FOREWORD












ORIGINAL HOME OF GEORGE AND ELIZABETH (SMITH) TENNANT

Thomas Tennant (1755 - 1821) and his wife Ann Hill (1764 - 1840), progenitors of the descendants recorded in this genealogy, were natives of the County of Carlow, Province of Leinster, in South-eastern Ireland.

Thomas was a son of Thomas Tennant, stone mason, of English descent, and his wife Judith Butler. He had two brothers Robert and Richard, also three sisters, Ann, Julia and Mary.

In historical data left to us by a grandson, also Thomas Tennant, Judith Butler was said to have been a daughter of a Captain Butler; some of her brothers were knighted, and one was Earl of Ormond of Kilkenny Castle. Attempts to confirm this or prior ancestry of Thomas Tennant, Senior, have been unsuccessful.

It has been said that Captain Butler objected to the marriage of his daughter Judith to Thomas Tennant, reputedly because of the difference in their faiths rather than in their class. However, believing in their love for each other in spite of adversity and loss of inheritance, Judith and Thomas eloped and were Married. It would appear that reconciliation took place later, as it is understood that their son Thomas subsequently had an administrative position assisting in the operation of the Butler estate and lived in a house thereon. Their children attended a private school.

Thomas and Judith lived happily together, and when their lives ended "they were buried in a churchyard called Aghade about a mile from where they lived. Their graves and monument were enclosed with cut stone, intended to defy the ravages of time."

Ann Hill (1764 - 1840) wife of Thomas Tennant, Junior, also of English descent, was a daughter of George Hill, and his wife, a Miss Dudson. Thomas (3rd) in his account stated "he(George Hill) lived to be 103 years old, a splendid looking person was he. I remember his dressed wig, and the silver buckles in his shoes."

Rev. Elisha Tennant in his account of the family stated "Grandmother Tennant (the above Ann Hill) was called a very pretty woman, and Grandfather (was) a fine looking man - one who would attract attention in a crowd."

Early in 1958 I requested the Chief Herald, of the Genealogical Office Dublin Castle to determine if the above lineage could be confirmed or extended. He is to be commended for the extensive search made and reported to me, but unfortunately without success in locating anything which seemed relevant. This may have been due to insufficient or inaccurate information, or loss of pertinent records. In previous correspondence, commenting on the surname he stated The name Tennant is English, and occupational in origin. Irish families so called were English settlers in this country."

It appears probable, therefore that ancestors several generations

preceding Thomas Tennant, Senior, settled in Ireland at the time of Cromwell. From Prendergast's "Cromwellian Settlement of Ireland" page 698, I have made the following extract: "Names of Cromwellian Adventurers for Lands in Ireland in the 17th Century"

The following were the surnames of adventurers for for Lands in Ireland, under the various Acts and Ordinances of Subscription: Commencing with the Acts of 17, Charles 1, Chap. 33, A.D. 1642 and ending in 1646, when all further subsciptions ceased:

Hill Richards Tenant

Burke's "Family Records" gives lineage of the family of Tennant, originally Dunand or Tenand - long settled in Scotland.

Further data may be found in Black's "The Surnames of Scotland" (1946) pg.766, from which I have extracted the following:

"Tenant, Tennant, Tennent:

William Tennant of Crestone of County of Linlescu 1296. His seal shows a large dog and the inscription S'Willi Tenaunt (Bain II, pg. 202, 581). Thomas Tenaunt was one of the witnesses in the inquiry concerning the Templars in 1309 (Wilkins' "Concilia", pg. 383). John Tenant was one of the garrison of Edinburgh Castle 1339 - 40, (Bain III, pg. 241). John Tennand was one of the burgesses (i.e. a citizen or freeman of a borough) of Sterling who attacked cruives or fishings of the abbot and convent of Cambuskenneth 1366 (Cambus 55)

Andro Tenand was charter witness in Ayr, 1500 (Friars Ayr, pg. 68) Andro Tenand and Bob Tenand were voters in Monkland 1519 (Simon 45). Andrew Tennend was burgess of Are 1539 (RMS III, 849). Another Andrew Tennant was mentioned in Dysart 1542 (Dysart pg. 7) Robert Tenent was witness in Glasgow 1550. Reversion (i.e. right to future possession) was granted Kenthigern Tenende in Glasgow 1555 (Protocols).

Observations on the political and economic conditions in Ireland during the 17th and 18th centuries are beyond the scope of this brief history, but references appear in the bibliography. In the early 19th century following the Napoleonic War there was a period of acute depression in the British Isles, with widespread unemployment and low wages for available work. The Military Settlements established in 1816 and 1817 at Perth and Richmond (Upper Canada) had created a good impression. Advertisements appeared in the newspapers of that time, for settlers to undertake the voyage to America, and particularly Upper Canada. Many families made that difficult decision.

Prospective settlers were advised to prepare for out-door work;

girls to be instructed in knitting and spinning, and the boys to learn the making of fishing nets and tackle. Also, each emigrant was required to have on board the following unbroken supplies: 18 lbs of Irish mess beef; 42 lbs of biscuits; 132 lbs of oatmeal; 6 lbs of barley and peas; 6 lbs of butter and 3 lbs of molasses - an estimated requirement for eighty-four days passage to Quebec. "Parents were allowed the discretion to lay in porter, tea and sugar as more suitable for mothers and children."

