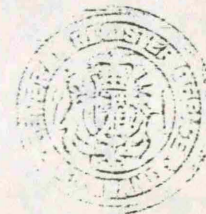

First I shall give you the information that I have gathered about William Edward³ Law.

All of this information came from Mr. Gooch and I am most grateful.

William was never a Woolwich man and spent little of his military service there, but he died in Woolwich.

On his discharge from the army - Jan. 1, 1881 - his intended place of residence was to be 22 Devonshire Place. Mr. Gooch found the following - "22 Devonshire Place was (according to the 1881 census) occupied by 2 separate households. The first was a family called Clarke; and the second consisted solely of Henry Law - head - married - 32 - born in Lambeth. This Henry was a brother of our William. If William had been a lodger of either family the return would have said so. It is curious that his wife (and any children) were away from home at the time. Mr. Gooch searched the families in the surrounding streets for the whole of that particular census district (about 3000 names) but found nothing."

William Law served most of his army years in India. He retired with a permanent disability of Ostitis (apparently an inflammation of the bone). This may have affected his conduct and perhaps led to his death. So family life for William and Mercy could have been difficult.

William died at age 42 from apoplexy. Apoplexy was a Victorian term applied to someone who died in a kind of fit - not too precisely diagnosed - possibly due to drink.

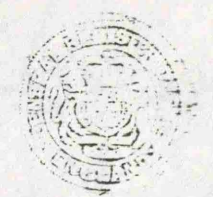

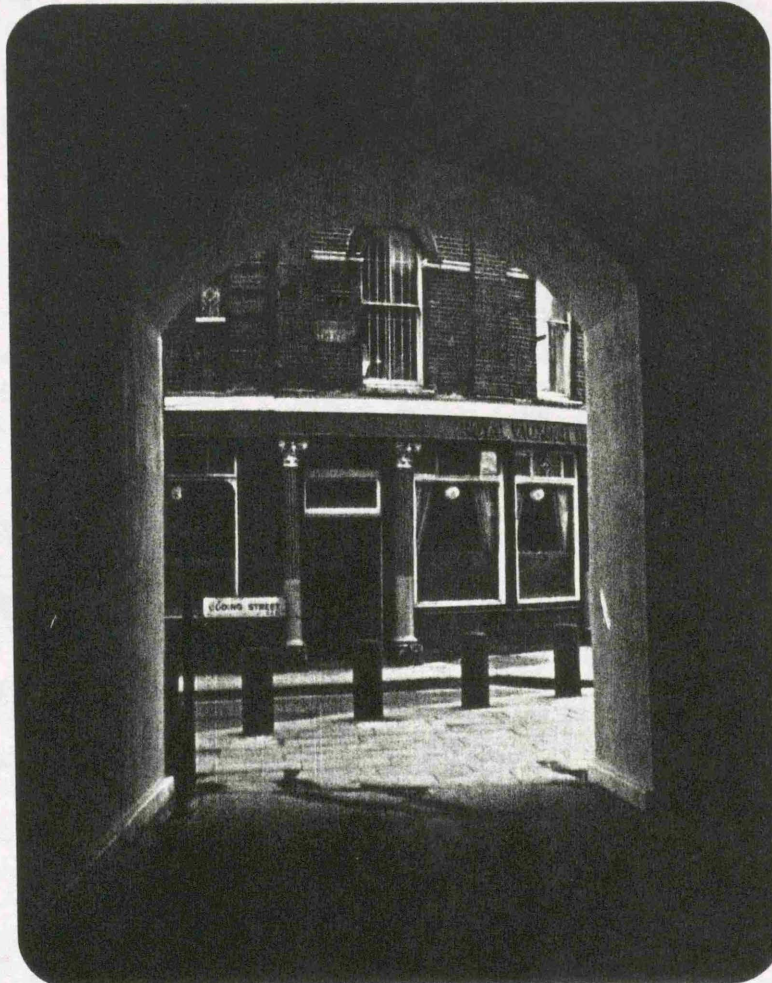

Below is a picture of the Royal Vauxhaul Tavern, Goding St. Lambeth - seen from the pedestrian passageway under the main railway line. The picture was taken by Mr. Gooch in March of 1981.

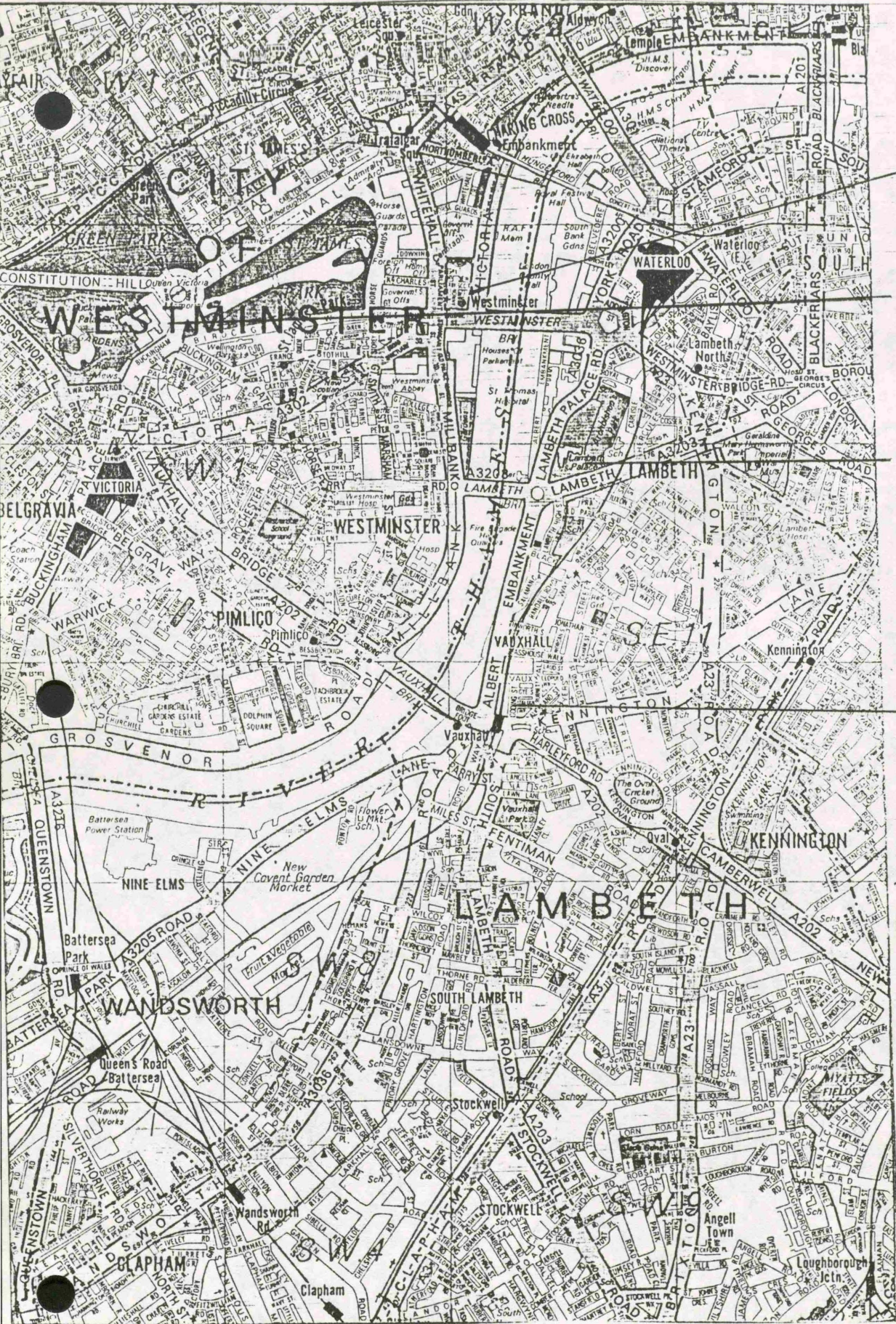


This picture - also taken by Mr. Gooch - shows Goding St. looking north. On the left is the railway viaduct. Picture taken in March of 1981.



Goding Street

This street was built about 1857 - close to the centre of London, on the wrong side of the river, and near to the railway. No houses now survive except one corner building (a public house) shown in the picture on the previous page. The houses here were fairly standard Victorian accommodation, two or three storey houses - mostly sublet to more than one family. Although part of Kennington and Camberwell would have been reasonable places to live, Vauxhaul (despite its proximity to the seat of government, just across the river) would not have been fashionable at that time. Goding St. is squeezed up against the railway viaduct, carrying the main line from Waterloo terminus to the south and west of England. The houses may have been destroyed in the 1939 war, but the roadway still is preserved. It adjoins a noisy and busy road junction. The photo of the street is looking north from the junction with Kennington Lane. The other picture shows the view as one approaches Goding St. through the pedestrian passageway under the railway by the Vauxhaul station. The Vauxhaul Tavern is probably late Victorian and is the only building standing in the street. The blue building in the distance in the other photo looks like a Victorian warehouse and was probably there in 1850.

Both Woolwich and Aldershot are military garrison towns - so there must have been some reason for Mercy to go the Aldershot (about 35 miles south west of London) Woolwich is a military town containing large barracks, a naval dockyard and an armament factory. Neither Albion Rd. nor John St. appear on modern maps, but Frances St. is still there. The barracks were large and inhospitable.

Lambeth - is that part of London - opposite the Houses of Parliament - on the other side of the river Thames The 1871 census covers 1200 street names - but some of these streets were very short.

