To answer your question first: We will give an additional \$25,000 to help the Romas in the Czech Republic if you recommend it. If you feel that the same amount of money could do better helping Romas elsewhere, we will follow your recommendation.

Your interview with Ms. Bagaric is very moving.

Will Sue Read attempt to make the movie?

Regarding the orphanage in Dnepopetrovsk, I have come to pretty much the same conclusion. Hence, I plan to give again this year \$30,000 for them via the Joint. Also, I will give an additional \$20,000 to Lubavitch here with the assurance that that will be transmitted in full to the orphanage and be used not for building, but to help more children.

We also plan to send \$30,000 to the Joint to be transmitted to the orphanage in Odessa.

Please do let me know what you think of the school in Vienna. Isabel and I were very impressed, and it may be that children do need outdoor and indoor toys to help them.

Next week, I am set to meet Mag. Bauer of the Zvi Perez Chaes School in Vienna to discuss their use of your donation and will let you know the results.

SKOPJE

Tjen, it is off to Skopje to check on the Health & Education Program proposal for Roma women and children you are underwriting.

Initial results show that 73% of the Roma women of childbearing age suffer from a sexually transmitted disease. How to treat them?

Once treated, how to prevent re-infection in such a complicated and problematic social and economic environment?

I will be looking for answers before committing any funds.

Sitting upright on a broad sofa, 78 year-old Danica Bagaric welcomes her guests to Sarajevo. Her left arm is completely paralysed from a stroke suffered years ago. She lays it simply in her lap.

Danica, as her helper Tanya explains, barely gets around these days. She walks with great difficulty. Yet her eyes shine brightly and she speaks with surprising animation as she tells her story.

She lives alone in Sarajevo. Never married. But tells of living in a close family. One sister moved away long ago with her husband to the Adriatic Coast. Too far, now that they are both old, to visit anymore. Another sister lives in Israel. The nephew, Doron, is working for an international organization in Kosovo. They too are far away. Danica last left Sarajevo seven years ago during the Bosnian War, when the German government decided to airlift her out of Sarajevo which was then besieged.

In this war the German looked after her. But Danica remembers another war and how the Germans took care of her then. The bluish number tattooed on her paralysed arm, 58165, tells the story. Auschwitz – Birkenau - Dr. Mengele.

She pulls out photos of the records of the medical experiments she was subjected to. We know just enough German to get the idea.

