Article about debt was misleading

A July 27 Journal Sentinel article on the finances of the Milwaukee Art Museum was misleading and damaging in spite of the fact that the reporter was given full cooperation and access ("Debt blurring museum vision").

seum vision").

The article stated that the annual expenses of operating the Calatrava extension are far greater than the additional income that has been generated.

Not true.

In the fiscal year that ends this month, both income and expenditure for operations will be about \$13.4 million. Our operations budget for next year shows us making a small surplus — of course, after making the sort of tough economies that all organizations are having the sort of the sort of the sort of tough economies that all organizations are having to make.

that all organizations are having to make.

The investigative reporter based his analysis on figures for the year that ended in August 2002. This did not require much digging. The figures were from financial statements published by the museum in full in its annual report

um in full in its annual report months ago.

We suggested that the reporter wait until figures for the current year were completed in December so he could be up to date and deal with not only the first full year of Calatrava operations, but also a year without construction

costs skewing operational results. He refused.

The first paragraph of the story on the front page said an-

story on the front page said annual expenses have ballooned by \$9 million. Incorrect.

Very roughly, because each year is different, our annual expenses since the Calatrava addition opened have gone up by about \$3 million — and so has income, by a like amount. Membership is up from 13,000 members before the expansion to 30,000 now; admissions are running at 360,000 visitors a year, or double levels before the expansion; annual donations and a successful museum store account for the rest. This is a successful and thriving institution. And don't forget about the art: Leonardo da

about the art: Leonardo da
Vinci, and Gee's Bend to come.
Of course we have a financial problem: the debt. We are very open about it. But we have long-term financing in

place and plans to reduce the debt fast.

The July 28 article was positive about the Calatrava: "Milwaukee got a bargain." It certainly did. What a pity that this article was read by 200,000 fewer people than the 434,000 who buy the Sunday edition of

who buy the Sunday edition of the paper.

I'm new to Milwaukee, but the negativism about its achievements is quite striking to outsiders like me who choose to come here to live.

Dear Ms. Gordon,

A long trip to Europe has delayed my thanking you for your letter of July 7th which really made me smile.

First of all, we have a very long way to go to reach the caliber of the Art Institute of Chicago or the Louvre. To most of us loving art, it would be sufficient if we reach the caliber of Minneapolis and Toledo. Chicago is much larger than Milwaukee. Minneapolis and Toledo are not.

You asked me to increase my last year's contribution of \$1800 to \$2500. Ms. Gordon, you call me by my first name, but obviously you don't know me.

My contribution last year, \$1800, was so small because I thoroughly disliked what the Art Museum was doing.

We have not had a Director who is really interested in old master paintings since Edward Dwight left us, perhaps before you were born. Russell Bowman was disinterested in paintings older than 1950 and the Director before him was even worse.

Now, however, we have an excellent Director, David Gordon, who listens carefully, is thoughtful and knows a great deal.

He is of course deeply burdened by the \$25 Million debt which has been described so carefully in the *Milwaukee Journal*. We have the Board of Trustees to blame for that, not our Director. But of course I was happy to hear Sheldon Lubar assuring us that he would raise the money to retire that debt this year.

Anyway, I do not want to raise my contribution to \$2500, but to \$18,000 and my check is enclosed.

I would appreciate a copy of the Polish exhibition catalogue as well as that of Brooks Stevens. Also, I would appreciate receiving a number of guest tickets to share with the many art historians who visit us.

Once Sheldon Lubar has kept his promise and David Gordon can consider future exhibits rather than worrying about the debt, I would certainly like to be involved in helping more.






Dear Dr. Bader:

MENOMINEE REUNION


An Exciting Discovery

These paintings of Menominee Indian people were done from life in 1858 by Samuel M. Brookes, a Milwaukee artist. The group of five men was commissioned by Mr. S. L. Rood and was donated to the museum by his daughter, Mrs. Sidney Hartwell, in 1941. It had been displayed in a number of temporary exhibits and between times hung in the office of Nancy Oestreich Lurie, head of the Anthropology Section of the Milwaukee Public Museum.

In the spring of 1987, an art dealer in southern California called Dr. Lurie explaining he was settling an estate and had a painting that might interest the Museum because it featured a Wisconsin tribe. As the conversation continued, both the caller and Dr. Lurie were astonished to learn about the existence of each other's paintings, apparently a pair though widely separated for many years.

Bringing About the Reunion, Thanks to Dr. Alfred Bader and the Kohler Foundation, Inc.

Although Dr. Lurie knew the value the dealer placed on the painting was a point to begin bargaining and that damage it had



suffered over the years should enter into the calculations, her experience in such matters was confined to Indian artifacts not paintings. In any event, there were no museum funds at hand to buy the painting or pay for its restoration—and the dealer had other prospects for its sale!

Dr. Alfred Bader of Milwaukee, a highly knowledgeable collector of oil paintings, responded to Dr. Lurie's plea for help. He not only brought his expertise to bear in negotiating an appropriate evaluation, but bought the painting and gave the museum six months to reimburse him without interest.

