Firms swap biotech drug rights

Schering AG will purchase Immunex' Leukine drug business for about \$380 million in cash plus additional payments contingent on regulatory approvals and sales milestones. Immunex' sales of the drug were \$108 million in 2001. Schering anticipates retaining about 200 Immunex employees. Leukine is a colonystimulating factor used to increase the production of white blood cells. The business is being sold to obtain U.S. government clearance of Amgen's planned acquisition of Immunex. Amgen already has its own colony-stimulating factor, Neupogen, that contributed \$1.3 billion to its 2001 sales. Separately, Amgen is acquiring the Neupogen business in Europe from marketing partner Roche for \$138 million. In December 2001, Roche's Japanese subsidiary agreed to merge with the drug firm Chugai Pharmaceutical, which markets a competing drug.

Sunoco cuts polypropylene

Sunoco Chemicals will permanently close 200 million lb of polypropylene capacity at its La Porte, Texas, plant during the third quarter. The facility can make 1 billion lb of the plastic per year. Sunoco says the shutdown is in response to market trends that make it prohibitive to operate older, high-cost facilities. The firm notes that it has been optimizing both the polypropylene assets acquired from Aristech Chemical in 2000 and those that it recently began managing for Epsilon Products.

Atofina settles over plant blast

Atofina Chemicals has reached a \$6.2 million settlement with the Paper, Allied-Industrial, Chemical & Energy Workers International Union and the Michigan Department of Consumer & Industry Services (CIS) stemming from an investigation into the July 14, 2001, explosion at its Riverview, Mich., plant that killed three workers. "Unfortunately, lives were lost because management did not diligently prepare for the emergencies in-

herent when using dangerous chemicals," says CIS Director Kathleen M. Wilbur. The investigation led to a fine of \$500,000. About \$4.1 million will go toward improving safety at the facility and for community programs aimed at accident preparedness. Another \$1.5 million will be dedicated to safety at other Atofina plants. The company is also spending \$80,000 to establish a scholarship fund in honor of the workers who died.

Bayer and Cambridge sign OLED pact

Bayer and organic lightemitting diode technology developer Cambridge Display Technology (CDT) have signed an agreement to bring materials used in OLEDs to market. The pact extends a collaboration that started last year when the companies began develop-



together. They now jointly own intellectual property for polyethylene dioxythiophene polystyrene sulfonate, a polymer used to transport charge in OLED devices. Under the new agreement, Bayer will make and market the materials, and CDT will provide technical support. OLEDs are an emerging technology for flat-panel displays used in electronic devices. CDT estimates that the OLED market will be worth \$2.5 billion in five years.

CHF acquires Wyeth painting

The Chemical Heritage Foundation has acquired N. C. Wyeth's painting "The Alchemist." Commissioned in 1937 by Hercules for its company calendar, the painting, along with other artworks the company owned, was sold at a late-April auction at Christie's in New York City. Hercules raised a total of about \$1 million from the auction. An anonymous donation to CHF made the painting's \$229,500 purchase possible. CHF already boasts what it calls one of the largest collections of alchemical art, consisting of more than 100 works, primarily 17th-through 19thcentury paintings. CHF will display the "The Alchemist" at its 20th-anniversary celebration on June 28.

Bhopal survivors want Dow to pay

Survivors of the 1984 gas leak in Bhopal, India, have begun a tour of the U.S. to pressure Dow Chemical to clean up wastes left behind at a former Union Carbide methyl isocyanate plant. Environmental umbrella group Ac-

tion against Corporate Crime & Toxic Terror contends that those wastes have contaminated drinking water. Dow, which bought Carbide last year, says Carbide settled personal injury and other claims in 1989 when it paid the Indian government \$470 million. But survivors filed a federal class-action lawsuit against Carbide in 1999, shortly after the merger with Dow was announced, seeking additional damages. Dow won't comment on the pending litigation but says it is considering an unspecified "positive humanitarian effort" in India.

Enchira starts to wind down

Enchira Biotechnology, one of several companies to develop gene "directed evolution" technologies, is going out of business. Virtually all its employees, including its CEO, have resigned or been released, and it has hired a financial advisory firm to help review alternatives and redeploy assets. Enchira lost a legal dispute with competitor Maxygen last year and was forced to stop practicing its Rachitt technology. Enchira shifted its focus to developing therapeutic proteins for cancer treatment but ran out of financing.