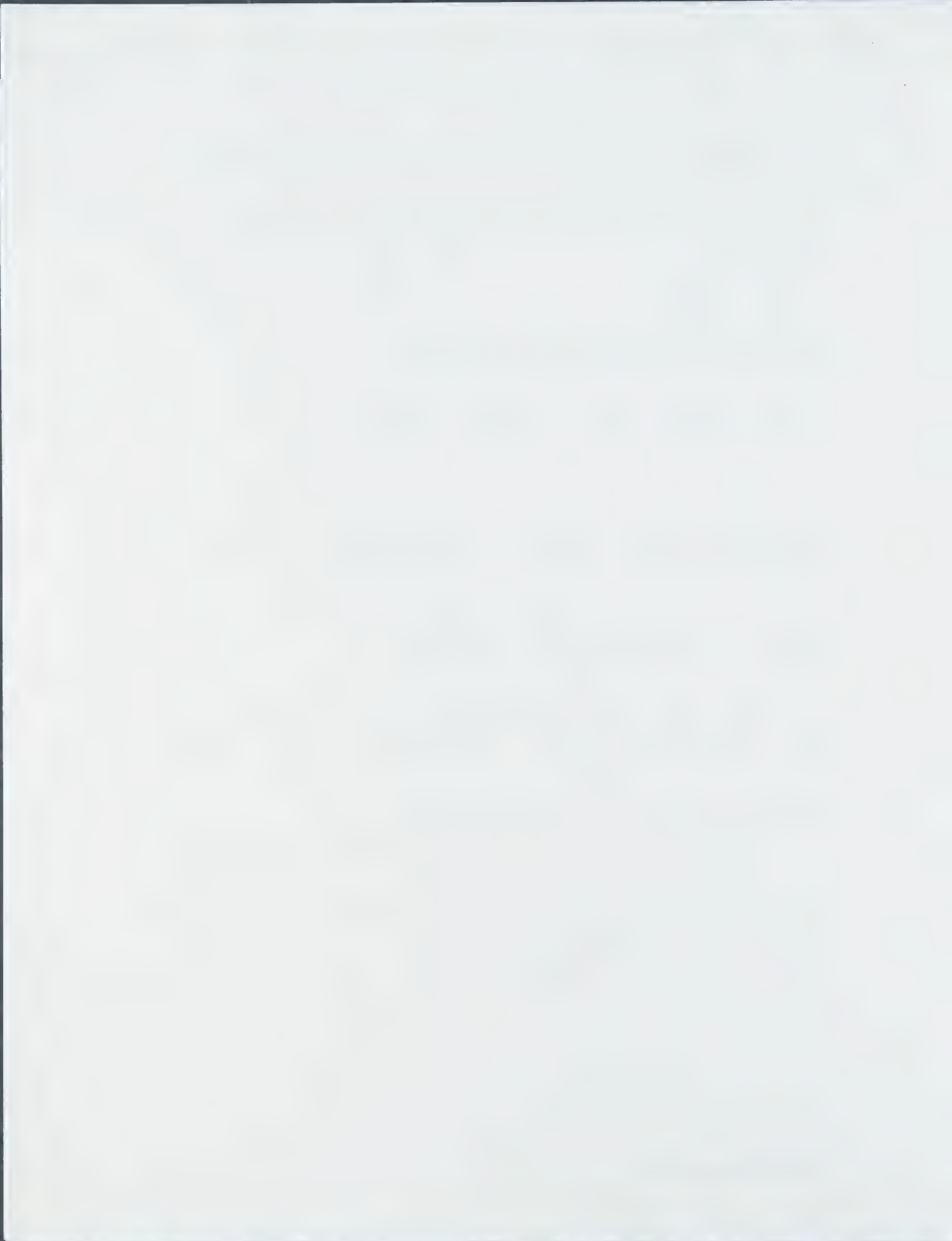

She had been captured at one of the great battles of Tito's Partisans and taken to Auschwitz as a kind of military prisoner. (Hitler didn't recognize Tito's Partisans as a legitimate army). But she wouldn't tell us about the medical experiments.

"Don't cry! - She shouts out suddenly. We screwed him!" she cries in a kind of fierce exaltation. "Mengele, you know, he's now dust and dirt, buried in the earth. And we are here".

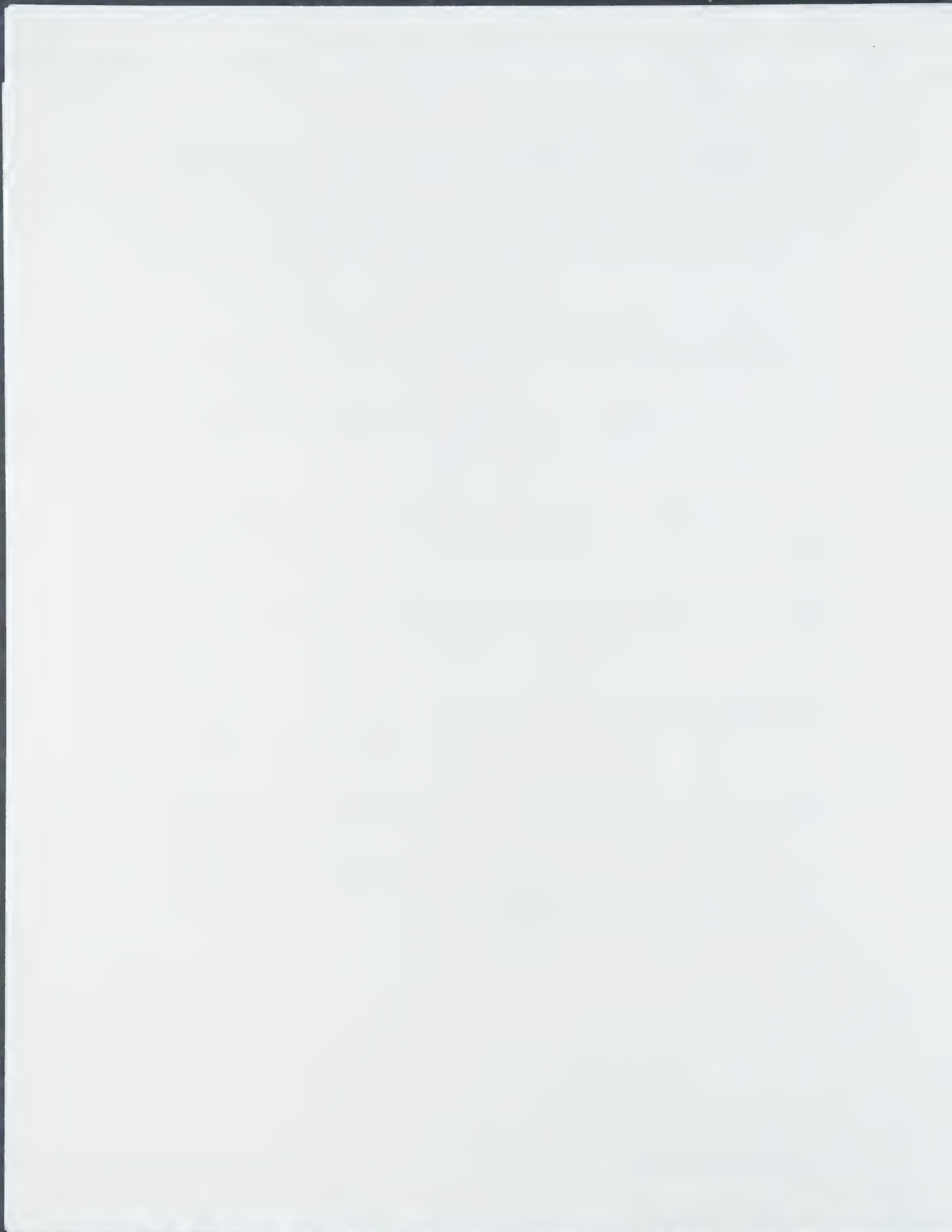
She shows us the book she's written about what happened to her. A picture of the fence at Auschwitz-Birkenau is on the cover. In English the title would read Never Again.



