





Just a little while ago I was invited to give some lectures at Ohio State University in Columbus in the middle of May but of course I turned that down so as not to miss your visit.


I also found Dr. Lamb very impressive, quite different from that character whose name I've forgotten but who wrote to you so irrationally about the Wisconsin Institute for Torah Studies. The fact is that it was right-wing criticism that scuttled a co-ed Jewish high school in Milwaukee. Dr. Lamb, on the other hand, was very supportive.

Unfortunately I am almost out of my autobiographies but a shipment is due to arrive at the end of the month and I will then send you five copies and also three copies of the latest report of the Helen Bader Foundation.

I have never had a catalogue of Alfred Bader Fine Arts. Most of my customers are foreign dealers who know what they like and who come here and take their purchases with them. The dollar is so low, and so is my overhead, and I have yet to meet a dealer visiting us who was disappointed.

I run a totally non-elitist gallery from paintings ranging from \$100 to several hundred thousand. And Isabel is truly expert in packing paintings to be taken along by visitors!

At the New York sales I had my eyes on five paintings and couldn't buy a single one. The best was by Rembrandt's student, estimated at \$200,000. It brought \$2.45 million.




Scientist, entrepreneur, art collector, lecturer and philanthropist...now we can add one more: Alfred Bader the unpredictable.

You constantly amaze me, Al, and the surprise of your obtaining what I consider a rare copy of a book, "Orpheus, A History of Religions", by Salomon Reinach, literally "threw me for a loop". You cannot imagine how many calls we made to bookshops, publishers and libraries in our attempt to obtain a copy. In truth, I had totally forgotten our conversation, and my follow-up to you regarding this book. In any case, I thank you and particularly bask in the euphoria of receiving the unexpected. Already I have a waiting list of those who would like to read it, including Dean Karen Bacon and Doris.

Those who heard your lecture at Stern College were fascinated by your discussion. It surprised me, and pleased me, that there was little, if anything, in what you said with which Dr. Lamm did not agree. He is a true Torah scholar. As I mentioned to you, he is extremely liberal. He carries the torch of being in the middle and has worked arduously to bring together the left and the right so that there is a united Jewish people. He has tried to bridge the various schisms that divide us today and which, unfortunately, has been the history of our people for the past 3,000 years.

I trust you were successful in your attempts to purchase various art pieces at the auction this week. With prices for art apparently at an all time high, it must be difficult to come to a realistic or fair price — i.e., comparable to an extent to the highs in the equity market today.

The physician to whom I referred in our conversation and who practices in Milwaukee is a Dr. Geche. His daughter, Debbie, is married to an Ephraim LeVer, the son of one of my close friends in Israel, a Mr. Joe LeVer who was the former director of production and engineering at Israel Electric. The last I heard was that Ephraim had opened up a photographic studio but I am not sure if he is still in that business, but not terribly important either. When I come to Milwaukee, as I plan, I might try to look him up.

Best wishes to Isabel. Again, thank you for taking your time and gracing us at Stern College with your presence.




As you know, we were in New York for just a couple of days last week to look at the paintings that were coming up for sale at Christie's and Sotheby's.

I have many good friends in the Czech Republic. If you would like some personal introductions to some of these, please do let me know.




Al, had you met in the past with Mr. Irwin Lerner, CEO of Roche USA? He is my golf partner locally.

# Camelot In Nutley, N.J.: Roche Institute Of Molecular Biology Remembered

BY SIDNEY UDENFRIEND

967, establishment of the Roche Institute of Molecular Biology (RIMB) by Hoffmann La Roche received wide news coverage. In a relatively short time, the institute estab-lished itself as a world-class research and training center and maintained this reputation for almost 30 years. It came as a surprise, therefore, when in the fall of 1994 the staff of RIMB was informed by Roche that as of 1996 the institut@would be disbanded.

The closing of RIMB is as newsworthy as its creation, and the scientific community should hear the story of what transpired in Nutley, N.J., since 1967—including details of our closing. As its founding director, and still a member with an active laboratory, I feel that I am in a position to tell the story of this unique institute, which, in spite of its success, ing dismantled.

My story is also a commentary on indus-try. One of industry's strengths is its ability to make and implement decisions rapidly. One highly placed executive can make decisions, the consequences of which can be profound. The rapidity of the creation of RIMB (one month from conception to reality) was not comprehensible to those in academia or government. Continued sup-port of RIMB by Roche was generous to an extent that, again, has not been seen in acad-emia or government. Unfortunately, because a company can move so rapidly, the demise of RIMB was just as swift as its creation. As I have learned, the longevity of RIMB within Roche represents an aberration in the

pharmaceutical industry.