Baggage was restricted to a few personal belongings, bedding, pots, pans and crockery. The owners of the vessels had to ensure sufficient drinking water to be rationed daily to the passengers, also to provide "sufficient furnaces for cooking victuals and baking oatmeal bread."

In Dublin, on April 18th, 1820, Thomas Tennant bought passage across the Atlantic to Quebec, for himself, his wife and family of nine, a daughter-in-law, and "one manservant", for the sum of £39. It was recorded that they left their home on the 12th day of April in preparation for the sailing.

Enquiries made of several sources including the Master of Shipping Records, Dublin; Lloyd's Register of Shipping, London; and the Registrar General of Shipping and Seamen, Cardiff, Wales, have been unsuccessful in determining the name of the sailing vessel on which the crossing was made.

Other records show that the sailing sloops "Commerce" and "Prompt" docked at Quebec in June 1820 with 1200 settlers out of Greenock. Those passengers had paid their passage from Scotland to Canada, but the British Government provided means of travel by boat to Prescott, thence to Lanark Township in wagons.

Because of the widespread poverty and unrest the Government authorized Lord Bathurst to advise the lieutenant-governor of Upper Canada to prepare for this group of settlers by providing 100 acres of land each and advancing £3 per adult plus £3 at the end of 3 months and £2 at the end of 6 months, to be repaid within 10 years. Essential tools, equipment and blankets were to be provided for each family; while building implements, a number of bushels of seed etc. were to be allotted for groups of settlers.

The Tennant family landed at Quebec on the 26th of June, after a wearisome voyage prolonged by adverse winds which blew the vessel off course. Passengers with their possessions were carried to Montreal by other boats. The diary of another emigrant who travelled the same route recorded arrival in Montreal in a heavy rainstorm which drenched clothes and provisions of the passengers. It would be naive to think that the sun shone all the time on our group, so it is quite probable that they encountered similar inclement weather on some occasions during their journey.

Baggage was transported by wagon from Montreal to Lachine 10 miles away where the colonists with their precious belongings boarded boats

or bateaux for the difficult journey up the St. Lawrence River past the Long Sault Rapids. (These rapids have disappeared within the last few years with the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway and the extensive hydro development near the city of Cornwall.)

The bateaux were 30 ft. long, and flat at stern and bow; with a movable mast and square sail. They had a crew of a captain and 5 or 6 men. When the current was too strong for poling, men would go ashore and tow the boat with a rope. Oxen or horses were also used. In the shallow water the boats ran aground at times and men had to wade into the river to free them. Women passengers frequently were obliged to walk along the river bank, perhaps quite gladly.

During the five days required to travel the 120 miles from Lachine to Prescott, the travellers' clothes were frequently wet, either from rain or from the heavy dew while they lodged out in the fields during the night. Sometimes they had access to farmhouses or barns. Many of them suffered illness from the exposure and the unpleasantly rough journey.

Thomas Tennant obtained accommodation for his family in the established Military town of Prescott (Fort Wellington). He and his older sons, George, Richard, William and John set out to choose lots for settlement. By wagon they travelled over poor, miry roads, presumably by Brockville to the depot of Perth, which had been established four years earlier on Pike Creek (renamed the Tay River) as the centre of the military settlement.

At the Land Office there they obtained location tickets, permitting some choice of lots in the area to which directed. From Perth they walked in a northerly direction along the blazed trail that became the "Perth Road" (leading to Pakenham and beyond to the Laird of MacNab Settlement at Arnprior). A few miles north of the present site of Ferguson's Falls, and a short distance off this trail they chose lots bordering on what later became designated as the lOth Line of Lanark Township.

Thomas Tennant "made choice of Crown Reserve Lot No. Eight in the Tenth Concession of the said Township of Lanark" and "Immediately occupied the South West Half of the said Lot".

(Petition of George Tennant, 1828: Archives of Canada)

It was already the month of July and so much had to be done to prepare for their first winter in Canada. Settlers at first had to sleep in the bush, with blankets spread on a bed of boughs, probably in a crude "wigwam" type of shelter. As quickly as possible they cleared a site and built a log shanty on the east side of the 10th line, directly coposite the location of the log home subsequently erected for George, and in contemporary times occupied for many years by his granddaughter"Bessie Ann" (the late Mrs. Benjamin Tennant). Unfortunately nothing remains of this shanty, the first home of our ancestors in Canada.

Shanties of 1820 in Lanark Township were of log construction, with the ends notched to secure the logs, and also reduce the space between them. These chinks were packed with moss and plastered with clay. The roofs were made of basswood "troughs" in two layers, the upper pieces being placed with the round side up, and covering the adjoining edges of the two underneath.

The base of the chimney was made of stone, while the upper portion was formed of pieces of cedar, heavily plastered with clay on the inside. The fireplace provided heat for cooking and baking as well as for the entire shanty. The fire afforded the only light in the long winter nights, augmented by home-poured tallow candles. The fire was not permitted to go out at night.