We asked her if at Auschwitz the Germans knew she was Jewish. Whether it was worse for the Jews or for the quasi-military-prisoners?

But as our questions revealed, we had been blindsided by our own preconceptions. Danica is not Jewish. She's a Croatian Roman Catholic; her brother-in-law in Israel is Jewish. She had joined Tito's Partisans as an Anti-Fascist. Mengele, it seems hadn't cared enough to even inquire whether she was Jewish or not.

We had come to see Danica because she is one of severely distressed 540 elderly residents of Sarajevo looked after by La Benevolencija, the local Jewish Cultural, Educational, and Humanitarian Aid Organization. The JOINT - The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee - has always been one of La Benevolencija's major backers, and I had spent a good part of the Bosnian war helping them set up an international network of donors. To be eligible for the medical and home care program you have to be elderly, alone, poor and chronically ill.

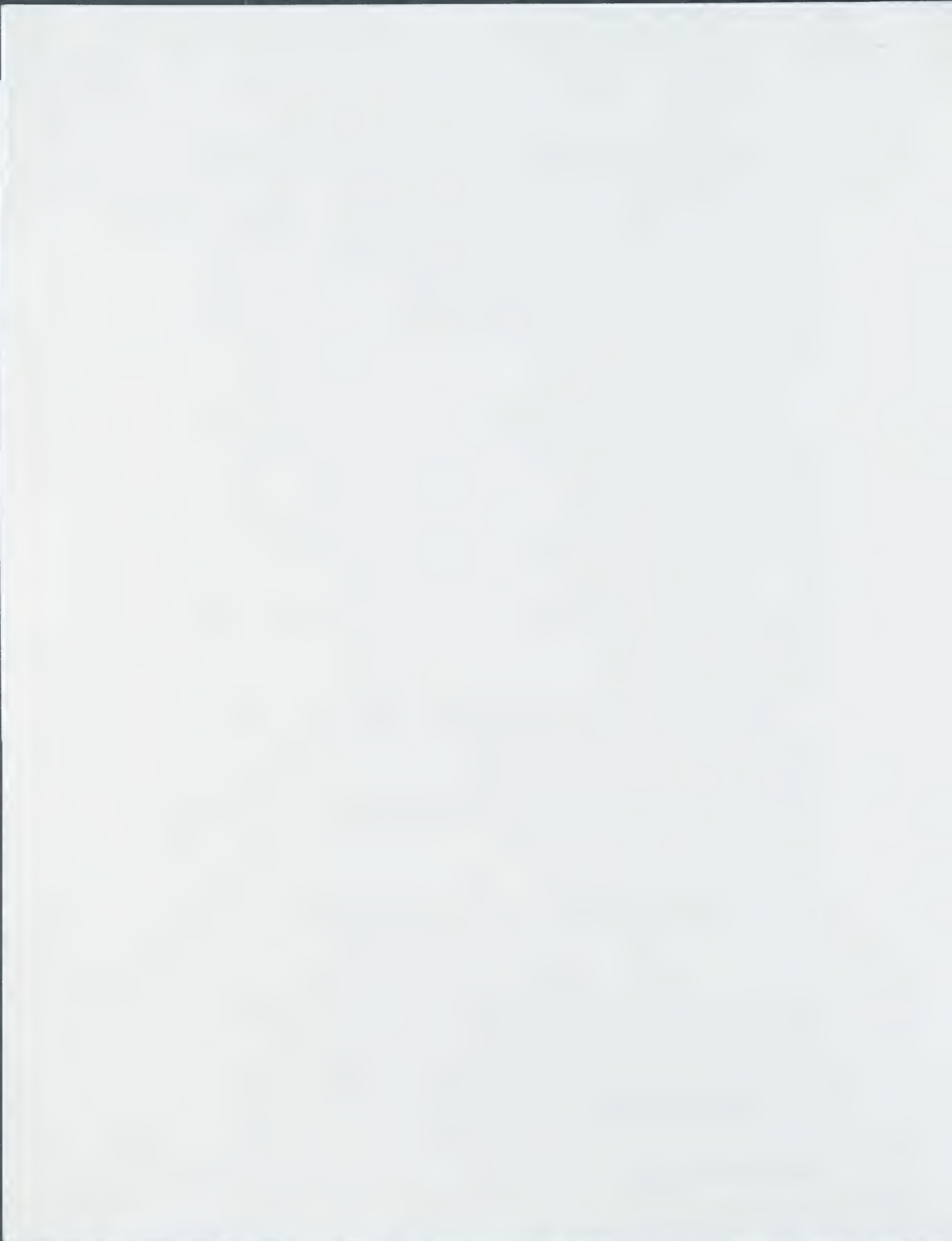


Operating since the middle of the war in Bosnia, the program is the only one of its kind in Sarajevo. More than 180 of the beneficiaries are Jews, all of them Holocaust survivors. The majority are Serbs, Croats, Muslims, Roma (Gypsies) and others (including one Seventh Day Adventist).

