Dear Dr. Bader or "Dear Alf.":

I am the very interested owner of volume #806 of A CANADIAN IN LOVE that contains the letters written to you from 1949 to 1951 by Isabel. I feel certain that had you sent her an engagement ring instead of a book about basic Judaism, in 1950, she would have worn it with love, pride, and joy and taken the first boat out of England at the end of the St. Francis school year. As the saying goes: "Love conquers all."

The 26 year hiatus in your romance prompted my writing a letter to the editor of the Canadian Jewish News about my conception of Judaism with a view, perhaps, to help young couples considering marriage overcome the indecision that springs from superficial religious differences. I enclose a copy of the letter that was published in the Canadian Jewish News August 31/00 edition in Toronto.

The letter attempts to equate basic Judaism with the essence of the Christian religion preached by Jesus which was really Judaism because that was the only religion, I theorize, that Jesus knew. The main difference is that the rite of circumcision performed on Jewish male babes eight days old for admission to the Jewish religion was replaced with slight moistening of the babe's hair with baptismal water for admission to the Christian religion. Little did Jesus know that he had the support of the American Academy of Pediatrics that maintains that circumcision is not required medically. Perhaps Jesus found the barbarity of the surgery without local anesthesia in his time disturbing.

Of course Isabel's letters are delightful. They "sparkle." She reduces herself to a "frazzle" in her devotion to the completion of the many tasks mentioned in her letters. They bubble with her undying love for you. I do revere your scholarship, business acumen, philanthropy, and of course your loyalty.

Advising about Judaism

Jennifer Fox writes (C/N, Aug. 10) that, as the cultural/religious ambassador of Judaism in Halifax, she feared giving her non-Jewish friends there at times wrong answers to their questions about who and what is a Jew. In this regard, I answer my enquiring friends, Jewish and non-Jewish, in Ottawa positively.

I tell them that anyone who observes the seven do's and don't's in the Ten Commandments and volunteers financial support for Jewish causes is a Jew. The first three commandments are a preamble proclaiming the oneness of the Author - monotheism.

Opposed to monotheism is polytheism. It features no behavioural criteria and can result in the wilful conduct of "Handsome is as handsome does."

The monotheism of the Jew mandates "noblesse oblige," noble behaviour in accordance with the aforementioned do's and don't's which, when rolled into one commandment, constitute the rule of conduct we call the golden rule.

"Do not unto thy fellow men what is hateful to thee; this is the whole Law [of God]; the rest is commentary" states Hillel who was one of the most revered Jewish spiritual leaders and who lived during the latter part of the first century BCE and the beginning of the first century CE. I have no doubt that he influenced the Jewish preachers. Jesus included, of that time.

And so I theorize that God is the Ultimate Idea that inspires observance of the golden rule.

equals \$0.64 per year.