Under standing conditions in force in Upper Canada to all classes of applicants in 1820, location tickets were granted to heads of families and young men over eighteen years of age. Accordingly, the four sons who were eligible located on 100 acres each as follows, as recorded in the Land Book entry sheet (Archives of Canada);

> George $E_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ Lot 8, Concession 9 (15 Oct. 1820) William $E_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ Lot 6, Concession 9 (17 Oct. 1820) John $E_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ Lot 8, Concession 11(17 Oct. 1820) Richard $W_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ Lot 7, Concession 10(17 Oct. 1820) (Dates of location shown in brackets)

Their names appear again the Land Book for 16 March, 1825 in the "List of Emigrants in the Lanark Military Settlement entitled to receive their Patent Deeds, having performed their location duties up to 24th December, 1823".

The location tickets of that time stipulated if the individual "is not residing upon and improving the lot, clearing and putting in crops at least four acres yearly, then this Title to be void and of no effect and subject to be immediately re-granted. After location no exchange can take place, nor is this certificate of any value but to the original Grantee".

Some of the men returned to Prescott in the autumn after the shanty was built, to escort the rest of the family to their new home. The party with whatever possessions they brought from Ireland began the tiresome journey by wagon to Perth. There they obtained provisions and set out on foot to the shanty.

George Tennant had married Elizabeth Smith in Ireland. A few miles from Perth near the site of Innisville the group gratefully accepted the hospitality of a Scots family already established. In their home Elizabeth gave birth to her first-born, their son George Ansley Tennant on November 23, 1820. After about 10 days, as soon as she was able to travel, they resumed their journey.

Shortly afterward they met a party carrying a man named Cochrane on a stretcher to Perth. He had been killed by a falling tree in clearing his lot about two miles beyond their destination, and was being carried

to Perth for burial.

Very soon our group reached the Mississippi River, which was then frozen over. Uncertain of the thickness of the ice, George cut two long saplings to carry in his hands. They were to bridge a gap in the ice if he broke through. Finding it safe, the group was able to cross without incident. During the journey from Perth, Ann (Hill) Tennant is said to have carried a kettle filled with dishes.

Imagine their circumstances - colder weather than they were accustomed to, a young mother with her baby in her arms, other members carrying the rest of their possessions plus provisions, walking along a blazed trail in a strange new land, heavily wooded, striving to reach their new home before nightfall on a cold autumn day.

The "man servant" referred to in the passage receipt actually was a woman, Betty Neal. During their stay in Prescott she met a British Army soldier, William Wilson, married him, and returned to England with him on his retirement from service.

Sometime during those first few months, Thomas Sr. steamed and curved a green sapling to form a walking cane. This was passed from son to son, and is a prized possession of Harry Tennant in California.

The isolation, severity of the winter, and remorse in bringing his family to "this wilderness" took its toll of Thomas. One day as he walked about, within sight of their shanty, he remarked "where will I be buried? This is a nice spot" as he stood where the sun shone on a naturally-cleared, sandy knoll. Broken hearted he passed away on February 7th, 1821, and was buried in about the spot where he had stood that day.

Thus began the Tennant Cemetery, deeded and registered as a burial ground, still in use. The accompanying diagram reveals how many of the Tennant family and relatives subsequently have been buried there.

Thomas' disillusionment with the "wilderness" to which he brought his family is understandable - however if he could have foreseen the desperate conditions in his homeland twenty years after his departure, he would have counted himself and his children lucky to have taken the difficult step he led them to take.

Clearing of land proceeded throughout the winter, and with the arrival of Spring their first seeding was done in roughly broken land wrested from nature.

Grief again struck the family, when William fell ill with high fever and within seven days passed on, in June, 1821.

They had many hardships to endure. Until they had time to fence their land, it was often difficult to find their cow (or cows). One afternoon, the youngest son, Joseph was sent to bring home their cow. He wandered about for a long time without finding her. An older brother went in search of Joseph, and came upon him seated dejectedly on a log, and muttering to himself, "God knows I earn the sup of milk I get!"

After the family became established, the sons and daughters married, settling on property bought from the Crown within a short distance of the original site. Particulars are reccunted elsewhere in this history.

Julia Tennant married James Thorne, and for at least part of their lives they were merchants in Ferguson's Falls.

Joseph Tennant married his cousin Elizabeth (Bess) Hill. She was the widow of a man by the name of Handsfield, whom she had married in Ireland. Joseph and Bess operated a store in Brockville for a few years. Bess died in 1881 and was buried in a cemetery at Harlem. Joseph spent his later years at Thomas Smith's and was buried in the Tennant cemetery.

As there were no children in the marriages of Julia Tennant or her brother Joseph Tennant, this genealogy records the descendants of their brothers George, Richard, John, Thomas, Robert and sister Elizabeth.

Of particular interest to many descendants of sons Thomas and Robert is the knowledge that as young men they worked for a short period at the "Front" as the St. Lawrence area was called, where farms had already been established.