It should be noted that RIMB's scientific staff are salaried employees of Roche. In 1967, it took some persuasion to recruit academic types. As the institute's reputation grew, it became easier and easier to do so. The sudden closure of RIMB makes me doubt that academic scientists of stature who wish to conduct investigator-initiated research will, in the future, be recruitable as salaried employees to a company-sponsored

I predict that such individuals will inter act with industry only from tenure-based university professorships, as many now do, to insulate them from the fallout resulting from frequent changes in a company's poli-cies and from turnover of management. I also expect that running a research organization such as RIMB through a university will necessitate endowed professorships, increasing the cost to a company considerably Grant support will probably be required, as

### A Stellar Cast

I was probably naïve to believe that any company could support an institute such as RIMB indefinitely. Even Bell Laboratories was cut drastically following the AT&T breakup. Nevertheless, for more than a quarter of a century, here in Nutley (about 12 miles from Broadway and 42nd Street in New York City), we operated a research center that was the envy of scientists throughout the world, a Camelot of the biomedical sciences. At RIMB, scientists were completely supported, enabling them to turn their full attention to any research problem of interest to them without the distractions of teaching. grant and fellowship applications, or facul-ty meetings, and without the restrictions placed upon scientists in government. The only, criterion for continued membership and promotion was the quality of one's research. RIMB was given a charter to this

The four key individuals who brought

the institute into being—two at the National Institutes of Health (Herbert Weissbach and two at Roche (John Burns and Alfred Pletscher)-had worked togeth er in the same laboratory at NIH during the 1950s and knew each other well. In early spring 1967, I broached the concept of an institute to Burns, who had just become executive vice president for R&D at Roche in Nutley. This was rapidly approved by Pletscher, then vice president for international research at Roche in Switzerland. By late spring I accepted the directorship of the institute with a number of provisos, among them that Weissbach join me as associate director. In July 1967, RIMB came into being. I present these details to show how impo tant Roche considered the institute, both at its founding and later on. In light of Roche's sudden decision to close it down, one must ask whether RIMB failed to live up to the company's expectations. Was the institute a success scientifically? Did it contribute sig RIMB maintain itself at the forefront of research over the years? As I will show, RIMB more than satisfied all the above.

By all criteria, the institute has been staffed by outstanding and innovative scien ts throughout its existence. Publications by RIMB scientists appear in the most presti-gious journals, and the Science Citation Index has always rated RIMB among the top four or five independent institutes in the United States (Science Watch, 4:2, 1993). In addition, many members have been recruited as depart ment chairmen, directors of other institutes. distinguished professors in prestigious versities, and leaders in biotech industry Successful research centers generally provide excellent training for young scientists

RIMB's postdoctoral fellowship and graduate student programs are among its greatesi successes. Close to 1,000 fellows and 40 graduate students will have passed through the institute during its lifetime. Of these, 20 are now chairmen of academic departments. 50 full professors, 60 associate professors, and many more assistant professors. One is a university vice president. About 25 are independent investigators or department heads in research institutes. About 35 serve in leadership roles in the pharmaceutical industry. Members of RIMB received many awards and honorary degrees. Most significantly, there were at one time (1986-87) seven members of the National Academy of Sciences on the institute's staff, four (Herbert

### State-Of-The-Art Studies

Research carried out at the institute at its founding was unquestionably at the cutting edge of molecular biology. Over the years it maintained that position, as shown by the scientific recognition accorded its members. However, the last few years brought about vast changes in the directions of biological research. Has RIMB kept up with this ex sion in genetics and neuroscience, and, if so, what areas of investigation have its scientists emphasized recently?

We realized that the machinery for elucidating human and animal genomes already very large and that the information obtained would soon be available to all. However, to make use of that information required an understanding of gene expression and regulation, areas in which institute members made a conscious decision to invest and that became its strengths. In 1993, RIMB had 27 members, 25 of whom were involved with gene regulation and developme

Under this rubric, several important areas were covered, including fetal development, membrane proteins, nutrient and humoral transporters, and signal transduction. About 13 projects in expression and regulation concerned the nervous system, and institute scientists are leaders in regulation of neural development, information storage in ne and sensory mechanisms. Today RIMB still finds itself in a leadership role in some of the most important areas of biomedical research.

