





Expect you are right about trip to sand islands near of Florida - but if you change your mind let me know - maybe a trip near Doha? Don't feel you have to do anything you don't want to!



Dear Everyone,

5 April 82.

It's April already! Spring. Easter. Rebukh.
What does it all mean. Awareness of now?

Spring here is very subtle - suddenly you notice the day are a little warmer, a blossom appears on the peach tree in the patio, new birds, longer day & less twilight as the sun moves across the equator & heads this way. It will cross overhead ^{the} in May after before it starts back again at end of June & then is overhead again in July.

It's also the rainy season. Enormous white & black cumulus appear high above the edge of the escarpment & by evening drop their load of moisture - much appreciated -

Except for the huge rain we had at end of Feb: Absolutely poured for 24 hrs - Resultly in years floods up here over the roads - all the deep ditches overflowing, bridges creased. It was nothing compared to what happened down the wadi. You can conceive all this water hurtling down over 7000ft to the Red Sea. Apparently they washed houses in the wadi & people & animals were washed away by the huge torrent - sometimes 50' wall of water in what is usually a dry valley.

Last week we went down to see the devastation. Incredible! Bridges that crossed the valley were swept away & the huge concrete sections carried for many meters down the river & the very good road - gone for nutes.

+ no animals or life around. Incredible years of work destroyed in less than 12 hrs. And practically nothing about it in any



paper. No journalist - allowed to write up the personal stories of those it must have looked like & what then comes or escapes - one can only guess.

They closed the road for 3 weeks & did amazing rebuilding of a highway after - Up & down - but have to go through water in places & the trip to the sea is longer -

Red Sea is warming up again & it will soon be too hot to go there at all.

We now have two hospitals to look after - though the out patient Dept in the new hospital does not open until June. Incredible though how it all works here. The Company did not get the contract until November or December - so had no chance to arrange new housing. Then the recruiters had to bring in nurses & doctors - nowhere to live! Then the Military decided the hospital would be all men instead of women & children & so all the section set aside for babies in incubators & isolettes - small vehicles - had to be changed. And the isolettes etc cannot be used in the old hospital because of difference in voltage - The hospitals are about 6 miles apart - so busing also a major problem! Ho hum!

I have now been here 18 mos $\frac{3}{4}$ of my required time. We will soon be asked to sign a new contract for a year - which I will do - with the understanding that I can leave on a months notice. So May we stay all the 3rd year. Will have to see how it goes. There is still also to see in Saudi Arabia & I havn't done half!

Next month get sent to the Saudi Cupace in Dammam - over on the ~~west~~ Arabian Gulf - Should be fascinating - in the oil producing area. I am lucky to be going - with 7 others.

Had a weekend in Riyadh, the capital - Seeing old friends. Stayed in the Whittaker Villa where they dine & house you for nothing & its all very grand. They even have a Video here & I saw Lawrence of Arabia part I - for the first time! Went to the Souq & looked at Carpet, - lovely old part of the city - also saw the old Ibn Saud's Burial Castle in Diriyah - incredible contrast to the now

Modern city. Strange things & contrasts here too. A huge tower with revolving restaurant had to be closed because could look down into Princesses garden from there! Also high rise apts built without elevators! so no one living in them. Also a White House - exact duplicate - but then you've heard a lot of this before - And in the middle of all "Chop Chop" square where they do the beheadings & cut off hands: in front of the main mosque. And so it goes Mid East & West meeting & somehow not getting the best of each other - except probably at the higher levels there is a sharing of the best of each - hopefully.

In the meantime the work is easy, the climate good, friends friendly & holidays & salary good - So I'm hiding my time here a while longer doing things I hasn't done before.

My colleagues in Jackson's Pt. will laugh when they hear that I have been made the president of the Medical Records Committee in the hospital! So surprised when they asked me - that I said yes! (Others with gather that records were never a very strong point!) Since I've been here though when 30 others might be treating the same patient - things improve!

