Dear Alfred,

I hope things are well with you. I returned a couple of weeks ago from Israel, Kiev, Cologne and London. We will return to Israel in June.

You suggested a couple of months ago that on my return from Israel I should give you an indication of some of my views on the Disengagement and Sharon's policies. I am very ambivalent and very worried.

I do not belong to the camp that considers land "untouchable" and I would readily trade land for Peace if Peace were in sight.

It distinctly is not in sight in our generation and not likely in the next generation of our children. As a man of faith, I have to hope and believe that somewhere down the line, the sunshine of Peace will emerge and will allow Jews to live in tranquility in the Middle East, in a "secure" State of Israel.

At this juncture, it is a dream.

I do not think that Sharon – in contrast to Peres – believes in the likelihood of Peace.

The supposition is that he wants to trade the Disengagement of Gaza for American and world acceptance of Israel retaining large settlement blocks around Jerusalem and some other areas.

The fact is – as you can see in newspapers every day – that our friends of the EU want to force Israel back into the 1967 borders and that the Arabs want the Jews to be pushed into the Mediterranean and to supplant the name of Israel by the name of Palestine.



I am not engaging in an argument on the wisdom of the Disengagement, though I am not sanguine reading of Israel Intelligence sources and Generals of the IDF predicting a new more sophisticated Intifada at the conclusion of the Disengagement process.

I am distinctly not pleased at how Sharon and his government have been dealing with the process and with the "settlers".

Both Labor and Likud sent the settlers into the sand dunes of Gush Katif and owe them a great deal more sympathy, understanding and loyalty than they have displayed to date.

It is true that there is a violent opposition, but I think a referendum would have gone a long way in subduing a majority of the Nationalist and Religious opposition.

During my recent visit in Israel, I spent a day in Gush Katif where I had not been in several years. I met in one of the hothouses a middle-aged lady who immigrated to Israel thirty years ago and settled in Be'er Sheva. She told me that she wanted a greater challenge in life, and asked where she should go to fulfill her pioneering spirit. She was sent to Gush Katif, which was then a mere sand dune. She helped build hot houses, brought up a family of children and grandchildren who now all live in the area. She is not a politician and not an ideologist, but extremely unhappy about being forced out of her home that she built with fortitude. She said to me that if at least we would be assured of Peace, she would be content to bring this further sacrifice of giving up her home and agricultural undertaking. So it goes.


I do not think that the Vilna situation has greatly improved since we last talked. It is a close call.

I am, though, in constant contact with Rabbi Fhima of Pinsk. He just had twin daughters and he is toiling day and night for the boys and girls in Pinsk and for the community there. His financial situation there is very precarious and I help him consistently.

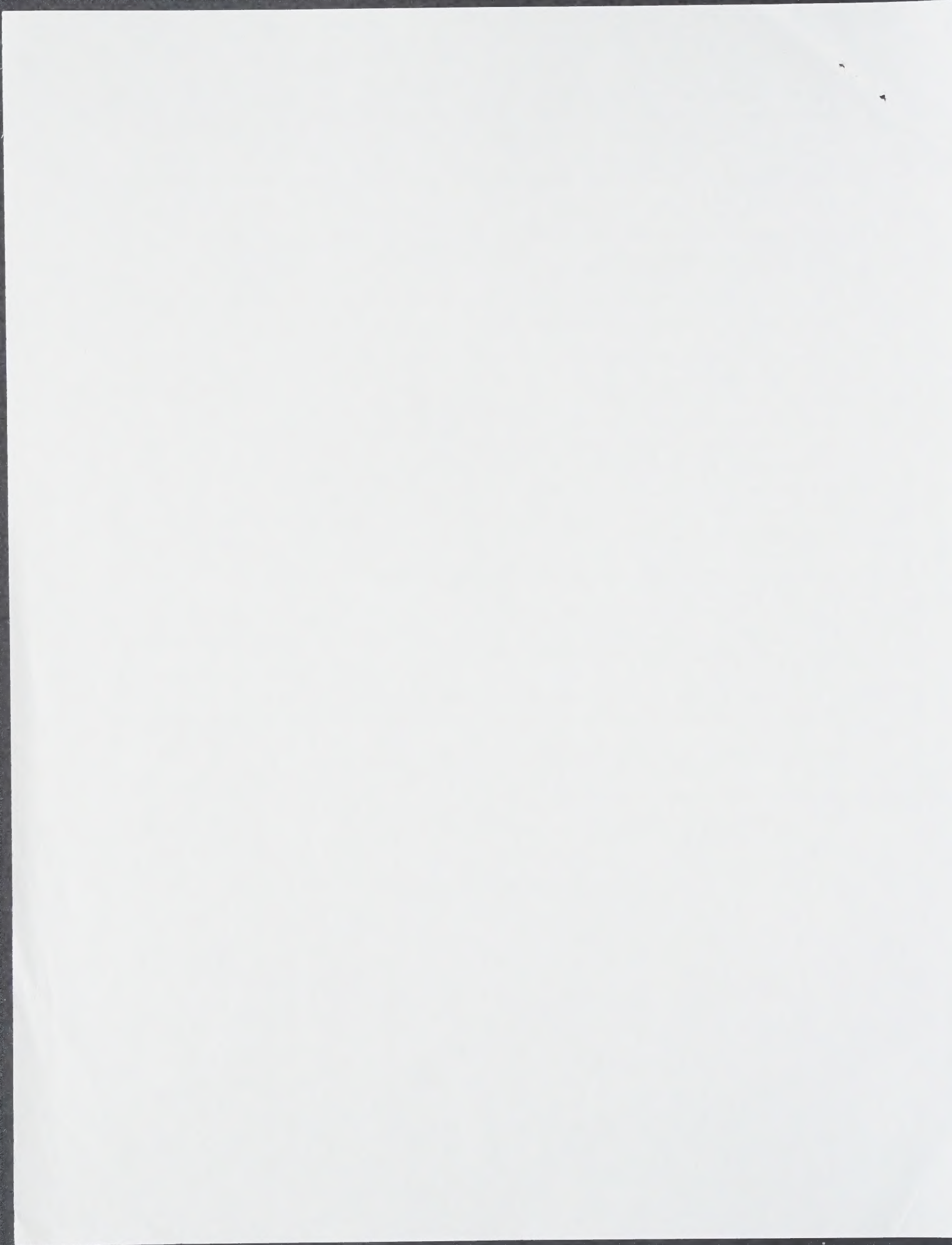

Dear Dr. and Mrs. Bader,

You will be pleased to know that today I received a cheque from the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee in the amount of \$36,000. At the current exchange rate, that amounts to about £19,888, but I can confirm the exact amount once it has been banked.

As requested, we will now apply your entire donation towards project work for the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel (EAPPI) and no longer split it between the EAPPI and our work in Uganda. I will provide you with an update on the work in a few months time.

On a separate note, you might be interested to know that one of our newly-appointed one-year placement workers, Katarina Putnik, will be working in Serbia and conducting an assessment of refugees and internally displaced people living in camps in four different areas in the region, including Kosovo. I asked Katarina if she might be visiting the lead-polluted Roma Camps, but she could not say at this early stage. I will certainly keep you informed if something develops along those lines.

Thank you again for your donation and your committed support of our work.

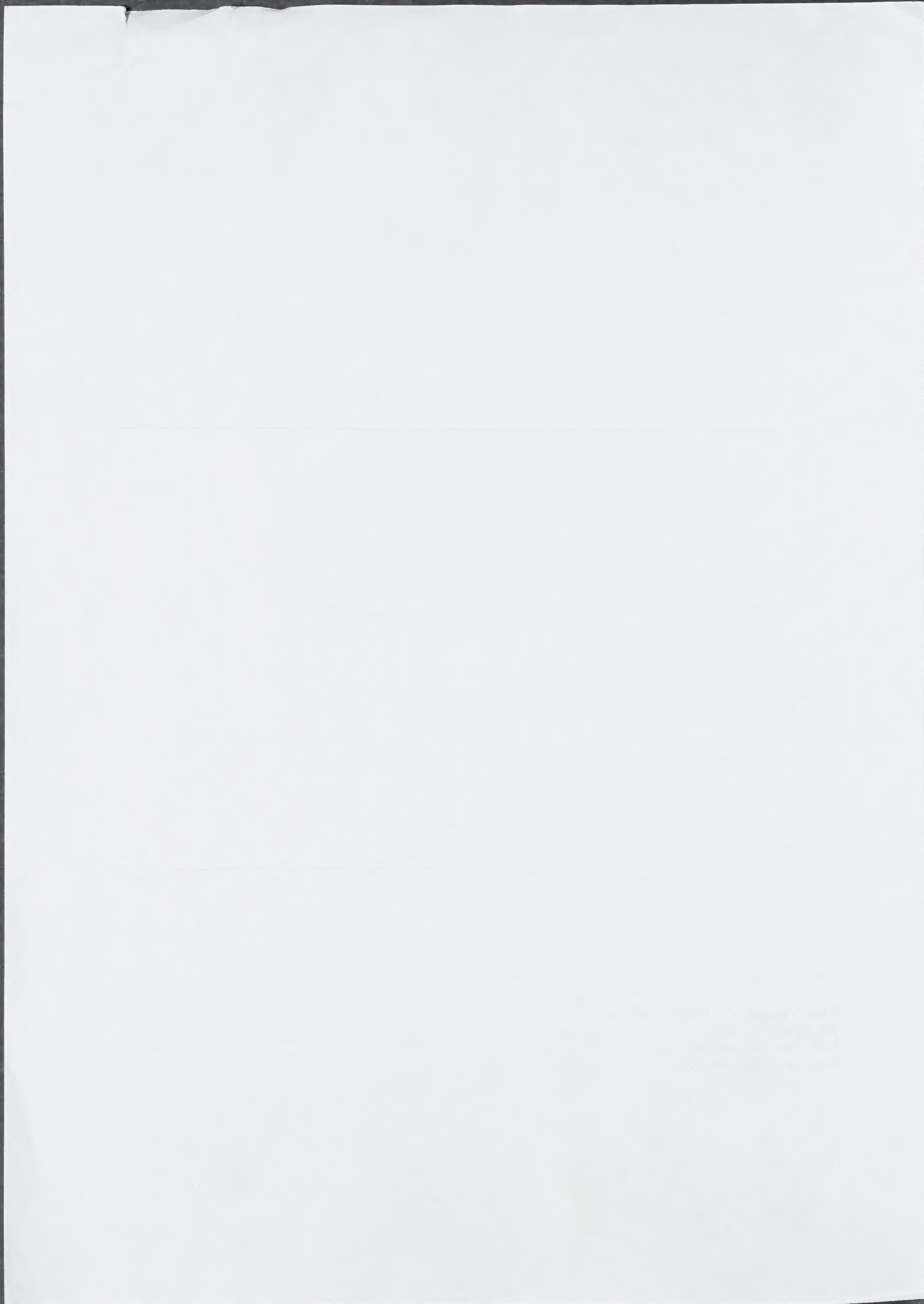

Thank you for your fax of today.

