Lt.Allan Neil Maclean must not be confused with General Allan Maclean who Historians say was in the 84th.Regiment and with Carlton at Quebec.

It will be noted that some material will be quoted twice but by different Historians.

You will also note there are some records included pertaining to SergeantNeil Maclean, This was necessary as Lt. Allan Neil Maclean married Harriet, Daughter of Sgt. Neil Maclean and his first wife. Their records both war and Personal were very Similar as well as Sgt. Neil being Father-In-Law of Lt. Allan Neil,

Allan Neil Maclean was born in Scotland about 1752 and came to Canada or New York as a Lt . in the British Army, 29th. Regiment before or during the Revolutionary War. The Regiment after the War was discharged in Quebecand returned to England.

Lt.Allan Neil is shown as Lt.Reduced and being a Storekeeper in the Commissary at Cataraqui under Sgt.Neil McLean who was the Commissary.

Military records show all Macleans as McLean in all their records.

A report in the book (Centennial of the Settlement of Upper Canada) by the United Empire Loyalists show Allan Neil McLean as a Lt. in the 29th. Regiment and being discharged in Quebec. Major Green reported that the men belonging to the 29th. and 34th. Regiments were discharged in 1787 when the Regiments went Home to England.

Caniff the historian who wrote (History of Upper Canada 1869) dealing particularly with settlement of Kingston and Bay of Quinte, says on page 425 that Neil Maclean not only received Lot 1 as mentioned but also (the Island at mouth of river called Isle Aux Pere) known to us as Bells Island. On page 426 he includes Lt. Allan Maclean as among those who came here two or three years after the Loyalists settlement of 1784. Neil Maclean you will recall was presumed to be attached to the 84th. Regiment and this being the case came to Cataraqui or Kingston, for among the garrison here in the early part of 1784 were members of the 34th. and 84th. Regiments and of Sir John Johnsons 2nd. Battalion of the Kings Royal Regiment of New York. Note

Lt. Neil McLean - Reduced was in the 84th. Regiment.

Sgt. Neil McLean - was in the 34th. Regiment and Commissary at Cataraqui. Also in the book (Centennial of the Settlement of Upper Canada by the United Empire Loyalists) on pages 312-313 it shows the following.

You will notice there were 2 Neil McLeans in the Commissary with Sgt.McLean as Commissary with Lt.Allan and Lt.Neil as Storekeepers. Both of the Lts.Reduced

This Lt.Neil McLeans record has been confused with that of Sgt.Neil McLean. In the John Askin Papers Page 715 it states possibly Archibald McLean a Lt. in the Third York Militia who was born in St. Andrews Upper Canada April 5th. 1/91 the son of Neil McLean and subsequently the step son of Robert Hamilton, died Oct. 24th.1865 in Toronto.

This statement is part in error, Archibalds Father was Lt. Neil McLean who was not the Commissary at Cataraqui but was a Storekeeper under Sgt. Neil McLean. 3

Lt. Neil Maclean, Born 1759 Died 1832 who came to America, served in the American Revolutionary War as a LT. in the 84th. Regiment (Royal Highland Emigrants) after which he came to Canada, and with other Officers and men of the Regiment, which was disbanded, was alloted lands in Stormont, served in 1812 as Col. of Stormont Militia.

He married Isabella, daughter of John Macdonald, U.E.L., of Leck and had issue.

Kingston Family

Sgt. Neil Maclean, Father of Harriet by first marriage in Scotland, was married second time in Canada to Mary Herkimer. Sgt. Neil Maclean died and was buried in Kingston Sept. 3rd. 1795. No Children by second marriage. Mary Herkimer second Wife remarried Robert Hamilton after his first wife died in 1796. Mary Herkimer died Aug. 8th. 1805. John Askin Papers Vol. 1 and 2.

Having no opportunity of writing you since the year 1775 and matters in this country having taken another turn since that time I shall be much obliged to you to please deliver Wm. Edgar Esqr. the order of the Lieut. Governor and Council of the late Colonie of New York to me for 5000 acres of land as a Reduced Master and Commander on the Lakes at the peace also the Mandamus of the King and Council to Commissary McLean for 5000 Acres. I am your most obedient and most humble Servant.

Lt. Allan McLean Born 1752 - Died 1847 was a Storekeeper at Cataraqui where Sgt. Neil McLean was Commissary. Lt. Allan Neil married Harriet daughter of Sgt. Neil.

Allan Neil was enrolled as a Barrister on July 7th. 1794 and was Secretary of the Land Claims Board of the Midland District. He was Treasurer of the Quarter Sessions and Registrar, but vacated his Office by moving out of the District in Jan. 1796. In 1798 was again a Clerk of the Peace. From 1804 - 24 He was a Member of the Legislative Assembly for Frontenac and from 1812 - 16 He was Speaker of the House. During the War of 1812 he was Lt. Col. and second in command of the First Frontenac Militia. In 1816 he was a Member of the Military Pensions Board for the Midland District and he was also a trustee for the Lancasterian School.

Caniff says on Page 437

Allan McLean Esq. the first Lawyer of Kingston created such by an Order-in-Council. His abilities were moderate and his original defective. (First lawyers were selected from among citizens who were not graduates of law schools. A man of considerable taste, modest, dignified in his deportment. For many years was the only legal adviser in the place. He was a faithful Representative in Parliament for many years. Was liberal in his political opinions. As proof of his good taste, he was proprietor of one of the best gardens in the Province. It covered one acre of ground and contained many choice fruit trees, such as apples, plums, pears and peach etc., all tastefully arranged, kept in prime order and defended from the wind by a high wall. He took honest pride in showing his garden to his friends and did not stint in distributing its lucious products. Mr. McLean left one daughter, who became the wife of John McLean Esq. Sheriff of the Midland District.

