



FOREWORD

OT all the pioneering in Canada has been done in her forests and plains by any means. The growth of the fine arts from the days of the earliest topographical draughtsmen and water colourists, who were, most of them, British army officers stationed in Upper and Lower Canada, down to our own day, when a vigorous and national

school of painting is springing up, has been no less heroic and deserving of epics and monuments than the work of her explorers and her statesmen. Even now, when it can be said that a slender chain of art galleries and art societies exists all the way from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and the rich are collecting the European old masters, the pioneering spirit is still very present to the artist who neither teaches, paints portraits, nor designs commercially, but who relies on a discerning public to permit him to dream his dreams and express them in form and colour.

The story of Canadian art and artists cannot be told in the foreword to a catalogue. It is not without romance, whether it is dealing with its earliest landscape painter, Paul Kane, and his wanderings among the Indians, Cornelius Kreighofi's inimitable studies of the life of the Quebec habitant, or the later rise of the Canadian art societies, such as the Ontario Society of Artists and Royal Canadian Academy in the seventies and eighties, and the establishment of the National Gallery and other art institutions.

We are living in stirring times in the literal sense of the word. The Canadian fine arts are stirring too, for which we may be devoutly thankful. If they were not, they would be either dead or degenerate. Canada is having the opportunity of measuring her art for the first time against that of the other British Dominions at the British Empire Exhibition, and whatever may be the relative verdict, Canada will at least show that she

possesses an indigenous and vigorous school of painting and sculpture, moulded by the tremendously intense character of her country and colour of her seasons.

The Canadian Section of Fine Arts is being managed by the Board of Trustees of the National Gallery of Canada, in whose hands it was placed by the Canadian Government. The following jury of representative Canadian artists made the selections:

It is Canada's most earnest hope that her exhibition in the art of the British Empire will only be the first of a regular series of such exhibitions, commencing in London and touring the art galleries of the Empire. That such exhibitions of fine and applied art would do an incalculable amount for the growth and public appreciation of art, both at home and in the several dominions, cannot seriously be questioned. They would, eventually, result in a greater sympathy and understanding of the Empire's needs, progress and achievements. If, in fulfilment of this, they brought about a regular exchange of some of the national public art treasures within safe and reasonable limits, a most valuable educational work would be set in motion and a great forward step be taken towards that closer communication of ideals and endeavours which is one of the British Empire's greatest needs.


