Dear Milena:

I am truly sorry to realize from your letter of September 25 only just received that I have really hurt your feelings by the criticism voiced in my letter of August 9.

To make matters worse, I have just received a letter from the Foundation for a Civil Society dated September 28, copy enclosed, from which I learned that you had difficulties retrieving the first \$15,000 from the account of the Institute of Art History at the Czech Academy of Sciences.

What Isabel and I would like to do is to have a travelling fellowship for a young student to study in a city of his/her choice for a period of six months.

To answer your specific questions:

- 1. He/she should be a graduate student in art history working towards a PhD.
- 2. I think that the idea of an age limit is attractive, and we would suggest a limit of 30 years of age.
- 3. The student should propose that he/she would like to study the works of one artist or one closely connected group of artists in a specific location. Let me give you some specific examples:

A student might wish to study painters in Augsburg around 1600 closely related to painters in Prague; or the student might be interested in studying Rembrandt students coming from Dordrecht between, say, 1630 and 1680; or the student might like to study the works of the Carracci family in Bologna, etc.

Thus there is no need to concentrate on one artist, but on one or a group of artists closely related geographically. Clearly someone wanting to study a specific painter in Delft will also want to go to The Hague, Leiden and Amsterdam to study.

But the fellowship is <u>not</u> to be used as a travel grant for a senior art historian to look at museums all over Europe. Surely you will remember that the fellowship was not set up for that purpose, yet it seems no students applied so Dr. Sronek received the award and used it for that purpose.

4. The recipient should be asked to present the results of his/her studies in a publication of his/her choice, but I don't think that it should be judged by anyone. If you select a good student, the publication will be good, and if the student is not good, it will be too late to judge the publication.

I have discussed the problem with a number of art historians and their response was that you were probably correct in saying that there simply aren't enough students in the Czech Republic to merit such an award. Perhaps I was led astray by the fact that we established three such fellowships for graduate students at the Institute of Fine Arts in New York to travel to Holland and Italy, and the Institute certainly had no difficulty finding excellent students, some of whom now have responsible positions in American museums and at universities.

Would it be preferable to split the \$15,000 and give \$5,000 each to three students or \$3,000 each to five students to spend one or two months at a place of their choice?

To turn now to the letter from the Foundation for a Civil Society, do you wish the \$15,000 which I plan to send shortly to stay in the Foundation's account in Prague to be turned over to you when the time comes? If not, what should be done?

As letters between us take so very long, could you please send me your fax number so that we can communicate more quickly.

I hope that you and your family really enjoyed your stay in the country.

Dear Alfred,

thank you for your letter - I am sory to disappoint you, but I have no access to fax (there is none even in our local post-office). The only thing I can do to hurry up our correspondence is to sit down and write my answer on the evening of the day your letter comes, which I am just doing.

Thank you for precision of conditions for your scholarship. I think it might be a good idea to split the \$ 15.000 into three smaller parts for shorter time: I think students would respond much better to that. I will send out the offer for next year closely following requirements in your last letter.

What concerns the problems about retrieving this year's sum well I did not want you to bother about that. But now that you know about it, please, would you be so kind and ask the Foundation for Civil Society to keep money on their <u>Prague</u> account and give them directly to the recipients of your scholarship. That would be the best solution for any problems.

I have to inform you, that unfortunately my mother fell ill again with leukemia. She flew to the NHI in Washington last week, but they sent her back because she now suffers a different form of the illness and they had no "protocol" for that cure. She is now treated in our best hospital here in Prague.

Dear Alfred,

thank you for the copy of your letter to the Foundation for a Civil Society in New York. I hope that this way of managing the money will be the best one.

I send out the announcments about your scholarship for the academic year 1994/95 to the universities teaching art history, i.e. to the Charles' University in Prague, Masaryk University in Brno and Palacký University in Olomouc. I accompanied them with personal letters to the professors teachning Baroque art and asked them to encourage the best students to apply. Beside that, the announcment will be published in the next number of the *Bulletin* of Art Historical Society (which goes to every important art-histoircal institution in the country and most libraries). I am discussing the possibility of publishing the announcment in two cultural periodicals (if they would be willing to publish them free of charge, and I think they would). The deadline for applications is similarly to the last year January 31, 1994.

I would like to inform you that my mother's treatment seems to have turned worse. Her doctor says, that nothing short of a miracle will help. We will see soon, I hope.

Dear Alfred,

your letter of August 9 reached me during my summer with children in our holiday cottage, which is in a village so small and remote (near Telč in South Moravia), that there is not even a typewriter there. I returned only last week, and that is why my answer is delayed.