A multi-ethnic team of 35 home care workers fan out each day from the rose-colored synagogue on the bank of Sarajevo's Miljacka River to look after these elderly in distress. An outpatient medical office located in the synagogue building sends out doctors and nurses to make home visits to those beneficiaries who live too far away to come there or who can not move at all.

Since the war ended, La Benevolencija's Home Care Program for the Elderly has drawn support from all over: The European Union, Soros, U.K. Jewish Aid, etc. The Germans too have been especially generous through HILF.

We always knew though that the international donor community would move on, that our help would be needed to sustain the program in the long run. This year the Home Care Program is financed by the JCHNT, Dr. Alfred Bader of Milwaukee (USA) and the Friends of La Benevolencija in Germany and Switzerland.

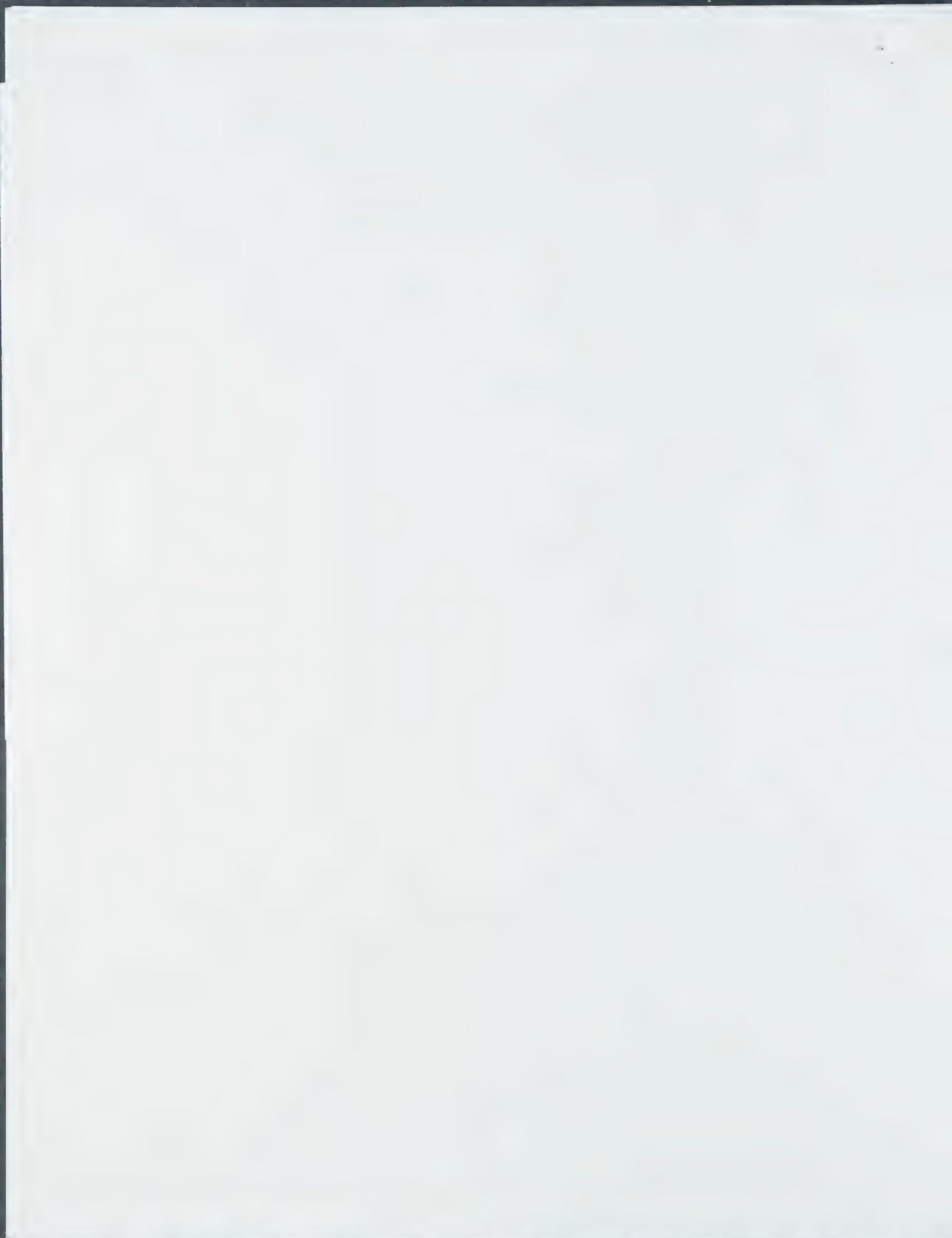




Danica Bagaric is just one of 540 beneficiaries. Like others in the program, she lives on a pension of less than \$ 100 a month.