ALDERSHOTT CAMP, a standing garrison for a large force, situated about 35 miles from London, on the confines of Hampshire and Surrey. It was established in May 1855, and was intended as a military training school, especially for officers of the higher grades. Its germ is to be found in the temporary camp on Chobham Ridges, formed in 1853 by Lord Hardinge, then commander-in-chief, the success of which convinced him of the necessity of giving our troops practical instruction in the field, and affording our generals opportunities of manœuvring large bodies of the three arms. He therefore advised the purchase of a tract of waste land whereon a permanent camp might be established. His choice fell on Aldershott, a spot also recommended by strategic reasons, being so placed that a force holding it covered the capital. Nothing came of Lord Hardinge's proposal till the experience of the Crimean campaign fully endorsed his opinion. The lands at Aldershott—an extensive open heath country, sparsely dotted by fir woods and intersected by the Basingstoke canal—were then acquired by the Crown. The first occupants of the camp were two battalions of the Guards and seven of embodied militia. On the return of the Crimean army, cavalry, artillery, and infantry of the line arrived and took possession of the lines of wooden huts and the permanent barracks, which had by this time been erected. Since then Aldershott has varied little in its principal features. It is separated into two grand divisions, styled the north and south camps. Beyond the latter are the permanent cavalry and infantry barracks and the queen's pavilion. Farnham is the nearest town, being only 4 miles from the south camp; Guildford and Godalming are 10 and 12 respectively, Windsor 18½, and Reading 21 miles. The soil on which the camp stands is a light peat, and a fruitful source of discomfort to its inhabitants. A little wet turns it into tenacious mud, while a little sunshine produces a black dust, not soon forgotten by those who have campaigned in the "Long Valley." The force stationed at Aldershott at the beginning of 1874 was composed of 1 cavalry and 3 infantry brigades; in the former there were 3 full regiments, in the latter a total of 11 battalions, with several depots of regiments abroad. Besides these, there were 2 batteries of horse and 6 of field artillery, 2 companies of Royal Engineers, and 4 troops of Royal Engineers' train (with pontoon, &c.); 7 companies of the Army Service Corps and 2 of the Army Hospital Corps—to provide for transport, and the services of bakehouse and slaughterhouse and hospital—made up the total strength of all ranks, as shown in the returns dated 1st January 1874, to 10,601 men, 2198 horses, and 48 guns. It is a lieutenant-general's command, and one highly prized, from its essentially military character and the practical experience it affords in handling a considerable force. Sir William Knollys (afterwards comptroller of the household to the Prince of Wales) was its first chief. He was succeeded by Sir John Pennefather; Sir James Scarlett followed; then Sir Hope Grant, who held the command in 1874. Naturally so large a military colony soon attracted other elements to Aldershott heath. Within a few years a town of Aldershott sprang up close by, and increased rapidly. Here the professions and all trades are well represented; there are respectable solicitors, surgeons, bankers, brewers, many schools, a steam printing press, a weekly military paper, and numerous shops. During the summer months or "drill season" the camp is a scene of incessant activity; field-days and parades follow in rapid succession, and owing to the camp's accessibility from London, the troops are often turned out at a few

hours' notice to make a show for royalty or foreign visitors. Yet there is much to beguile vacant hours; many clubs—for cricket, croquet, racquets, and the drama—a gymnasium, and several excellent libraries. Admirable charities also exist for the assistance and relief of the soldiers' wives and children. (A. G.)

Here is the information that I have gathered about Mercy Jane Togwell Holmes Law

When William Edward³ Law died in 1888, Mercy was only 35 years old. Her two sons were quite small and besides that, there was her daughter Teresa Maud Holmes (age 11) and perhaps more Holmes children. Then, too, there was whatever family William Law had by his first marriage. One story has it that there were at least two stepsons along with Teresa.

Miss A. Legg of the After Care Section of the Barnardo Home was most helpful and she was able to fill me in about those difficult years. Here is what she wrote.

"Mercy was sober and hard working - but was only able to earn a little by taking in washing. Her furniture was taken in payment for rent and for some time, she and the boys had to move from place to place. The boys became beyond her control, frequently truanting from school, and she sought help from the Barnardo Home.

Henry Edward⁴ Law was admitted to their care on July 7, 1890. Charles⁴ Law remained with his mother. Her address at that time was Crimea Rd. Aldershot."

Sometime between 1890 and 1914, Mercy married for the third time. Her husband's name was Cook. And by this marriage she had at least one child that we know about- she was Daisy Cook and she went to Australia.

Below are pictures of Henry Edward⁴ Law - the 1st taken when he was admitted in 1890 and the 2nd when he left for Canada in 1892. We were so thrilled to get these pictures - they came also from Miss Legg.



BOOK I CHAPTER I

Henry Edward (Harry)⁴ Law

On the next page you will see a copy of Harry's birth certificate. It was sent by Mr. Go

As stated on a previous page, Harry was admitted to the care of the Barnardo Home on July 7, 1890. At age 9, he sailed for Canada on board the S.S. Mongolian. The ship left England in September and on Sept. 15, arrived in Quebec, most likely Montreal. He must have been one of a group of boys who were met at the dock by someone and escorted to Ontario.

On Sept. 20, Harry was boarded out on the farm of Mr. H. MacQuarrie of Baysville in the Muskoka area.

In January of 1895, he worked for a Mr. John Smith of Kintore, near Woodstock. I am grateful to Miss A. Legge of the Barnardo After Care Section for these two names.

I tried to locate descendants of the MacQuarrie family of Baysville - wrote letters to two MacQuarrie families still living in that area. - but received no replies. Then I tried to locate the descendants of Mr. John Smith. Here I was more successful. From a Leona Alderson, of R.R.1, Burgessville, I received the following information about the Smiths.

"The Smith home is on the 8th concession and only a mile from the town line of Middlesex. I was born in 1906 and remember John Smith and his wife as nice old people. His son, Orie, lived on the farm until his death. He was an only son. Then - Orie's son, Gordon Smith, kept on with the farm. Gordon has sold or rented the land and moved to London, Ont."

Shortly thereafter, I did receive a letter from this Gordon Smith. Here is what he had to say - "I remember my father and grandfather John, speaking of Harry Law. My grandfather died in 1938 and my father died in 1964 - so I could not pursue the matter. I, however talked to my Aunt Olive, who is 93. She does remember the name but not how long Harry lived at our place."

One record shows that Harry attended the East Zorros school 1892 - 1898. I think that it was at the Baysville farm that he was mistreated. He had to sleep in the barn. He was not given proper food or clothing and he was forced to wear shoes that were too small for him. As a result, he had foot problems for the rest of his life.

As soon as he was old enough, Harry left and went to Toronto. There he worked in a mens clothing store for a time. It was here that he joined the militia - perhaps the 48th Highlanders.

In 1903 or 1904 - Harry went to Kingston and for a time worked in Bibby's - a mens clothing store. He also worked occasionally at the Gage grocery store. It was in Kingston that he joined the army - the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery and later the Medical Corp.

And it was in Kingston that he fell in love with Ada Lena Gage. Her parents did not want her to marry a soldier. So in 1906 - 1907 - he was in the army and out - by purchase. Harry and Ada met through Class 27, a group from Queen St. Methodist Church. The Gage family were strong Methodists. Ada played the piano and Harry sang. He also had a glockenspiel - and this instrument is still in the family to-day.

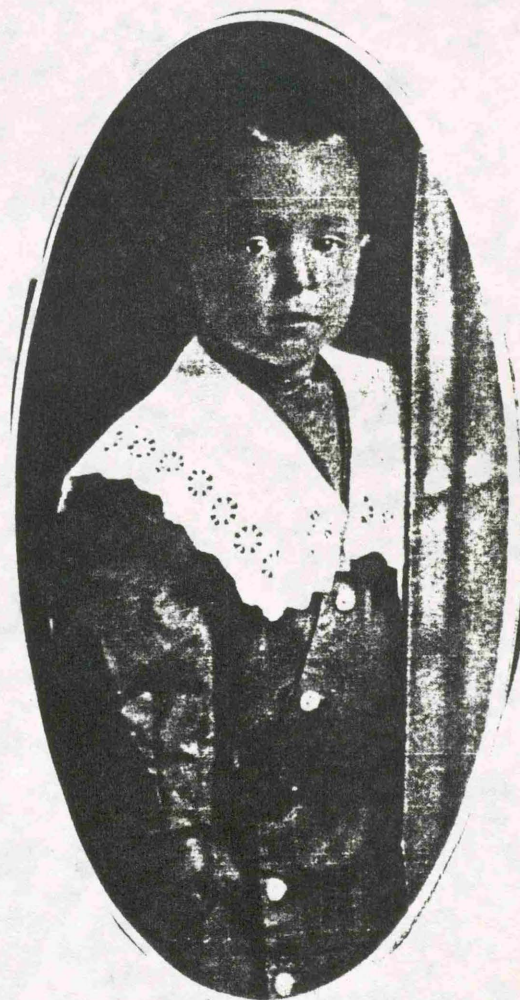

In 1908, Harry again joined the Army. He quickly rose from the rank of Private to Captain. During World War I, he was overseas for 5 years.

Since he was an officer, he was allowed to take his family to England for some of the war years. So - in 1916 - Ada, Gage and Bert went over on the S.S. Tunisia and they returned to Canada on the Metagama in 1918. There was some excitement on board the S.S. Metagama - when the ship was torpedoed - but they managed to get to port. While in England, the family stayed in Plymouth.

