The bursaries are not very important in themselves, except that we very much hope they will be successful and will then be able to use the University College model to set similar schemes at other urban universities.



The bursaries are not very important in themselves, except that we very much hope they will be successful and will then be able to use the University College model to set similar schemes at other urban universities.



Thank you for your letter of August 17th.


I very much hope that with your help, the bursary meeting next year will last for two days and that you and others will have a chance to get to know the students personally, and then to get more applicants.


