Dr. Alfred Bader

Dr. Bader was born in Vienna, Austria in 1924. He graduated from Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario with a degree in Engineering Chemistry in 1945 and from Harvard University in 1950 with a degree in chemistry. He worked for a Canadian paint company, which was acquired by Pittsburgh Plate Glass. He was offered a position in the research laboratory at PPG in Milwaukee in 1950. In 1951, Dr. Bader founded the Aldrich Chemical Company, which became incorporated with the Sigma Chemical Company in 1975. He has served as president, CEO, chairman and chairman emeritus of Sigma-Aldrich. Dr. Bader is currently operating an art gallery that he started in 1992 in the Astor Hotel in Milwaukee. Dr. Bader was the curator of "The Bible through Dutch Eyes" exhibition at the Milwaukee Art Center in 1976 and co-curator with his wife Isabel of "The Detective's Eye" exhibition in 1989. He has published widely on chemistry, art and the Bible.

History of the ACS in St. Louis

Chemistry came to St. Louis with the arrival, in 1800, of Antoine Saugurain, physician, chemist and explorer. The geographical situation of St. Louis, the Gateway to the West, made it the logical city, west of the Mississippi, to be a chemically oriented community. Mallinckrodt, the first chemical company west of Philadelphia, was founded in 1867. By 1903, the need for a society where chemists could meet, discuss their interests and increase their knowledge was evident. On February 3, 1903, the St. Louis Chemical Society was organized. Efforts were made to affiliate the Section to the American Chemical Society (ACS), the Academy of Science and the Society of Chemical Industries. On December 7, 1907, amongst a quite large and enthusiastic crowd, St. Louis became a member of the American Chemical Society. Activities of the Section during the next few years included the establishment of a library of Chemical journals, consultation on the "Great Water Controversy" on the method of purification of the St. Louis water systems and strong support of the Pure Food and Drug Law. In April 1920, when the Leather and Sugar Sections held their first meetings and the Dye Section became a Division, the St. Louis Section hosted the 59th National Meeting of the ACS. In 1928, there were 260 members within a territory 75 miles from St. Louis, Missouri, and 25 miles in Illinois. The Section hosted the National Meeting, April 16-19, 1928, at the

Chase Hotel. The Midwest Regional Meeting in May, 1932, drew a large crowd in spite of the Depression and the National Meeting held at the Jefferson Hotel, April 7-11, 1941, had almost 4,000 registrants. The first Midwest Award was given to a resident of the Midwest Region who has made meritorious contributions to the advancement of pure or applied chemistry or chemical education in 1944. In 1948, Charles Allen Thomas, Monsanto, was president of the ACS. The Midwest Regional Meeting was held in St. Louis that year and there were 2725 chemical plants producing 4030 items. In 1951, after topping 1000 members in 1950, Dr. Desiree leBeau, Research Director, Midwest Rubber Reclaiming Co., was the first woman to serve as Chair. During the 1960's steady progress was made in the Section. The "Chemical Bond" was initiated in 1965, continuing education courses were offered at Washington University (1965 and 1968), started the chemistry seminar program at St. Louis University and created the Steering Committee for long range planning and continuity in 1967. In 1970, the St. Louis Section Award was initiated to be given annually to members or affiliates of the Section who has shown outstanding contributions to the profession of Chemistry as well as demonstrated potential to further the advancement of the chemical profession. The excellence of Chemistry in the St. Louis area has produced several Nobel Prize winners such as Drs. Joseph Erlanger, Edward Doisy, Carl and Gerty Cori and Arthur H. Compton. In 1973, there were 206 firms in the St. Louis area producing chemicals and allied products with about 1,600 employees. The 1984 spring National Meeting was held in St. Louis and the Midwest Regional Meeting in 1989. The Section has received the Outstanding Performance of a Local Section Award in 1984, 1986, 1992, 1993 and 1996. Section members, Clayton Callis and Al Heinenger, went on to become National ACS Chairs in 1989 and 1991, respectively. Currently, there are approximately 1850 members in the Section. Members are involved in the Awards, Education, Professional Activities, Program, and Publicity and Public Relations Committees. They are actively involved in Chemical Progress Week, National Chemistry Week and special projects such as "Speak Out - The Chemical World" and "Kids and Chemistry". The St. Louis Section continues to introduce new programs to its members and the community to further our understanding of the things around us and how chemistry is everything.

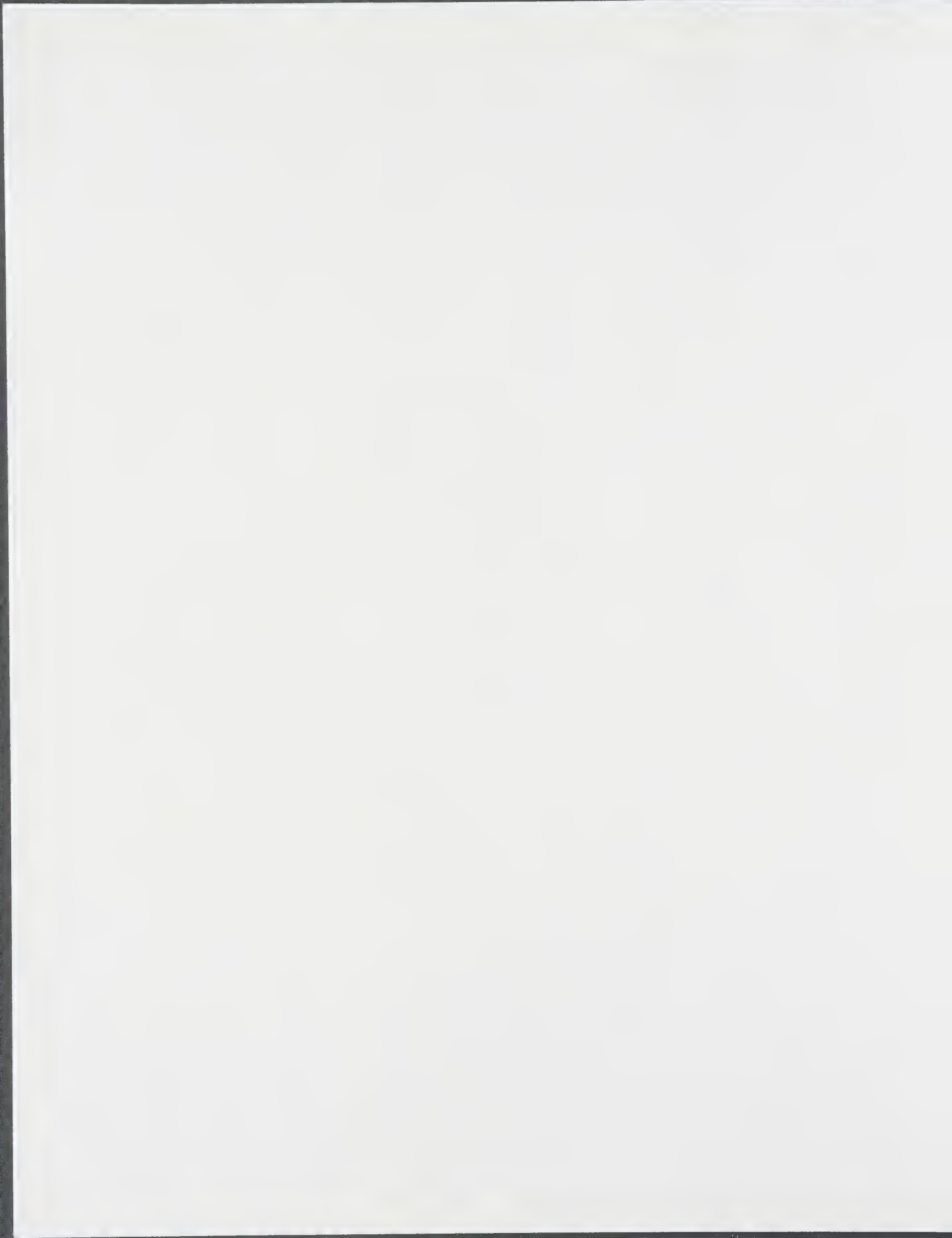
All in all, it was a most enjoyable visit, except for the very long drive.

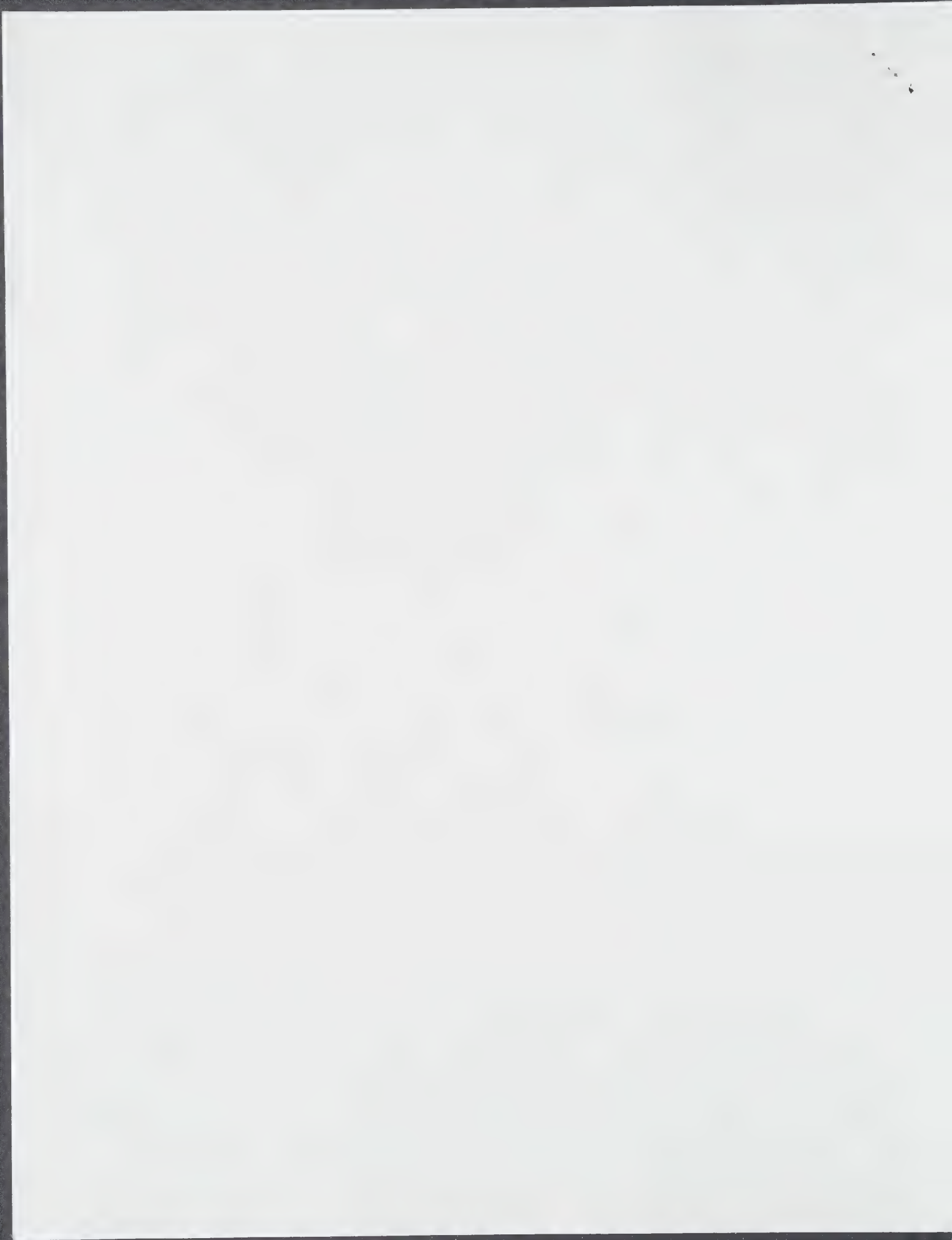

As you know, I have only just returned from a long trip to England and so have only just seen your fax of yesterday.

