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AUTHOR'S PREFACE

This Genealogy is in two parts. Part 1 starts with the Palatine German immigrant ancestor, Niclaus Staring or Staringer, who came to New York in 1710. It follows each generation in direct male line of one branch of his descendants down to the present time.

Conversely, Part 2 starts with the present generation of that line and works back through the generations of both the direct male line ancestors and as many of the lines to which their spouses belonged as we have been able to follow. Rather than in narrative form, Part 2 consists mainly of Ancestor charts, Family charts and a generation by generation Ancestor Table.

PART I - GENEALOGICAL NARRATIVE

GENERAL INTRODUCTION

This genealogy shows the origins of a family and the descent of one line from its first Palatine German immigrant ancestor through to the children of the author, his brothers and their children. The family name, originally Staring (or Staringer) at the time of the immigration to the then British Colony of New York, was changed about 1820-30 by some branches, including ours, to Sterling, as the family and other German speaking people of the area in which they lived became anglicized.

Wherever possible the siblings of all direct Sterling/Staring ancestors of this line have been identified but the families of those siblings have not been traced.

The genealogy consists of two parts. Part I is a narrative which discusses the family's origins and its coming to North America and provides salient information for each of its generations. This part can stand by itself if necessary but has the shortcoming of not containing information on the ancestors of some of the wives of male Sterling or Staring direct ancestors. Part 2 of the genealogy contains "Ancestor Charts", "Family Charts" and a generation by generation Ancestor Table these provide additional information to that of the first part, including female lines.

This genealogical study had its beginning when, in May 1970, I drove from Quebec City to Kingston with my younger daughter, Eleanor, to pick up and bring home my elder daughter, Anne, after her second year at Queen's University. The evening of our arrival in Kingston, Anne was planning to attend an end-of-exams party, leaving Eleanor and me with time on our hands. On impulse, remembering that my father William Edmund Sterling had once told me that his great-grandfather Sterling had farmed on the Collins Bay-Bath road near Kingston, I phoned a Gordon Sterling who was listed in the telephone book as living near Collins Bay. I told him as much as I could of my background, including the fact that my great aunt Annie Sterling had once mentioned visiting relatives near Kingston. He thought there might be a family connection and offered to telephone his father Edwin who was at that time 93 years old and living in Kingston. The upshot of the call was that Eleanor and I visited Gordon Sterling for about one hour early that evening and later the same evening visited his parents in Kingston. We were both struck by the very close resemblance of Gordon, who was then about 50 years of age, to my brother John Dixon (Dick) Sterling then also aged about 50. The visit to "Uncle Edwin" Sterling and his wife "Aunt Rose" was a major "find". A wedding picture of Edwin also showed a close resemblance to Dick. It turned out that Edwin was the youngest son of Isaac Sterling (my great-great grandfather) by Isaac's second marriage while his half-brother William H. Sterling (my great grandfather) was Isaac's eldest son by his first marriage. The two wives were sisters, and thus the half brothers were also first cousins. Edwin told me that his father had come to Canada in the 1830's from Sterling creek, a part of West Schuyler near Utica N.Y. From his father's, record book he gave me the names and birthdates of the children of Isaac's two marriages.

That was as far as I took the matter until several months later I received a letter from a Mr. Sterling O. Kimball of Burton (near Flint) Michigan. Sterling Kimball is a grandson of Charles Sterling, a younger full brother of my great grandfather William. Sterling Kimball had discovered "Uncle Edwin" several months before my discovery and already had some

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experience in "digging up ancestors". He introduced me to the use of land records and census records as tools in genealogical research. He also "introduced me" (by mail) to the late Dr. H.C. Burleigh of Bath and Kingston, a gruff family doctor who was interested not only in the well being of his patients but also in their ancestry. Much of the material in this Sterling/Staring genealogy was collected in collaboration with Sterling Kimball, with the two of us trading information as we uncovered it. The genealogy sterling Kimball, with the two of us trading information as we uncovered it. The genealogy would be far less complete than it is without his contributions and generosity with information.

I confess to inconsistencies in spelling the names of some ancestors. For example the given name of the first Sterling ancestor in North America is sometimes spelled Niclaus and sometimes Nicholas. These differences in spelling in this genealogy were sometimes due to differences in original or transcribed documents and records and sometimes due to a tendency on my part to give German and Dutch names an English spelling. Thus Johan becomes John; Jurg becomes George and Friedrich becomes Frederick. In the case of surnames the old records themselves were often uncertain as to spelling. Also surnames sometimes changed with time and place: Van Ijsselsteyn becomes Esselstein and then, in Canada, Asselstine.

I have tried to identify data of which I am uncertain, but nevertheless there are bound to be some errors in both this narrative part and in the charts. It is my hope that readers will correct any errors which they discover and fill in any missing information which they can supply. They are asked to let me know of these corrections and additions.

In closing this introduction I must confess that my efforts have "slackened off" in the past five or six years, mainly because most of my ancestral lines have been traced to their places of origin in the Rhineland, the Netherlands and on my mothers side, Ireland. Searching in these countries of origin is more difficult than searches in New York State and Ontario because of both distance and time. However, I hope that others of the family will be tempted to pick up where (I hope temporarily) I am no longer active.

Lastly, I wish to thank my wife, Emily, for her encouragement and for her willingness to follow me into cemeteries, archives and record offices in three countries while I pursued my searches. She has been both helpful and forbearing.

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THE STARING/STERLING FAMILY

1. THE NAME

Our Palatine German ancestors in the Rheinpfalz in the 17th century and in New York colony and State in the 18th Century were generally referred to in church and other records under the surname STARING or, occasionally, STAHRING. One significant document, the British Board of Trade New York Subsistence List, (5)(6) (see Appendix A) gives a STARINGER surname for our Palatine immigrant family, but this appears to be the only instance of the use of this variant of the name in New York.

Prof. Brechenmacker³⁵, in his book on German family names, does not list the surname STARING or STARINGER although we know that these are used on present day Germany. In his book he lists the surname STAHRINGER and derives it from the place name STAHRINGEN (originally STALRINGEN) a village spa now part of the town of Radolfzell⁽³⁶⁾. This is near Konstanz, close to the Bodensee (Lake Constance). A Heinrich STAHRINGER of Konstanz is recorded on documents in 1506⁽³⁵⁾. The name is also found in its older form, STALRINGER⁽³⁵⁾, as early as 1294 at the village of Sernatingen, now part of Ludwigshafen. This is in the Palatinate only about 60 km south of Wonsheim, the village which our ancestor Niclaus Staring (or Staringer) left in 1709 to come to New York in 1710.

Although I tend to favour the derivation of the name STARING from STAHRINGER there is another possible origin which should not be overlooked. The name STARING is well known in the Netherlands and may be indigenous to that country. however, the claim by W.L. Stone⁽⁸⁾ of a Dutch origin for the STARINGS of New York can not be supported by his "evidence" which is clearly fabricated. Unfortunately his book has misled many STARING/STERLING families into believing in a proven Netherlands Dutch ancestry.

A final change in our surname occurs when about 1820 - 1830 some STARING families living in the Herkimer-German Flatts - West Schuyler area of the Mohawk Valley in New York State began to use the surname STERLING. The reason is not known but was probably associated with the anglicization of the German and Dutch speaking peoples of the district.

When Isaac Sterling⁵ came to Canada about 1832, he was apparently beginning to use the name STERLING in his everyday life.⁽¹⁾ However, in transactions involving his farmland in Ernestown Upper Canada, which he had been given by his father Nicholas A. Staring⁴, he was referred to as Isaac Staring until the 1850s.⁽²⁾ His father Nicholas and his uncle Timothy were evidently known by their original STARING name until their deaths in 1844⁽³⁾ and 1849⁽¹⁾ respectively. In his will, Nicholas A. Staring refers to his sons by the STARING surname. The probate records similarly use the name STARING in referring to the members of the family but, significantly, the sons, including Isaac, sign the probate papers with their STERLING surname. Similarly, in the Probate of the will of a Henry N. Staring, also of W. Schuyler (d. 1868 age 68) his children state that it has been their custom to write their name STERLING.

2. ORIGINS

The first Starings to come to North America were from the Rhineland Palatinate ^{(4), (5)} a part of what is now Germany. This middle district of the Rhine was fought over and devastated several times between 1620 and 1707. The final devastation was by the French under Marshal Villars in May 1707. This was followed by a very severe winter in 1708/1709

which killed a large percentage of the area's fruit trees and grape vines, thus threatening the livelihood of the people at a time when they were trying to rebuild their lives after the French invasion. At this same time British landed proprietors in what are now North and South Carolina were distributing pamphlets aimed at attracting settlers to their vacant lands. This combination of affairs was more than enough to encourage a mass emigration. About 13,000 inhabitants of the Palatinate and nearby areas travelled down the Rhine to Rotterdam in 1709 where they were able, with the help of the British Government and private charities. to obtain passage to London on British Army transport ships. Some of these people were dispersed as labourers throughout Britain and a few hundred were settled in Co Limerick, Ireland. The British Board of Trade was at the time faced with the fact that Sweden had a monopoly on the trade in pine pitch from the Baltic. This was an important material to the British Navy. The Board of Trade conceived the idea of setting up a pine pitch industry in New York to break the Swedish monopoly and persuaded about 3,000 of the Palatines to go there in 1710 under the promise that they would eventually be granted land for farming.

Amongst those who went to New York was a family of three adult persons, headed by a Niclaus Staring or Staringer. The marriage record in 1712 of one of these, Johann Adam Staring, stated that he was the son of Johann Niclaus Staring of Wonsheim, County of Alzey, in the Palatinate. We thus are most fortunate to have found through this record, the ancestral village in Germany and the name of the father of the immigrants to New York.

