



Could you please help me by advising me whether you know of any translations of these works.



Dear Dr Bader,

You may remember that we met at Sotheby's a year or two ago and exchanged letters about our paintings by Heerschop. Now our acquaintance emboldens me to ask you a favour.

I am giving a lecture on 26 April on seventeenth-century knowledge of the plague of Athens in 431 BC, and I intend to discuss, among other things, Michael Sweerts' <u>Plague of Athens</u> which was auctioned at Christie's when you were over here, and which is now, I am told, in a New York collection. I would very much like to show a slide of one of the self-portraits of Sweerts, and because your Sweerts picture is not only striking in itself but also has an obvious harmony with my general subject, I ask whether I might trouble you for a 35 mm colour slide of it, or for a colour print from which a slide could be made. Naturally I would be pleased to refund any expenses.

There is an exhibition on alchemy in Brussels at present, organised by the bank Crédit Communal de Belgique. Our Heerschop is there, a nice Thomas Wijck from Leiden, some pictures from the Musée Royal des Beaux-Arts in Brussels, and illustrated manuscripts from many countries. It ends on 10 March.

As soon as I have my alchemical picture by Heerschop cleaned, I will send youaa photograph.


As promised, please find enclosed color reproductions of two other alchemical paintings. The color reproduction of the Wyck is very good, the one of the Bega is terrible.

As promised at our meeting at Sotheby's today, I send you enclosed a photograph of our painting by Hendrick Heerschop. I assume that the alchemist on the right is weighing the gold he has manufactured with his assistant on the left.

As you may know already, the Rijksbureau voor Kunsthistorische Dokumentatie in the Hague has records of numerous pictures of similar subjects by this painter. One shows an <u>Explosion in an alchemist's</u> <u>workshop</u>, on canvas 58.5 x 48 cms. London Art Market 1928, (RKD neg. L 42459). Of course Heerschop also painted other things too, like the two big history-pictures on canvas in the Study Collections of the Rijksmuseum.

Knowing your interest in Rembrandt - iconography I enclose a leaflet about my book on "The anatomy lesson of Dr Tulp", together with a copy of Professor Bruyn's review, which summarises the arguments accurately. Professor Tümpel has agreed to review it for Simiolus.