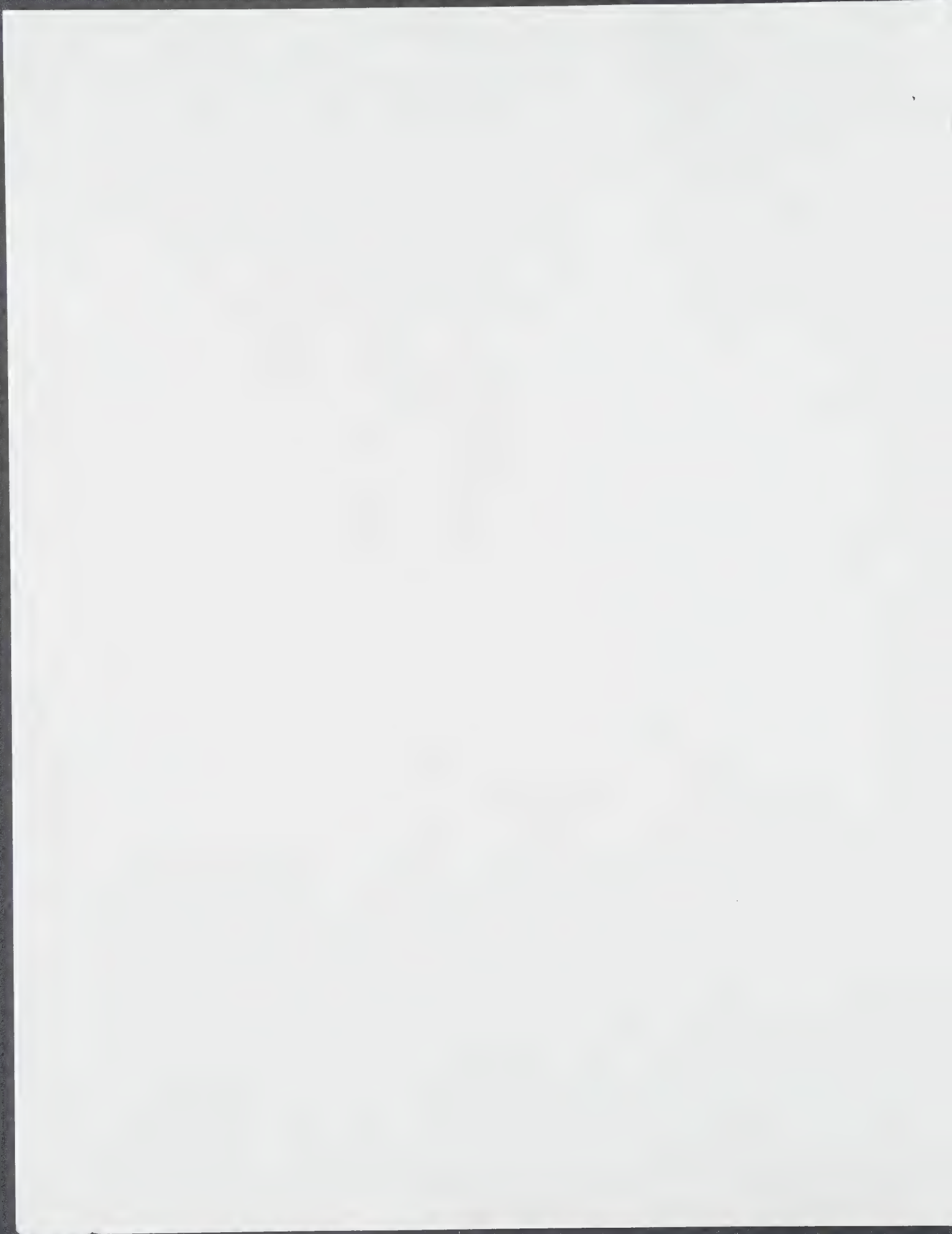

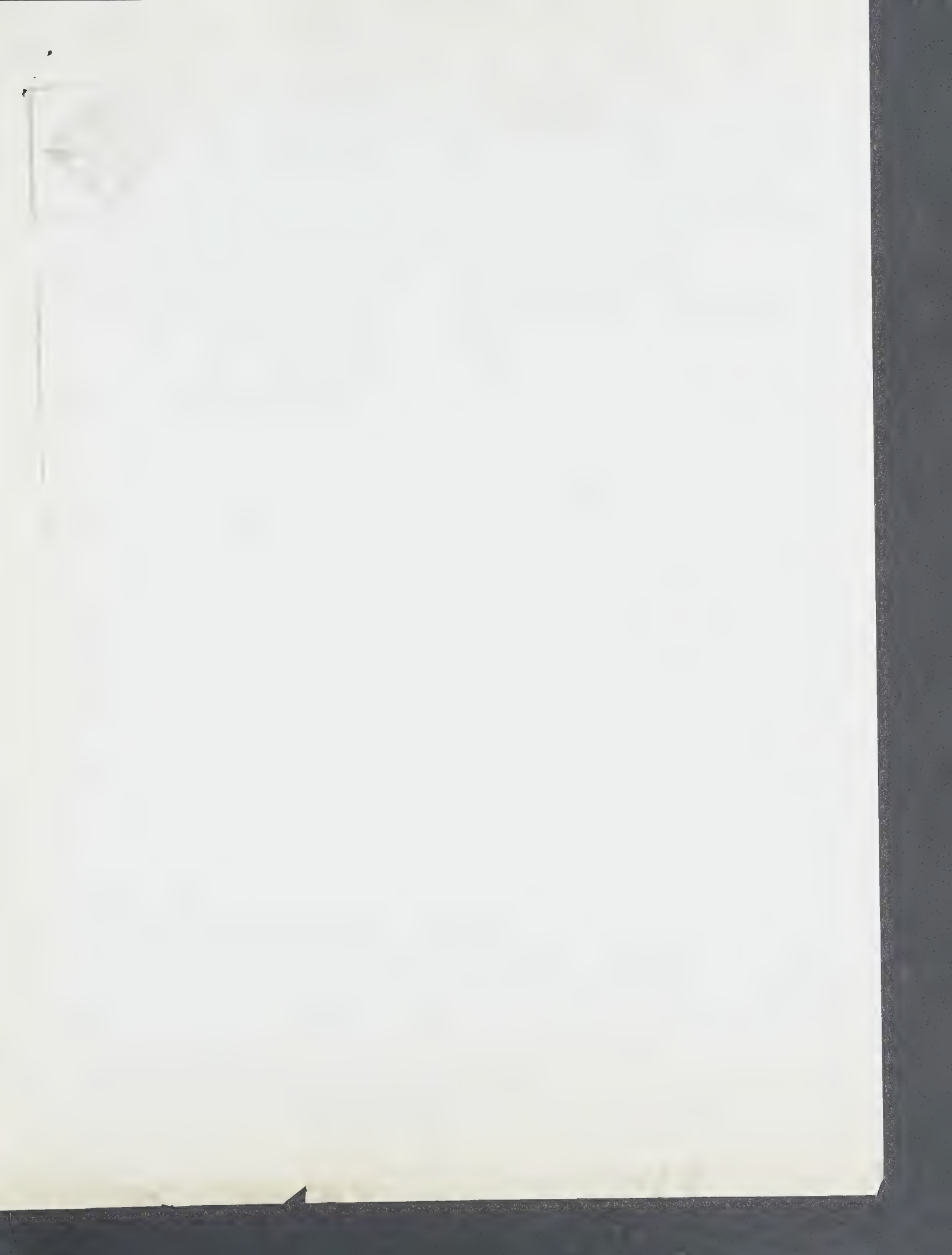

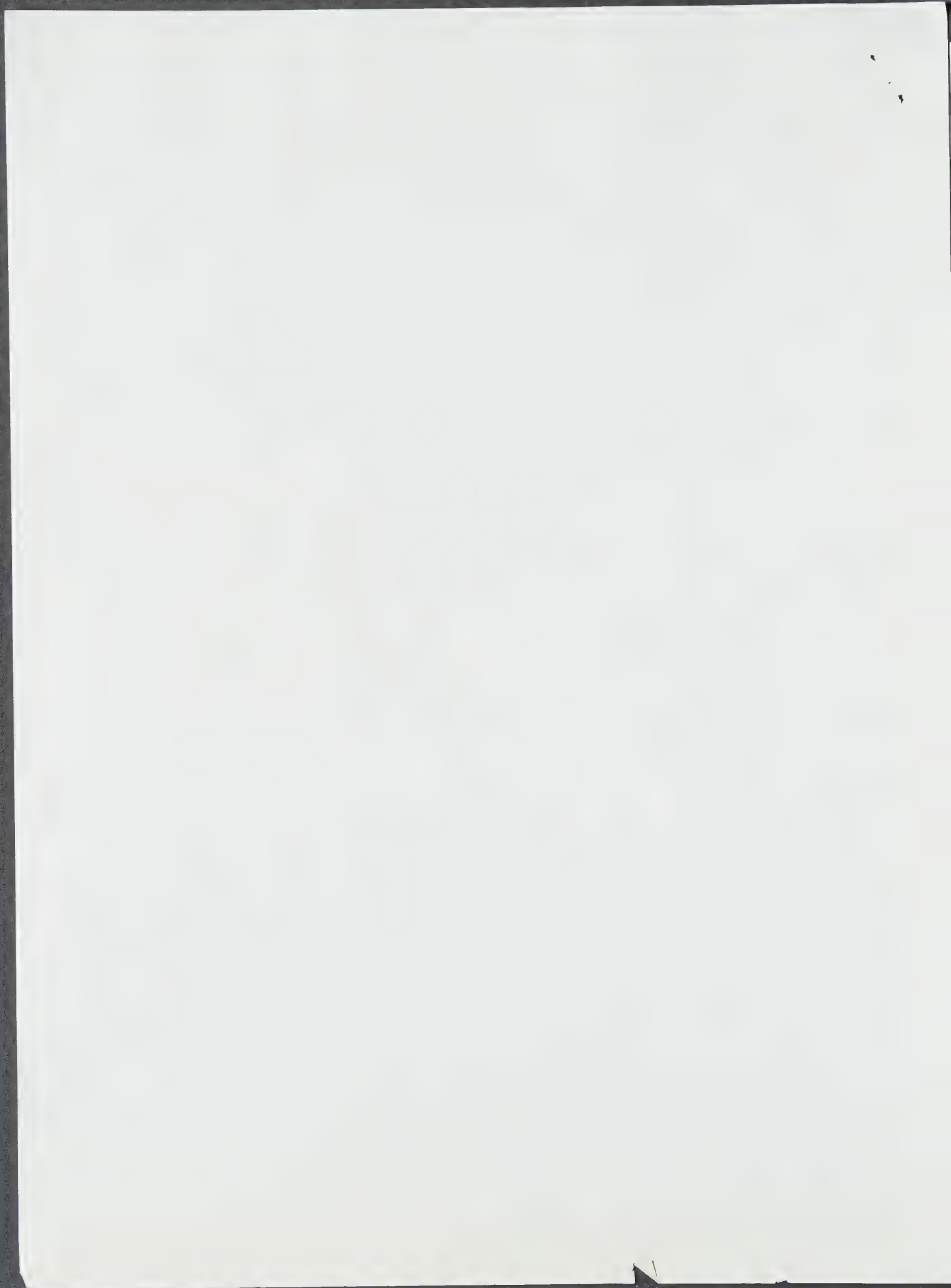

Isabel and I have never been to Kansas before and much look forward to this trip.

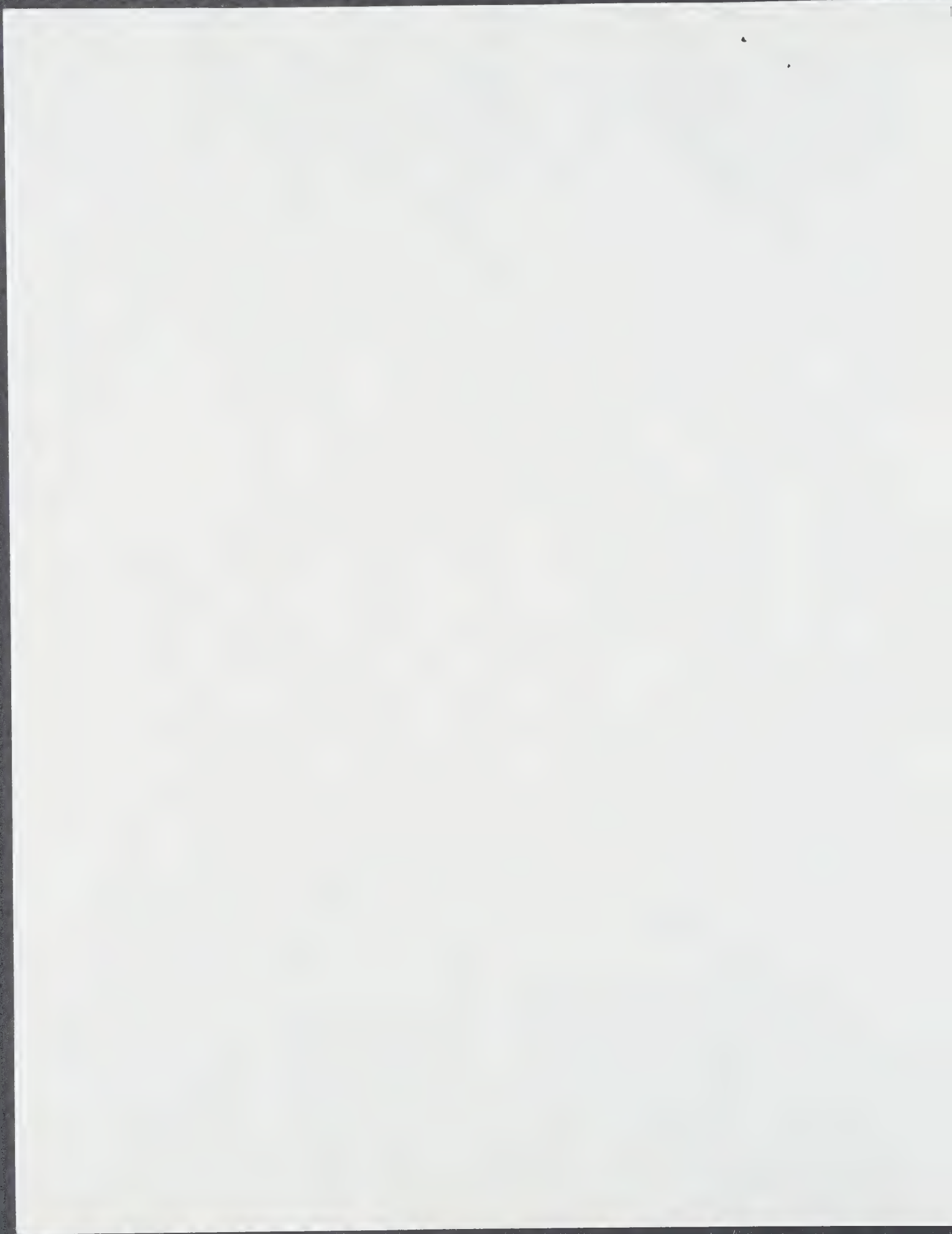

As Sarah may have told you, I would like to give the ACS Sections the choice between Talks #1 and #3 on the enclosed menu.