3. GERMAN DATA ON THE STARING FAMILY OF WONSHEIM

Mr. Hank Z. Jones, who has researched the Palatine families which left the Rhineland in 1709 and came to New York in 1710 has provided us with information pertaining to a Niclaus Staring of Wonsheim prior to the Palatine emigration. A German researcher, Mrs. Carla Mittelstaedt-Kubaseck, employed by Jones to search for records of Niclaus Staring in Wonsheim and the surrounding area reported: (Private communication from Hank Jones) ... "The records of Wonsheim are not yet found 1691-1798. Before the end of the war (i.e. World War II) all the records which were kept by the Burgomasters in the various villages were collected to be safely kept in another place. They were collected in a schoolhouse to be transported; and then the end of the war came and most of the records were missing..."

"The churchbooks of villages near Wonsheim were then combed in hopes that Niclaus might be mentioned as a sponsor or that he might have married in a nearby village. Nearly 50 towns and villages near Wonsheim were examined for some reference to the emigrant Niclaus. Finally, at Marnheim - a village about 16 kilometers south of Wonsheim - records were found in which two references to a Niclaus Staring were given:

FROM THE ANCIENT CHURCHBOOKS AT MARNHEIM (Beginning 1648):

a) Marriage

Nickel Staring, son of Friedrich Staring - inhabitant at Wensheim (sic), and Anna Elisabeth, daughter of the late Jorg Burkey (hard to read) inhabitant here at Marnheim, were married

b) Baptism

Johann Peter, son to Nicolaus Staring - inhabitant now at Marnheim, formerly inhabitant - son from Wonsheim as per the document * from the Ampt Bolanden (i.e. Town Council of Bolanden) - and his wife Elisabeth, was baptised 20 October, 1686. The sponsors were Johann Peter Fiskussen - inhabitant at Fiebersheim in the Hochlobl, Oberampt Creutzenach - and Anna Margreth, wife of Jacob Stumpf.

Further information provided by Hank Jones on the Burkey family of Marnheim is copied in Appendix B.

These are the only references to the Starings at Marnheim. There is no way of knowing if this Nickel (i.e. Niclaus) Staring of Wonsheim and Marnheim is the Niclaus Staring who emigrated to New York via England in 1709 - 1710, or is the father of the New York settlers or perhaps some other relative of those settlers.

The date of the marriage to Anna Elizabeth Burkey (1686) is appropriate to a Niclaus or Johann Niclaus Staring who could have been either the same person as Niclaus Staring the immigrant to New York or the father of the immigrant Niclaus. However since the immigrant Niclaus is known to have fathered a child Eva, about 1730, it is unlikely that he is the same person as the Niclaus who was married many years earlier (1686) in Marnheim.

Recently, Hank Jones has published a 2 Volume compendium of his research into the Palatine families of New York⁽³³⁾. This gives a further Staring connection with Wonsheim in quoting the Lutheran Churchbook of Steinbockenheim (1 1/2 km south of Wonsheim) for the burial of Barbara Staring from Wonsheim, on 6 Feb. 1698 aged 82 years. The same churchbook also notes the death of a child, Johann Paulus Staring, 9 Feb. 1698, aged 3 years. His parents are not named.

From the fact that the Nickel Staring who was married in Marnheim on 17 July 1686 is said in the marriage record to be a son of Friedrich Staring of Wonsheim and the evidence that a Barbara Staring of Wonsheim had died in 1698 aged 82 years, it would appear that the Starings probably had lived in that town (Wonsheim) for many years by the time the immigrant Niclaus Staring came to New York. Barbara Staring may possibly have been a mother or grandmother of "Nickel" (Johann Niclaus) Staring.

4. NAMING PRACTICES

The Palatines who came to New York Colony in 1710, had a custom for naming their children which we have found to be important in tracing our Mohawk Valley ancestors. Male children were almost always given two names. The first name was usually Johann but was very seldom used by its holder. The second name, however, was used as an everyday name. Because several persons living at the same time in the same area might have the same everyday name it was customary to distinguish between them by adding to that name


the father's everyday name or the initial of that everyday name. Thus Johann Adam Staring³, son of Joseph Staring² was often known as Adam J, (or less frequently as Adam Joseph) to avoid possible confusion with several other Adams e.g. Adam N. (son of Nicholas), Adam A. (son of Adam). A similar custom existed for women. For example Anna Henry Staring would clearly be a daughter of a Henry Staring. However the practice was not as fixed as for males. Also an Anna Margaretha might be called Anna, Margaretha, or Anna Margaretha. Diminutives were also frequently used, particularly with women or an Anna might be called Hannah or Nancy, especially as the area became anglicized, and Maria might become known as Polly or Bally for some reason which I do not know.

5. THE FIRST (IMMIGRANT) GENERATION

In his account of the movements of Palatines from the Rhineland to England via Rotterdam in 1709, Knittle⁽⁵⁾ pointed out that many of the Palatines travelled from Rotterdam to London on British Transport ships which had been used to bring troops from England to the Low Countries to fight against the French in the War of the Spanish Succession. Embarkation lists of these travellers were kept for sailings from Rotterdam between early May and late July 1709. These lists do not include Palatines who paid their own way to London or were sent by private charity in August and October 1709. The Kast family from which we are also descended is listed in the Third Embarkation List in June 1709 but no record of the Staring family has been found in any of the existing embarkation lists, indicating that this family either paid its own way or was late in getting to England. The lists usually gave the name of the man of the family, state whether a wife is with him and give the number of children accompanying them. The absence of an embarkation listing which includes the Staring family thus deprives us of knowledge of how many Starings started out on the travels (many Palatines died, particularly children, in England during the winter of 1709/10 and on the long (8 - 10 weeks), crowded, trans-Atlantic crossing in the Spring of 1710).

Although there is no Embarkation List showing the travels of the Staring family from Rotterdam to England, the British Board of Trade records pertaining to the Palatines in New York makes it clear that this family was definitely part of the 1709 movement to England and the 1710 immigration to New York. These immigrants were settled on the Hudson River near Germantown and across from there at West Camp, (Map, Plate 1.). Due to lack of interest from the Palatines (their interest was in acquiring land for themselves, not in to be experts in extracting pitch from the pines, the enterprise was not a success and was to work on the Livingston estate while others moved to Schoharie. Still later (1725) many of Mohawk and Herkimer in the Mohawk Valley of New York, while others went to Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

Knittle⁽⁵⁾ gives a detailed account of the reasons behind the emigration of the Palatines and of their early years in New York. He notes that there are four records pertaining to the Palatines in America in 1710 and the early years following that immigration. These were:



a. The New York Subsistence List (5) & (6)

This list is in the British Public Record Office, C.O.5/1230. It was compiled from the journal of the Palatine debtors to the British Government for subsistence given either in New York City or in the Hudson River Settlements from their landing in June or July in 1710 to September 1712. In the list the Debtor (Dr) column shows the numbers of "adults" (persons over 10 years of age were given adult subsistence) and then the number of children (persons 10 years of age or less) for several dates between July or August 1710 and September 1712. There is only one Staring record, "Niclaus Staringer". This is copied in Appendix A to this Genealogy together with other relevant data from the C.O.5/1230 and its companion Colonial Office document C.O.5/1231. The first entry, in Aug 1710 shows the Staring or Staringer family as consisting of 3 adults and no children. In the absence of evidence to the contrary we have assumed that they were all males. The next entry, October 1710 shows only 2 persons receiving subsistence, possibly one was temporarily absent in Albany or New York. The next entry, for June 1711, shows 4 adults, and that for September 1711, 4 adults and one child. These changes indicate the marriage of Niclaus (possibly in September or October 1710) and the addition of his wife (Maria Catharina) and child (Anna Margaretha - born 7 August 1711) to the subsistence list. Another child appears in the September 1712 entry.

b. The Simmendinger Register (5)

This was made by a Palatine, Ulrich Simmendinger, who returned to Germany in 1717. He notes "Adam Staring with Anna Maria and three children at New Cassel" (Schoharie Valley settlement village).

c. The Burnetsfield Patent

According to Knittle this was granted on 13 April 1725 and assigned 100 acre lots to some 90 individuals. It comprised those meadow lands south of the river that were later known as the German Flatts and lands across from there on the north side of the river. The village which grew up opposite the Flatts was called Palatine Village, and later, after the American Revolution, Herkimer. Governor Burnet's Order in Council to grant a patent is dated "the 17th day of January in the nineth year of his Majesty reign, Anno Dom 1722/3".*(12) The Burnetsfield Patent covers both sides of the river. Grants include the following:

(1) Lots North of River

Mary Eva Staring, wife of Adam Staring Lot 13, 100 acres of woodland at the falls (Little Falls or the "Carrying Place", "called by the natives Astennogen")

Johan Adam Staring

Lot 28, 94 acres being and woodland. 94 acres plus 3/4 of an island.

^{*} The date is 17 January 1723 "new style", that is as we now record years, with the new year beginning 1 January instead of in March, which was "old style".

Frederick Staring

Lot 24. This consisted of two parts. 70 acres of woodland and 30 acres on the "great flatts", the more fertile flat land next the river.

Johannes Veldin Staring

Lot No. 6. 100 acres. Appears to be mixed woodland and lowland on the river.

(2) Lots South River

Nicholas Staring

Lot 42. 100 acres. This is a long narrow lot running back from the river. It probably contains both lowland and woodland and lies near the east end of the Patent.

Joseph Staring

Lot 41. 100 acres. This lies next to the lot granted to his father Nicholas Staring.

John Velde Staring Jr.

Lot 1. 100 acres. This is the most westerly lot on the south side of the Burnetsfield Patent area.

In the Burnetsfield list, the wife of Johan Adam Staring is called Mary Eva. In the Kocherthal record of Adam's marriage and in the Simmendinger register his wife is called Anna Maria. It is not know if this is the same wife or if Anna Maria died and Adam married a second time.

