Dear Mr. and Mrs. Spagnoli:

Alfred Bader forwarded to me the photograph you sent him of your painting by Jan Victors depicting Samson and Delilah. It is surely an authentic and representative work by the artist, probably dating from the 1660s--much later than Victors' painting of The Blinding of Samson in Braunschweig (Herzog Anton Ulrich-Museum), which I believe is one of his earliest works from the 1640s. Your painting is closest in style and compositional arrangement to Victors' undated Jacob and Laban, last recorded in New York with the art dealer Victor D. Spark (see Debra Miller, "Jan Victors (1619-76)," Ph.D. diss., University of Delaware, Newark, 1985, vol. 1, p. 293, cat. 43).

Before I received your photograph, I had catalogued two versions of the subject of Samson and Delilah by Victors: the aforementioned painting in Braunschweig (Miller, vol. 1, pp. 301-02, cat. 64--I believe Dr. Bader sent you xeroxes of the relevant pages); and one unidentified work of unknown whereabouts (vol. 1, p. 335, cat. U14). It is likely that the following references (from the fiche collection at the Rijksbureau voor Kunsthistorische Documentatie, The Hague), which do not conform to either of those two versions, are to your painting:

It looks to me like there are, indeed, 14 figures in your painting, although it is difficult to tell from the photograph. If you have any additional information on the provenance of your painting, I would appreciate your sending it to me. How, and when, did the painting come into your collection? I plan to publish my monograph on Victors in the future, when the necessary funds become available to my publisher; your painting should be included. In the meantime, I will send you off-prints of three of my published articles on Victors under separate cover.

Dear Deborah:

May I ask you for your help with a Victors problem?

As you will see from the enclosed, Sotheby attempted to sell in New York on April 5, 1990, Lot 173, a painting described on the enclosed Xerox, which they called Horst. It seems to me that Sumowski is right in calling the painting and early work of Victors, but you must keep in mind that Sumowski knew $\underline{\text{only}}$ the engraving which he reproduces in his Volume IV.

I wonder whether you have seen the original, or if not whether you can tell from the black and white photograph and the small color illustration given on plate XXIV of the Sotheby catalog whether I am correct in my thinking that this really is an early Victors.

The painting was unsold in 1990 and was sold for a much lower price at an arcade sale at Sotehby New York this January.


My son David has now found an architectural job in Philadelphia, and so I very much hope that we will now get to Philadelphia more often and will have a chance to visit with you.

Dear Debbie:

Isabel and I are so happy to have your letter of November 7 with the news about your work.

Quite some time ago, Egbert Haverkamp-Begemann told me that he liked your thesis very much indeed, and frankly I find it difficult to believe that he would hold up a manuscript so long. I telephoned him immediately to inquire, only to find that he is out of the country until early December. Unfortunately, Isabel and I are leaving for England and Holland next Tuesday and so I won't be able to try to get in touch with him again until our return at the very end of December. I will talk to him then and let you know. I have a sneaking suspicion that Davaco is not very efficient and are blaming Egbert.

May I ask you for a very great personal favor? Prof. Dr. Werner Sumowski is now working on Volume IV of his monumental work on Rembrandt students. In that volume will be Victors. He needs photographs of three paintings in your thesis, specifically, your Nos. A2, A24 and A41. Would it be possible for you to send these to him on loan for just a very few days so that he can have prints made for his book. His address is: Hessenwiesenstrasse 4, D7000 Stuttgart-Rohr, West Germany, and I would suggest that you send them by registered air mail. He has promised to return them to you within a few days.

Needless to say, I know how vital these photographs are for your book, and if you would like to have good copies made, just for insurance, please have your photographs photographed and I will be happy to reimburse you for all of your expenses.

Prof. Sumowski is also looking for a photograph of a painting which was owned by Jan Klein in New York some 20 years ago, which he then called Victors, but which may not really be by Victors. 
Do not worry for a moment about the attribution of my Joseph Explaining His Dreams. I would be worried if you thought that it was a bad painting or a copy, and actually I prefer puzzles to the sure thing. As you will see from the enclosed, Dr. Zafran also doubts that my painting is by Victors, but while I do believe there is a relationship between my painting and that in North Carolina, I do not really believe that both are necessarily by the same hand.

Your explanation for Victors not painting any New Testament subjects because he was a strict Calvinist is interesting, but can you support it? Were there in fact any other strict Calvinist painters who never painted New Testament subjects?

I will go through the thesis more carefully during the next week and write to you more, shortly. In the meantime, please note No. 16 on page 40 and 81 of the enclosed.

Dear Alfred:

Enclosed is a copy of the penultimate draft of my dissertation on Jan Victors! My dissertation defense is scheduled for 15 April. 2:00 p.m., at the Art History Department of the University of Delaware. I have until 6 May to present the final copy to the Office of Graduate Studies. I would appreciate your comments and any suggestions you might have for revisions. You are of course welcome to attend my defense, as well, although I would certainly understand if your schedule does not permit it. I know you will be giving a lecture at the University on 24 April, and I look forward to seeing you then, if not before.

Thank you for your letter concerning the study of volker Manuth in Berlin. I had corresponded with him a few years ago: at that time he was planning a dissertation on Victors, unaware that I was already so far along. I hadn't heard from him since, so I'm glad to know that he changed his topic, presumably to avoid overlap with mine. His new research topic should be quite interesting: I've only touched on some of the problems in my chapter on historical subjects.

You will find that I've catalogued your painting of Joseph Fxplaining His Dreams as an uncertain attribution to Victors, for the reasons given in the catalogue entry (catalogue U12, p. 334). I'm still not absolutely convinced that it is by Victors, but 1 don't feel certain that it can be rejected either. I'm sorry I wasn't able to reach a definitive conclusion.

Right now I'm working on an article for Mercury (the Hoogsteder-Naumann quarterly), on Victors' Ruth and Naomi. Otto told me you had seen it and had some comments about the fabric of one of the costumes, which I would be interested to hear. I would also like to request your help and expertise in identifying the subject of a painting in my catalogue, previously called a Family Reunion, which I believe to be an Old Testament theme, similar in conception to so many others by Victors. I have enclosed a separate photocopy of this work (catalogue 87).

I hope you enjoy reading my dissertation and anxiously await your comments. Best regards to you and your family.



I arrived safely back in Philadelphia, after an exhausting 7 weeks in Europe. I saw a lot of Victors, which was very helpful--there's quite a difference between black and white photographs and the real thing! I've changed my mind about a few paintings after seeing them in person. Everyone in the museums I visited was wonderful, they couldn't have been more receptive or interested in my research. Eastern Europe was quite an experience. It was exciting to see the collections there, the curators were among the most friendly and helpful I've met, and many of the cities were breath-taking (especially Prague)--but conditions there are disquieting, to put it mildly. I collected many more photos for my catalogue, and ordered the remainder from the RKD.

Since I've been back, I've gone over my catalogue raisonne again, and I've also gotten all the Victors' documents in order. I'm getting started on the biographical chapter now-I hope the writing will go smoothly. Otto's partner, Hoogsteder, recently bought a beautiful Victors (Ruth and Naomi). I haven't seen the painting yet (although I knew of it from a photograph in the Witt). They are thinking of publishing a quarterly journal featuring works in their gallery, and have asked me to write a brief article on the Victors. It is an interesting piece--formerly attributed to Jan de Bray, and also misidentified as Vertumnus and Pomona.




