Dear Julius,

Your thought-provoking letter of April 12th has given me a great deal of pleasure for two reasons.

First, I agree with you that Jan Lievens at his best can rival Rembrandt, but the idea that he was really first class only when he was close to Rembrandt is mistaken, and I enclose a photograph and description of a late portrait which I like even better than the painting called Rembrandt's Mother. The portrait is of Jacob Junius who was born in 1608 and so I presume that Lievens painted it in the 1660's. The second cause for pleasure was the fact that you ended your letter with "Best greetings Julius" and I very much hope that you won't mind my addressing you as Julius, and hope that you will call me Alfred.

Your comments about my double portrait show how difficult it is to judge a painting from photographs only. My restorer's comments are enclosed, and they show clearly in what good condition the portrait is. I will consider the possibility that it might be Italian, although I can't think of anything comparable. Charles Munch has restored more Rembrandt school paintings than almost any other restorer, and he has wondered whether this painting might not be by Samuel van Hoogstraten, pointing to the costume in Sumowski 838 and the strange, almost 19th century way of seeing as in Sumowski 880.

It is one of my favorite paintings, whoever painted it, and I just hope that your travels will bring you to Milwaukee so that I can show you the original.

Dear Professor Held:

What a pity that we saw each other only so briefly at the meeting of Netherlandish art historians, and that Isabel and I will not have a chance to visit you in Bennington this spring.

Recently, I acquired a painting for my personal collection, of which I enclose a photograph and a color snap shot. I must tell you that I love this work even though I don't know who the artist is, nor even what the subject is.

When it was sold at Sotheby's in London last December it was attributed to Sweerts, but I am much more confident of your little gem being by Sweerts than of this painting. Various other suggestions have been made, for instance, Jacob van Oost, the Elder, and Jan Lievens from his Antwerp period, but I find neither convincing.

At first, I thought that the figure in the background may be a woman, but Isabel doesn't think that women in the 17th century would wear such berets. Could it be an allegory of old age?

Physically the painting is in excellent condition; what little abrasion there is, is all around the edges where a frame must have rubbed.

I would appreciate any help you can give me.

Dear Professor Held:

Thank you for your very kind letter of January 16.

Could we tentatively set Saturday afternoon and evening, May 15, as a date for our meeting in Bennington? Of course, I will confirm early in May to make sure that the visit is still convenient.

Perhaps my experience with that wonderful Rembrandt portrait sold to the Rijksmuseum, RRP-A80, has taught me to concentrate far more on the face of a portrait than on the hands. In the portrait by Rembrandt the hands may be by a student and only the face is truly inpainting.

With the Flemish portrait here, there is no doubt in my mind that the artist concentrated far more on the face, but I do not really think that face and hands were done by two different artists. Perhaps if you saw the original you would not feel as strongly.

I have now also sent photograph and color transparency to Roger Mandle at the National Gallery to get his comments about the attribution to Jordaens rather than to de Vos.

The inscription really does say SU with a period after the SU, but of course a slight paint loss might have changed the "i" to a period.

How interesting that the young man looks faintly familiar to you; should the penny drop please let the Milwaukee Art Museum know.





Isabel and I plan to be in New England the weekend of October 26, 27, and I am wondering whether we might drive up to Vermont and spend a little time with you.



Dear Dr. Bader:

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What an interesting and instructive exhibition you (and the other authors) have brought together; let me thank you warmly for the catalogue and the photographs which you sent under separate cover.

As you can imagine I turned the pages with considerable interest, occasionally with amusement, once or twice with a question mark, but I am so deeply involved in two projects (one is the new printing, with additions, of the Rembrandt essays of 1969) that I can not go into details. Still, I am sure the exhibition must have been an eye-opener for many of the visitors.

There is, however one item in the catalogue which has some special significance for me - the painting of an old woman by Jacob van Campen. I don't know if you are aware that I have mentioned that picture in a footnote of an article I wrote for Master Drawings, 1985, p.53, note 21. One of my colleagues - I don't remember who - had shown me a photo and its similarity with the print is indeed striking; whethe my, admittedly tentative, attribution of drawings to van Campen will find acceptance remains to be seen. (By the way, if you read the Author's Note at the end of the text, please correct the word "regulated" to what I had written: relegated; it is close to the end.)

I am still very much interested in van Campen and may be abl to attribute a truly important work to him (though the collector who owns it has much grander ideas for it). I wonder therefore if I could get a photo of your painting, and while I am at it, could I also get from you aphoto of the print of Laurent Coster, after van Campen, 'reprodaced on p. 82 of the catalogue?

The next issue of Master Drawings has a few more such head studies, mainly by deCrayer.

Once more my best thanks, also for the permission to publish the painting of Rembrandt's father (about which I have no doubts),
