Dear Stan,

We have invoiced Aldrich for the 7 lots, for a total of \$21,000 and hope that you will be paid shortly. Please let me know when you have received the check.

In the past all of your compounds have been exceedingly interesting and that is why Bob Wandler had no hesitation whatsoever in allowing the price to be raised from \$50 to \$60 per sample.

But I would like to point out to you that among these 7 collections there are a fair number of compounds which are really of very little interest. Of course I did not point this out to Bob Wandler and he has not said anything to me but you should be guided in choosing the next compounds to be sent.

Allow me to give you a few examples:

In Lot 3, p.1, the two benzoic acids without nitrogen are not of great interest. In fact generally without nitrogen are of much less interest. p.2&3, you have 18 compounds with very long chains, again unlikely to be of great interest. p. 4, you have several compounds without nitrogen. You wouldn't call the nitrogen in piperidine as adding to the interest, nor are nitro compounds of much interest.

Thank you very much for your kind letter of April 9, 1993, and the enclosed copies. I also appreciate your corrections concerning your predecessors living in my country. And I really must visit the Milotice castle to see the "ugly portraits" of your ancestors. It is a good reason to spend a nice week of my vacation in Moravia in some of the coming years.

After I sent you my last letter I realized that I should have wished you and Isabel "Happy Passover" so allow me to do so with some delay. I must admit that before coming to the USA I had no idea about this holiday. And then I was not sure if it is appropriate to wish a Jewish person at this occasion. This time I asked a person about it and she assured me that it is not only appropriate but nearly compulsory. So accept my excuse.

I am glad to see that you are establishing a new Bader's Fellowship, now even at famous Harvard University. I wish I were twenty years younger to compete for these fellowships. I only hope that Czech Universities will be able under the new conditions to produce graduates good enough for these fellowships. My friends from Prague Technical University have really hard time now. Some people in the Czech Republic also complain about the hardship of the real life in this new situation. I agree that the situation is not very good in the sense of standard of living. But who of us could even dream about going abroad to do some postgraduate studies? Who could travel without any restrictions? Who could subscribe any foreign newspapers or magazine? And who could express his or her opinions without any fear? And I hope that the hardship of living is not for ever. It will not be easy but I believe that the next generations will have similar living conditions to those in other more developed countries.

As far as your award for the best paper is concerned, your offer of \$3,000 is very generous and I only hope that it will go to the right person. I would be glad to serve as a peer but I believe that it would be more appropriate to leave the selection to the Czech Chemical Society, especially if you give him your experience with other Chemical Societies.

I am really sorry that I will not be in Prague during your visit to meet you and Isabel. I do not know the schedule of your Prague stay but if you have time to spend an evening with my wife and Tom be sure that they would be really happy. So if your schedule allows this, either let me know or call directly in Prague to my wife (tel. # 4010676). She would be obliged to prepare a dinner for you and she is aware that it should be low-fat and low-cholesterol (and of course not pork).

Dear Alfred,

Thank you very much for your kind letter of April 28. Excuse me for the delay but I am very busy these days. My brother is visiting me and so I am trying to show him as much as possible. Since I received an announcement about the Symposium on your honor, we planned our trip to Massachusetts (Plymouth and Boston) for the last weekend which enabled me to attend the event. Or more precisely, part of it because I had to leave earlier having a long drive before me. I enjoyed your lecture very much (as usual), as most people in the auditorium did. I am only sorry that I had not enough time to be there later.

I am glad to see that you are new Bader's Fellowships at the Harvard University are really established. I hope that the science community in the Czech Republic will recognize your great contribution for the future of our chemistry. I browsed the copies of your correspondence dealing mainly with the fellowships you gave me before the lecture. I especially liked your letter answering the question about the possible instability of the Czech Republic. I would appreciate having this copy in my file, if it is possible.

Regarding your award for the best paper, I consulted several friends from Prague and they mainly advised to wait till the next year. They argue that there will be a substantial change in the Czech Chemical Society (reorganization of the Sections and new elections) during this year. In case you wish to establish the prize this year, the person in charge in the Society is Dr. Paleta from Prague Institute of Chemical Technology, Technicka 5, 166 28 Prague 6.

As far as my future plans are concerned, I am still an employ of our Research Institute in Prague. The Institute has hard times now but I hope that I will have an opportunity to work there in coming years. The Institute was slimmed substantially from about 800 employees to about 350, many good people (unfortunately many of them scientists) left the Institute. Some of them went abroad and some of them became representatives of various foreign companies which expanded their business in the Czech Republic. During my winter visit of Prague my boss told me that he had enough money for me in his project's budget. I hope that the situation in coming years will be improving. Of course, I am very glad to have opportunity to work at Roche but I have been considering the stay in the US to be temporary and I am looking forward to returning home. For the next two or three years I will not even think about any long-term stay abroad. And if I decide for some other stay abroad in future, it would be definitely with my wife. The time spent without my family was very hard for me, and maybe even harder for them.

I do not like to bother you but I would like to ask you for a favor. A good friend of mine was offered an interesting job by a person who also mentioned your name during their conversation. Since nobody knows the person very well and not all business persons from the West active in the Eastern Europe are reliable, he asked me for some information. I am aware that you cannot tell me that somebody is not a reliable person, but maybe you can tell me if you would recommend your own friend to accept a job in



a company owned (or influenced) by the person. Name of the businessman is Dr. Walter Van Herck and he is from Belgium.

I must repeat again that I am really sorry that I will not be able to meet you and Isabel in Prague during your visit. It would be a great time to have more time to spend together then previous years when your business consumed most of your time.