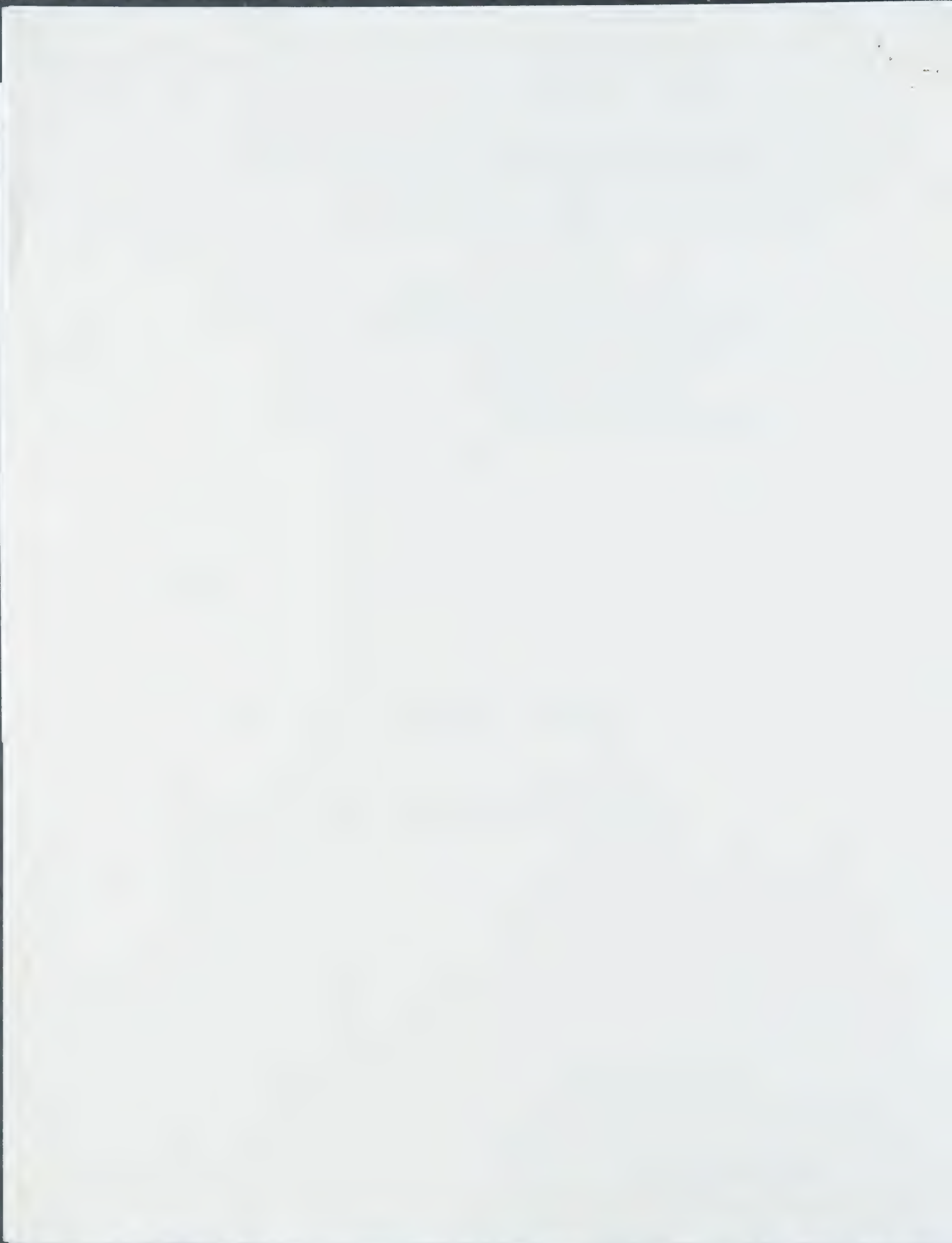

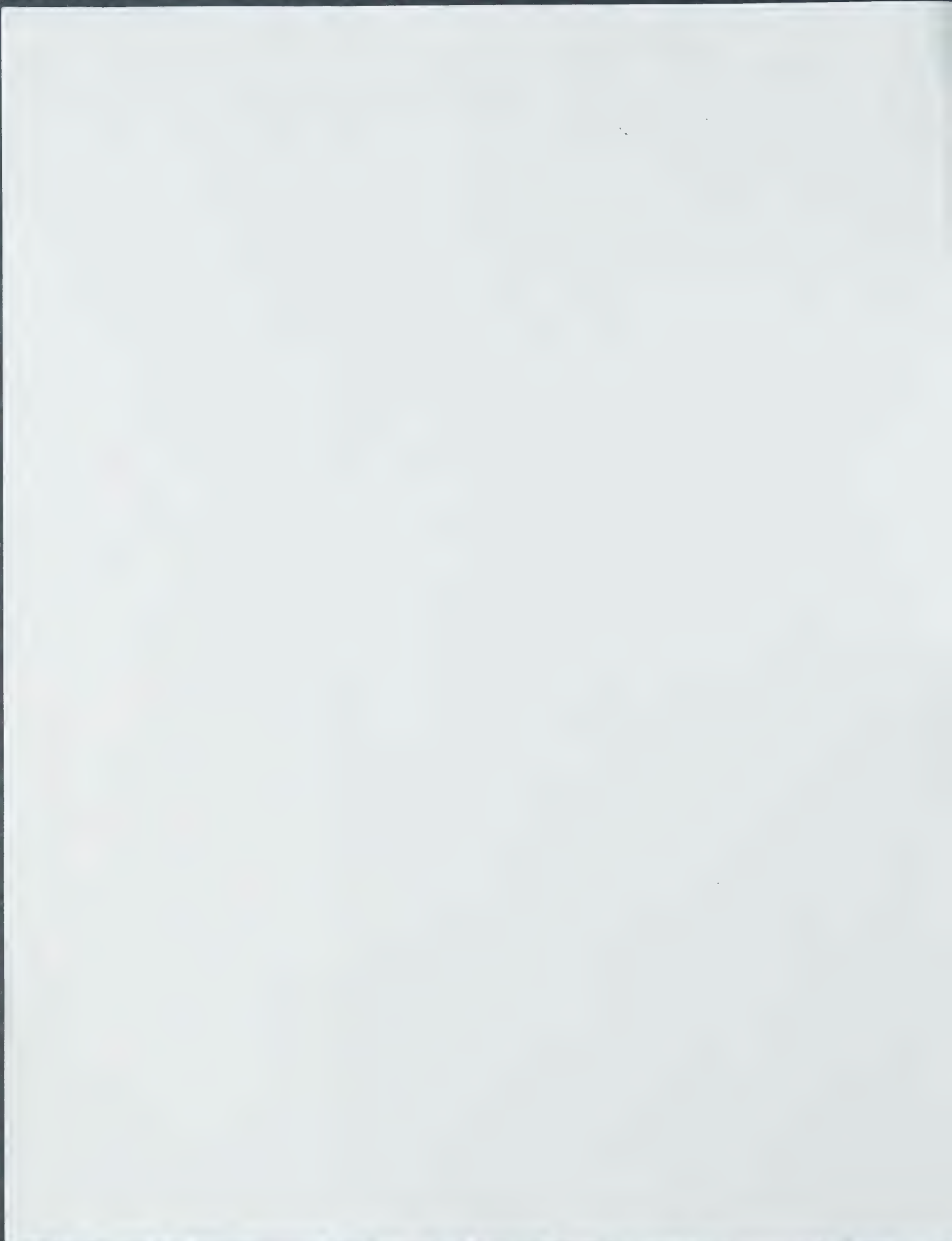