Bayer and WHO to develop malaria drug

The World Health Organization's Medicines for Malaria venture has enlisted Bayer to develop a new malaria medicine based on the active ingredient artemisone. Bayer holds the patent rights to the ingredient, the result of a research alliance with Hong Kong University of Science & Technology. Clinical trials are scheduled

A rough translation is as follows:

Dear Mr. Naumann,

Here I confirm once again that I have no further interest in the painting by Schoubroeck/Brueghel. You offered me the painting in Maastricht as a Schoubroeck and stressed that it would not cause any difficulties to get an expertise from Dr. Ertz. On your invoice it says "School of Brueghel" but in your last fax you wrote "really by Schoubroeck".

Dr. Ertz had no idea who painted this painting except that it is not by Brueghel and Dr. Krämer, the author of the work on Schoubroeck, says that it has nothing to do with Schoubroeck.

In Maastricht I couldn't pay for the painting by check and take with me because Gerlach said that without a documentation regarding duty I could not take the painting, as you said. In your fax of the 19th of March you wrote that the duty transaction could be handled only if I could prove through payment receipt that I paid only \$25,000 because you had imported the painting for \$45,000.

Now that I have informed you that I have no further interest in the painting, Gerlach has "accidentally", as you wrote in your fax of April 8, paid the VAT. These are contradictory stories, hard to believe, for a serious expert and dealer.

You will get the VAT back when the painting is exported from the EU and anyway you have further customers waiting for that painting.

Dear Al,

My mother and father are both rolling over in their respective graves, just knowing that they have raised such a rude daughter. I apologize profusely for not responding to your letters in January and February. I have been on a very heavy travel schedule for the past four months and correspondence has suffered mightily. I'm sure you realize how much mail I get, and I do try to respond personally. I hope you will forgive me, for this lapse in civility, even if you do not like my explanation below.

The companies we track for earnings are a sample of companies that we have picked and followed over time to represent the chemical industry. The companies are not selected solely on the basis of total sales. But if we look at sales only, it appears to me that in 2001, \$207 million of the total sales for Sigma-Aldrich were in fine chemicals. I may be mistaken, but this is the only area in which Sigma-Aldrich supplies chemicals in the typical chemical company fashion. It is not just a function of how many of Sigma-Aldrich's 85,000 products are made there. Even if I included some--not all-- of the sales from the categories of biotech and diagnostics (which is being sold), the amount of sales would still be lower than any of the companies on our list.

One other point about this list of companies: These companies have been tracked by C&EN for many, many years. We do not lightly replace them, as we would then not be able to make long term trend analyses. We only replace companies when they disappear. For example, Union Carbide was a staple of this list for many years. Now union Carbide is part of Dow and it doesn't appear. It was replaced by PPG Industries, a comparably sized company.

I know this explanation will not please you, and perhaps that is why I delayed in answering to you. I certainly knew the answer back in January when I got your first letter, but as I said, I was traveling almost nonstop and I kept putting off my response. It must have something to do with wanting to please you, Al, that I delayed in answering.

Finally, let me agree that "the fine chemicals Sigma-Aldrich has provided to chemists have contributed greatly to the advances in chemistry in the past

50 years." That's why Ann Thayer did such a fine and lengthy article on the company in our Oct. 8, 2001, issue. We try to give credit to Sigma- Aldrich in other ways than including it on a list of companies tracked for earnings. Indeed, many companies are not on the list of earnings and I have never received another letter of complaint!

My warmest wishes to you. I hope this finds you well.

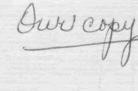

I would like to thank you for the dinner and the very pleasant evening April 14th. I really enjoyed talking to old friends and being brought up to date on whereabouts (and deaths) of people I knew well while working at Aldrich.

I also thank you for the book you gave me - I will read it and treasure it and the Aldrichemica Acta which I herewith return. I made copies. Mark also gave me a copy of the Aldrich catalog he happened to have in his car. It's been many years since I saw a copy and I am amazed at the changes. You remember I suggested the inclusion of structural formulas many years ago. Ed Segrin was a strong proponent of 'Common chemicals' even though he was not a chemist.