Some of the children were given lots, possibly the eldest son of each family or possibly any male child over a given age, eg. over 10 years of age. Joseph Staring, son of Nicholas, was 11 years old when he was granted the lot next his father in 1725.

d. The Kocherthal Party and the Kocherthal Records

"Reverend Kocherthal was the leader of a band of 41 persons from the Palatinate who came to London in 1708 and were sent to New York with Governor Lovelace (in 1709). ... They first settled at Newburg on the Hudson River." (5)

The Starings were not members of the Kocherthal Party but were part of a much larger wave of emigration that left the Palatinate in 1709 and arrived in New York via the Netherlands and England, in 1710. Kocherthal apparently looked after the spiritual needs of many of these later arrivals in addition to those of his own party. His West Camp Lutheran Church records have been copied by MacWethy. (7)

The Kocherthal records provide the following information:

1) <u>Birth and Baptism</u> - West Camp on the Hudson; Anna Margaretha,² child of Niclaus and Maria Catharina Staring (a brick-maker). Born 7 Aug. 1711, Baptized 11 Aug. 1711. Sponsors - Philip Petri the sexton and his wife.

- 2) Marriage at West Camp on the Hudson, 2 Dec. 1712 Johann Adam Staring, son of Johann Niclaus Staring of Wonsheim, County of Alzey in the Palatinate and Anna Maria, widow of the late Bernard Lifenius.
- 3) <u>Birth and Baptism</u> in Schoharie, Maria Catharina, child of Johann Adam and Anna Maria Staring. Born 28 Sept. 1715, Baptized 24 Jan. 1716. Sponsors Deitrich Laux and his wife, Maria Catharina, (after whom the child was apparently named).

The birth and baptismal record for Anna Margaretha provides us with an estimate of when Niclaus and Maria Catharina were married and gives us Niclaus' trade (brick-maker) in the Palatinate. The marriage record of Adam Staring is very important in that it gives us the name of the village in Germany from which the family emigrated.

Albany Church Record

In addition to the Kocherthal records, other church books can provide information on the early years of the Palatines in New York. One record gives us the baptismal date and the names of the parents of Joseph Staring who we have been able to identify as our second generation ancestor. This record is from the church book of the Reformed Dutch Church in Albany.

"Baptism on 11 April 1714 in Albany (by Dom. Pieter van Driessen) of Joseph and Catryna, children of Niclaus and Catryna Staring. (10)(11) The witnesses were Joseph and Catryna Essching and Catryna Engelspreken (sic). (Engelsbrucher)

Niclaus Staring¹ of Wonsheim and German Flatts. (b. @1688 - d. after 1730). Niclaus, probably christened Johann Niclaus, was the senior of the three Staring immigrants and most likely the elder brother of the other two. If this latter assumption is correct then his father was the Johann Niclaus Staring of Wonsheim referred to in Rev. Kocherthal's marriage record of Johann Adam Staring.

Niclaus may have been born about 1688 and would have been about 22 years of age when he came to New York in 1710. He has been determined to be the ancestor of our particular branch of the family. We have not pursued the lines of Nicholas' brothers.

From the New York Subsistence List and the Rev. Joshua Kocherthal's record of the birth of his daughter, Anna Margaretha, it would seem that he married (Maria Catryna) about September 1710. We have no record of Maria Catryna's family name or of her origins. However, she was almost certainly a Palatine immigrant.

We know from records that Niclaus had four children between 1711 and about 1730 and there may have been others such as the Nicolas mentioned by Hess⁽⁴⁾. Known children were:

Anna Margaretha² (b. 7 Aug. 1711 - d. ----)

Joseph² (baptized 11 Apr. 1714 - d. after 1795), his wife's name was Maria

Catryna² (baptized 11 Apr. 1714 - d. ----)

Eva² (b. about 1730 d. ----), married Jorg Rickker 21 Sept. 1750.

6. THE SECOND GENERATION

The first North American born Staring of whom there is a record is Anna Margaretha², daughter of Niclaus Staring¹ and his wife Maria Catryna, baptized at West Camp on the Hudson, 7 August 1711. Others of whom we know are Joseph² and Catryna², also children of Niclaus and Catryna Staring, baptized 11 Apr. 1714 at Albany^(10,11), Maria Catharina², daughter of Johann Adam¹ and Anna Maria Staring born 28 Sept. 1715, baptized at Schoharie 24 January 1716. In addition to these children mentioned in the several baptismal records there are more second generation children known to us through other records.

The Burnetsfield Patent⁽¹²⁾ has possibly given us, in Johann Veldin Sr. or Frederick, the name of the third male Staring immigrant. Another child for whom we have no name, is the one who appears in the New York Subsistence List for 13 September 1712.⁽⁶⁾ We know of still another, by name, from the records of the Dutch Reformed Church at Schoharie where the registration for marriage is given on 21 September 1750 of "Eva Staring², daughter of Niclaus, born at the Fall".⁽¹³⁾ (i.e. what is now the town of Little Falls, N.Y.). This is at the eastern edge of the Burnetsfield Patent, close to where Niclaus had his lot.

From the large number of third generation Starings it is certain that there must have been several more second generation Staring males whose names have not come down to us. The second generation children would have been born between 1711 and about 1735. Their marriages would be mainly in the period 1735 - 1760. We are fortunate in having been able to identify, through strong circumstantial evidence, Joseph Staring² as being the first North American born ancestor of the branch on which this genealogy is concentrating. Most of this evidence results from studies which identified our third generation ancestor, a Johann Adam Staring³, as "Adam J." or "Adam Joseph Staring", i.e. as Adam, son of Joseph. A brief sketch of Joseph is given below:

Joseph Staring² (1714 - 1796)

Joseph's baptism, recorded in the Dutch Reformed Church, Albany, on 11 Apr. 1714, shows him to have been the son of the senior of the three first generation immigrants, Niclaus Staring¹ and his wife Catryna. Joseph was granted Burnetsfield Patent Lot 41 (South of the River) next to his father who had Lot 42. Only brief mentions of him occur through his lifetime. His name appears on the Militia Roll of Capt. Mark Petry's Company, February 1757, a year in which the French invaded German Flatts. It appears again on the Roll of Capt. Conrad Frank's Company for May 1767. ("Adam Joseph Staring" is recorded on the same Muster Roll). The company was all from the south side of the Mohawk River. (MacWethy⁽⁷⁾).

On 14 September, 1765 he was one of nine people, who together with Sir William Johnson bought the first and second Staley Patent tracts from the original owners of the patent. These tracts contained altogether 34,000 acres of land lying "partly adjoining to and on the Back of the Patent of the Great Flatts" (Burnetsfield Patent, south side).

Nearly thirty years later Joseph sold, for about their original cost, two large lots in the patent to Adam A. Staring⁴ (15) and Joh Nicholas H. Staring,⁴ (16) two of his grandsons by his sons Adam J.³ and Henry J. Staring.³ These sales were respectively 5 Aug. 1794 (Attested by Joseph on 25 March, 1795) and 31 March 1794. Adam's lot formed part of his estate when he died in 1825. The deeds give Joseph's wife's name as Maria. These deeds are the last records we have of Joseph. It is possible that he died between 1795 and 1798 by which date his son Adam J. had moved to Ernestown, Upper Canada. Joseph signed the deeds with an X (his mark).

Joseph's children were:

- 1) Henry J.³ (b.@1743 d. 27 May 1808) married Elizabeth Hess 2 Oct. 1764.
- 2) Anna Eva³ (b.@1745) married Adam Stahle 9 March 1764
- 3) Johann Adam (Adam J.)³ (b.@1746 d. @ 1820) married Catharine McGinnis on 3 July 1770
- 4) Anna³ (Nancy) (b. 1751 d. 1822) married George McGinnis 12 March 1773.

He may have had other children of whom we have found no records. One may have been the Peter J. Staring mentioned by Hess. (4) Of Anna Eva, our only information is the record of her marriage, cited above.

Our information concerning our ancestor Johann Adam (Adam J.) Staring and his brother Heinrich J. Staring (Henry) is outlined in our discussion of the third generation of Starings in North America.

7. THE THIRD GENERATION

The majority of third generation Starings were probably born between 1740 and 1755 and would thus have been of military age at the time of the American Revolution. In the American Colonies before the Revolution the age for military service was 16 to about 55. The same age limits probably applied to the Revolutionary militia. In the Colonial Militia Rolls for 1767,⁽⁷⁾ 10 Starings are listed, all from Burnetsfield, including 4 Adams. One Adam and one Nicholas are officers. During the Revolution 24 Starings are listed as serving in the Revolutionary Forces⁽¹⁷⁾ and three, John, George and Jacob⁽¹⁸⁾ are known to have served in the Loyalist Forces.

John the Loyalist was granted land as a Military Claimant near the present town of Morrisburg, Ontario. He apparently left only one child, a daughter. George and Jacob were granted land, as Military Claimants, in Fredericksburg township near Kingston, Ontario. They and their descendents spelled their surname "Storing". Our ancestor, Johann Adam Staring known as Adam or Adam J. never petitioned for land as a Loyalist and therefore it is most unlikely that he ever aided the British cause.

Of the Starings who served in the revolutionary forces 22 were in the Tryon county Militia. (17) Of these:

2 are listed as Adam 1 is listed as Adam J. 1 is listed as Adam A. and 1 is listed as Attam

In addition, an Adam Staring (Stering, Storing in the records) served in "The Line - 1st Regiment" and in the Levies. Also a George Staring was in "The Levies".

In the following section I have provided a summary of the large amount of information which I have on Adam J. Staring, the third generation ancestor.

Johann Adam Staring³ (Adam J.) (b. @1746 - d. @1820)

Adam was born about 1746, a son of Joseph Staring and his wife Maria. By trade he was apparently a blacksmith but later acquired a considerable amount of land both in the Mohawk Valley and in Ernestown Upper Canada and is called a farmer. He married a Catharina McGinnis in 1770. Her parents were well known in Albany and the Mohawk Valley and warrant a special section in this genealogy. (Appendix C). Adam served at least 2 days in the rebel militia during the American Revolution as Adam J. Staring and may also have served at other times as just Adam Staring.

