I don't have to tell you that our hopes and prayers are with your wife.



At age 20 he made his debut as a composer by performing his own work, Concerto for French Horn and Orchestra, with the Cincinnati Symphony. A live performance by Duke Ellington so fascinated the young composer that he began making symphonic arrangements of Ellington's music for the Cincinnati "pops" concerts, and this led to further experiments combining jazz elements with contemporary classical forms. Schuller later coined the phrase "third stream" to identify this style of blending

Art Scholars Explore Rembrandt Mystery

Eminent art historians from Europe and the United States will gather on the Trinity campus this month to pull a few more threads from the unraveling mystery of Rembrandt Harmensz van Rijn.

The study of the celebrated artist leads to a fascinating puzzle: Rembrandt is universally acknowledged as the master of 17th century Dutch painting, yet when scholars try to distinguish his works from those of others in his circle, extensive disagreement arises. Since 1923 the number of paintings in existence attributed to Rembrandt's own hand has ranged between 706 and 420, and the number is decreasing further with the current publication in Holland of *A Corpus of Rembrandt Paintings*, the most comprehensive study of his work ever undertaken.

On Feb. 6 the Stieren Arts Enrichment Series at Trinity will host an all-day symposium aimed at determining which "Rembrandts" are truly authentic.
According to Charles Talbot, Trinity's Alice Pratt Brown Distinguished Professor of Art History, the symposium will examine the question of why the difficulty persists in establishing the authenticity of Rembrandt's work and how this affects our understanding of the artist's achievement.

Seven leading Rembrandt authorities will be featured during the event, including two of the principal authors of *A Corpus of Rembrandt Paintings*, Josua Bruyn and Ernst van de Wetering. The Dutch scholars have thus far published two of the five or six volumes comprising the work, and the published results have in many cases been highly controversial.

Based on the team's findings, it is estimated that the number of authenticated Rembrandt paintings may fall to about 350, and the disattributed paintings include some of the best known and most popular ones hitherto exhibited over Rembrandt's name.

The symposium will be held in the Chapman Graduate Center Auditorium beginning at 9:30 a.m. The morning session will conclude at 12:30 p.m. and the afternoon session will be conducted from 2 to 5 p.m. For a complete schedule, see story at right. The symposium is free and open to the public.

The works of art under discussion during both sessions will be illustrated with slides, and audience members will be invited to ask questions and offer comments during the afternoon session.

In conjunction with the symposium, the Marion Koogler McNay Art Museum will exhibit a small group of paintings especially for this occasion. The focus of the exhibition will be the painting of a half-length figure of a man in oriental dress, known as The Turk, from the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C. This is the only painting in the second volume of the Corpus about which the authors could not decide conclusively whether it is by Rembrandt or not. The painting has recently been cleaned at the National Gallery and will provide a case study for the subject of the symposium. The exhibition will run from Jan. 17 through Feb. 14.

Also in conjunction with the symposium, the San Antonio Museum of Art will exhibit nine paintings from the Sarah Campbell Blaffer Foundation that are by pupils or followers of Rembrandt. This exhibit will be displayed Feb. 4 through 28.

Symposium Schedule

Both sessions will be held in Chapman Auditorium on Saturday, Feb. 6.

The morning session, presented from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. will feature three speakers: two of the leading authors of *A Corpus of Rembrandt Paintings* and the curator of European paintings at the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, whose collection of Rembrandts has been reduced by the *Corpus*. Topics will include the following:

■ Aims and Methods of the Project — Presented by Josua Bruyn, Professor, University of Amsterdam, Member of the Rembrandt Research Project;

■ Authenticating Rembrandt: Reflections on Method — Presented by Ernst van de Wetering, Professor, University of Amsterdam, Member of the Rembrandt Research Project;

Rembrandt and Connoisseurship—Presented by Peter C. Sutton, Curator of European Paintings, Museum of Fine Arts, Boston.

During the afternoon session, 2 to 5 p.m., the above speakers will be joined by the following Rembrandt authorities for an open discussion:

■ Egbert Haverkamp-Begemann, Professor, Institute of Fine Arts, New York University, who will serve as moderator;

■ Arthur K. Wheelock, Jr., Curator of Northern Baroque Paintings, National Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C.;

■ *John Walsh*, Director, J. Paul Getty Museum.

Distinguished Scientists Lecture Series: "The Search for Randomness," 8 p.m., Feb. 1, Chapman Auditorium, free. Persi Diaconis, professor of statistics at Harvard University, will discuss the nature of randomness in everyday occurrences such as flipping a coin, shuffling a deck of cards and throwing darts at a wall. In spite of his notoriety as an outstanding statistician, Diaconis' first career (and one he feels he is better at even today) is magic. After graduating from high school at the age of 14, he left home to travel around the United States as a professional magician. His entry into academia was a result of his interest in magic, card tricks and probability. He bought a book on probability which looked as if it were filled with real-world problems and interesting insights but found he couldn't understand it. Diaconis claims one of the major reasons he went to college was to gain the tools necessary to understand the book. In addition to his work at Harvard, Diaconis also serves as statistical consultant to Bell Telephone Laboratories and to the Stanford Linear Accelerator.
