Dear Dr. Douglas,

I hope I may add a more personal note to my official letter.

Mrs. Russell was so very fond of you, and whenever your name was mentioned she told me how much she admired you.

A few weeks after her death I called on Mary, her faithful house-keeper, who has been ill ever since. She suffers from heart-disease, and although the doctor had tried to warn her, it was a terrible shock when she found Mrs. Russell dead. Mary told me that Bertrand Russell had promised to come and see Mrs. Russell after Stockholm, where he received the Nobel Prize, but though he wrote and told her all about it he did not call on her; and Mary felt that his visits might have stopped altogether, and thought Mrs. Russell could not have borne this, and that it was perhaps fortunate that she died before this happened. I was deeply impressed, and think it may be quite true.

I am so glad to know that the Cezanne reproduction pleases you; I had hoped it would, it has the qualities which I associate with you; clarity, serenity, simplicity (in the sense of absence of frills and fussiness).

You may be interested to know that, in February, I applied for the post of Relief and Advisory Secretary offered by the I.S.S. in London. Both Miss Bond and Professor Cullis consented to act as referees, and they thought that I was the right person for this kind of work, but, alas, a young woman who could have been my daughter got it. I must admit, however, that she seems extremely suitable, having much more experience than I have in raising money for relief funds. Still, I was terribly disappointed our relief work has come to an end, or very nearly so, and this was what I was most interested in, and best qualified to cope with. I long to get back to case-work and interviewing, but my age - 54-and very likely my Austrian origin are against me.