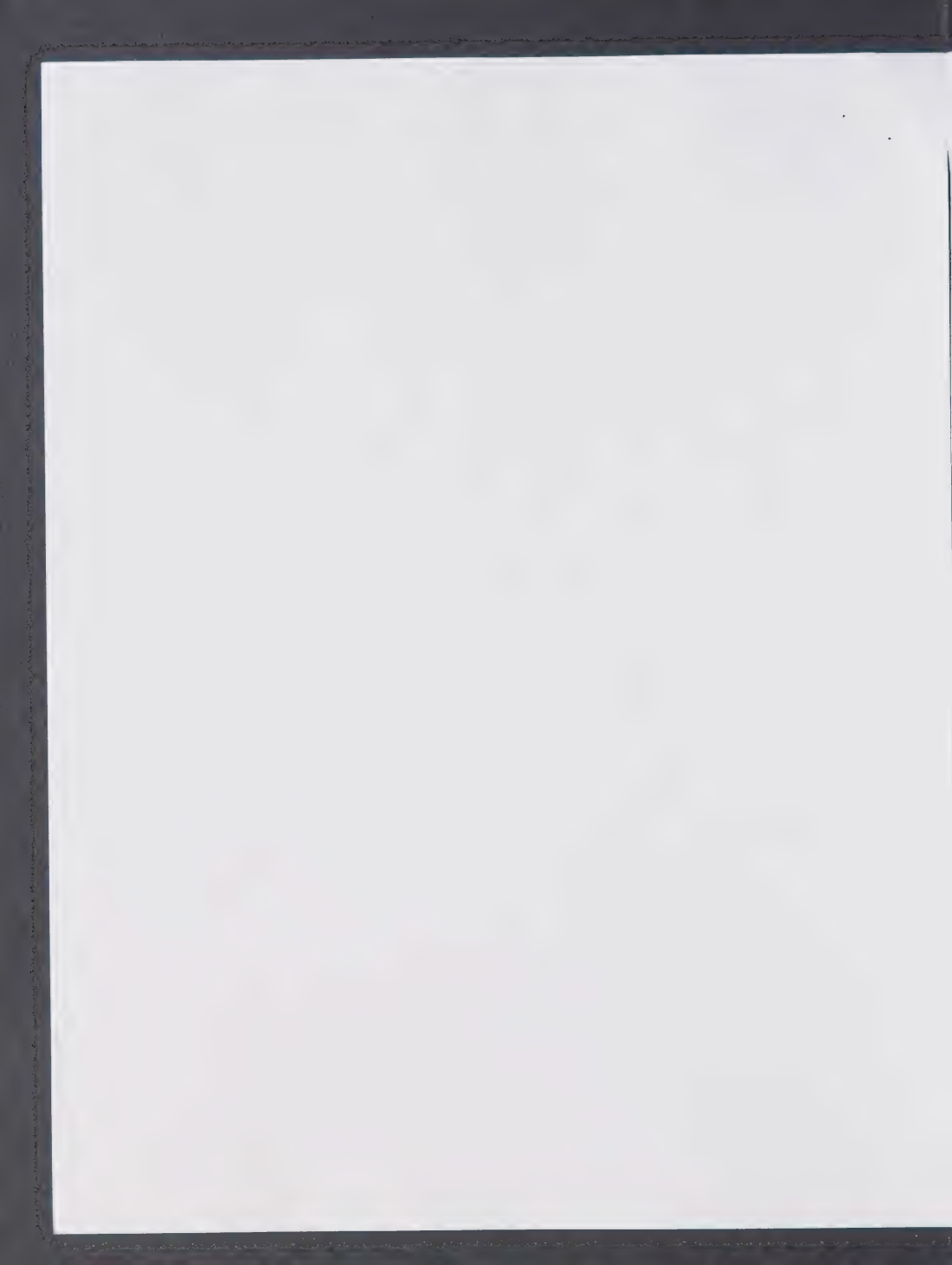

valuable programs for federal funding. The

