

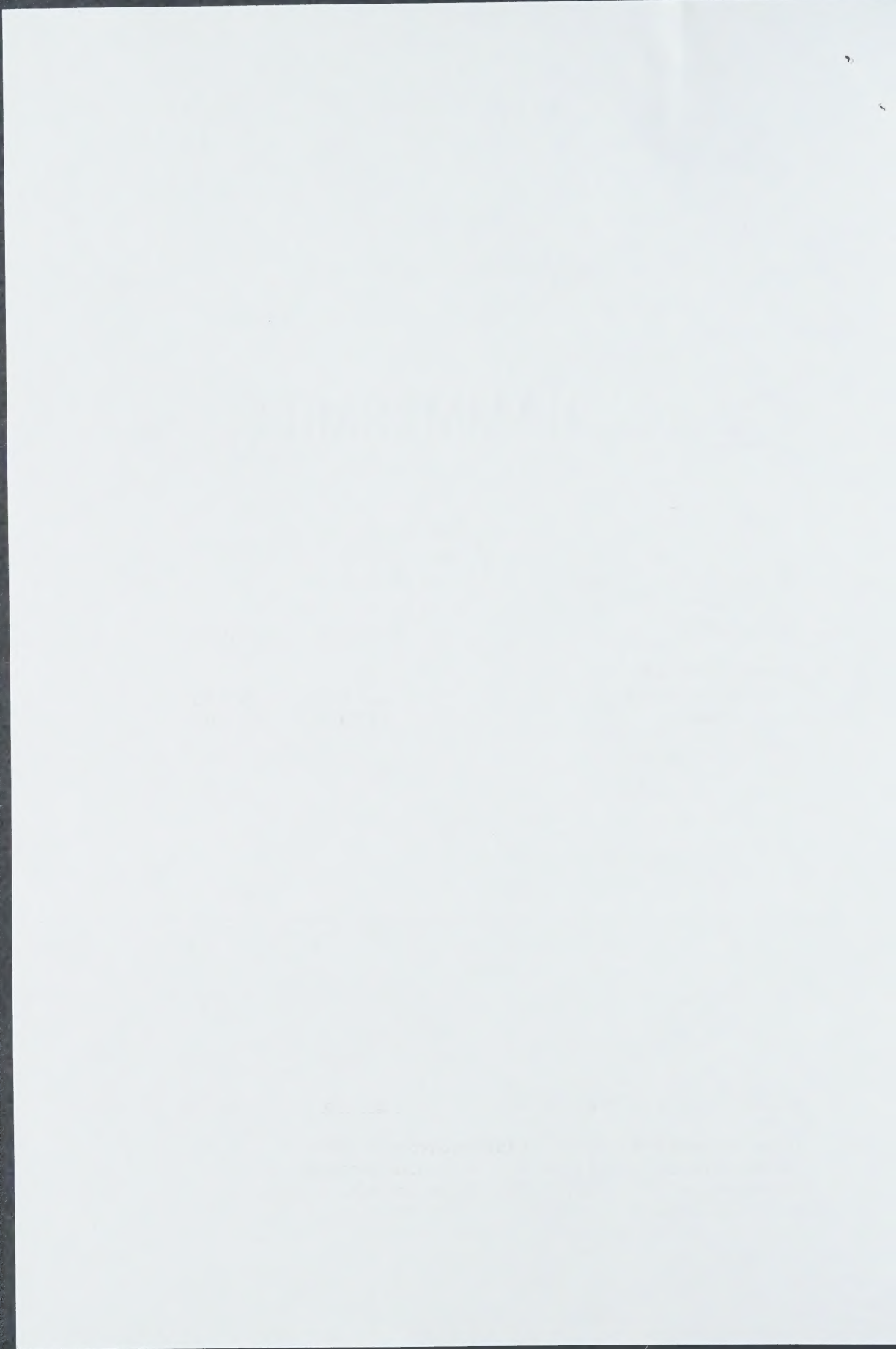

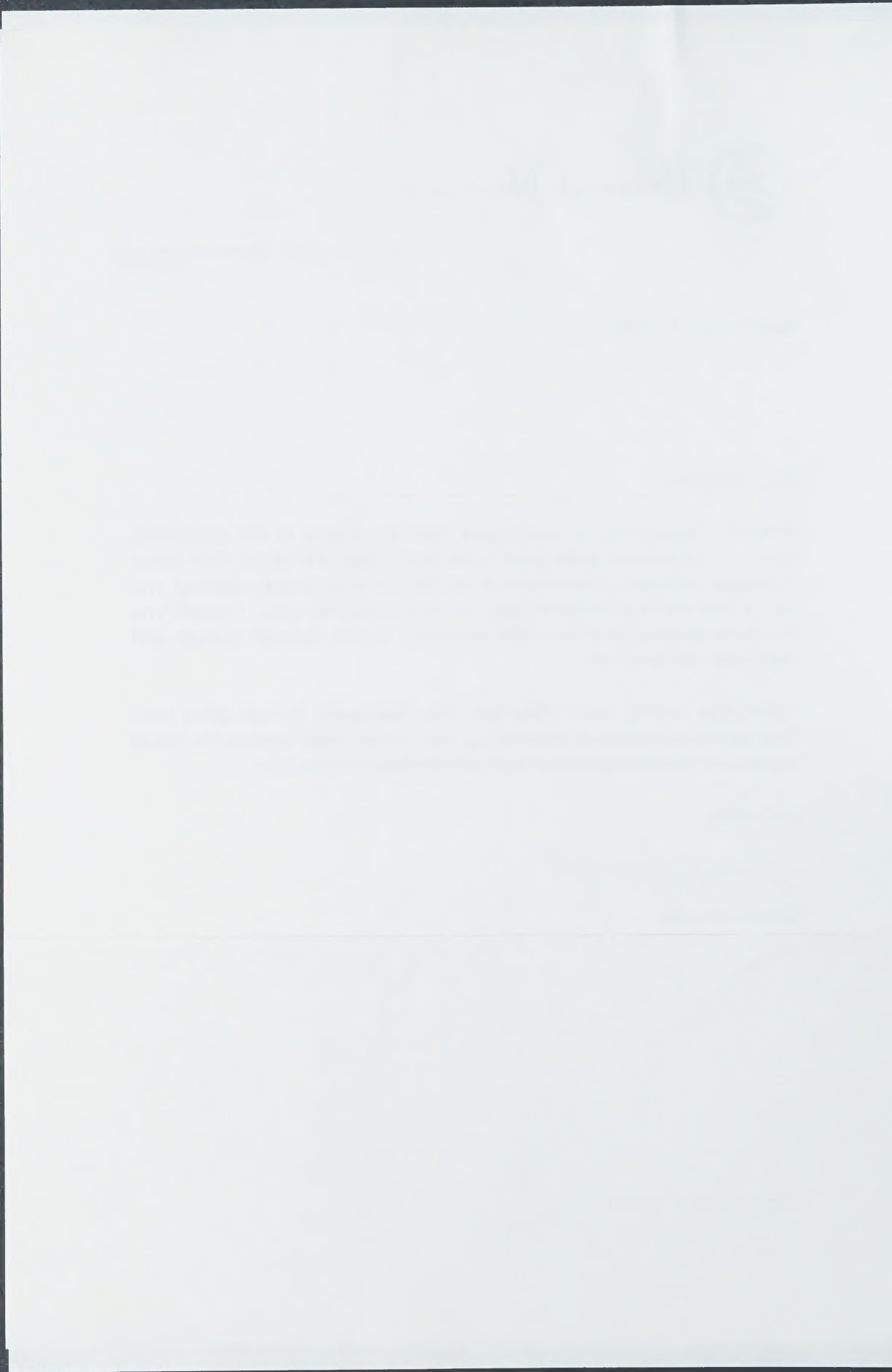
Dear Member,

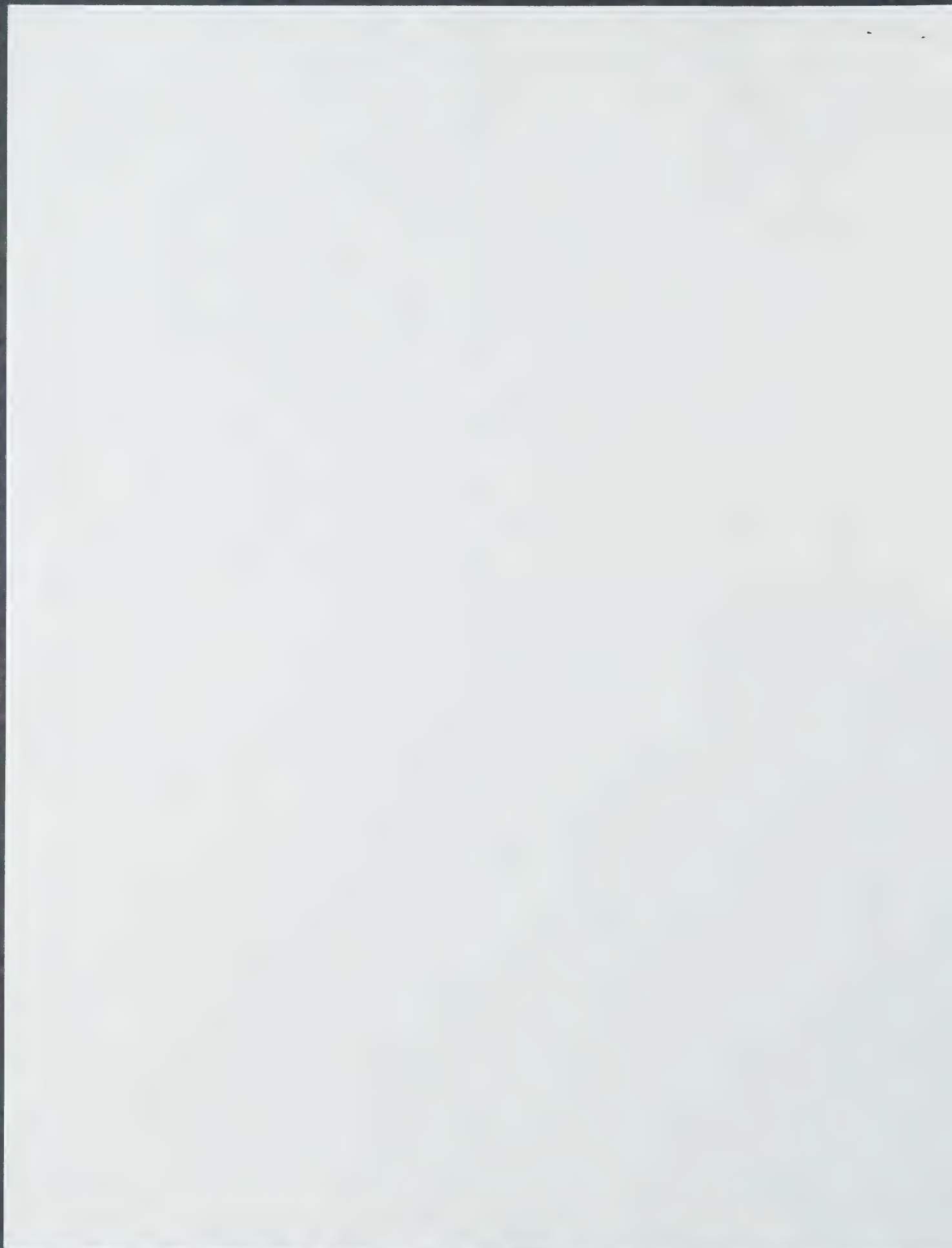

Gilbert Stork, Martin Ettliger, and Bob Woodward helped me very much more than Louis Fieser; in fact, I don't think that I saw him alone in my lab, Converse 205, for more than about two hours during the two years there.

Did you perchance keep a copy of the letter of "recommendation" describing you as not suitable for an academic career? If so, I would love to have a copy. Incidentally, Teddy Lytle mentioned that letter to me once, and I don't think that it was given to you by mistake. Not that Fieser wanted you to have it, but Teddy did.

