Thanks again for everything and all best wishes from house to house for 2000.





Robert Hughes has a rare gift. Combining the fields of sociology, history and art history he has written this book which traces the origins and development of modernism in art. It is insightful, articulate, and easy to read (to my mind). This is not an attempt to change your views (I rather admire your directness for saying "I don't like Van Gogh"). There is no denying modernity, however, as it has held sway over the art world for over 100 years. This book provides clarity and context for this elusive problem.

I was very happy to meet you. Even in art school there were few that admired the old masters as much as I did (do). A kindred spirit in this realm is rare. I remember the show The Bible Through Dutch Eyes at the Milwaukee Art Center. At that time I was studying painting at M.I.A.D. which was at the corner of Milwaukee and Chicago streets (1978?). I walked over three times after classes. My attention has now moved to more recent artists but I still seek out the Dutch masters at any major museum I go to. One of these days I hope that you will have a chance to visit us in Milwaukee.



Of course, I should wait until December 14th, 1997 to send you my best wishes, but at my age, I rather do things while I still can.



I have now lived with the painting which you sent me for a few days and also had it photographed, and I will enclose some of these good photos with the painting.

Studying other works by Chardin, I have come to the conclusion that the chances of this really being by him are very small. I cannot be certain, but certainty in such matters is hard to come by. The fact is that the painting is old and has quality, but I don't think that it is good enough for Chardin even though his output varied a good deal in quality.

What would I do if I owned it? First of all, I would have it cleaned. That could be done easily and quite inexpensively right in Minneapolis by one of the ablest restorers I know, Jim Horns, at 1313 - 5th Street S.E., Minneapolis, MN 55414; Ofc.Ph: 612/379-3813.

Then I would have the painting rephotographed. Then I would send a photograph of the cleaned painting to the world's expert on Chardin, Dr. Pierre Rosenberg at the Louvre. When you do that, I would recommend that you write to him in French. In my experience, French art historians are much more likely to reply if you write in French, even though their English is very good.

I will be returning your painting to you by FedEx next Monday for Wednesday arrival and would appreciate your acknowledging safe receipt.



To Our Shareholders:

Hauser celebrated its 10th anniversary of successful business in November. It is hard to imagine the early days with only three employees!

We recently released our second quarter fiscal 1994 results. Total revenues for the quarter were \$14,457,278 compared to last year at \$15,007,195. Net income increased 6.3% over the same period in fiscal 1993 to \$2,074,803, in spite of revenues being slightly lower. Fully diluted earnings per share for second quarter fiscal 1994 were \$.20, the same as the second quarter of fiscal 1993. Research and Development expense for the six-month period was \$1,091,188, compared to \$387,463 during fiscal 1993.

Over the past three months, Hauser management has evaluated the Company's paclitaxel (*Taxol*) related business. The balance of fiscal 1994 will be strong, as will the first quarter of fiscal 1995, based upon the final nine months of the current paclitaxel (*Taxol*) supply contract. Although other business areas will continue to grow and new paclitaxel (*Taxol*) related revenues will be developed, fiscal 1995 revenues could be down substantially from fiscal 1994.

The full impact could be moderated if other revenues increase over current expectations and a sufficiently strong and aggressive new paclitaxel (*Taxol*) partner is found. We expect an improvement in revenues and earnings in fiscal 1996 as all business areas continue to grow and paclitaxel (*Taxol*) sales begin to pick up. We have accelerated efforts to find a new partner for paclitaxel (*Taxol*) and paclitaxel (*Taxol*) analogs. These efforts include discussions with numerous significant pharmaceutical companies throughout the world. Three leading candidates have been identified, and discussions are progressing well. We believe these efforts will result in one or more formal relationships for the development of paclitaxel (*Taxol*) and paclitaxel (*Taxol*) analogs internationally.

Hauser's strategic relationship with Tastemaker for the development of flavor extracts is strong. Hauser and Tastemaker have each put in place a full-time management team to assure continued success. The venture has also expanded efforts in the development of new products. Currently, there are 18 products in the market and over 50 in development. The new products are being marketed into the soup, sauces and snack food markets, broadening the venture's market exposure beyond ready-to-drink beverages and vanilla. Production has begun at Hauser's new 30,000-square-foot flavors facility. Hauser and Tastemaker have extended their current contract two years, through 1995, and are presently negotiating to strengthen and expand the contract.