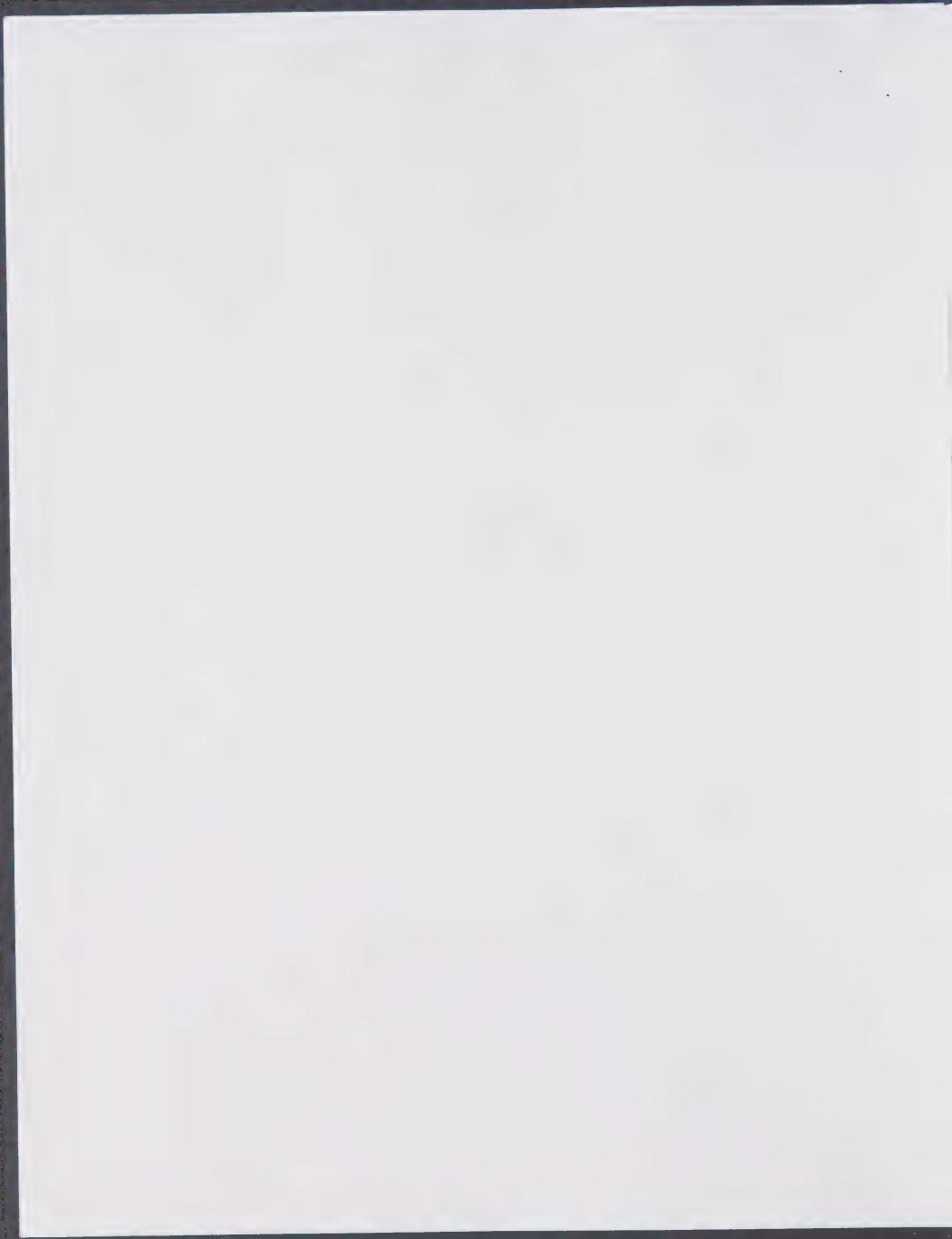


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Senate and