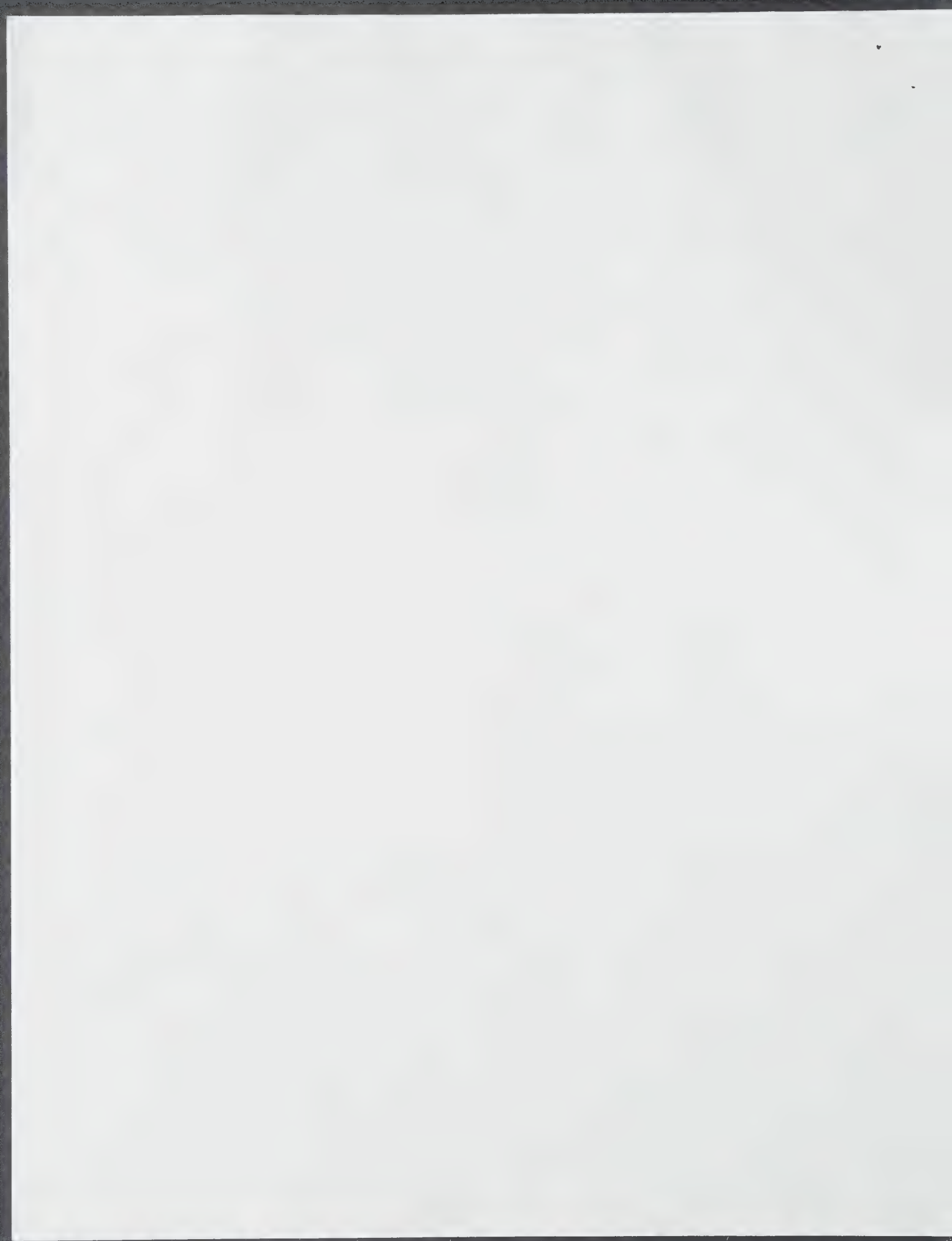
But then I always enjoy giving a second talk, either at an art museum or the art history department of a university or to the chemistry department.

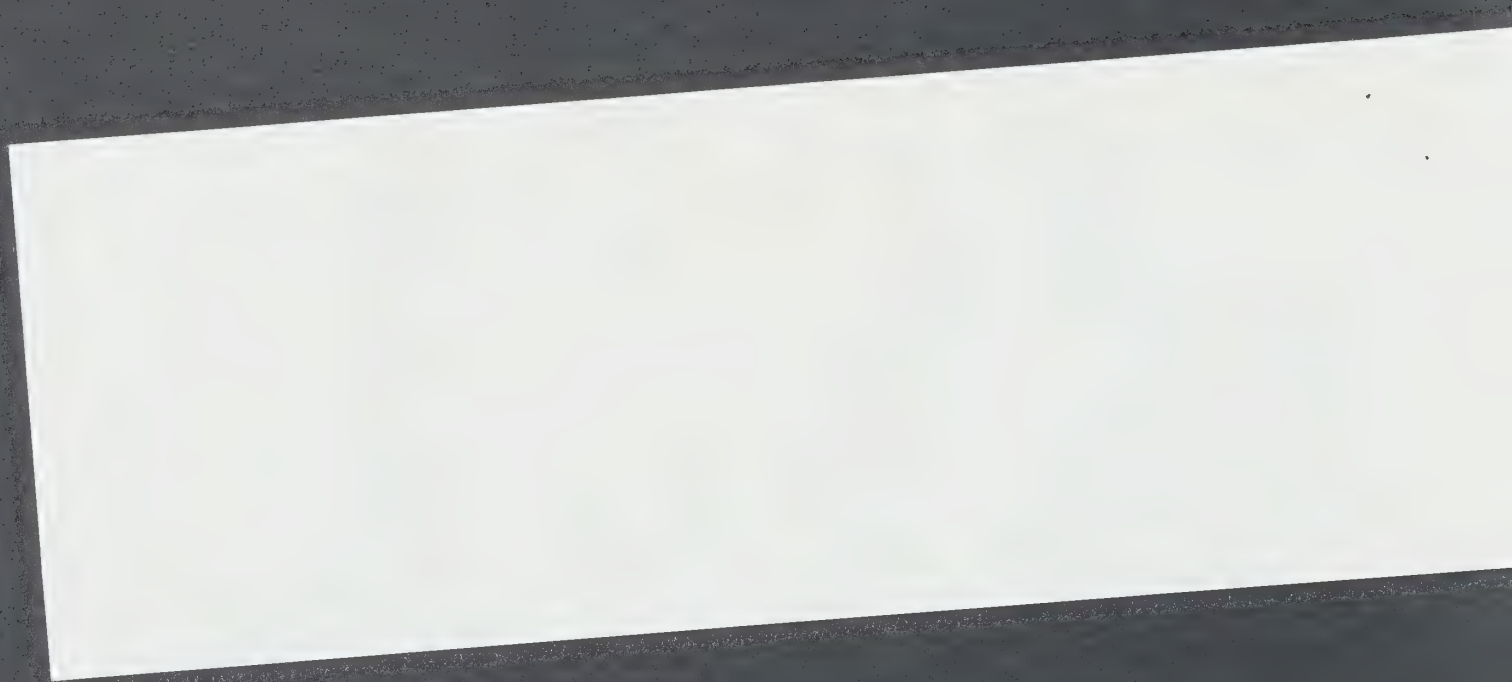

For the ACS meetings, I would like to present either Talk #1, *The History of Aldrich*, or Talk #3, *Richard Anschütz: A Detective at Work*.

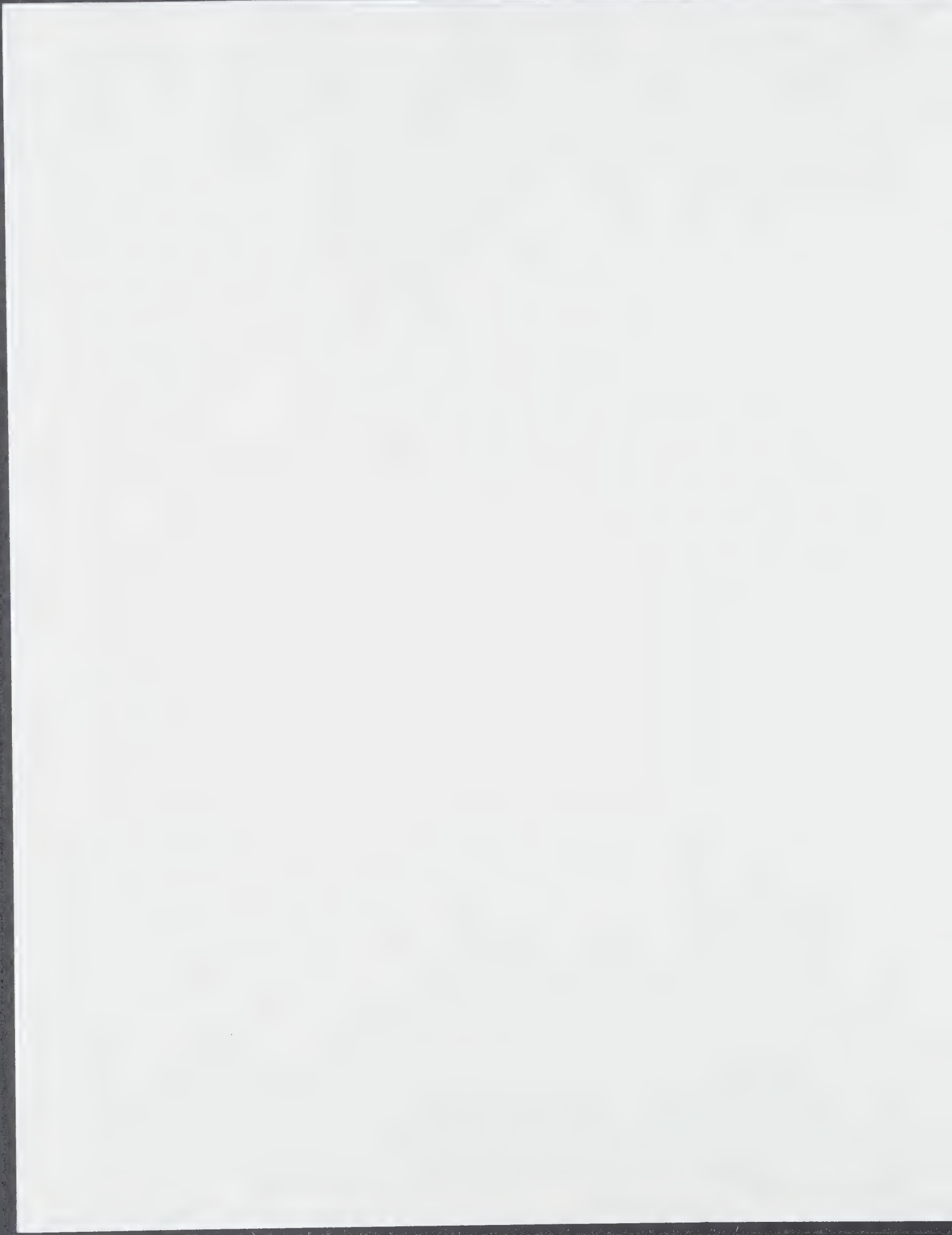

The downs were partly related to the expenses and partly to the set-up in St. Petersburg.