With this grace period, Dr. Lurie could begin contacting potential donors. She sent out many appeals and after several months of disappointing replies and anxious waiting she received the glorious news that the Kohler Foundation, Inc., Kohler, Wisconsin, would donate the painting to the museum and underwrite the cost of its restoration.


About the Paintings

The picture featuring women was completed in July and the group of men in December of 1858. We do not know the identity of the people in the earlier painting, but the names of the five men are written on the back of the canvas: standing left to right,

Na-a-nos-a-ko-sa and Tik-ko; seated left to right, Ne-kun-a-quok,

Kis-kan-a-keom, and Na-ke-wai-mi.

Well over 100 years before these paintings were made, fur trade




goods--woolen blankets, other textiles, yarn, silk ribbons, glass beads, and the like--had amost completely replaced native materials in the clothing worn by the Menominee and other Woodland tribes. The Indians, however, developed their own styles in the use of these items.


The paintings are important documentary records illustrating hair styles and how garments and adornments like those shown from the museum's collection were actually worn. The depiction of women is unusual. Even when photographs of Indians became available later in the nineteenth century pictures of men continued to greatly outnumber those of women.

About The Artist

Samuel Marsden Brookes was born in England in 1816. In 1833 the Brookes family came to America and settled near Chicago where Brookes visited artists' studios and began to develop his talent as a painter. At the age of 25, he moved to Milwaukee where he supported himself doing portraits, miniatures, and landscapes. In 1845 he left for England and spent the next two years studying art in Europe. Returning to Milwaukee, he soon attracted a regular clientele. The Wisconsin State Historical Society commissioned him to paint some 30 portraits of prominent settlers and Indian chiefs, including the famous Menominee Chief Oshkosh, also painted in 1858. As far as can be determined, Brookes painted the scene with the group of Menominee women out of



personal interest, but the influence of this work is evident in the privately commissioned painting of five Menominee men. In 1862, Brookes moved to California, evidently taking the earlier Menominee painting with him and selling it there. In California, he had a highly successful career as a still-life painter. He died in San Francisco in 1892.

I would greatly appreciate hearing from you whether "the truth can now be told" and, if so, how you would like it told in general.

There is no great hurry, but this has been on my mind and I wanted to get in touch with you now because I will be on vacation for a month during the last of December and first part of January. I'll need it! We are in the last stages of having a mezzanine completed over our office and lab' area to provide more office and storage space. My whole staff and I have been in temporary quarters and possibly next week but certainly the week after we will be moving back. It was horrendous getting packed and moved out and moving back will not be much better.

John Luedke hasn't recovered yet from the History Section's mezzanine project and we commiserate with each other.

Thank you very much for your letter of April 19th. We are very pleased to learn that you are in principle prepared to loan your painting to the Rembrandthuis. We think it's very important for the exhibition to include some original paintings by Rembrandt. Only then the problems involving the 'translation' of painted images into prints can be presented clearly to the public.

First of all I would like to react on your remarks concerning the security situation in the Rembrandthuis. In October 1994 a project group, consisting of security specialists, has drawn up a new overall security plan for the Museum. The program, which was presented last November covers electronical, mechanical and organizational aspects of museum security. The execution cost amounted fl. 350.000,-. The findings of the project group were checked and confirmed by an independent organization specialized in the field of museum security. At this moment the arrangements proposed by the project group are almost completely executed.

We are fully prepared to meet the conditions mentioned in your letter. However, to loan the painting we will have, as you already expected, to raise additional funds. At this moment we are negociating with two possible sponsors. We are confident that these contacts will be brought to a successful conclusion. As soon as we have made any progress in this field, we will let you know.

Next time you are downtown, please do pick up the painting. As I am in and out of the gallery, I will tell my office manager, Cheryl Weiss, where it is kept.



A HISTORY OF MIAD and MIAD/Venture

MIAD began with 25 students and instructors from the former Layton Art School. These students brought their own chairs, tables, and easels and also cleaned and painted the warehouse that had been the former Phoenix Hosiery factory. A faculty wife provided their lunches for several years.

Johnson Wax provided grant funds to begin the school and Andrae Electric provided electric fixtures. Scholarship funds from the Layton School Tour of Homes were also given. Members of the Board were chosen from the community. It was a most exciting and rewarding time for

the volunteers.

MIAD/Venture was given its name in 1982, when a group of women supporters of the Milwaukee Institute of Art and Design decided to form an organization dedicated to funding of scholarships for deserving students. These women were: Mary Buestrin, Jane Daud, Linda Grunau, Dorothy Hoffman, Lynn Laun, Ann Martin, Rosemary Monroe, Teddy Morton, Patti Peterson, Pat Thompson, and Rita Wareham.

