For friends and supporters of the Centre for German-Jewish Studies, I am adding to my seasonal greetings a note about recent developments, for those who are interested.

We shall be entering the New Year with the prospect of three new colleagues joining us in different capacities. The most notable is the outcome of the advertisement for the new joint appointment of Director of the Leo Baeck Institute (London) and Lecturer in German-Jewish History at Sussex, closely associated with the Centre. We expect that Dr Raphael Gross will take up this new appointment on 1 May 2001. He has made his name as Assistant Professor at the University of Bochum through a series of original publications, above all his book 'Carl Schmitt und die Juden: Eine deutsche Rechtslehre' (which is being translated into English). A central theme is the debate between the progressive jurist Hans Kelsen and the conservative Carl Schmitt about the alleged antagonism between 'Jewish Law and Christian Grace'. After 1933, when Kelsen was forced to emigrate, it turned out that Schmitt's conception of 'Grace' was quite compatible with the ideology of National Socialism.

Our advertisement for a part-time Research Assistant (Archives and Publications) has also had a successful outcome. During the interviews, held on 11 December, it became clear that the duties set out in the Further Particulars could not all be assigned to a single candidate. We decided to appoint Samira Teuteberg, a young German woman with excellent library qualifications, as Research Assistant (Archives). She impressed us all, not least with her facility in deciphering old German handwriting. Members of the committee were also very impressed by a second candidate, Jonathan Hughes, who has just submitted his doctorate on the Austrian Jewish author Joseph Roth (as subject close to my heart). So we have decided to create a second part-time post of Research Assistant (Projects and Publications). Hughes's qualifications and experience mean that he should be able to represent me in certain functions for which I do not at the moment have a suitable deputy.

We continue to pursue funding opportunities to develop the Arnold Daghani Collection. We have just heard the outcome of the most ambitious of our applications, submitted to the Arts and Humanities Research Board during the summer. The application, prepared with the help of Deborah Schultz and other colleagues, was graded A + (the highest of the five grades). However, there were unfortunately not sufficient funds for the AHRB to support all A + applications (we have been encouraged to resubmit our application in May 2001).

The visit of Professor Wolfgang Benz from the Technical University in Berlin was one of our highlights in December. Before his lecture on Jewish Life in Germany after 1945, we had the opportunity to discuss possible collaborative research projects and we agreed to hold a joint workshop at Sussex (probably at the end of June 2001) on the Acculturation of German-Jewish Refugee Children who settled in England in the 1930s, which might in the longer term provide the basis for a more ambitious joint research programme.

There is thus plenty to look forward to in 2001, including our book on 'The Work of Jakov Lind', which should be out by the end of February, in time for Jewish Book Week; the issue of the journal 'Psychoanalysis and History' with our Freud Conference papers; and 'The Trial of Richard Wagner', to be held at the London Jewish Cultural Centre on Sunday 17 June.

On a more personal note, I have been advised by a doctor in Leicester with a special interest in dietary treatments for MS that I should go on a regime which avoids all milk products (including my favourite cheeses), tea, coffee and chocolate, animal fats and all red meats, and certain vegetables (including tomatoes and potatoes). Whether this will stabilize my illness remains to be seen, but the first indications are not unpromising. At all events, it looks as though I shall be one of the few people who actually lose weight over Christmas!



I have enjoyed it more than most all of the biographies of any of my contemporaries, and there is a reason for it. It has many similarities with my own life as well as coincidences which are amazing.


It also had an enormous influence on me, since I decided to finally have my own book edited and printed after it existed before only as a manuscript. When it is ready, I will send it to you for sure.

I now will only write about one single coincidence, which I think will amuse you!

I met David New Years Eve 1963 also on the "Franconia" on a cruise to the Caribbean. I was forced to take that cruise, mainly by David Susskind, you might have known him, because I went half crazy after Kennedy's assassination, having worked for him to establish the Peace Corp. The Franconia was a newly refitted beautiful ship made ready for the spoiled 1,000 American passengers for their winter vacations. It was David's first cruise after his regular crossings to Montreal as an officer of Cunard.

He was only a young man but had wisdom and knowledge of Methuselah. I, who have known interesting men, statesman and others, was so elated and impressed that when the end of the cruise-time came I was ready to leave everything behind me and follow him to England. But that of course this you will read in my book one day!