Had a super ski holiday in Norway - from Country Met a great group of Canadians - Oslo (planned) & we went off into the mountains & plateau. Snow & weather marvellous, suddenly realized how much I had missed the snow. We sometimes skied 30 kms/day: Nothing compared to those who took part in the Biathlon race of 55 Kms -


the oldest of whom :: kid 60's skied the whole 55 Km!
Marvellous! A great deal of it was uphill too! We skied from
our hotel to other hotels for lunch - enormous smorgasbord
of every sort of fish, meat, dessert, salad! The snow was
perfect (mid March) about 6-10 feet of it! Had to believe it
will ever melt away for the summer! And the weather
warm. You can ski for miles & miles & miles on the
trails thru Norway - as so much is virtually unpopulated
- a rather only cottage area - & not nearly so cold as
home! Oslo was lovely too - though probably not at its
best as this season - ad we saw the Viking ships dug up
in the 8th C. A.D. - remarkably beautiful - they had been used
for burial & filled with all the possessions of the
dead plus his dog & servant. Shadows of the Pyramids

Getting to Norway had some problems! I ~~left~~^{left here} a few days
before meeting friends in Norway, & was to do a bit of down hill
skiing in Sunnaland first - travelled Akka-Teddal & Amman
(Jordan) - Geneva - Zurich. In Zurich - no bag! Suit case &
all ski cloths left in Amman! So walked a lot instead.
There was only snow on the highest mts anyway. Zurich
a wonderful city with beautiful Schonbrunn on river & lake &
lovely bridges & easy transit. But expensive!

Had another lovely weekend at the sea - mostly because some locum doctors wanted to go down - I had thought it might be too hot now - but it was glorious. Joined






up with a carload of 7 children & 1 adult & a surgeon &



Not easy to write during Ramadan - mails are bad; we work morning & evening (& bed & snooze in the hot afternoons!) & one tends to become a bit disoriented (not lazy - leaves as!). All the poor muslims gradually get more & more tired as the month wears on & the fast becomes a drag & the evening meal less & less digestable!

Now it's over & so is the 4 day of Eid al Fitr - the feast. On the last day of Ramadan the down town souq is alive with festivities (as much as anything is alive in SA, with all the calls to prayer, lack of dancing & singing & pageant)

Some of the scenes in the souq were quite moving - Bedu families - enormous numbers, sitting in groups in the ground - in areas lit by one lamp only, selling grain to people who could afford it & who would then give it away. Children lay with their heads on the grain sacks & the faint left gave an atmosphere of ancient Arabia - back in the 14th C.

Beyond these groups were stalls selling modern plastic trinkets & bright clothing - quite a contrast.

Last night one of our SP's had a party for some girls - a
fence do with bar b q & fabulous deserts & then
games & video of the Royal Wedding! Quite fun.

Tonight another party by the pool for the acting Chief of
Professional Services who gets sent home (the everyone else
around her!)

Still really enjoying weekends camping &
- usually on escarpment now - as the R. Sea
is so hot (100°) & the sand blows & the road is
deteriorating. Last week our car was broken into
& all that was taken was a blouse of mine & a
coat of the drivers; my money left. We are
pretty certain it was some Bedouin sheepherders -
who tend to be quite vicious & very injurious
about Western clothing & makeup etc -

& probably a sign they are becoming emancipated!
The women have far more vitality ~~than~~ &
aggression than we would ever believe
when seeing them hidden under a veil!

Lucky they didn't drive off in the car! - So then
a big expedition to the Souq to find another window for a
small truck - all the shacks in building where they
work on car parts -

So much courage and enterprise to so little purpose, and it such a cost
in human lives and expense a military hardware. But the real irony is that
we are still further from an acceptable solution to the Falkland Islands problem.
I wonder old George would have thought about the landings on South Georgia?
he has his painting of a wavy woodland, don't suppose from memory.

I have a h.g. write from Athens - They have been staying in a friend's farmhouse
in Southern Anatolia (Karaman) after visiting h.g.'s mother, but expect spending the
next 2 months in Crete where a friend has built himself a house in a remote
and lonely spot. They will help with the orange picking and then head back to
pt Nepal and then beyond India. Evidently they have established a
trading arrangement in Athens which welcomes the journey and other hand-
crafts they are able to bring back from India and which seems to be quite profitable.
Orión is thriving and enjoys travelling - for the moment anyway. Best regards to all





Have you ever heard the Tibetan incanting bells that hum when you rub them with a stick around the edge? I got 2 when in Darjeeling & they are lovely - also a bowl that does the same thing.