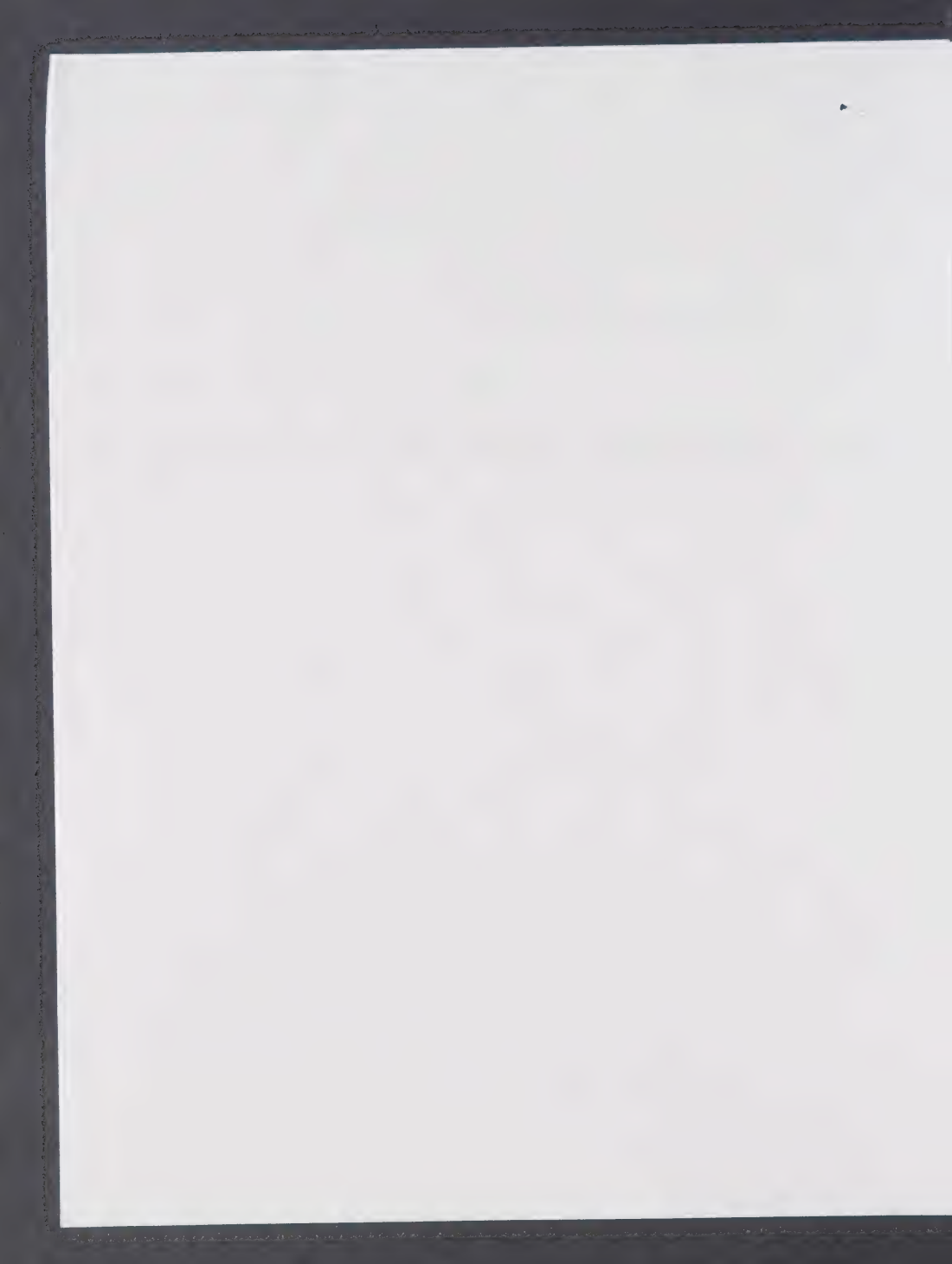
Thank you very much for your August 15th letter and the enclosures.