Harry always claimed that he was the first Canadian to land in France. He belonged to the Medical Corp of No. 2, Stationary Hospital and was in the first unit to cross the channel to France in November of 1914. He spent Christmas of 1914 in France, for we have a letter which he wrote on Feb. 16, 1915 from Torquette, France, thanking someone for the gifts that he had received. We have done considerable research about this point. I did receive from the National Library of Canada, a picture - which could be Harry and others making this landing. We have concluded that maybe there were three men who claimed this honour - namely - Harry Law, Staff Sgt. J.A. MacDonald, & Edgar A. Teahan.

I have corresponded with the MacDonald family and learned the following - "Staff Sgt. J.A. MacDonald was an officer in World War I, having become a druggist and he was responsible for most drugs supplied to the Canadian Army. He claimed to be the first Canadian soldier to set foot in France, and as a Sgt. was probably the first enlisted man down the gangplank."

Re Edgar A. Teahan - I noticed his death notice in the paper in 1981 and immediately wrote to his family. I received no reply.

Harry Law did receive the Mons Star and a letter written by the Curator of the Hamilton Military Museum seems to confirm the whole story. At any rate, we are all proud of Harry and he most certainly was one of the first, if not the first, to land in France.

Besides this letter and the picture already mentioned, you will see a clipping from an Ottawa paper and the Ottawa Evening Citizen and articles from the Daily British Whig - the Kingston paper at the time.

They left on Monday for France, Lieut. Colonel A. T. Shillington, Ottawa, in command. The staff includes nine officers and one hundred and fifty men.

The officers of No. 2 Stationary Hospital who have gone to the front include, in addition to Lieut. Colonel A. T. Shillington, the following: Majors S. H. McKee and C. J. Williams; Captains N. E. Munroe, S. H. Morris, Myrand and F. Es Currie; Supernumerary Captain J. W. C. Johnson, Dental Surgeon B. L. Neilly.

Dr. the Hon. H. S. Beland, who has served with the Belgian army since the outbreak of the war, applied some time ago to be attached to No. 2 Hospital whenever it was sent to the Continent.

All the officers named are Ottawa men. The nursing sisters of the Canadian expeditionary force number about one hundred and are in charge of Nursing Mastrons M. C. MacDonald and H. Ridley.

Seven thousand of the Canadian expeditionary force on Salisbury Plain, including the Fourth Infantry Brigade, moved into tents today.

Was First Canadian Soldier To Set Foot In France In 1914

THE first Canadian soldier to land in France in the Great War is a visitor in the city today. He is Capt. H. E. Law, director of physical education in Verdun High School. Capt. and Mrs. Law are visitors at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Frazer, 61 Blake street. Capt. Law enlisted in the medical corps at Kingston, and was a sergeant-major in No. 2 Canadian Stationary Hospital Unit, which sailed from Southampton on November 8, 1914, while the members of the First Canadian Contingent were still floundering in the mud of Salisbury Plains, and wondering who would have the distinction of being the first to land in France.

The departure of the hospital unit was carried out with great secrecy, and the Canadians landed at Le Havre on the morning of November 9. About 11 o'clock that morning Sergt.-Major Law of Kingston, Ontario, was marching down the gangplank. He was the first Canadian soldier exclusive of reservists who had been living in Canada and recalled to their units, to land in France. He was closely followed by Staff Sergeant McDonald of Sarnia, who was the second man ashore.

Although reluctant to discuss his war service, Capt. Law recalled the

events of that morning when interviewed today.

"I recall the thing that impressed me most as we landed," he reminisced. "The kits of British officers who had been killed were piled in heaps in the shed, to be sent back to England. Most of them had bloodstains on them. That reminded us forcibly that we were going to war."

The first order which he read in camp, he recalled, was that of a member of a Wiltshire regiment had been court-martialed, and ordered shot on a charge of attempted desertion.

"The order was duly carried out at seven o'clock this morning," he recalled reading to the Canadian unit—further reminder of the grim business of war.

There was no welcome and no ceremony in connection with the landing of the first Canadian unit. The troops were met by a British R.T.O. and escorted to camp. The Canadians were under the command of Col. A. T. Shillington of Ottawa. The second in command was Col. C. H. Elliott, who died in Toronto on Thursday.

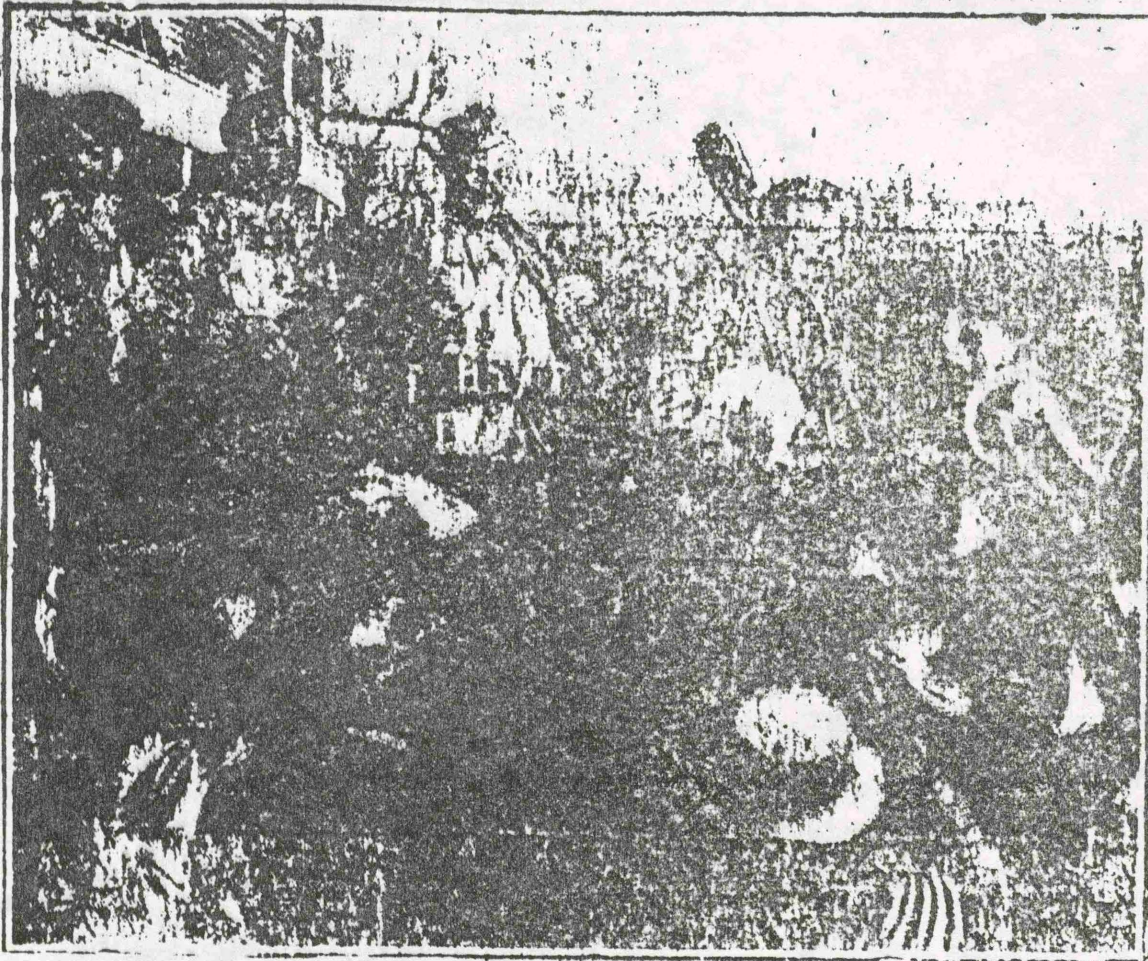

Dear Mrs. Law,

We have received your letter of enquiry concerning your father-in-law Harry Law. Sgt.-Maj. Harry E. Law (W.O.) #34251 is listed for the No.2 Stationary Hospital, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Adam T. Shillington.

The Canadian Medical Corps were indeed the first Canadians to reach Europe. In fact the 1914 (Mons) Star was presented to only 100 Canadians, all members of No.2 Stationary Hospital. The medal was awarded to personnel who served in France or Belgium before November 22-23, 1914, and No.2 Stationary Hospital was the only Canadian Contingent to qualify. Some hospital staff landed at Boulogne November 8th. and others at Le Harve Nov. 9th., 1914.

Assuming that he was with the Boulogne contingent, your father would thus have been in the first group to set foot in France, and, as the Sergeant-Major, may have actually been the first one to disembark. Those landing at Boulogne had embarked at Southamton on Nov. 7th. on the hospital ship Carisbrooke Castle. We have no information on hand concerning the Le Harve group. We do not have a copy of the photograph you mentioned to confirm the order of landing. It may be on file with the Public Archives of Canada in Ottawa or perhaps with the Canadian War Museum, also in Ottawa.

It should also be possible to trace Sgt.-Maj. Law's service record as you now have his serial number and his unit.

Dear Mrs. Law:

Thank you for your letter which we received June 6, 1982, concerning a picture of the first Canadian to land in France during World War I.

We searched the Ottawa newspapers for November and December 1918 and the Kingston Whig-Standard for November 1914 to November 1918. The latter was a very cursory search mainly of the photo sections at the end of every second issue. We did find two articles which may be of interest to you. The one is the landing of the British expeditionary force in France (this copy is the best that we could produce from the microfilm) from the Whig-Standard, September 9, 1914. The other article gives a listing of the Kingston men at the front as of April 8, 1916 (Whig-Standard also).