His name is listed as a private in the 4th Tryon County Militia. (17) In the National Archives in Washington the following is noted on a reference card:

"STARING, Adam J.
Bellinger's Regiment
New York Milita
Ensign.
Reference Card Original filed under
Staring Adam A.
General Index Card 3714"

Also in the Archives is a "Pay Roll of a Draft under the command of Col. Henry Renselaar, being on duty in the month of November 1779, fourteen days".

This is followed in the Archives by a Certificate pertaining to the same draft.

"On duty in the month of November 1779 Capt. Staring 3 days Adam Staring, Ensign. 5 days Adam J. Staring 2 days"

This is signed by Heinrich Staring, Capt. and certified before Wm Petry, Justice, on 30 Apr. 1787. It is clear from this that our Adam J. Staring should not be confused with

Ensign Adam A. Staring who was also in Capt. Heinrich Staring's company of Bellinger's Regiment (4th Tryon Militia). The U.S. National Archives, based on sketchy evidence from the State of New York has "lumped" the two Adam Starings together on one card without noting from the pay roll, evidence that they were two separate people.

From this record of service it is not possible to know if he was a "Patriot" who actually may have had more service or if he was a "Fence Sitter" or a "Closet Loyalist". We do know that he may have had divided loyalties. His brother Captain (Militia) Heinrich (Henry J.) Staring was an active rebel but his wife's family were ardent and active loyalists. His mother-in-law Sarah Kast McGinnis ("the widow Magin") was of particular service to the Loyalist cause (Appendix C.)

During or shortly after the Revolution it appears that Adam acquired several lots of the Kast Patent, property owned originally by his wifes grandparents and later by her mother and her brother-in-law John Thompson.

About a decade after the Revolution Adam moved with his wife and family (with the probable exception of his eldest son, also named Adam) to Ernestown, Upper Canada. The most likely date is 1797. There he acquired over 600 acres of land on the "Front" at Millhaven by purchase from the original Loyalist grantees. About 1806 his son Nicholas, from whom our Canadian branch is descended, returned to New York and settled at what is now Sterling Creek, West Schuyler (near Utica) on land given to him by his father. His other son Timothy, and his 3 daughters remained in Canada.

From various land records we know that Adam died about 1820. I have no record of where he is buried. This is possibly in an unmarked grave on his Ernestown farm.

We do not know whether Adam's decision to come to Canada was influenced by dissatisfaction with the New Republic or the lure of cheap land in Upper Canada or the fact that his wife's brother George McGinnis, a Loyalist officer, had settled in the area, first at Amherst Island and later in Fredericksburg Township.

Note:

1. There appears to have been another daughter, also named Sarah born 20 May 1788, who died before the second Sarah was born. It was fairly common at that time to name a child after a deceased sibling.

2. There may also have been one other son whose name has not come down to us. In the 1790 census of Herkimer a family which is almost certainly "our" Adam Staring's is listed as having 2 males (including the husband) over 16 years, 3 males under 16 and 4 females (including the wife). In addition, there were 2 slaves.

Although we have no contemporary description of our ancestor, Johann Adam (Adam J.) Staring, a glimpse of how he may have appeared can perhaps he obtained from a description which we have of his brother Henry J. Staring (Heinrich).

Henry J. was active in the Tryon Co. militia during the Revolution. He saw many days of service and achieved the rank of Captain. In 1792 when Herkimer Co. was formed out of Tryon Co., he became its first judge. He, like his brother Adam, moved to W. Schuyler near the present town of Utica, N.Y. after the Revolution, acquiring part of the original Kast Patent. It is interesting to read the description of him recorded by Lt. John Harriott in Vol. II of "Struggles through Life", (Philadelphia 1809). (34) "We stopped at Judge S---'s to refresh our horses. Hearing that he was first judge of the county I doubted whether it was a tavern until my fellow traveller called for cider, which the judge readily drew for him. His appearance in point of dress was so singularly grotesque in contrast to the dignity of his office that I could not refrain minuting it down while he was waiting on his customers during the short stay we made. His hair was matted like a mop and looked as if no comb had entered it for months past; he had on a ragged brown greasy jacket, the sleeves of which appeared to have been torn off; dirty canvass trousers, no stockings, and very thick shoes tied with leather thongs. In a breast button-hole of his jacket was a short tobacco pipe, completely japanned with smoke; this last article was a constant appendage to every Dutch (sic) settler I met as well as to Judge S----".

In those days in that, until recent, frontier area, other sources note that people often had only 2 outfits, one for everyday and one for Sunday. The one Judge Henry Staring wore must have been his everday clothes. He died in 1808, a year before Lt. Harriott's book was published.

8. THE FOURTH GENERATION

The fourth generation of Starings in North America was born about the time of the American Revolution, in which many of their fathers fought. This generation probably spoke German as its mother tongue but was partly anglicized as a result of a post-revolution influx of English speaking people from the New England states and southern New York. As children many of this generation were probably affected by the various British and Indian raids into the Mohawk Valley. Information concerning our fourth generation ancestor, "Nicholas A" Staring is given below.

Johann Niclaus Staring⁴ (Nicholas A.) (1785 - 1844)

Son of Johann Adam (Adam J.) Staring³ and his wife Catherine McGinnis. His birth is recorded in the German Flatts Church Record Book as 6 March 1785. He died on 19 July 1844 at West Schuyler N.Y. and is buried in the nearby Dutchtown-Miller Cemetery. He obtained from his brother Timothy⁽³⁰⁾, land which their father Adam had purchased in Ernestown, Upper Canada in 1804 and sold this in 1833 to his sons Isaac and Joseph⁽³¹⁾ for a nominal sum. His wife, according to Stone⁽⁸⁾ was Adelia Cox, daughter of Fesser Cox. Although much of Stone's genealogy is erroneous, for this period when he was obtaining information from living memory which could be readily checked by others it is less subject to error or fabrication. The tombstone in the Dutchtown-Miller cemetary gives Adelia's death as "1877, aged 90 years". DAR Bible Records, quote the "Gaylord Bible" as giving her death in "1878, aged 93 years 11 months". Her father, Fesser Cox, served in the New York, Tryon County Militia on the "Patriot" (Rebel) side during the American Revolution.

Nicholas almost certainly went to Canada with his parents Adam & Catherine Staring about 1797 or 1798 when Nicholas was 13 years old. However, he had returned to Herkimer County, New York by February 1808 when he obtained part of Lot 11 in the first allotment of the Kast patent from his father. He probably married Adelia Cox about this time - their son Joseph was born on 22 December, 1810.

Nicholas was a farmer all his life. He owned several lots in the Kast Patent near what is now West Schuyler. In his will he gave his real property to four of his sons, Joseph, Ira, Adam and Sanford and required them to pay \$800 to each of his four daughters. The fifth son, Isaac, had already received over 300 acres of land in Ernestown Township, Upper Canada from Nicholas and was not mentioned in the will but is mentioned in the probate and signs that document.

The will of Nicholas A. Staring refers to his children by the Staring name but they sign the probate using the surname Sterling. Therefore the name change occurred during

the lifetime of Nicholas A. Staring, probably not many years before his death. He and others of his generation kept the original surname, his children and the children of a few other Starings of his generation adopted the new surname, Sterling.

The tombstone of Nicholas and his wife Adelia in the East Schuyler, Dutchtown-Miller cemetery gives the name as Sterling, rather than Staring. This is probably because by the time Adelia died in 1877 or 1878 she and the other members of the family had been using the Sterling surname for many years.

We do not know when English became the language most used by our branch of the Staring family. This was also probably during the lifetime of Nicholas. Certainly Adam Staring, the father of Nicholas, would have used German as his first language and English as a learned second language. Nicholas may have spoken both languages with the same fluency and his children, while maintaining some of the German language were possibly more fluent in English. In 1844 several members of the congregation of the Dutch Reformed Church in Herkimer petitioned to have every other sermon given in English instead of German. I do not know when the German language was no longer used in the church, but it probably persisted in partial use for another generation.

Nicholas' children were all probably born in West Schuyler. They were:

These birthdates were obtained by Mrs. Edith Jones of West Schuyler, a descendant of Joseph Sterling, from a neighbour. There are definitely some errors since in at least 2 cases there are less than 9 months between birthdates of children.

9. THE FIFTH GENERATION

Although Adam J. Staring³ of the third generation came to Canada about 1797, the first male Staring of our line to settle in Canada and leave male children who continued the name in this country was Isaac Staring⁵, his grandson.

Isaac Sterling⁵ (Staring) 1812 - 1903

Second son of Johann Niclaus (Nicholas A.) Staring⁴ and his wife Adelia Cox. Isaac was born at Staring Creek (now Sterling Creek) near West Schuyler N.Y. in January 1812 and died in Ernestown Ontario 17 October 1903. He may have been named after Isaac Fraser the husband of his aunt Nancy Staring⁴.

Isaac Staring and his older brother, Joseph, moved to Upper Canada about 1833. On 4 March, 1833, they were sold by their father Nicholas, 374 acres of land in the first and second concessions of Ernestown Township for the nominal sum of 5 shillings on condition of their providing lifetime support and maintenance to Timothy Staring, a brother of

Nicholas. (2) Several years later, after 1841, Joseph moved back to West Schuyler leaving Isaac in possession of the Ernestown properties at Millhaven.

Isaac married his first wife, Mary Ann Vent, on 8 June 1837. She was a grandaughter of Adam Vent, a Loyalist. In addition to farming he had a sawmill on Millhaven Creek. This burned down and was rebuilt in 1841. (1)

His first wife, from whom my branch of the family is descended, died on 19 October 1853 after giving birth to a child on 3 October. The child also died. He married, as his second wife, on 1 November 1855, Sarah Vent,, a younger sister of his first wife. According to the Diary of John C. Clark⁽¹⁾ "they crossed to the States to be married". He had two sons and four daughters by his first marriage.

I am descended from the eldest son of the first marriage, William H. Sterling.⁶ Isaac had five sons and four daughters by his second marriage. One son, Nicholas died young. The youngest son of the second marriage, Isaac Edwin, died in 1971, aged 95 years.