Bob Wandler and I talked about your plan to send the "Employee Comments" to the directors of the company. We feel we should clarify some issues that we are very concerned about and also very important, because we don't want anyone to get into trouble. Perhaps it is my fault; I certainly hope that I have not misled you; please know I wouldn't intentionally do that.

David Harvey passed "*Adventures of a Chemist Collector*" among the officers as far as we know; and we are not aware of others. Some officers had the book in their possession, and, of course, employees would notice it and pick it up. He specifically asked some employees if they had read the book, and encouraged them to do so. 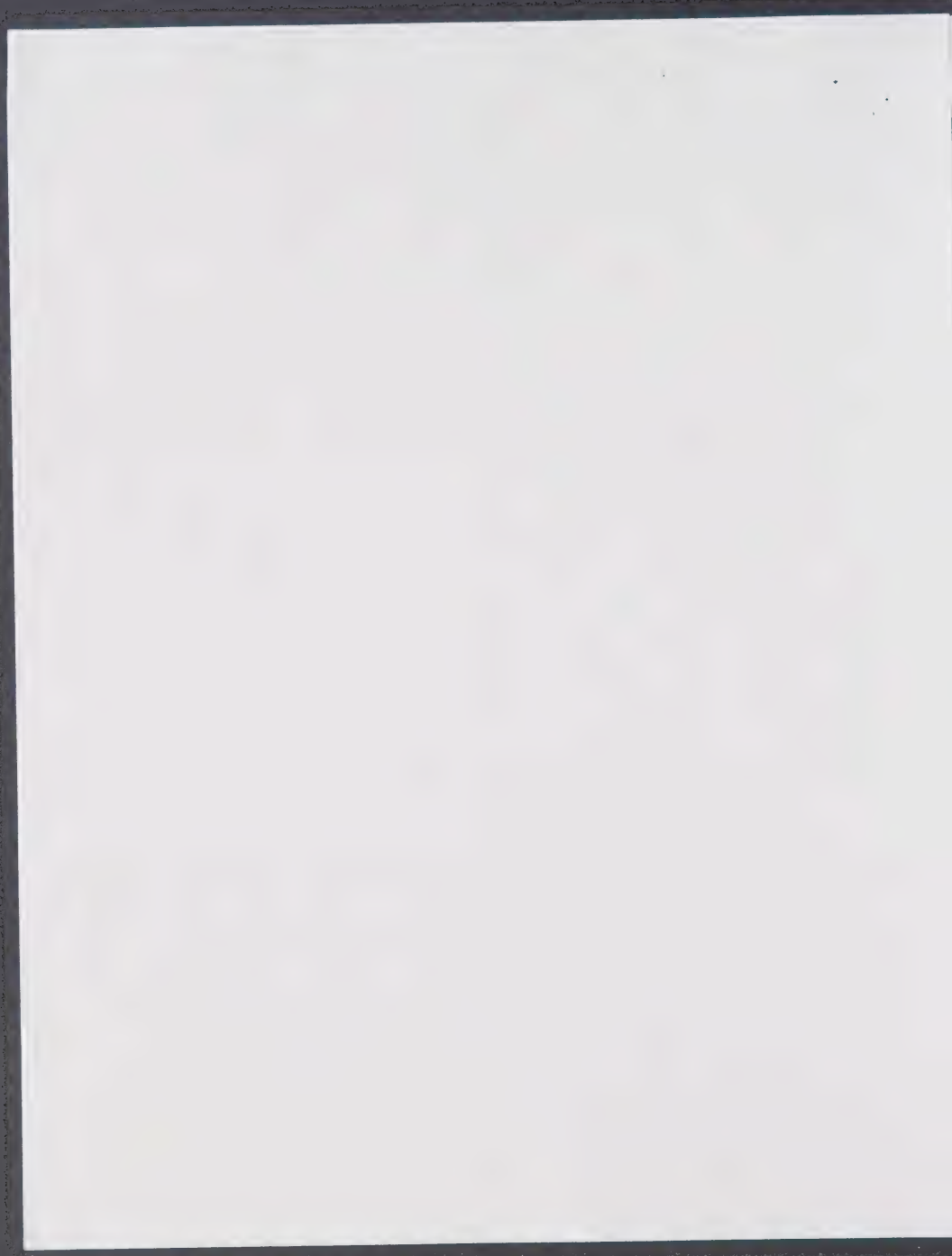
a good rapport with our top key accounts. They like her business tactics and trust her as a representative of the Corporation.

Many thanks for your informative letter of 9 May. I shall remember to refer any individual student recommended by the director of the Litomyšl School to you, in case you should consider him or her eligible for a scholarship. Czech students receive a yearly subsidy from the Ministry of Education, so perhaps an American student could eventually be sponsored.

Regarding your mention of the Foundation for a Civil Society, I applied to this Foundation for funding on 1 February, 1994. They declined, but referred me to the Czech and Slovak Enterprise Fund. However, the mission of this government-funded agency is to back commercial ventures only.

In fact, I have such a venture in mind which would involve the school and the restoration sector in general, but it would be premature to introduce it now. My chief concern is raising funds to enable the school to fulfil its purpose of becoming self-sufficient by the end of next year.

The school, although regional, is of national importance. No doubt it will play a part, perhaps as a model, in the developing programs of both the European Commission and the Council of Europe to vitalize this sector and explore its socio-economic benefits. Yet, such funds as might currently be available from these two organizations, though welcome, are insufficient to meet the school's needs. Frankly, I have applied to over one hundred possible sources for funding and I am running out of ideas.