We phoned the librarian, Mr. Ludwig Kosche, at the Canadian War Museum to see if any clippings relating to the landing of the Canadians in France during World War I had been kept. Mr. Kosche had some general accounts of the No. 2 Stationary Hospital but no mention was made of Captain Law. Mr. Kosche referred me to the Directorate of History at National Defence Headquarters. Mr. Owen Cooke checked a list of commissioned officers from World War I-- the Jackson list compiled in the 1930's-- for a mention of Harry Law. He gave me the following information:

The Number 2 Stationary hospital was the first unit to see service in France in November 1914. H.E. Law was appointed Staff-Sergeant on September 4, 1914. He was at Valcartier September 25, 1914 and landed with the No. 2 Stationary Hospital November 9, 1914. He was promoted February 12, 1915 to Honorary Lieutenant and Honorary Captain (the same day). On March 10, 1916 he was assigned to Number 3 General Hospital and on April 12, 1918 to Number 9 Stationary Hospital. His name appeared on the Canadian Army Medical Corps medical list June 9, 1919 and was "struck off" December 31, 1919 (name on the Quarter Master lists of the Canadian Army Medical Corps). On May 12, 1920, he was promoted to Brevette-Lieutenant in the Princess of Wales Own Regiment and was promoted to Captain, January 1, 1922 and assigned to the second battalion March 1, 1926.

The account ended at this date. Mr. Cooke suggested that you write to the Princess of Wales Regiment, Montreal Street Armoury, Kingston, Ontario as they have some archival material.

We hope that this information will be helpful to you.



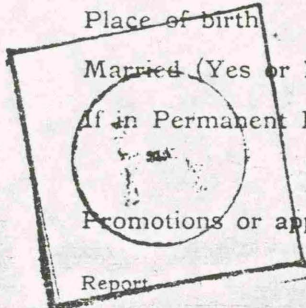

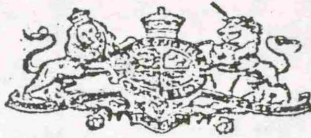

Recommendation for retirement.

The Adjutant-General submits for consideration a recommendation that Captain (Quartermaster) Harry Edward Law, C.E.F., (Quartermaster-Sergeant, The Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps) be retired to pension on reorganization of the Permanent Force, such retirement to have effect from 31st. December, 1919.

This officer served in the Permanent Force from 6th. February, 1906, to 8th. September, 1907, and from 22nd. January, 1908, to date of retirement. He proceeded overseas in the ranks and attained the rank of Captain (Quartermaster) in the Overseas Military Forces of Canada.

19424 / On the 8th. November, 1919, Capt. Law stated that he would prefer to retire to pension rather than revert to his Permanent Force status, and asked to be retired on 10th. November, 1919. At a meeting of the Selection Board, it was decided that there would not be available any suitable employment for this officer in a commissioned capacity, on reorganization of the Permanent Force, and retirement to pension was accordingly recommended.

Pending confirmation of the Honourable the Minister in Militia Council, the retirement of Captain Law was approved, and the G.O.C. M.D. No. 3 notified accordingly on the 13th. November, 1919. Retirement was set, however, for the 31st. December, 1919, in order that Captain Law might be granted further leave before retirement.

If retirement, as now recommended, is approved, Captain (Quartermaster) H.E. Law will be granted the rank of Captain (Quartermaster) in the Permanent Force so that retirement may be with that status. He will then be entitled to a pension of \$651.52 per annum, to be increased after 13 197/365 years by \$1.41, when all unpaid arrears will have been recovered.

When Harry returned to Kingston after the war ended, he tried selling insurance. At this he was very successful and he became a member of the 'Million Dollar Club' very quickly. He also found time to brighten up the streets for Christmas. See article below. He was always studying and taking courses - a business course from Shaw's College - a calligraphy course in script writing - and numerous other correspondence courses. A Physical Education teacher was needed at Kingston Collegiate and Vocational Institute. Harry applied and he got the job (with only a Gr. 6 education). He took summer courses at various places in order to qualify. From Kingston he went to teach in Shawinigan Falls, Que. and later in Verdun, Que. In Verdun, one of his students was Buzz Berling, famous war ace. Buzz gave his teacher one of his few pictures. After his death, his family refused to give out any information about him. Harry retired at age 65 and returned to Kingston.

During the summers when he was teaching in Quebec, he bought Cosy Island on Knowlton Lake - near Hartington, Ont. Here he built Gala Cottage with his own hands and help from his son-in-law, Clifford Smith. It was a beauty spot and many good times were spent there. You will see a picture of it on a following page.

He also liked to garden and grew scarlet runner beans and monstrous tomatoes. Besides this he was the Rose Man of Kingston. His home on Earl St. was surrounded by roses of all varieties. In 1953 he became the President of the Kingston Horticulture Society. He was in demand as a judge at all the flower shows in Kingston and surrounding area.

During World War II, he was a Flight Lieut. in the Reserve Air Cadets. See certificate on a previous page.

And finally he took up oil painting - studied under James Kierstead - now a famous painter - but at that time he was a Kingston policeman doing art in his spare time. Harry's paintings were great! He sold a number of them and gave them to his friends and family.

Harry and Ada celebrated their Golden Wedding in 1957. See article to follow.

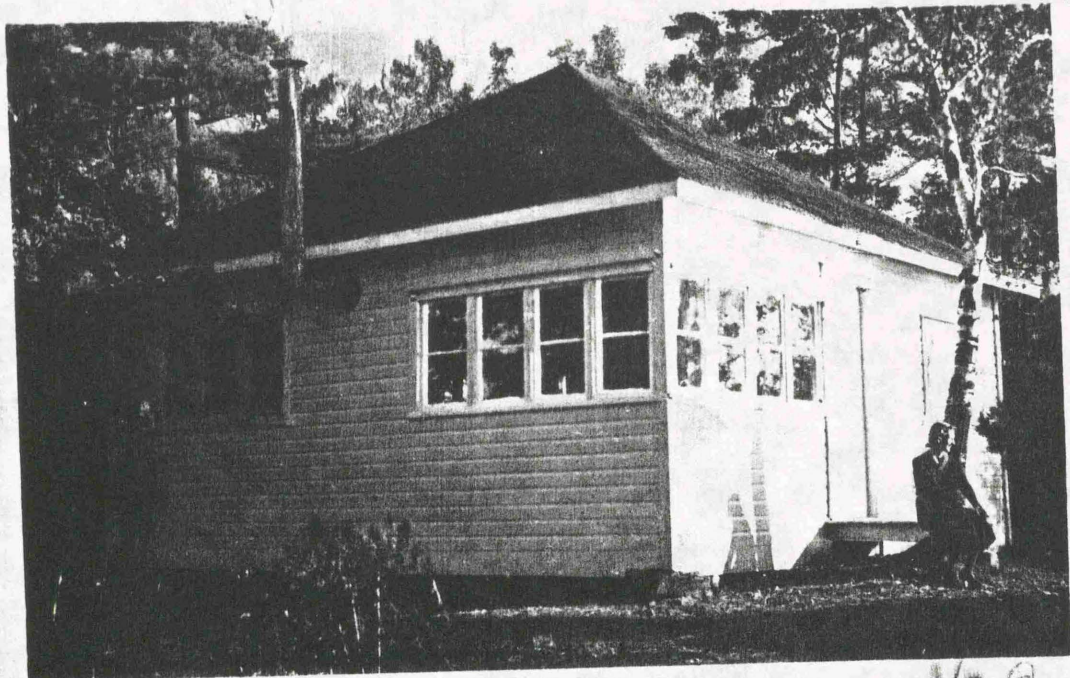
He enjoyed his retirement years to the full. What a life! He really made the most of each opportunity that came his way.

Harry E. Law

Harry E. Law of 59 Earl street, Kingston, died in the Kingston General Hospital last Friday, and his passing is mourned by many in Napanee, especially by members of the Horticultural Society.

Mr. Law was the prime mover in the re-organization of the Society in February 1953. Working through two of the charter members of the re-organized society, he was chairman of the meeting when about 50 interested people met and officers were elected. At that time he was president of the Kingston Society, and director for district three of the Ontario Horticultural Association.

During the meetings the first year, Mr. Law was frequently present and was always there when his presence was requested. He has always been a member. Especially at first, he was called on for advice, and frequently was the speaker or organized a program for the meeting. He and other members of the Kingston Society whom he selected often served as judges for the flower shows.

For about eight years he has been the judge for the flowers exhibited at the fall fair in Napanee.

He has made many friends in Napanee, and had been unstinting in his help to garden lovers. He was especially interested in rose growing, and each year contributed rose bushes as prizes for the flower show. Many of the members also received rose bushes as gifts from him.