India was not as full of staring people as I thought it might be - or so it appears. It's so hard to tell when travelling around like we did. We did meet up with an American woman who travelled around buying for a shop in California - things that would otherwise have no market - think I told you - & she knows the Tibetan refugees well - the ones you also visited in Darjeeling. Did you see the Everest Center there too? - in Darjeeling I mean. They showed a great ~~photo~~ movie of the Indian (successful) expedition.

Thank goodness the Sikhs (esp.)

Bear Allie:

It's usually travel that takes "top billing" in our annual letter but this year Fred's trip to China has to compete with the news that he finally finished his book and is now reading page-proofs. It'll be off the press after Christmas and we'll make sure you are advised! But in case you can't wait to know what it's about, here is the title: "This is the Prophet Jesus... An evolutionary Approach to his Teaching". And a reminder (for explanation) that what Jesus taught and what kind of person he was, has been a continuing interest of Fred's since his student days in the twenties.

In September, Margaret's doctor advised that China was too far from home for her. However, she persuaded Fred to go anyway on this special itinerary which he had planned and requested two years ago. Besides the McGill group of 33 included several old friends as well as sister Helen. Under Stanley Frost's leadership we left Montreal early on Oct. 2nd and flew via Toronto and San Francisco to Hong Kong in 26 hours. A brief stop there for recovery and then by train to Canton and by plane to Peking.

The two full days in Peking included a visit to the Canadian Embassy for a useful briefing, as well as the now familiar but always interesting sights of the Forbidden City, Temple of Heaven, Summer Palace, Great Wall, Ming Tombs and a Peking Duck dinner! This time I climbed the Great Wall to the left as one approaches: it is steeper and the top higher than that on the right and there is a wonderful view. The trees on the hills were in full autumn red.

Xian was spectacular. (And we had a guide to match: Miss Wang Hai had everything!) At Emperor Qin's mausoleum they have uncovered part of the estimated 6,000 terracotta army of foot soldiers, horses and chariots - life-sized and natural looking - which have guarded his treasure for more than 2,000 years. To look down on row after row of these figures - each face different - was pretty impressive.

Xian was the capital of China for more than 1,000 years and during the Han dynasty was the China-end of "the Silk Road" to Europe. Such a long history means there are many cultural relics such as the two Wild Goose Pagodas (Buddhist temples), the Bell Tower with the library of ancient calligraphy, a Neolithic village and a Chinese mosque. In addition we visited a museum, a cloisonné factory and went to an evening dance performance which had no discoverable social significance!

Fog in Chungking kept us in Xian an extra day which was all very well except that having checked out of our hotel we could not get back in: with so many tourists all beds in places like Xian are booked well in advance. However beds were found in a country inn which we went to by bus.

As in 1980 Jiang Ze Jia, the Chairman of the Electrical Engineering Dept. at Chungking University, met us at the airport. He and his wife Jia Qi laid on a 15 course banquet for Helen, me, Bob and Lois Chipman (University of Toledo but at McGill in 1947-48 When Jiang was a student there. Bob was Jiang's research supervisor). Two Chinese who had been scholars at McGill recently were there also as was Jiang's son, his wife and their new baby. A very good party.

When the plane for Chengdu came it was small and could take only 25 of us but it returned for the other 8 before long. On previous visits travel was largely by train. Now tourists go by plane but the "four modernizations" program is still too new to meet the needs of an ever expanding tourist industry. But they'll make it - and soon! Tourists are once again treated as guests, given small gifts and shown many courtesies.

The name Chengdu, capital of Szechuan Province, will be familiar because

this is where the West China Christian Missions were located and generations of missionaries from many Protestant sects and a variety of countries, but especially from Canada and the United States, went there during the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

The city foundations, so to speak, date back to about 400 B.C. Chengdu has long been famous for the quality of the brocade woven there. Just how long is indicated by the fact that in AD 25, a government official was appointed to control the brocade industry. For all that, the industry survived and Chengdu brocade is still famous and with the arrival of each tourist group even better known for we were taken to the mill where the cloth is made and each of us presented with a square of brocade - large enough to cover a bridge table.

The medical school of Szechuan University was just up the street from our hotel and there I contacted Professor Wu Fu Ling who teaches English to the medical students. He came to my hotel room and we spent a couple of hours together; his attitude toward the "new look" is very favorable. I learned of Wu from Earl Willmott (now in B.C.) who was Fu Ling's teacher years ago.

