Dear Gerald:

Thank you so much for your most helpful letter of August 4th, only just received.

Now that you know your way to Bexhill, I do hope that you will come again; we will be there from about the 10th of November until Christmas, with only a few days in between, in Europe. By now you know that good paintings don't have to be expensive; I buy quite a few really fine works for a few hundred pounds, or even less.

I have given many hundreds of lectures around the world entitled "The Adventures of a Chemist Collector" and it might well be an appropriate title for the book.

I appreciate your saying that I should find a commercial publisher if at all possible. While I will want quite a few illustrations, I will be satisfied to have all of them in black and white.

Several people have suggested that I contact the St. Martin's Press, which, incidentally, is the company in which many years ago, and for a short time only, I had a financial interest. Do you know much about that company?

What is most important to me is that the book be published and be available at a relatively low price. I do believe that a great many chemists would buy it, particularly if it is well advertised as surely it would be in magazines such as Chemical & Engineering News and Chemistry in Britain. Also, there will be a number of juicy art historical essays, such as about my fight with the Getty Museum, so that quite a few art historians would be interested.

Would Elsevier have any interest?

Many thanks again for your and Isabelle's hospitality when we came down on Sunday 25 July. I really am most grateful for the trouble that you took to reacquire the painting and I hope that my wife and I can spend a little more time with you and the other works of art sometime in future.

Although it is true that we do not have much money to spend, we find our main deficiency is time. Our children consume almost all the time that is not committed to work, and although this is very willingly given it still seems to leave little time for other more personal interests. I am sure that you can remember something similar from when your own children were young.

I have looked through the autobiographical chapters that I took away with me on paintings and on the beginning of Aldrich, and recollect that you had distinguished three main themes: your life as a chemist, your art collecting and the recent Sigma-Aldrich management. I get the impression that you have put together a collection of pieces that you have written on these subjects over the course of the last few years and are now writing new material to draw them together.

My immediate comment is that it will be very difficult to produce a book of coherence without an obvious thread to the narrative. To achieve this I think you will need to carefully reconsider all the draft materials you have, once the drafts are complete, and attempt to distinguish in them a theme (or themes) which has been manifest in your various activities.

To help focus on the idea of a theme I was casting around in my mind for a word or concept which might have some relevance and the word that first occurred was "alchemy". This word while strongly implying chemistry goes much further and embraces both philosophical ideas and a sense of aspirational values which transcend normal business dealings. Having conceived this idea, I was reading a book review in a newspaper and the phrase "the alchemist's gift" leapt from the page.

A book's content is not dependent on its title but an early idea of a title can help shape the book, even if the title itself does not survive. One idea might be *Alfred Bader: the Alchemist's Gift* or *Alfred Bader: the Alchemist's Art*. These both have a level of meaning which could help crystallise some of the many issues you hope to address.

Please feel free to deal with this idea as you wish, or totally ignore it. I think you should expect to sell the book mainly to chemists, who are not a difficult group to reach, but that you would have very limited success selling it to those interested in great art. However, those specialists in conservation and connoisseurship are not particularly difficult to reach either. At the moment, both the pieces on chemistry and those on art are written at a technical level which requires specific knowledge to fully appreciate them.

I would encourage you to attempt to use a commercial publisher if at all possible. Private publication would not ensure that your book is taken seriously by bookshops, libraries, and the other standard outlets for reference material, and might compromise production standards. I infer that you will want to include a significant number of art illustrations, presumably in full colour and the publisher would probably ask you to help defray the cost of producing these.

Finally, although it seems obvious, it is worth repeating that ultimately it is the reading of the book that is important, not the writing of it, although the former does require the latter.

Please keep in touch as work progresses.


Actually, there has been a good deal of publicity about Queen's acquiring Herstmonceux Castle, and some of that is enclosed.





Fine Chemicals Journal

I wanted to thank you very much indeed for the time you spent with me on 23 February. The conversations I was able to have with your two people at the Sigma-Aldrich Company, Steve Branca and Al Runquist were most useful. I have tried to get in touch with Peter Pollack by telephone, so far with no success. However, I have written to Dr Pollack and will shortly be having a meeting with some of my colleagues at Pergamon to see how we can progress the journal. When we met you suggested that you would be able to let me have a list of 8-10 names of people who we should contact, with some biographical description, and it would be most useful if you could supply that in the near future.