Isaac started out with over 300 acres of land and a sawmill. When he died, the family farm at "the Front" had diminished to about 100 acres. He was probably not the best of farmers and also had to provide for two families.

He kept in close touch with his relatives in West Schuyler, making frequent visits to Joseph and his family. This closeness continued into his son Edwin's time and did not stop until about the end of World War II when Edwin's second cousin, the mother of Mrs. Harold Jones, (Edith Davis) died. In 1984 Edith Jones, her husband and her brother Bill Davis were still farming land which had belonged to their ancestor Nicholas A. Staring and which had probably been owned by Adam Staring. This is part of the Kast Patent and has therefore been in the hands of Kasts and descendants of Kasts since 1723. (Appendix C).

10. THE SIXTH GENERATION

This Canadian born generation consisted of Isaac Sterling's families by his two marriages. Several of the children moved to the United Stated and formed a further link between the U.S. and Canadian branches. I remember my father mentioning his great aunts Amy and Sarah who I believe were nurses. They lived in the U.S. most of their lives - in Watertown and Utica. Their sister Mary Elizabeth (Mrs. Richard Pugh) lived in Utica.

William Henry Sterling⁶ 1841 - 1881

Son of Isaac Sterling⁵ and Mary Ann Vent. Born 21 December 1841 at Ernestown Ontario⁽¹⁾ Died in Newburg Ontario 9 December 1881. There is no tombstone for him but there is a single small stone for his wife Elisa Jane Rook. This has the inscription:

Elisa Rook, Wife of Wm. Sterling Died Nov. 2, 1885 aged 36 years 2 mos.


In the 1861 census, William H. Sterling was shown as living at home (presumably helping his father with the family farm at Millhaven, Ernestown Township).

In the 1871 census, he was shown as living in the village of Newburg with his wife and son Irvine. He is listed as being a Wesleyan Methodist, of German origin. His occupation is given as "Stage Driver".

The 1881 census incorrectly spells the name as Stirling. It again lists him as Wesleyan Methodist and of German origin. His occupation now is given as "Farmer".

His death notice in the Napanee Standard 12 January 1882 edition again has the surname Stirling.

I have not searched the Lennox and Addington County land records to find where his farm was located but since the 1881 census record shows him at the village of Newburg it was probably in that vicinity. He may have been renting a Rook family farm in the area. Further research on William is needed.

William's wife, Elisa Jane Rook was the granddaughter of Richard Rook who came to Canada with his wife and grown children from England before 1846. Her father was Robert Rook, born in England and her mother Elizabeth Caroline was born in Canada.

11. THE SEVENTH GENERATION

The children of this generation were orphaned at an early age when their mother died in November 1885 and their father in December 1881. The younger ones were brought up by relatives. The eldest, <u>Albert Irvine</u>, lived for a short time with an uncle, then set out on his own. They probably inherited little or nothing from their parents. It is my understanding from remembered conversations with my father that his father, Albert Irvine, and his father's sisters remained very close throughout their lives, possibly because of having been orphaned when quite young.

Albert Irvine Sterling7

He was born on 22 March 1869, son of William H. Sterling and his wife Elisa Jane Rook. After his parents death he became a carpenter and worked in Oswego, N.Y., Deseronto Ontario, Valleyfield, Quebec, and finally in Ottawa, Ontario, probably anywhere there was work to be found. When he died in 1927, he was a foreman at the Ottawa Car Works where they were still making wooden street car bodies and street car furniture. I remember him as a firm but kindly grandfather who was as likely as not to bring with him a "grab bag" of candy for his grandsons or a beautiful hand-made wooden toy car. I also remember that nearly every finger on both his hands had either lost a joint or had been otherwise damaged in some way, probably from working in factories with unguarded machinery.

His wife was Phoebe Ann Thompson, a daughter of John Thompson of Roblin Ontario, and his wife Mary Asselstine. John Thompson was a great grandson of William Thompson of Richmond Township, a Loyalist. Mary Asselstine was descended from John Asselstine (Hannes Esselstine) a Loyalist, from an old New York Hudson Valley Dutch Family.

12. THE EIGHTH GENERATION

The three children of Albert Irvine and Phoebe Ann Sterling all died relatively young, Aleta in her early twenties and William Edmund (Ed) and John Wesley (Jack) in their forties. In the lifetimes of Ed and Jack, World War I and the great depression of the 1930s occurred. They saw World War II begin but not its end.

These wars and the 1930s depression had a profound effect on the world as a whole and on its peoples, including this generation of the Sterling family.

This generation also saw very major advances in technology, particularly for communication and travel. The invention of the airplane and the radio and the remarkable proliferation of the automobile changed the lifestyles of this generation far more than the lifestyles of previous generations had ever been changed. Their story is, in essence, the story of the first half of the twentieth century.

William Edmund Sterling⁸

From the age of about 6 years to 11 years, he lived in Valleyfield, Quebec, where he came to know his cousin William Sterling Lamb well - a friendship which lasted until William Lamb was killed in France shortly before the end of World War I. Many of his summers were spent in Roblin Ontario on his grandfather John Thompson's farm. It was also there that he came to know his great-grandfather Peter Asselstine, a wagonmaker and farmer of Dutch descent who could still speak the language of his ancestors who had settled in New York about 1650.

About 1905 his family moved to Ottawa, which was his home until 1930.

As a young man he was active in the pre-war militia. He joined the Canadian Expeditionary Force on turning 21 in 1915 and saw service in France as an artilleryman (51st and 23rd Howitzer batteries). He was gassed twice, the last time being on 7 September 1918.

Before the war he had learned the trade of Jeweller/Watchmaker but after the war he was advised to take up an outdoor occupation because of the effects of the war gases on his system. With his father's assistance, he bought his grandfather Thompson's farm at Roblin Ontario. This was a mistake for two reasons. The farm land had been depleted and so had his physical ability for farming. In 1923 the farm was sold and he returned to Ottawa, worked for a while for another jeweller and then established his own jewellery store. His jewellery business prospered for a few years then failed at the beginning of the depression. He was fortunate enough to obtain a position in Windsor in the Preventive Service of the then Department of Customs and Excise, later moving to the Undervaluation Branch of that Department. He made his home in Amherstburg but worked, for the most part, in Windsor.

His wife, Alice Annetta Story was the descendant of Irish Protestant pioneer settlers of the Ottawa area. After the death of her husband she returned to Ottawa to work in Government service and managed to put her three sons through university. She died much mourned on 1 April 1968 while living in Belle River Ontario.

Marked BT New York 122 (i.e. Board of Trade) This is the companion document to C.O.5/1230.

C.O.5/1230 contained an index giving names and the folio number (i.e. double page number) where the indebtedness of the Palatines (written Palatins) was summed up. The table for each family in which the summation was made gave the folio numbers, (opposite each reconning date), relevant to that family in C.O.5/1231. Thus in folio 179 of C.O.5/1230 the indebtedness of Niclaus Staringer is summed up. The table, for example, opposite October 4, 1710 lists the reference Journal Folio 30. At folio 30 in C.O.5/1231 the indebtedness is listed for Niclaus Staring for 2 people 61 days as - 19 - (19 Shillings). The listing heading shows that the family was still in New York City at that date.

> Also compare the dates in the Johann Georg Kast entry with the dates for the Niclaus Staringer entry - either the Staring family remained in New York City longer or were among the "officers" whose subsistence charges were, through error, not made for December 31, 1710 and 23 March 1711 recovery dates. This was "remeded" in December 1711.

"The Palatins hereafter named for themselves and their families subsistence Debtors to the Queen Most Sacred Majesty L2579-1-7 for subsistence distributed to the said Palatin Families from the 5th October 1710 at New York to the 5th October last (i.e. 1711) both inclusive at the rate of ... etc."

"NOTE:

These families charged with small sums were sent up to the settlement last fall and others with large sums were subsisted at New York till the spring following and not sent up til April or May and the remainder being widows and orphans have been subsisted to this time. In this charge are brought in several omission for provision allowed to the officers from their arrival here to the 26th June last which was not charged".

Niclaus Staringer was not listed at "Livingston Manor" 31 Dec. 1710, nor 25 Mar. 1711. He must then either have been still in New York on those dates or must have been one of the officers noted in the last sentence of the note above whose subsistence had been omitted to be charged.

On 24 June 1712 Nicholas Staringer (4.1) is shown at Livingston Manor. The 13 September 1712 entry also shows him and his family (now 4.2) at Livingston Manor.

DATA ON THE BURKEY (BARCKE) FAMILY OF MARNHEIM. FROM THE CHURCH BOOKS OF MARNHEIM (Beginning 1648)

The following data provided by Hank Jones (The Palatine Families of New York) in a private communication is in addition to the Staring-Burkey data appearing in the body of this genealogy. Mr. Jones later published a 2-Volume compendium of his research into the many Palatine families who came to New York in 1710(33).

"Jorg Burggay (sic), Gemeinsmann (i.e. Commoner) here at Marenheim (sic), died 26 January 1685 aged 81 years".

Among the children of Jorg and his wife Anna Elisabeth were:

Anna, daughter of Georg Barckey "aus Westphalen burtig" and his wife Anna Lisabeth was baptised 22 October, 1654. Godparent was Anna, Bastian Laugsach's wife from Joxweiler (i.e. Jacobsweiler)

Elisabeth, daughter to above, bapt. 14 Oct. 1656 - died young.

<u>Hans Heinrich</u>, son to Georg Barckey and Anna Elisabeth, was baptised 20 September, 1657. Godparent was Hans Heinrich Barckey, son of the brother of the child's father.

<u>Elisabeth</u>, daughter to Georg Barcke and Anna Elisabeth, was baptised 26 December, 1659. The Godparent was Elisabeth Huss, wife of Conrad Dieffenbach. (She married Nicolaus Staring - JH)

<u>Hans Jacob</u>, son to Georg Barckey and Elisabeth, was baptised 20 April, 1662. Godparents were Hans Schneider and Meister Jacob, the carpenter from Joxweiler.