Do you now understand a little, why I feel so close to you, and want to call you a friend. For today this is quite enough. I don't even know if you will open my letter, I do hope so.



Just another comment. I feel terrible about everything that is going on in this country. The war in Iraq, the destruction of old Mesopotamia, the death of so many intelligent people, not understanding Iran and the very troublesome happenings in Israel, in which I still don't see any solution at all. I suffer with all these people and see no end to it!


Another worry are elections in Germany, and the draconian methods that Tony Blair has found necessary to declare in England!


Thank you so much for your letter. It made me truly happy to read your words.

You asked after Germany. Well, after two years in Jerusalem it was difficult at the beginning. For example, I was wearing kippah only on Shabbat but I was told that it is dangerous on the streets because of some groups of young Arabs harassing Jews. Rabbi Rothschild was one of the victims some time ago and he told me in person about his broken glasses. Therefore, I bought a black hat to avoid a strange feeling of taking off kippah immediately after services.

There is a fence in front of every Jewish building and a policeman 24 hours a day. People have a fear of a possible attack. I think it is almost schizophrenic since nothing happened so far. I was very upset when a German policeman told me a couple of weeks ago that I cannot enter the synagogue so early. Behind the synagogue's door there is another surprise – Israeli security guards and a checking point. Would you believe that I was not allowed to enter the synagogue on my very first Shabbat in Berlin because I was somehow suspicious and did not have an ID with me? I do not need to mention that I went home crying.

Nevertheless, now I am very balanced and quite satisfied in Berlin. I learn every day Hebrew and even speak Hebrew with a Russian Jew who lives in my dormitory. I also prepare for *Yamim noraim* since I invited myself to Rabbi Tovia Ben Chorin in Zürich. For Shabbat Shuva, I will chant there all Haazinu, have a short D'var Torah and lead Torah studies.

One Shabbat I spent in the Lauder Yeshiva in Berlin. I was amazed how even rabbis were operating with simple categories without asking any questions. For example: "They are only 21 birds forbidden compared to the 30 000 birds in the nowadays encyclopedias. Therefore, we are well off." Well, the word "nowadays" is exactly the problem making the entire claim very naïve for me. Abortion is another problem of the Jewish law if we take into consideration Ex 21:22. But even if we do not take it into consideration and argue that an abortion is a murder why then Jewish law says that we do not get a soul until the birth? If it is a murder, what do we murder? I am not for abortions but I cannot leave the inconsequence of the Jewish law unnoticed. Last but not least, I



claim that a soul as a non-material entity independent on the body is not a Biblical concept but a rabbinical one, perhaps under the influence of the Greek philosophy.

In July, I attended some classes at the University of Potsdam with Prof. Admiel Kosman. He is a Talmudic scholar (without kippah) from Bar Ilan University. He wrote for *Haaretz* and published six collections of his poems. Many consider him controversial but I have not found yet a reason. He is an amazing teacher and I would like to attend all of his lectures next semester: Avodah zarah, Women, Sages and Bible and Ethics in Talmud.

Thank you for writing me about your Jewish approaches. I always liked very much yours and Isabel's independence. Here in Berlin I feel very independent of all the Halachic fanatics and very strong with my Jewish identity. I even put tefilin every morning even though in Jerusalem I have not done it at all.

I know how much you and Isabel like each other and that always impressed me. I wish I could be one day in such a meaningful relationship too but I doubt it. One of my biggest questions is if under these circumstances I can still be happy and balanced. So far, I am. Do you believe in the previous lives? I do not but it might explain many things, as I was told in Jerusalem.



I was thrilled to receive your autobiography -and amazed by the multiplicity of images in your possession resembling my "Old Man" painting, one in particular.

I was also not unimpressed by the backcover image on the book, and your connection to it.

In reading through the book, I note your kindred interest in Delft, as well as Dosso Dossi, subjects of equal interest to me, as you will see in the enclosed book.

On Delft, I have been trying to do a definitive documentary film on Vermeer for many years. I had hoped to have it ready for the current exhibition and had every connection in the world, including the curator of the National Gallery willing to help, the largest network in the Netherlands prepared to broadcast it, and the curator of the Delft Museum agreed to hold the premiere there, across from where Vermeer lies entombed at this moment.

I am sorry that a long trip to Europe has delayed my responding to your letter of June 14th.


I am convinced that Milwaukee needs a Jewish high school, but I am also convinced that it should be co-educational.