I recall hiring him at the time we instituted the IBM 360s. Remember the desk units, and the magnetic stripe inventory cards? I think we were a decade ahead of the computer revolution. And the mess as we tried to catch up with the sales and ended getting a second 360 due to IBM's underestimating our volume?

I never finished telling you (in the car driving to your gallery) why I decided to leave Aldrich. At the time I sold some stock that I had held for 5 years. I was shocked to have a New York attorney notify the SEC and Aldrich that I was involved in insider trading as an officer of the company. Apparently, this guy watched for transactions by company officers and then jumped in and claimed 'inside trading'. As a result, he said he was due an amount equal to the profit on the transaction. I complained to Klitzner and Bernie that the stock I sold was 5 years old – and was told by both that money (and stock) is **Fungible!** An interesting use of the term – note Enron!

In amy case I had to pay around \$7000.00. I checked with Marvin and complained that neither he nor Aldrich had warned me about this, but neither suggested any solution. I ended up selling more stock to pay the "fine". At the time I had heavy expenses – putting my son through medical school and 2 daughters through college. So I was naturally quite put out with the company and decided to leave – in protest.

As you know, I had been operating a gallery/craft shop in Door County at the time

on weekends. I recall both you and Bernie stopped by one day.

When I left Aldrich I took a temporary position with Willowbrook as a chemical production advisor - I didn't get much money, but it held me over for a year. We then moved to Mequon to the place we have now which serves as a shop/residence.

I would like it very much if both you and Isobel could visit our little enterprise in the near future. I enjoyed seeing your gallery and really liked the paintings, etc. Your collection is worthy of a more accessible showing - the sixth floor of a hotel is difficult for potential viewers/buyers to access, except by appointment.

I do some sculpture, time permitting, and have sold many dozens of creations over the years. Unfortunately, running a business is a full time job leaving little time for me to create. Also, we had the misfortune of having a franchise discount craft business move into a location one mile south of us about 4 years ago. This has cut off our sales to the south (metropolitan Milwaukee) and has affected our business drastically. It only through stained glass sales and other items that 'Michaels' doesn't handle that we survived.

It has been a lot of fun though and I look back at the Aldrich days fondly. I was sorry to hear that old friends like George Skeff and others had died.

As you can see, I really enjoyed the evening and am sorry my wife couldn't make it - she has a hip problem that gets better and worse with the weather. Thanks again.

My mother and father are both rolling over in their respective graves, just knowing that they have raised such a rude daughter. I apologize profusely for not responding to your letters in January and February. I have been on a very heavy travel schedule for the past four months and correspondence has suffered mightily. I'm sure you realize how much mail I get, and I do try to respond personally. I hope you will forgive me, for this lapse in civility, even if you do not like my explanation below.

The companies we track for earnings are a sample of companies that we have picked and followed over time to represent the chemical industry. The companies are not selected solely on the basis of total sales. But if we look at sales only, it appears to me that in 2001, \$207 million of the total sales for Sigma-Aldrich were in fine chemicals. I may be mistaken, but this is the only area in which Sigma-Aldrich supplies chemicals in the typical chemical company fashion. It is not just a function of how many of Sigma-Aldrich's 85,000 products are made there. Even if I included some--not all-- of the sales from the categories of biotech and diagnostics (which is being sold), the amount of sales would still be lower than any of the companies on our list.

One other point about this list of companies: These companies have been tracked by C&EN for many, many years. We do not lightly replace them, as we would then not be able to make long term trend analyses. We only replace companies when they disappear. For example, Union Carbide was a staple of this list for many years. Now union Carbide is part of Dow and it doesn't appear. It was replaced by PPG Industries, a comparably sized company.

I know this explanation will not please you, and perhaps that is why I delayed in answering to you. I certainly knew the answer back in January when I got your first letter, but as I said, I was traveling almost nonstop and I kept putting off my response. It must have something to do with wanting to please you, Al, that I delayed in answering.

