Dear Dr. Bader,

I have read your essay on chemistry and anti-Semitism in Vienna in the 19th century with great interest, especially since I am not familiar with the situation of Jews during this period in Austria. Meissner was certainly an exceptional person. It's too bad, also probably for the sake of Jews that he was an incompetent chemist. The story of Wilhelm Wertheim is indeed moving and telling. I find it remarkable (though not surprising) that the Catholic church was so strongly opposed to Jews being granted equal rights. In my opinion your article leaves the question open whether Loschmidt was an anti-Semite. Treitschke in Berlin who was probably one of the greatest anti-Semites during his time, had Jewish friends, too, whom he wanted to exempt from his attempts to create a unified Christian academic world. Do you know whether Loschmidt also publicly supported Jews who wanted to become professors in Austria? Or whether he defended them against anti-Semitic attacks?

The questions I would like to ask you are related to the forced emigration of chemists from Nazi Germany and Austria to the US.

1) Looking at those chemists who had already a position in Austria or Germany before they had to leave, I find that physical chemists, especially Herman Mark, and biochemists, as for example Max Bergmann, became the most eminent refugee chemists in the US. Do you know whether there were also organic chemists among the refugees of that generation who became eminent in academia or industry?

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- 2) Have you known some emigre chemists of that generation personally? (Apart from Bernard Witkop who might be considered as a late emigre since he could not leave Germany during the war. I read in your book about your unpleasant and later pleasant meetings with him.)
- 3) My next question is concerned with those chemists who came to the US when they were still pupils or students. Of them, you have certainly become the most outstanding and influential person in chemical industry, and I must say that I enjoyed very much reading your fascinating autobiography. I know also Carl Djerassi and his achievements. Do you know who else of the chemists came to the US as a German or Austrian refugee?
- 4) You wrote about your friendship with Herbert Bondy. I would be very much interested to know whether he told you about his experiences with Staudinger as scientist and person, especially after 1933.
- 5) Did the fact that so many German and Austrian chemists of industry and academia had compromised with the Nazi regime and anti-Semitism have impact on your economic cooperation after the war? I could imagine that in some cases the cooperation could have become quite difficult. On the other hand I was told that for example Herman Mark did not care at all whether a person had been an Nazi or not because he didn't want to think of bad things in the past.

I would be very grateful if you had the time to answer some of my questions or if it were possible to meet some time in New York.

Meanwhile I take the opportunity to send you my best wishes for the New Year.

Enclosed please find the transcript of the interview with my mother's brother.



However, looking at my calendar that might not be necessary.



Dear Dr. Bader,

Thank you very much for your letter and the review on your autobiography. Already the review shows me how admirable - in so many respects - your life and your achievements are. I ordered a copy of the book, but did not yet receive it.

May I shortly introduce myself to you? I studied biology and after several years of teaching biology and chemistry at a Gymnasium, I started research about biology in Nazi Germany under the supervision of Prof. B. Müller-Hill at the Institute for Genetics of the University of Koeln. My Ph.D. Dissertation was translated and published this year by Harvard University Press with the title "Biology and under Hitler". Now I am carrying out research about chemists and chemistry in Nazi Germany and Austria. One of my major topics is the impact of the expulsion and emigration of Jewish chemists. I am looking primarily at life and work of academic chemists. So far I could identify 134 chemists at universities and Kaiser Wilhelm-Institutes who were dismissed and who in most cases left Germany. But I try to find out as much as I can also about



they got a position or completed their studies and also about those who later became industrial chemists. And about those who did not manage to leave Germany in time.

In this context I would like to ask your help. I am sure that I will find many answers to my questions concerning yourself in your autobiography. But I can imagine that you got to know many other emigré chemists working either at universities or at chemical companies, particularly Aldrich. And I would greatly appreciate if you gave me some names and further information about their life and work. If you were interested and had the time for it, I would like to talk with you about some of your experiences and about chemists whom you know who were forced to leave Nazi Germany or Austria.

I could come either to England or, from November onwards, to the U.S., where I will spend several months of research mainly in Philadelphia, but also in other places.