Hauser continues to work closely with the National Cancer Institute (NCI) under our second Master Agreement. The current project is for michellamine B, a compound being evaluated by NCI for activity against the AIDS virus. Michellamine B is produced from a vine that grows in Cameroon, West Africa. This two-phase project includes the development of a more optimized process for the purification of michellamine B and production for NCI's pre-clinical testing programs. The process development phase of our work has been completed, and we are using our new process to produce larger quantities of michellamine B.

Hauser Laboratories continues to provide full service laboratory testing, which creates future manufacturing opportunities from its problem solving activities. In fiscal 1993, sales were about \$1.8 million. This was a decline from previous years as technical resources from Labs provided support to design and develop our paclitaxel (*Taxol*) operations. We have resumed positive growth in this area and anticipate sales of \$2.5 million for fiscal 1994.

Hauser held its Annual Shareholder Meeting in October in Boulder, Colorado. At the meeting, presentations were given highlighting the Company's activities and future business strategies. The following corporate officers were re-elected: Dr. Dean P. Stull, Chief Executive Officer/Chairman of the Board of Directors; Thomas A. Scales, President/Chief Operating Officer; Dr. Randall J. Daughenbaugh, Executive Vice President/Chief Technical Officer; Gregory L. Huckabee, Secretary, and William E. Paukert, Treasurer.

Elected to Hauser's Board of Directors were: William E. Coleman, Stanley J. Cristol, Randall J. Daughenbaugh, Ray L. Hauser, Roger F. Reinking, Christopher W. Roser, Thomas A. Scales, Dean P. Stull and Bert M. Tolbert.

We anticipate many challenges as we continue to grow our businesses and respond to anticipated changes in our paclitaxel (*Taxol*) related business. We are in excellent financial position, and look forward to an exciting year.

At this busy time of year, we want to pause a moment to thank you for your continued support and wish you and your families a very healthy, happy 1994.



My family and I have decided to try to support mainly disadvantaged students, and the enclosed describes some of our efforts.







A NEW HUMAN BRAIN METABOLIC REACTION

We have discovered a metabolic reaction which occurs in the human brain. In this reaction, a compound called homocarnosine is split into two amino acids by an enzyme (a dipeptidase). One of these amino acids is gamma aminobutyric acid (GABA), a well-known neurotransmitter. Neurotransmitters are involved in the passage of messages (electrical impulses) from one nerve cell to the next. We have found that homocarnosine and the enzyme are present in certain neurons (nerve cells) in many regions of the brain. For example, this system was seen in neurons of the retina, optic nerve, olfactory bulb, cerebellum, cerebrum and hippocampus. This reaction probably plays a role in regulating vision, the sense of smell, muscle coordination, and other brain-controlled functions. Certain diseases may be caused by a malfunction of this system; now that this reaction has been identified, drugs affecting the reaction may be developed and could be effective therapy for these diseases.

There is a human genetic defect in which the concentration of homocarnosine in the brain is much higher than normal. These individuals have neurological disorders including mental retardation and difficulty in walking. We found that they lack the abovementioned enzyme, which accounts for their elevated brain homocarnosine levels. There are many other genetic defects caused by missing or defective enzymes; researchers are trying to develop techniques for restoring the missing enzymes.

Partial deficiencies of the homocarnosine-splitting enzyme have been reported in children with muscular dystrophy and in adults with alcoholic myopathy (both are muscle-wasting diseases).









Over the last year I have been working as a post-doc with Harry Kroto but recently he has agreed to take me on part time, I can therefore spend more time painting.

Most of my favourite paintings are still life's but I have recently started some abstract experiments so that I can learn more about colours and tones. I am also experimenting with scientific themes, the last two photos show such an experiment. Here I have taken an electron microscope image of nanotubes (elongated tubular fullerenes having dimensions ca. 10 - 100 nm diameter and up to several μ m's long) and used the pattern created by the tubes as the basis of a rather abstract design. I would value your opinion on these paintings.

Dear Ms. Halpern:

Thank you for your interesting letter of April 22nd.

I see a number of difficulties with the possible acquisition of Otto Schneid's work:

- 1. If his works are declared to be a national treasure by the government of Canada, does that mean that his works could not be exported from Canada?
- 2. I really cannot judge whether his works are competent or not. If somebody had shown me ten slides of the work of Chagall before I ever heard of Chagall, and then asked me whether I thought them to be great art, I fear that I would have said no. I realize, of course, that this is my problem, but it is a problem.
- 3. In my experience, estates of the works of artists often ask outlandishly high prices for the works, even though there is no established market.