Statues and photos of Mao Ze Dong have mostly disappeared but near the Friendship store in Chengdu is a huge statue of Mao. There is a large billboard there too carrying a family-planning poster which shows a "just married" couple being counselled by a beautiful nurse in uniform - one child is encouraged; a second is tolerated but only just; and for a third there are penalties. With 1,000,000,000 bodies already there and the amount of land suitable for food production fixed, it seems like a sensible policy.

Kunming, capital of Yunan Province has an elevation of 6000 feet which results in a spring-like-climate the year round even though it is close to the tropics. Flowers are always blooming and flowering trees abound. Kunming was the China end of the Burma Road of world war II where General Stillwell worked his way into China only to find that his assistance against the Japanese was not welcomed by Chiang Kai Shek who was not fighting 'the Japs' but 'the commies'. Since liberation it has become a large industrialized city with a population of 1.2 million. Half of the 50 or so minority groups in China live in Yunan province and add color and variety to the city. When we went to the Stone Forest - a karst limestone formation of tall jagged stone columns - a group of Sani came from their nearby village to entertain us with songs and dances, dressed in their national costumes of blue and pink.

Our last stop was Guilin - which every tourist hopes to find on his/her itinerary. The karst rock formation here resulted in straight up-and-down mountains with the land between frequently covered with groves of bamboo. We went out from Guilin about 25 miles by bus, to take a four hour boat trip down the river Li. The scenery is beautiful, the river clean and clear; along the banks are farms, villages people fishing, washing clothes; and on the river small boats- some with motors, some with junk-type sails carrying who knows what. It was a pleasant and colorful trip - a good ending to the tour.

From Guilin to Canton to Hong Kong by train, then Honolulu on a Singapore plane. Two rainy days there, a flight to Los Angeles, then Air Canada to Toronto and Montreal on October 29, ending a month of travel.

There were some casualties - one fall by Helen which will restrict her mobility a couple of weeks more; colds shared by many; but I think all of us felt the tour very worthwhile. For me this fourth trip presented new and different views of a 5000 year old culture and a people revitalized, moving forward into a new era - co-operating and sharing. Some among the billion Chinese people no doubt harbor memories of the old ways and scheme for their return. But I keep remembering the children's faces and the peasants' expressed gut-feeling that the new way is better.

Dear Allie Douglas:

Since from October 29th I have been flat on my back with a small fracture, or limping around the apartment on a cane, I have gone through several books but haven't done any writing. However, the situation is improving and, if our Indian summer holds, I may get out on my own by Christmas.

Last year, when I left your colorful greetings and letter^s in a basket in my living room, I had every intention of answering them promptly. I apologize; the year went back like lightning. July I spent in England, glad to get away from strikes at home. Alas, London's Underground was out, aided by sympathetic bus drivers. After four wasted days, the Underground opened but British Rail closed down. At Victoria Coach Station, after waiting in line two hours, I got a coach ticket to Bath. After ten lovely days there I repeated the wait and got tickets to Salisbury, Sherborne, Longleat, and back to London.

Here a friend took me to a Southwark Cathedral party on the 27th floor of Guy's Hospital, drove us up through eastern England. We saw Midsummer Night's dream at the new Barbican Theatre. I explored London Museum again, and the new Covent Garden. I was driven to Gatwick Airport. The weather had been beautiful, the flowers never more exuberant, and I had had some interesting interviews.

On October 2nd, Fred and I went with a fine McGill group for 21 days in China, flying via Toronto, San Francisco and Pan Am to Hong Kong via Okinawa to refuel -- 26 hours in all! From Canton we flew to Peking, always fascinating, then to Xian where the terracotta horsemen (no two alike) stand on parade. Xian, the former capital of China, was the beginning of the Silk Road. It offers many interesting exhibits, e.g. a museum of artefacts used by people who lived 6000 years ago.

In Chungking we were again entertained by friends at the University and watched the traffic on the Yangtze River and its harbour. Chengdu lies on the fertile plain of Sichuan, a meticulously tended market gardens and emerald green paddies. Besides visiting temples, art galleries and evening entertainments, we drove to the Golden Horse Communism, and saw the 2000-year old Min River conservation system that controls floods and releases water into irrigation canals.