#### Searching For Answers

In my opinion, RIMB more than met all the criteria set up in its charter from the company It rapidly developed into a world-class research and training center and served as a window to the scientific world for Roche. The institute also developed important products. Beyond that, it was the institute that moved Roche into biotechnology and changed it from a traditional, chemically oriented drug company to a

odern pharmaceutical company.

Why, then, did Roche decide to close the institute? In my estimation, this was due not to deficiencies on its part but to differences of opinion between Roche research management and RIMB as to future directions of research and to the organizational make-up of the institute. Difficulties in attracting a suitable director to succeed the retiring Weissbach, who had taken over the directorship in 1983, were a contributing factor. The acquisition of Syntex by Hoff-mann-La Roche in the fall of 1994 gave management the option of setting up a research facility in Palo Alto, Calif., an area that would be more attractive for recruiting a new director and would permit them to redu rect its research to genomics more rapidly, rather than gradually overhaul the existing

Once it was decided to set up an institute in California, RIMB became a casualty of the company's downsizing. All of this does not, however, explain the suddenness of the institute's closing after it had been in existence for close to 30 years. In effect, our members had about eight months in which to locate positions elsewhere. Contrary to some repor none were offered positions in Palo Alto.

The current dismantling of the institute is The current dismantling of the institute is painful. Fortunately, the pain has been less-ened for two reasons. First, our scientists find themselves in high demand, and most have received excellent job offers. 

I'm almost through with your book and I want to tell you how much I have enjoyed it. I probably enjoyed it more than any other person who has read it and there obviously are many reasons:

- Having been at Harvard together it conjures up memories of my life at Harvard.
- 2. Both having started new companies, although on a different order of magnitude, I see mutual problems in the startup of a company, the most important of which is working seven days a week and 20 hours a day. Unfortunately, I was not able to get along on personality alone. I had to work very hard. You are the only one to whom I would say this because there is no question you have not only worked as hard, but probably even harder.
- 3. The interesting personal sections regarding Helen and Isabel fell on very receptive modems by me and I was fascinated by what you described and also the psychological manifestations of the situation.
- 4. The value of personal contacts. You make quite a big thing of this and I understand perfectly. We had a field force of approximately 40 salesmen in the U.S. alone and eight regional offices with technical service personnel, consisting of about 100 people. They all did a job. On the other hand, the most important point was the personal visitations that I had to make with the chairman of the board, the president, as well as the executive V.P. of the production department at each of the utilities. Unless the top executives at the utility signed on, we weren't going to get the ongoing business.

So, it had to be a personal relationship wherein they trusted Apollo and I had to serve in that capacity. Once they heard our story and realized that this was a new technology, then, and only then, could the rest of our staff be helpful, including our sales executives, the local regional sales managers and the local sales engineer. I wish it had been otherwise. Right now, we have the same situation existing but it takes too much out of me to travel overseas both to Europe and to the Pacific Far East to do the same thing that we found was so essential in developing business with utilities in the U.S.

It was obvious that the same thing took place in your case which was the need for key people in your field to meet personally with you and for you to understand what they were doing. One gets the feeling that the board of directors of the merged Sigma-Aldrich did not understand the crucial aspect of such personal meetings.

For your information, I distributed all the copies of the book to various people who in one way or another would have an interest: either someone involved with Harvard, someone involved with a startup business or someone involved with philanthropy vis-a-vis the Helen Bader Foundation. I also sent a copy to my golf playing friend, the former CEO of Roche in the U.S.A., Irwin Lerner.

Dr. Bergen pointed out to me that there is a two-volume book, "The Jews of Czechoslovakia". She mentioned that in Volume II, Page 65, a family by the name of Bader is mentioned. Please note the reference to a Menahem Bader (ERETZ ISRAEL),....



I am appalled by Rabbi Yosef Singer's memo to you of January 3rd.

We had an orthodox and co-ed high school in Milwaukee, modeled we hoped on Rabbi Soloveichik's co-ed high school in Boston. It failed, in part because the Rosh Hayeshiva argued against it.


Our most generous contributor in Milwaukee was Max Karl, who gave many millions to Jewish causes. He asked the Rosh Hayeshiva whether he would prefer to have Jewish children go to a public high school or to an orthodox co-ed school and the answer was the former!

When Marvin Klitsner visited WITS to discuss this, the rabbis there told him that the matter was so technical that they could not discuss it with a layman. Marvin, the ablest lawyer I know, told me that if he ever had a client to whom he could not explain his case, he would drop the client.