Dear Alfred:

Thank you very much for your letter of August 13, 1996 and the enclosed interesting article of Prof. Zahradnik. Please excuse my delay but I have really been very busy for last several months. In August we spent a fortnight in Switzerland with Majka's uncle who has been there from 1968. I participate in a grant of the EU called Copernicus and therefore in September I was allowed to attend a Symposium on QSAR in Lausanne. In addition, during September I also received proofs of two major reviews I had prepared for Allan Katritzky. One was a part of the second edition of the Comprehensive Heterocyclic Chemistry and the other was for Advances in Heterocyclic Chemistry. I also started to teach Medicinal Chemistry in a private school (the graduates will receive a level of education comparable with bachelor's degree). This is only a short list of my duties and I must admit that I am not able to manage my time more efficiently. Naturally, it is no excuse for my delay.

I also postponed my letter since in your last letter you announced that I should receive the computer printouts from Aldrich. I am sorry to say so, but I still have not received them.

Thank you for your fax of 22 January; I also received a message that you called on Friday to follow up -- sorry that I was not here to take your call.

I am not going to write in detail about all of our current Bader initiatives, since I have briefed Wendy and she will have all of the background pieces of paper and information to discuss with you when you are in New York on Wednesday. Questions which I believe you would like to review include the Chemistry award, the Art History award and small grants to Jewish organizations, the Tolerance Foundation and Roma (Gypsy) organizations.

At this point, therefore, I will only respond to the two points you raise in your fax of 22 January.

1. Regarding the Chemistry award: 1 raised your concerns with representatives of the Czech Chemistry Society and have received a response from Dr. Drasar (attached). While no one from the Foundation was able to attend the final meeting of the Committee which made the award decision in 1996 for Dr. Havlicek I do know from conversations which I had in December with some of the members that the question of whether this was CHEMISTRY was thoroughly discussed. It also makes note of that in the minutes from the meeting (which are, of course, in Czech). Even if I had been present, quite honestly, I would not have been able to assess this question, since it is really not my field of expertise. I am encouraged, however, that the members of the committee decided, based on the application materials, that the work of Dr. Havlicek is appropriate for the award. At this point, I cannot add more and look forward to your response to Dr. Drasar's e-mail message

2. The Foundation for a Civil Society, through our Democracy Network Program, has given a few small grants to Roma organizations in the Czech Republic, including the Dr. Rajko Djuric Foundation. For your information, I have forwarded a list of organizations to Wendy and though they are all small and many lack good solid organization skills, they are all doing extremely worthwhile projects. I think your idea to support such activities is an excellent one.

f am sorry that I will not be able to see you and Isabel when you are in New York. I especially enjoyed our meeting last year when we visited the Metropolitan Museum and saw the Wieners' art collection. 1 look forward to hearing from my colleagues about the meeting.


Thank you very much for your letters of September 20 and October 4. I feel a little bit guilty for the delay but I am now really busy.



And I really must visit the Milotice castle to see the "ugly portraits" of your ancestors. It is a good reason to spend a nice week of my vacation in Moravia in some of the coming years.

After I sent you my last letter I realized that I should have wished you and Isabel "Happy Passover" so allow me to do so with some delay. I must admit that before coming to the USA I had no idea about this holiday. And then I was not sure if it is appropriate to wish a Jewish person at this occasion. This time I asked a person about it and she assured me that it is not only appropriate but nearly compulsory. So accept my excuse.

I am glad to see that you are establishing a new Bader's Fellowship, now even at famous Harvard University. I wish I were twenty years younger to compete for these fellowships. I only hope that Czech Universities will be able under the new conditions to produce graduates good enough for these fellowships. My friends from Prague Technical University have really hard time now. Some people in the Czech Republic also complain about the hardship of the real life in this new situation. Dear Stan:

I feel very guilty to have worried you by not replying to your letter of February 16th which I appreciated very much indeed. I have been travelling a good deal with many lectures in Florida, Texas, the Carolinas and Georgia, and so I put off writing to you until I had a firm schedule for my trip to Prague. That schedule has only been finalized now; and I know that I will be in the Czech Republic from the 8th to the 16th of June, with a couple of days in the middle in Prague.

Of course I very much enjoyed reading your article, and I want to thank you for your very kind words. One minor and totally unimportant detail is that I have no family, but very good friends in Miroslav. My father's father was born in Kyjov, and my father's mother, in Prague. My father and I were born in Vienna. My mother's family had homes both in Hungary and Moravia, and the family castle in Milotice is now a museum with lots of ugly portraits of ancestors of mine. Why they did not have the good sense to pick good painters in the 17th and 18th centuries I don't know, but it's too late to do anything about it.

I have now established an award for Czech art historians to spend six months abroad studying any baroque art of interest to them. Also, as you will see from the enclosed correspondence with E. J. Corey, I am about to set up a fellowship at Harvard for Czech chemistry students.

Of course, I am very intrigued by your idea of establishing an award for the best organic paper published by a young Czech chemist in any given year. I very much want to discuss this with you in Prague. As this won't be possible, please think about it and then send me your telephone number at home so that I can discuss it with you. What I have in mind is for a committee of three chemists, initially,

perhaps you, an academic at the Academy in Prague, perhaps Dr. Tichy, and an industrial chemist, perhaps Vladimir Matous, to constitute a committee of three within the Czech Chemical Society to select the best papers for the first few years. 

I am so happy to have your details and informative letter of February 16th.

I was glad to hear that you received the check for the research samples from Bob Wandler; he is a very good man who tries hard to expand the Library.