* Note - Allan and Harriet Maclean had 5 Daughters and 4 Sons.

> The last paragraph stating (First Lawyers were selected from among Citizens who were not graduates of Law Schools) was in error as the following paragraph will prove.

Allan McLean was one of the Barristers admitted by the Law Society of Upper Canada under the Authority of a Statue of the Legislature, he being enrolled on the 7th. of July 1794 together with Messers D.W.Smith, Richard Barnes Tickell, Angus McDonald and James Clark Jr. Roll of Upper Canada Law Soc-iety Osgood Hall and Q 280-I page 245. As a Barrister he was granted 1200 Acres of land, that being the quanity regularly granted to Barristers.

We understand from the description of the garden, also from the following paragraph why when land was subdivided the streets were called Grove and Orchard in Kingston. Miss Machar in her (Story of Old Kingston) page 95 speaks of the garden,

Mr. Allan McLean probally the son of Neil McLean already mentioned, possessed a tastefully laid out demesne called (The Grove) on the shore of the Cataraqui near the present Cotton Mill, which contained one of the best gardens in the Province, an acre in extent and filled with choice fruit trees.

Afoot note States. A granddaughter of this gentleman still dwells in Kingston, now the widow of Dr. 0.S.Strange, long an esteemed Physician of old Kingston.

Col. Allan McLean represented the County of Frontenac in the Legislative Assembly of Upper Canada for the 4-5-6-7-8-1804 to 1824 Parliments being the Speaker of the last 3. He died near Kingston on Oct. 8th. 1847 - 94 years.

Col.Allan Maclean's Property throughout the Province as shown in his Land Book amounted to 17066 Acres.

The preceeding was written for the express purpose of clearing up some of the records of our Ancestors. In a few cases it is not complete as desired, however from Family and Church records also the Public Archives as well as some research from other sources, results have been cross checked and you will note the source of information has been shown.

You will again note that most of the Military as well as Historians spelled Maclean as McLean but our Family Bible as well as other records Show Maclean.

Neil Maclean

He was a Justice of the Peace and a Member of the Land Board of Mecklenburg and the Midland District from its inception and of that of the County of Frontenac down to the time of its abolition. He was also a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas with Dr. Stuart and Mr. James Clark on July 14th, 1788 He had been a Sergeant in the 34th.Regiment and had been Acting Commissary General which was the reason for his Daughter Harriet receiving 3000 Acres of land as the Devisee of her late Father on the 18th. Nov. 1797.

For this same quantity of land he had himself applied to His Excellency in Council on Oct. 17th. 1792 (Q Series Public Archives of Canada Vol. 282 I pages 263 - 4 alleging that he had served His Majesty for 34 years and that he had been reduced in 1783 from 20 shillings per day to seven and sixpence. He represented also that he had been long a resident in the Province. Resolved reads the entry. That the Honorable Executive Council would feel themselves extremely happy could they comply with the prayer of the Petition.

Page 37

They are pleased to order that he shall have a Grant of 1200 acres and in consideration of his having been a faithful Servant of Govt., they are pleased to order that Mrs. Mary Maclean have a Grant also of 800 acres. This was July 10th. 1793 IBID pages 324-5.

He owned Lot 2 in the town of Kingston and he made representations to Councilon July 24th, 1793 that occupancy of the Beach in front of the same by any other person would greatly lessen the value of his property. Accordingly it was ordered that, if any application be made

for the same (it is) to be refused to Mr. Maclean's Memorial

Through an error in Transcription it appears from a letter of the Secretary of the Board (Mr.Allan Maclean) which was written Dec. 12th. 1798, effect had not been given to the decision, on July 8th. 1794 when he prayed with Neil and Hector Maclean, Richard Porter and Richard Cartwright Sr., for waste lands of the Crown.





Neil Montaque Maclean Born Oct. 3rd. 1853 New York City Corner 13th. Street and 4th. Ave.

Family moved to Kingston, Ontario in 1863 They also lived in Bath, South Bay and Milford.

At age 19 attended the School of Military Instruction at Kingston and received the Second Class Certificate on 14th. March 1874. Public Archives of Canada Record Group 9, 11 J5 Vol. 19, folio 210

Due to Indian uprising in the Northwest left Kingston for Red River April 3rd. 1874. Commissioned as Captain.

After his Military Service he returned to Kingston and married Caroline Emma Waggoner of Kingston Mills in 1881.

About 1883 moved to Watertown, N.Y. Worked as a Fireman on the Rome, Watertown and Ogdensburgh Railroad. He secured his papers as an Engineer. The Railroad was taken over by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad later the New York Central.

In 1906 moved to Wanakena, N.Y. as Engineer for the Cranberry Lake RR. He died in 1910 and buried in Watertown, N.Y.



He was of Irish parentage, born in the County of Armagh, and was well known in Kingston.

Mr. Tighe was educated at Trinity College, Dublin where he took his M.A. degree in 1858 and almost immediately came out to Canada. He was ordained Deacon in 1858 by the Bishop of Huron and priested in the following year by the same Bishop.

He retired in 1905 and resided in Kingston for some time, later moving to Carleton Place where he died in May 1912.