In fact, I was deeply troubled by that letter. I gather from it, that I did not succeed in formulating precisely the prerequisites for the recipient of your generous scholarship for Czech art historians. You will recall I sent you the draft for the announcment last fall and I understood you agreed with the formulations. I tried to explain to you, that such people as Dr.Šroněk (and, incidentally, myself) had less opportunity to travel abroad during all their professional careers under the communist regime than today's students. I would like to assure you, that I have done a lot to get the information about your scholarships to get to most of the Czech art historians (sending the announcment to as many as 80 institutions and asking them to inform all their employees and/or students). Perhaps you might prefer to chose from the applications yourself?

To prevent further misunderstandings, please, be so kind and specify the prerequisites for the future holder of your scholarship:

- Should he (she) be an undergraduate student, or graduate up to some number of years after finishing the studies?

- Should there be some age limit?

- Should he be required to present his travel plans, which would

have to approved (by you or me)?

Should he be required to concentrate his study on one 17th century painter, or school, or locality, or country?
Should he present the results of his work in any form (to be judged by you or me)?

As soon as I get such information from you, I will prepare and send out this year's announcment of the Bader Scholarship for Study of 17th Century Painting. To ensure that all the art-history students in this country knew about it, I will contact the teachers of Baroque art at the Prague, Olomouc and Brno universities and ask them to talk with their students about the scholarship.


Dear Milena,


Please don't think for a moment I am trying to imply that a student working on Willmann should get the prize; the unenviable task of selecting the three best must be yours.


thank you for your letters of January 28th and 29th. I have, in fact, met Elizabeth Suing of the Prague office of the Foundation for a Civil Society, because she was very enthusiastic about giving me help with the publicity concerning your Scholarship for art history students. She convinced me that it would be acod, it she would have leaflets printed and distributed more widely than it was originally possible for me personally. I even bet her to persuade me to prolong the deadline for this year's applications, so as to end on February 28th.

Neverhteless, I do not think her campaign will bring about any more suitable applicants than those who have already applied - they are four students of the last term in art history (two from Prague and one from Brno and Olomouc each), seeking help for being able to prepare their diploma theses on 17th century painters (Willmann, Jan Spillenberg, van Aachen and "the relationship between the Bolognese painting and Moravia"). It will be really difficult to select the one who will not get the scholarship. As you can see, your idea is getting ground.

Dear Alfred, I understand very well the reasons uny you want your scholarship in exactly the way you want it. I think it is a great idea and that it will help to develop more interest in 17th century painting among our art history students. Please, understand, that the girls from the Foundation for a Civil Society just wanted to broaden the possible range of applicants to help more people, than what they feel to be a too narrow number of specialists. But rest assured, that I understand your intentions and I will try to continue in your direction.

Dear Milena,

Isabel and I met with three officers of the Foundation for a Civil Society in New York earlier this month, and we were really impressed by their competence and sincerity in wishing to help the Czech Republic.

I understand that you met with Elizabeth Suing of the Prague office of the foundation and that both you and she are concerned that the three student awards are too narrowly focused, being only for students interested in Baroque paintings. The suggestion has been made that the award be broadened to include sculpture, architecture, drawing, or other media.

Milena, please understand why I do not want to do this. Throughout my life I have concentrated on Baroque paintings, and I am convinced that there is fine Baroque art in the Czech Republic and that there were great painters, such as Kupetzky and Skreta who were great artists but not well known in the west. Also, you know what a center for art, specifically for paintings, Prague was around 1600, and how much collaboration there was between Prague, Vienna, Augsburg and even Amsterdam. It may well be that there will now not be three students interested in such a Baroque scholarship, but that only means that our idea is one the time for which has not yet come. This doesn't mean that there won't be Czech art historians interested in Baroque art a few years from now.


Let's see what happens during these three years. If we fail, we will find some other way to help Czech art historians.

Of course we very much look forward to chatting with you at length about how to help Czechs.




My son David has just sent me the enclosed article talking about anti-Semitism in Prague today. Is that really factual?



thank you very much for your letter of February 25 including the clips of articles about you - I may use the Czech one to put out a similar, if shorter, notice in the *Bulletin of the Art Historical Society* (I will send you a copy, of course).

- and, of course, my mother. She spends her time now between Prague and the States, having done some teaching in Phoenix, Arizona and giving lectures in New York, Washington and some place in Mississippi (i forgot the name). I am afraid, she will be just there in the first half of June, but one is never sure about her schedule.