Do you have any idea what Dr. Schneid's estate is asking for all of the works, including the documentation and the manuscripts?

Isabel and I look forward to being in Canada, including Kingston and Toronto, in October and November. If your answers are encouraging, then I would very much like to look at the works and discuss possible purchase.

Thank you for bringing this to my attention.

Dear Mr. Bader:

As a graduate of the Master's Degree Programme (1992) under the supervision of Dr. David McTavish at Queen's University in Kingston, I first would like to thank you so much for all that you have done for the Department of Art and the Agnes Etherington Art Centre. I feel that my studies at Queen's were greatly enhanced by your generous contributions to the University's art community. While at Queen's, I attended a wonderful talk that you delivered in the Department of Art, and I vividly remember the privilege of meeting you following the lecture.

I very much want to share with you some information regarding an artist named Otto Schneid, whose life's work I have been introduced to by sheer good fortune. Schneid, a man who dedicated himself to creating art in the early 1960s, was born a Czechoslovakian Jew in 1900, and died in Toronto, Ontario in 1974.

Schneid was a prolific international scholar of Art History. Among the invaluable items left after his death relevant to his extensive research are some manuscripts written in various languages, including the German work entitled "The Jew and His Art in the Diaspora," which was printed, but never published due to its confiscation by the Nazis in Austria in1938. In addition, there are 6000 signed letters and photographs which Schneid personally acquired from numerous prominent Jewish artists in Europe (Chagall, Soutine, and Modigliani, to name a few) prior to the second World War.



Schneid also produced approximately 200 paintings and drawings, primarily in Israel, the United States, and Canada. His subject matter focuses on the Holocaust, as virtually his entire family perished in the war, biblical stories, and Jewish festivals --- events which he imbues with a passion for the intimate. Among the many collections in which his work appear are the British Museum in London, and the Pitti Palace in Florence.

I have enclosed some more information for your perusal: an entry from Who's Who in Canada (1971-72) profiling Otto Schneid; a description of surviving documents and artwork; a brief biography highlighting events in Schneid's life; and a sample of slides showing Schneid's work, with an accompanying list. In all honesty; however, the slides do not do his paintings justice. I have also included a copy of my curriculum vitae for your interest.


Frankly, Mr. Bader, as a Jew as well as an Art Historian, I find it terribly unfortunate that these documents and artworks have been overlooked by various individuals and organizations who have been remiss in investigating their potential academic and monetary value. Presently, this invaluable collection is stored in a private residence in which the atmospheric conditions have the potential to damage the entire collection. I am writing to you in the sincere hope that you might consider getting involved in finding a home for the documents and/or Schneid's artwork. The historic, artistic, and cultural significance of Otto Schneid's efforts demands greater recognition.

I see a number of difficulties with the possible acquisition of Otto Schneid's work:

- 1. If his works are declared to be a national treasure by the government of Canada, does that mean that his works could not be exported from Canada?
- 2. I really cannot judge whether his works are competent or not. If somebody had shown me ten slides of the work of Chagall before I ever heard of Chagall, and then asked me whether I thought them to be great art, I fear that I would have said no. I realize, of course, that this is my problem, but it is a problem.
- 3. In my experience, estates of the works of artists often ask outlandishly high prices for the works, even though there is no established market.

Do you have any idea what Dr. Schneid's estate is asking for all of the works, including the documentation and the manuscripts?

Dear Mrs. Heinemann:

I enjoyed being able to chat with you by telephone this morning.

To tell you a little about myself, I enclose two articles.

As I explained to you, there is no question in my mind that your painting, *The Annunciation*, is by Terbrugghen and was an important and fine work.

The only reason that it did not sell at Christie's in London on July 8th is that many knowledgeable buyers worried about the painting's condition. To me, the greatest worry is the area just above the angel's scarf on the right side of the painting. Almost all depictions of the annunciation show a sewing basket, and I fear that it might have been not just overpainted, but obliterated before restoration. While the last restorer had a great reputation, he also had a number of associates, some of whom clearly were not very good. Just look, for instance, at the restoration in the faces.

Under the circumstances, I cannot possibly consider offering £150,000, which you suggested this morning. I hope that my offer transmitted to you through my good friend, Clovis Whitfield, of U.S.\$100,000 was not hurtful; I certainly did not want it to be.