During the late 1970's, after the founding of the Milwaukee Institute of Art and design, these women were active in various events involving the school. Scholarship dinners were given each year to help fund worthy students. These were important times in the life of the Milwaukee Institute of Art and Design and, we feel, contributed in no small way to it's rapid growth in recent years. Since 1983 MIAD/Venture has given over \$70,000 for scholarships to deserving MIAD students.

MIAD/Venture BYLAWS

Adopted May, 1983 Amended May, 1984, November, 1992, April 1994

RULES OF PROCEDURE

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of the organization shall be MIAD/Venture

ARTICLE II PURPOSE

The purpose of this organization shall be to promote community awareness of the Milwaukee Institute of Art and Design (MIAD) and to provide financial scholarship support for its students.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP AND CONTRIBUTIONS

Section 1 Membership shall be open to all persons interested

in MIAD.

Section 2 There shall be the following types of members:

Life Benefactor Sustaining

Sponsor

Section 3 Any member in good standing shall have the right to vote, to participate in the meetings, and to hold

office.

Anyone serving on the MAID Board of Directors shall be ineligible to hold office other than the MIAD/Venture President.

Dues shall be payable to the Treasurer on or before

March 31st of each year.

ARTICLE IV MEETINGS

Section 4

Section 1 The annual meeting shall be held in conjunction with the opening of the Senior Show. Other meetings will

be held by special notice.

Section 2 Each membership is entitled to one vote.

Section 3 Motions may be passed by a simple majority of

members present.

ARTICLE V OFFICERS

Section 1 The officers shall be a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary,

Treasurer, and Membership Chairman.

Section 2 Officers shall be elected to serve for a term of one year and may be reelected for an additional term of

one year in the same office.

Section 3 The election of officers shall be held at the annual

meeting. The new officers shall be installed at that time and take office immediately.

ARTICLE VI

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1

President

The President shall call and preside at meetings, shall be an ex-officio member of all committees, and shall have general supervision over all activities subject to the control of the MIAD Board. The President shall be a voting member of the MIAD Board of Directors.

Section 2

Vice-President

The Vice-President shall, in the absence, disability, or resignation of the President, have the powers of the office of President and perform the duties pertaining thereto.

Section 3

Secretaries

- A. The Recording Secretary shall keep records of all meetings and shall have custody of all records and reports.
- The Corresponding Secretary shall send out notices of all meetings and shall carry on such correspondence as the President shall direct.

Section 4

Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be responsible for receipt and expenditure of all funds in accordance with actions of MIAD/Venture. The Treasurer shall keep a record of all receipts and expenditures, and shall present a detailed report at the annual meeting to be kept on file by the Recording Secretary. Scholarship funds and other contributions to MIAD shall be dispersed with the approval of the MIAD/Venture Executive Committee.

Section 5

Membership

The Membership Chairman shall be responsible for formulating and implementing a program for recruiting new members, for the establishment of files, and maintenance of such files. The Membership Chairman shall notify all members of annual dues.

ARTICLE VII

COMMITTEES

Section 1

The standing committees shall be the Executive Committee, the Nominating Committee, and such other committees as are appointed by the President. With the exception of the Executive Committee, the Chairman of the standing committees shall be appointed by the President after the annual meeting to serve for the ensuing year. The Chairman of each standing committee shall present a detailed report

at the annual meeting to be kept on file by the Recording Secretary.

Section 2

The executive Committee shall consist of the elected officers. It shall have the authority to transact such business as the President shall designate, and to act in matters which cannot be held over to a regular meeting. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be called by the President, who shall be the Chairman of the Committee. A simple majority shall constitute a quorum.

Section 3

The Nominating Committee shall consist of a Chairman and two (2) other members appointed by the President. It shall present a slate of officers and nominees for the Executive Committee at the annual meeting, which slate shall have been presented in writing to the membership two (2) weeks prior to the annual meeting.

Section 4

Other committees may be appointed from time to time by the President. There should be a Historian.

ARTICLE VIII

AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting by a majority vote of the members present at said meeting, notice of proposed changes having been sent to all members at least two weeks in advance of the meeting. Amendments to the Bylaws so made shall not become effective until approved by the Board of Directors of MIAD/Venture.

I enclose a copy of that article, which otherwise is very fair.





Dear Mike:

In response to your letter of February 18, I simply do not believe that your proposal is practical. If you go to the museums and say to them, "Would you possibly lend such and such a picture for a show that we might have some time in the future" then the answer will almost always be in the negative. If, on the other hand, you can say to a museum, and particularly to a director who knows you, and you say, "The Milwaukee Art Center and the Wadsworth Atheneum are planning a major show of Rembrandt students for the summer of 1983. Will you please lend us your work which will be very important to the show", then the answer will usually be "yes".

We went through all this before the Bible show. Tracey had feared that few, if any, museums would lend us paintings. In fact, no museum whatever turned us down, though some museums loaned us some, and not others, because of fragility.

What is essential to any show is that the director and the associate director are really enthusiastic about it. Without that enthusiasm it just cannot be done.