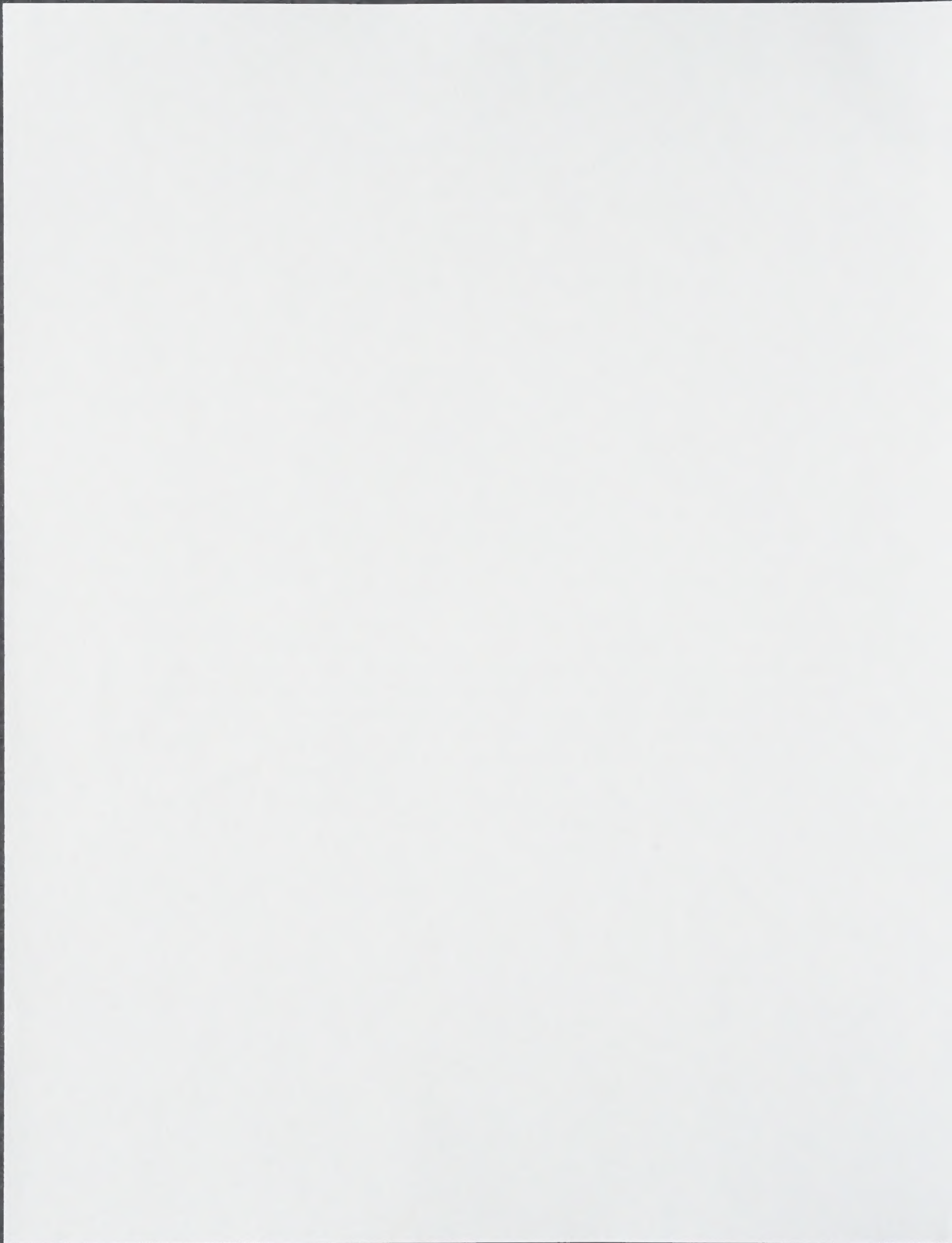

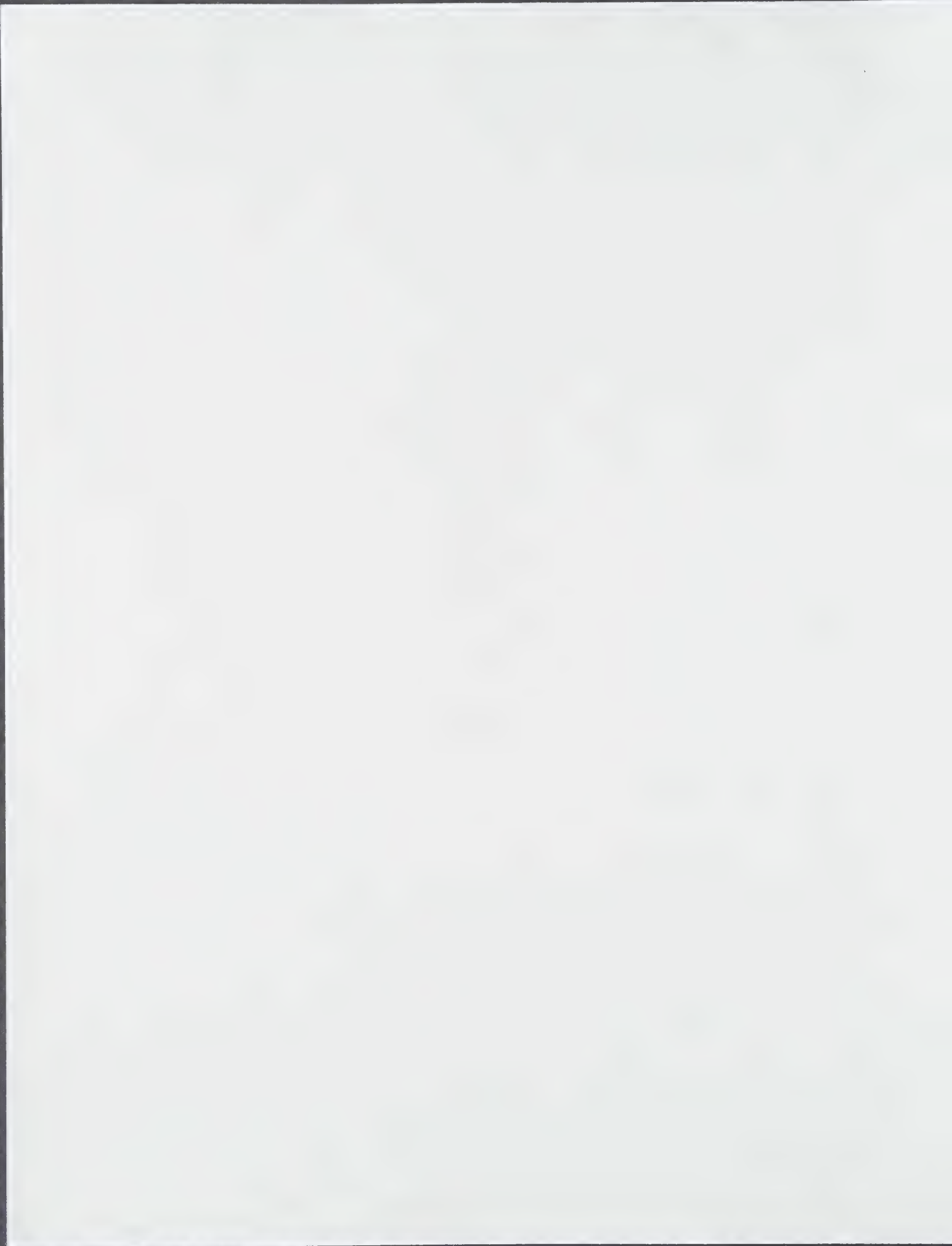

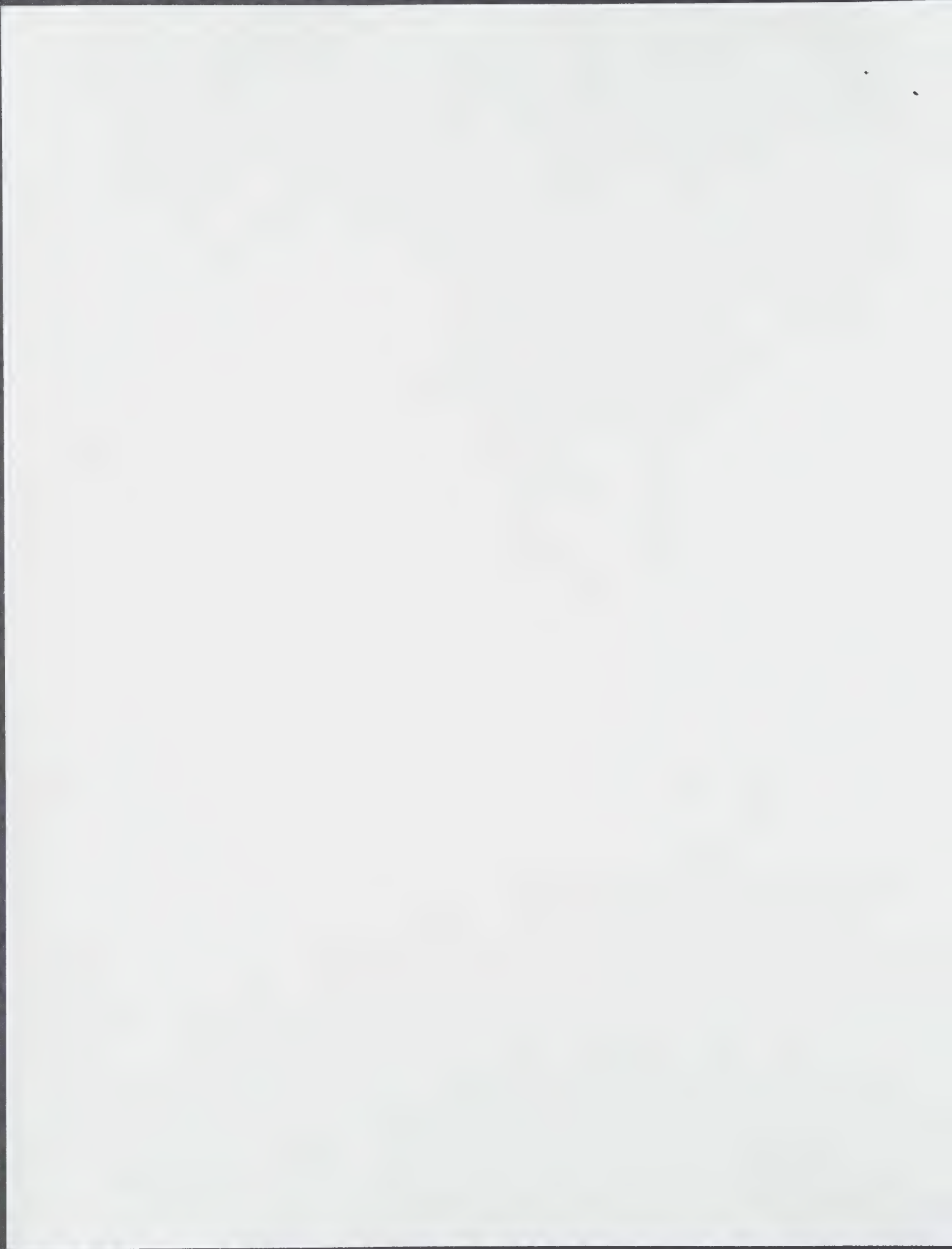

She called and left me a message on my phone--she said that she liked you both and that you were full of life and Isabel was beautiful and that she wondered what you thought of her!

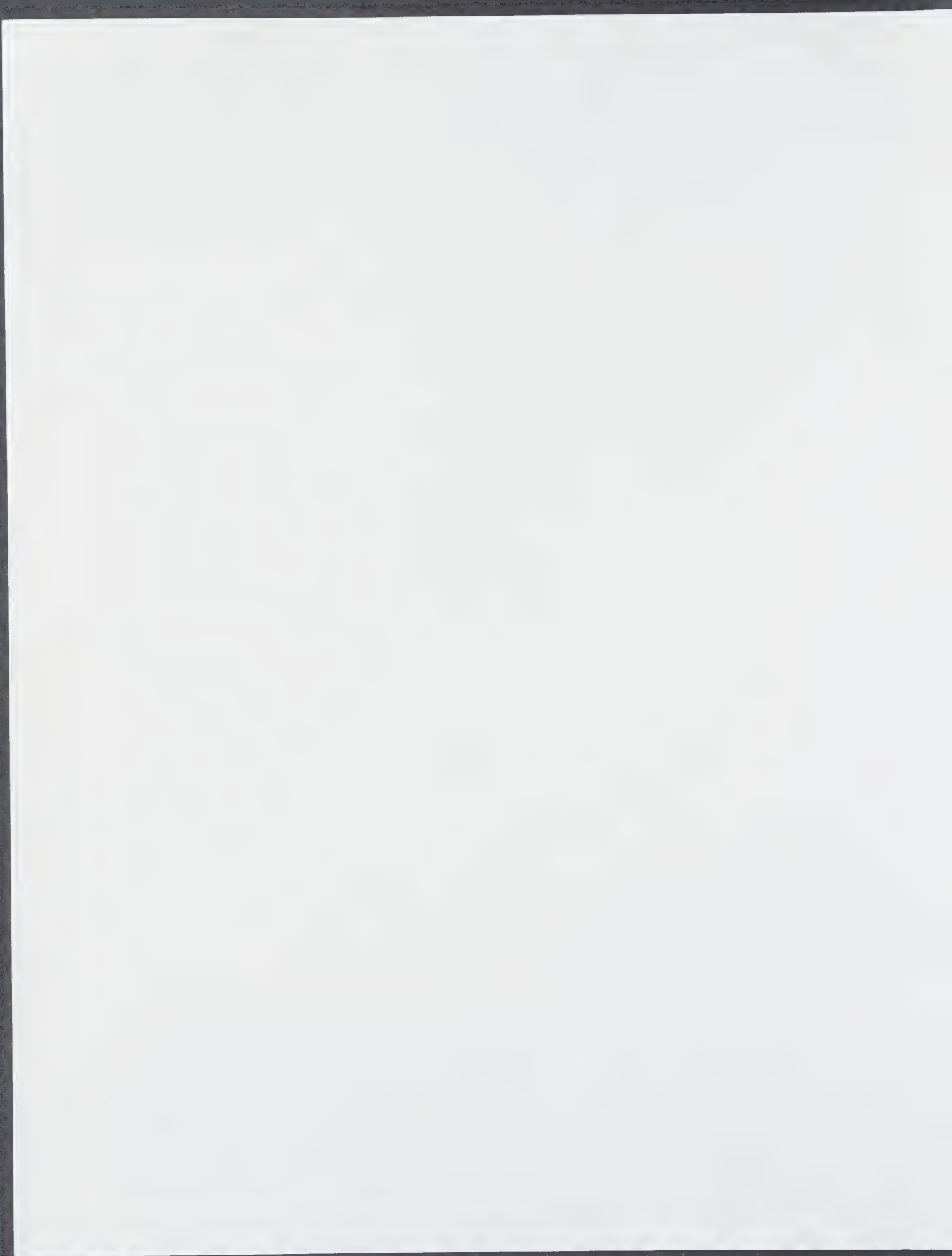
I will ask about de Wit and write you soon.