Finally, let me agree that "the fine chemicals Sigma-Aldrich has provided to chemists have contributed greatly to the advances in chemistry in the past 50 years." That's why Ann Thayer did such a fine and lengthy article on the company in our Oct. 8, 2001, issue. We try to give credit to Sigma- Aldrich in other ways than including it on a list of companies tracked for earnings. Indeed, many companies are not on the list of earnings and I have never received another letter of complaint!

My warmest wishes to you. I hope this finds you well.

I hope you had a safe journey back. I passed today again with a melancholy "Zimmer's rent" on Emek Refaim 8. It seems to me as a dream -as an unbelievably sweet dream-that both of you were here and that we spent so much time together.

I am deeply grateful for everything what both of you did for me last weeks and last year too. But independent of all that you have to know that I like you very much.

Why do I say it? I have three reasons.

Theft reported to the Amsterdam police and to IFAR (illustrated in IFAReports, 16, 4, No. 236).

Three paintings were stolen. Of these, the best (previously attributed to Rembrandt, *Bredius* 226) was discarded by the thieves and found that evening. The two others, a period portrait of Rembrandt's mother and the Coques *Portrait* were sent to the auction house De Eland in Amsterdam, were offered for sale in 1995, but returned as reserves were not reached. Shortly thereafter, the Amsterdam police recovered the paintings, checked neither their own police report nor IFAR, kept both paintings in their Lost and Found for three years and then sent them to auction (again to De Eland) where they were offered and sold on June 25, 1998, as lots 1420 and 1421.

Rembrandt's Mother was bought by an Utrecht collector, Dr. M.B.H. Schilder, who took it to the RKD where it was identified as one of the paintings stolen from Bader. Dutch law gives buyers at auction legal possession of their purchase if acquired three years after the theft. Hence, Bader negotiated a repurchase of Rembrandt's Mother from Dr. Schilder and would like to negotiate a similar repurchase with the buyer of the Coques.

Thank you for sending me what is called the official translation of Bredius' expertise of June 1938.

When I saw this I just could not help laughing. It seems to me that Bredius is not referring to a fellow Paulus, who was in business in Leiden, but to a painting of St. Paul which in 1938 had a false Rembrandt signature, and where scholars argued whether the painting was by Rembrandt or by Lievens. A number of art historians believed it to be by Rembrandt, but now it is accepted as a work by Lievens. I am quite familiar with this because I own it, and I enclose a good reproduction.

After careful consideration I have come to the conclusion that the painting of Jesus in the Temple is a competent painting, but certainly not by Rembrandt. It was not painted in 1632, but a few years later, and clearly shows Rembrandt's influence.

If it came up at auction I would certainly be interested in bidding on it, but not too high, and nowhere near millions of dollars.

I cannot tell whether the author(s) of these descriptions are acting only in ignorance or want to mislead willfully.

Anyway, I do not want to have anything further to do with this.

The situation is quite different with the Supper at Emmaus. That is a lovely painting which I saw twice many years ago and which I liked. It certainly is from Caravaggio's immediate circle and was probably a second version painted by Caravaggio himself with one of his students.

In this painting you can see his gift of genius for composition. Throughout the entire painting we see the superb examples of colour and touch.

In the beginning, I asked my self if perhaps Lievens had co-operated in this painting as there was a time when a man named Paulus was in business and he had the heads and hands painted by Lievens, but the remainder, the strong, great books of still life were absolutely done by Rembrandt.

However after examination, this work becomes extremely revealing for the study of Rembrandt's development. What magnificent heads! How majestically the High Priests are sitting, what a marvellous variation of facial expressions. This painting is truly a most exciting and interesting discovery.

Translator's Notes:

- Dossier Number 1149. Doctor Bredius maintained a dossier on each painting he examined.
 At the time of his death, he had dossiers on nearly four thousand paintings that had been submitted to him to obtain Rembrandt expertise. However, he only wrote Certificates of Authenticity on six hundred seventy eight paintings.
- 2. Upon first examination of this painting Dr. Bredius believed that this painting was a collaboration work painted in combination with Jan Lievens the Elder. Jan Lievens was for a short time a business partner of a man named Paulus. However, after the cleaning of the head of the Young Christ, the High Priest and a scholar, Doctor Bredius came the conclusion that the painting was entirely by the "Hand of the Master" and not a collaboration work.
- 3. This painting is particularly revealing and interesting as there are only four surviving early group works by Rembrandt that date in the 1626 to 1630 period when he first began to paint independently.
- 4. Doctor Abraham Bredius is the author of "The Paintings of Rembrandt" which was the first internationally accepted comprehensive catalogue raisonné of the works of Rembrandt. Doctor Bredius is considered to be the most important Rembrandt scholar of this century.
- 5. The 96° in the lower right corner is an internal control number of Dr. Bredius and shows that Dr. Bredius verified the certificate as original on one occasion.

