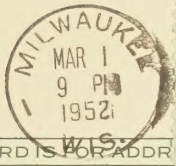

Dr. Bader Heads Hillel Academy

Joseph Lubner, outgoing president of Hillel Academy, announced that Dr. Alfred Bader was elected president of the Academy at a board of director's meeting held on Sept. 18.

Dr. Bader, a well known industrialist, is active in many civic organizations. He serves on the board of directors of the Milwaukee Jewish Welfare Fund and the Milwaukee Board of Jewish Education. In the field of art he figures prominently as a collector, patron and connoisseur.

Other officers elected to serve with him are: Dr. Jerome Cornfield, Howard Karsh, Dr. William Petashnick and Philip Rubenstein, vice - presidents; Allen Saltzman, treasurer; and Mrs. Sylvia Guten, secretary.

Hillel Academy holds a unique place in the Jewish educational system of this city, since it is the only Jewish all day school offering a complete curriculum of Jewish and general studies. Close to 200 students attend, with classes running from kindergarten through eighth grade.

Located in the Board of Jewish Education Building, 4515 W. Good Hope rd., this building of the Academy was recently acquired and houses the Board of Jewish Education offices, its library and the Milwaukee Hebrew High School.

Communal Services

Jewish communal services in the United States are "big business." Their aggregate value, or cost, is estimated by the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds to have totalled close to \$1 billion.

Also included in this sum are the aid and services given by American Jewry to Israel. In 1967, this aid reached a record high of \$323 million, due to the spontaneous and generous giving for Israel during the Six Day War. As a result of this outpouring of aid, Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds raised over \$179 million for the Israel Emergency Fund of the United Jewish Appeal, in addition to the proceeds of the 1967 regular campaign which exceeded \$144 million.

It must be taken into consideration that excluded from the \$1 billion estimate is almost all endowment income of the Federations, as well as all building fund campaigns conducted for Jewish hospitals, homes for the aged, Jewish centers and other structures. The New York Federation of Jewish Philanthropies alone received many millions of dollars during the year for its building fund.

Courses Offered

RECENT TRENDS IN JEWISH EDUCATION

A lecture-discussion course designed to analyze general objectives of Religious Education to evaluate current practices and specific techniques of teaching from Kindergarten through High School.

(For teachers in the Religious School and those persons who are interested in joining the faculty at a later time.)

JEWISH HOLIDAYS & CUSTOMS

This course is designed for persons who wish to familiarize themselves with the observance of Jewish holidays and customs in the synagogue and at home. The course content will include the historical development and ceremonial significance of each of the Jewish holidays.

BIBLE

A survey course of the Old Testament explaining the structure of the Bible. The Bible will be analyzed in terms of its three major sections and 39 separate books. Some of the less familiar books, such as Job, Ecclesiastes, Proverbs, will be covered in detail.

HISTORY

The course will deal with the major episodes in Jewish history from the beginning until the present time. A chronological survey will be offered, major events being stressed. The course will include a description of people and places of significance.

HEBREW I

A course designed for those persons who have no previous knowledge of Hebrew. Ability to read easily will be the goal.

JEWISH MUSIC APPRECIATION

The range from ancient liturgical music to modern Israeli music will be included in this course. The history of Jewish music will also be covered. Use will be made of recordings.

HEBREW II

A course designed for those persons who have a basic knowledge of reading Hebrew. Emphasis will be placed on the study of Hebrew prayers in the Union Prayerbook.

JEWISH ETHICS

Emphasis will be placed on the spirit and the ideas of Jewish Ethics and their practical application as found in the Bible and the Rabbinical literature. This course will cover the major ethical contributions of Judaism to mankind.

