Dear Dr Douglas

1985 so far has been a year of joy and sorrow. The happy part was that I was honoured to receive advice from our Governor-General that "it is proposed to submit your name to The Queen for the honour of Officer of the British Empire (OBE) in recognition of your services to New Zealand, on the occasion of the New Year". The public announcement was made in our media on 29 December and that started a flood of telegrams, personal and telephone calls and letters from all over New Zealand. Then on 29 May I attended the Investiture at Government House, Wellington, and at a simple ceremony, but very impressive, received the insignia of the Order with about 70 others who were recipients of various civil and military honours. In the evening of that day I invited a number of my old Wellington friends and working associates to a cocktail party at a friend's home to celebrate. These people had all contributed significantly to my achievements over the years. I was extremely glad that my brother and sister-in-law from here (Tauranga) were able to be with me and I have some lovely photographs taken by the official photographer, the Press and by my sister-in-law as lasting memories.

The sad news is that since our return from the Investiture in June my brother Allan's health has been gradually deteriorating. He has been suffering from the same blood cancer as my older brother died of about 7 years ago and has known since the diagnosis about five years ago, that there was no cure. He went straight into hospital for a blood transfusion the day after we got home and was in and out of hospital having treatment until we were told about the middle of August that there was nothing more the doctors could do for him and his prognosis was that he could live for only about two more months. As I write this his end is very close. He came home from hospital about 20 August and June, his wife, has been nursing him there. She has had wonderful support from the doctors, the local hospital, public health nurses and particularly her family. But it is a very traumatic time for all of us.

I am giving June whatever help she asks from me and unfortunately it has meant I have had to forego attending the International Congress of the International Federation of Business & Professional Women which is taking place in Auckland here this very week. I had registered to attend but did not feel I could go away from Tauranga at this time. There are about 1000 women there from over 50 countries and as I know from my attendance at a similar one in Buenos Aires, Argentina, in 1974, they are very exciting and stimulating meetings.

I am most thankful that my health this year has been very much better than last. Also my sister in England has recovered remarkably well from her two major cancer operations last year.

I wish you a very happy 1985 Christmastide and everything you yourself wish for in the New Year to come.



Canadian Pacific!

A transcontinental railway line was imperative for national development and communications, and to hold a restless British Columbia within Confederation. But the task was beset with the enormous difficulties of distance and terrain, and with financing problems. Completing the line is often described as the greatest railway feat in history!

The Last Spike

Line construction was proceeding east from Port Moody, on Burrard Inlet, B.C., and west from Fort William, and the plan was to meet in Eagle Pass, at a place called CRAIGELLAchie. The two ends of steel grew ever closer, finally meeting at the planned location 7th November, 1885, when the last spike, made not of gold but of the same iron as was used throughout, was driven by Donald A. Smith (Lord Strathcona). Also present were Sandford Fleming, William Van Horne, and other officials, and ordinary workmen. The act was completed in awed silence, and the simple ceremony concluded with a brief speech by Van Horne; then the conductor called "All aboard for the Pacific!" The transcontinental line had been completed to tidewater, and by December 1885, trains were running between Montreal and the Pacific. What a Christmas present for Canada!

"... on the 7th November last, at Craigellachie, B.C., after 53 months of arduous labour ... the last rail was laid ... On the same day, Her Majesty the Queen ... congratulated the people of Canada ... Within 3 or 4 weeks from this time, through freight and passenger trains will be running regularly between Montreal and the Pacific Ocean."



Dear Dr. Douglas,

I don't know whether you saw the death notice for Phebe Prowse which appeared in both Montreal's "The Gazette" and Toronto's "The Globe & Mail" on Feb. 7 & 8. I helped Phebe move up to Guelph from Montreal in Nov. 1983 and saw her as recently as Jan. 13 there. She was not well enough to be dressed that day but we had a short visit. It was a week or two after that she was taken by ambulance to the Guelph Hospital and she died from an ulcer haemorrhaging on Feb. 5. I went to the funeral home in Mtl. on Feb. 8 to express my condolences to her four nieces and Robert her nephew. Her nephew/and one niece, Phebe, live in Toronto and they had been with her as she died. Phebe looked as though she was just asleep in the coffin. The service ^{Feb. 9} in the chapel of St. Andrew's and St. Paul's Presbyterian Church (next to the Museum) was a very moving one - short though it was - as the minister recalled her life as teacher and librarian and the award to her by the Sir Geo. Williams Alumni in 1952 (she received her B.A. from Sir Geo.'s). The death notice showing her B.A. and B.L.S. did not mention the McGill diploma in 1924 for Physical Education which she must have received when she was only 20. The death ^{ntoice} said "in lieu of notice"