USING THE MOST CRITICAL STANDARD AVAILABLE, THERE ARE LESS THAN 150 WORKS THAT HAVE MANAGED TO RETAIN THE ACCOLADE OF BEING ENTIRELY BY THE HAND of Rembrandt. Among these works that remain in private HANDS, THE FOREMOST IS UNDOUBTEDLY THE «THE YOUNG CHRIST IN THE TEMPLE».

AN INVENTORY OF HIS COLLECTION OF ART AND ANTIQUITIES, TAKEN BEFORE AN AUCTION TO PAY HIS DEBTS, SHOWED THE BREADTH OF REMBRANDT'S INTERESTS: ANCIENT SCULPTURE, FLEMISH AND ITALIAN RENAISSANCE PAINTINGS, FAR EASTERN ART, CONTEMPORARY DUTCH WORKS, WEAPONS, AND ARMOUR.

Unfortunately, the results of the auction, including the sale of his house, were disappointing. The painting titled "The young Christ in the Temple" had been carefully removed from his inventory through a series of slight of hand and avoided the auction.

Among Rembrandt's first major public commissions in Amsterdam was the "Anatomy Lesson of Dr. Tulp". This work depicts the regents of the Guild of Surgeons gathered for a dissection and lecture. Such group portraits were a genre unique to Holland and meant substantial income for an artist in a country where neither church nor royalty acted as patrons of art. Rembrandt's painting surpasses commemorative portraits made by other Dutch artists with its interesting pyramidal arrangement of the figures, lending naturalism to the scene. In an interesting tie to "Anatomy Lesson of Dr. Tulp", forensic examination of this work shows that it was painted with the same brush as the "The young Christ in the Temple" also shows Rembrandt's love of exotic costumes, a feature characteristic of many of his early works.

THESE PROBLEMS IN NO WAY AFFECTED REMBRANDT'S WORK; IF ANYTHING, HIS ARTISTRY INCREASED. HIS PERSONAL LIFE, HOWEVER, CONTINUED TO BE MARRED BY SORROW, FOR HIS BELOVED HENDRICKJE DIED IN 1663, AND HIS SON, TITUS, IN 1668. ELEVEN MONTHS LATER, ON OCTOBER 4, 1669, REMBRANDT DIED IN AMSTERDAM.

"The young Christ in the Temple" is arguably the most important work in the world by Rembrandt that still remains in private hands. It has only passed hands through a sale three times in more than three hundred years. Remaining in the same family from the late 1600's until 1995, then passing briefly into the private trust of <u>Princess Diana</u> just before her death. This work is now being offered to a discerning buyer and it will remain one of the most exclusive purchase

I have sent the photographs of the porcelain Louis and the Persian bronze to appropriate colleagues for their opinions, and will forward same when I have their answers. David Moore-Gwyn is considering the Thomas Phillips, and will let me know what he thinks in a few days. I have left a message for Norbert Garson to say that alas the coloured chalk drawing is the work of an artist not known to my colleagues, and believed by them to be of negligible auction value. I put this as tactfully as I could.

For the remainder I have some answers, but not all of them. I confirm the estimate on the Bison picture in Sussex of £6,000-8,000. We all think it stands an excellent chance of making rather more, and the reserve should not be less than £6,000. We would be delighted to have it for sale in Bond Street (not Olympia).

I confirm my estimate on the Johann Ulrich Mayr, Sumowski 1464, of \$30,000-40,000, with a reserve of \$25,000. The catalogue entry should stress the Venetian character of the picture, that it was painted there, and that Strozzi's influence is palpable.

