



As you know, we just returned from the East late Friday night and so I have only just seen your proposed schedule of lectures.

I sure wish that we had had a chance to discuss the schedule in some detail before this week because it poses some real difficulties.

First of all, the second last and last talks, on "Loschmidt: The Father of Molecular Modelling" and "Anschütz, Couper and Loschmidt ..." overlap a great deal and I would like to suggest that you allow me to give only the talk entitled "Anschütz, Couper and Loschmidt: A Detective at Work." You will, I think, find this a very intriguing story, very much of a detective story which will even interest non-chemists.

The first and second talks "The Adventures of a Chemist Collector" and "The Detective's Eye" deal with different paintings, each before and after restoration, and I would like to ask you to replace one of these with the talk entitled "The Joys of Collecting: Building a Collection."

I am glad that the talk on Wednesday evening is on "The Bible Through Dutch Eyes; Rembrandt and the Jews" because that will certainly be of interest to the Department of Religion and Jewish Studies.

However, I always like to have at least half an hour just to lie down after the second lecture and before dinner. Will that be possible if the second talk ends at around 5 p.m.?

There is also a good deal of overlap in the first two talks planned for Thursday, namely, "Chemophobia" and "The History of the Aldrich Chemical Company." The latter is, I think, considerably more interesting.

Not included in your schedule is what I think is one of my most interesting talks, that entitled "The Rembrandt Research Project and the Collector" and I am wondering whether you couldn't fit that in somehow. Of course I realize your difficulties as we are now on Monday morning and the talks are to begin on Wednesday.

What I am suggesting is that I give six lectures, of course in any order you wish, of which two deal with chemistry, "The History of Aldrich and Sigma-Aldrich" and "Anschütz, Couper and Loschmidt: A Detective at Work;" one bridges chemistry and art, namely "The Detective's Eye," and three deal with paintings. These three would be "The Joys of Building a Collection," "The Rembrandt Research Project and The Collector" and "The Bible Through Dutch Eyes; Rembrandt and the Jews." The last bridges art and the bible.

Of course I do hope that you will find six talks, rather than seven, satisfactory.

I will be in my office all day today and as so much work has piled up I do not plan to go out for lunch. Please call me at your convenience. Isabel and I much look forward to seeing you.