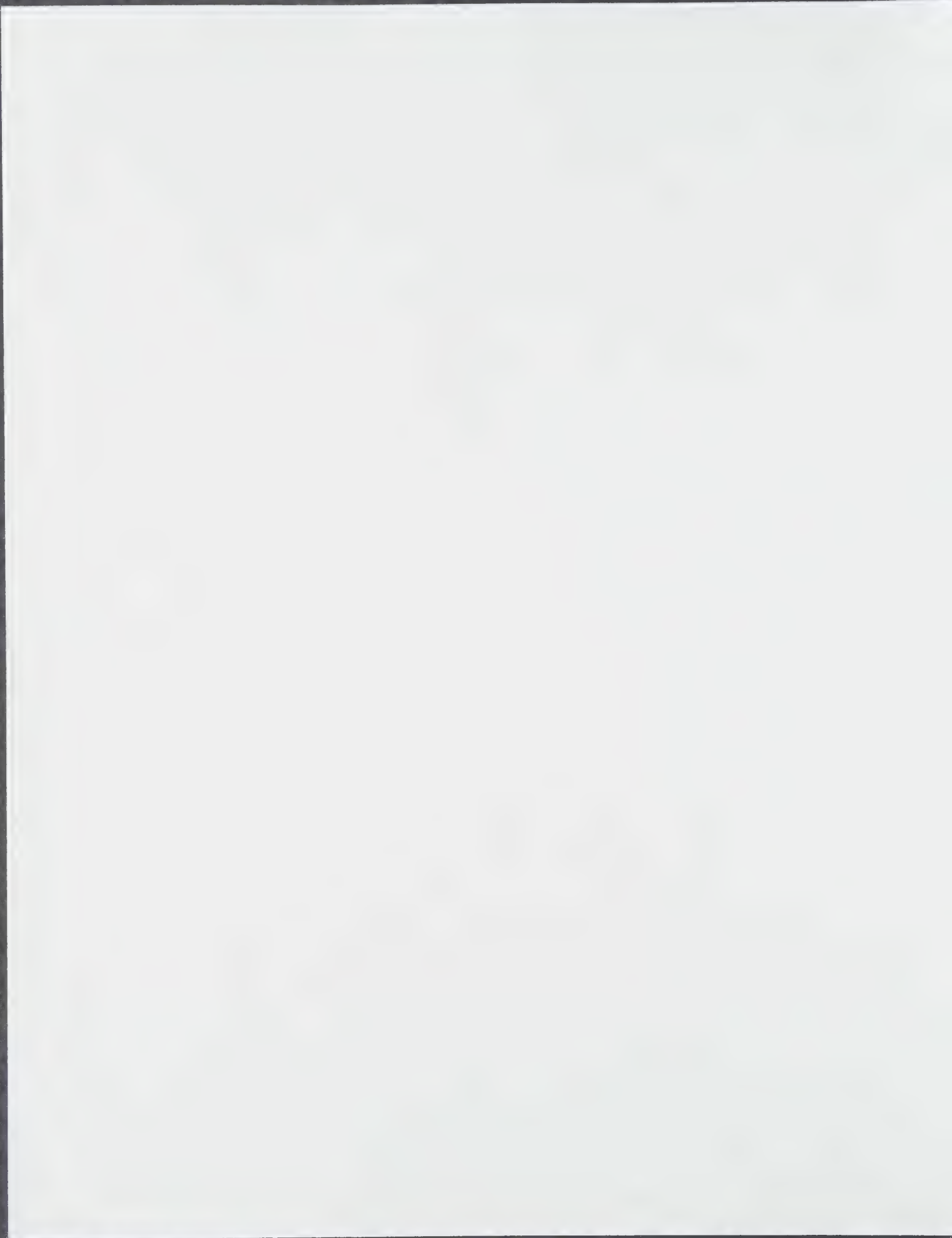

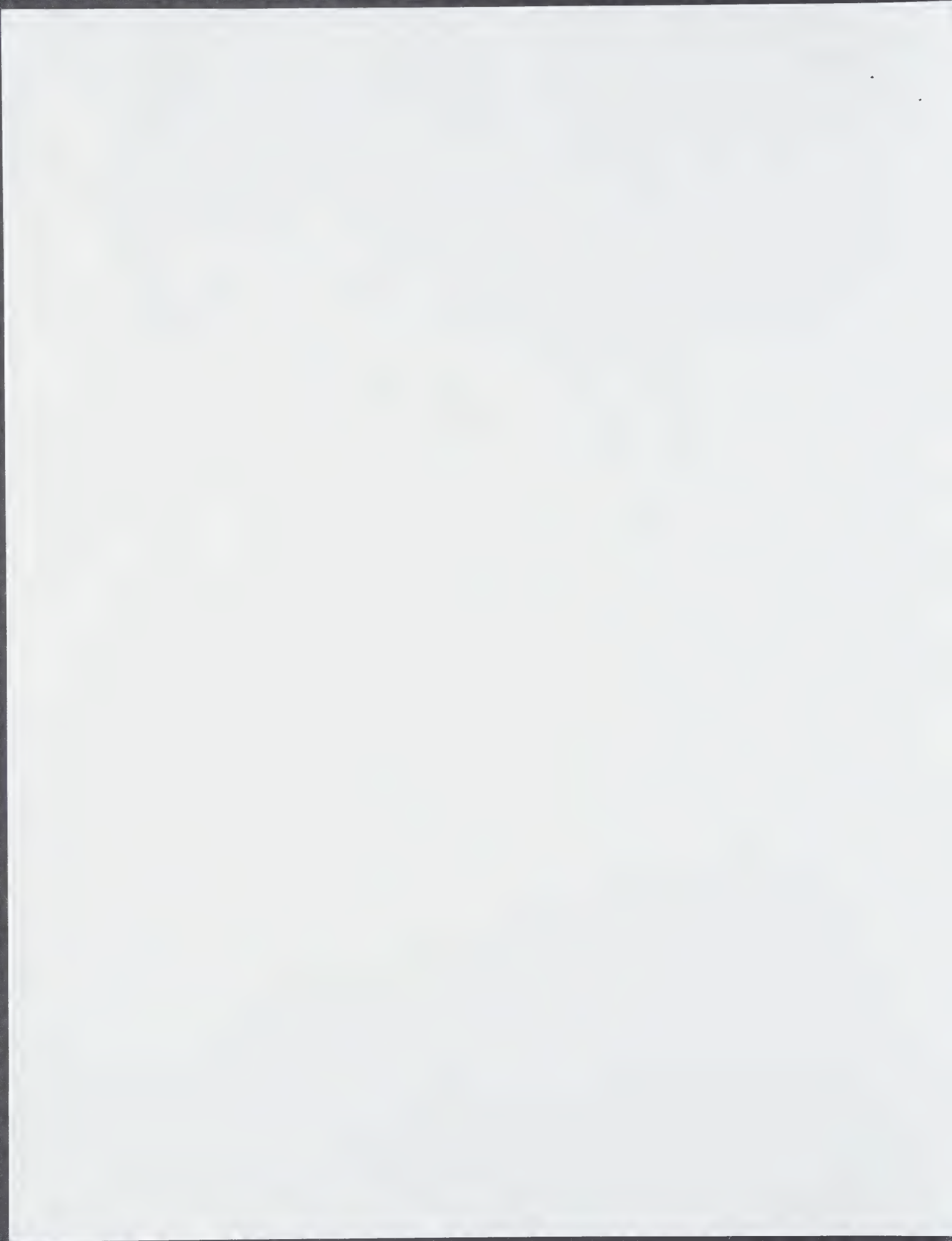
Dear Kurt,

Thank you for your delightful letter.

Unfortunately, I was not at Queen's in February of 1946, as I was working in Montreal then. Thus, I know nothing about your undoubtedly happy attack on the girls in Goodwin House.

On a more serious note, some of our own people are our worst enemies. Isaiah saw that very clearly. When I read about those silly arguments about whether women should be allowed to pray in concert at the Western Wall, I am reminded of what the greatest Jewish teacher I ever had, Rabbi David Shapiro, said: The statement in Genesis that woman must serve man is purely descriptive of society, not proscriptive. When the Messianic Age approaches, these disparities will disappear. Well, if Maimonides was correct, then the Messianic Age began in May of 1948.

In our own synagogue we have had quite a struggle to allow the Rabbi to take the Torah through the women's section after the reading. Clearly, victories can begin with tiny steps.

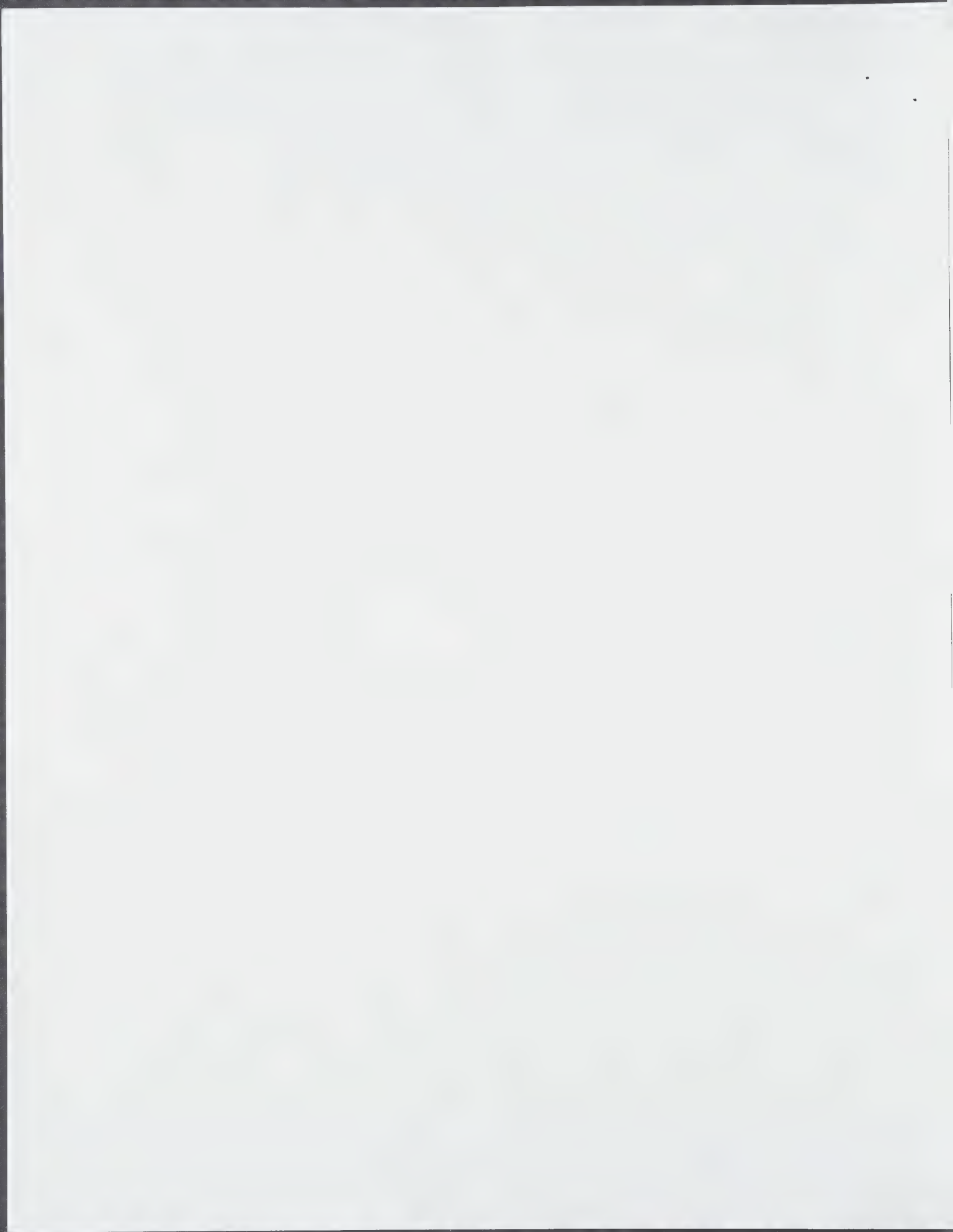

Dear Alfred,

Regretfully we have not had much contact for awhile. Though retired, I lead a hectic and harassed life and do a fair bit of traveling, all dedicated to the cause of our wonderful but complicated Jewish People whom our great leader Moses described as "stiff-necked".

