At end of third year college signed form stating villingness to enlist as technical officer; heard no thine further till January 1945.

Jan. 10 th. $1945 . \ldots$...vas requested to return pink exemption form - E-255676 - (This was because he applied for naturalization.)

Jan. Ioth....Instructed to appear before medical board in kingston, and classified as A-1.

Jan. 11 th....Appeared before Axry examination board and was questioned as to qualifications.

He was informed that the result of these exaninations would be sent to him by personal letter about the middle of warch. telling of his acceptance for officers training in either Artillery or Infantry; it being understood that he be allowed to finish his college year.

If not accepted for officers training has to apply for a osition to any one of a given list of essential industries.

Failing to obtain a position with one of these industries he is then at liberty to seek employment on his own account.

Alfred Bader is now doing secret chemical research work at the University and is anxious to continue in the same rield.
