The Final Phase of Benno Jacob's Biblical Studies

Benno Jacob, the Biblical scholar and leading German rabbi (1862-1945) was an early opponent of the Graf/Wellhausen theories; in contrast to others, he used his linguistic insights and modern methods to construct a different approach to the Torah. A steady stream of books and essays (Im Namen Gottes [1903], Der Pentateuch [1905], Die Abzahlungen in den Gesetzen [1909], Quellenscheidung und Exegese [1919], Auge um Auge [1929], etc.) culminated in the publication of his Das Erste Buch der Torah, Genesis [1934], a work of 1055 pages. An abridged English version was published in 1974. His Exodus Commentary of 1100 pages, appeared in an English translation in 1993. The destruction of German Jewry led to a neglect of his works. They have, however, been appreciated by scholars including Franz Rosenzweig, Martin Buber, Nahama Leibowitz, Gerhard von Rad, Brevard Childs, and others, who have often quoted them.

Thank you so much for your letter and let me react to your suggestion about the Genesis. The Genesis Commentary is available in a photo-reproduction which KTAV printed a few years ago. However, this, of course, is only the German textand that means it can reach a very limited audience, especially since few of the younger generation either here or in Israel are capable of reading German. I am interested in making this book available in English or in Hebrew and would be most pleased if your foundation would provide \$5,000 toward that publication.

I realize that such an effort will take a few years, but I have begun to work in this direction and have no doubt that it can be done as it was done with the Exodus Commentary.

Let me interestyou in another possible project. It is also necessary to make the Biblical works of Benno Jacob more widely known and I intend to do that through a symposium in 1995 which will be held either in New York or in Jerusalem. Some outstanding scholars who are interested in my late grandfather's Biblical scholarship will participate and the proceedings will then be published. As this would involve a fairly range of individuals - Orthodox, Conservative, Reform as well as university professors, it would certainly serving the purpose of making an awareness which does not now exists.