We live in a very challenging, difficult period of time and we sure manage to add to our challenges and sometimes are our own worst enemies.

Your life devoted to man's achievement in the field of Arts and Science is more sedate and gives you much pleasure. I was privy to your accomplishments when I visited Queen's this past weekend. Edith and I had a great time staying with the Elkins. As you no doubt know and have been told, the Elkins are doing a very fine job, are performing beautifully in Kingston and are very well liked by the community. We attended a Shabbaton at the Shul with an excellent scholar-in-residence, Dr. David Luchins.

Friday afternoon, Gini Rosen took us to the most magnificent Art Gallery whose 17th century Dutch art donated by the Baders ranks with the National Gallery in London and the Ryksmuseum in Amsterdam. Very impressive

I spent time with Prof. Tulchinsky who by all accounts is doing a great job as head of the Jewish Studies program.

Prior to going to Kingston, I looked through some old files and found - believe it or not - an old summons to the Supreme Court of the Alma Mater Society for responsibility for creating a disturbance - along with 19 other Electrical Engineering students in contravention of regulations at Goodwin Hall, a women's residence. Would you believe that of me? Frankly, I do not recall the incident and it did not leave a lasting impression.

I also looked through the files of Hillel Foundation in which you, Prof. Zev Lev and I were active. It was a good time in our lives, though in the midst of war and world destruction.

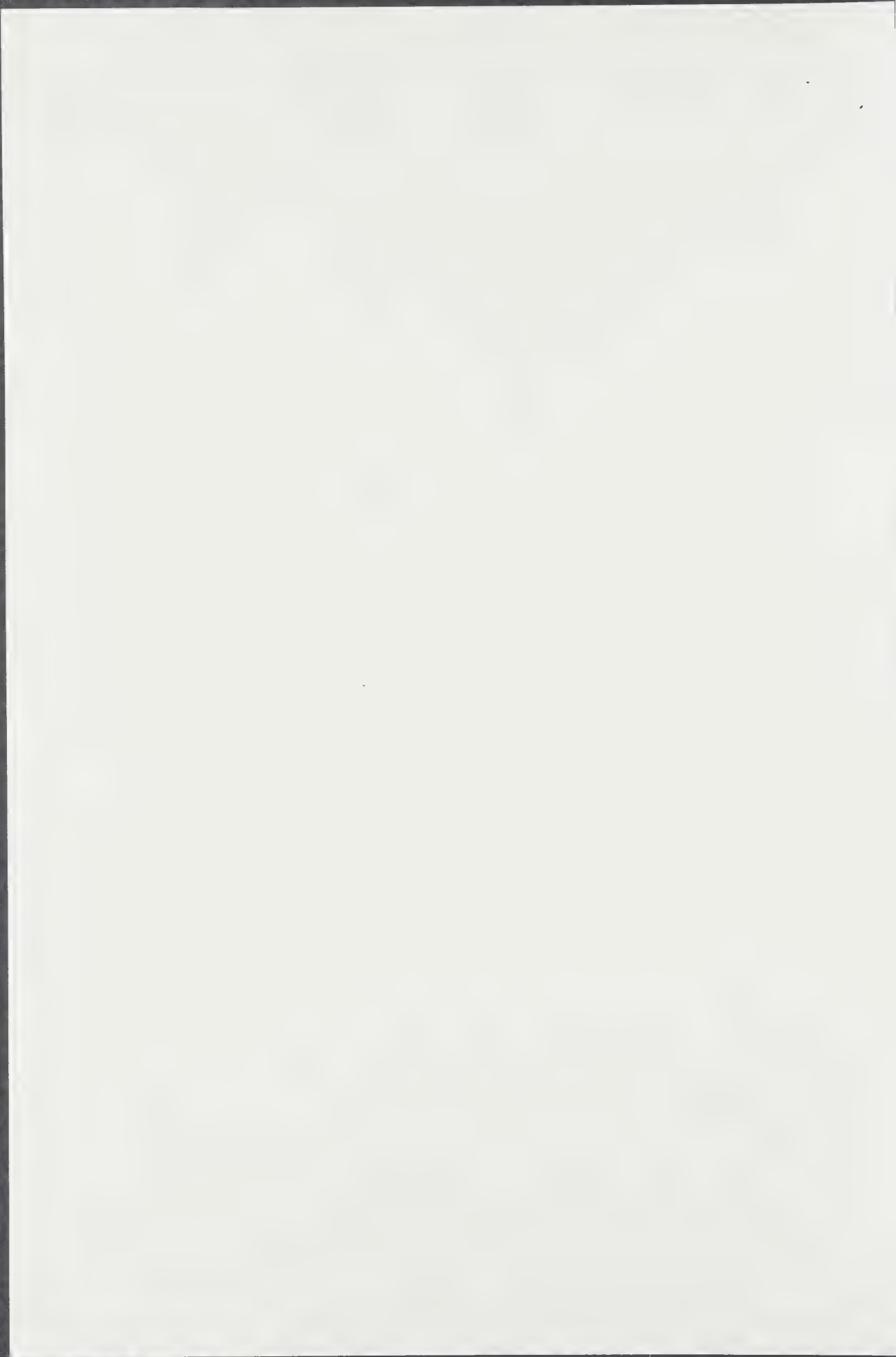
I hear great things about you and Isobel and I am enchanted by all the good work that is being done by the Bader Foundation.

Seeing as you are a "Castle Man", I thought I would pass the deal on to you for your consideration.

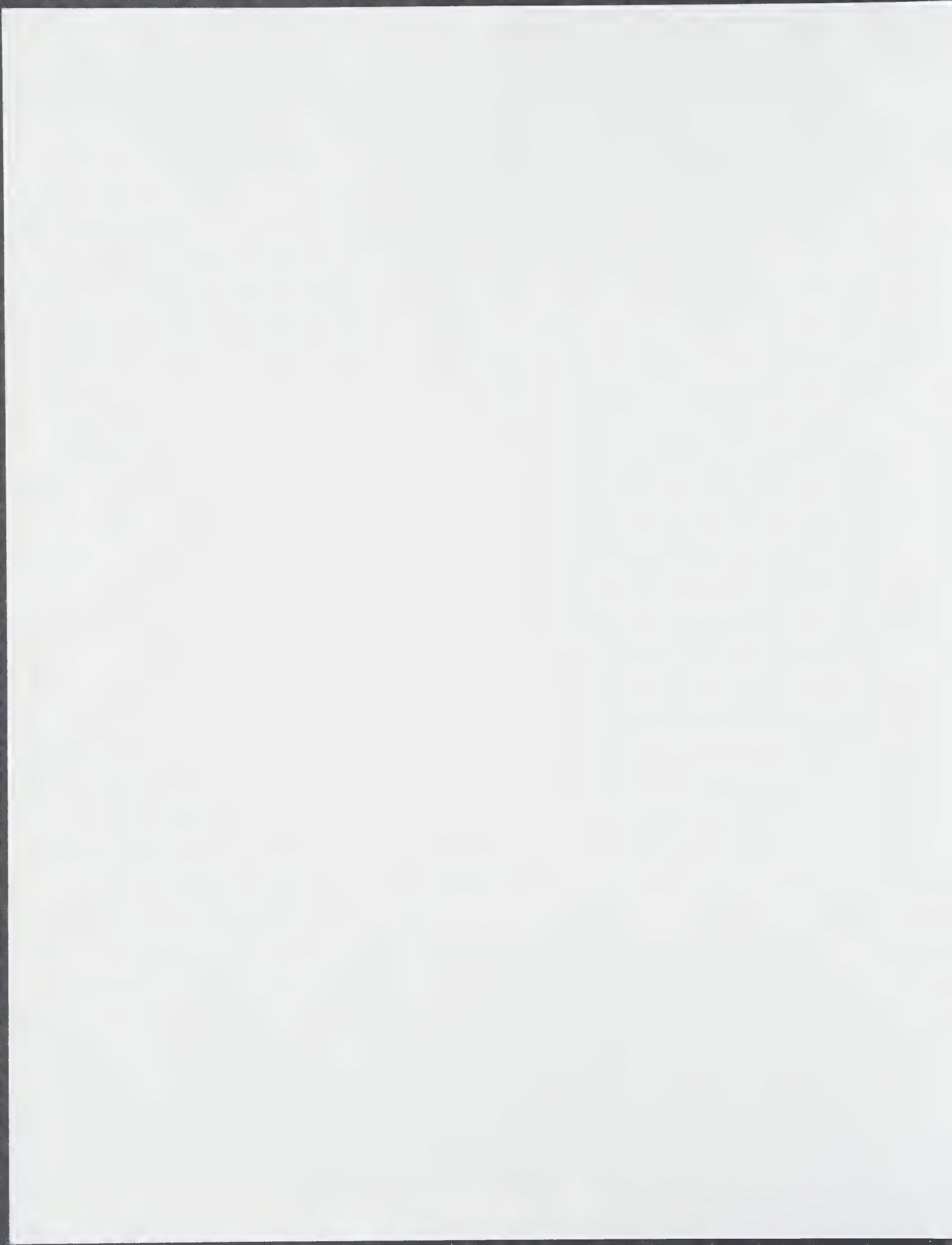
I know you had a specific thought in mind when you bought the castle in England and it is now serving a great purpose and making a great contribution to Queen's.

Thank you for your letter. As it happens, I have been wanting to write to you for a while.