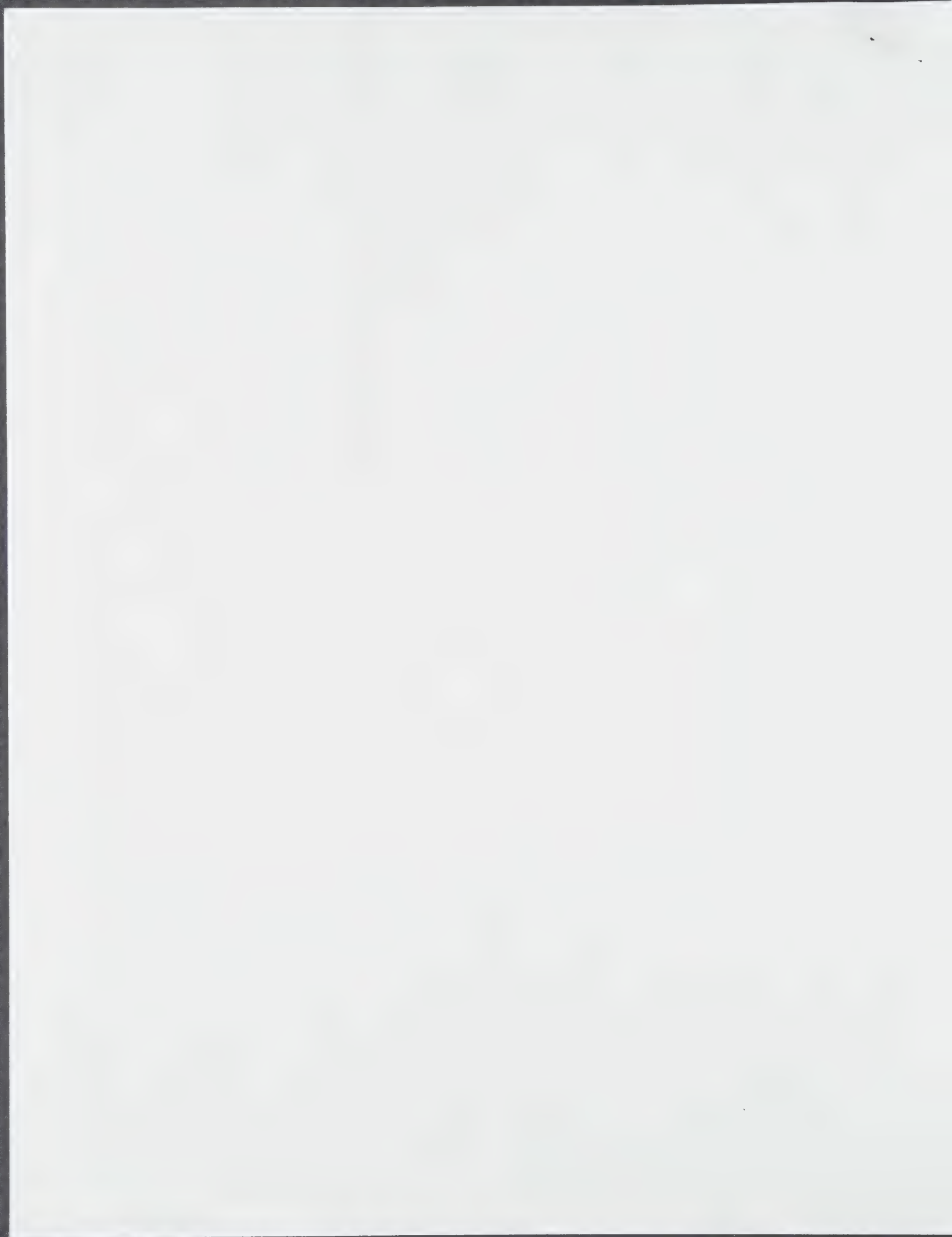

And of course it was much easier to drive with someone who knows Florida, rather than having to drive ourselves.

I felt badly about the high motel charges and you will note that we tried to make up for it by eating at the very least expensive restaurants.

The problem in St. Petersburg was quite different.

The man in charge both of the Tampa and St. Petersburg meetings was Steve Miller. When you meet him you find him to be a likeable, laid-back, person. But he has no experience how to

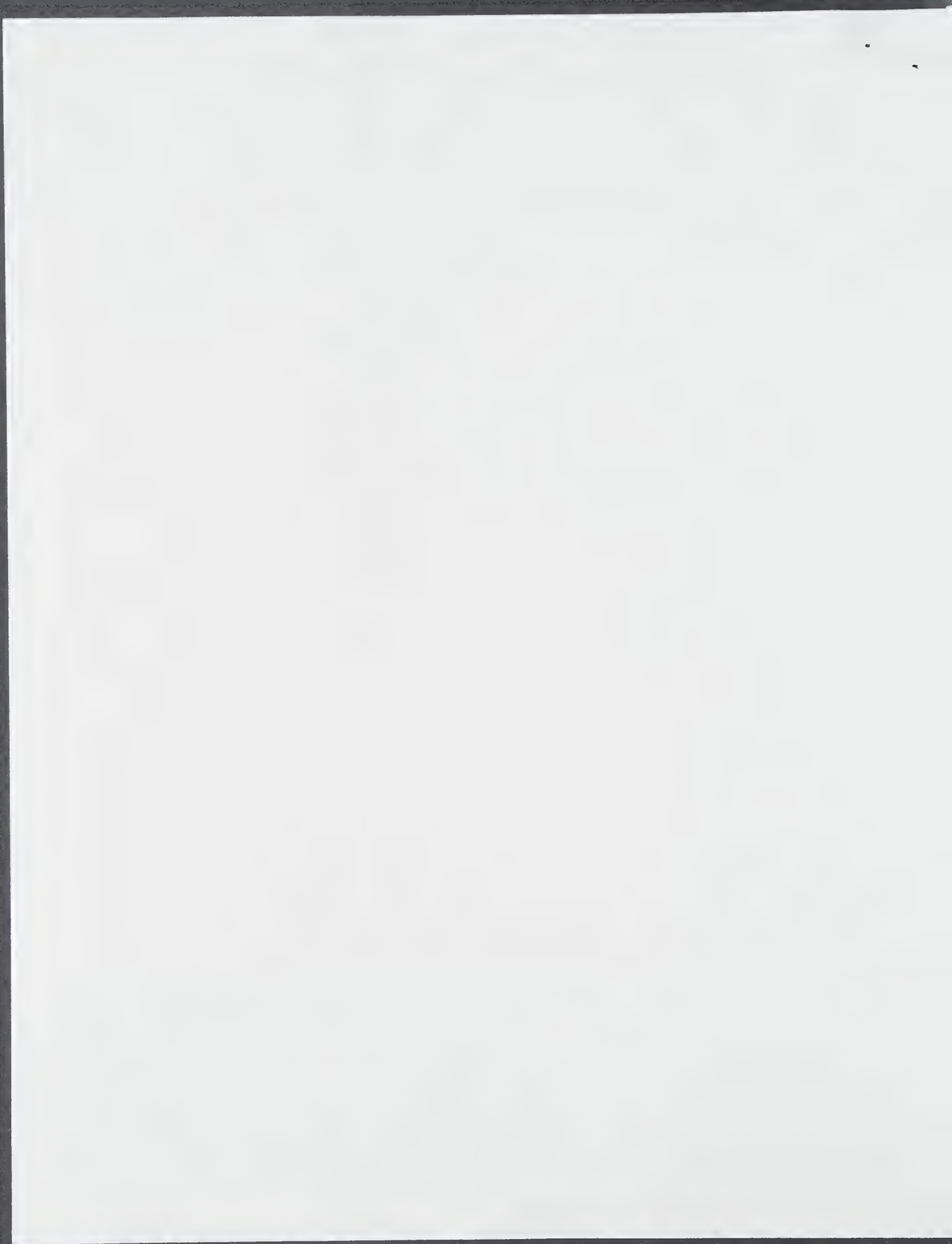
Would Isabel and I go to Florida again if we could live our life over again? Of course we would - because there was so much which was really enjoyable.

Surely you received my fax of December 5th from England, a copy of which is enclosed.