In Kun Ming, spring exists the year round for the average temperature is 65° F. This flowered city is the capital of Hunan Province where live half of China's 55 Minorities. The scenery on this 6,200 ft. high plateau is beautiful with red soil terraced with brilliant green crops. Fifty miles away lies the Stone Forest which must be seen to be believed; 3 million years ago, it laid at the bottom of the sea.

Guilin, our last stop, is surrounded by cone-shaped mountains. They line the Li River, a 50 mile green, winding stream banked by bamboo groves and farms ploughed by water buffalo. During the four-hour trip down it, we passed or were passed by junks, sampans, fishing dugouts and other pleasure craft. After one night in Canton's new luxury hotel, we returned via Hong Kong, Honolulu and Los Angeles. It was a magnificent ^{trip} with fine weather all the way and good company although we missed Margaret sorely. Of the return flight, the less said (by me) the better, although I managed a few Queen Elizabeth waves from my wheelchair to those who had to walk the interminable miles of airport corridors.

Best of Christmas wishes, and may 1983 bring some reason to the deranged minds of those world leaders who seem bent on bringing our world to an end. God bless us, everyone.

One of the nicest things that occurred to us during this year was the honor conferred on our sister Jessie, when she was chosen to go to Ottawa as one of the Canadian Achievers to dine with the Queen at the time of the official signing of the constitution. The presence of Prime Minister Trudeau was just one of the added rose petals strewn in her path.

This year was Saskatoon's 100th Birthday; it has been a year of celebration and festivity, bringing a lot of people home and bestowing many honors. Edith was one of the thirty people chosen by the Agriculture Committee as having "contributed significantly" to the life of farm people in the province. She was honored with dinner, speeches and gift.

In July both Edith and Winnie visited Eastern Canada and each stayed with Bill and Laura in Quebec. In addition, Winnie was in Kingston helping celebrate the 40th anniversary of the opening of the nylon plant there. Her former friend and partner Dorothy Catto died earlier this year but a great many friends were on hand to welcome Winnie, most of whom seem to have weathered well. When the plant was opened Winnie was doing employment for "Nylon" and many whom she hired are now retired, including D. L. Guthrie. Everybody has forgotten that the beginning wage for girls in the plant was 30 cents per hour.

Edith had a wonderful visit with Jeanne Rowles in Toronto, who drove her to the Shaw and to the Stratford Festivals. In Saskatoon our theatrical activity took the form of welcoming playwright Al Pittman and actor Clyde Rose from Newfoundland. Winnie took part in the reading to the Canadian English Teachers' Conference of Al Pittman's manuscript play "West Moon". When the boys got off the plane their urgent request was for breakfast one morning during their stay for their fellow Newfoundlanders. We did finally achieve this social function the morning of their departure (on the patio.)

This year is the fiftieth anniversary of Edith's graduation from the University of Saskatchewan and she was part of the committee to plan this event which went off to everyone's satisfaction. It was nice seeing such friends as the Van Cleaves and the Dalgleishes. Meantime Winnie was partaking of the 70th anniversary of the college of Engineering, including opening of their new building. It was a shame Dean Mackenzie could not travel from Ottawa to attend, he was often toasted. When Winnie was acting as the Dean's secretary he was consulting engineer for the Broadway Bridge. Then, too, times were hard and jobs were scarce. All construction labor for the bridge had to be requisitioned from the local relief offices; no machinery could be used for work that could be done by hand; laborers could be used for only one week at a time and a man with no children could not earn more than \$25.00 per month, while the maximum for a man with a large family was \$37.50. Things are not that bad now though we still do have to cope with unemployment. We have people cooperating and we seem to have more people with difference of opinion trying harder to listen to the other point of view. There seems always to be more than one point of view. We still have the arms race counterbalanced by ploughshares.

Century Saskatoon celebrations has a song and a saying, "For a hundred special reasons, we are proud to call you home". The Citizens Appreciation Committee chose 100 special people at the end of the year and among this group, the three sisters are included. A dinner is planned for December 10 with special Centennial medals for each person. It gives a nice warm feeling to be part of the special reasons and we mean to make this warm Christmas feeling keep on going past the end of Centennial year. We hope you, too, have had a good 1982 and that it will be followed in 1983 with a year full of joy and peace.