I have discussed the Master of the Legend of Saint Lucy panel with Ben, Richard and Letizia. Their consensus and I agree with it is that the estimate should be \$30,000-40,000 (not \$40,000-60,000), but we could accept a reserve of \$30,000.

If given enough time to think about it and write a proper note, we would be delighted to have the *Cumana* for sale. I do think it has a good chance of being an early Rubens. The estimate should be \$18,000-25,000, with a reserve of \$15,000.

We would be delighted to have any or all of these for sale in New York, either in May or next January, as you prefer.

Dear Alfred,

We are about to quibble with these small invoices, when we have avoided the bigger issues of dealing with my brother's finders fee on the Rembrandt. You suggested that we discuss the matter in London, but we never got around to it. You will recall that at least a dozen dealers offered me the Minerva, and each and every one of them built in a huge fee for themselves. Francis simply introduced me and left the matter in my hands. I suggested that I pay him 10% of my profits when the painting is sold, and I thought you and I would simply split this amount at that time. As already discussed, I made these arrangements without your knowledge or approval. However, there is still the matter of Francis, who as a full-time art dealer makes his part of money in this way, that is, through introductory commissions. I can't neglect him or suggest a cash payment of only \$60,000 (which he refused, by the way). After all, Haboldt and Noortman basically got a buyers fee of \$600,000!

I paid Francis \$240,000 in increments of \$20,000 per month. This started out as an investment in his business, but eventually I turned it into a payment for the Rembrandt. You see, it's 1% of the cost price, and Francis is pleased with this.

Like me, you have a payment to Noortman that I did not split. As first arranged before Noortman and Daniel, you would pay the entire \$300,000 and I would not be responsible for this expense. In fact, I volunteered to contribute to this at the time, and you refused. About a month later, you apparently changed your mind and said we would square up upon sale. Your charitable contribution yields you around \$100,000 in deductions as you said, so I guess I would be asked to pay \$100,000 of the \$200,000 remaining, when the sale is made.

You can see what I am getting at here. I am suggesting that we leave both of these expenses until the end, when the painting is sold. If I paid \$240,000 towards the purchase, and you paid \$200,000 out of pocket, then you would owe me \$20,000 when the accounts are tallied up.

Dear Otto,

You are probably the last person in the world with whom I would like to argue over invoices and I just hope that you will bear with me:

1. The cost of moving the Minerva to Day and Meyer should be paid by the Japanese who insisted on viewing it there rather than at your gallery. Laura billed the two agents involved, but so far they have not responded or paid. If they don't pay, I expect you to share the expense, because this is integral to the attempted sale. It is an expense I would not have undergone without the Minerva here. After all, the insurance is more than \$30,000 per year. Basically, I am insuring your property for free. How can you ask for more?

You have never before charged me for moving paintings.

- 2. Paying \$300 a year storage for the crate of the van de Cappelle again seems to be your business expense. We are storing that enormous crate for the de Gelder, outside the gallery, but of course I am not going to charge you. Again, this is an expenses integral to the item, one I would never have if I did not have the painting here. It is not a general expense of the gallery. I saved the crate because crates cost \$400 to \$500 to build on this scale. If anyone needed to see the painting during the year, I would have saved this expense. It's a gamble, but one I insist you take with me. You see the argument here, right? If the picture had been shipped and I saved us money, you would accept the savings. So it's not fair that you would not accept the cost of the gamble when it fails. The shippers told me that to use this crate going to Maastricht would cost quite a bit more, as it adds weight and volume. By the way, I sent our Reymerswaele to the Getty last month, and it cost me \$3500 for crate and shipping. This painting is about the same size as the Van de Cappelle.
- 3. Gander & White is very expensive and I know that both of us had hoped that the two paintings would be part of a larger shipment. Of course I am immediately sending you my check for \$1075.08, our share of the cost. Compare this cost to sending the Reymerswaele ONE WAY from New York to the Getty, and that trip did not involve customs clearance in two countries! This is very, very reasonable.

Will Gander & White send you further documentation that they exported the Ostade or do you think that their invoice will suffice to recover the VAT? Laura has asked for this.

Gradually as we talk to each other more, we will get to know each other.