There they met and married sisters - Mary Anne and Frances Richards. Their parents, Richard Richards and his wife Mary James, with three of their family had emigrated from Ireland shortly after the Irish Rebellion, and settled in Utica, New York. Mary Anne, Frances and brother Henry were born in Utica.

Circumstances following the War of 1812 - 14, prompted the Richards family to move from Utica to Upper Canada, about 1817 or 1818. It has been said that they crossed the St. Lawrence River on horseback on the ice a short time before break-up. There were "air-holes" or open areas which made the crossing hazardous. To reduce the risk of causing breaks in the ice, they were advised to canter rather than walk their horses.

The Richards family settled near Lake Eloida in the Farmersville or Athens area, where they were living when Thomas and Robert Tennant became acquainted with Mary Anne and Frances.

The Richards family, some generations previously had moved from Wales to Ireland. (Note reference to Cromwellian Settlement). In the latter part of the 18th Century they lived near the town of Gorey, County Wexford, on the south-east coast of Ireland. Richard's wife, Mary James belonged to one of the eminent families of County Wexford.

Richard Richards was a merchant and had interests in shipping. He had two brothers who were doctors of medicine, and one sister. Sarah, the first child of Richard Richards and his wife was born at Cahore Point in 1791. Susanna and John were born in 1793 and 1794 respectively.

Richard Richards took part in the Rebellion of 1797-8, with a company of cavalry, in which he rode his own "bay mare". In an encounter, Richard went to aid a fellow eavalryman, who was on foot defending himself with his sword against two opponents, after his mount had been killed. Richard was shot in the right arm, by his own stable-boy, whom he had befriended, but was now a member of the opposing faction. Richard's horse had one leg broken by musket fire, but managed to carry him about nine miles to safety. Richards arm was so badly shattered that it was of little use to him afterwards. As he had lost most of his holdings to the rebels, he decided to emigrate.

Mary (James) Richards died in 1826, and was buried in the cemetery at Tincap, a small community a few miles north of Brockville.

Richard Richards died in 1840 at the home of his daughter Mary Anne, and was buried in the Tennant Cemetery.

Their eldest daughter Sarah married William Giles in Brockville in 1817, and settled on a farm one mile east of Athens. John Richards married Betsy Johnson and settled near the village of Lansdowne.

Henry Richards (1805-1888) married Jane Hill (1802-1889), settled near Harlem and they were my maternal great grandparents. Jane Hill was a daughter of Thomas Hill (1747-1830) and his wife Ann Ansley (1762-1843) and a niece of Ann Hill who married Thomas Tennant with whom this record is initially concerned.

For much of the above detail of the Richards family, I am indebted to Miss S.E. Laura Cockell of Athens who in 1956 prepared a record of Richards descendants.

A great granddaughter of Sarah Richards has a sampler made by Sarah as a school-girl in Gorey. I believe there are one or two china cups in existence, one in my brother Joseph's home, brought from Ireland, and carried by one of the early members of the family in her apron from her burning home near Harlem many years ago. Joseph also has a "horse-pistol" brought by the Richards family from Ireland, while I have a beautiful Paisley shawl of large dimensions, in which the fine fabric and delicate pastel shades are in wonderful condition after 150 years or more, a prized gift from my mother.

The passage receipt was given to me because of my great interest in the family history, by "Bessie Anne" as she was affectionately known, about eighteen years ago, a short time before ill health forced her to leave the old homestead.

There was further relationship between the Hills, Richards and Tennants. George Hill and his wife had one son and three daughters of whom I have knowledge - Thomas, Ann, Mary and a daughter whose name I do not know. The latter was an ancestor of Mary Frizell who married Alfred Tennant (grandson of George).

Thomas Hill had two daughters - Elizabeth who married Joseph Tennant as already mentioned - and Jane, who married Henry Richards and became my maternal great-grandmother as well as my great-aunt because her husband was a brother of my paternal grandmother, Frances Richards!

Ann Hill of course was the matriarch of this history by her marriage to Thomas Tennant.

Mary Hill married John James and became the mother of Letitia James, the first wife of Edward Tennant (son of Robert). Mary (Hill) James was buried in the Bowland Cemetery near Clayton.

Elizabeth Hill, her father and Aunt Mary (James) came to Canada at a later date than Ann Hill and Thomas Tennant.

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George Tennant had a good position in Ireland, but the lease on his farm was about to expire. On arrival in Canada, he had hoped to obtain a clerical position in Brockville, but none was available, so he and his wife decided to settle on a lot near his parents and brothers. He was a council representative in the Bathurst District of Upper Canada in 1849, and held the office of magistrate for a period of time.

He had several encounters with the Ballyghiblins, a group of dissatisfied settlers from the area between Shipman's Falls (Almonte) and Carp. Once a number of these ruffians were bound to ox-sleighs and brought to George as magistrate. He had them temporarily released, given food in his own home, before being re-bound and sent on to gaol in Perth.

He was attacked by a group of them while in Shipman's Falls with a load of grain to be ground. He and the miller had to barricade themselves in the grist-mill for protection until the attackers withdrew.