Since talking to you this morning, I have thought very hard about this and cannot escape the conclusion that the painting was at one time a very fine work, and yet that buying it is a great gamble. What if there is nothing left where the basket had been?







His rival in Bruges was Adrian Ysenbrant who, like Benson, was inspired by Gerard David and the new High Renaissance vocabulary coming from Italy.

The panel relates with variations to two other depictions of the Magdalene by Benson, one in the Groeninge Museum, Bruges, the other in the Royal Collections, Hampton Court, England. (See Friedländer, 1974 nos. 274, 274b). Works by Ambrosius Benson are today in numerous museums including the National Gallery, London, the Louvre and the Prado.

Wanneer men bij Daatselaar & Godhelp binnenstapt, is het eerste wat opvalt een magnifieke empire sofa. Het glanzende mahoniehouten frame, voorzien van klauwpoten en verguld beslag, werd vakkundig bekleed met schitterende oudroze stof met ingeweven bleekgouden lauwerkransen. Door middel van van een ingenieus mechaniek kunnen de zijleuningen worden weggeklapt, zodat een slaapbank onstaat. Men zou zich hier zo op willen neervlijen om rustig een hapje kaviaar te nuttigen uit de 19de-eeuwse kristallen ijskoeler die op een tafel staat te pronken.

In het aangrenzende vertrek valt een stel kolossale zilveren Hollandse Biedermeier kandelaars op. Ze zijn afkomstig uit Den Haag en werden in 1842 door A.D. Pijzel vervaardigd ter gelegenheid van het huwelijk van Anna Wilhelmina Elisabeth, barones van Nagell en Moritz Carl Freiherr von Nagell of Gartrop. Hun wapens werden gegraveerd op de voet.

Tot zover is er niets nieuws onder de zon. Daatselaar & Godhelp staan immers al zo'n twintig jaar bekend om hun collectie antiek van goede kwaliteit. Maar degene die afdaalt in het sfeervolle souterrain, wacht een aangename verrassing. Aan weerszijden van

een grote spiegel hangen twee op het eerste gezicht onopvallende schilderijen: op het ene staat een kerkruïne in een landschap afgebeeld, terwijl het andere een kasteelruïne gelegen aan een rivier of slotgracht laat zien. Beide werken zijn gemongrammeerd IvR 1638 en worden toegeschreven aan Izaäck van Ruysdael (1599-1677). Wat opvalt in de voorstellingen zijn de gedempte tonen, de luchtbehandeling en de bijzondere lichtval. Het zonlicht dat hier en daar door de wolken heen breekt, veroorzaakt lichte vlekken in het landschap. De afwisseling van lichte en donkere partijen versterkt de dieptewerking van het geheel. Hoewel de schilderijen misschien de subtiliteit missen, die men vindt bij de grote 17de-eeuwse meesters van de landschapschilderkunst, zijn ze toch een voorbode van hetgeen door coryfeeën als Jan van Goyen en Jacob van Ruisdael tot bloei werd gebracht. Dit is ook niet verwonderlijk, als men bedenkt dat Izaäck een oudere broer was van de beroemde landschapschilder Salomon van Ruysdael en de vader van Jacob van Ruisdael. De broers trokken vanuit hun geboorteplaats Naarden naar Haarlem, waar Izaäck lijstenmaker en kunsthandelaar werd en daarnaast ook schilder.

Tot op dit moment is slechts een tiental schilderijen bekend dat aan Izaäck van Ruysdael kan worden toegeschreven. De panelen bij Daatselaar & Godhelp zijn afkomstig uit de collectie van een particulier, die rond de eeuwwisseling met behulp van Bredius zijn verzameling samenstelde. Na bijna een eeuw een verborgen bestaan geleid te hebben, zijn ze nu gelukkig weer te bezichtigen. Maar niet nadat ze eerst door gebr. Douwes Fine Arts vakkundig werden gerestaureerd. Zo werden bijvoorbeeld de 250 jaar oude donkere vernislagen verwijderd. De 'ontdekking' van deze Van Ruysdaels is van groot kunsthistorisch belang, omdat ze nieuw inzicht kunnen verschaffen in de arstistieke ontwikkeling van Salomon en Jacob. When I showed my original to Christopher Brown, he thought that it is by the same hand as *The Man in a High Room* at the National Gallery in London. Mine is beveled on all four sides and looks, of course, more like a scholar than a bookkeeper at work.


We so hope that you will have a chance to visit us before long.