I am sorry that I could not acquire your copy after the Rembrandt self-portrait which you purchased at Cohen-Fontaine for \$12,000-\$13,000. That is a lot of money for a later copy and I have no customers for such.

The Supper at Emmaus is a lovely painting which I have seen in the original twice and admired. Professor Slatke's comments are correct: it is by Caravaggio and a student.

Were it to come up at auction I would bid up to \$200,000 and might or might not get it. That's a long way from \$20 million.

Such fine paintings are burdened by the misleading comments that accompany them.

To turn now to the *Twelve Year Old Jesus Arguing in the Temple*, here are a few questions:

1. What proof is there that this was painted in 1632. Is it signed and dated and, if so, where?

- 2. What proof is there that Princess Diana had an ownership interest?
- 3. I would like to see the Bredius expertise of 1938. The painting is not illustrated in Bredius' catalogue nor in the Gerson-Bredius catalogue written much later in 1938.

Once I have that information I will consider this further.

Of course the painting does remind you of works by Rembrandt; for instance, the figure furthest to the right with the figure furthest to the left in Bredius 558.

If I owned the painting, the first thing I would do is to submit it to the Rembrandt Research Project. The owners probably have done so and received a negative reply.

I look forward to receiving the information requested.

Thank you for sending me the material on the *Supper at Emmaus*. You sent everything detailed in your letter of January 28th except #5, the opinion of Professor Leonard Slatkes, who is a very able art historian, and who is likely to have said the same that Mina Gregori wrote, namely, that it may be a joint effort by Caravaggio and one of his students.

Oskar and Jan Klein bought a great many good paintings at London auctions in the 1950's and I actually saw this very painting in their gallery on 57th Street in 1957.

The fact that Walter Chrysler and Robert Manning bought this painting speaks for its quality.

It is certainly not by Caravaggio himself, whose prime version is in the National Gallery in London. It may be a joint effort by Caravaggio and one of his students – as Mina Gregori believes – or it may be a period copy.

As such, it is attractive, but nowhere near worth \$20 million.

For comparison, check Lot 179 of Sotheby's New York sale of January 25, 2001, the painting of *A Lute Player* believed to be in the same league. That painting brought \$110,000.

I believe that were you to buy the Supper at Emmaus for, say, \$1 million, you would be making a serious mistake.

To Whom It May Concern:

The answers follow the questions.

There is no proof that it was painted in 1632, and it is not signed and dated. Even if it was signed and dated, over one-half of the signatures and dates on authentic works by Rembrandt have been proven to be spurious. Bredius dated the painting about 5 years earlier than did Veritus. All of the dating by Bredius on other than independently documented works (for example, The Anatomy Lesson of Doctor Tulp) was subjective based upon style. Veritus dated the painting 1632 based on the fact that the same brush was used to paint the Young Christ as was used to paint Doctor Tulp, the later being documented independently as to the date of authorship. Further information to this effect can be found at the Veritus web site on the following page: http://veritus.org/sendter/limits.php

The specific passage is in the first paragraph under the heading Digital Brushstroke analysis.

There is no proof, although it was independently reported in more than one publication. The trustee will only state that "the painting was in trust for a member of a Royal Family" who desires to remain anonymous. This statement will be sworn to on the Bill of Sale if desired.

The original expertise is located with the painting. Since the Bredius book was printed in 1936, one would not expect to have a painting evaluated in 1938 included. The Gerson-Bredius catalogue was an annotated reprint and did not include the approximately 6 paintings that were considered authentic by Bredius, but examined after the 1936 printing.

No the painting was never submitted to the Reinbrandt Research Project although they were aware of its existence since they used the files of Bredius as their basis for their catalogue. I do not know the reason for this but I suspect that it had to do with the then pending patrimonial legislation in Belgium. Had the painting been certified as following under patrimonial guidelines for Belgium, the owner would not have been able to sell it out of the country. I am in a similar situation with an Italian owner of a Caravaggio whose painting is catalogued but the location is not disclosed and the owner is attempting to export the painting before it is listed on the patrimonial registry of Italy. Important to note is that this painting is not on any patrimonial registry and can be freely exported. This will be certified in the Bill of Sale as well as a certification that there are no third party claims against the painting. Let me know when you would like to view the painting