Frequently they hijacked loads of supplies being hauled home from Ottawa by other settlers. On one occasion, they not only took George's load but beat him severely and left him lying on his sleigh. His team of horses found their way home with their master unconscious on the sleigh. He never recovered from the effects of the beating.

The Ballyghiblins burned school-houses, engaged in brawls and committed other crimes until driven out of the area by a group of "vigilante" farmers.

George's wife, Elizabeth Smith, whom he married in Ireland, was a sister of James Smith who married George's sister Elizabeth Tennant.

John Tennant (1797 - 1876) was a young man of twenty-three when he emigrated from County Carlow with his parents in 1820. Consequently he qualified for an emigrant's purchase of 100 acres in the Lanark Military Settlement under the provisions existing in Upper Canada. In the Land Book of 16 March 1825, he is recorded as having performed the Location Duties up to 24 December 1823 on E_2^1 Lot 8, Con. XI, Lanark Township (date of Location 17 October 1820). This was within about two miles of other members of his family.


A Kay (or Kaye) family also had emigrated from Ireland in 1818-1820. They settled in Addington County, near the Village of Napanee Mills (now Strathcona) St. Lawrence River area, but soon after two brothers took up land near the Tennant Settlement in Lanark County.

One of their sisters, Jane Kay (1806 - 1881) came to their new holdings to keep house for them. It was then she met John Tennant and married him. They lived all the rest of their lives on that farm, and raised a family of 12 children.

Mary Tennant, their eldest daughter, when a child was sent to an uncle's farm two miles away to borrow some bags, needed for a load of wheat her father planned to haul to Ottawa to sell, and to bring back a load of flour and other supplies, to last them for considerable time. On her way she found a string of sleigh bells which she picked up and carried with her for amusement. On her way home she was followed by five or six dogs -- as she thought. Whenever she shock the bells, the animals stopped but would follow after her each time she resumed walking. When she reached the home buildings, the animals jumped over a fence and ran off into the woods the jingling of the bells she carried had saved her life from being attacked by the wolves. Animals at that time were very plentiful, and many times John went out at night to chase deer out of his fields of wheat. The Wilde family of three sisters and five brothers (perhaps more) emigrated from Queens County, Ireland, about 1826. The eldest son, Johnathon at that time was married, and had three small children, the oldest being William, five years of age. The voyage by sailing vessel was a tiresome thirteen weeks at sea.

Johnathon had been a Government surveyor, and was land agent for the Earl of Abbeyleix. He was a very conscientious man, and rather than evict a family for rent past due, would pay it himself. It has been said that the agent who succeeded him was shot because of his harsh treatment of these tenants.

After arrival in Canada, Johnathon taught school for a number of years, but became an invalid, William then had to find work when quite young to support the family.

Brian Garrett Eric McCreary na na ina mananga ata si majarakan kasa natasi na manan mana Elizabeth Tennant, who emigrated in the summer of 1820, had been courted in Ireland by George Smith. However, it has been recounted that he was not interested in emigrating at that time, so she came to Canada with her parents.

During their stay in Prescott, it is presumed that she again met her former fiance's brother James, who had emigrated the previous year, and was working in that military town at the time. The Almonte Gazette in one account indicates that James and Elizabeth were married in 1820 in Ogdensburg, N.Y., by the Anglican clergyman stationed there.

The hardships of pioneer life did not shorten her life, as evidenced by bearing a family of fourteen, and living to be about 100 years of age. When there was indication of failing health, a birthday party held for her was attended by about 120 relatives and friends.

The September 15th, 1899 issue of the Almonte Gazette, in reporting the unusual gathering, stated that "she has use of her faculties to a surprising degree, is able to read without glasses, can take a good morning walk; and only a month previously had hemmed a handkerchief by hand."

Her husband James Smith had died about eighteen years previously but at the time of the gathering, four of her eight sons were alive and six daughters, the eldest being 77. There were fifty-nine grandchildren and forty-three great grandchildren, the eldest being 26 years of age.

A portrait of about 90 of those present was taken by Benoit and Richardson of Carleton Place.

A very few days before her passing she was visited by her pastor, Reverend James Fairburn. Calling her "Grandma" as was customary, he asked her "Does it seem a long time to you from your childhood days in Ireland to the present?" She replied, "No, but when I look back over the long rough road I have travelled, it's a long journey."

Then she related her most dangerous and thrilling experience. Her husband James had walked to Brockville for supplies, leaving her alone with their two children, Ann and George. She heard a ewe bleating in distress and dashed out of the shanty to find a ewe being attacked by a wolf. With a stick she chased the wolf away a short distance. Grasping the ewe by the rear legs she struggled backwards toward the shanty, with the lamb (the only one they had) following its mother, and the wolf lurking only feet away. She pulled the dead ewe into a lean-to at the shanty. Meanwhile her two children were on a chair in the shanty trying to lift the door latch, which fortunately was quite high, quite oblivious to the danger their mother was facing just outside the shanty.

(As recounted by her youngest daughter, Catherine, who was also present during Rev. Fairburn's interview)

James Smith, born 1798 in County Carlow, Ireland, was a son of George Smith and his wife Sarah Marshall.