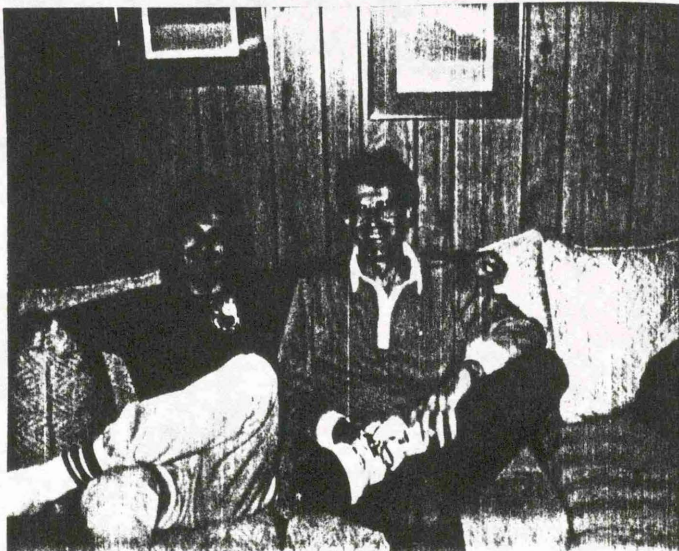

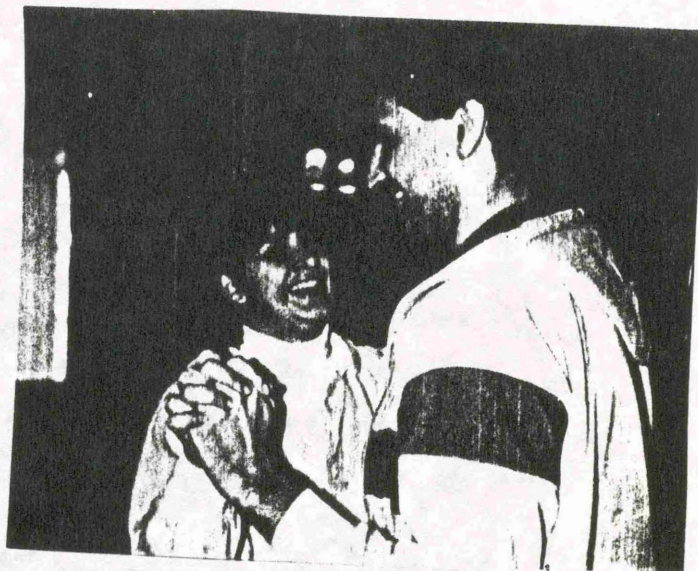

Hasty P's 'Troop the Colours'

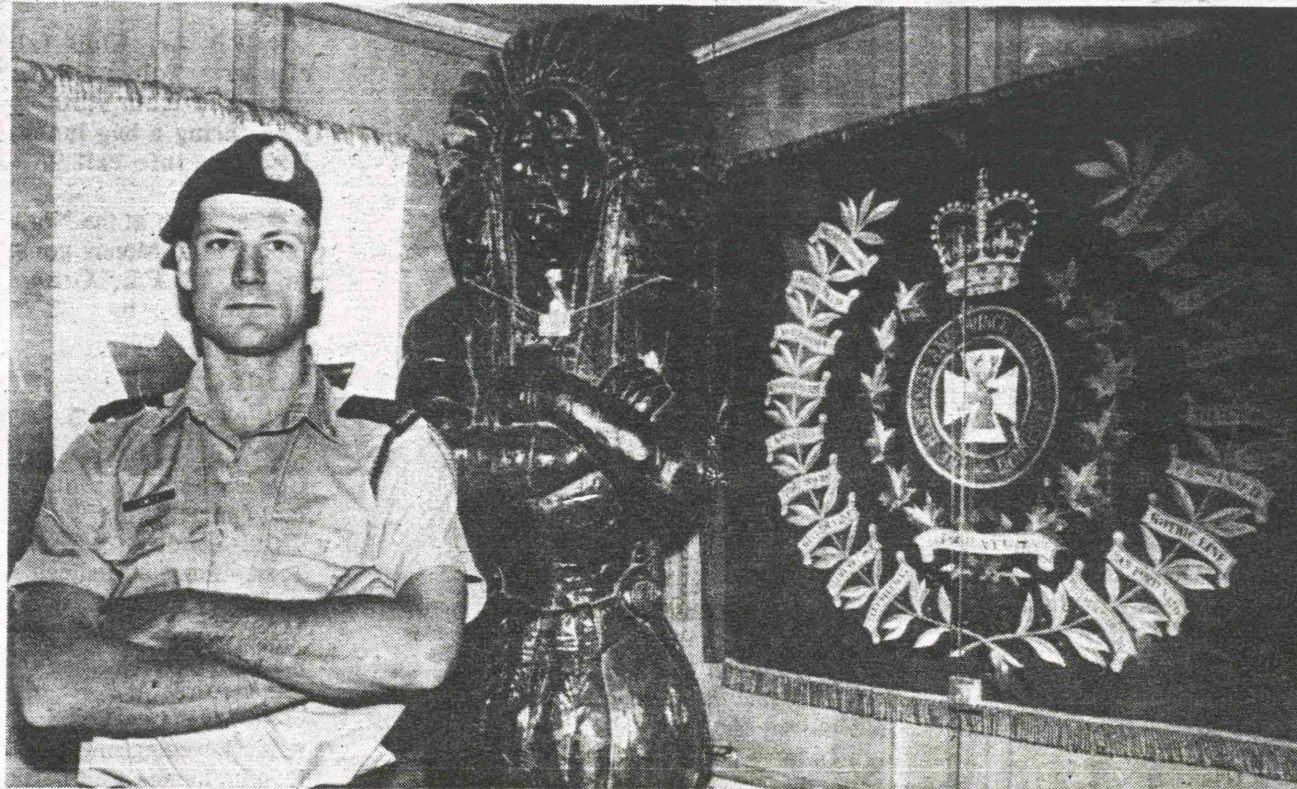

Living history is about to happen this fall.

During the first weekend in October the Hasting and Prince Edward Regiment will Troop the Colour for the first time since 1976 as part of the regiment's 125th/50th anniversary and reunion. Oct. 7 and 8 will be the regiment's 125th birthday and its 50th anniversary of mobilization for Second World War.

Colours have been used for centuries by armies and serve two main purposes: as a mark of distinction and as a rallying point during battle. Though the latter is no longer practiced, it is the tradition that carries on. Since 1751 regiments have been limited to two colours: the Sovereign, a symbol of the Crown, and the Regimental, representing the unit itself. The colours are emblazoned with names of battles in which the unit has distinguished itself, reminding the regiment of its history and traditions and is the unit's most prized possession.

The Hasty P's as they are affectionately known, will Troop the Colour on Saturday, Oct. 7, at 2 pm at the Belleville

fairgrounds. The colours will be "trooped" across the parade grounds followed by a salute to the colour and a march past for the

finale.

This all promises to be quite a show, says Warrant Officer Steve Smith, who hopes to get "150 to 160

militia on parade" for the "once in a lifetime event." He is expecting a large turnout of 1,000 or more.

A large contingent of

post-war veterans is also expected to attend, said Smith, who has had enquiries from as far away as South Africa and

Australia.

Approximately 60 dignitaries are to be in attendance, including Lord and Lady Tweedsmuir as well as Brigadier General Seamark, both former Hasty P's.

In the forefront of all these dignitaries will be Chief Petawawamuch, the regiment's mascot, a nine-foot-tall Indian carved out of solid maple.

On Sunday the regiment will be granted Freedom of the Town of Picton, a tradition that dates back to medieval times when armies had to camp outside of walled cities and were not allowed to parade through the city with their colours displayed. The ceremony will grant the Hasty P's access to the town and the right to parade with their colours.

Everybody is welcomed to attend this rare event at the Picton fairgrounds.

It's "very rare that a militia unit undertakes something this large," said Smith, a 10-year-veteran of the Hasty P's. The excitement is growing says Smith, who is hoping for a parade position in this event "reminiscent of armies 75 to 100 years ago."

Canada's armored train a "footnote" to wartime but it's topic for book

An "interesting but rather important footnote" in the annals of Canadian military history is what Belleville resident Neil Smith soon wants to share with the general public.

Smith has started his research into Canada's only armored, wartime train -- the No. 1 Armoured Train used in the Pacific Coast Command to fend off what was feared as a possible attack by Japanese invaders in 1942-43.

But Smith needs the public's help in getting any information he can on the train. He's asking anyone who has any pictures, stories or recollections of the train unit to contact him at his 166 William St. residence.

"I think it would take me about one to two years to gather all the information I need to write a book on it. And I hope to have it published in Canada for national distribution," Smith says.

Smith said he's not writing the book to make a profit.

"I just think it's something (the armored train) that should receive some national exposure in Canada. It's a rather unusual story in Canadian military history and I want to tell it to the Canadian public."

Smith, who's had no formal military experience other than being a cadet years ago and a cadet instructor for the past nine years at the Belleville Armouries, said he has "a lot of interest in the military."

Besides a "fairly strong" military background in his family, Smith is a collector of Canadian militaria. He already has a collection of some 2,000 pieces of military memorabilia dating back to the 1760s.

Smith, with a large collection of military books, has never written a book before. But all that changed when he recently read a short article on the armored train in the Canadian Journal of Arms Collecting.

"This (armored train) struck me as something that had not been known about in Canada. I'm sure not too many people know we had such a train in Canada before. I think it's too important a footnote in our military history to be passed over," Smith said.

His research has already generated this information about the armored war-time train: It was built by CN Rail in Winnipeg for the government in June 1942. It was seven cars long, powered by a diesel-electric locomotive. There were two, heavy machine gun cars, two anti-aircraft cars, two living-quarters and communication units and a searchlight car.

The train was manned by the Winnipeg Grenadiers and soldiers from other Canadian units from July 1942 to October 1943, when it was taken out of service.

The train was never fired upon by the enemy, nor had it been used to fend off any enemy attacks.