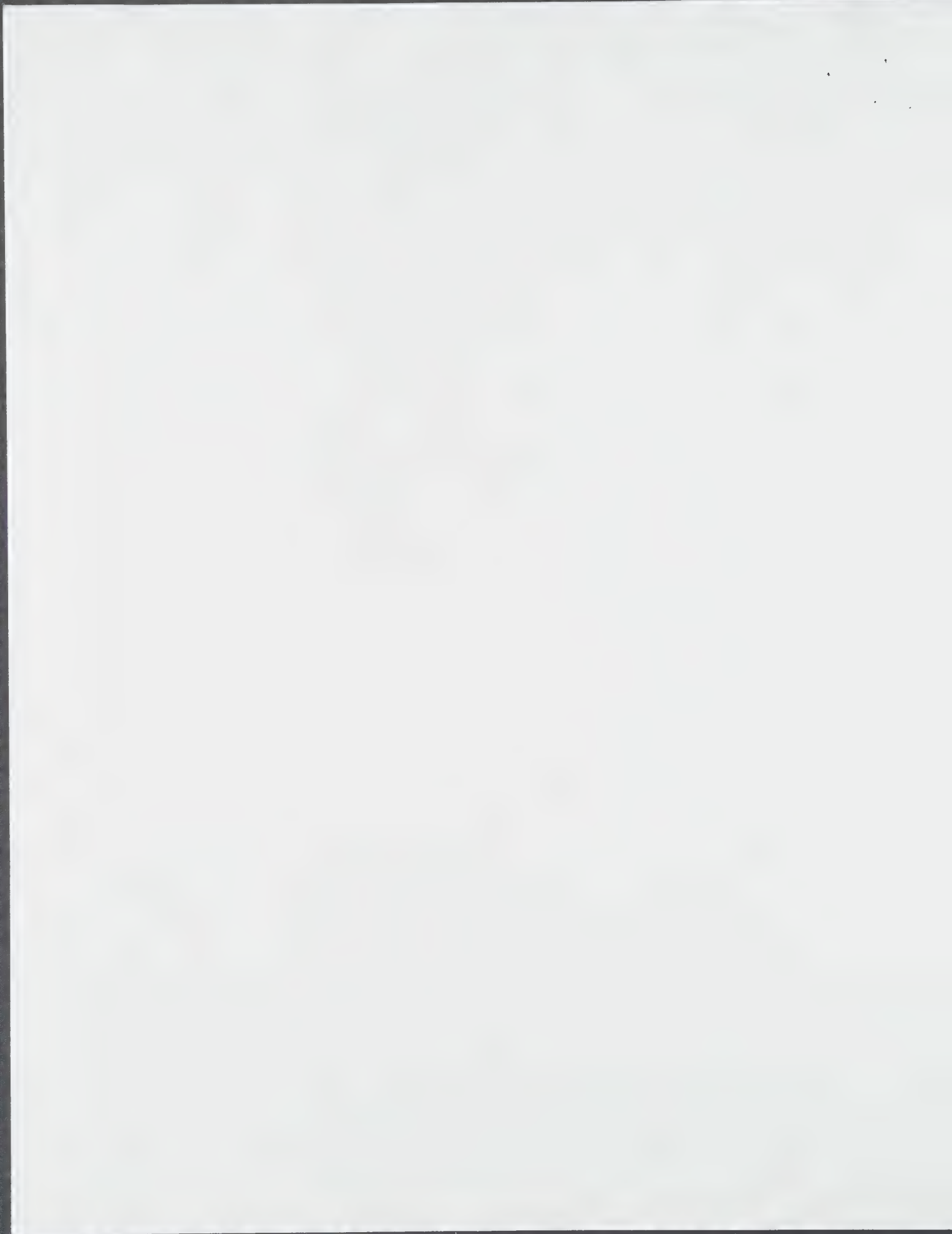

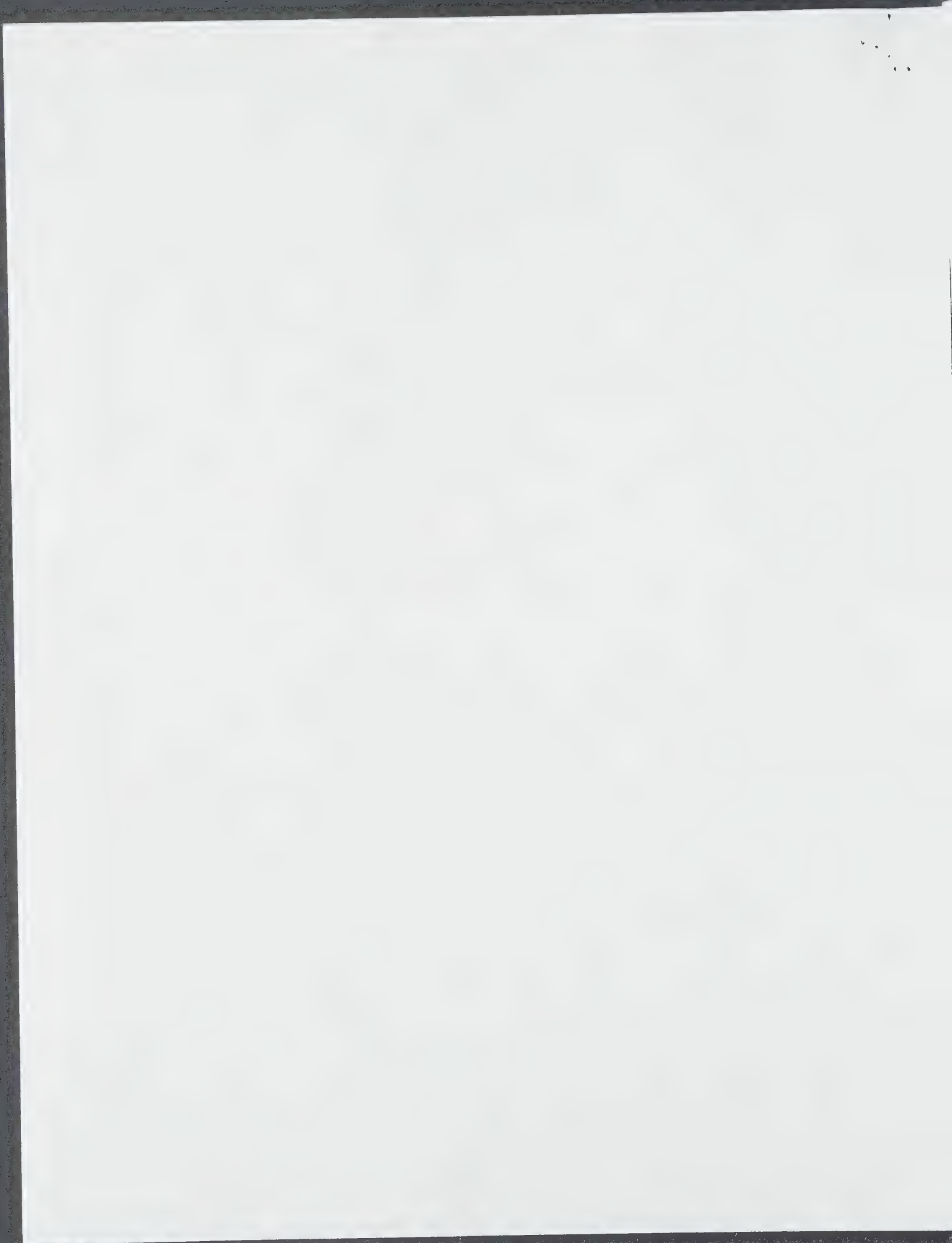
All in all, it was a most enjoyable visit, except for the very long drive.

May I suggest the following:

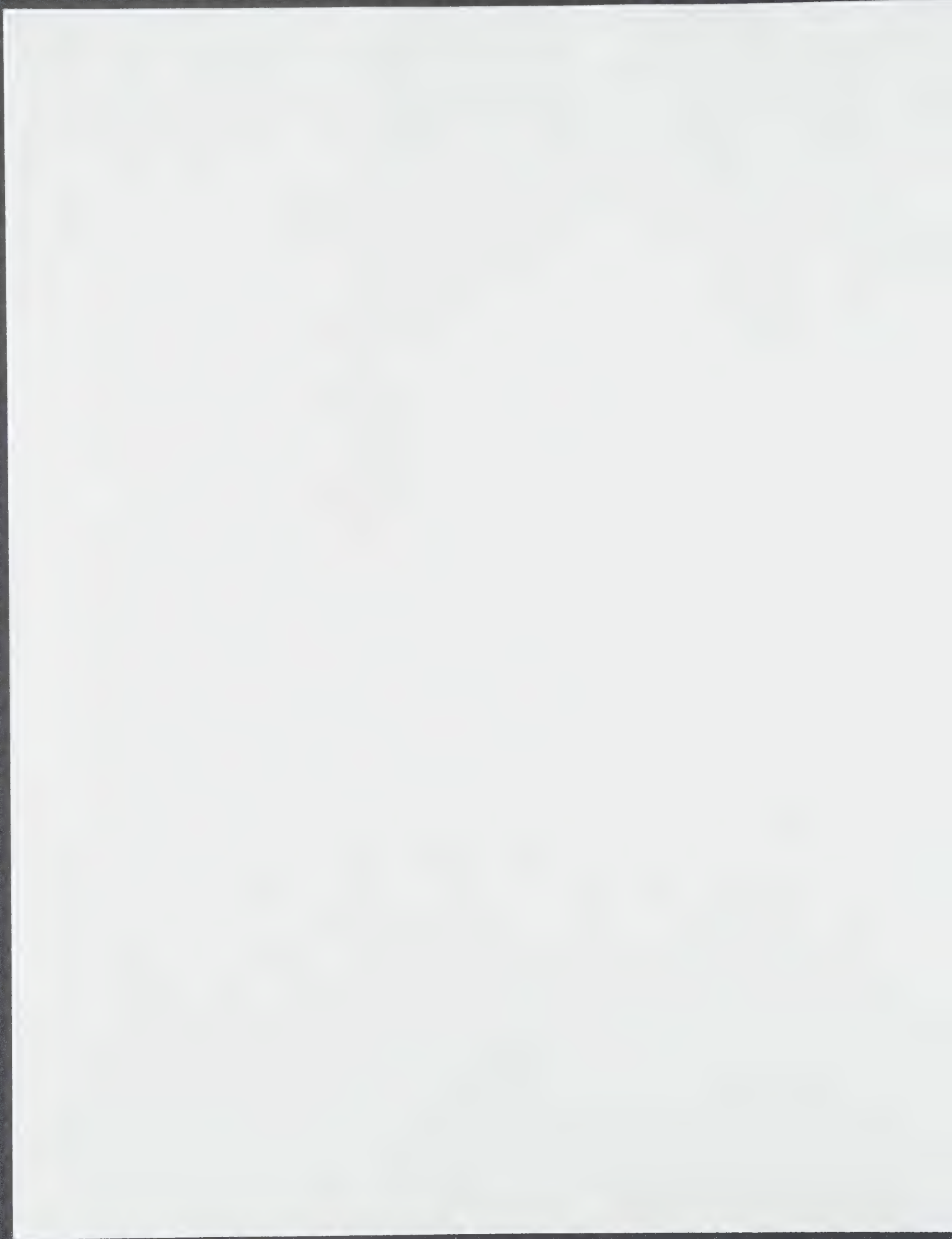
1. Monday, April 11th - Memphis

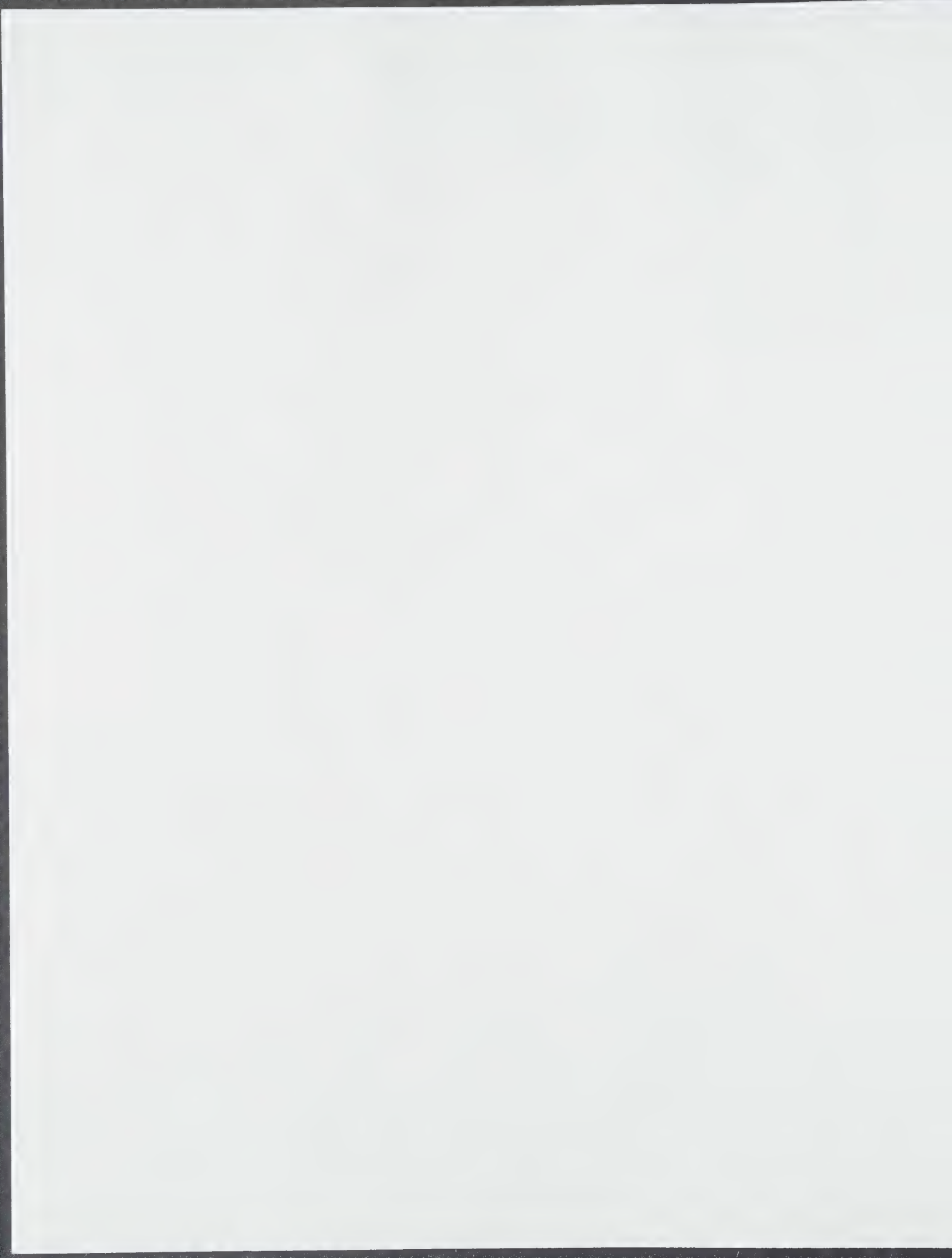

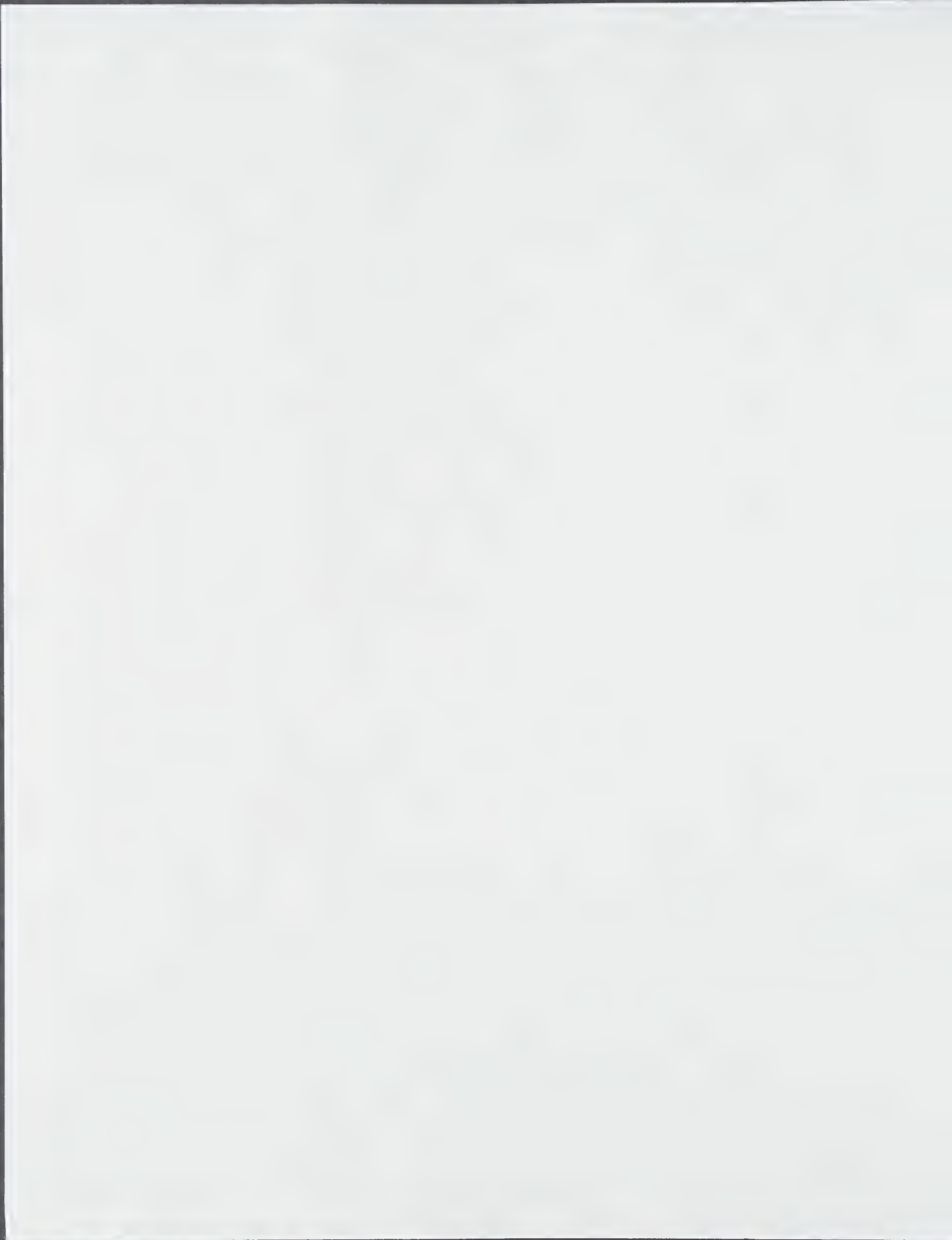
Please do obtain advice from the local sections.

