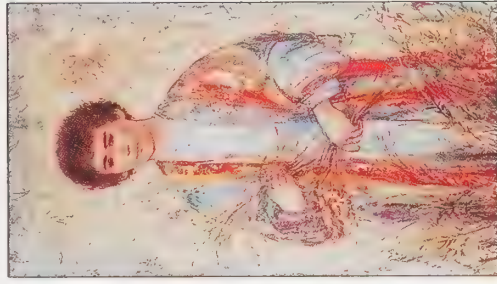

Sacrifice of Isaac

Rembrandt's specialty in the human encounter shows in Isaac's expression. The angel, sent to Abraham, interceded and offered the ram caught in the thicket as the appropriate sacrifice. (As depicted by Rembrandt in the lower left side above the corner of the painting.)

This illustrates a historic moment in the discovery of monotheism in contrast to idolatry, and discovery of faith in God, human devotion as a religious expression and the abandonment of human sacrifice.

Biblical teachings and interpretations, along with Rembrandt's paintings, served as a beautiful introduction to Dr. Girsh's medical education and seeded the inspiration for this book.

Dr. Girsh fostered a unique interest in Biblical art and Rembrandt and his contemporaries. Girsh writes, "The Attic of Civilization represents, to me, the location where these Biblical interpretive paintings were stored when, as a boy, I first undertook the study of Biblical interpretation. Since these paintings were not available to me for integrated correlation and were in this loft-like position during my boyhood, I like to look upon them as having been stored in The Attic of Civilization."

From *The Attic Of Civilization* is a new and fascinating study of Biblical art and interpretation, which began as a project to accompany his exhibit, on tour throughout the country, of work by Rembrandt and his contemporaries. Directors and curators of museums, as well as art historians, have been awaiting this important work, which has been described as "a unique contribution to Biblical art." This book contains enlightening artistic interpretations by Rembrandt, with original classic language connotations and interpretations along with its artistic calligraphy. Important copies of the original scroll inserts, with analyses by noted scholars, provide absorbing reading material.