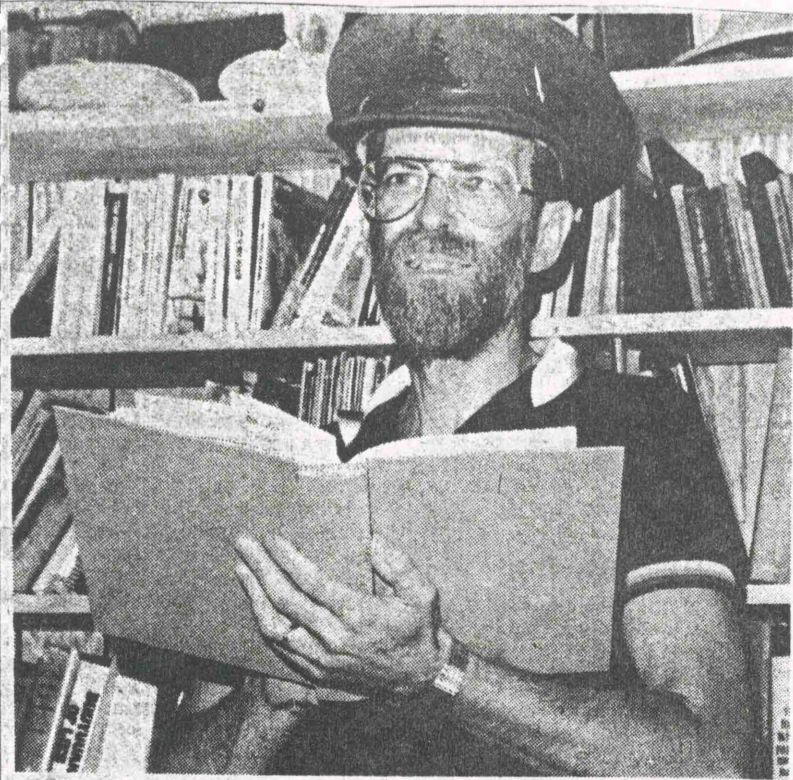
The purpose of the train was to provide a mobile artillery unit that travelled along the country's west coast shoreline, warding off any attacks by the Japanese, who, a year earlier, had attacked Pearl Harbor.

Smith said he's read the train was disbanded in July 1944 and its individual cars returned to normal railway service.

"But what exactly happened to the train after it was taken out of service is something I don't know. And that's one of the things I'm trying to find out," he said.

Some of the information already received by Smith was generated through the Canadian Public Archives in Ottawa, which supplied him with a war diary of the armored train and the military unit manning it. He's also received some photos of the actual train.

But Smith said he's hoping notices he placed in the Sentinel, the Canadian Armed Forces magazine, and the Canadian Legion magazine, will generate even more first-hand information about the armored train.

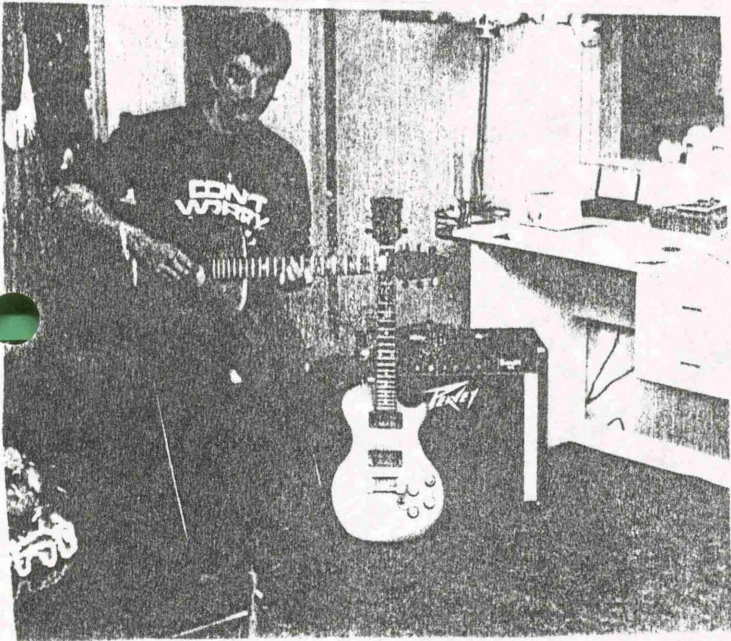

Charles Thomas⁴ Law

It was Mr. Gooch who sent me the copy of Charles' birth certificate, but it was Mr. Attwood who found his death certificate. You will see copies of both on the following pages. On the death certificate, his next of kin was a daughter - Eva Jenkins - and her address was given. We had expected to learn that Charles had died in Africa, so finding him in Wales was quite a surprise. The Africa bit, is a story in itself. I shall save it for the Conclusion of this book.

At any rate, we now had an address. Mr. Attwood tried and tried without success to reach Eva Jenkins. Then we tried many times. Two or three years ago, at Christmas, I sent a card and letter to her address in Wales. I am so grateful that the lady living now at that address opened and read my letter and replied to me. She told me that Eva Jenkins had not lived there for 6 or 7 years and that she did not know where she was. However, this lady suggested that I write to the Post Office in this little Welsh village and explain my problem. This I did - and lo and behold - Eva Jenkins had a younger sister - Iris Games - living in that same village! They referred my letter to her. Iris was most interested and put us in touch with the rest of Charles' family. What a thrill!

Now, my husband, Bert Law, had first cousins that he did not know existed, and many second and third cousins.

Edith was born at Wroughton, near Swindon, and her father and brothers worked on the Great Western Railway there.

Charles was born at ⁴Goding St. Vauxhaul, Lambeth. He did not go to school much because at that time, you had to pay a half penny and his mother could not afford to send him. But Charles had good handwriting and he was always reading history books.

Alan Games, husband of Iris Law, thinks that he recalls Charles telling him - that he put his age on in order to go to the Boer War. And he thinks that Chas. went as a mercenary. David Law also mentions this part about being a mercenary. This would be around 1899 - 1902 - so if Charles went, he would have been 15 or 16 at the time.

Charles met his wife, Edith, when in the Wiltshire regiment at Swindon. This was 90 miles due west of London. They were married in 1905.

The family left England for Wales in 1908 - 09 in order to find work. At that time there were three Iron Smelting Works in Wales. All of their children, except the first two were born in Wales.

Charles served in World War I. He was wounded in France in 1917 - shrapnel in the back. He suffered a lot from this in later years. He was sent back to the front and was wounded a second time. His youngest daughter, Iris, has the 2 bullets that wounded her father, along with his medals etc. which she keeps in the brass cigarette tin given to all soldiers at the front by King George V. There is quite a story here - but I will save it and include it when I get to the youngest child, Iris. Contact was made with his brother, Harry, also in France in 1917, by letter, at least.

The family remember seeing this picture of Harry Law hanging on the wall in their home and they were told that he was the brother who had gone to Canada.

After World War I, work was scarce. Charles was laid off from the coal mines in Wales. The family was poor. So the family supplemented their income by going up into the mountains, digging coal and selling it. Charles was identified as a builder's labourer.

During World War II, Charles was in the Fire Service and was sent to all the cities helping to put out the fires during the bombing raids.

Charles loved the outdoors and climbing hills and rocks. He grew lovely flowers and was proud of his runner beans. He could play any instrument - piano, banjo, accordian - but he had no musical training. One of the pictures that follow - is of Charles at his club - where he was security at the door. The group of ladies entering were going to play bingo. This was on the occasion of his 80th birthday and they gave him a small gift. When he died his address was 62 Brondeg Heolgerrig, Merthyr. He is buried at Merthyr. Charles and Edith had 7 children.

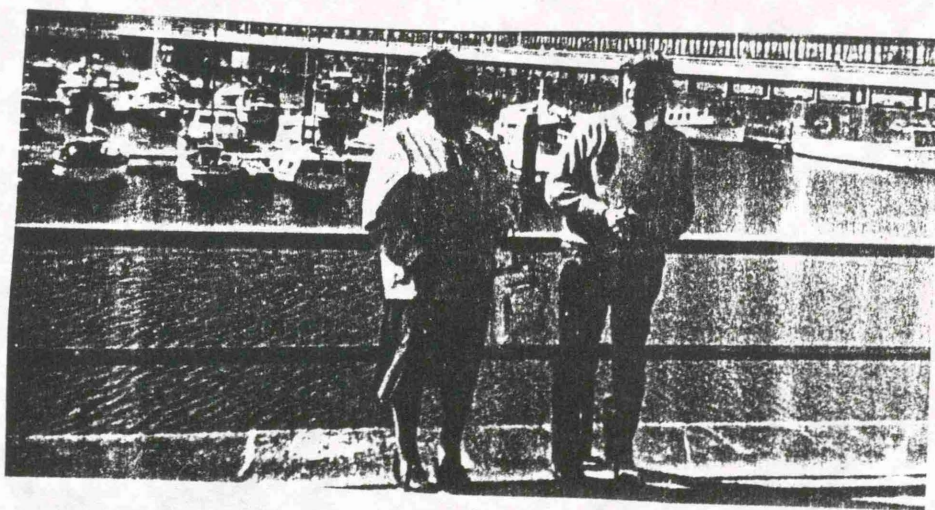

David was born in Wales. He recalls helping his father to gather coal wastes because the family was poor. He also recalls visiting his grandmother Cook at Swindon - as a young boy - age 8. Daisy Cook was there and a young man (?) who took him to the pictures (movies).