How very nice to read the translation of your thoughtful article on the Bader Fellowships in Organic Chemistry.

The second student, at Imperial College, is doing well, indeed. I met him in November, he is working with Dr. Willie Motherwell, and they get on very well together. He comes in at 7 in the morning and works until 9 in the evening--a work ethic quite unknown in England. He is also a kind and thoughtful person.

Your Czech article has only one minor and unimportant mistake. My grandfather Bader was born in Kyov. 

I have already received the check for amount you have predicted. Thank you for your assistance in this matter.



Dear Alfred,

Thank you very much for your last letter and the first part of you autobiography which was enclosed.

I have just returned from Prague and I enjoyed the stay very much. I met with many friends and I also tried to find out some suggestions concerning possible ways to help Czech chemists. Unfortunately the present situation of research (not only in chemistry) is really difficult and it is caused by the overall economic situation of the country. Nevertheless, I believe that some incentives for Czech chemists to return to their homeland after receiving experience abroad can be useful. Maybe it could be done in the form of a prize for the best article published by Czech chemists (both in Czech journals and abroad) in some period of time. The Editorial Board of Collections of the Czechoslovak Chemical Communications founded similar prize, but their prize is for the best article published in their Journal by Czech chemists working both in Czech Republic and abroad.

Another problem for Czech chemists is the fact that many foreign journals require some payments for publications. In the present situation these fees are out of reach of most Czech chemists. Even for persons having some foreign currency it is not simple to pay these fees in the situation when their personal income is much lower then average salary in the country. Therefore refunding these expenses (or their part) after publication from some source (maybe from some special foundation) can encourage people for submitting articles also to these Journals, which are often of high readership.

Of course consider these ideas only as my personal ones and I really have no intention to persuade you to give your money in a project you do not consider useful.





### BADEROVA STIPENDIA PRO ČESKOSLOVEN-SKÉ STUDENTY ORGANICKÉ CHEMIE

Zakladatel a dlouholetý předseda firmy Aldrich dr. Alfréd Bader se v roce 1990 rozhodl založit na dvou významných světových univerzitách Baderova stipendia určená výlučně československým absolventům vysokých škol v oboru organické chemie, a tak jim umožnit získání titulu Ph.D. V září 1991 nastoupil jako první Baderův stipendista na Columbia University v New Yorku absolvent Masarykovy univerzity v Brně Miroslav Řezáč. O rok později by měl nastoupit Baderův stipendista také na Imperial College v Londýně. Cílem tohoto článku není přinést podrobnosti pro případné zájemce, které jsou dostupné na všech v úvahu přicházejících školách. ale osvětlit, proč se zájem dr. Badera soustředil právě na naše absolventy.

Dr. Bader je všeobecně známý svou vášní pro obrazy starých mistrů, zvláště pro vlámské a holandské mistry 17. století, s jejichž reprodukcemi se pravidelně setkáváme na obalech všech publikací vydávaných firmou Aldrich. Jeho cílem však není do těchto obrazů ukládat prostředky, zabývá se historií těchto obrazů, objevováním nových fakt o jejich tvůrcích, srovnáváním obrazů ze své sbírky s jinými obrazy se stejným tématem, atd. V této oblasti je jeho snem, aby na jeho "alma mater", jíž je Queen's University v Kingstonu, bylo zřízeno studium historie umění na úrovni Ph.D. Aby pro to vytvořil předpoklady, věnoval dr. Bader během posledních 20 let této univerzitě kolem 100 obrazů starých mistrů, čímž se umělecké centrum této univerzity stalo majitelem nejucelenější sbírky obrazů tohoto období v Kanadě<sup>1</sup>. Tento příklad uvádím úmyslně jako důkaz cílevědomosti tohoto člověka, který se rozhodl pomoci zvýšit úroveň chemie u nás.

Když jsem se před lety obrátil na dr. Badera ve snaze dostávat pravidelně Aldrichimica Acta, byl jsem překvapen jeho srdečným dopisem a žádostí o sdělení některých fakt o Československu. Během vzájemného dopisování jsem si postupně vytvářel obraz tohoto vitálního člověka. který se postupně stal úspěšným obchodníkem, aniž přestal být organickým chemikem a velmi citlivým člověkem. A z jeho dopisů, občasných osobních setkání v zahraničí, a v posledních dvou letech i v Praze, jasně vyzařoval vztah k Československu a láska k Praze. Počátek tohoto vztahu sahá až do jeho dětství, kdy často trávil prázdniny u svého dědečka v Miroslavi na jižní Moravě. S úsměvem vzpomíná, že právě tam dělal první obchody, když objížděl sousední vesnice a vykupoval králičí kožky. A jako pravidelný vrchol prázdnin pak navštěvoval "das goldene Prag". odkud pocházela jeho babička. Dodnes se dr. Bader obdivuje předválečnému Československu, jedinému demokratickému státu ve střední Evropě. Jako Žid zvláště oceňoval. že řada příslušníků tohoto národa našla v Československu



přechodné útočiště při svém útěku před Hitlerem. Po válce ho vývoj v Československu zklamal, a až události v roce 1968 v něm vzbudily naději na lepší vývoj. Když krátce po srpnové invazi navštívil Prahu, neubránil se tomu, aby vyjádřil své zklamání v článku v Aldrichimica Acta<sup>2</sup>, jejichž obal zcela netradičně nezdobil žádný obraz starých mistrů, ale obraz Svatovítské katedrály.