James learned cabinet making, and served seven years in the trade. As there was little work available in Ireland at the time, he emigrated to Canada in 1819 and after enduring eleven weary weeks at sea, landed in Montreal in May. During that voyage, James Bowland, baby son of friends, died and was buried at sea.

He walked from Montreal to Prescott where he obtained temporary work in a brewery at a few cents a day, with board, lodging and the customary three pints of beer a day.

A short time after the arrival in 1820 of Elizabeth Tennant, with whom he was acquainted in Ireland, they were married in Ogdensburg, N.Y.. They moved from Prescott to the 2nd Line of Ramsay Township, the farm now occupied by Arthur Yuill.

Subsequently they effected a mutual exchange of their lot with a Mr. Gray, whose parents lived on adjoining property in Ramsay, and the lot Mr. Gray occupied on the 10th Line of Lanark, a short distance from the original Tennant settlement. The latter property included the farm later owned by Alfred Ireton.

They lived at first in a log house on that property, and later built a frame house, probably in the late 1850's, a short distance to the east which remained intact until recent years when it was removed.

In his younger days, James and Edward Geddes (whom he had known in Ireland) erected a number of buildings in Bellany's Mills (Clayton). After Geddes' death, he continued construction with James Dickson. Geddes and Dickson were buried in the Bowland Cemetery - named after the Bowlands referred to above, who settled near Clayton.

Because of his cabinet making trade, James was called upon to make coffins for deceased neighbours. Frequently the finishing had to be done at night, and he often enlisted the aid of his youngest daughter Kitty to hold a light for him, hand him nails, etc., as he worked. Invariably he needed something from the house, and she was despatched to get it. As she ran through the orchard in the dark, her young mind conjured up ghostly imaginings, which in later years she claimed had caused her hair to become gray prematurely. James continued his carpentry trade until he was an old man.

James Smith owned the first coal-oil lamp in the community, and the first factory-made wagon driven over the Perth Road. In the early days of their settlement, supplies had to be carried from Brockville, and later from Perth or Lanark, over blazed trails through the woods.


The pioneer spirit prevailed and he led quite a successful life. James Smith is recorded as being about six feet four inches tall, a quiet retiring man, greatly attached to his home and family. He died in May 1882, and his body was interred in the nearby Tennant Cemetery.

Robert Watchorn (1844-1917) was born on Lot 19, Concession 12, Lanark Township, close to Floating Bridge. He was a son of Henry Watchorn, born 1821 in County Carlow, and his wife Nancy Taylor of County Armagh. Henry emigrated to Canada in 1830 with his parents, Robert Watchorn and Mary Halpenny, of County Wicklow. A short time after their arrival, Mary (Halpenny) Watchorn became ill and died in Montreal. Their youngest child, Thomas was 5 months old. Robert Watchorn knew the Tennants in Ireland, and when he suffered this great loss in his wife's death so soon after coming to Canada, he was immediately befriended by the three eldest of Thomas Tennant's sons, who opened their homes to his young sons. Henry was raised by Richard Tennant; Thomas by John Tennant and William Watchorn by Thomas Tennant.


William Watchorn in later years stated that his benefactor was the finest man he ever knew. William was supplied with shoes, suits, etc., just the same as Thomas' own sons. Yes, equality of treatment, it is said, even extended to a trip to the woodshed, if necessary! Similarly, Henry Watchorn thought a great deal of Richard and respected him highly.







Robert Tennant and Frances Richards were married November 1st, 1830. Frances and Mary Anne Richards (who married Robert's older brother Thomas) were daughters of Henry Richards. Robert and Frances lived on a farm on the 12th Line of Lanark Township. which he had bought from the Crown. Later they purchased the adjoining 100 acres, bounded by the 11th Line. Their original home was replaced by a stone house. Their youngest son Wesley was just old enough to carry his high-chair from the old house to the new one. A double row of cedar trees lined their lane, and has been a landmark throughout the years. Their eldest son Thomas R. Tennant farmed near Stittsville, on the farm later occupied by his daughter Emma. Their grandson Robert Edward Tennant moved to British Columbia where his descendants still reside.

The gold rush lured Robert, his cousin Elijah, and James Coulter of Clayton to British Columbia via the Panama Canal. Robert mined in the Fraser, Peace and Cariboo areas, his companions returning home after enduring one year of the hardships encountered. For several years Robert owned and operated an oil refining plant at Skidgate on the Queen Charlotte Islands. Later he moved to Victoria and engaged in real estate business.

Edward Tennant lived about one mile west of his father's farm, on a farm bounded on the west by Taylor's Lake, and on the east by his brother John's farm. His home was the site of Lloyd Post Office prior to rural mail delivery. Edward retired to a comfortable residence in Carleton Place.



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The Almonte Gazette of December 29, 1893, recalls the equipment provided for settlers: spade, adze, felling axe, brush hook, bill hook, reaping hook, pitchfork, pick-axe, 2 hoes, 9 harrow teeth, hammer, plane, chisel, auger, handsaw, 2 gimlets, 2 files, 1 pair of hinges, door lock and key, 9 panes of glass, 1 lb. of putty, 14 lbs. of nails, camp kettle, frying pan, one blanket for each man or woman, and one for every two children. To groups of settlers were issued a pit saw, crosscut saw, grindstone, crowbar and a sledge hammer.