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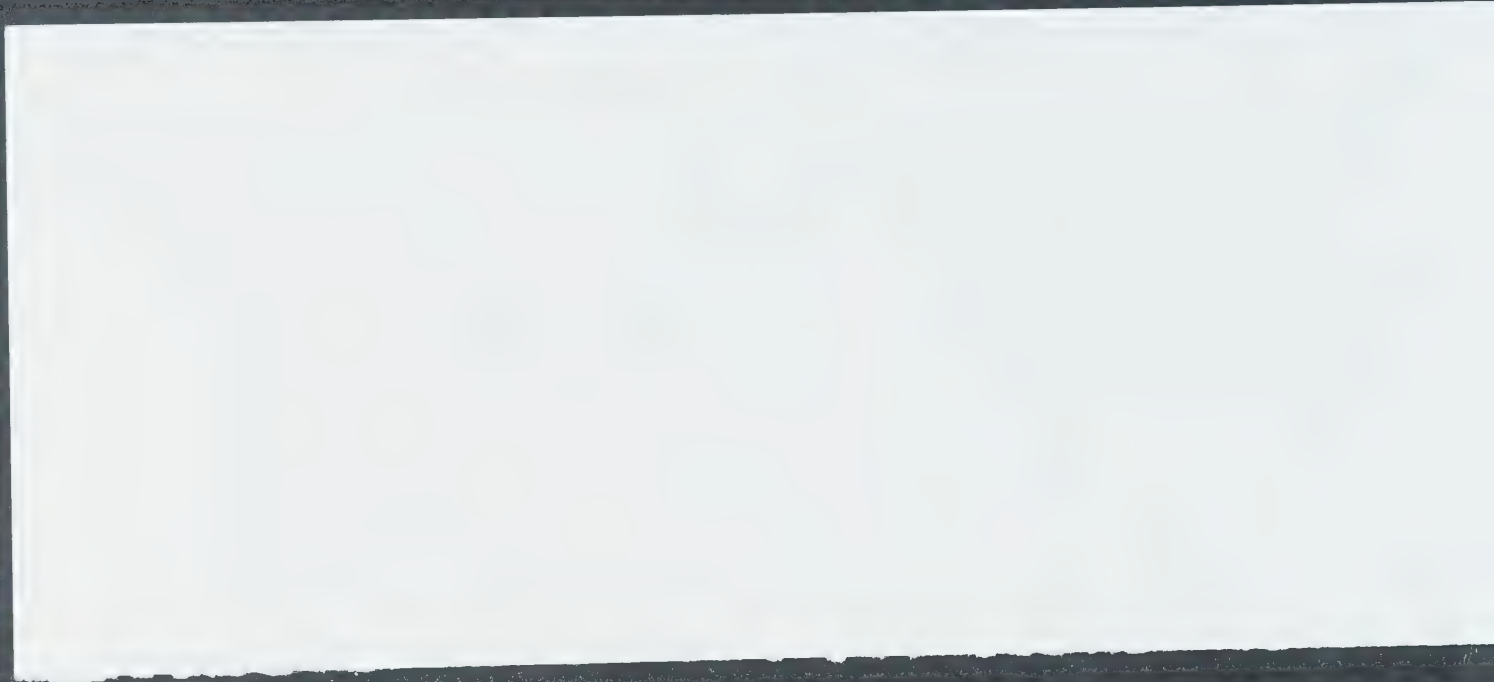