Přestože v následujících letech se návštěvám u nás vyhýbal, svůj vztah vyjadřoval jinými způsoby. Oblíbeným námětem jeho přednášek po celém světě se stal "zapomenutý genius" Josef Loschmidt, chemik českého původu, který kromě jiných věcí objevil před Kekulem vzorec benzenu<sup>3,4</sup>. Podle dr. Badera pak Kekule o Loschmidtově publikaci musel vědět a vědomě si tento objev přisvojit. Pro dr. Badera je typické, že přednášku na toto téma hodlal přednést i na konferenci pořádané ke Kekuleho výročí, což mu nebylo umožněno.

Se všeobecnými změnami ve východoevropských zemích vzrostl i zájem dr. Badera o Československo. Byl jsem doslova bombardován různými články týkajícími se vývoje u nás, na něž chtěl dr. Bader názor člověka "z druhé strany". Po listopadu 1989 pak dr. Bader Československo několikrát navštívil, přednesl tu několik přednášek a uskutečnil řadu obchodních i osobních setkání. Podle jeho názoru je úroveň chemie v Československu vysoká, chybí zde však osobnosti skutečně světové úrovně. Na základě této úvahy se pak rozhodl zřídit již zmíněná Baderova stipendia a doufá, že některý ze stipendistů by se takovou osobností mohl stát. Nezbývá než doufat, že náš další vnitrostátní vývoj neodradí tohoto příznivce v dalším snažení ve prospěch úrovně Československé organické chemie.



On the other hand, it is easy to get from Manhattan to the Newark airport, and I would suggest that we meet at a spot at the airport convenient to you at a definite time. We will then make sure that we are at Newark airport half an hour or so before you arrive.

We had a wonderful week in Czechoslovakia, and I am trying to help both chemists and art historians. The first Bader fellow from Brno is now beginning his second year at Columbia University, and the first at Imperial College in London just arrived there.

Our help to Czechoslovak art historians is described on the enclosed.

Dear Alfred,

Thank you very much for your call and you and Isabel for your nice letter of July 21. I am very glad to hear that you have spent some part of your European journey again in Czechoslovakia and I hope that you enjoyed it in spite of the tension you observed there. I am sure that your latest experience from my country could be for me very interesting. Therefore the possibility to visit you in Milwaukee was a great temptation for me. But during last several weeks we started to travel by car and I have realized how far from Nutley Milwaukee is.

I was really very disapointed when I found that it is nearly impossible to get there during my vaccantions and therefore we decided not to go there. I am looking forward to meet you in Nutley in October and although I am sure that you will be very busy at Hoffmann-La Roche, I still hope that you will spare some time for me. I believe that our decission not to go to Milwaukee was the greatest disappointment for Tom since he enjoyed your visit in Prague very much (especially his discussion with Isabel). But I am sure that you will visit us in Prague more often in following years. Situation in Czechoslovakia is changing in unpredictable way now, but I hope that this change will be a peaceful one. Since the main streams in Czech and Slovak politics seem to be incompatible, I will probably return to a different state than I left. Of course the split would have also a negative economic impact but I am sure that even an independent Czech republic can be changed into a prosperous country.

As far as my experiences from my stay is concerned, most of them are positive and interesting but some are also at least mixed (e.g. TV programs, some parts of NY City or Philadelphia). I really appreciate the possibility to work at Hoffmann-La Roche but I must say that before I came here I had supposed greater differencies between the



levels of both institutions. Even the difference in laboratory instruments is not so dramatic as I expected. Therefore I hope that our Institute will be able to survive even the hard times which are in Czechoslovakia now. Probably the most critical situation will be at the beginning of the next year and so I was asked by my Prague boss to extend my stay to June 1993. I hope that it will be possible in spite of the fact that some reorganization is under way at HLR and that the project I am doing now will be terminated this October. Even if my stay is not extended I believe that it will be inspiring in many ways.

Before I came to the U.S.A. I wrote a short article on Bader Fellowships for Chemicke Listy and I hope that it will be published soon. I believe that the article also expresses properly your relationship to our country. I very appreciate that the latest development at Sigma-Aldrich did not discourage you in supporting Czech students in the form of the Bader Fellowships and that you are even planning to establish new fellowship in University of Pennsylvania and to support also Czech art history students in future.

All good wishes, also to your family.



I feel very guilty to have worried you by not replying to your letter of February 16th which I appreciated very much indeed. I have been travelling a good deal with many lectures in Florida, Texas, the Carolinas and Georgia, and so I put off writing to you until I had a firm schedule for my trip to Prague. That schedule has only been finalized now; and I know that I will be in the Czech Republic from the 8th to the 16th of June, with a couple of days in the middle in Prague.

Of course I very much enjoyed reading your article, and I want to thank you for your very kind words. One minor and totally unimportant detail is that I have no family, but very good friends in Miroslav. My father's father was born in Kyjov, and my father's mother, in Prague. My father and I were born in Vienna. My mother's family had homes both in Hungary and Moravia, and the family castle in Milotice is now a museum with lots of ugly portraits of ancestors of mine. Why they did not have the good sense to pick good painters in the 17th and 18th centuries I don't know, but it's too late to do anything about it.

I have now established an award for Czech art historians to spend six months abroad studying any baroque art of interest to them. Also, as you will see from the enclosed correspondence with E. J. Corey, I am about to set up a fellowship at Harvard for Czech chemistry students.

Of course, I am very intrigued by your idea of establishing an award for the best organic paper published by a young Czech chemist in any given year. I very much want to discuss this with you in Prague. As this won't be possible, please think about it and then send me your telephone number at home so that I can discuss it with you. What I have in mind is for a committee of three chemists, initially,

perhaps you, an academic at the Academy in Prague, perhaps Dr. Tichy, and an industrial chemist, perhaps Vladimir Matous, to constitute a committee of three within the Czech Chemical Society to select the best papers for the first few years. But the Czech Chemical Society will have to set up some mechanics of continuing that committee in perpetuity.