Twins <u>Valentin</u>* and <u>Gottschalk</u>, son to Georg Barkhe the "Tobakbereiter" (Tobacco Preparer) and Anna Elisabeth, were baptised 2 October, 1664. No Godparents mentioned.

*The Johann Veldin Staring who was listed in the Burnetsfield Patent in 1725 was possibly named for the Valentin (Veldin) Barkhe whose birth record is noted above.

THE KAST AND McGINNIS (MAGIN) CONNECTION

The wife of Adam Staring³ was Catharine McGinnis, the youngest daughter of Timothy McGinnis (better known as Teady Magin) and his wife Sarah Kast. Catharine's (Catharina) baptism was recorded 24 April 1748 in the Reformed Dutch Church, Albany. "Catharina (daughter) of Fedie Meginnie (sic) and Sarah Haas (sic). Witnesses Richard and Sarah Cartwright". (The McGinnis and Kast names are spelled several different ways in the records of this church).

Catharine's father was a well known trader operating out of Fort Oswego on Lake Ontario and the Kast Patent on the Mohawk River. His name appears frequently in the correspondence of William Johnson, (later Sir William) Superintendent of Indian Affairs for the Province of New York. During times of war between Britain and France, it was evidently the custom of Teady Magin, as a wartime Captain in the Indian Department, to recruit his Indian customers for service on the British side. Plate No. 3 is a photocopy of a letter from him to (Colonel) William Johnson concerning such a recruitement. The letter was dated "Oswego 2th June 1747". The photocopy shows signs of a fire which destroyed some of Sir William Johnson's correspondence, fortunately after cataloging had been done. Plate 2 is a transcription of Plate 3. Teady Magin (McGinnis) was killed at the Battle of Lake George, 8 Sept. 1755 when he went to war once too often with his Indians and fell into an ambush set by "French" Mohawks (Caugnawagas).

Catharine's mother, Sarah Kast grew up on her family's land grant, the Kast Patent, when it was the westernmost settlement in the Mohawk Valley and a stopping off place for Indian and other travellers.

After her husband's death at Lake George, she carried on his trading activities from the Kast Patent, probably spending the trading season there and the winters at her home at Half Moon near Albany. As the "Widow Magin" she became well known in the trading activities of the Mohawk Valley.

When the American Revolution began she actively supported the British side, aided Loyalists to escape to Oswego and Niagara and acted as a liaison between those places and Loyalists still in New York. She was eventually imprisoned at Ft. Dayton by the Rebels but escaped to Niagara with her two married daughters.

After her escape to Canada she continued to support the British cause. Correspondence during the Revolution from L.Col. Daniel Claus, a son-in-law of Sir William Johnson, to General Sir Frederick Haldimand states "from her childhood Mrs. McGinnis was much beloved by the 6 Nations so far that they prevailed upon her parents to let her live among them and adopted her as one of themselves, whereby she acquired the language perfectly, and after her riper years was so far capable as to render many signal service to Government". L.Col Claus in writing from Montreal on 5 November 1778 said that he has asked her to spend the winter with the 6 Nations Indians in order to influence them to remain loyal to the British. (Haldimand Papers, National Archives of Canada, MG21 Vol.B, 114). She spent that winter (1778-79) and also the winter of 1779-80 at Cayuga, the most central village of the 6 Nations.

This is to acquaint You that Cassieneunt two Sons is going down to fight Against the French with Eight Indians and Ottrowano is gone to his Castle to gett his fighters in readiness and then he will be down with You as Soon as possible I have had the Happiness to Stop the Connout here at Oswego in his Voyage to Canada — he also will be down and his Son Likewise. I have also true Intelligence that Seaven Castles of the foreign Nations will joyn with Us and the five Nations wherefore I begg you will take good Care for those which I now Send down to You; No more at Present but my Service to all good Friends with this I Conclude Sr.

Introduction to Part 2

Part 2 of this genealogy consists mainly of Ancestor and Family charts beginning with the compiler and his brothers. For good measure it includes family charts for their children and grandchildren. In these charts, reversing the order of Part 1 of the genealogy, the first generation is the compiler and his brothers, the second generation is their parents etc. In Part 1 the compiler is the ninth generation from the immigrant ancestor. In Part 2, the compiler is taken as the first generation and his Staring immigrant ancestor becomes the ninth generation.

The Palatine German immigrant ancestor was Niclaus Staring or Staringer. About 1830 some of his descendants in the Mohawk Valley of New York and the Ontario Front, anglicized their surname to Sterling. Our ancestor Isaac Sterling, born Staring, was one of these.

The Ancestor and Family charts provide considerably more information on the families into which our male Staring/Sterling ancestors married than is provided by Part 1 of this genealogy. In some cases it has been possible to follow these female lines back for several generations.

In developing this genealogy I have not attempted to discover descendants of siblings of any of my ancestors, however it is my hope that the information I have compiled may prove to be of help to them in their own genealogical researches.

- 1. The numbering system for the Family charts is based on the standard numbering system used in the Ancestor Charts. Thus William Edmund Sterling who appears on Ancestor Chart No. 1 as person No. 2 has Family Chart 1-2. Similarly, Nicholas Staring the immigrant from the Palatinate, who is on Ancestor Chart 22 as person No. 4, has Family Chart 22-4.


It does not appear that any members of the Burkey family took part in the emigration from the Rhineland of 1709. The name does not appear in the embarkation lists from Holland or the Hunter Lists of Palatines receiving subsistence in the Colony of New York in the period 1710-1712. However, a Peter Burcky Sr., Jacob and Peter Byrky, Jacob Bercki and Peter Berckie served during the Revolution in the Fourth Regiment of the Tryon County Militia, the same regiment as that in which our Adam J. Staring and several other Starings served. This regiment was from German Flatts, south of the river.


It would appear that after the emigration of 1709 one or more members of the Burkey family may have followed their Staring relatives to New York and settled in the German Flatts area near them.
















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































Thomas James Story

(From an Ottawa Newspaper, July 1949)

T.J. Story Marking 90th Birthday Sunday

The last member of one of the pioneer families of the district, Thomas J. Story will celebrate his 90th birthday Sunday at his home on Richmond Road, Westboro, where he has lived for nearly half a century.

His father, James Story, came from Ireland in 1837 to settle in Fitzroy township and Mr. Story recalls his elders referring to Ottawa as Bytown. Produce was brought by wagon to Ottawa while grain was sold to dealers at Pakenham.

Mr. Story later operated a farm of his own near Osgoode and after moving to his present home was a tea and coffee merchant in Carleton county for many years. Now retired, his chief hobby is his chickens and he reads the evening paper without glasses.

His wife is the former Adelaide Boucher and he has three daughters, Mrs. Morley Peaker, of Manotick, Mrs. Ed. Sterling, of Ottawa, and Mrs. L.S. Breadner, wife of Air Chief Marshal Breadner, also of Ottawa.

Family of Johann Adam STARING (Called Adam and Adam J.)

Notes and References on Family Chart:

- 1. Although positive proof does not exist the circumstantial evidence is very strong that the parents of the Catharine McGinnis who married Johann Adam Staring were Timothy McGinnis (Teady Magin) and his wife Sarah Kast. In particular it should be noted that Adam and Catharine had a son Timothy and a daughter Sarah. Timothy was not a common name among the Palatine Germans of Burnettsfield and German Flatts. Other children of Adam and Catharine were:

 Margaret, probably named for Margaret Kast Fox, an aunt of Catharine, and Nancy (Hannah) probably named after Catharine's oldest sister Hannah. See also will of Johann Jurg Kast Sr. and of Ludovick Kast (Articles by H. Hess).

Dr. Burleigh in his Ontario Historical Society paper on Sarah Magin mentions that a Sarah Storing aged 9, was with her at

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Carleton Island in Nov. 1783 during the American Revolution. He believes that this earlier Sarah was a daughter of Henry J. Staring (Capt.) captured by British Indians. However, this may have been a still earlier born daughter of Adam and Catharine.

NOTES:

- (a) In addition to the children listed on the family chart, it is possible that there was an eldest son <u>Joseph</u>, named after Adam J.'s father. This would be consistent with the 1791 Census records for the Adam Staring who is most likely our Adam.
- (b) Nicholas A. christened Johann Niclaus, after his sponsor (his cousin) Joh: Niclaus H. Staring son of (Capt.) Henry Staring.
- (c) Margaret probably named after Margaret Kast Fox, an aunt of Catharine. May have been christened Anna Margarita.

Johann Adam STARING (c.1746 - c.1823) <u>Biographical Notes</u>

Adam Staring of Herkimer Co., N.Y. and Ernestown, Upper Canada.

Adam appears to have moved to Canada sometime between 1792 and 1798, most likely about 1796. He was not a Loyalist, and in brief service in the Rebel Militia - (4th Tryon Co. Militia) during the revolution. He is almost certainly the Adam Staring who is strong that his wife was the daughter of Sarah Kast Magin and Henry Staring. Adam thus had a brother strongly entrenched on the rebel side and in-laws who were ardent and active loyalists.

Again, from strong circumstantial evidence, we know that Adam the original Palatine immigrant.

1. From the date of his marriage and the birth dates of his children, Adam must have been of military age during the revolution, and not being a declared Loyalist, probably had to do militia service in the rebel forces. The only Adam Staring who served in the Tryon County Militia during the deration who we cannot account for and dismiss from consideration is an Adam J. Staring who served a few days in the

4th Tryon Co. Militia in 1779. The other Adams were either born too late, died too early or had wives not named Catharine (DAR Lineage Books).

