Final year student in Chemical Engineering, Queen's University.  
Scholarship holder.

At end of third year college signed form stating willingness  
to enlist as technical officer; heard nothing further till  
January 1945.

Jan. 10th. 1945....was requested to return pink exemption  
form - E-255676 - (This was because he applied for nat-  
uralization.)

Jan. 10th....instructed to appear before medical board in  
Kingston, and classified as A-1.

Jan. 11th....Appeared before Army examination board and was  
questioned as to qualifications.

He was informed that the result of these examinations would  
be sent to him by personal letter about the middle of March.  
telling of his acceptance for officers training in either  
Artillery or Infantry; it being understood that he be allowed  
to finish his college year.

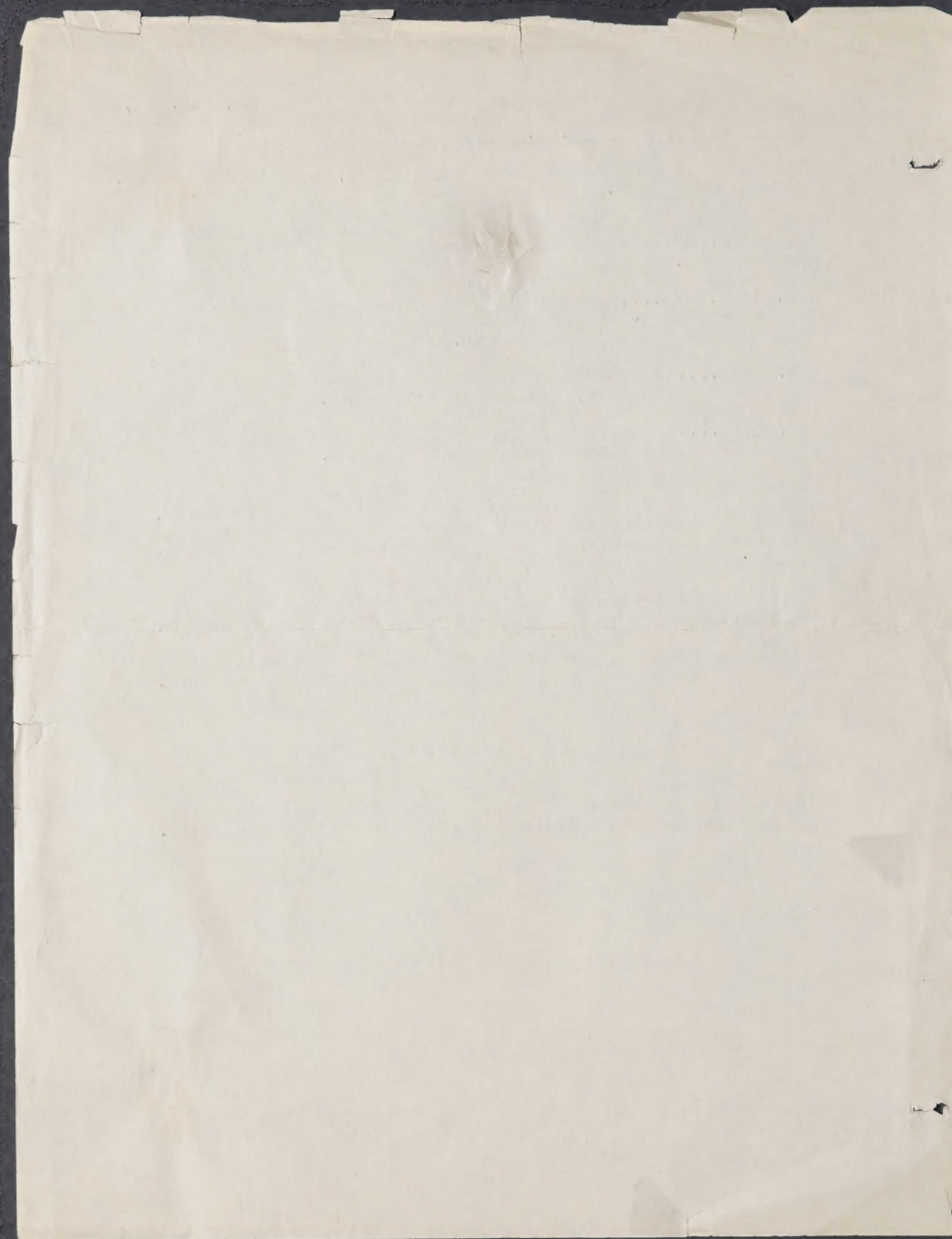
If not accepted for officers training has to apply for a  
position to any one of a given list of essential industries.

Failing to obtain a position with one of these industries  
he is then at liberty to seek employment on his own account.

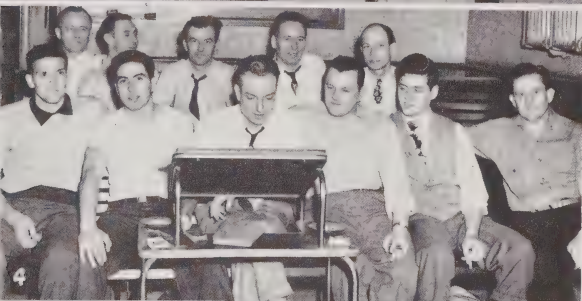
There were 14 new members who

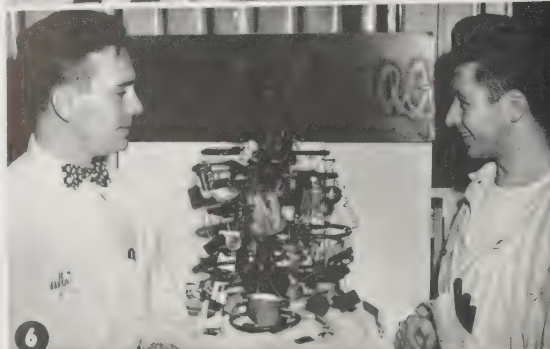
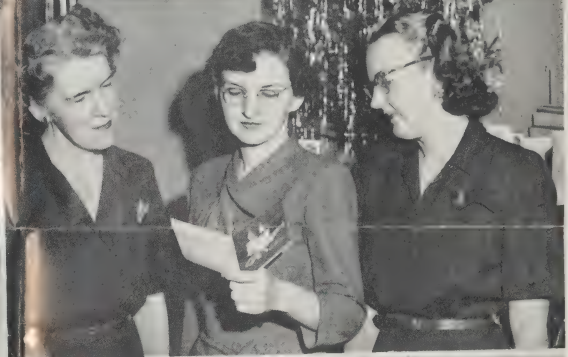

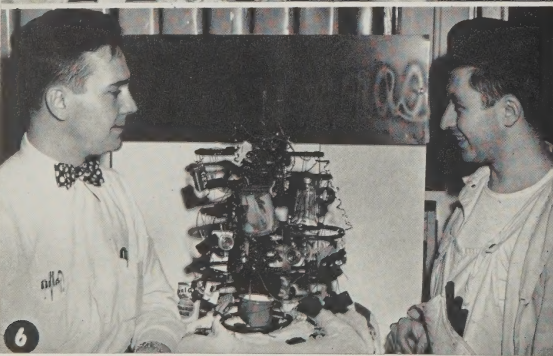