flowers donations to McGill University in memory of Rosalie McDonald McLea", which I thought very appropriate as McGill celebrates the graduation of the first class of women at McGill.

Phebe always looked forward to seeing you when you were in Montreal, so I thought I would send you a personal note about her.

Another person who was always glad when you were able to make a visit to Montreal is Charles Patton, of course. He is pretty frail now but does go out, and was in Italy, Spain and England in the autumn of 1983. I often talk to him on the phone.

Phebe is being buried in the General Protestant Cemetery at St. John's Newfoundland. Her brother still lives near Corner Brook in Nfld. where one of the married nieces lives with her husband. Her sister is still alive - in Victoria, B.C. - but her mind has gone. Phebe and I had a wonderful trip to Nfld. in 1967 when I met the brother, the niece, Roberta, still living in Cornerbrook and the niece, Patricia, who now lives in Winnipeg with her husband Gwenyth lives in Vancouver.

Hope you are enjoying being 90 years young!



Dear Aunt Allie and Alec,

Best greetings from Paris. I have now been here for 17 days and things are all going well. I'm quite surprised as to how much I feel at home and how normal things feel. I think that I will have no problems living here for three months. I'm quite alarmed as to how fast those three months will pass though.

It was so lovely to be back in Canada for the 4 days in September for Stephen's and Valerie's wedding. The ceremony and reception were a delight to attend. All in all, we welcomed a terrific new cousin into our family.

I was also very happy to come back for the 4 days and experience a bit of Canada's Autumn. Although the ~~cold~~ weather was not cool, the leaves had begun to turn. It is something that most Europeans will not have seen - the brilliant reds, oranges and yellows of the leaves. Here in France we have had an extremely warm Fall and only now are the mornings beginning to feel cool. So far I have been enjoying sunny days and have only used my rain coat once.

I am spending my first two months and a bit in Paris learning diatom taxonomy. I am doing my studies in a suburb of Paris which is fortunately not too far from Paul's apartment. That is, considering how large Paris is. I have one hour on the metro each way or else a half hour by bicycle. Needless to say I prefer to bicycle but ~~walk~~ that is quite a risk in Paris because of the drivers! However, I wear my helmet and amuse the French in so doing. They have never seen a helmet worn by a cyclist and laugh at me. Well, my safety is of more concern to me than my pride and so I wear it everyday to the lab. The lab is part of a National School where most students are destined to becoming teachers. However, research is one side that is encouraged, making it possible for causes such as mine to exist. I am working on a core from Lake Zurich in Switzerland. I hope to have enough time to finish but I think some intensive work may be called for!

In December I think that I will go to Finland for a week. The dates are not yet fixed and so I hope to finalize those arrangements soon. Once I know the dates, I hope to arrange a trip to Leningrad. Time is short though and so if it is not for this time, I will leave it for another time.

I have spent my weekdays at the lab, but my weekends are spent outside of the academic atmosphere. I have now passed three very enjoyable weekends. The first was spent in the

company of a fellow Queen's student, Mark Woodhouse, who was a student of Dolf Harmon. He now is off to Africa to do a post-doctorate. We explored parts of Paris we had never seen and then went back to places he had been a few years earlier. My second weekend was spent in Saumur chez les Jean Paul's. It was a beautiful weekend weather-wise and I was able to cycle one morning and attempt Eskimo-rolls on the Loire both days. Eskimo-rolls are the best moves one does in a kayak in order to right the boat once it is turned over. Some people have the knack and learn very quickly. I'm not very adept but progress is being made. This weekend I spent with Sylvianne Ashworth, the cousin of my mother who was in Washington for 6 months and who came to the Island this summer with her youngest daughter. We spent the day visiting two castles. The first was a private one which was hosting a gardening show. It was quite something to see all the great landowners in their tweeds examining plants and sometimes buying them to put them in their gardens. In the afternoon we went to Versailles, I had never been before and so I looked quite forward to it. I did not visit the interior because the Saturday afternoon crowds were not appealing. We instead rented a rowing boat and rowed up and down the big pool. It is about 1 1/2 km long and so I had enough to keep my arms busy for a while!

