I have been a customer of yours for nearly 30 years, as well as an admirer of your catalog/handbook covers the creator of which often is unknown. Such is the case with an oil painting I recently acquired here in Edina, Minnesota. The seller bought it in Beaver Dam, WI. It is a landscape $(49 \times 30 \text{ inches})$ of Lake

Bled, Slovenia (part of former Yugoslavia).

Because of the apparent signature: "Alpar", (see white area at the very bottom, center,) it was attributed to Alpar Paraschivescu (Romanian). Alas, to me it is not Alpar, but "Alpes," the French word for alps. The question thus remains, who painted it and when? How did the painting get to Beaver Dam? The garb of the voyagers in the canoes hint to me at about 1850. Lake Bled is a delightful composition of blue water, snow-clad alps, a castle on a rocky pedestal and the church on an island.

I grew up near Lake Bled and as a youngster often paddled that lake at the foothills of the Austrian Alps. The painting therefore has great sentimental

value to me.

I would appreciate if you would comment on it. I am enclosing a photo of this treasure of mine.



Unless this painting is quite inexpensive, I would not be interested.