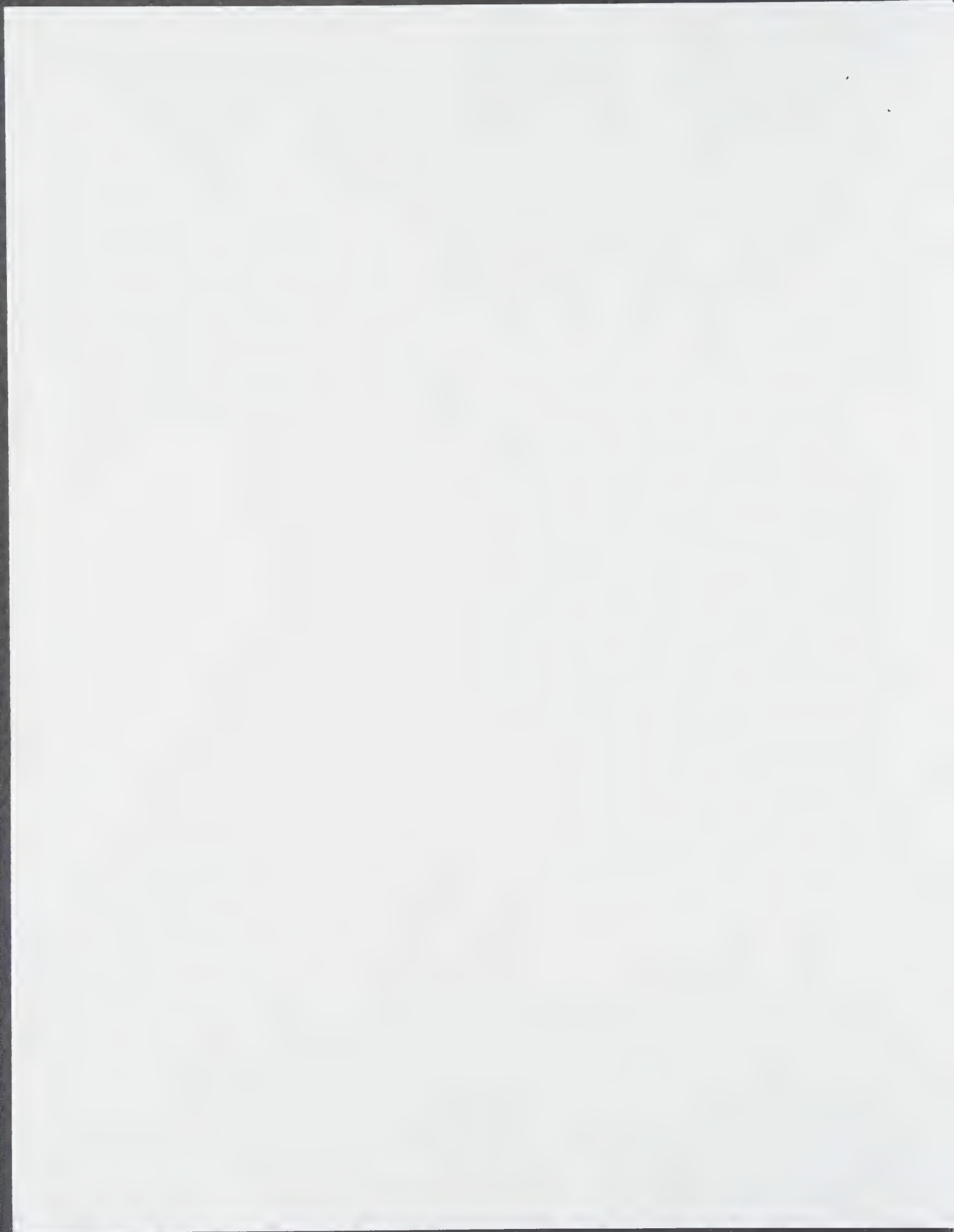
Edith and I are presently in Toronto for another two weeks and will then be off to Israel for the months of September and October, spending the holiday time there.

We will therefore not be here during your visit to Toronto and Kingston and will have to postpone our get-together to a later time.

I might find an opportunity to visit in Milwaukee some time in November/December and talk with you on "affairs of State".

It was good of you to make further help available to Rabbi Phima. I have done likewise. He performs particularly well with great devotion, great integrity and self-sacrifice.

I understand that the dispute with Lubavitch has been resolved in Prague with the help of Rabbi Nechamia Goldberg who happens to also be the Rabbinic authority at Jerusalem College of Technology – a very clever and fine man.



I think that the problem in Vilna is still unresolved – a different circumstance and different people on both sides – very sad.

Edith and I have just returned from two weeks at a small health spa in northern California where I took a holiday from food and restricted myself to six glasses of water a day – no supplements. No trouble – and it helped me to lose considerable weight and excessive blood pressure. A very commendable approach to health food.

You wonder how I relate to the present trauma in Israel. It is a very hard and sad call and unfortunately, poorly handled by both sides of the divide. We will talk about it when we next meet.

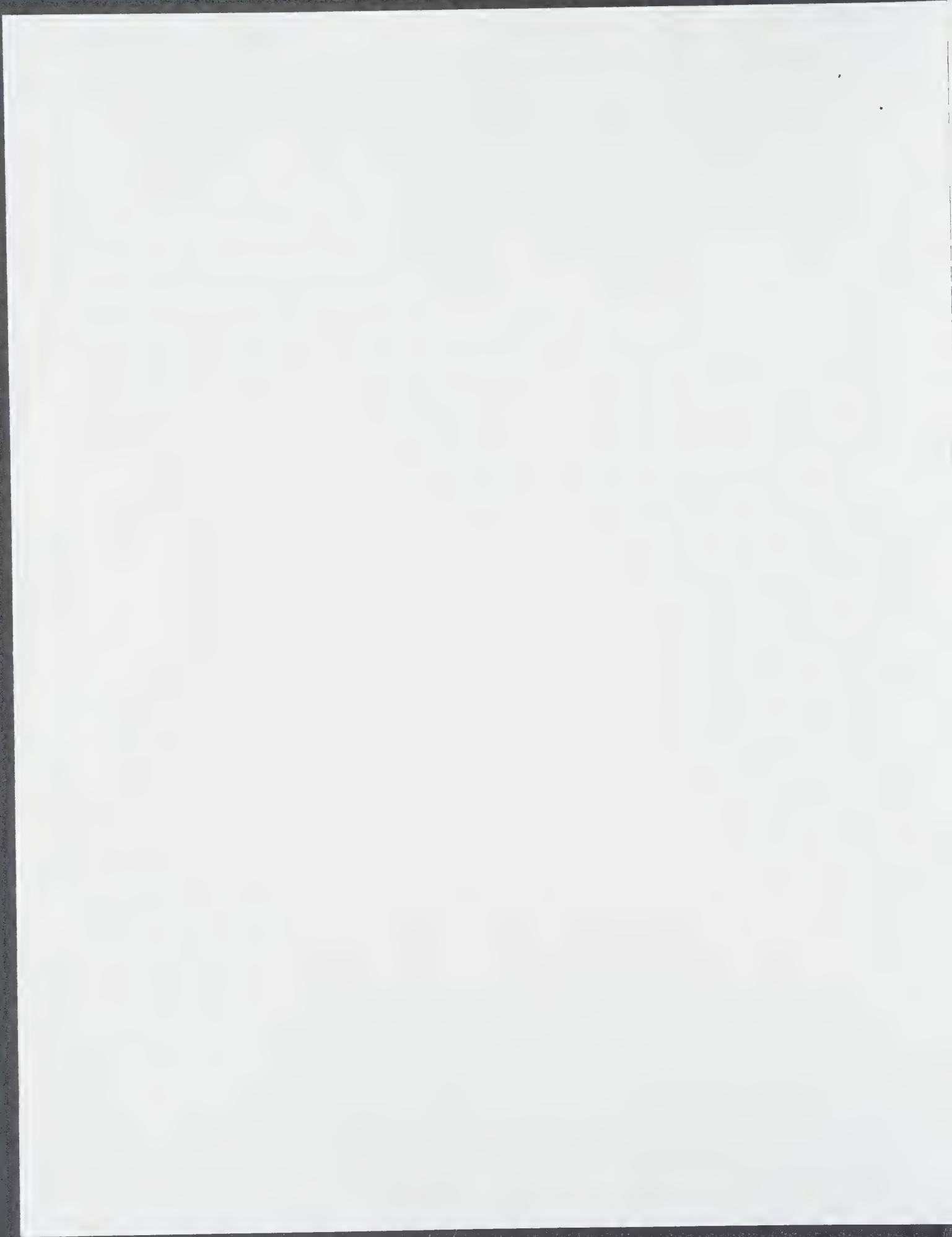


Dear Dr. Bader:

In the meantime, I again want to express our thanks for your making it possible for three very excited RIT students to study this fall at Herstmonceux. What a splendid opportunity!

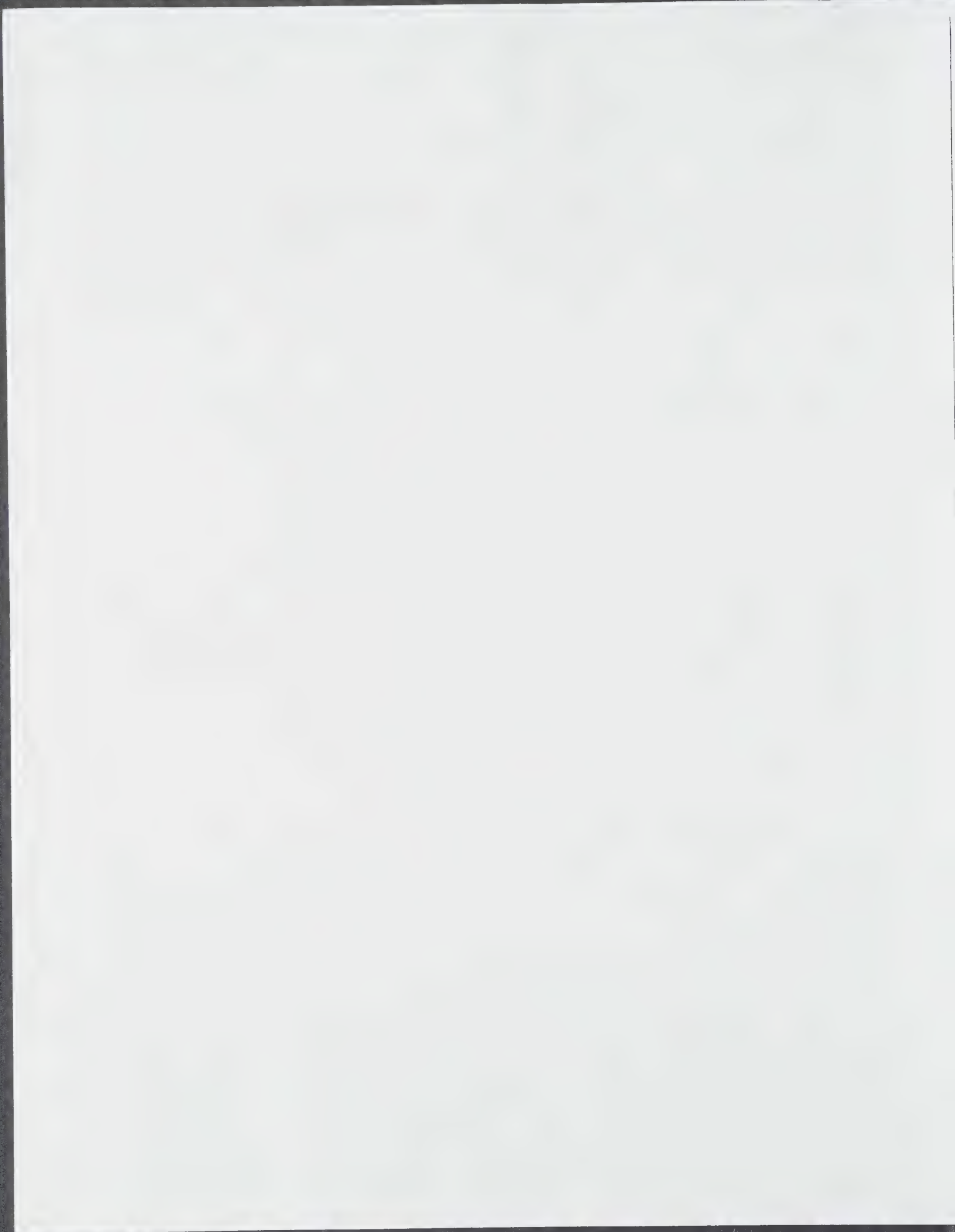

Alfred Bader: Chemist cares for Karlin

PRAGUE PROFILE

Making money work wonders

When Alfred Bader was growing up in his native Vienna in the early 1930s, he used to spend summers visiting the family of his Jewish governess, Hilda Kozáková, in the south Moravian village of Miroslav, near the Austrian border. Hilda's brother Robert Herzog was a businessman traveling from village to village visiting butchers to buy the skins of slaughtered animals in order to sell leather to village shoemakers. The boy would tag along to help unload hides, salt them and store them in the family cellar.

Watching Herzog, then a communist, sweet-talk his clients or bargain with a tanner from Mikulov "was the beginning of my business education," says Bader, now a 79-year-old multimillionaire philanthropist who gives away half of each year's income to good causes, many of them in the Czech Republic. He makes annual gifts of at least \$5 million (135 million Kč); this year's "will certainly exceed \$15 million."

There were weekend journeys to Prague, too, centered around the Old-New Synagogue and the Jewish Cemetery. Near there, a vendor sold drawings for 5 Czechoslovak crowns apiece. "Given the choice of spending 5 crowns on a drawing or on 10 ice-cream cones" Bader recalls, "I usually bought the drawings, many of which I still have."