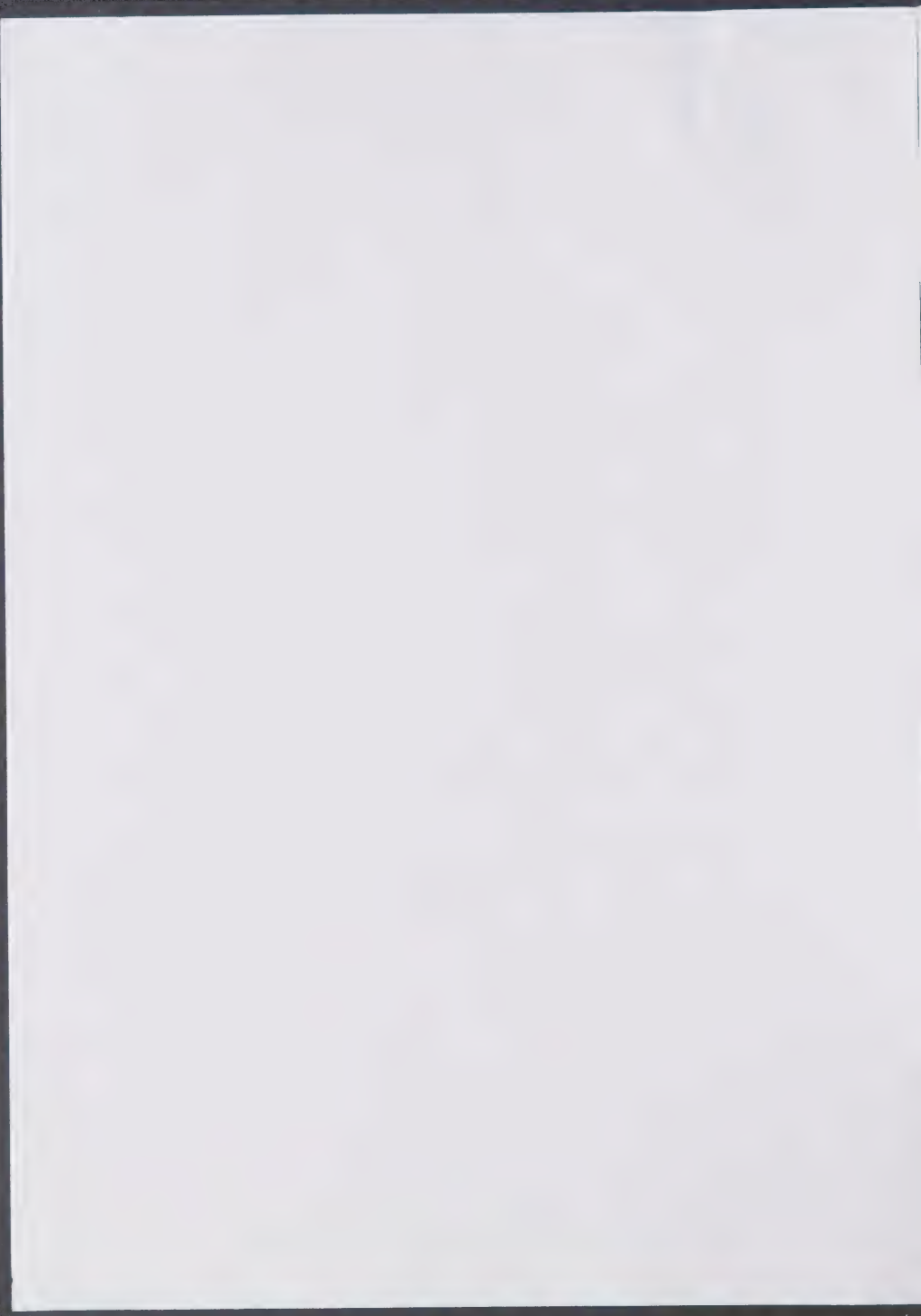

It was great to see you and Isabel again, with your discourse on Rembrandt and all. It made me think of all the sleuthing you did about the history of the identification of the benzene ring. So many of us are ready to accept that the world is flat, simply because that is believed by them at that time. So much for belief! Of that sort of belief, at least. Then along comes a thinking man, able to convince the believers that they should rethink their beliefs. You seem to be such a thinking man.

But I warn you, now I think you are only half the man I thought you before reading from your book. Previously I was able to believe you as being miraculous. Now, I shall have to revise my opinion to merely stupendous. The reason being a glance at your family background and environment in the period of your youth. No more is it puzzling how you did so extraordinarily well in academic achievements in foreign countries - especially finishing High School before having the good fortune to meet Jean I. Royce, Prof. Jackson, and Dr. McNeil. I'm really not taking - or trying to - anything from you at all. After all, life is what it is, regardless of what we may think. In that regard, I was a good student in 1941 and 1942, as were you. (Don't bother to tell me that you were the better one. It's academic.) What happened in 1943 I never could find out. I think I gave Isabel my congratulations and adulations in connection with her brand-new degree. May it always shine!



