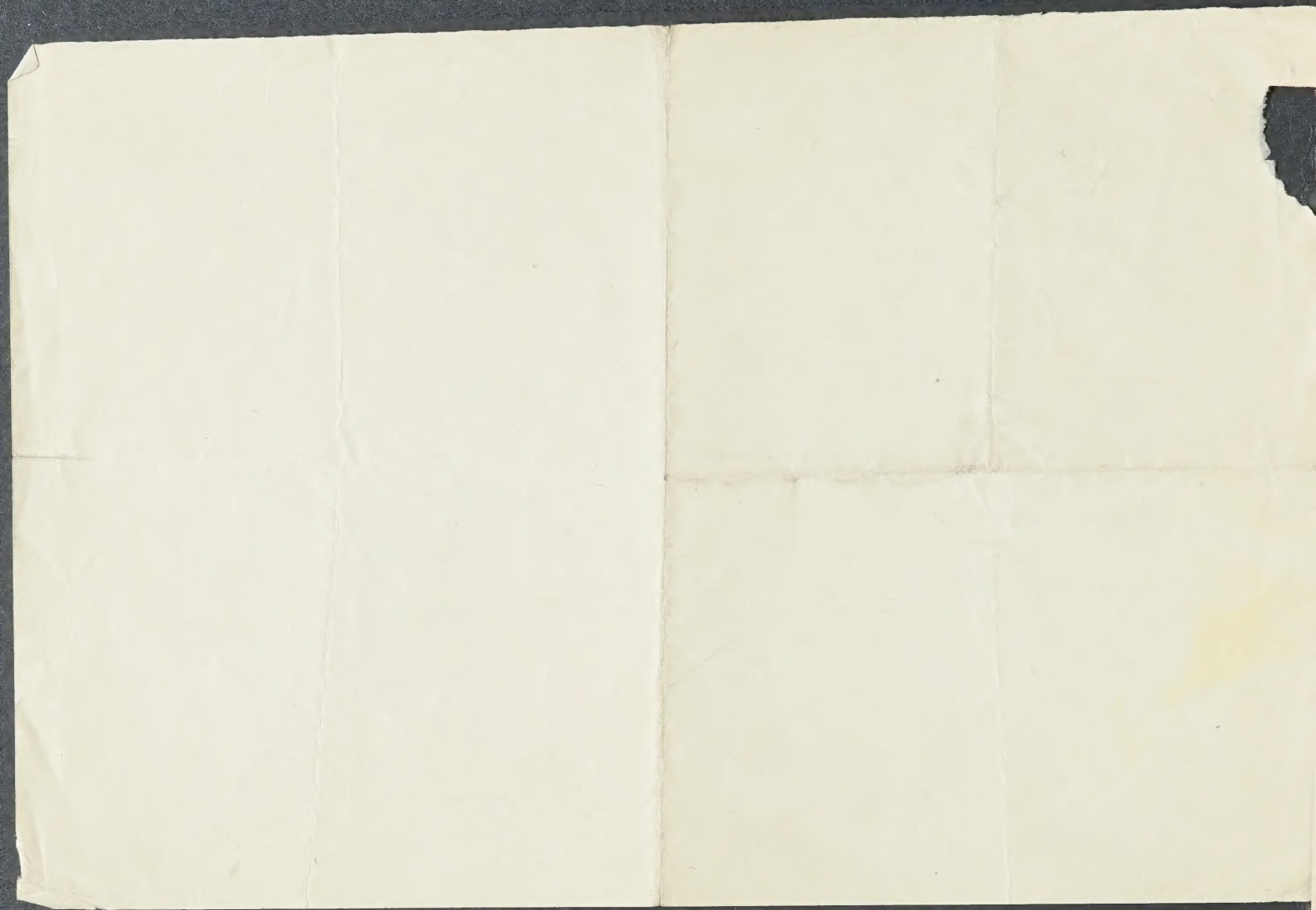

Ottawa, December 24, 1943.

Dear Sir:

The purpose of this letter is to inform you that in accordance with a recent decision of the Canadian Government, the conditions under which you were granted release in Canada have been modified as indicated hereunder,-

1. The period of your release will be immediately extended until December 31, 1944.
2. It will not be necessary for you to obtain the consent of the Immigration Service to change your present employment, nor to report periodically to the said Service as called for under the original conditions of your release.
3. You will now be subject to the provisions of the National Selective Service Civilian Regulations in the same manner and to the same extent as any other person in Canada.
4. You will still be subject to the Defence of Canada Regulations.

Please note carefully the following requirements,-


- (a) On receipt of this letter you should immediately forward to the Director of Immigration, Department of Mines and Resources, Ottawa, your Entry Certificate (Form 242A) for cancellation and issuance of Permit in accordance with paragraph

(over).....

No. 1. above. Be careful to state the address to which the Permit is to be forwarded. The Permit should again be sent to the Department in December, 1944 for further endorsement.

- (b) The National Selective Service Civilian Regulations provide for the control of employment. Should you desire at any time to leave your present employment or to seek employment, you should inquire at the nearest Employment and Selective Service office as to what steps you must take, since non-compliance with the National Selective Service Civilian Regulations carries severe penalties. These offices are located at all principal points throughout the country and information as to the location of the nearest local office may be obtained from your Post Office.
- (c) It is presumed that you have already registered with a Registrar of Enemy Aliens under the Defence of Canada Regulations. If so, you will be advised in the near future if there is to be any change in the procedure of your reporting. If you have not so registered, please immediately present yourself with this letter to the Registrar of Enemy Aliens in your district; this official is usually an officer of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Detachment in the District.



MEMORANDUM

West Block, Wellington St.,  
OTTAWA, November 11th, 1942.

I am sending you this memorandum for your guidance in connection with your release from a refugee camp, so that all misunderstandings, a few of which have already occurred, will in future be avoided.

2. Refugees, so long as they remain in Canada, continue to be the general responsibility of the Commissioner of Refugee Camps, whether they are in the camps or out of them, but those out of the camps are also the responsibility of the Director of Immigration, in all matters connected with their employment or the pursuit of their studies.
3. Release from the camp is for a temporary period only. It will be renewed by Immigration officials from time to time so long as refugees are careful to observe the conditions of their release and the place of their residence; failure to do this may result in the withdrawal of temporary release and return to a refugee camp. Released refugees do not obtain the status of Canadian citizens, but are regarded as friendly aliens enjoying temporary liberty in Canada.
4. Refugees may not leave their place of residence in Canada and go elsewhere to live or to work, without first securing the approval of the Director of Immigration. They must also report immediately to the Police (Registrar) on their arrival in their new home.
5. Refugees may not leave their place of residence and go temporarily to some other place to visit or on business, without securing the permission of the Police where they are registered.
6. Refugees are not subject to the general regulations of National Selective Service and are not required to apply to a local Selective Service officer before taking employment which has been arranged for them by the Director of Immigration. The Director's consent to move from one job to another is the only approval necessary.
7. As there is no Auxiliary Military Pioneer Corps in Canada, refugees are not eligible for enlistment in any Branch of the Armed Forces or to join any Canadian Officers' Training Corps.
8. Refugees should be careful to limit their personal belongings and luggage as far as possible to a total not exceeding 150 lbs.