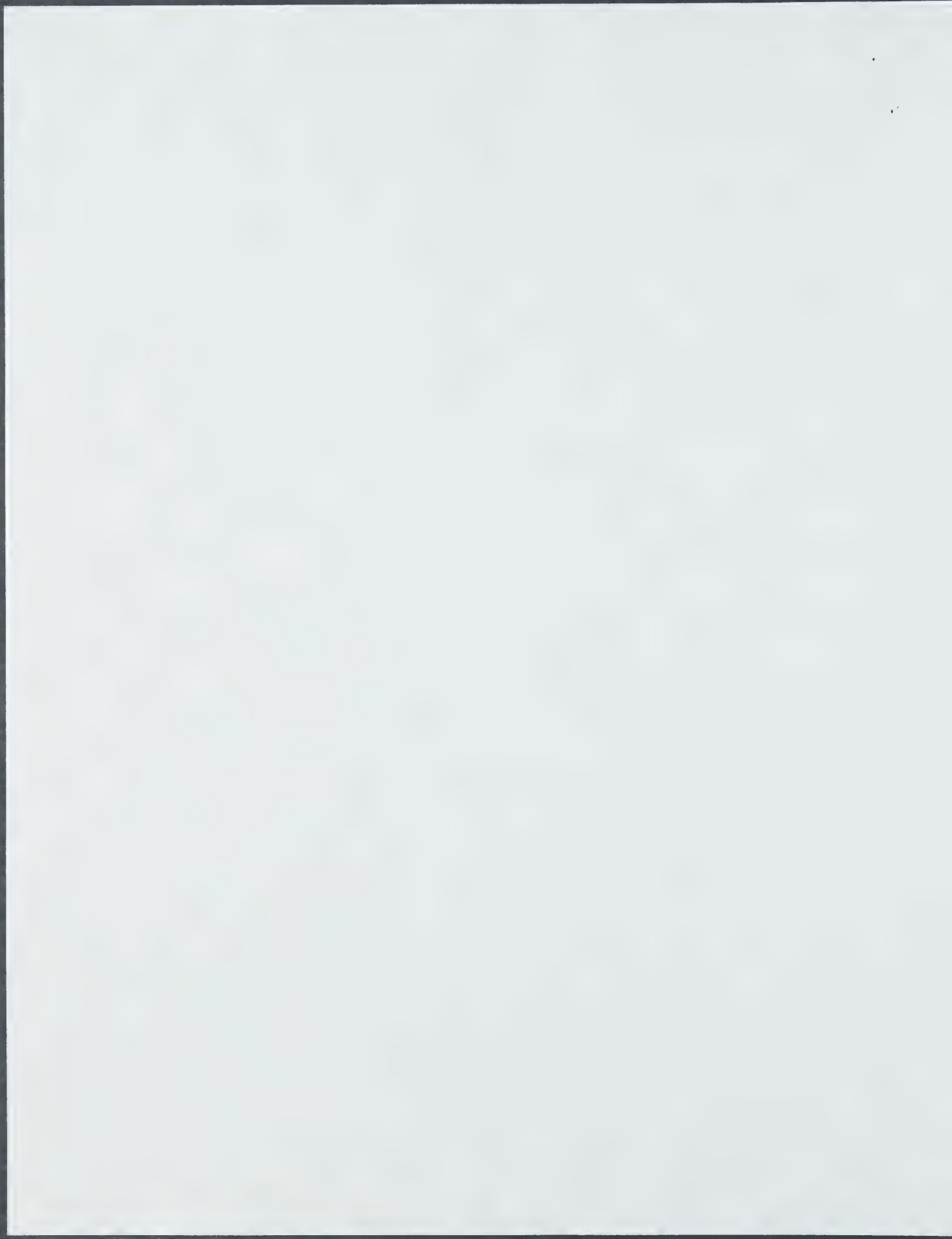
Fieser's mistake regarding you is in the same league as Robert Millikan's, enclosed.