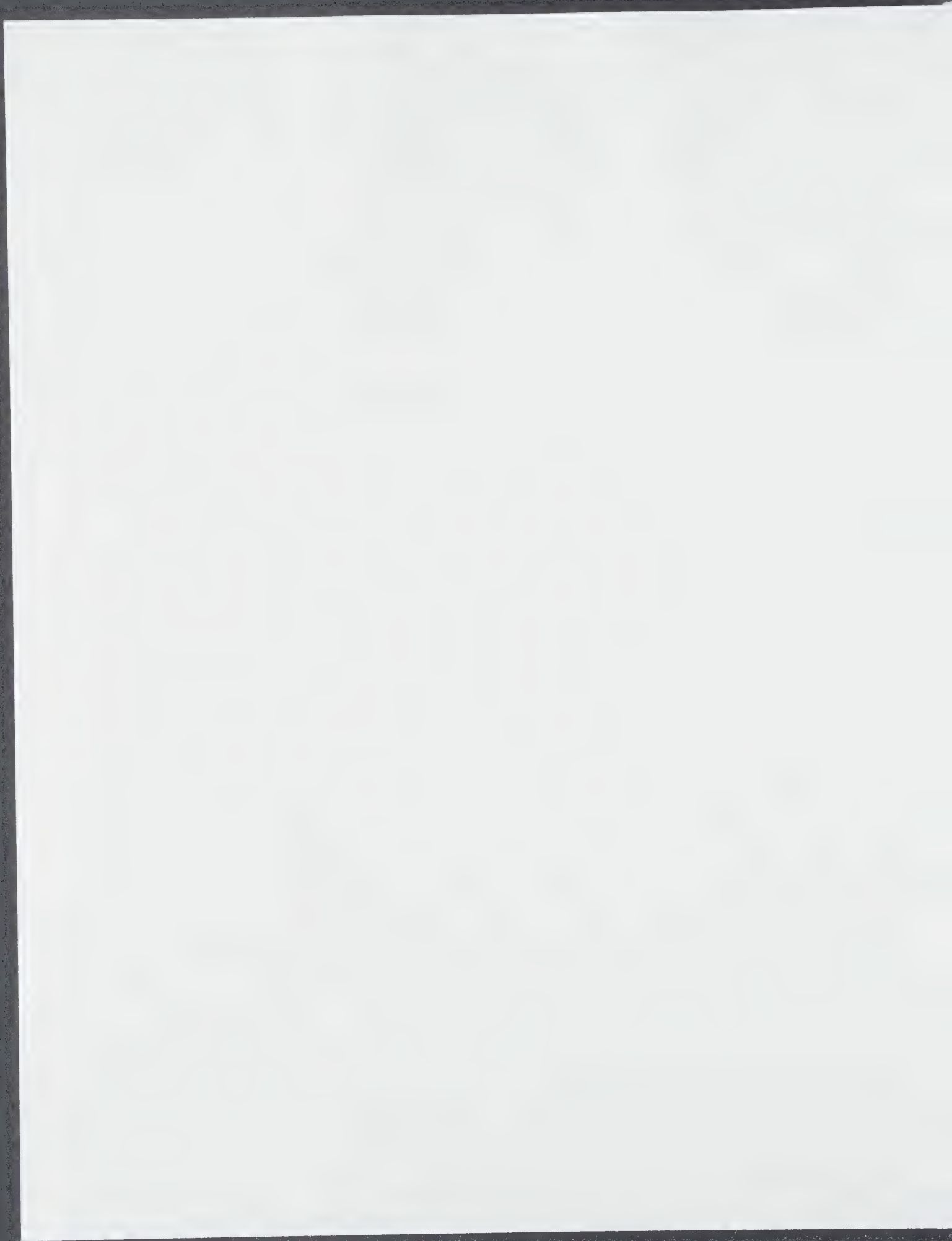

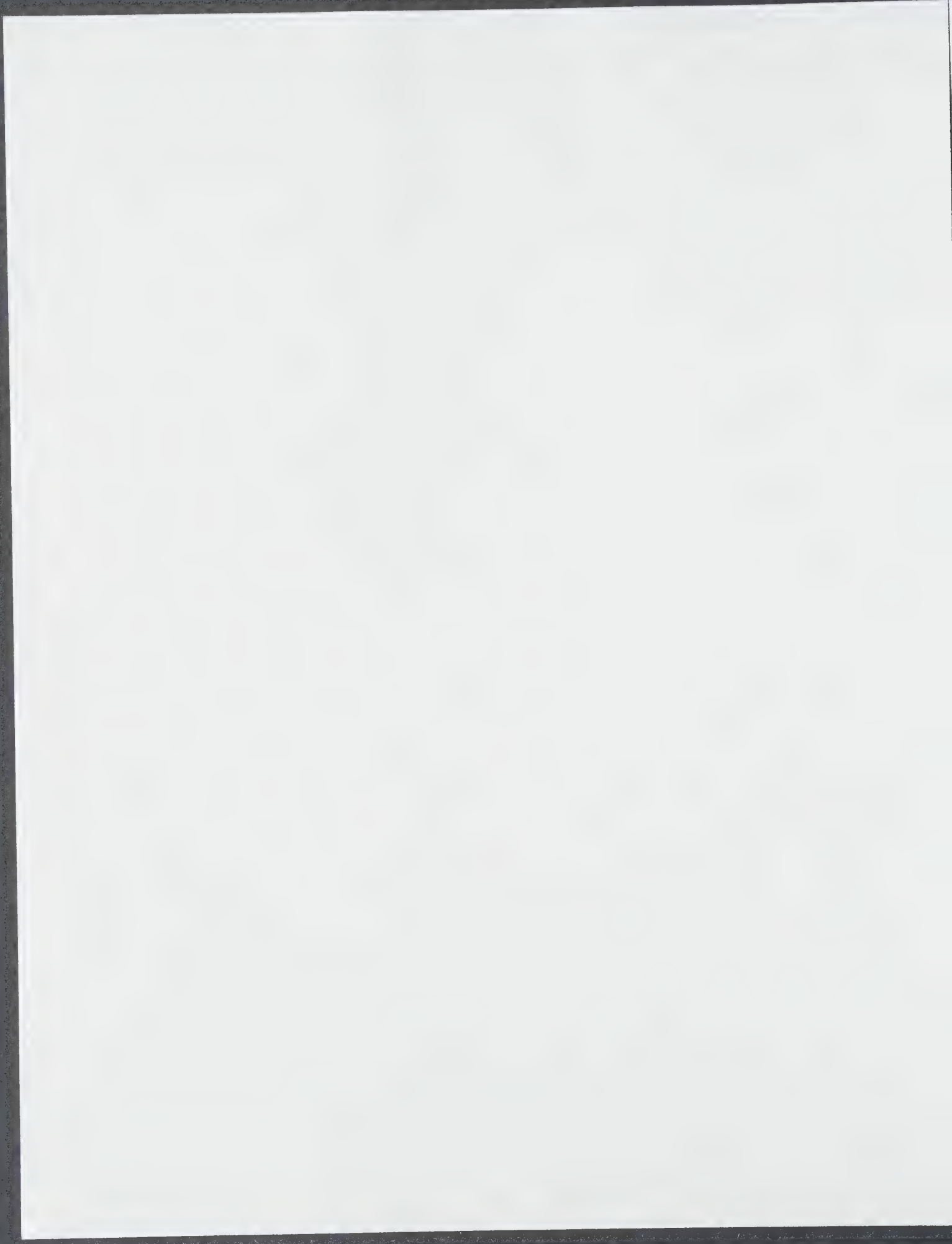

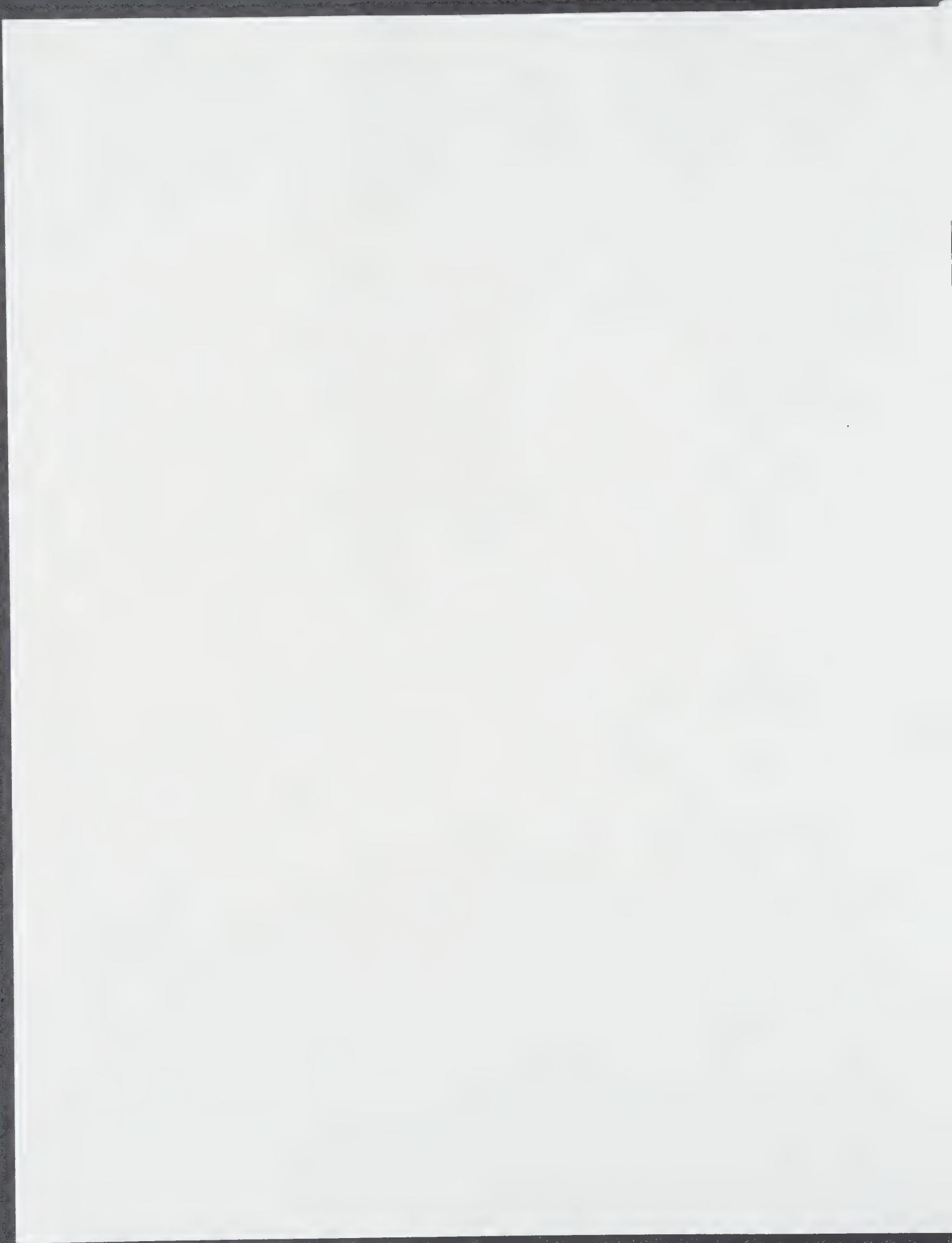

Please note that we left Milwaukee on Sunday even though my first two talks were not until Monday; that was because we still worry about snow storms in Milwaukee in April.