This was the beginning of Alfred Bader's career as an art collector and dealer, whose milestones include buying a painting for \$55,000 in 1975 — a study of Rembrandt's father that was originally disqualified as an authentic Rembrandt by experts in Amsterdam — and then proving it was a real Rembrandt. It was recently appraised at \$10 million when he gave it to his Canadian alma mater, Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario. Since he also founded and headed the Sigma-Aldrich global chemical conglomerate from 1955 to 1991, his candid memoir is appropriately titled *Adventures of a Chemist Collector* (see box for details).

Alfred Bader became a Nazi target at 13 when Hitler annexed Austria. But when the British government allocated 10,000 visas for Jewish children between 12 and 16, Bader was placed on the first *Kindertransport* train, which left Vienna Dec. 10, 1938.

Lodged with a Jewish family in Brighton, he enjoyed a good year in school. But when

he turned 16 in the spring of 1940, he was interned as an "enemy alien" in a roundup of potential threats between ages 16 and 65. Thrown in with German prisoners-of-war and labeled a POW himself, the teenager was sent to prison camps on the Isle of Man and then in Canada, where a guard named Bruno, father of six, used to wake him every morning by "playing with my penis." Fortunately, the son of his British sponsors resided in Montréal and Bader was released to them after 15 months of internment.

Though he'd passed the matriculation exam for McGill University, he was rejected there and by the University of Toronto because their Jewish quotas were filled. Accepted by the applied-science faculty of Queen's University, the young man with a thick German accent proved a brilliant student who, in three successive years, was awarded bachelor's degrees in engineering chemistry (1945) and history (1946) and a master's in chemistry (1947). He is now Queen's University's most generous benefactor.

Young Bader's appetite for paint and chemicals was whetted by a summer job as a lab technician at a paint company in Montréal. Upon graduation, he went south of the border on a

fellowship in organic chemistry to Harvard, where he took another master's in 1949 and a doctorate in 1950. That year, he moved to Milwaukee, Wisconsin, which is still his home city, to work as a research chemist for the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company.

A marriage deferred

During his 1949 Harvard summer vacation, Bader sailed from Québec City to Liverpool for his first return visit to Europe. Two days before the ship docked, he met Isabel Overton, the daughter of a Protestant lay preacher from northern Ontario. After a week's courtship in London, he proposed marriage to her. She hesitated — mostly because of their religious differences and his determination to raise any children as Jews, meaning that their mother would have to be Jewish or convert to Judaism.

Their courtship continued by correspondence after he returned to the States and she settled in England as a schoolteacher in Sussex. In her 80th letter to him (he kept them all), she wrote that she didn't think their marriage would work.

On the rebound, he met Helen Ann Daniels, from a South Dakota religious background similar to Isabel's but willing to convert. They were

married in Milwaukee by an orthodox rabbi in 1952 and had two sons.

His heart, however, still belonged to Isabel and, in 1975 — propelled by a recurrent dream in which her gaunt preacher father asked him why he wasn't with her — he looked her up in Sussex. In 1981, "Danny" divorced him so he could marry Isabel.

A playground for outsiders

Partly because he has roots in southern Moravia, Bader endows prestigious annual prizes and a professorship in organic chemistry at Masaryk University in Brno. He also funds Bader Art History Fellowships for Czech scholars to do research, mostly abroad, and Bader Science Fellowships enabling four Czech students a year to do their doctoral work at the Imperial College in London and three U.S. Ivy League universities: Harvard, Columbia and Pennsylvania.

There is a non-elitist side to Bader's generosity, epitomized by his motto: "Save my money for somebody left out." In recent years, he and his wife have been active in humanitarian and educational aid programs for Roma (Gypsies).

One of the reasons they visited Prague in June is a case history in how philanthropy can prove profitable for everyone:

In Prague 8's flood-devastated Karlin sector, the Molákova street special school for 120 children classified as mentally or socially underdeveloped (90 percent of them Roma) was heavily damaged by last August's waters. City funds weren't readily forthcoming to repair the school. So the children were dispersed to study in special shifts elsewhere, if at all.

To encourage action, Bader pledged \$20,000 (now \$40,000 Kč) toward repair of the school if City Hall would match that sum. Neither school director Jitka Vargová nor the municipal officials to whom she brought Bader's offer had ever heard of matching grants, so the bureaucrats threw up their hands and gave her the entire 5.5 million Kč needed to restore the school.

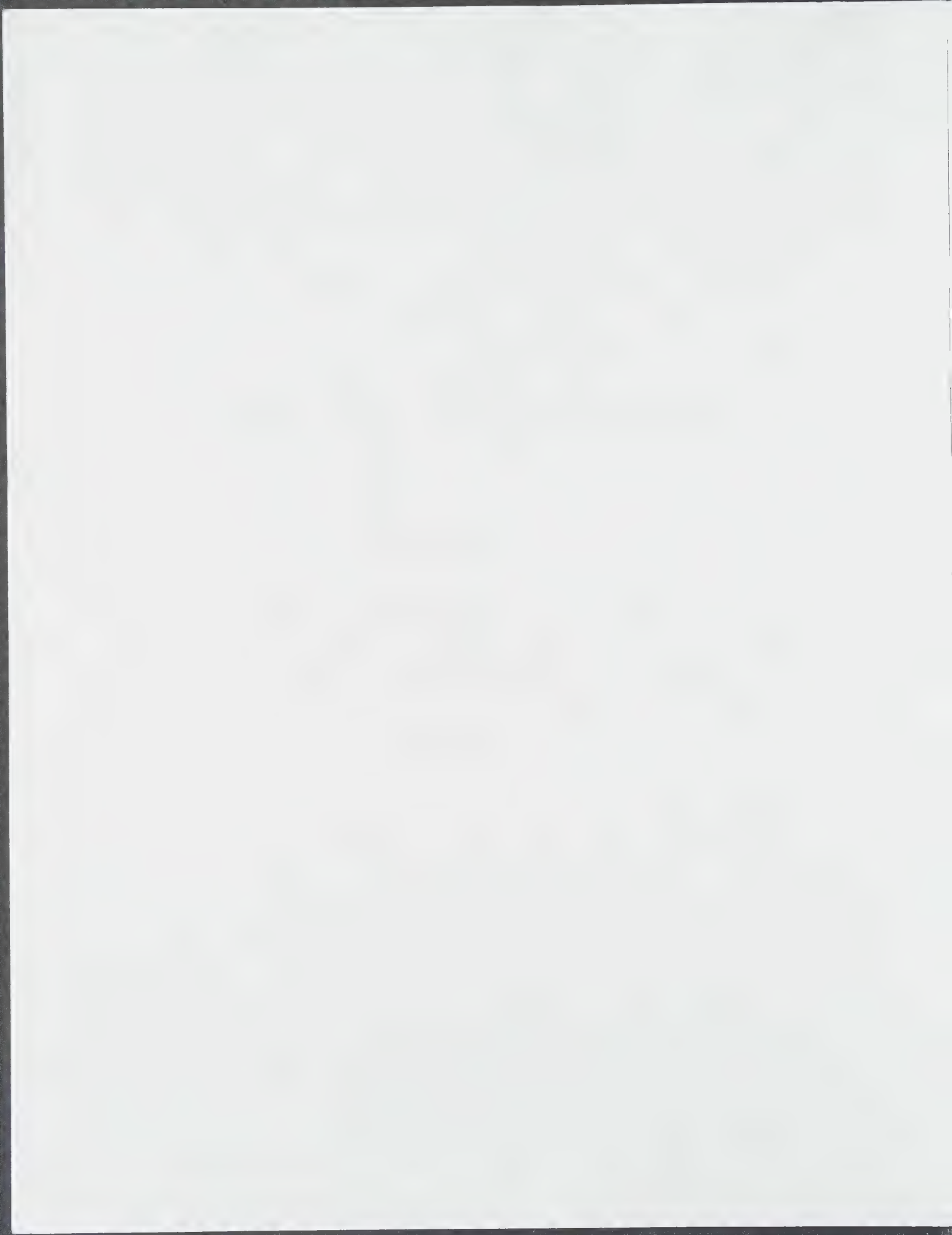
Pleased but embarrassed, Vargová offered the Baders their money back. No way! Instead, they re-earmarked the money to dredge a sea of contaminated mud coating the school's garden. When work started, it was discovered that soil and plant contamination was much less than feared. So the money was reassigned again — this time for architect Josef Smola to create a state-of-the-art playground in the school's garden.

Complete with slides, swings, climbing wall, gazebo and wicked-witch hut, the playground was opened on Friday the 13th by the roly-poly, cherubic philanthropist and his slender, elegant wife. During the speech-making and after the ribbon-cutting, this loving and generous couple held hands, already enjoying their gift as much as the kids who couldn't and didn't wait to start using it.

SUMMARY

My name is Kelly Rich [I don't like titles]. I am disabled, I have scoliosis; To much lifting hurts my back, & I need 1 1/2 weeks to rest if the muscles become to sore. Massage helps, but my insurance does n't cover it, and it is to expensive to do regularly.

I have sensitivity to temperatures below 80°, so if I do work it cann't be in cold weather, or in air conditioning. Most places, airconditioners are set for 65° to 70°. I have dyslexia (2nd. form) causes problems in explaining what I need to say, & have a hard time comprehending things I read.

These are only a few things. The money would be helpful in many area's if I find work just delivering light things, or helping someone get somewhere.

Paying for health care that my insurance doesn't cover.

Basicly, To pay bills, you need money; To take a vacation, you need money, transportation; To get this you need employment, To get employment you need a vehicle. And to get a loan, You need to have money.



I have dyslexia (2nd. form), which if this doesn't make any sense, it does to me. My wording either by written, or verbal, can be confusing for others to understand. Simply put : What is simple to me may be hard to someone else; and what is simple to someone else, is hard to me.

Due to my health problems, there are some employment I can't do, because of my sensitivity to cold, the work I can do require transportation just to get there. To take a cab round trip daily for 5 days of work each week, and what most places, at the rate of pay received with taxes taken out, I would have to live on the street just to make a living.

To get a vehicle I would have to get insurance as well, The state of WI requires that drivers have auto insurance.

Because of my disability the government gives me Medicare and Medicaid. One pays 80 % and the other pays 20% of the bill(s), you would think with both it would come out to 100%, not including each individual co-payment.

For Sample: Lets say that a doctor charges \$100.00. 1st. its sent to Medicare who would pay 80% of the bill then it would be sent to Medicaid who would pay 20% of whats left & the rest is my responsibility.

Lets figure;

$\$100.00 \times 80\% = \80.00 Medicare payment

$\$100.00 - \$80.00 = \$20.00$

$\$20. \times 20\% = \4.00 Medicaid payment

$\$20. - \$4.00 = \$16.00$

$\$16.00$ is my responsibility.

But thats not how it goes though, Medicare does pay 80% but of what they approve of, not the total bill, as sample below shows.

\$100.00 [Lets say Medicare approves of \$40.00]

\$40.00 x 80% = \$32.00 Medicare payment

\$100. - \$32.00 = \$68.00

\$68.00 x 20% = \$13.60 Medicaid payment

\$68.00 - \$13.60 = \$54.40

\$54.40 is my responsibility.

To have other insurance(s) will help ease government insurance, it may help take a load off government spending.

To take a vacation, it would be nice since I never been on one before, Growing up, a vacation was going to a neighbors house for 1-2 days. (Every child should get one, in their life), My turn should be up for some good entertainment at a amusement park, or going some place quiet & go fishing.

With your help I could get a vehicle w/insurance coverage for 4-5 years till I get steady employment I would like to get a Jeep Cherokee, or a Jeep Wagoneer. Also with your help, I could ^{get} health insurance to help take a load off the government spending, (same as above till I can find steady employment and get insurance through them.

There are two other things I would like to do, (1) To get a C.D. savings, & (2). Maybe invest some money for the future. Any money left over from the \$20,000. after all these other things are completed, will be used in one (1) to three (3) ways, or All ways, listed below.

1). Help homeless children & adults with clothing/ Medication.

2). Help other disabled / elder adults who have trouble walking / or hearing.

3). Donate money to whom I believe will use it best.

Most of these can be fulfilled in the same building
in which I live.