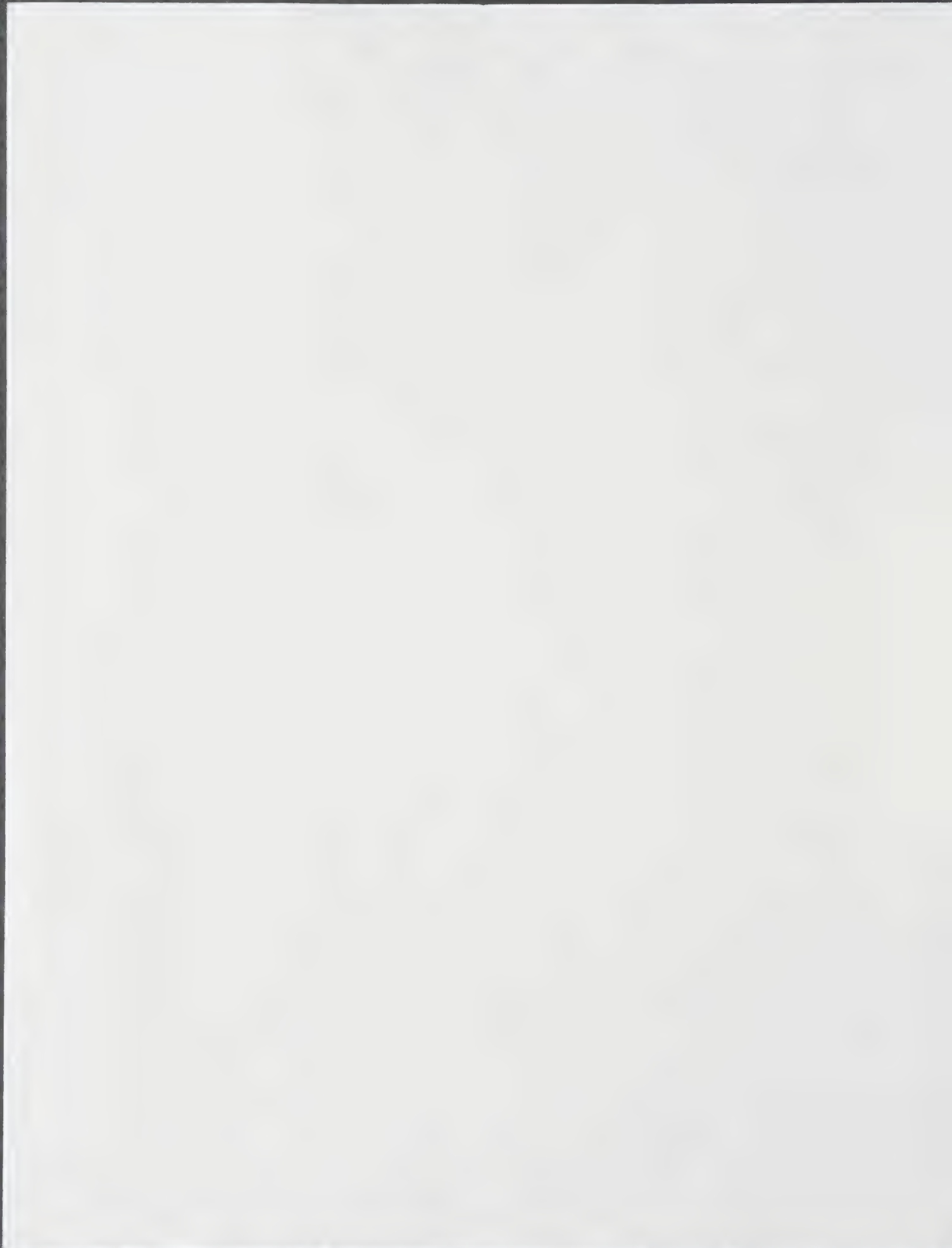

Tidelands Suit On La. Looms

WASHINGTON, March 26 — (AP)—The Supreme Court Monday gave the United States permission to file suit against Louisiana to determine ownership of a large area of oil-rich submerged lands in the Gulf of Mexico.

The U.S. contends Louisiana's boundary extends only three miles from its shore line. The Justice Department says the state claims nine miles "from a very extended line claimed to be the outer limit of inland waters."