My friends at La Benevolencija in Sarajevo have agreed to take on the 70 persons from the waiting list.

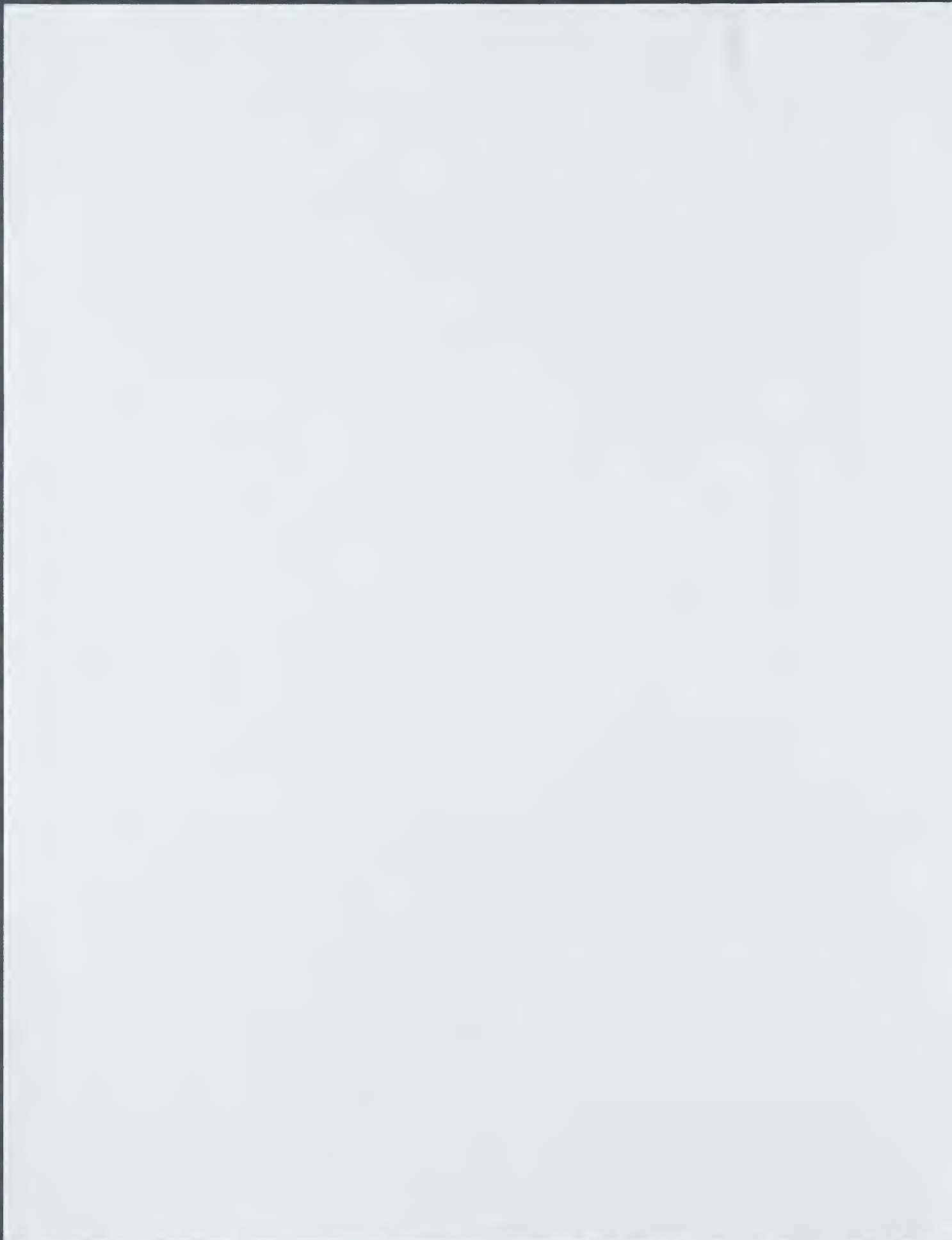

Personally I am so very grateful. Your prompt backing enables the JOINT to move ahead quickly and see that good things get done.