My wife and I visited Professor Reichstein just a few weeks ago and realized of course how very sick he was. And yet we are shaken to learn of his passing and want to convey our deepest sympathy.

If ever one can say of a man, "The memory of the righteous is a blessing", it can be said of your brother and father.

We were good friends for many years and looked forward each June to spending a few hours with him talking about chemistry, about ferns, about his life, about art.

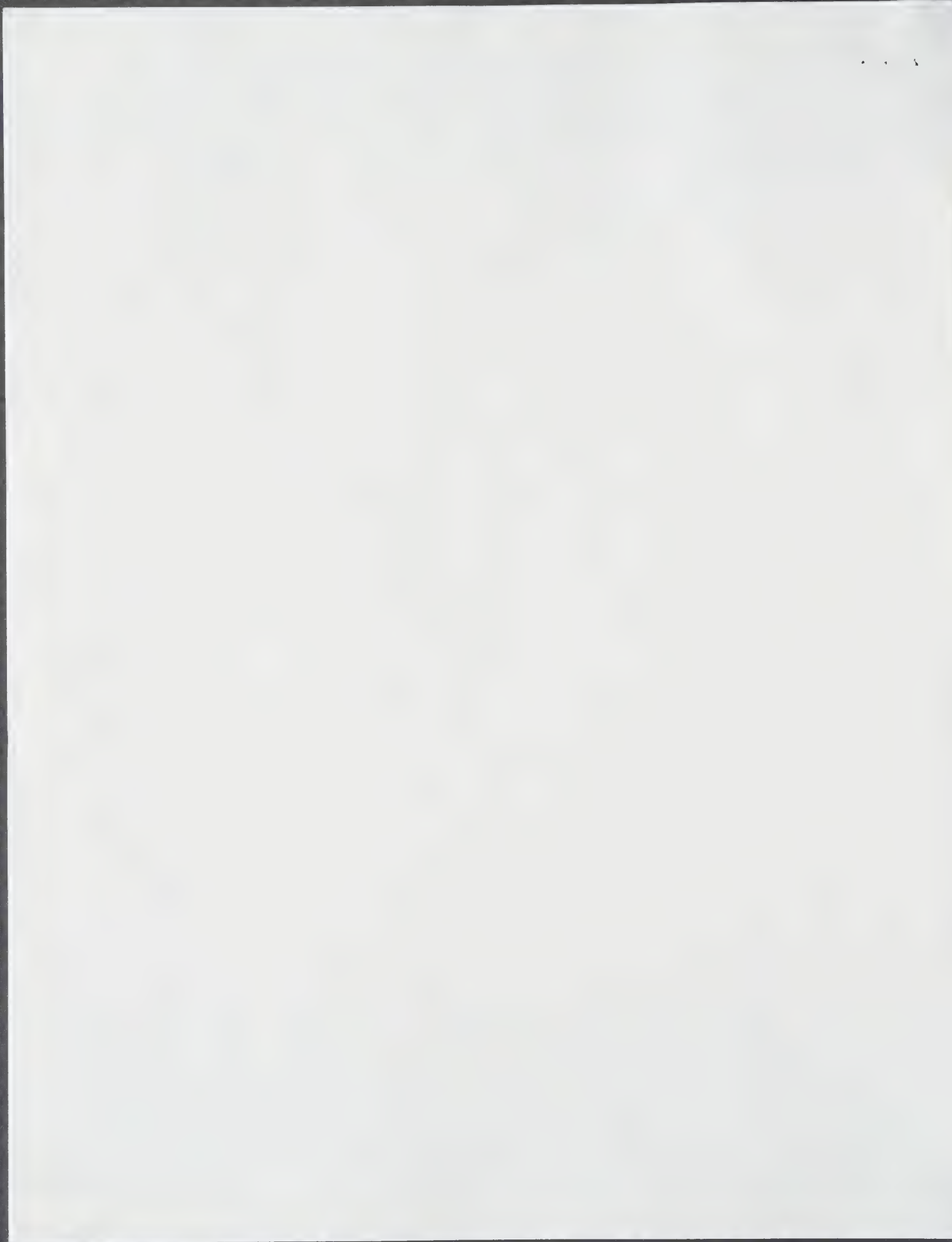

Tadeus Reichstein, 99, Dies; Won Nobel for Cortisone Work

Dr. Tadeus Reichstein, a Swiss chemist who shared the Nobel Prize in medicine with two Americans for their work with cortisone, died Thursday at his home in Basel, Switzerland. He was 99.

In the 1930's and 1940's, Dr. Reichstein isolated several biologically active substances including corticosterone, the anti-inflammatory agent now known as cortisone, from hormones produced in the adrenal glands, which are located above the kidneys.

Dr. Reichstein studied organic chemistry at the Zurich Eidgenössische Technische Hochschule, where he earned his Ph.D. in 1922. After a brief time in industry, he returned to the technical institute as a lecturer. In 1933, he had his first great success when he developed a process for synthesizing Vitamin C that helped lead to its mass produc-

tion.

In the mid-1930's he began his pioneering work on the hormones produced in the adrenal glands. By 1937 Dr. Reichstein had isolated corticosterone.

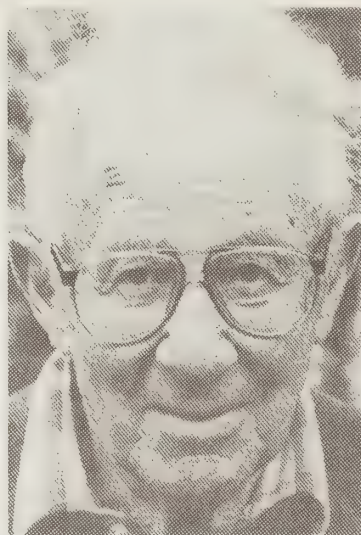
At the same time, similar independent research on cortisone was being done in America by Prof. Edward C. Kendall at the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota. In the 1940's, he and Dr. Philip S. Hench, his colleague at the clinic, began testing cortisone, which Dr. Kendall had named Compound E, as a treatment for arthritis.

One of Dr. Reichstein's assistants, Dr. Marguerite Steiger, subsequently synthesized a form of cortisone that was named deoxy-corticosterone. At the time it proved useful in the treatment of Addison's disease, a condition in which the adrenal glands do not produce enough hormones.

In 1938, Dr. Reichstein joined the faculty of the University of Basel, where he continued his research. By 1946, he and his assistants had isolated 29 different steroids produced by the adrenal glands.

In 1950, Doctors Reichstein, Kendall and Hench were jointly awarded the Nobel Prize in medicine for "their discoveries concerning the suprarenal cortex hormones, their structure and biological effects."

Dr. Reichstein retired from the

University of Basel in 1967, but remained active in research until recently.

In 1992, he was among 63 Nobel laureates to sign an appeal to the world's governments to use their influence to end fighting in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Tadeus Reichstein was born July 20, 1897, in Wloclawek, Poland. His family lived in Kiev, Ukraine, and Berlin before settling in Zurich in 1905. They became Swiss citizens in 1914.

Among his many professional affiliations, Dr. Reichstein was a Fellow of Royal Society in London and an international member the National Academy of Sciences in Washington. Dr. Reichstein, who often spoke of himself as "a devoted gardener of African plants," was also an honorary member of the American Fern Society.

He is survived by a brother, Ignaz Reichstein; a daughter, Marguerite Rosset, and three grandchildren.

Walther Volbach, Theater Director, 98

Walther R. Volbach, a theater director, historian and educator, died yesterday in Amherst, Mass. He was 98.

Dr. Volbach specialized in theater directing, opera production and scenic design. He translated many modern European plays into English, including works by Schiller, Franz Grillparzer and Montherlant. He was an early champion of the Swiss scenic artist and esthetician Adolphe Appia and translated many of his essays.

In all, he published more than 100 scholarly articles and several books on theater.

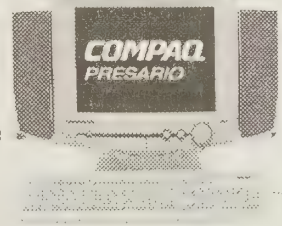

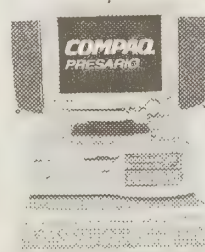

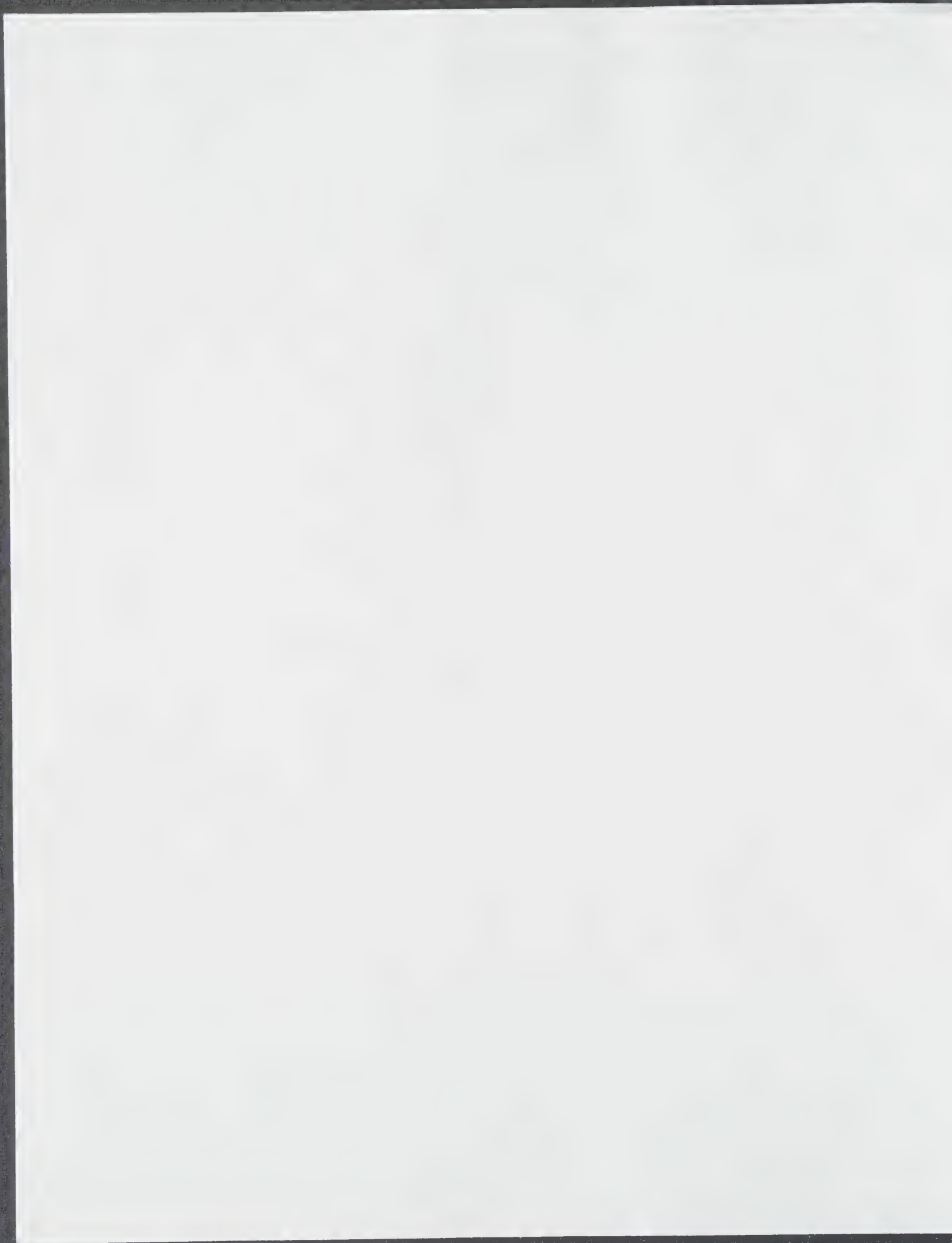

We have lots to talk about on many subjects, but time is such a short commodity, that it gives little opportunity to meet or even have a quiet telephone conversation.