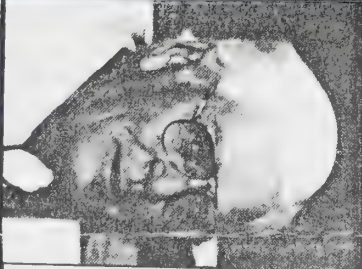

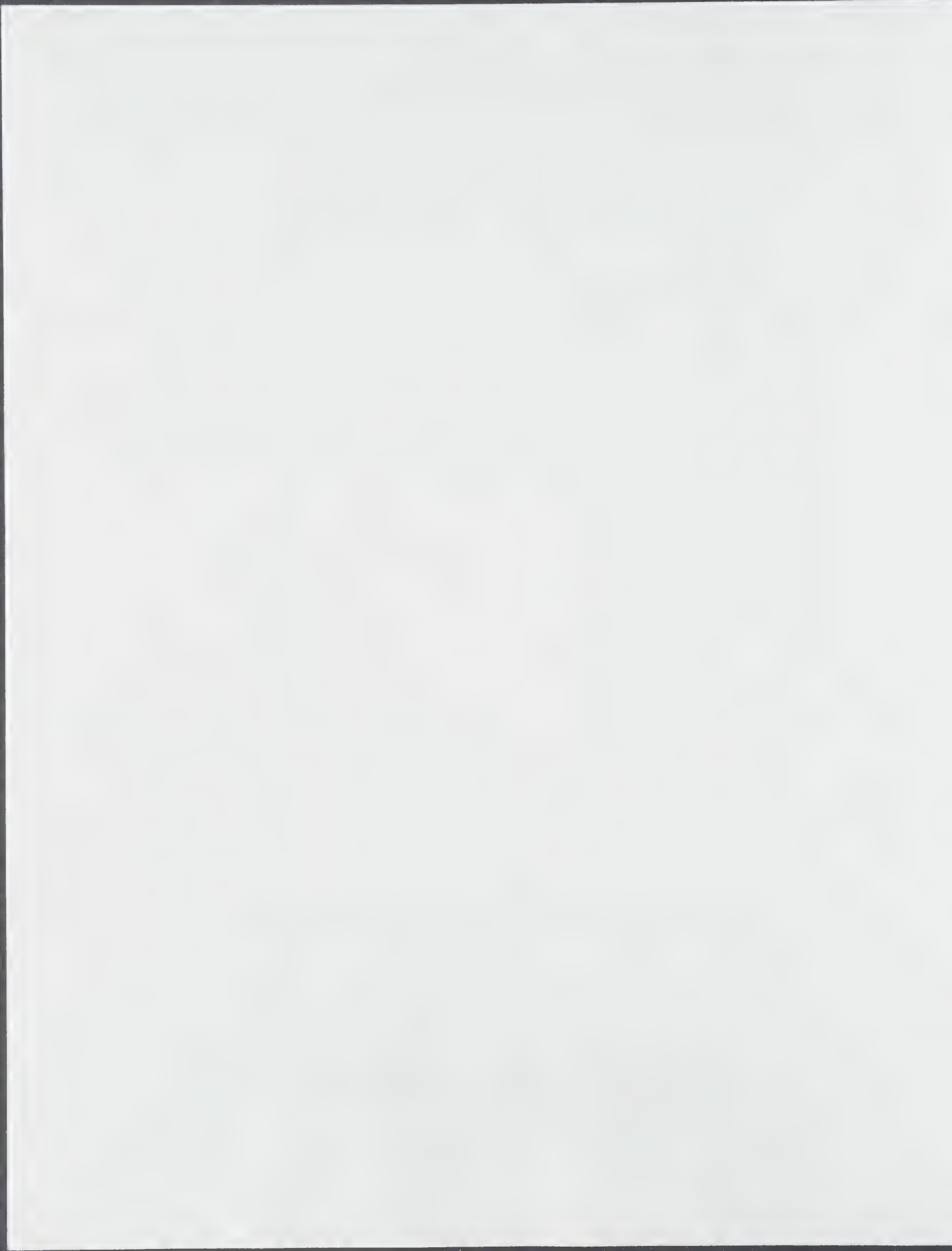

Author-scholar presents lecture, slides at opening

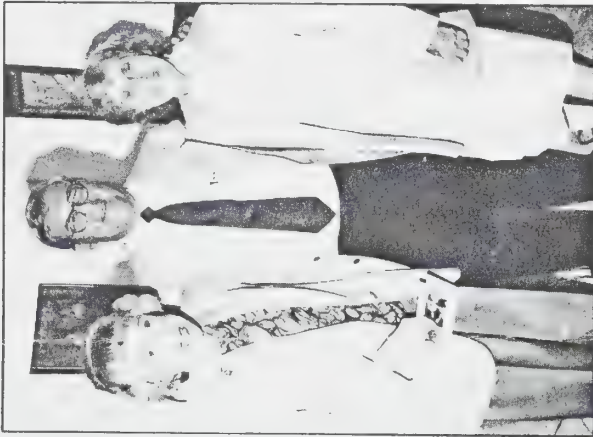

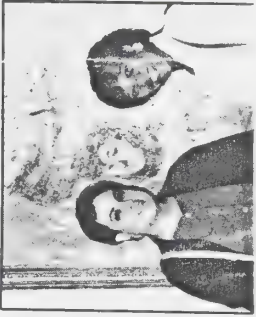

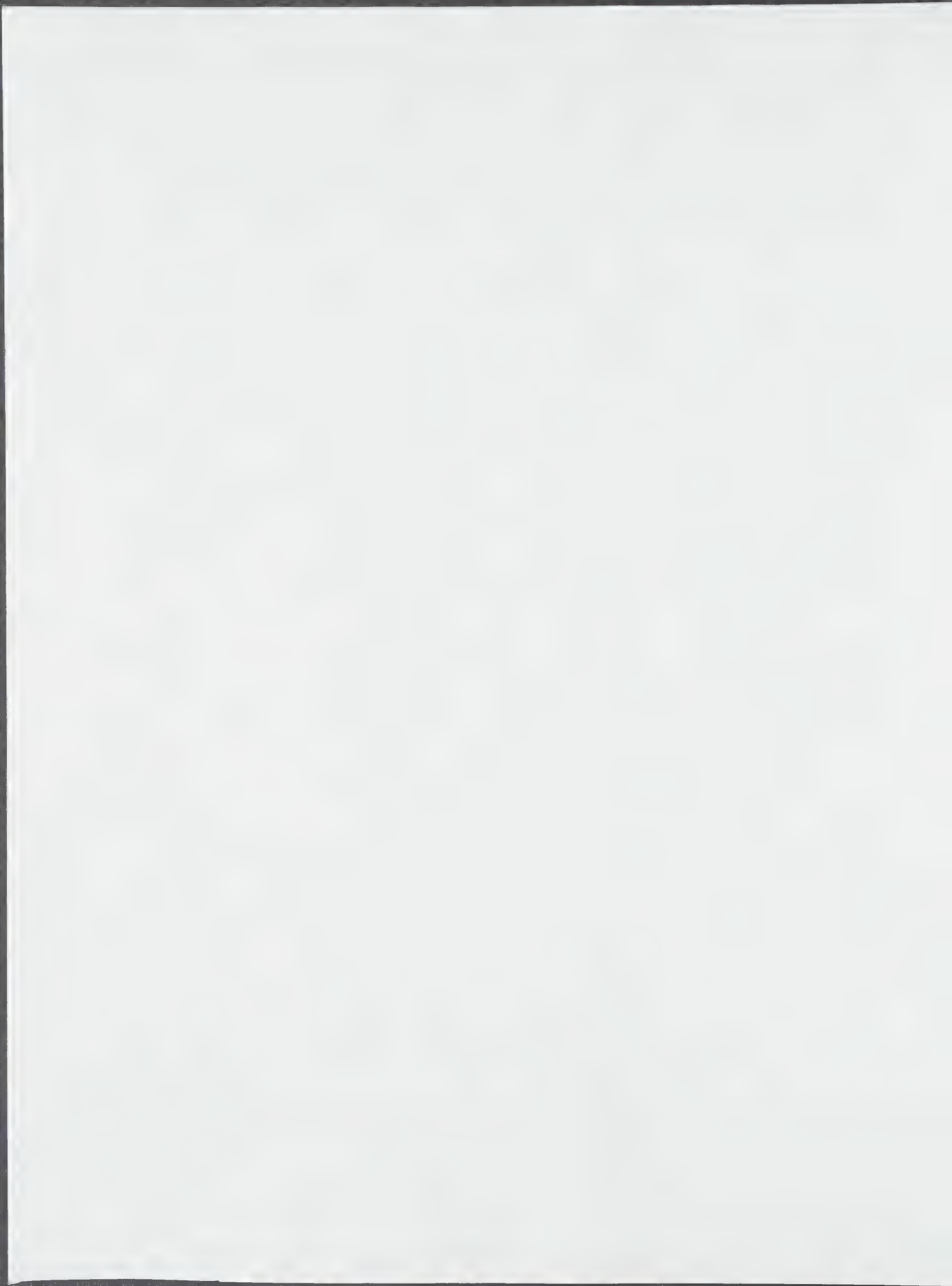

Isabel and I much look forward to being in Gainesville, speaking twice in the chemistry department of the university on Thursday and Friday, February 3rd and 4th.

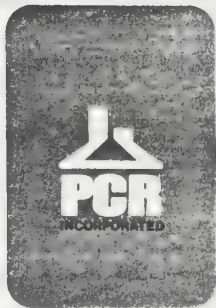
Of course I very much look forward to being there, and hope to have a chance to chat with you.