In Montreal in 1831, butter cost $8\frac{1}{2}$ d. per pound. Prices in the settlement area in 1841 were represented by: potatoes, 20¢ a bushel; a quarter of veal or pork was 5¢ per pound; maple sugar, 10¢; oatmeal, 2.50 per cwt; a pair of plaid check trousers \$2.00; and a pair of "fine" shoes were priced at \$1.90.

The shilling was worth 20¢, and the Pound was valued at four dollars (Halifax currency). Various coins were made legal tender in Upper Canada, including the Spanish Dollar; Pistole, Crown and Louis d'Or of France, and the United States Eagle. Decimal currency was first recognized in Canada in 1853 with the Canadian dollar equal in gold to the U.S. dollar. Decimal currency was legally adopted in 1856.

Fuller's Directory, 1866-67 listed Thomas Watchorn as a partmer in the firm of Cannon and Watchorn, manufacturers of woollen goods, in Almonte.

The Bathurst Courier, issue of Sept. 28, 1838, announced that letters addressed to George Smith and William Smith remained unclaimed in the Perth Post Office, since Sept. 5th. Also in the Bathurst Courier - NOTICE -

"All persons are hereby forbid purchasing or making any bargain for the front half of Lot No. 4 in the 6th Concession of Lanark, as the Subscriber holds a bond for a deed from the original Locatee, Mrs. McFee, to the amount of £200, and the public are requested to be on their guard, as it is understood that the said Mrs. McFee is endeavouring to re-sell the said Lot."

The Perth Military Settlement Register, 1816-1822, lists the names of James Tennant, and a William Tennant, who had arrived from Scotland on 13 Aug. 1817 on the ship BROTHERS. They located on E[±] and W[±] of Lot 21, Con. 2, Yonge Township, Leeds County, probably ancestors of the Tennants near Lansdowne, Ontario.

The name Tennant also appears among the early settlers in the Milverton area, near Stratford in Western Ontario.

Late 19th Century - Clayton Fair, held in November was an event that everyone attended. Cattle and horses were sold or traded. Hucksters were plentiful with everything from razors and watches to linament and elixirs. The Hotel stood nearby, and by evening the crowd became exhilarated and probably encouraged by imbibing, many longstanding grievances were settled.

The frequent use of the same Christian names in the different families led to widespread use of descriptive nicknames among the contemporaries, such as "Red Dick" and "Black Dick" in the case of two descendants of the Richard and Jane (Cardiff) Tennant. Similarily a son of Thomas and Mary Ann (Richards) Tennant was called "By Gollys" Dick to distinguish him from "Foundry Dick", a son of John and Jane (Kay) Tennant.

Several of the Tennants were notorious for their teasing, and practical joking. Recounting of humorous experiences and anecdotes also appears to be characteristic.

"By Gollys" Dick used to tell about a trip to town when he spied what appeared to be an acquaintance across the street. The object of his gaze likewise saw Dick, and changed course to meet and chat. As the distance between them lessened, they both realized they were mistaken in identity, and after shaking hands Dick remarked: "Sure, I thought it was you, and you thought it was me, and it was nayther of us!" Often Dick's tales were so plausible that only the twinkle in his eyes revealed the fictitiousness of his yarns.

A commendable characteristic of the family as a whole has been the legal adoption of orphaned children, or the "raising" of one or more children of a close relative.

Many of the Tennants planted extensive orchards and rows of maple, lombardy poplars or cedar trees along their lanes, or road frontage, which still exist, identifying land once occupied by them.

Although they settled on the land as emigrants, and many have continued in some phase of agriculture, mixed farming, cattle raising, homesteading on the prairies or specializing in walnut groves. etc., their descendants have been engaged in a great variety of businesses and professions. These lines of work include general merchants; lumbering, including retailing, carpentry and cabinet making; woollen manufacturing; various phases of railroading; mechanics; insurance and real estate; cheese and butter plants; civil service in different levels, including senior administrative posts; the clergy; teaching in primary, secondary and college levels; college registrar; physicians and nurses; public health and scientific research; morticians; millinery and dressmaking; music, etc. One family was noted for a"cancer cure". Many have been quite public minded, serving on school boards, councils, and participating in other phases of community life. Several had military service in the World Wars of 1914-18 and 1939-45, and some were killed in action. Hobbies too play an important role, and range from gardening to stamp collecting, oil paintings and ceramics.

"Save the meal from the mouth of the bag" an admoniton frequently voiced by the pioneers, cautioned against indiscriminate use and wastage of items that were expensive or not readily available.

Mention was made earlier of the St. Lawrence Seaway development. In conjunction with it, the Upper Canada Village located near Cornwall, contains a number of buildings, restored and furnished to portray to our generation a glimpse of pioneer days. One is the log house of the McIlraith family, built in 1820 on the 3rd Concession of Lanark Township.