I have also gone into Paris after work in the lab to ~~not~~ attend two concerts. They were magnificent and I also enjoyed the atmosphere of the old churches. Once the winter sets in though, I'm sure they will be quite cold and damp. The first concert was for trumpet and organ and the second for flute and mandolin. Really fantastic! Although I end up going home late in the evening, it is well worth it.

I wonder how your concerts at Grant Hall and D. Auditorium are going. I hope that some good performers are coming to Kingston. I do not doubt it, because after 4 years of concert I was always very impressed by what we saw and heard.

Is the Island still open or has it been closed ~~shut~~ up for the season? I had many lovely weekends there this summer.

Our 1984 letter told of the good luck we had had in finding an unwanted ramp which we were able to acquire--as a gift--and have installed for us by our good neighbours, the Rawsons. Emboldened by this, we went ahead and installed a chair-glide. One step up from the entrance hall you sit in an armchair, press a button, and the chair moves up a "mountain-rack-rail", turns at the half-landing corner and arrives upstairs. A lever turns the chair to face the bedroom-floor landing and enables the passenger to step off easily. It cost the earth! but since we had spent next to nothing on the ramp, we took a deep breath--and bought it! It has been a godsend. We use it all the time. No longer does it matter if you leave something behind!

Elizabeth's fall in April 1984, resulting in a dislocated hip, has plagued her ever since. Now at long last she is home again. Since this has been a year of hospital visiting and tiring treatments, life has been "sotto voce"--as mother used to say--and Hilda faces a cataract operation just before Christmas--but we have been blessed with some very welcome visitors; flying visits from our U.S.A. friends, Sally Curtis, Marian Hamilton, and our cousin Margaret Bowell, cousin Peter and Sue Swayne from Vancouver, and Jack and Mary Harrison from England. Also--a rare treat--from Australia my old friend from Toronto days, Padmini Murari (now O'Brien) with her two beautiful daughters Nalina and Vimela, enhanced with the most charming manners. Our Buckmaster cousin Mary Tasker (from Bath) spent Christmas with us (and now we are looking forward to a return visit this Christmas). Wolfgang Fuchs and his wife, Dorothy, have been for short visits. Wolfgang is recently retired from a professorship at Cornell. In the early Hitler era he came to us at Mill Hill Park, and made his base at No. 16. Mother used to say of him--"The German World War One robbed me of my only son, Ralph, but the German World War Two gave me a new son, Wolfgang".

I sent in a paragraph concerning the former (1910) occasion when Daddy took me up to Shepherd's field at Mullion. I recall seeing a long ribbon of light, and beyond that a low curtain of flickering light--the Aurora Borealis!-- Apparently no one else's memory went back as far--so I won the prize! a book by Terance Dickenson, entitled "Halley's Comet: a mysterious visitor from outer space."

The garden did not get much attention this year though the birds or squirrels helped by planting a couple of chestnut trees, and some green beans! The snow peas were a failure, and the raspberry canes produced one berry---but the tomatoes have been exceptionally fine, huge and of excellent flavour.

We continue to be surrounded by "T.L.C.". Our doctor drops in every week. Neighbours shop and fetch and carry for us and drive us to church. We have students to help us, one in the mornings, and another in the evenings -- so the meals are all covered and the necessary chores -- so we live in the lap of Edwardian luxury, "Upstairs and Downstairs"! So don't hesitate to come and visit. We'd love to welcome you, and Kingston is really a very attractive small city with pleasant rural surroundings, not to mention Lake Ontario at the end of our road!