Of course, there is no need to re-invent the wheel: there are such Bader awards with the ACS, the Canadian Chemical Society and the British Royal Society of Chemistry. I have in mind a \$3,000 award annually, with most of it to go to the chemist winning it, and some amount to pay for the administration of the award. Let me discuss all this with you when I talk to you, but please discuss this with the officers of the Czech Chemical Society when you are in Prague, also.

I would be happy to provide the money this year, through the Charter 77 Foundation, and then to have the first award made in 1994.


My 70th birthday will be on April 28, and I will celebrate it with a dinner with many of the oldest employees at Aldrich.

Thank you very much for your kind letter of February 15 and the enclosed materials. You know that I really appreciate that you continue keeping me informed about your activities regarding Czech Republic and your help to our chemistry and art history. I found your collaboration with the Foundation for a Civil Society quite reasonable and I hope that prof. Paleta is also satisfied with the proposed solution. I have a small note regarding the copy of professor's Paleta letter of December 15, 1993. I was a little bit surprised by his concern about the influence of the inflation to the value of the award. I feel that their main concern should be to establish the award and make it really prestigious. I agree that the value is very important, especially at the beginning, and I am sure that 100,000 crown is more than enough. In my opinion, the worst thing that could happen is to give the first Awards to recipients that are not worth it. And finding a reliable procedure for the recipients elimination should concern prof. Paleta now. Since he is a very systematic man, I believe that it will end well. and I would like to organize the vacation as a special gift for him. It may be our last vacation spent together since I suppose that later he will more enjoy his vacation without us.




I feel guilty that I have not replied earlier to your long and informative letter of November 15th sent to our home in Bexhill, but I have been exceedingly busy all this time. We do indeed like spending 89 days each year in our English home, which is a very simple place but in a nice area. Our stay is limited to 89 days as we would have to pay British income tax if we stayed there longer.

I have been exceedingly busy trying to finish my autobiography and hope to find a publisher for it within the next year. It isn't at all easy to write 15 or 20 chapters about subjects as different as chemistry, Aldrich, and art history, and the danger of such a book is that many of the chapters will be of little interest to specific readers.

Regarding my trying to help Czech chemists, there have been some positive developments. I have gotten to know the people at the Foundation for a Civil Society, formerly Charter 77 Foundation, and they seem to know their way around, to help Czechs.

Enclosed is my recent correspondence with Professor Poleta from which you will see that I have given the funds for the first three years to the Foundation, and they will give 110,000 Czech crowns to the Czech Chemical Society in each of the next three years. After that, we will see how best to give the capital so that the award will be permanent.

Also, Harvard University has accepted a fellowship for one Ph.D. student from the Czech Republic every year, to go to Cambridge for his or her studies. At the other three universities, Columbia University, Imperial College and the University of Pennsylvania, the fellowship is for one student to come every three years. The first student at Columbia University is doing very well, as is the second student at

Imperial College. However, last year the University of Pennsylvania received no suitable applicants for the Bader Fellowship. They will try again this year.

As you know, I met the president of the Czech Academy, Professor Zahradnik, last summer, but our correspondence since then has been very disappointing. Perhaps another visit and the help from the Foundation for a Civil Society will be useful.

## Dear Alfred:

First I must apologize for the delay. I hope that you have already found that I hate being late for any response but I have been really busy for the last two months. I had to finish a review for Advances in Heterocyclic Chemistry, the deadline for its preparation was the end of October. After being cut off from my Czech colleagues from other Universities, Institutes and Companies during my stay in the U.S.A., I attended two events in the Czech Republic during October and November (Congress of the Czech and Slovak Chemical Societies, Conference on Organic, Bioorganic and Pharmaceutical Chemistry of the Czech Chemical Society). I had to prepare lectures for the meetings. In addition, I attended a Seminar on heterocyclic Chemistry held in Prague with several distinguished speakers from abroad. I also had to prepare a project on analgesics for the next year to get funding for it. The situation in Czech pharmaceutical industry is very difficult since most companies are not willing to pay money for research. They prefer to form a joint venture with foreign companies (mostly some unknown ones) and to produce only so-called generic drugs. Fortunately I have a promise from Leciva that they would finance my project for the next year by 4 million crowns. It could look lots of money but it is not, since the bureaucracy in both our Institute and in the Czech Republic in general is still big and its expenses as well.

Thank you very much for your letter and copies of your correspondence dealing with your help to Czech chemistry. It is a great thing and I must say that it is really "by no means easy". I am afraid that your experience with your traveling award for a student of art history is not exceptional but rather typical. I must say that generaliv characters of people have been revealed since 1989 and frequently not only good features appeared. No law dealing with conflict of interest is valid in our republic. The law from the Communist era was abolished and all attempts to pass a new one have been rejected by the Parliament. The situation is very advantageous for our representatives since most members of Parliament have their own private companies and can use their information during the privatization process for their advantage. There have been published many cases when our ministers, government officers, members of Parliament, and police officers are involved in a very strange privatization. For example, deputy chairman of ODS (party lead by Vaclav Klaus whom I personally admire) bought a building in Prague for 7 million crowns and sold it in two months for 76 million crowns. And everything was legal since our Parliament passed the law that in some cases objects for privatization could be sold not for a real value but for a value count by a special methodology that did not take into account its real market value. And some people are touched by such behavior of these famous and influential people and are trying to get money or other advantages from everything possible. In spite of such unpleasant features of our recent process I believe that there is no alternative to the privatization. This part is only an illustration of our present situation, not a complain of mine.