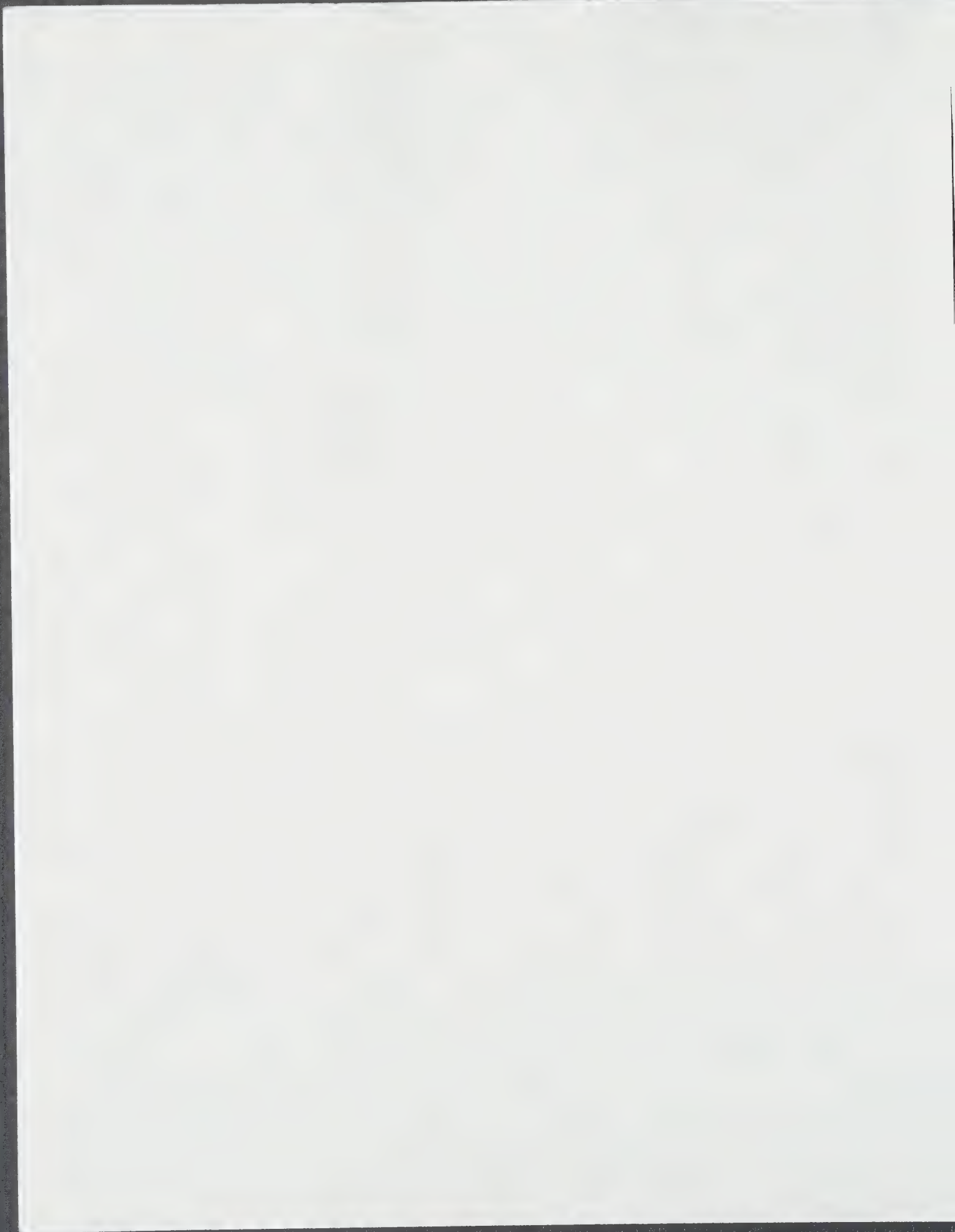

Reimbursement of your expenses will occur soon after you submit the completed report of your costs, along with all original hotel, transportation, and other pertinent receipts. Expenses incurred by anyone who may accompany you will not be reimbursed. If you need an advance on your travel expenses, contact this office; an amount covering the cost of air fare plus \$50 per travel day may be issued.

As the local sections taking part in your tour must ultimately pay for the trip, we encourage you to economize as much as possible while you travel. Make airline reservations as early as possible (at least 30 days in advance) to take advantage of "supersaver" or other bargain air fares. Rental car discounts are available to ACS members through Dollar, Hertz, and National as explained in the enclosed "Special Notice to ACS Tour Speakers." At transportation counters, hotels, motels, and restaurants, ask about any reductions in costs to which you are entitled by virtue of your current memberships in trade organizations, other professional societies, special benefit plans, etc. Your efforts in regard to controlling costs will enable the Society to continue the tour speaker program at its current reasonable cost to the local sections, despite rising travel prices.

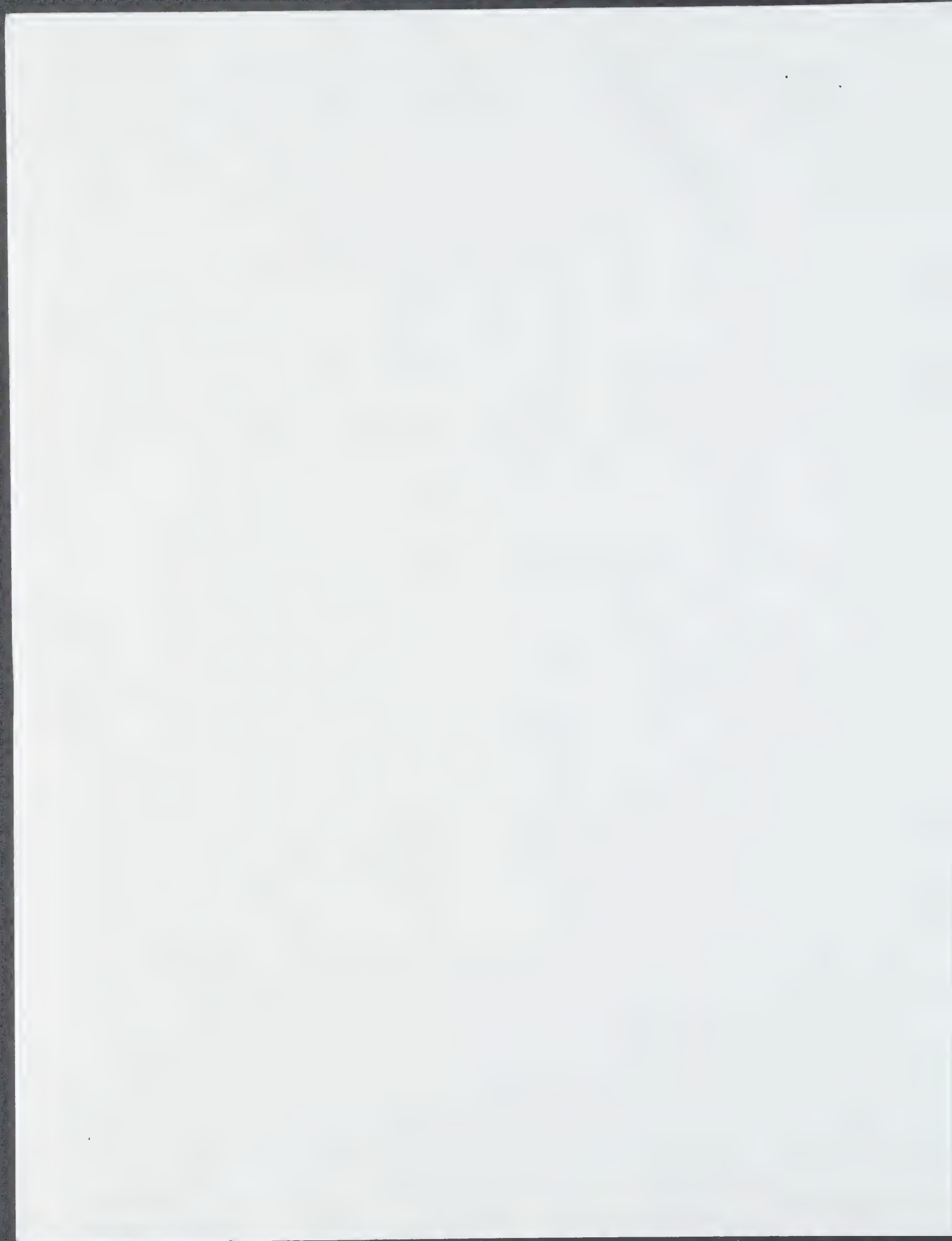

REQUEST FOR PAYMENT VOUCHER — TRAVEL EXPENSE**AMERICAN CHEMICAL SOCIETY****Travel Policy and Instructions for Preparation of Travel Expense Voucher**

It is a long-standing policy that all persons traveling on behalf of the American Chemical Society are reimbursed by the Society for their reasonable out-of-pocket expenses in connection with such travel. The following regulations, guidelines and procedures have been devised to assure equitable and consistent application of this policy throughout all units of the ACS and are published herewith as a guide to the traveler.

1. Expenses in connection with duly authorized travel on behalf of the ACS generally will be reimbursed in accordance with the following regulations upon presentation of properly prepared vouchers signed by the traveler and approved by the appropriate officer of the activity or program concerned. Vouchers should be received in the Accounts Payable Office within ten (10) days after completion of trip.

2. All pertinent information should be filled in as requested. Unusual circumstances in connection with the traveler or the expenses involved should be explained in the space provided at the bottom of page 2. When applicable, charges should be equitably adjusted because of business for other organizations or for personal business.

3. Transportation ticket stubs should accompany this voucher. Reimbursement shall not exceed less-than-first-class fares except when such accommodations are clearly unreasonable or impracticable. If first-class fares are used and the traveler seeks reimbursement, there must be a statement on the voucher as to the reason why first-class fares were necessary, for example: less than first-class was not available for reasons other than unavoidable delay in making reservations; would require circuitous routing or entail additional expenses offsetting savings in fare; or would not make the necessary connections.

4. Expenses for transportation by personally owned automobile will be reimbursed at ^{28¢}~~21¢~~ per mile, plus toll charges and necessary parking fees, if any. Except under unusual circumstances which are explained on the voucher by the traveler, the amount reimbursable for travel by personally owned automobiles shall not exceed the cost of travel by commercial air carrier at less than first-class rates, plus \$20 (in total) in lieu of transportation costs to and from airports. Identification of others accompanying the traveler should be made on the voucher if the travel expenses of these additional persons are to be reimbursed by the ACS.

5. Reimbursement for the use of rental automobiles on authorized travel will be made provided that circumstances make it impossible or impractical to use other means, and provided that the traveler submits information indicating the necessity for the use of a rental car. Whenever possible, the basic compact sedan will be engaged. Also, all attempts should be made to use the discount programs offered by Hertz, National or Dollar and reservations made through the ACS Travel Office. Otherwise, rental fees should be charged to the traveler's ACS American Express card or to his/her personal credit card and claimed as a reimbursable expense. With one exception, reimbursement of full collision insurance for rental cars is not allowable; the traveler should decline the collision damage waiver on the rental agreement form. When renting from National, determine the deductible limit, and if it exceeds \$3000, accept the extra coverage. The Society will reimburse the traveler for any damage claim assessed against him/her by the rental agency up to the deductible amount specified in the rental agency's collision policy provided the vehicle was not used, operated or driven in violation of the provisions of the rental agreement.

6. The society automatically provides \$250,000 of *accidental* death coverage to all staff, officers, and Board and Committee members during travel and sojourn on business for the ACS. The protection is in effect for the full period during which the individual is involved in business travel, but does not apply to any commutation or vacation travel. For this reason, premiums for other travel or life insurance paid by persons covered by the ACS policy are not reimbursable as travel expenses. For others traveling on ACS business, travel or life insurance premiums paid for coverage up to \$250,000 maximum during a trip on ACS business may be reimbursed as a travel expense.

7. Complete itineraries and all costs incurred in connection with travel must be listed on this voucher. Those costs which are to be billed directly to the American Chemical Society should be listed in the direct charge column. All other "out-of-pocket expenses" are listed in the reimbursable column. Any items of personal expenses billable directly to ACS should be shown both as an addition in the "charged directly" column and as a deduction on the front of the voucher.

8. Cost of rooms will be reimbursed on an actual cost basis if the receipted bill from each hotel or motel is attached. The reimbursement shall be at the rate of a single room with bath, if available. Otherwise, a written explanation or justification for a higher charge should be entered in the space provided at the bottom of page 2. The costs of a room shared with persons not on Society business should be prorated on an equitable basis.

9. The expenses of meals (including tips on meals) are reimbursable on an actual cost basis. Receipts are *not* required to substantiate such expenses if the average cost per day does *not* exceed the following maximums: \$30 per day for a trip of three (3) days of less in length; \$40 per day for all of the days required for a trip that is more than three (3). The average cost per day is computed by dividing the *total* claimed for meals and tips on meals by the total number of calendar days required for each trip; *partial* travel days are counted as *full* days; time spent on personal business or business of other organizations is excluded. Also, for the purpose of this computation, the elapsed time for trips by automobile shall be limited to the amount of time that normally would have been required had the trip been made by commercial air carrier. The cost of meals subject to this "average-cost-per-day" guideline applies to the traveler's meals only. Meals paid by the traveler for other persons are reimbursable as "other expenses" if the other persons would have been entitled to reimbursement by ACS if they had paid the expenses, or as "entertainment expenses" if the requirements of regulation No. 11, below, are met, *and* provided that the names of the other persons are listed on the voucher or attachments thereto. In addition, the cost of official meal functions which the traveler is required to attend because of his position or office with ACS may be reimbursable as special costs when explained on the voucher.