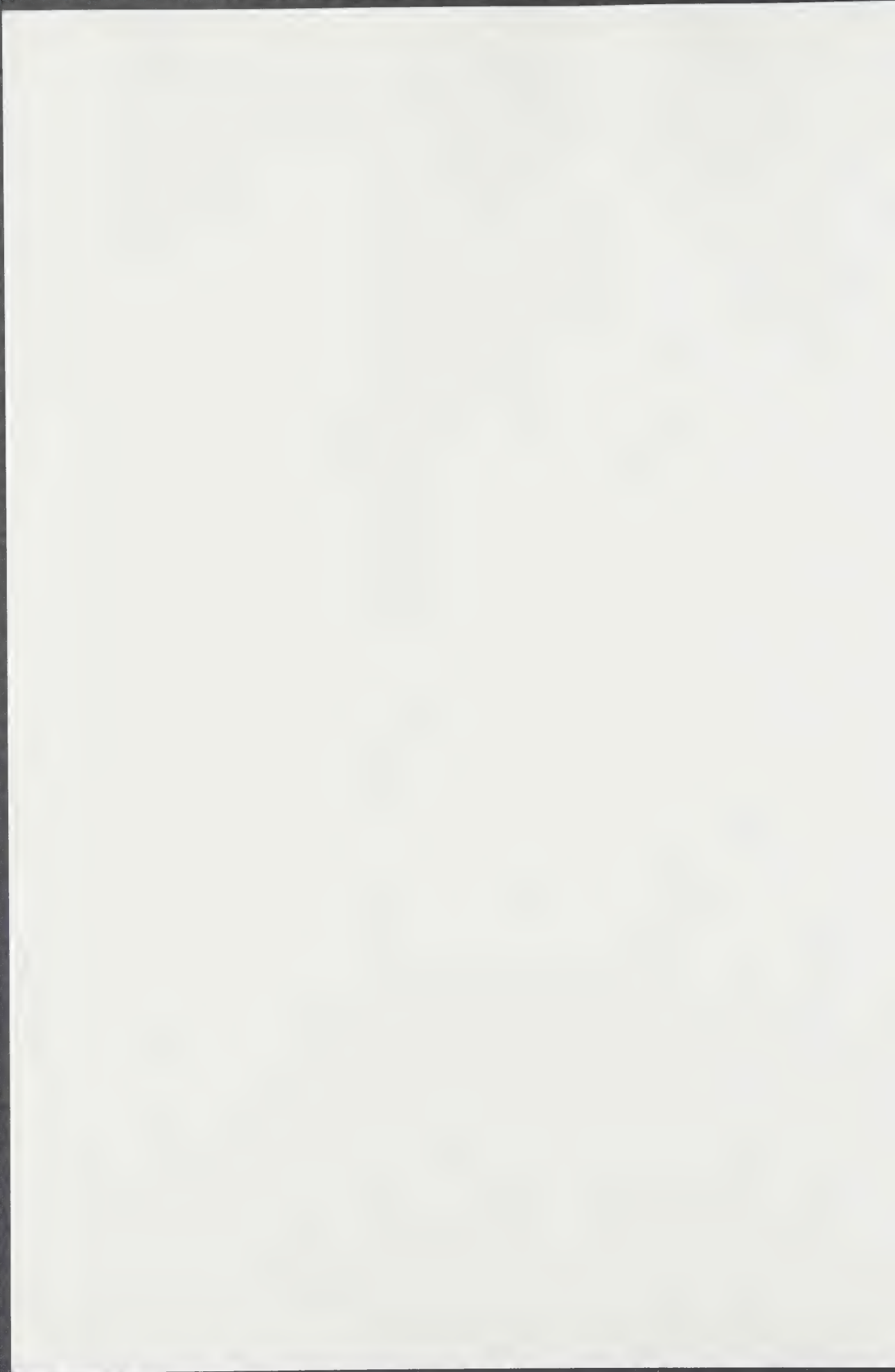

For example, I read about your richly deserved 1995 Charles Parson Award in C & EN last May. I meant to send congratulations, but didn't follow through.

I too recall the unfortunate situation in 1992 about the shabby treatment by Tom Cori, because of your gift to Queen's University. Again I meant to lend my support to your side, but failed to write or call.

In October 1990 Ruth and I and friends visited Frank Lloyd Wright's Prairie House, Mitchell Conservatory and the Milwaukee Public Museum. At the latter we particularly admired the Dutch Master Paintings contributed by Alfred and Isabel Bader. Of course, I planned to at least phone and wish you well, but somehow neglected to do so.

This past Thanksgiving while discussing Paintings and Drawings, Ruth referred to a book - Quality in Art - by Jacob Rosenberg - which was a gift from you in 1973. And, we have long cherished a drawing by Anton Levy which you forwarded in March, 1973 to hasten my recovery from a myocardial infarction - and it helped.

I retired from the Chemical Division of the Quaker Oats Company in late 1973 at age 60, and looked for an activity which would be less stressful yet interesting. I decided on Piano Technology and was an apprentice with a concert Tuner - technician in Chicago for a year, built a home in Knights Templar



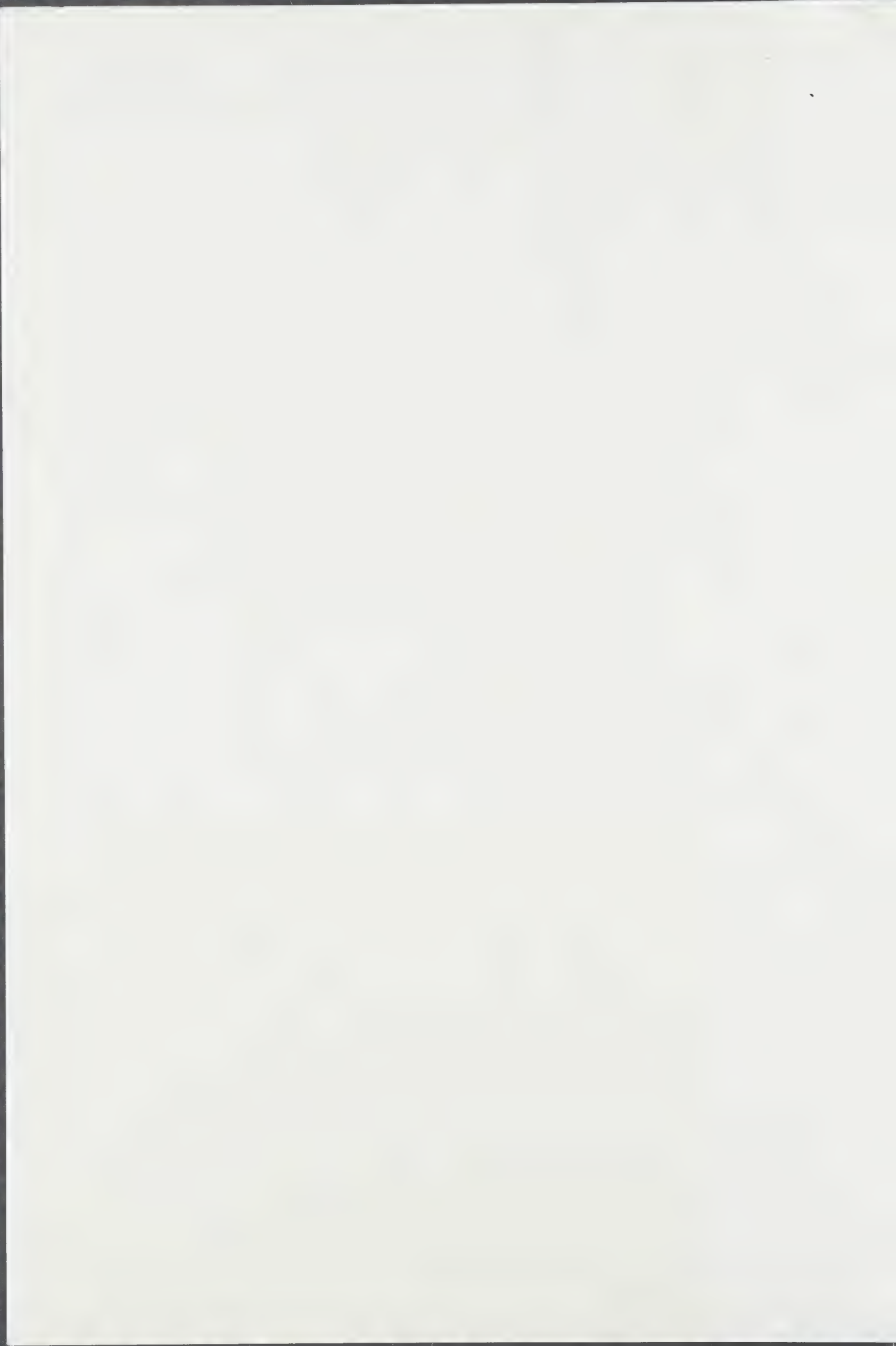

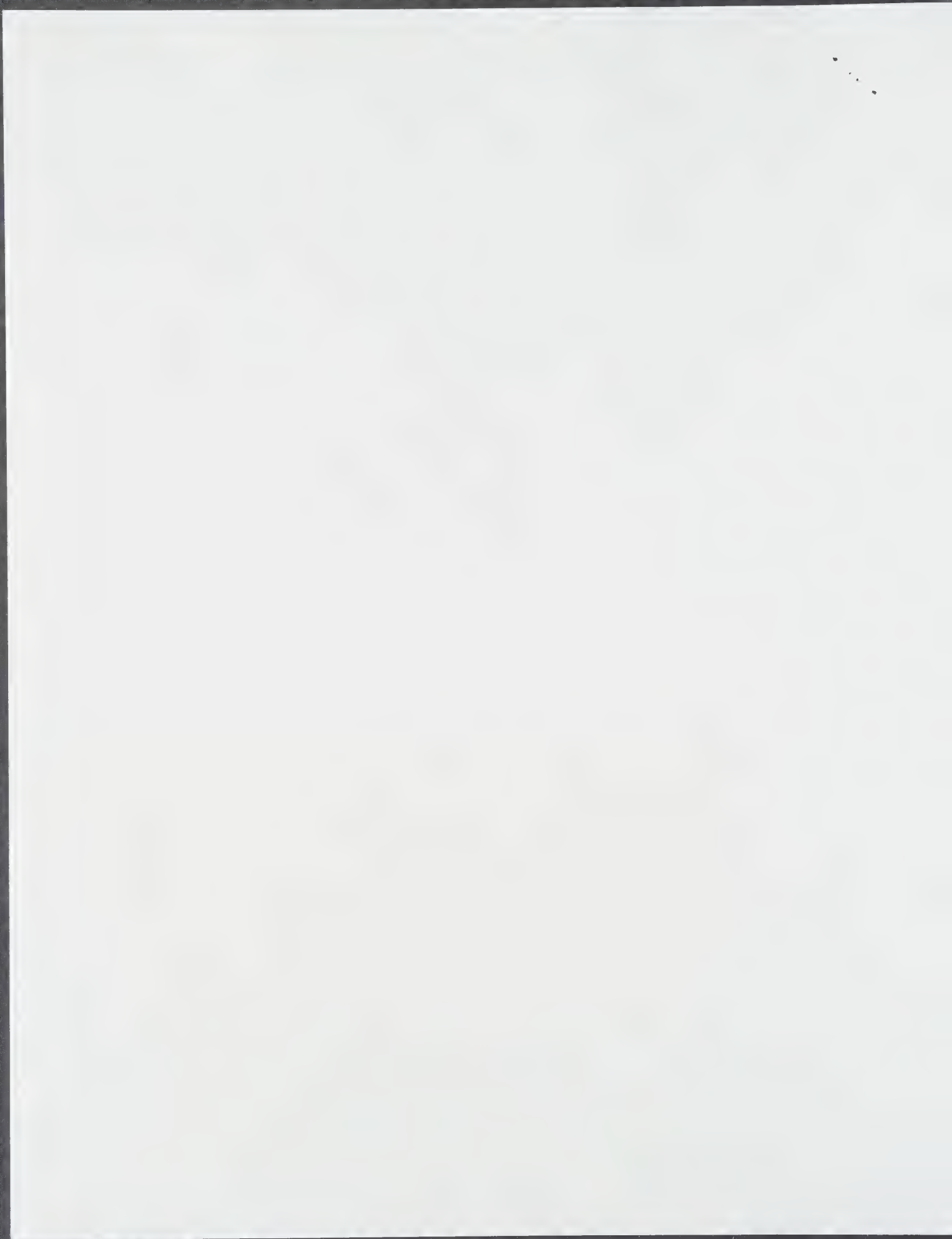
