Dear *Douglas*,

As you will be aware, the expenditure of the Royal Astronomical Society has considerably exceeded its income for the past few years. The deficits have been due to heavy increases in costs and a further rise is expected in the coming year. In 1955 the deficit reached £843, and at the Annual Meeting on February 10 last it was resolved to increase the annual contribution from three to four guineas and to make a corresponding increase in composition fees. In the hope of improving the financial situation still further, the Council has decided to issue an appeal for donations to those Fellows who in past years have compounded on terms which are favourable by comparison with the present rates.

In inviting you as a compounder to make a donation to the Society's funds, may I draw your attention to the seven-year covenant as a means of increasing the value of any donation you may feel able to make to the Society? Sums of money paid annually to the Society under a covenant covering a period of at least seven years are treated for tax purposes not as income of the person making the covenant but as income of the Society. Since the Society is not liable to income tax, whereas in general the donor is, the Inland Revenue authorities will refund to the Society any income tax already paid by the donor in respect of the sums involved. In this way a donation of (say) £7 paid not as a lump sum, but in seven annual instalments under a deed of covenant, by a Fellow liable to income tax at the full rate of 8s. 6d. in the £, is worth to the Society the sum of £12 3s. 6d., that is, the £7 donation from the Fellow plus £5 3s. 6d. income tax recovered from the Inland Revenue authorities.

If you are willing to assist the Society by a donation, you are asked to sign and return to the Assistant Secretary the enclosed form of covenant, completing it for one-seventh of the total sum you are prepared to contribute. This does no more than bind you to make your donation in seven equal annual instalments. Subsequently you will be asked, when you actually pay the instalment each year, to complete and return a tax deduction certificate setting out the amount of tax paid. Should this be less than the full amount at the standard rate, the Society will be glad to refund to you any resulting increase in your tax liability. There are no other formalities. If you will do this, you can, with very little trouble to yourself, respond to the Council's appeal in a way which may almost double the value of your donation to the Society.

Have seen 2 amateur productions of Restoration Comedies lately & have decided that was quite enough!! Had to be so terribly well done. One at Tynbee Hall & the other at the Institute of Educ. Also went to see Richard III - Quite a terrible movie - rather gruesome to say the least - do try to see news reel of Queen's Visit to Africa such amazing festivities by natives.

Did you know that I have been asked to be one of Ruth Henrietta Davenport's Godmothers? My first godchild. I am quite thrilled! But very alarmed when I read the Christening Service and all the responsibilities of the godparents!