Turning to other matters, I was extremely interested to have the opportunity to look at some of your pictures and will be writing to you privately about some of the matters we discussed. Looking at the literature about the schism between you and the Sigma-Aldrich Company, it is quite clear that what you were doing was in no way harmful and could not possibly be construed as damaging to the company. Indeed, it is a measure of the market's belief in the company that you were able to sell a call option at all, since they are only purchased on the bluest of blue chip companies, and the purchaser clearly expected the shares to continue rising.

I am afraid, as you have suggested, the reason for this split must truthfully lie elsewhere. Nothing that you have done can be diminished by their actions.

You also mentioned that you are writing your autobiography: although this would not be appropriate for Elsevier to publish, I would be quite willing to act as your agent to find an appropriate publisher for the book, if this is of any assistance.


I note that you will be in England for most of July, and hope that we can meet then.

Fine Chemicals Journal

I am writing in connection with a new journal that we are investigating in the area of "fine chemicals" (see attached draft Aims & Scope), which we believe is not at present adequately represented either by existing mainstream journals in organic chemistry or by the various down-market trade publications, such as *Speciality Chemicals* and *Performance Chemicals*. The results of a market survey we conducted last year show there is strong interest and support within industry (amongst fine chemicals manufacturers and their customer base, in pharmaceuticals, agrochemicals, etc.) for a good quality publication, although as you might expect there is little traditional academic interest in the idea, especially in the United States.

We have reached the point of wishing to identify a team of potential Editors, who would in the first instance assist us in refining the idea and defining the structure and content of the journal and then go on to manage it - in terms of administration of submissions, the peer-review process, commissioning articles where appropriate, etc. As a former chemist, myself, I have of course been aware of your key involvement in the manufacture and supply of chemicals, in your role as Chairman of Aldrich. But it was Peter Pollack of Lonza, with whom I have been discussing these matter most recently, who suggested that you might be interested in co-editing such a publication. I believe Peter copied you in on his last letter to me, dated 22 June.

I have since been away on business and then on holiday; otherwise, I would have been in touch with you sooner. Would you be at all interested in discussing this project further with us? Whether or not, we would certainly welcome your views on the idea.

I hope I may look forward to hearing from you soon.

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AIMS AND SCOPE

Fine Chemicals Journal is intended to provide an effective forum for the exchange of scientific, technical and commercial information between professionals in the Fine Chemicals Industry - that is, chemists working in discovery research, process R&D, production and manufacturing, business development, chemistry management, quality control, purchasing and marketing/sales - and their customer base - chemists in industries concerned with the development of pharmaceuticals, agrochemicals, flavours and fragrances, colour chemicals, food additives, electronics, high performance polymers, etc.

Topics covered will include:

* New chemistry/chemical methods of importance to the fine chemicals industry;

* Academic/industrial collaborative research;

* New high yield routes to production of existing products;

* Process development and scale-up;

* Manufacturing methods;

* Development of catalytic methods for fine chemicals;
* Latest process technology and total quality issues;
* Search for new clean processes (zero-emission plants);

* Applications and formulation methods.

In addition to full reports and short communications of original research results, which if of an industrially sensitive nature may be submitted in summary, or digested, form giving extensive experimental detail, the journal will publish the following:

* Commissioned reviews of (e.g. tutorials) in particular areas of industrial research and development;

* Case studies - in discovery research, development, manufacture;

* Papers from conferences organised by recognised groups whose important work otherwise rarely enters the literature;

Abstracts of patents;

* News of new products - chemicals, plant or laboratory equipment - or of new techniques still under development;

* Company profiles - e.g. of smaller (less well known) companies and their product range, or a review of new compounds in development by, say, a drug company;

* A safety/toxicity file containing new data on chemicals;

* Literature monitor - a digest of papers published elsewhere;

* Calendar of events