At age 10 he passed for secondary school and spent 5 years there. Then came the General Strike in 1926 and there was no work. So, he joined the Navy. He was 14 and retired after 34 years of service. He became a Chief Petty Officer and Gunnery Instructor.

In 1933, he was a young seaman, visiting Redruth and he met Eileen. They were married in 1935 in Plymouth at the Registry Office. A few years ago they celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary.

In 1936 he was aboard HMS Crafton - which was an escort for the yacht, Nahlin, carrying Edward VIII and Mrs. Simpson.

During World War II, he was on HMS Renown and remembers looking for the Graf Spee.

David recalls Gunnery School in Washington, D.C. Then he had to go by train to Vancouver, B.C. Then they went by boat down the west coast through the Panama Canal and up the east coast calling at Norfolk, New York and Halifax, N.S. They used to carry the fighter planes to replenish other squadrons.

In 1943 he was in Vancouver picking up a Woolworth Carrier.

They finished up in the Pacific with the Americans when VJ Day came.

After the War he joined the HMS Vanguard. It was to be used by George VI for a Royal Tour, but the Tour was cancelled because the King was too ill. He received the BEM for his outstanding zeal and devotion to duty while on the Vanguard.

Then he joined the Enard Bay, and finally the Ark Royal 1958 - 60.

His naval career ended at RNAS Culdrose in Jan. 1961.

He returned to Redruth and worked with Gray's - bakers and then with Graham Brabyns until he retired in 1980.

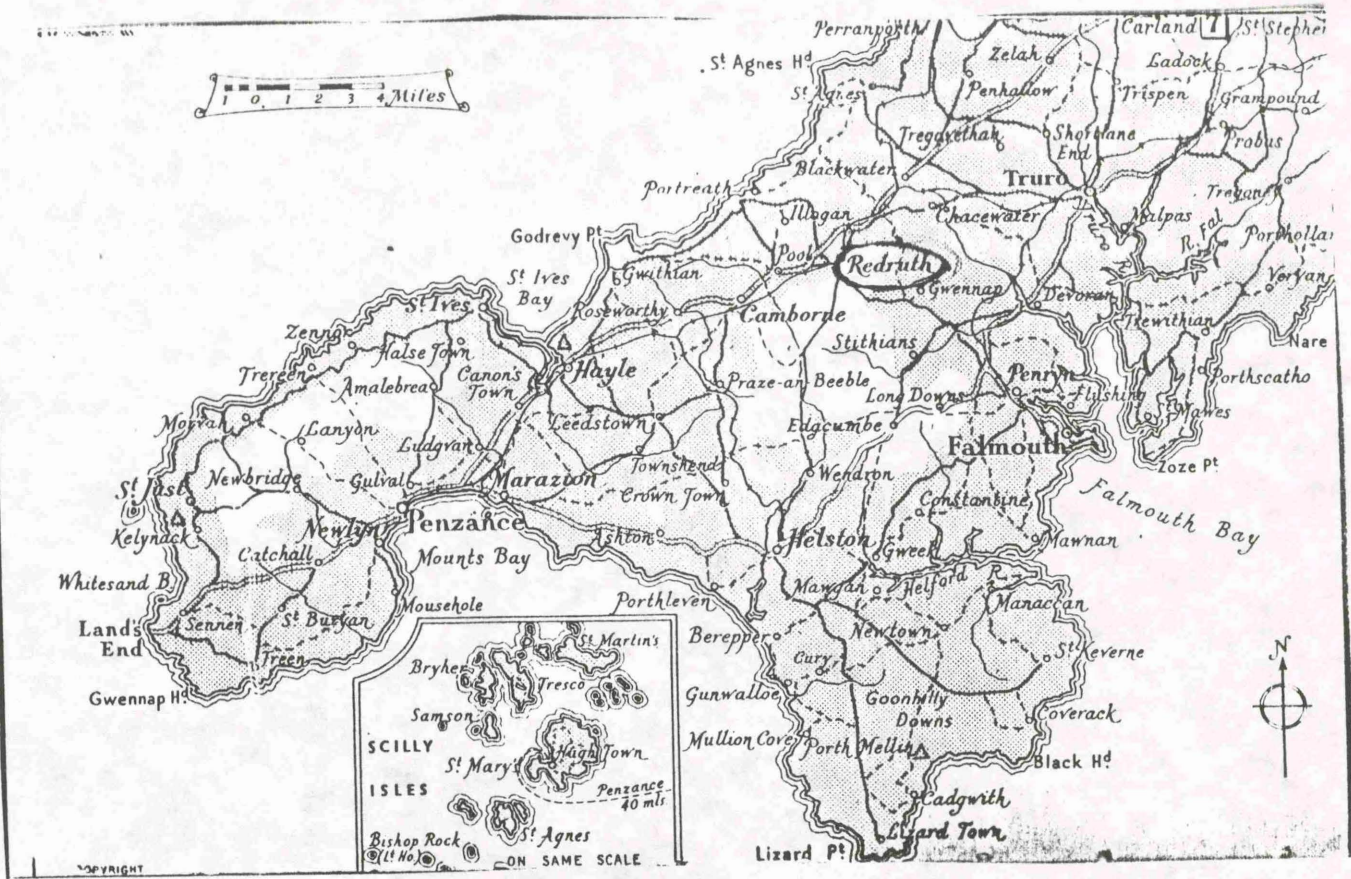
David enjoys making wine from gooseberries, red currants and elder flower.

Their address is 51 East End, Redruth, Cornwall, England. Cornwall is quiet in winter, but very busy in summer because of the tourists.

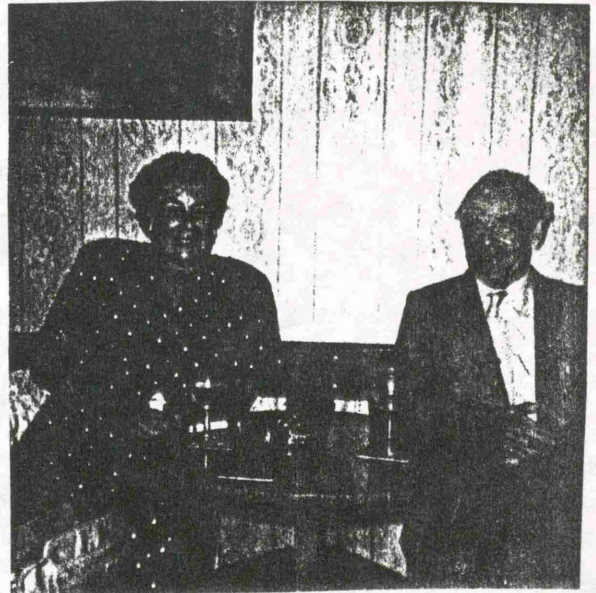

Family party marks 50 years



ON A WEEKEND visit to Redruth in 1933, a young seaman, David Law met a local girl, Eileen Thomas ... and last weekend they marked 50 married years with a big family party.

But many of those years were spent apart. For ex-CPO Law was at sea — at times for up to nearly three years — while his wife brought up their four children at Redruth.

Early in the 1939-45 War, he was on HMS Renown, a battle cruiser, in a force chasing the German pocket battle cruisers, Scharnhorst and Gnersinagu.

In one engagement, a German shell passed within ten feet of him. He was with Renown when it went looking for the Graft Spec, only to find the job done and on Ark Royal chasing the Bismark.

Part of the war was spent on the Woolworth Carriers, adapted as carriers by the Americans, taking aircraft and supplies across the Pacific.

The war over, Mr. Law joined the 2,000 men on HMS Vanguard, Britain's last battleship. He prepared the ship for a planned Royal tour by King George VI but the king was too ill to travel.

For his "outstanding zeal and devotion to duty" on Vanguard Mr. Law received the BEM.

From Vanguard he joined Enard Bay, a frigate of only 1,500 tons, then the famous Ark Royal. He ended his career at RNAS Culdrose in 1961.

Looking back on his long service, he recalled 1936 when he was on HMS Crafton, an escort to the yacht Nahlin carrying King Edward VIII and Mrs. Simpson.

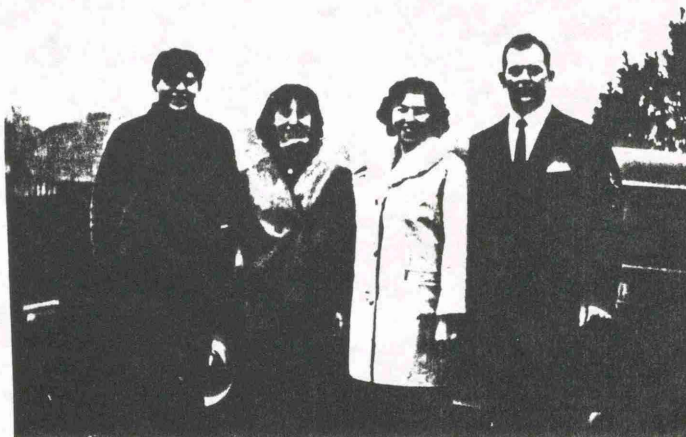
At Redruth he worked as a clerk with Gray's, the bakers and then with Graham Brahyns until his retirement in 1980.

Mrs. Law trained in dressmaking at Grant's of Redruth and has spent her life in the town. She made a ten pound cake for the weekend's celebrations. Three of their four children were there.

Missing was David Law (49), who lives in Australia, but present were Mrs. Carole Apps, of Redruth, Mrs. Anne Kellow, of North Country and Mr. Peter Law, who flew home from Germany where he is with the RAF. The couple have 12 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

David and his family have been a tremendous help to me in putting this all together.