During the Conference on Organic, Bioorganic and Pharmaceutical Chemistry I discussed the matter of the award in the Czech Chemical Society with Prof. Paleta. He explained me their reasons why they preferred establishing a foundation to buying long-term bonds. He informed me that the new version of the Award, that accepted most of your suggestions, was prepared and would be sent to you in the near future. I did not see the text but I hope that the version would be really acceptable for you.

Regarding your fellowships you have established for Czech students at several Universities I hope that it will be possible to find good students for them but, in my opinion, there is not advisable to established some additional ones. I also discussed the matter with Prof. Paleta and others and they believed that the number of good students is slightly declining. Generally, in our media Chemistry is blamed for many sins and is not very perspective for young people. In addition, there is no need for new chemists both in Academia and Industry and chemists on the bench level are greatly underpaid. Of course there are some students with an enthusiasm for Chemistry and I hope that they will be attracted by your fellowships. And what you can do for encouraging them? I believe that the standard procedure of sending the announcement to all Czech Chemistry Universities should be enough. Maybe you can ask Prof. Paleta to place an advertisement in Chemicke Listy (Journal of the Czech Chemical Society) whenever it would be necessary. In my opinion it could be helpful if the current Bader fellows share their experience in the form of letters to Chemicke Listy but I could not imagine the way how to encourage them to do it.

As far as VUOS is concerned, I have found that the company was on the list of companies for privatization by the coupon method. I hoped that I could meet Ing. Matous during some of the events I have attended since my return from the U.S.A. but he apparently did not attend any of them. I hope that you will introduce us during some of your next visits to our country.

Since I have noticed in a fax, the copy of which you sent to me, that you were planning a longer stay in England, I am sending this letter to your England address. Your place in England must be very nice and your stays there very refreshing, judging according to the frequency of your visits there. Years ago, when I started learning English, I hoped to visit England and this vision was a great encouragement for further study. We also discussed the possibility to visit England during some of our next family vacations and maybe you can advice us some places of interest together with information about the travel and boarding possibilities in England. Maybe we can discuss this matter during your next visit to Prague.

Dear Stan,

I am so happy to have your letter of September 5 for two reasons, one of which may amuse you. The better of the two is to know from your letter that you are settling down to your work and are relatively happy with what is happening in Prague. The other reason is that I can now write to you. I mislaid your Prague address, and I have not yet had a reply about your address from Dr. Felix at Roche, to whom I wrote some time ago.

To answer your letter of May 19 which awaited me when I returned from Europe at the end of July, there is nothing confidential about my correspondence with Harvard about the Czech fellowship, and copies are enclosed.

Regarding an award with the Czech Chemical Society, that was tentatively accepted during my meeting with Dr. Paleta in Prague, and I enclose copies of the correspondence. The Czech Chemical Society is slow in reaching decisions, and I received Dr. Paleta's reply only today. His and my faxes, enclosed, will be selfexplanatory.

Establishing awards in the Czech Republic is by no means easy, and I want to share with you my concern in a field that doesn't interest you particularly, but which is very close to my heart--art history. I wanted to establish a travelling award to send a <u>student</u> to a place of his or her choice. However, I wasn't certain how well the Czech Academy would handle such an award, and so I promised \$15,000 each a year for a trial period of three years. Yet, when I inquired about it in Prague during my last visit, I was introduced to the man who won the award. He is certainly not a student, but a man with an established reputation who had no intention of studying in one place, but simply used the \$15,000 to look at museums all over Europe. Clearly, such a trip is very worthwhile for him, but it is not at all what I wanted to do, namely, to help a Czech student. What do you think of my last letter to

Dr. Milena Bartlova, who is incidentally a very likeable and good person and the daughter of the recent Czech Ambassador to Washington. I have not yet had her reply, and I am very curious to learn what she will say.

This is not the only disappointment I have had. As you know, we have established several fellowships for Czech students, and the first two who went to Columbia University and Imperial College, are doing well. However, the University of Pennsylvania received one application only, and when the applicant was offered the fellowship he had to turn it down because he had accepted a fellowship from Michigan State University. My letter to Professor Smith will be self-explanatory.

What can one do to encourage more Czech students to apply for these fellowships?

Recently, I received a letter from Professor Rudolf Zahradnik who is the president of the Academy of Sciences, suggesting that I establish a Bader Chair in physical chemistry at Charles University. I have been thinking about this, and I will now reply that I would be interested in the future to establish such a chair, but would much prefer it to be in organic chemistry, rather than in physical chemistry. I wonder whether Professor Zahradnik will understand my reasoning, which surely you will understand.

Since I received your letter of May 19, I have made some inquiries about that Belgian businessman, Dr. Walter van Herck. I would like to urge you and your friend to be quite careful.

I have been very disappointed in what has been happening at VUOS. As you know, we have become good friends of Ing. Vladimir Matous, one of the most decent Czechs I know. Because of this friendship and his ability, we had hoped to invest in VUOS when that company is privatized. But that has simply been put off time and again, and we don't know whether it will ever take place. Should you ever have a chance to meet Ing. Matous, I am sure that both of you would enjoy the meeting. Again this last summer, we had a couple of very good days with him and really enjoyed the visit.

I think that I really share your thinking and sentiments about Prague and the Czech Republic. Prague has become quite cosmopolitan and overcrowded by tourists, but

I think that the positives, both in Prague and the entire country, outweigh the negatives such as the growing crime rate. Maybe it's just wishful thinking, but I do believe that in time the Czech Republic will become one of the great countries of Europe. 