- 2. An Adam Joseph Staring is recorded on the muster roll of Col. John Jost Hercheimer's Reg.'t at Burnettsfield in May 1767 (pre-revolutionary Militia).
- 3. Hess, pg. 21, notes an Adam J. Staring who bought land on 26 June 1773 at a Sheriff's sale. This was the patent belonging to 3 Cunningham brothers and probably consisted of about 300 acres. On 28 Aug. 1792 Adam J. Staring and Catharine Staring his wife sell the same land (to Samuel Dexter) "farm situate on the north side of the Mohawk River in the town (i.e. township) of Herkimer". The deed was recorded by Jonas Platt 15 March 1798. I have copies of both deeds. In the purchase deed Adam is called a blacksmith; in the selling deed in 1792 he is called a farmer.
- 4. On 16 Feb. 1798 Adam J. Staring and "Caty" his wife sell 1/3 of Lot 11 in the first allotment of the Kass (sic) patent to Henry Staring of Schuyler for \$150. Adam J. and Catharine are noted as being of the Town and County of Herkimer. They were probably at that time living in Ernestown, Upper Canada but still calling themselves as "of Herkimer".
- 5. On 6 Feb. 1808 Adam Staring "late of the Town and County of Herkimer and now of Upper Canada" sells the remainder of Lot 11 in the first allotment of the Kass (sic) patent to "Nicholas A. Staring, son of the said Adam". This was registered in 1822 by "Adam Staring, formerly known as Adam Staring Jun." i.e. by Adam, the brother of Nicholas A. and son of Adam J.
- Both Nicholas A. and his brother had sons who they named Joseph. Adam Staring and Catharine were sponsors at the baptism, 19 March 1803, of the Joseph who was the son of Adam Jr. and his wife Elizabeth Cox (Gaks in the records). Although it is possible that these "Josephs" were named for the brother of Elizabeth and Delia Cox, sisters who married Adam Jr. and Nicholas A., (the brother was Johann Jost but appears to have been called Joseph at least by his descendants) it is more likely that they were named after the Joseph who was grandfather of Adam Jr. and Nicholas A. (see item 8. below).
- 7. Nicholas A. named one of his sons Adam J. (or at least he was so identified in the Will and Probate of Nicholas A.).

Since Nicholas A. already had a son Joseph it is possible that the name Adam J. was meant to honour Nicholas A.'s father Adam - who was called (frequently) Adam J.

He was almost certainly one of the third generation of Starings in America. There were several Adams in this generation at least one other of whom was also called Johann Adam and was married to a Catharine (Catharine Weber). "Our" Johann Adam was probably the Adam who married a Catharine McGinnis, on 3 July 1770 and was certainly the Johann Adam whose son "Timotheus" was born on 17 May 1778. (German Flatts church records.) His family, as far as we know consisted of 3 daughters and 3 sons (Adam Jr., Johann Nicolas (Nicolas A.), and Timothy). There may have been another son Joseph. Adam J. moved with Timothy and his daughters to Ernestown, Upper Canada in the 1790's (before 1799). Adam Jr. and Nicolas A. either remained in Herkimer or soon returned. They married and raised their families in West Schuyler, Herkimer Co., N.Y. One of Nicholas' sons, Isaac, later obtained part of Johann Adam's property in Canada and became the ancestor of the Canadian branch of the Staring/Sterling family.

Niclaus Staring (Staringer)

(The immigrant to New York, 1710)

1. In the "New York Subsistence List" of the British Board of Trade, Niclaus is listed as head of a family which initially consisted of 3 "adults", then for a short time may have decreased to 2 then jumped to 4. If it is correct that the 3 adults were Niclaus, Johann Adam and Frederick who are Burnettsfield patentees then the question arises: were Johann Adam and Frederick sons of Niclaus or brothers of Niclaus. The marriage record (Dec. 1712) (Kocherthal) for Johann Adam states that he is "son of Johann Niclaus Starring of Wensheim (sic), commune Alzey". From the way Kocherthal's records are written Johann Niclaus could at that time just as likely be living in New York as in the Rhineland. That is, it is not clear whether Niclaus Staring the immigrant was a son of Niclaus Staring of Wonsheim or was the Nichlaus Staring of Wonsheim and thus the father of Johann Adam.

Chart 222-1 is based on the assumption that the original Staring immigrants were brothers whose father was also a Niclaus Staring.

Jörg BURKEY, a "tobacco preparer" in Marnheim, in the Palatinate, was born in Westphalia and may have come from there to the Palatinate after the Thirty Years' War, i.e. after 1648. This was encouraged from neighbouring areas including Switzerland and north Germany.

Jörg Burkey's daughter Anna Elizabetha married Nickel Staring, son of Friedrich Staring of Wonsheim on 17 July 1686. They were probably the parents of the three Starings who came to

No Burkeys were in the 1710 Palatine migration to New York but one or more Burkey families may have followed the Starings shortly after that date. In the American Revolution enlisted men in the Tryon County Militia - Fourth Regiment (Colonel Peter Bellinger) included: Jacob Bercki, Peter Bercki, Peter Burcky Sr., Jacob Byrky and Peter Byrky. Capt. Heinrich Staring was in this regiment as was Adam J. Staring and formed of men from the Burnetsfield Patent area North of the Mohawk River.

The Jacob and Peter Byrky were probably the same persons as Jacob and Peter Bercki but registered differently at different

Further Notes to Chart 23-2

Timothy McGinnis ("Teady Magin")

According to the late Dr. H.C. Burleigh of Bath, Ontario, Timothy McGinnis on his arrival in America (from Ireland) served as an indentured clerk on the Livingston Estate, near Albany. On completing his indenture he met and married Sarah Kast and established a trading post on her family's property, the Kast Patent. He was actively involved in trading with the Indians there and at Fort Oswego on Lake Ontario. Whenever England and France were at war, so were their colonies. Timothy McGinnis, commissioned as a Captain in the Indian Department of New York, would recruit Indians with whom he traded to fight on the British side, see Plates 2 and 3 of Part 1 of this genealogy. He was killed together with many of his Indian recruits on 8 September 1755 in an ambush at Lake George, N.Y. set by Cawgnawaga Indians who supported the French.



According to H.Z. Jones the Kast family came from Leiman in the Landkreis (New County) of Pirmasens, south of Kaiserlautern in the Rheinland-Pfalz, and about 80 km South of Wonsheim.

The London List of Palatines describes Johann Georg Kast as a husbandman and vinedresser. From this I assume that he was a small farmer or agricultural labourer experienced in the cultivation of grapes. He was a patentee in the Burnetsfield and his wife and children also received 1100 acres of land (the Kast Patent) in what is now West Schuyler, just east of Utica N.Y. The Sterling Creek runs through the Kast Patent.

Adam J. Staring and his brother Heinrich acquired much of this land during or shortly after the American Revolution. At least some of this was acquired from Adam's mother-inlaw Sarah Kast McGinnis.

The Kast Patent was, for some time, the most westerly European settlement on the Mohawk River. It was there that Sarah grew up and became fluent in the Mohawk language. Johann Georg Kast, in addition to farming, engaged in trading with the Indians and Sarah met and married the young trader Timothy McGinnis (Teady Magin).

Notes to Chart 24-1

Fesser COX

Both the Christian name and the surname of this ancestor are an enigma. In "New York in the Revolution" (17), he is listed as having served, presumably at different dates, in the 4th Tryon County Militia as Fauet Cox and Fesser Cox, and in the 3rd Tryon County Militia as Petter Cock. His daughter Elizabeth Cox, wife of Adam J. Staring Jr. was called Elizabeth Gaks in the record of the baptism of their son Joseph 19 March 1803. The version Fesser Cox seems to be the one accepted by his family.

In the New York revolutionary war records there were many COX persons serving in other counties but their Christian names were clearly of English origin. Fesser (or Petter) Cox may have been of Dutch or German origin but I could find no Dutch or German surname from which Cox might have been derived.

Notes to Chart 251-1

Johann Jost PETRI (1)

(Ref. H.Z. Jones)

This family is from Breitscheid near Altenkirchen. This is about 100 km. north of Wonsheim but still in the Rheinland-Pfalz.

Johann Jost Petri (1) was buried in Breitscheid on 24 June 1700. His widow, Anna Gertrude petitioned to leave Germany in 1709 and made her appearance on the Hunter List (#567) with 2 persons over 10 years of age and 1 person under 210 years, one of whom may have been her son Johann Jost. Her last entry in the Hunter List was 4 Aug. 1710 with Her last entry in the Hunter List was 4 Aug. 1710 with the same numbers. Her son may have taken over the responsitive same family between then and the next Hunter List entry.

Her son Johann Jost PETRI (2) made his initial appearance on the Hunter Rolls as 568 on 31 Dec. 1710 with 2 persons over 10 years of age. He was a soldier in 1711 in the Palatine Volunteers to Canada. He was one of the Burnets-field patentees and a magistrate of his village. He was taken prisoner by the French in 1757.





The considerable time between the birth of Levi (Dec. 1818) and Catharine (1825) may be significant.

McDowalls marriage register shows a marriage of William Thompson and Cornelia Beatty on 27 January 1818, Fredericksburg.

From July 20, 1822 to 26 April 1831, there is a gap of over 8 years in the register.

Is it possible that our Levi is a son of Cornelia Beatty by first marriage of our William Thompson. Cornelia may have died a few years after his birth and William may have married Hannah Wees shortly thereafter. Because of the gap in the registers there would be no record of Cornelia's death and the second marriage of William. However, against this theory is the fact that Levi's death record gives his mother's name as Hannah Weese. Of course if Levi was brought up by Hannah he might regard her more as a mother than a step-mother and his children would consider her as their grandmother.

In the "family chart" I have recorded her as Levi's mother although as I have stated above I have some doubts about this.

Ysselsteyn/Esselstine/Asselstine Family

A genealogical study of the Canadian Asselstines has been published by a Kathryn Asselstine* from data furnished by her family connections and from New York, New Jersey and Canadian church and historical records. Although it contains some errors it is nevertheless an excellent source and is particularly useful for the information it supplies on the family prior to the American Revolution and during the early years after the Revolution.