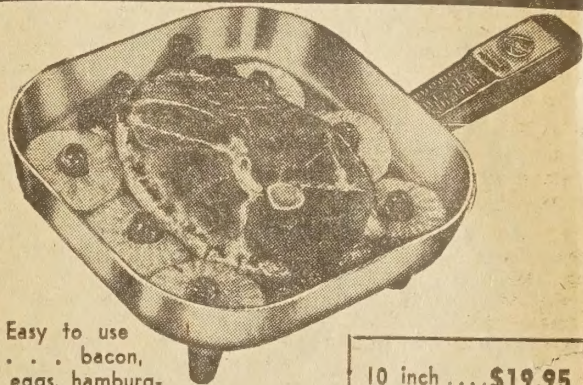

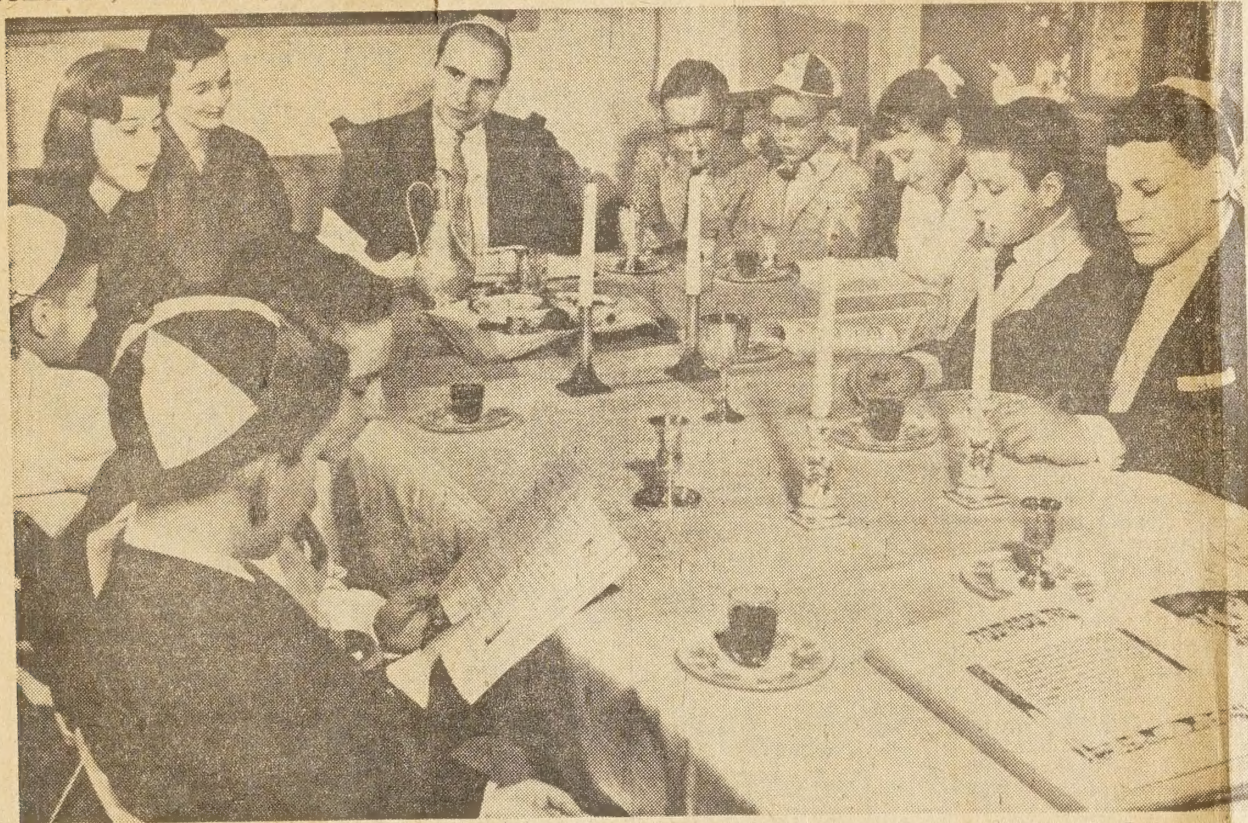

WASHINGTON, March 26 — (AP)—The Supreme Court Monday gave the United States permission to file suit against Louisiana to determine ownership of a large area of oil-rich submerged lands in the Gulf of Mexico.

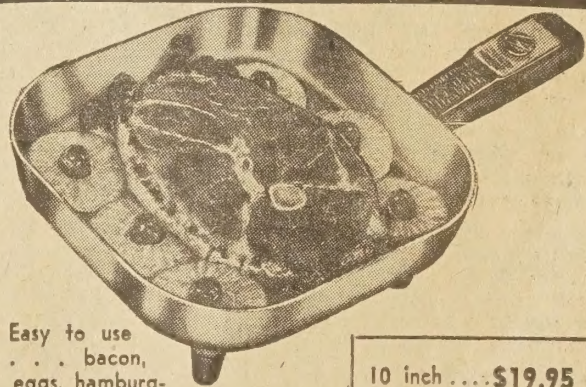