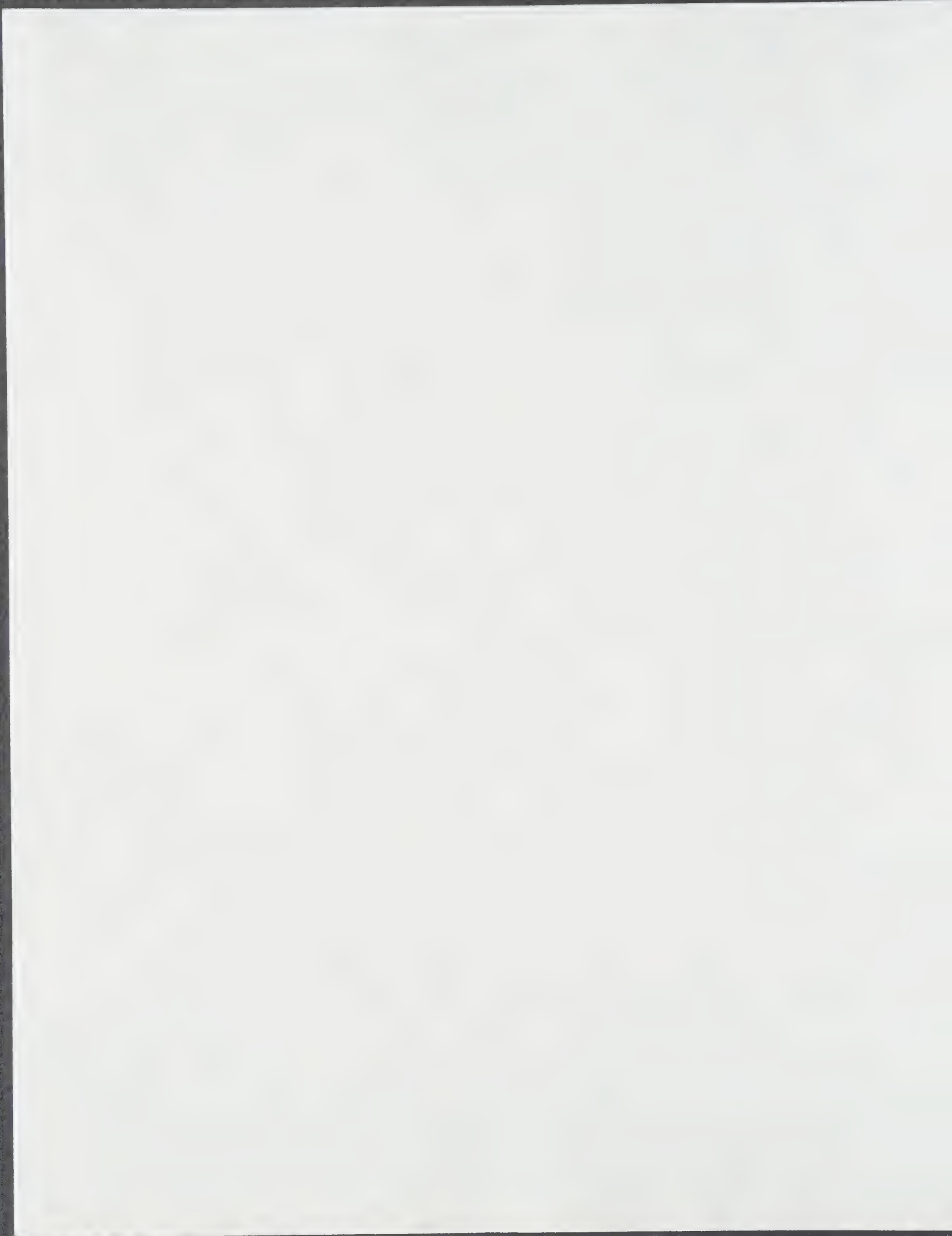

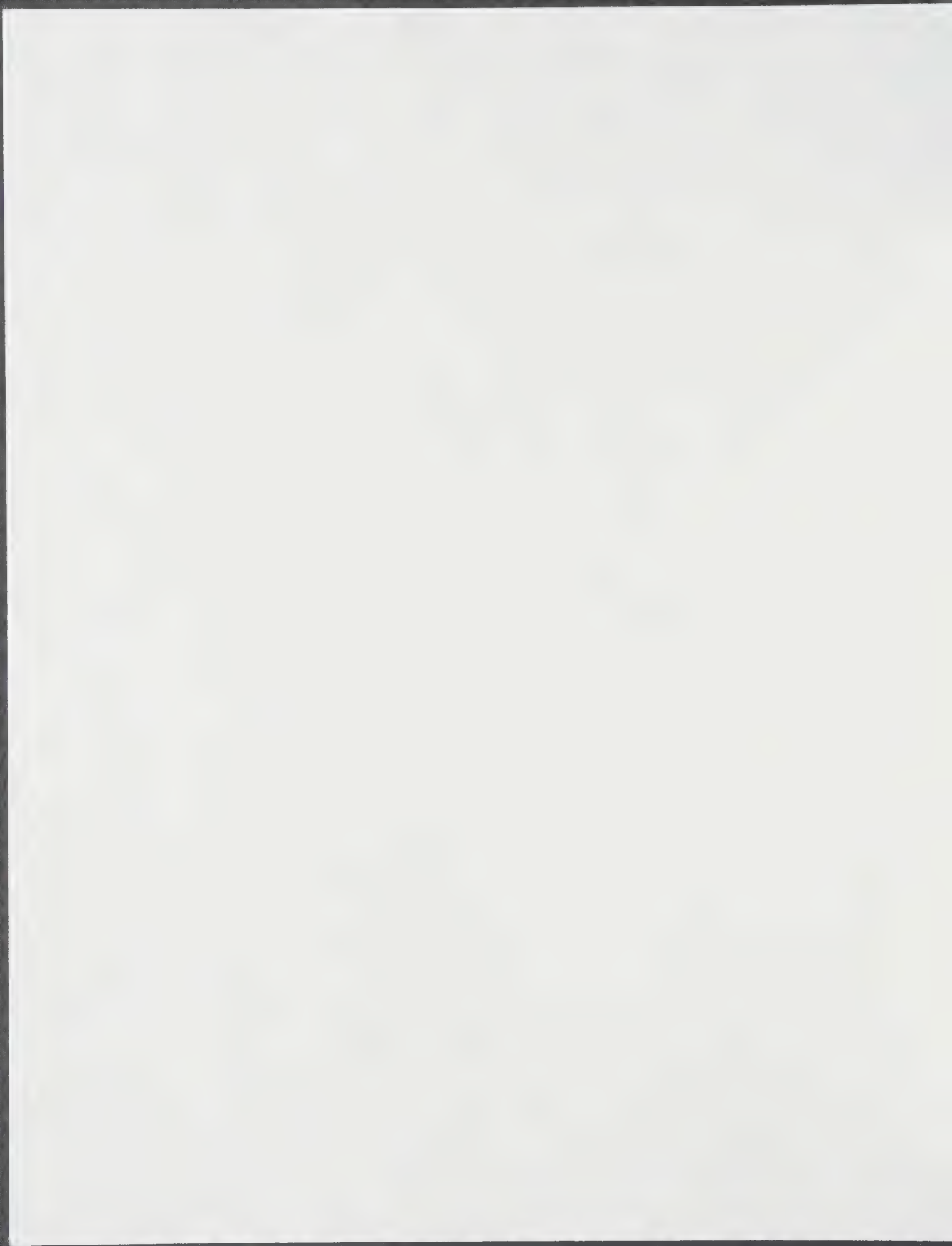

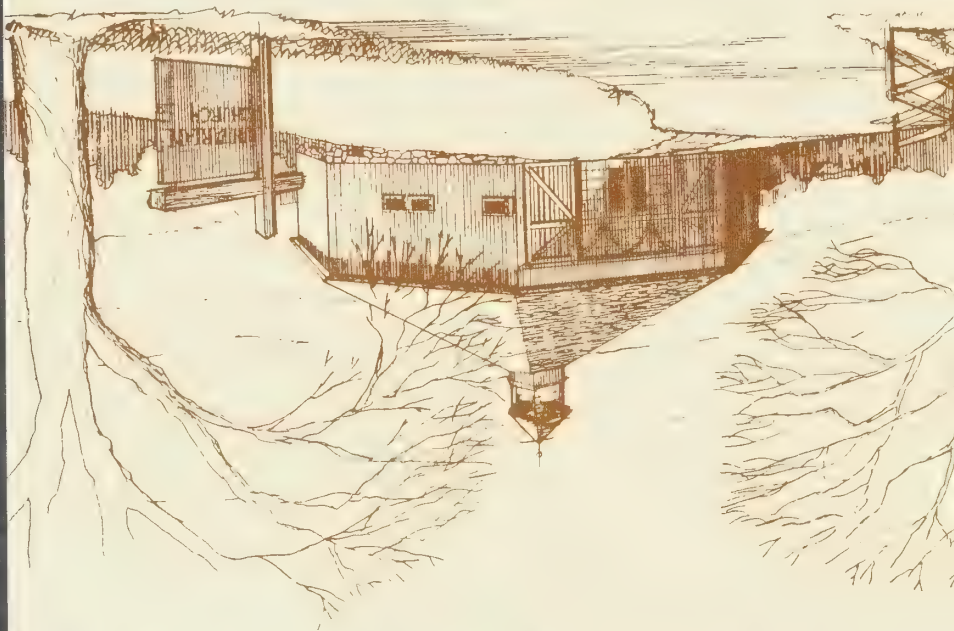

She is presently attending Cardinal Stritch College to finish her Bachelor of Science Degree and will graduate in May, 1987. Her plans are then to pursue a Masters degree in Occupational Health.

Sue brings with her six years of experience acquired when working for St. Luke's Hospital in the Cardiac Medical Unit as a Staff Nurse. While at St. Luke's, Sue became familiar with procedures such as electrophysiology studies, angioplasties, and cardiac catheterizations.

Sue was also involved in developing teaching brochures, booklets, and slide presentations for patient and family education, and in addition, was influential in starting a patient learning center at the hospital, equipped with many different modes of teaching.

After special training in hyperbaric oxygenation, Sue accompanied patients in the hyperbaric chamber. Hyperbaric oxygenation is the administration of high concentration of oxygen, usually 100% in an environment of increased atmospheric pressure. Under these conditions the amount of oxygen dissolved in the blood can be increased tremendously. The routine runs in the chamber usually were patients with wounds that wouldn't heal. The emergency patients were usually smoke inhalations and scuba divers with the bends.

