



One a Nobel Laureate and the other, and I remember your words "of course, he will receive the Nobel", then soon to be a Nobel Prize awardee? I would appreciate your suggestions for speakers. It is your day and hence the speakers should be your choices. Please suggest four or so for obvious reasons.





Thank you for the wonderful Rembrandt lecture at the Agnes Etherington Art Centre which I had not heard in such detail before.