Now I must break away to write to my oldest sister in Florida. She would be five years older than we are, and worked as a nurse for fifty years, I should judge. A month ago she had a heart attack and a stroke, I'm told. Her near memory is bad, but I've been writing her about things at home when we were young. Another sister, in Albany, called to say that at least some of what I've written has got through. I'll keep at it - like the drop of rain that wears away the stone - or in this case, the blockage?

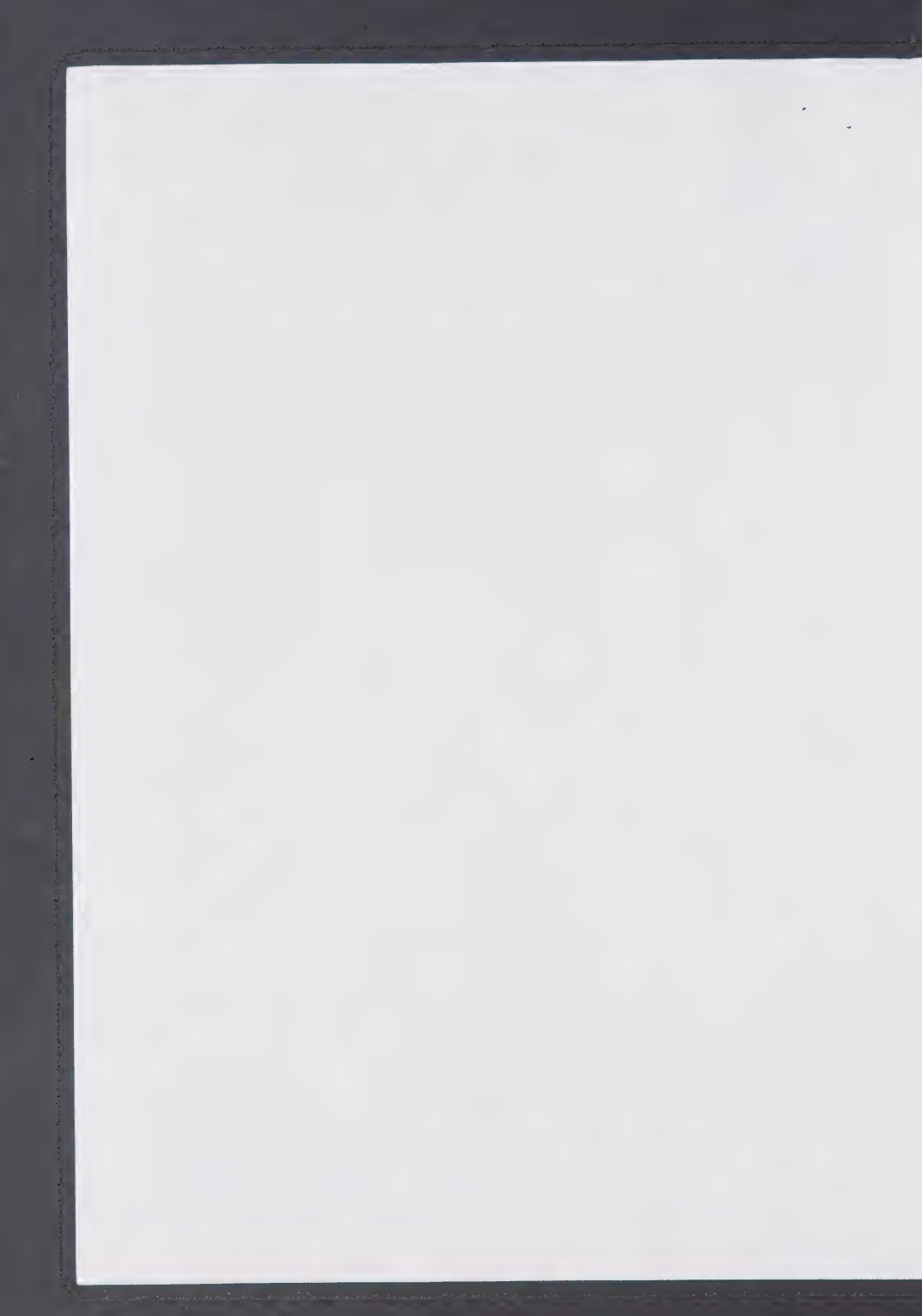
Dear Alfred,