10. Reasonable costs of cleaning, laundry and valet are allowed if the duration of the trip is for more than five days or under special circumstances which must be stated on the claim for reimbursement, such as the traveler speaking at meetings, etc. Additionally, the reasonable actual cost of one personal long-distance telephone call for each two days of trip is allowed. Fees for travelers checks and special costs of foreign travel such as passport and visa expenses, as well as currency exchange fees, are reimbursable.

11. Reasonable costs of meals and other expenses paid by the traveler on behalf of individuals who are not otherwise entitled to reimbursement for travel expenses for the same trip are allowable as entertainment costs if incurrence of the costs was in furtherance of ACS business. Each participant for whom such expenses are claimed must be indicated on the claim for reimbursement and a statement as to the business purpose of the expenses must be included. Receipts are required for reimbursement.

12. The following types of expenses are considered personal and are not reimbursable except under unusual circumstances: tuxedo rental; barber and beauty shop expenses; credit card fees; interest or service charges on revolving charge accounts; and any other expenses of a purely personal nature which normally would have been incurred regardless of whether a person is in travel status.

13. Trips involving travel outside of the United States must be approved in advance by the Executive Director or his designate.

14. Reasonable tips related to the business purpose of the trip are reimbursable. Such tips should be claimed on the travel expense voucher under the category of expense to which they apply (i.e., tips on dinner checks would be included as costs of meals). Tips which do not relate to a specific item listed on the voucher (such as baggage handling tips) should be reported under "other expenses."

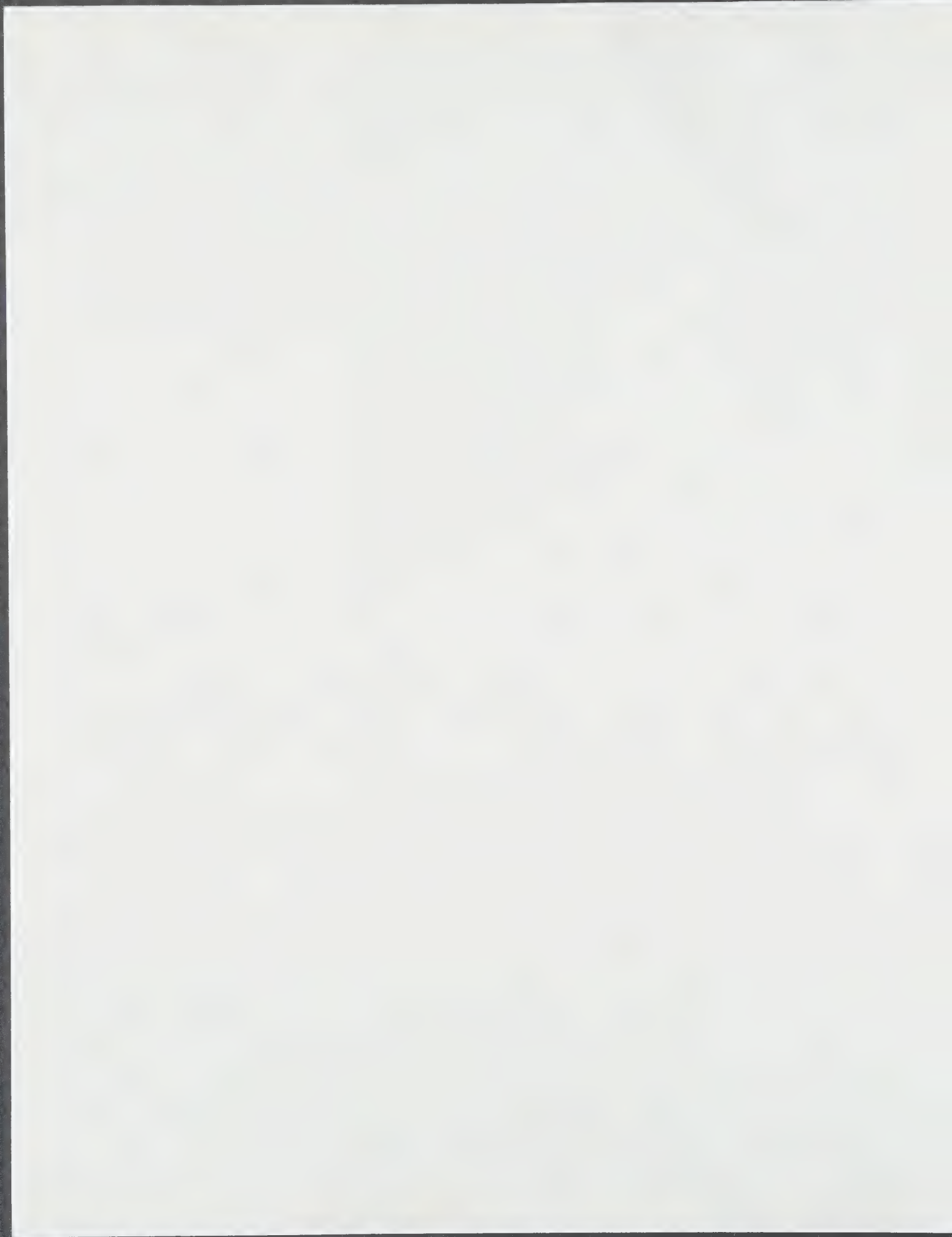

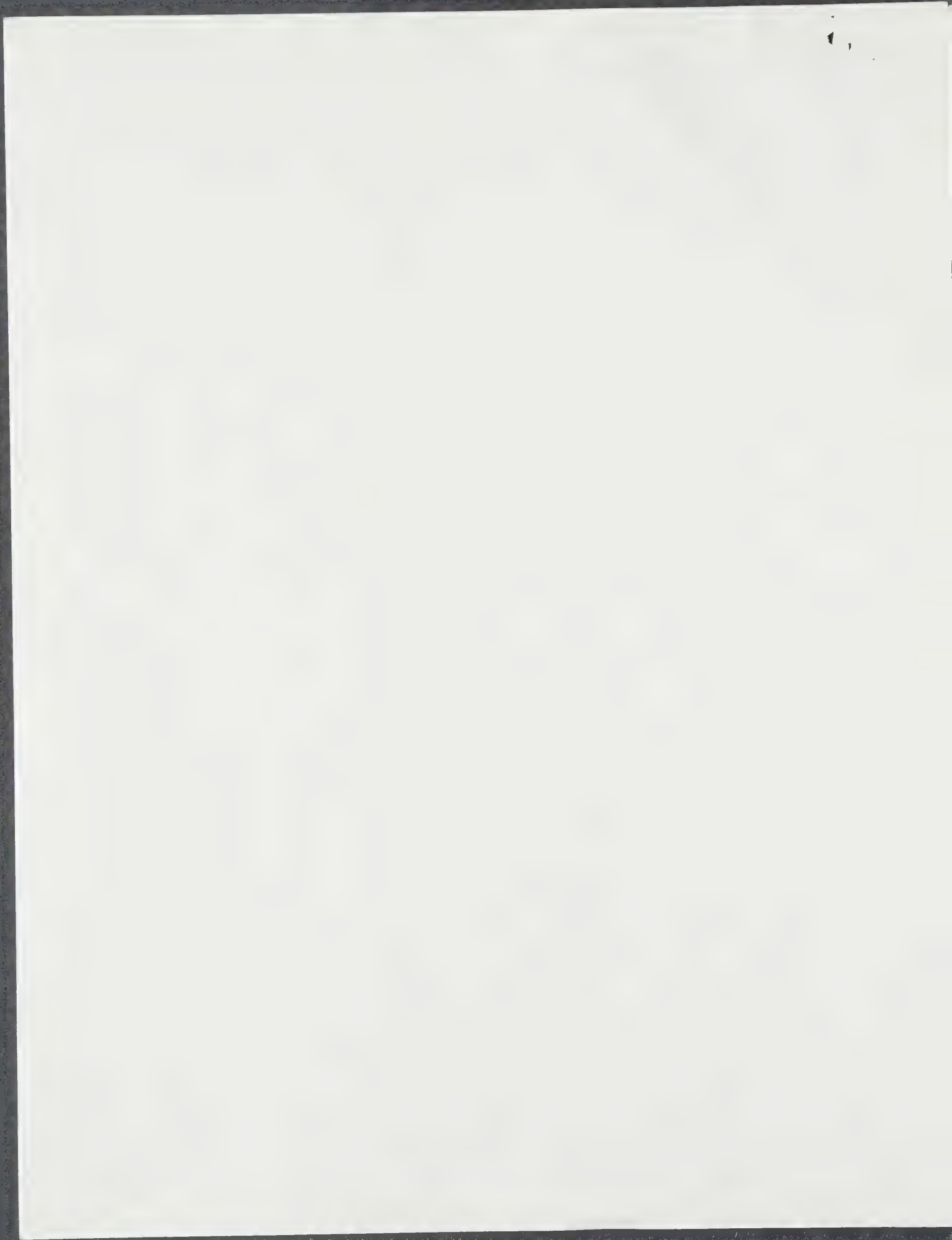
Mr. Sal Cillela, the Director of the Art Museum in Columbia, has invited me to speak at the museum, probably on Sunday the 21st.

May I suggest the following:

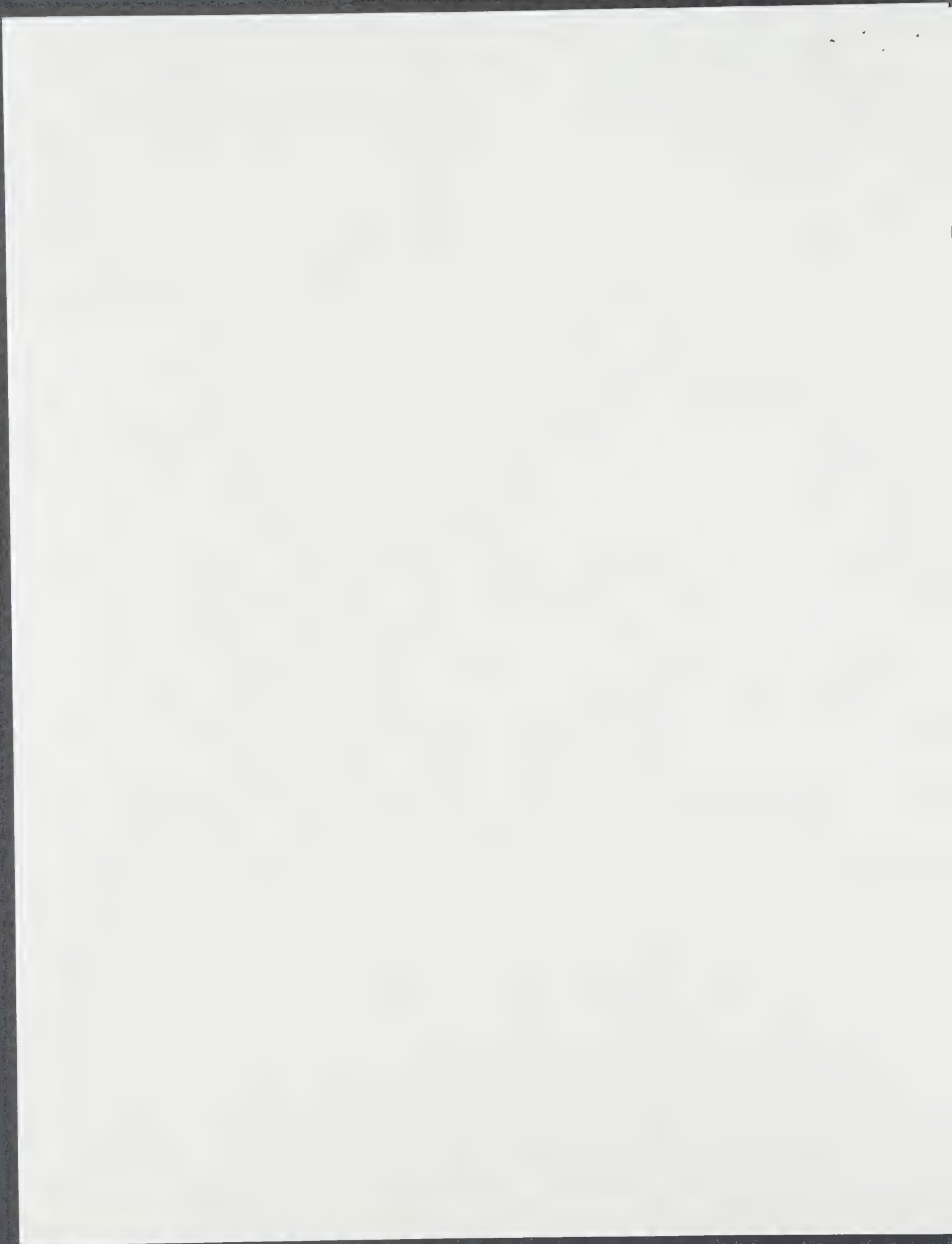
1. Monday, April 11th - Memphis