Iris was born in Wales, and her father, Charles Law, was 48 years old at the time. Iris worked as a dressmaker and later for Kayser Bondor Lingerie.

She was the first of the family to reply to my letters, because she lives in Merthyr Tydfil. Her address is - 39 Clare St., Merthyr Tydfil, Mid Glam, South Wales, CF470⁰YN. I am grateful to her for so much and for sharing pictures and information about her family. She had her father's medals and the bullets taken from him during World War I, when he was wounded. She kept them in the brass tin bearing the picture of King George V and Queen Mary. This contained cigarettes and was given to all soldiers at the front. In that tin was the letter which I photo copied and it appears in Chapter I. It was written by Harry Law, in France, in 1917 to his brother, Charles Law, also in France. So, you see, that letter was very precious to Charles!

In regard to the brass tin - Harry Law also received one. Unfortunately, his son, Bert Law, as a young boy - found it, tried to smoke the cigarettes, then smashed the tin and threw it away.

Merthyr Tydfil is steeped in history. The great Iron Works and the castle are there. The castle was built by the iron masters, who lived in it. The streets have terraced houses. It is 24 miles from Cardiff City and 30 miles from Swansea with its miles and miles of beaches called the Gower Coast.

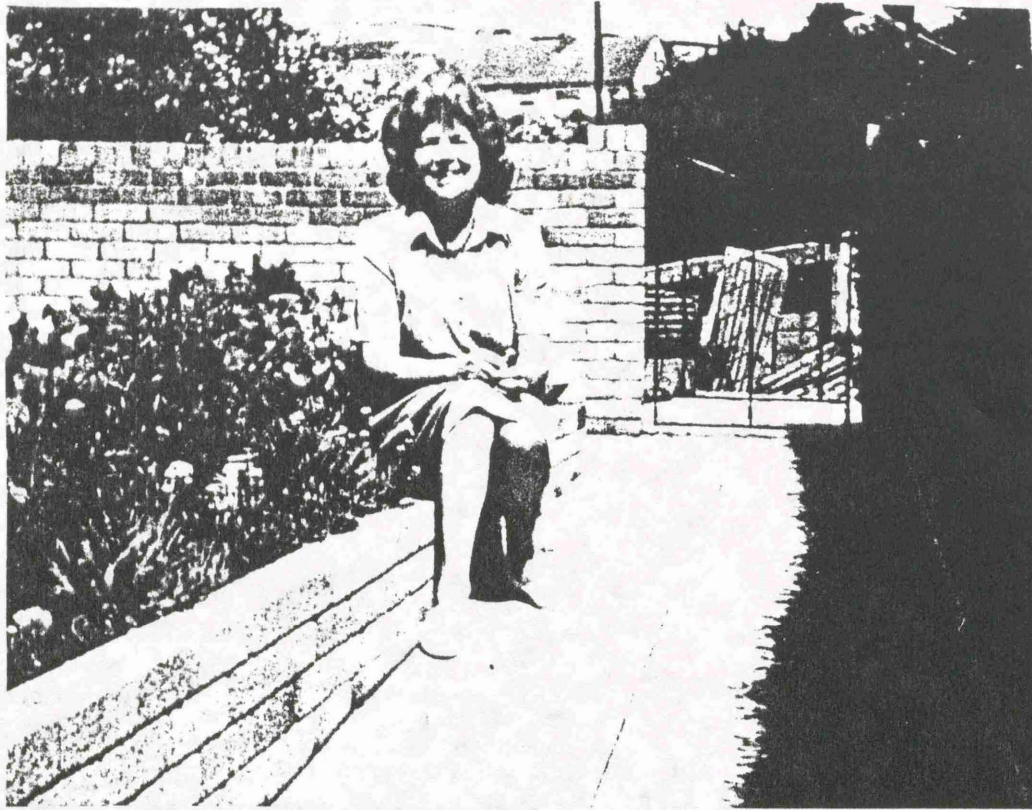

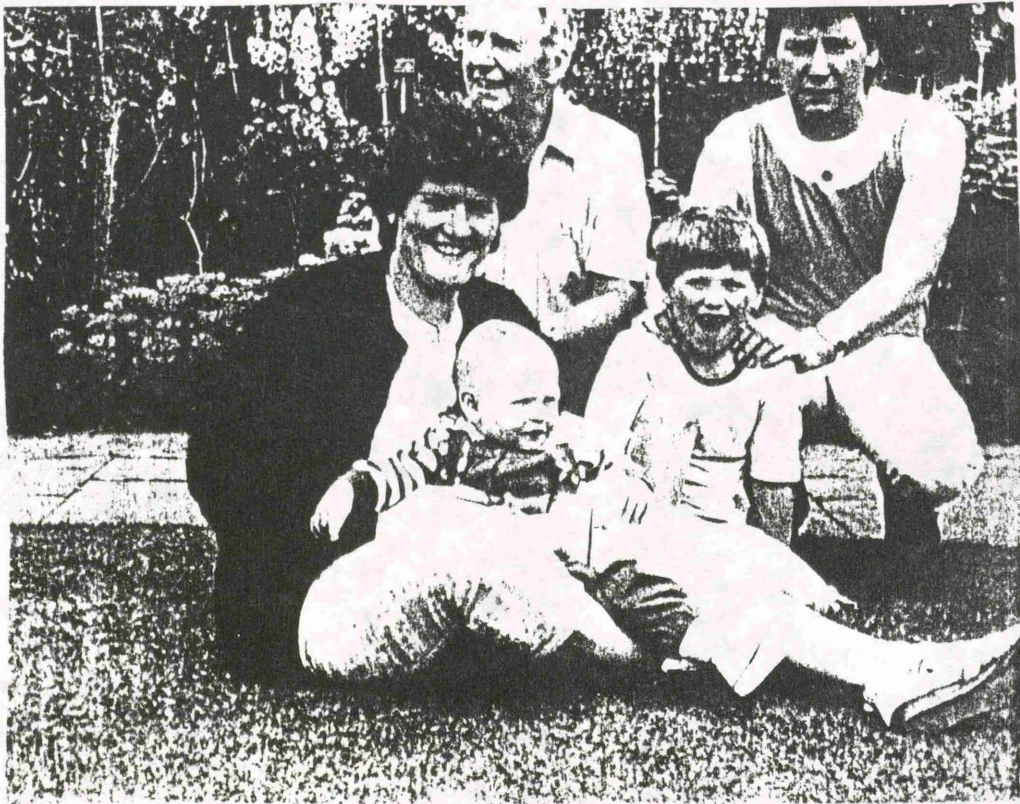

Our Mystery Man

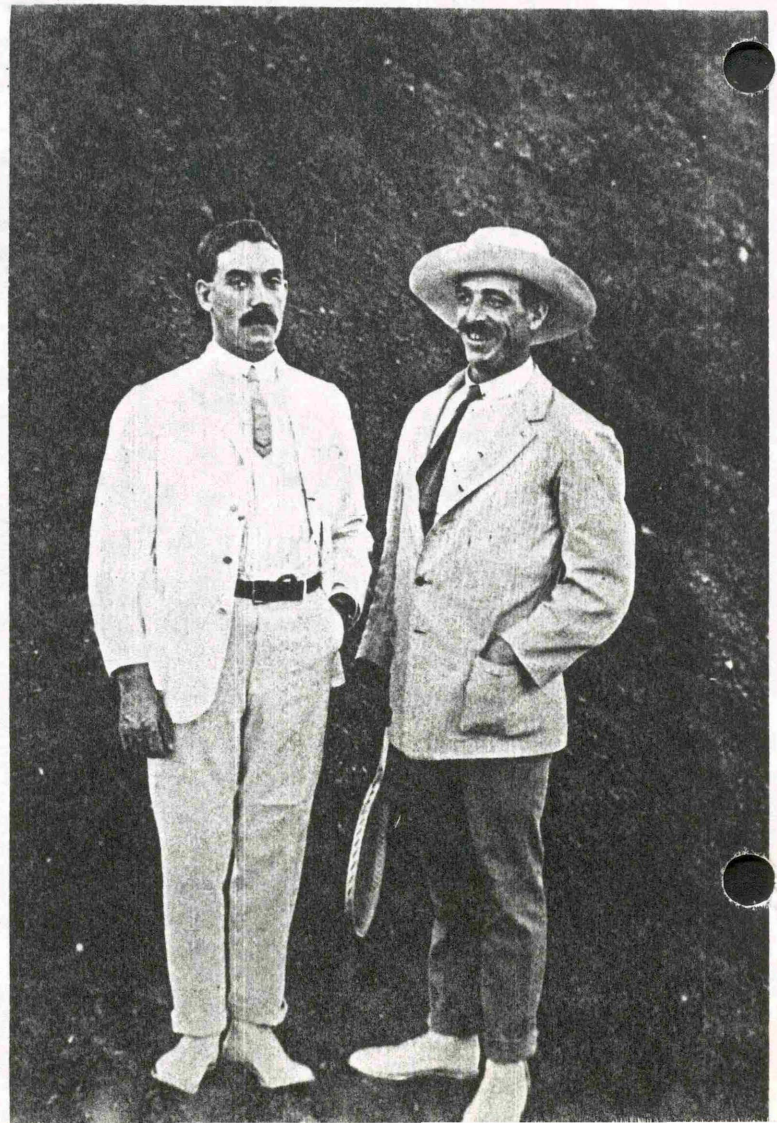