The first North American progenitor of the family was almost certainly a Marten Cornelise or Cornelisen, a native of Ysselsteyn in the province of Utrecht, in the Netherlands. He first appears in Schenectady, N.Y. (then the New Netherlands) in 1660. He moved to Claverack N.Y. in 1668. This town became the "seat" of the family and the origin of its various branches. The original property is still owned by a male line of the family.

It is unlikely that Marten Cornelisen bore any surname when he came to New York; at that time surnames were not common in the Netherlands. However he appears to have been given or adopted the surname van Ysselsteyne in New York because of having come from the town of Ysselsteyn (now Ijsselstein) and also perhaps to distinguish him from several others in the colony named Marten Cornelisen. The name Marten Cornelisen van Ysselsteyne would identify him as Marten, son of Cornelis, and as coming from the town of Ysselsteyne.

In any event the surname remained but very early became written as Esselstein and less frequently as Isselstein. It was not until two U.E.L. brothers Peter and Hannes (John) Esselstein came to Canada after the American Revolution that their name was modified again, this time to Asselstine. All spellings of the name had approximately the same pronunciation.

Isaac Esselstein³, the father of the U.E.L. brothers, Peter⁴ and John⁴, was almost certainly a grandson of Marten Cornelisen. Kathryn Asselstine believes Isaac's father to be Jacob², a son of Marten Cornelisen and I have so shown him was raised in New York City and Perth Amboy N.J. rather than in the Claverack area where we later find our Isaac.

In our genealogy we also find that we have little information on Abraham Asselstine⁵, one of the sons of John Asselstine⁴, U.E.,

by his first marriage, with Catharina (Cool). However, by a deed 10 May 1821 (recorded 10 Dec. 1833) Kings Township, 6 York Co., our known Canadian born ancestor Isaac Asselstine, is identified as Abraham's son and heir. We do not know who was Abraham's wife or if he had other children.

Family notes show John Story as having been born in Drumreilly Parish in Ireland. This is in County Leitrim which borders on Co. Fermanagh and Co. Cavan in the north and east. Drumreilly Parish is in the Church of Ireland (Anglican) Diocese of Kilmore. This Diocese extends into Co. Cavan in which there were Story families including a Bishop Joseph Story.

The Genealogical Office in Dublin cites the Tithe Applotment Book for Drumreilly Parish for 1834 as showing John Story as responsible for tithes of £14.3.0. This corresponds to between 85 and 100 acres of land. He was probably a fairly well-to-do tenant farmer who could see no future for his large family in Ireland, where the tendency to sub-divide land was common.

Two of John and Margaret Story's sons (David and possibly James), came to Canada about 1837 to reconnoiter the country. In 1838 the parents and the other children came. John was apparently more affluent than most Irish settlers in that he was able to provide several of his sons with farms when they married.

There is some disagreement as to the spelling of the surname -Story or Storey. John always signed his name Story; others sometimes used one spelling and sometimes the other.

1. Our first information concerning John Griffith was found in Public Archives of Canada Colonial Office 384, Emigration 1817-1818, Vol. 3, folio 60. This has the following:

"List of Protestant families preparing to emigrate from the Counties of Carlow and Wexford to this date. Seven hundred and ten families containing four thousand and twenty-seven individuals of whom eleven hundred are able-bodied men."

This is dated 29 November 1817.

2. The records of the Ontario Department of Public Records and Archives show that: "John Griffith received his patent to the North-East half of Lot 3 Concession 7, Ramsay Township on 26 Oct. 1826". Since patents usually took about 4 years to prove and register this indicates that he settled in 1822.

John BOUCHER

In his lifetime in Canada his name was generally given as Boucher. However, in the "Return of Persons located by the Quarter Master General's Department in Bathurst District" (Canada Land Petitions RG1, L3, Vol. M21) his name is spelled Bouchier. In a petition dated April 6th 1823 he signs his name John Boucher. Bruce Elliott (37) has noted that he was one of ten families of "Protestant Loyalists" who in March 1819 planned on emigrating from Mount Shannon in Ireland to Canada. His landlord who was afraid that he was "endeavouring to quit this country defrauding me of my rent", called him John Bouchier. It would appear from other data provided by Bruce Elliott that in Mount Shannon descendants of the same original family might be called Boucher, Bouchier or Bourchier - all with the same pronunciation.

John Boucher in Canada was a successful farmer and Tavernkeeper first in March Township then in Nepean. He provided farms for seven sons. His third wife, Sarah Wright Coulter was a granddaughter of Philemon Wright, the founder of Hull.

Our Boucher line is from his second wife, Elizabeth Mulligan.

According to Mac Lysaght "Irish Surnames" (1964), Boucher, also spelt Bouchier, is a pre-Cromwellian settler family.

Boucher Emigration from Ireland

The following copies of letters pertaining to emigration from the Mountshannon area were found by Bruce Elliott (37) in Public Archives of Canada copies of Colonial Office documents. The letter dated 17 March 1819 from John Boucher's landlord claims that John is planning on leaving the country while still owing rent for his tenant farm. The third letter dated 18 September 1823, four years after John Boucher came to Canada, has an attached list which I have not copied, of 48 distressed families wishing to emigrate. It describes some of the conditions pertaining to the time and to the area. The list which I have not copied includes the No. of Males No. of Females following Boucher families:

Our John Boucher had children in Canada who he named George, Robert, James.

It is clear from all of this that the Bouchers were a numerous lot. Probably the original Boucher settler in the area had a fair sized tenant farm but subsequent generations had subdivided it too many times. This resulted in very small holdings, insufficient to provide adequate support, particularly during the depression which followed the end of the Napoleonic Wars in 1815.

At the anxious request of forty eight distressed families of the Parish of Inniscalthra and County of Galway I respectfully beg leave to lay their case before your Lordship in the hope that His Majestys Government would be pleased to afford them some assistance to enable them to emigrate to one of the Colonies in upper Canada, where some of their friends and relations are already settled, and where they themselves would now be, but for the extreme pverty under which they labour - and I was for eleven years their Parish Minister, and can bear testimony to their loyalty and good conduct, having received the most active assistance from those poor (?) people in keeping the peace of the Country in disturbed times, when nearly the whole of the County of Galway was overrun by the ribbon system and for the truth of this statement I rather think His Majesty's Government in Ireland (with whom I communicated at the time on the subject) can vouch.

Thirty seven of these families are protestants of the established Church and eleven Roman Catholics, and I dare say that it is unnecessary for me to inform your Lordship that Protestants of the lower class in this unhappy Country, and indeed I might say Protestants of all classes who are not tied to the Country by property and self interest are most desirous to seek for peace and quiet in any clime, and any Land where Providence may think fit to grant them that blessing, denied (f.347) to them in the place of their birth, and in the case of these families, in whose favour I have presumed to address your Lordship, the population of the part of the Country they inhabit is redundant beyond conception, and the soil barren and unable to support a large number, and emigration from one District of Ireland to another will be impracticable, until murders and house burnings cease, and the dreadful spirit, that exists at present, suppressed.

The list I herewith enclose was put into my hands by those poor people, and I beg leave to send it as I received it, and in hopes of Your Lordships favourable answer.

Obituary

John BOUCHER

Ottawa Times

It is our painful duty again to chronicle the death of one of our oldest settlers in the County of Carleton. The subject of this memoir, John Boucher Senior, who died the 10th March, 1869 was a native of Mount Shannon, County Galway, Ireland. He was born in the year 1795 and emigrated to Canada with his wife and two children, landing in Quebec on the 19th May, 1819, being then 24 years of age. After wending his way up the St. Lawrence and Ottawa Rivers he located in the Township of March in which township he lived till a few years before his death, having removed to the Township of Nepean, adjoining where he first settled and where he remained till Death, to whom the strongest must submit, claimed him as one of his victims. He retained all his faculties up to the time of his death, having reached the good age of 74. In his business and other relations of life he gained the esteem and friendship of everyone from the manly, straight-forward course he pursued.

He was father of twenty-five children, eighteen of whom are still living to mourn the loss of an indulgent parent. His remains were followed to their last resting place by a large number of sorrowing relations, and by a large concource of friends and neighbours, the cortege extending over a mile in length. Having arrived at the church, over a mile in length. Having arrived at the church, adjoining the burying ground, his remains were first taken into the church, where a very feeling and appropriate into the church, where a very feeling and appropriate sermon was preached by the Rev. Mr. May, the curate of the sermon was preached by the Rev. Mr. May, the curate of the parish, after which the body was lowered into the grave, parish, after which the body was lowered into the grave, there to rest till the resurrection when we trust, it will come forth a glorious body, when his spirit will be united to this glorious body, to sing the praises of redeeming love throughout a never ending eternity.

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ANCESTOR TABLE

This ancestor Table summarizes the data from the Ancestor and Family charts pertaining to each known ancestor in both the direct Staring/Sterling line and in the many female lines for which we have information. It shows this summarized data, beginning with Thomas Story Sterling and his brothers, born in the 1920's, as the first generation and going back generation by generation to the known ancestors of the eleventh generation. The ancestors from this earliest generation were born for the most part in the mid 17th century, ie about 1650. Many of the female lines "fell by the wayside", particularly after the sixth generation, but fortunately the Staring/Sterling line could be traced as far back as the eleventh generation and a possible twelfth.

Except where otherwise noted, the charts cited in the Ancestor Table are Family Charts. Dates in brackets are estimates.

There were two Esselsteyn/Asselstine - Keller marriages. Isaac Esselsteyn to Anna Elizabeth Keller about 1740 and Isaac Asselstine (their great grandson) to Mary Keller in 1820. The ancestor of both Keller women was Christian Keller⁽¹⁾ a Palatine immigrant of 1710. These two marriages are why we have Conrad Keller⁽²⁾ and his wife appearing as ancestors in both the 9th and 10th generations and Christian Keller⁽¹⁾ in both the 10th and 11th generations. Also, since Conrad Kellers wife was Maria Barbara Proppert her father, Johann Jost Proppert appears in both the 10th and 11th generations.