In her spare time, Sue enjoys music of all types and has studied jazz voice at the Conservatory of Music for 5 years. Other outside interests include water sports, cross-country skiing, and traveling.

Sue is excited about facing the challenges that Aldrich offers. Her personal approach to wellness and preventative care, along with her years of nursing experience will benefit the Company greatly. SAFETY & HEALTH CORNER

Aldrich's Safety and Health Departments take a triad approach to your safety — Health, Industrial Hygiene and Safety — each separately responsible for specific concerns, yet working together to cover all aspects affecting your personal safety and health.

The Safety Professional is concerned with fire protection, equipment safety and chemical storage. The Occupational Health Nurse is involved with the medical aspect of employee health, particularly as it relates to acute situations which may require immediate medical attention. The Industrial Hygienist is concerned with employee health, specifically with preventing health problems which may occur from long-term exposure to unsafe levels of certain chemicals.

Aldrich has a team of well-trained safety and health professionals. We give our full attention to protecting employee health and preventing accidents. My job as the Industrial Hygienist is to evaluate and control health hazards in the workplace.

One way I do this is by monitoring the air an employee breathes while working in chemical handling areas. I conduct air monitoring to assess the effectiveness of chemical fume hoods and local exhaust ventilation trunks used to control chemical vapors.

The monthly safety and health inspections conducted by the Safety and Health team is another method of health hazard control. Inspections are made in all areas of the company, over all shifts, to assure that established safety practices are being followed and unsafe conditions are identified and corrected.

Hazard identification and control are important, but equally important is safety and health training. Training brings new ideas into the workplace and refreshes and re-establishes existing practices. You may have recently attended a C.P.R., first-aid, respiratory protection or other training class. These classes keep you up-to-date in safe work practices for your job.

As you see us making our inspections, or any other time, ask us questions about your safety and health concerns. We're working for you!

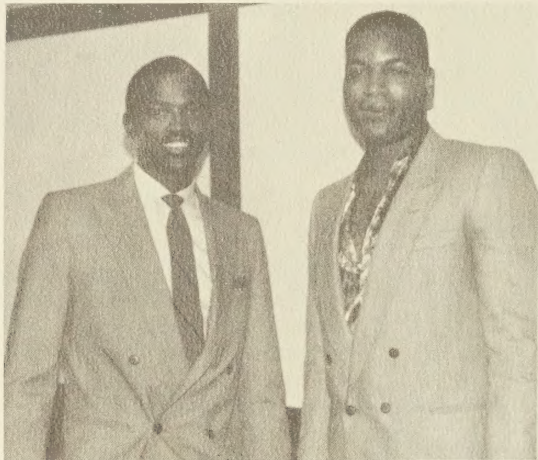