When I discussed this with the rabbis at WITS recently, I was told that this was an ancient matter and that attitudes have now changed. Marvin had declined to make further contributions to WITS, but I was able to change his mind, and the Bader-Klitsner Foundation made the first contribution in years just recently.

Clearly I was mistaken: The top management of the Yeshiva has not changed.

Steven Klitsner, Marvin's son and an ordained orthodox rabbi, visited me last week, and I showed him Rabbi Singer's memo and Dr. Lamm's letter. Steven pointed out that the Rosh Hayeshiva feels about the co-ed Yeshiva University as he does about a co-ed high school.



WITS is undoubtedly doing good work limited to right-wing orthodox students. To say that it has "truly revitalized the Milwaukee community bringing vibrancy and life into every aspect of communal life" is a gross exaggeration, and in fact, the Yeshiva has hurt our Jewish community by speaking against the high school.

Ira, please don't misunderstand. Of course, if the Yeshiva were asked by an orthodox family whether to send their children to a co-ed high school, they would understandably counsel against it. But there are many modern orthodox families who would prefer their children to be at a co-ed orthodox high school in Milwaukee, rather than have to send them to such a school in Skokie or Boston.

And if I were asked what I think of a Reform Jewish Day School in Milwaukee, I would say that it's just fine, but I prefer to send my children to the orthodox Hillel Academy.

Coincidentally, an interesting article on this very issue appeared in last week's Wisconsin Jewish Chronicle, and I enclose a copy. Cooperation has not happened in Milwaukee, at least in part because of the Yeshiva's opposition.


Needless to say, I will be happy to autograph as many of my books as you would care to bring along.







I thought so many times to call you following our meeting in New York almost a year ago. However, without a specific purpose I hesitated to contact you. Actually, I was sure that I would be making a trip to Milwaukee, primarily to visit you and to see the Bader Art Gallery, but my preoccupations with the growing business in the Czech Republic has kept me locked up, in-house.

Firstly, I have been waiting for news of the publication of your book. Just a few days ago, I received a call from someone in Milwaukee who mentioned that he saw my picture in the book. I am so proud. If you could be good enough to send me details or the address of the publisher, I would like to order twenty-five copies to distribute to various people either because you and I know them or I have some interesting connection between the Bader Foundation and their interests.

Secondly, I presume you will be coming to New York in January again for the Art Auction. I would like to talk to you to see if it would be at all possible for you to present a seminar there to a special group at Yeshiva University. I believe I had mentioned this to you previously. If this is at all possible, we would love to schedule a special event in your honor.

Now on a more personal matter. Enclosed I am sending you information that relates to a dinner on November 19th in which Doris and I shall be honored.



I have served as Chairman of the Board for the Rabbinical Seminary of America. Ten years ago, we initiated a campaign to build an International Headquarters of the Rabbinical Seminary of America.

We now have all the permits in place; problem now is securing enough advance pledges to start building the \$10 million edifice.

I have attached a copy of a proposal for the Bader Foundation which I shall send to your son, Daniel Bader, President. I am hopeful that the proposal sent to him will pass scrutiny by the Bader Foundation.

Perpetuating Judaism is not the sole domain of the reformed, the conservative or the various orthodox sects. It is the concern of all Jews, particularly those who believe that our destiny is linked to expanding our education institutions.

The Rabbinical Seminary of America, with its extensive outreach programs, is ideally constituted to expand Jewish values and to bring into the fold many totally unaffiliated Jews. Michael Steinhardt said something similar recently when he announced his retirement. He was quoted in the New York Times as seeking to perpetuate Jewish identification and values.

Al, this is the first time that I have ever approached my friends on a project that is so close to me. Your interest to help us obtain a major grant from the Bader Foundation would touch me deeply.

I just learned today that you live just two blocks away from our Milwaukee branch, the Wisconsin Institute for Torah Study "WITS". I understand from our educators there that you have an extremely high regard for the school and you speak enthusiastically about it. I also learned that Daniel has been interested in special projects and has in the past, donated a computer system to the school.

Al, I am hopeful that a significant building dedication could be forthcoming by the Bader Foundation and that our proposal meets its objectives.

Ira, I must tell you that we are not orthodox Jews. I very much like the staff at WITS, but was aghast when its leadership and other orthodox rabbis in Milwaukee strenuously opposed an orthodox high school in Milwaukee because it was co-educational. You can read all about that in my autobiography.

The focus of the Helen Bader Foundation is to help Jewish education in Milwaukee and in Israel. Of course, I will tell Daniel that we have long been good friends.