## Dear Alfred:

Excuse me that I was not able to write you sooner but I was really busy. I returned to Prague on July 2 and I had an idea of a very quiet two months' vacation spent alternately at my parents house near Pilzen and in Prague. In reality it was not so. In fact it was a very strange type of vacation since I had to visit many friends and colleagues who were interested in my American experience. In addition I had to prepare some other materials (publication for J. Het. Chem., poster for the Conference of Czech Chemists that will take place in Olomouc next week). Since my boss told me that I would be a person in charge of a project dealing with non-opioid analgesics I also had to study what has been done in the project during my stay in the US. Unfortunately I was not satisfied with my findings and therefore I had to spent some time of my vacation in the library to modify the project. All these facts caused that especially in Prague I was really busy. I postponed all my correspondence till September since I expecting to have more time. In spite these expectations were not fulfilled I want to get something off to you.

The stay in the US and work at Hoffmann-La Roche was an experience of my lifetime. I had been longing for something like that for years and I am glad that the dream came true. I found many good things there but I must say that there are some other things I do not like so much. I suppose that I will often get back in my thoughts to that part of my life but now I prefer to enjoy the current situation. For me it is great to be back home with my family and friends. In Prague I found a lot of changes, mostly positive. Especially the Old Town is really colorful and in much better shape than two years ago. Unfortunately prices in this part of Prague are really high for ordinary Czechs. In general, standard of living of most people is slightly lower than several years ago. On the other hand there are emerging some successful entrepreneurs who can bring some real economic growth. Unfortunately, all the process is also connected with relatively high criminality and with corruption in all levels of government, and even in the police and the justice. But I feel that overall situation after the split of Czechoslovakia is better than I had expected. Fiscal policy of our government is very restrictive (at least 1 think so) and our budget is balanced. Unfortunately the budget restrictions were very painful for our scientific institutions. For example our Institute used to get 50% of our money from the



government. This year we received only a very small portion from the government funding agency and therefore the Institute had great difficulties in obtaining funds for the real basics. Consequently approximately one half of the employees have left the Institute. I know that slimming of the Institute was necessary but unfortunately average level of people leaving the Institute was higher than that of people left here. And similar situation exists in the Czech Academy as well. Our Institute is expected to be privatized next year and I wonder what kind of changes the process comes. It is quite natural, but for us unfortunate, that all Czech pharmaceutical companies try to establish at least joint venture with some foreign companies and therefore their funding of our research is decreasing. Only the future tells us if medicinal research in the Czech Republic is really possible or not.

And what about you? Thank you for your visit and especially for the nice painting you gave to Majka. I hope that will be home to enjoy your next visit. I would be very grateful if you write me about your Prague visit, about your impressions from here and about your meetings with people from the Academy and the University. And what about your project to invest into VUOS Pardubice? Of course, all the possible information would be confidential.







Při poslední návštěvě Prahy mi můj přítel a známý podporovatel světové a zvláště české chemie a historie umění dr. Alfred Bader věnoval svou autobiografickou knihu "Adventures of a Chemist Collector". Po řadě více či méně biografických článků, z nichž pro českého čtenáře jsou asi nejpřístupnější články v Aldrichimica Acta (17, 3 (1984) a v Chemických Listech (86, 315 (1992)), se do rukou čtenářů dostává kniha autobiografická

Kniha je členěna do 24 kapitol pokrývajících jednak jednotlivé etapy života dr. Badera, jednak jeho hlavní aktivity vědecké, obchodní, sběratelské a mecenášské

V kapitolách Childhood, Internment, Queen's University a Harvard popisuje své dětství v Rakousku, útěk před Hitlerem do Anglie, internaci v Kanadě a následné vzdělávání. Přitom neopomíjí ani údaje odborné, včetně chemického zaměření své práce.

Další kapitoly (Aldrich, Collecting Chemicals, Searching for Suppliers. Friends and Competitors. Joint Ventures, Sigma-Aldrich) popisují fascinující historii založení firmy Aldrich a sepětí dr. 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Alferd Bader: Adventures of a Chemist Collector (ISBN 0 297 83461 4) Wiedenfeld and Nicolson, London 1995. Pages 288, price14,95 BRP.

During his last visit of Prague my friend and a well-known supporter of chemistry and art history, especially Czech ones, Dr. Alfred Bader gave me his autobiography "Adventures of a Chemist Collector". After several more or less biographical articles, from which the most accessible for the Czech readers are articles published in Aldrichimica Acta (17, p. 3, 1984) and in Chemicke Listy (86, p. 315, 1992), readers can enjoy this autobiographic book.

The book is divided into 24 chapters covering individual stages of Dr. Bader's life, its main scientific, business, collector's and philanthropic activities.

In chapters Childhood, Interment, Queen's University and Harvard the author describes his childhood in Austria, his flight to England ahead of Hitler, his internment in Canada and following education. He did not omit also professional aspects, including chemistry of his interest.

Further chapters (Aldrich, Collecting chemicals, Searching for suppliers, Friends and competitors, Joint ventures, Sigma-Aldrich) describe a fascinating history of foundation of Aldrich Chemical Company and Dr. Bader's commitment to the growing company. His activities which distinguished Aldrich from other suppliers of fine chemicals and which were essential for the enormous growth of the company are especially well described. Despite the fact that today's conditions are different, especially these parts could be useful for chemists who are starting their own businesses. Particular attention is paid also to the description of the atmosphere in Sigma-Aldrich from the merge to Dr. Bader's expulsion in 1992 (chapters Sigma-Aldrich and My expulsion). Description of interpersonal relations in the top management, attitude of individual company managers to various situations and other details must persuade unbiased readers about Dr. Baders arguments.

