


Have got ski plans underway - going to Austria in March & hopefully Patsy will join the group for here. Should be fun. Dear Lunsbeck - place called Igls.






How great that everyone seems to have such good jobs for the summer and can all stay in Toronto. When does Marie Clarie go to France - and Alex?



Nepal

Darling Anneke,

Here I am on a high ridge above the Kathmandu Valley, looking over to the great Himalayas! On a 5 day trek along the wedge of foothills that forms the Kathmandu Valley - How marvellous it is!

Am taking lots of pictures that will send to you to see. Cannot remember if you came to Nepal - but somehow think not?

Started off from Saudi on 29th Oct - (How time has flown) and attended some of the conference in Bangkok that is advertised on back of this paper. How often they referred to the Alma Mata conference that I attended thanks to you, before we met in Afghanistan - Terrifically full of tiny Thai peoples + I felt like Gulliver! When left there went North to Chiang Mai, by bus. — a northern city where the people that manufactures - or rather, hand make - all sorts of lovely silks, Thai dye cloth, cane wood etc. The bus tour included trips up to the "Elephant working" - very much put on for tourists - fun to see how they move the great legs + have a chain through the forest - wonderful Elephant boys - sitting just behind the ears + jiving with their feet. They then take the elephants down to the river to give them a bath - still sitting on them & sometimes all the elephants totally emerged except for tip of trunk!

Then they took us up to a hill village where some northern tribes have been relocated since being disrupted near the Laos border. Apparently they are a law unto themselves and grow poppies - probably for opium. Anyway they were selling a lot of lovely things but looked rather depressed & poor. We also visited various places where they do the crafts - layed on for tourists to buy - Then bus back to Bangkok - 11 hrs though the mtns & on to Nepal. - all the while met all sorts of great travellers - nice people - quite a number of Australians.

Katmandu is a fairly small city - with wonderful contrasts: the center teeming & full of all sorts of shops & stands & stalls & eager people - though not so pushy as India. And then... - Magnificent ancient totally other worldly - so hard to imagine how they have survived & what exactly they do convey to the faithful.

Decided a trek was ^{essential?} inevitable in Nepal! & found it very easy to get a guide ad 2 porters to walk around these hills for 5 days. A really nice Sherpa guide + two Nepalese porters & me! We meet all sorts of people on the way also hiking along - porters or Nepalese with heaps of children in the little hammocks (mostly holding out their hands for rupees!)

What incredible views - The great white peaks high in the distance. Then wooded & rocky foothills, then deep valleys with markedly amazingly terraced hill sides up & up & up - little steep narrow terraces. Some of the valley look quite prosperous & you can see that on the lower terraces they will grow nice (fallow at this time of year) ⁱⁿ then up millet alternating with wheat & vegetables, turnips or parsnips & some beans.

Many of the small high up villages & farms we pass are thatched & usually built of stones & mud. The better ones have tin roofs & glass windows - but that is rare. The women are such a contrast to the black Sindi ghosts! - They are jaily dressed in Sari type clothes & very raunchous & demanding - very hard working. They don't find the Westerner much to their liking though, by their expression & often laughter. Hard to get a friendly feeling from them - but then we must appear so rich.

There are huge numbers of volunteers working in Nepal and it's hard to know how they get on.

I will try & find out when get through this trekking & return to Kathmandu. Will be there 3 more days. & then off to Delhi for a short stay & maybe see the Taj by nearly full moon on 19th - then to Sindi by 21st. Back to work.

There is a marvellous sunset as I write this at half moon up above & big fire to keep us warm

It gets quite cold in the tent at night despite of sleeping bag + all the cloths I put on! Should have bought a hat. A lot of heat escapes through top of my head!

The carriers, porters here are incredible. Nepalese don't use animals at all to carry but their own backs. Everything seems to be carried in huge triangular baskets - even an old woman today I saw - so if I get a broken leg or something they can't carry me along like that!

The paths go everywhere. Some are very steep & very narrow + deeply cut into the hillside - others quite wide 'super highways' - (about 8' wide!) Occasionally the back is almost too narrow for me! I carry a small pack + they carry the tents, sleeping bags, food, pots + pans + teapot! What a life! Seeing the sun-set ^{high} on the high peaks - a pinky orange glow peak - really marvellous - at then in 12 hours rising behind them - glorious. How quickly it warms up - only to get cold again when the clouds come. Right now clouds cover most of the mountains but expect they'll be gone in the morning.



Women at McGill, The First Hundred Years

Dear Professor Douglas,

In 1984 McGill celebrates the 100th anniversary of the Admission of women to the University. Just a hundred years ago, some twenty-eight young women made history by becoming "regular" or "partial" students in the Faculty of Arts. Their achievement and the efforts of the thousands of women who have followed them will be acknowledged in a variety of events now being planned for the 1984-85 academic year by a special Centennial Committee.

As part of the Centennial programme, we are hoping to follow on from We Walked Very Warily: A History of Women at McGill with a book written by some women of McGill. We envisage a series of essays by perhaps twenty women who have been associated with the University as students, as professors or in other capacities. We do not expect these essays to be statistically representative of certain Faculties, disciplines or eras - rather, we would like to know more of the individual women who have contributed to the richness of the McGill milieu. Certainly we would like to have their assessment of their experience at McGill, but we would also like to know more about them personally, to understand what prompted them to undertake the careers they did, to learn their views of women's place in society. We do not expect them to have identical opinions on the latter, some may be feminists, some will not. There is no party line.


We acknowledge that we are, in part, copying from the University of Melbourne where one of the ways in which the centenary of the first woman graduate (1883) is being honoured is by the publication of The Half Open Door. The editors of that book of sixteen essays asked women connected with the University of Melbourne "to reflect on their lives, and attempt to relate for others the most significant formative influences on their lives". Like them, we want to know about the women of our University as writers, scientists, historians, educators and such, and we also want to know about their ideas and values. In a general way, we also want to try to understand what factors have precipitated women into academic life, what accounts for success, why do some women persevere and others not, why are there still relatively few women at the top of the professions. Like the editors of The Half Open Door, we feel a sense of responsibility for preserving for later

generations something of the lives and opinions of our contemporaries. Since letters and diaries have gone out of style and since few ordinary people record their lives in the modern media, it seems to us that the autobiographical essay is one way in which individual voices of this century will be heard in the next. For that is another of our ambitions. We want our publication to be one of the enduring outcomes of the Centennial Celebrations. We are happy to report that The Half Open Door has been met with much acclaim and find this very encouraging, justifying our expectations and leading us to believe that our efforts will be similarly successful. For our title we have borrowed a line from Lillian Hellman and plan to call our book "A Fair Shake".


The purpose of this letter is to invite you to participate in our project by contributing an essay on your own life. You may begin with your family and childhood or at any point along the way and deal with any aspect of your career that you care to share with others. We want to assure you that we have no set pattern for these essays. We expect them to be highly individual and you are free to say whatever you want. The only formal guidelines we offer is that your autobiographical essay should be about twenty typed, double-spaced pages and, since we are striving for publication in early autumn 1984, we would need to have your manuscript by August 15, 1983. We trust that it will be feasible for you to squeeze this into your summer schedule.

We do hope you will accept this invitation and would be pleased to answer any queries you may have. We would appreciate your response by April 6th, 1983.


Ibaragi (The Demon Ibaragi)