Freeman's book "Ireland" includes a map and details of the Dioceses, Church of Ireland (Anglican). In south eastern Ireland there originally were three Dioceses - Leighlin, Ferns and Ossory, with cathedrals at Leighlin (County Carlow), Ferns (County Wexford) and Kilkenny, respectively. Leighlin Diocese was united to Ferns in 1597, and this combined Diocese was united to Ossory in 1835. Acting on this information, I wrote to the Very Reverend Gart, Dean, at St. Canice's, Kilkenny. He is familiar with Aghade, and forwarded my request for information to the Rector, Rev. Canon Studdert. In due course I received a reply from him, with many extracts from the Church Registers, pertaining to some of our ancestors. Through Canon Studdert's generosity in the time consuming search of the records, he was able to supply information invaluable to us, in definitely identifying the parish to which Thomas and Mary Ann Tennant belonged.

The latter confirms information I have had for many years that a son Thomas had died at the age of eighteen (and two other sons also died in their youth) prior to the emigration of the family in 1820. AGHADE - About three miles south of Tullow. The name represents "Ath Thadhad" - the ford over the Slaney River which gave its name to the principal church of St. Iserninus (d.468) a disciple of St. Patrick. The countryside is very attractive.

TULLOW - (County Carlow) - a pleasant small market town in an attractive countryside, on the Slaney River. The Butlers built a castle there in the Middle Ages to command the river crossing.

GOREY - (County Wexford) - was prominent in the 1798 insurrection

County Wexford originated as a Norse trading settlement during the 9th and early 10th Century.

Wicklow (town) derived its name from the Norse trading settlement (Vikingalo).

BIBLIOGRAPHY

Public libraries contain many books on life in Ireland prior to 1800 and subsequently, as well as books on Canadian history during the same period.

With reference to pioneering, the following are suggested:

"Roughing it in the Bush" by Susanna Moodie (McClelland and Stewart - Toronto)

The Moodies came to the Cobourg District in 1832 and later moved to Lakefield (near Peterborough, Ontario). It is a semidiary giving an accurate picture of pioneering in 1832-1839.

"Authentic Letters from Upper Canada" by Rev. Thomas Radcliff (MacMillan - Toronto)

This is a particularly interesting book, full of details of pioneer life in 1827-1832, by reproduction of letters telling of the trip from Montreal to York (Toronto) and London (Ontario) and experiences in land settlement.

> "Early Days in Upper Canada" - The Letters of John Langton (MacMillan - Toronto)

"Upper Canada Sketches" by Thomas Conant (Wm. Briggs -Toronto) (Published 1898)

"Pioneer Settlements" by E.C. Guillet (Ontario Publishing Company, Toronto)(1947)(Many drawings and sketches of Upper Canada settlements)

"Pioneer Sketches in the District of Bathurst" as the area including the Tennant Settlement was known - by Senator A. Hayden. This was a limited printing, and copies are difficult to find.

"Kinsmen" by Percival J. Cooney

This book recounts in interesting fashinn the events of clan life in the Laird of McNab's settlement near Arnprior, Ontario about 25 miles distant.

"Canada - The Foundations of its Future" by Stephen Leacock a private edition printed in Montreal by the House of Seagram, and illustrated by Canadian artists.

Wesley and Marcie Tennent spent many hours of concentrated searching in the extensive Library of Congress, Washington, D.C., endeavouring to find some lead to the relationship with the Butler Family. They provided me with an extensive list of references, but so far I have not been able to authenticate this connection. Their list. includes the following titles of more general nature: "The United States and Canada in 1832-33-34" by C.D. Arfwedson (Richard Bentley, London, England, 1834)

"The Great Hunger" by Cecil Woodham-Smith

(Harper and Row, New York, 1962) A story of the famine of the 1840's in which countless Irish peasants perished, caused thousands to emigrate, and their influence in the New World.

"County Carlow History" by Michael O'Flanagan (1876)

"Carlow in '98" by William Farrell

"The Cromwellian Settlement of Ireland" by John P. Prendergast ((1808-1893),

Contains the names and subscriptions of the adventurers for lands in Ireland, 1649-1660.

"Shell Guide to Ireland" by Lord Killanin and Michael Duigan (1962) (Rainbird, McLean, Ltd., London, A wealth of historical data and information for tourists is given in concise but explicit form, with many pictures and illustrations.

Much historical data can be found in commemorative pamphlets such as "The Lanark County Federation of Agriculture 1949-50" and "The Story of Lanark, 1862-1962". One of you very thoughtfully provided me with an interesting pamphlet "Paths of History in Perth and Huron (counties in Western Ontario) as published in 1963 by the British Mortgage and Trust Company, Stratford. The authors have included many reproductions and cuts along with a record of the origin and development of the communities in that area.

"The History and Antiquities of the County Carlow" by John Ryan, published in Dublin, 1833, gives the following description of Aghade at that time: "The church of Aghade stands at the distance of about 4 miles south of Tullow, and adjoining the road leading to Newtown-Barry. It is prettily situated on gently elevated ground, in the midst of a highly cultivated district. A rivulet running close by the church-yard adds to the beauty of this tranquil scene. The church is a modern structure of plain architecture, and of the usual oblong shape, with square belfry and spire."