I mentioned to her the need to get Czech visa for the Canadians, and she explained to me, that this is due to the fact, that the Canadian party provides visa for our citizens under extremely unfavorable conditions, including one of the highest fees in the world (whereas the USA provide them comfortably and free of charge).

I have given your address to Prof.Z.Kudělka from the Art History Department of the Masaryk University in Brno, who is desperately searching for funds to publish an already finished book on Baroque art in Moravia and Silesia. I warned him you prefer to support individuals and not publishing projects, but he insisted on presenting his project to you in writing. Both he and the colleagues he wrote the book with are renowed shcolars in their field and their project forms a part of the newly awakened Moravian patriotism - it is true, that most of the published art historical material has been up to now reduced to Bohemia proper.

I hope you and your wife live well and that we will be able to meet in Prague.



I am so happy to have your letter of February 14, but after all these years why the formality of calling me Dr. Bader? I don't think of your as Mrs. Bartlova but as Milena.





As always, it was such a pleasure to spend some time with you, and I only hope that when next we visit Prague--probably next summer--we will have a chance to spend some time with your mother.

You will recall we established the award for Czech art historians, specifically for students, to spend a few months to study individual artists of their choice at whatever center of learning most suitable for those studies.


We met Dr. Michail Sronek, who is certainly a very likeable man, but he is an established art historian, 41 years old, and the head of the department renaissance and baroque art at the Institute of History of Art in the Czech Academy of Sciences. It never occurred to us that the award would go to a person in an established position. Nor does he want to use the funds to study one particular painter, but rather to travel all over Europe.

Milena, please don't misunderstand me: I really like Dr. Sronek and he seems like a kind and caring person. But the award is for students in art history, not to be used as a travel grant for senior art historians.

As you perhaps know, we established several such awards with the Institute of Fine Arts in New York, and they have given the awards to students, and we are delighted to know that several of these students are now respected young art historians at various museums in the United States.

Of course I remember that you explained to me that there just aren't any students in the Czech Republic at the moment who could have applied. Well, if that is really so then the idea for such an award is simply an idea whose time has not yet come. As you know, we promised to try giving this award for three years, and we plan to keep our promise and send you \$15,000 each

year for two more years, but we very much hope that you will find some students who would use the award as it is intended. One key question is how well you really advertised the award, and whether, perhaps, more advertising within the Czech Republic would lead to more suitable candidates.

I did meet Professor Rudolph Zahradnik, the president of the Academy of Sciences of the Czech Republic, and discussed with him the possibility of Czech students coming to study at Herstmonceux Castle. The purchase of that castle by Queen's University has now been completed, and Queen's hopes to have a rather extensive program in place next year. When that happens, we will be in touch with Professor Zahradnik to discuss how best to make studies available to Czech students.

Also, I am happy to report to you that the Czech Chemical Society has accepted an Alfred Bader Award for chemical research.

Dear Alfred,

I hope you and Isabel are back well from your last journey to Europe. I was very happy to have met you in Prague, but my prolonged stay with children in the country delayed my letter to you.

I must tell you how fascinated I was by your autobiography. I have to admit I did not await much from a depiction of life of a chemist enterpreneur, but I was litteraly unable to put the book down! I am now preparing to write about it as I have promised, but I am a little afraid that journalists might think that your rich life story is just a "bad literature" and not, as it in fact is, a good life. If only I was able to write so convincingly and well as you did!

I am coming back to my work from January 1, 1996. Here are my plans for travels which you have so kindly offered to sponsor (as you have suggested, 10.000 US \$ divided into three years): 1. Spring 1996 - one week in Rome, summer 1996 - Nürnberg, Munich, Augsburg and the Rhinelands. The research would concern my share in the important project of the new corpus of Bohemian medieval painting (several panels of Bohemian origin are kept in these localities).

2. Summer 1997 - the USA. I would have to visit Boston and New York with their Bohemian Gothic paintings (I have a friend living in Manhattan with whom I could stay). Further travel would depend on your reccomendations (is it worthwhile to go to the Getty Center in Santa Monica?).

3. Summer 1998 - Romanesque sculpture of Southern France. I will be forced to travel in the hot summer months because it is the only time when I can arrange for my family in such a way that they will not miss me too much. I am looking forward to propose publicly the fourth year of your Baroque scholarship in October. I hope the collaboration with the new person at the Foundation for a Civil Society will be as a smooth as it was with Elisabeth Suing.