It is not possible to imagine Dr. Bader's personality without his trips between chemical laboratories all over the world (Tribute to Universities) and without his collector's activities (Paintings, Trophies of the Hunt). Especially Czech chemists can be interested in the chapter dealing with Dr. Bader's affection of the recent years, which is the discovery of unknown facts from the life and work of Josef Loschmidt. From many awards, gifts and fellowships established by Dr. Bader, he mentions some of them in chapter Caveat Donor. One of the most recent gift he describes in a special chapter. This generous gift is a former royal



observatory Herstmonceux bought by Dr. Bader for more than ten million dollars and given to his alma mater for starting a study center of this Canadian University in England.

Reading the book gives the reader many interesting points dealing with all aspects of the author's life. He does not avoid even religious and quite personal issues (Isabel and Danny, David and Daniel). Autobiographic parts are enriched by the author's observations from his journeys and his meetings with scientists, people from chemistry and art business and with other friends. Some readers could be confused by high number of persons as well as numbers of companies and museums mentioned in the autobiography. For other readers this feature could be an invaluable source of information which illustrates the author's activities. Both chemists and art historians will be surely satisfied by comments of a true expert. This book is especially valuable for readers interested in history of chemistry since it brings many interesting details about famous scientists who Dr. Bader has met during his fruitful life. An essential feature of this book is, however, that even parts which deal with matters quite remote from the reader's specialization are written very readably. Any particular information is well documented by literature references which is quite uncommon in autobiographic book but it well demonstrate Dr. Bader's sense for details. An extensive index is an invaluable part of the book.

At the end of book reviews authors usually evaluate the book from the point of their usefulness for the potential readers and/or libraries. In spite I fully realize the difficult situation of our chemists and scientific libraries, I believe that abundance of information, life wisdom and optimism that come from the book justify this expenditure.

As your visit to Prague is approaching I am looking forward to meeting you. I must inform you that last year I bought a new car (again Skoda), which is relatively small but really reliable. Therefore I am able to take you where you want both inside and outside Prague and therefore feel free to ask me. I would really appreciate if you can send me a rough schedule of your trip to the Czech republic, especially your Prague visit.

Regarding my work, nothing has changed but big changes are probable since our Institute should be privatized till the end of this year. Additional unpredictable but necessary changes will be caused by privatization of Leciva Praha which should be done till the end of July. Our institute has most of its money from contracts with Leciva, for example, my research program on analgesics is financed from 50% by Leciva and 50% by a grant from the government.

In January I became an editor of our chemical journal Collection of the Czechoslovak Chemical Communications and therefore I am busy to learn a lot of things regarding editing now. I have served as an reviewer for this journal but this is a new experience and I hope I will like it.

Dear Alfred,

Thank you for your letters of May 7 and 9 I have just received.

I am glad to hear that your visit to Prague will take place in the scheduled time since we probably will leave for vacations on June 28. The evening of June 23 is quite suitable to meet with you and I hope that you will be able to take a dinner with us in our apartment. As I have offered to you I can also help you with transportation whenever you like.

Regarding your offer to collaborate with Diversa I am afraid that it is not quite possible at this time. The reason is that there is a great shortage of productive chemists in Prague. Our Institute has some contracts with several Czech companies as well as with Novo Nordisk and we all must work hard to fulfill the contracts which is essential for our Institute to survive. I am in charge of a project and frankly said it is very tough to keep pace and I am not able to prepare samples for Diversa. Of course, these long-term research contracts are paid much better than ordinary custom synthesis. Since our Institute has not been sufficiently reorganized our expenses, mainly for large section of pharmalology and many clerks, are too high. However, a former colleague has founded his own company and besides his contracts he is able to produce a limited number of samples. Though his production might be also more expensive than you expect, this is probably the only way I can be helpful in this matter now. Since your visit to Prague is approaching, our idea is that you can bring a list of about 10 compounds and he would consider the list and send you his suggested prices in about two weeks needed to consult the literature. In case of compounds prepared earlier by myself he would pay me a fee for consultation. He will also prepare a list of his compounds which can be prepared in 50 g quantities, of course with the proposed prices. This list I can give you during your visit.

Most of the compounds I have experience with are nitrogen-containing bi- and tricycles, namely quinoline and pyrazolo[3,4-b]quinolines. Nearly all pyrimidine samples were prepared by a former colleague of mine who died several years ago and therefore nobody here has direct experience with these compounds. Many other heterocycles, mainly benzimidazoles, were prepared by a former colleague who retired several years ago. He is not able to work on it but he can give us an advice.

I believe that the best idea is to discuss these matters in details during your visit. Since our Institute is not able to participate in the cooperation now, please do not contact me via fax in this matter.

Thank you for your letter of January 16, 1997. I am happy that most of the samples seem to be useful for Aldrich (I have already received a check). Meanwhile I am preparing three more batches of samples, mostly compounds not mentioned in the Library of Rare Chemicals in spite I gave them to you several years ago. I will send them to your Fine Arts address in a week or so. I still have not checked some older pyrimidines I have already provided to you and I hope to do it in a month or two.

Regarding the Bader Award, I have checked the original announcement published in the Bulletin of the Czech Chemical Society in 1994 (a copy is enclosed). The announcement clearly says that the award is for work in organic and bioorganic chemistry. I suppose that the committee considered the work of Dr. Havlicek as a work from physical organic chemistry. I am sure that after your recent letter to prof.