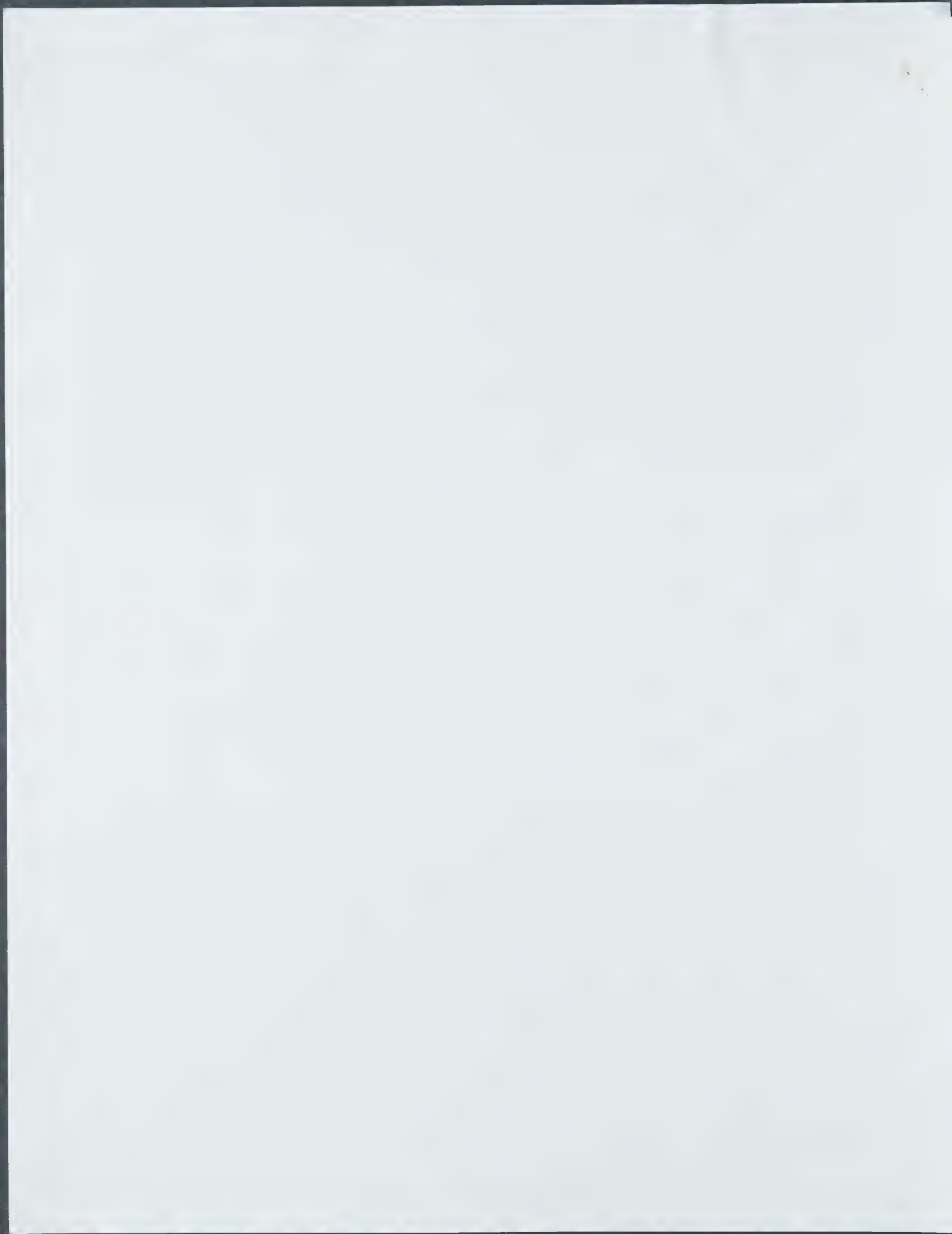

Dear Yechiel,

Thank you for your e-mail.

If the 70 on the waiting list in Sarajevo can be included, I will send my check to the Joint in New York. I am leaving on Thursday afternoon, January 18th, and returning on Friday, January 26th. I don't suppose that you can get agreement by Thursday, so the check will have to wait until my return.

When I was a boy of 15 I received my first reward for good work at school, specifically, the *Book of Genesis*, edited by Dr. J. H. Hertz, inscribed to me by a Rabbi in Brighton, "To Alfred, for excellent work in Hebrew, May 17, 1939". My work in Hebrew hasn't improved much, but I still use Hertz's commentaries and quote his to Verse 28 of Chapter 37 in Genesis:

28. *Midianites*. In the meantime, while the brethren were at the meal, some Midianite merchants, casually passing by and hearing human cries from the pit near the roadside, carry off Joseph and sell him to the caravan going to Egypt. The brothers did not thus actually sell Joseph. He was "stolen away", as he himself says in XL, 15 (Rashbam, Luzzatto).

You know how many Rabbis there are in Israel and how many different opinions they have. I understand that there is a computer program telling you to which Rabbi or Rabbis to go if you want which particular answer. This probably does not yet apply to commentaries in the Bible, but it may in time.

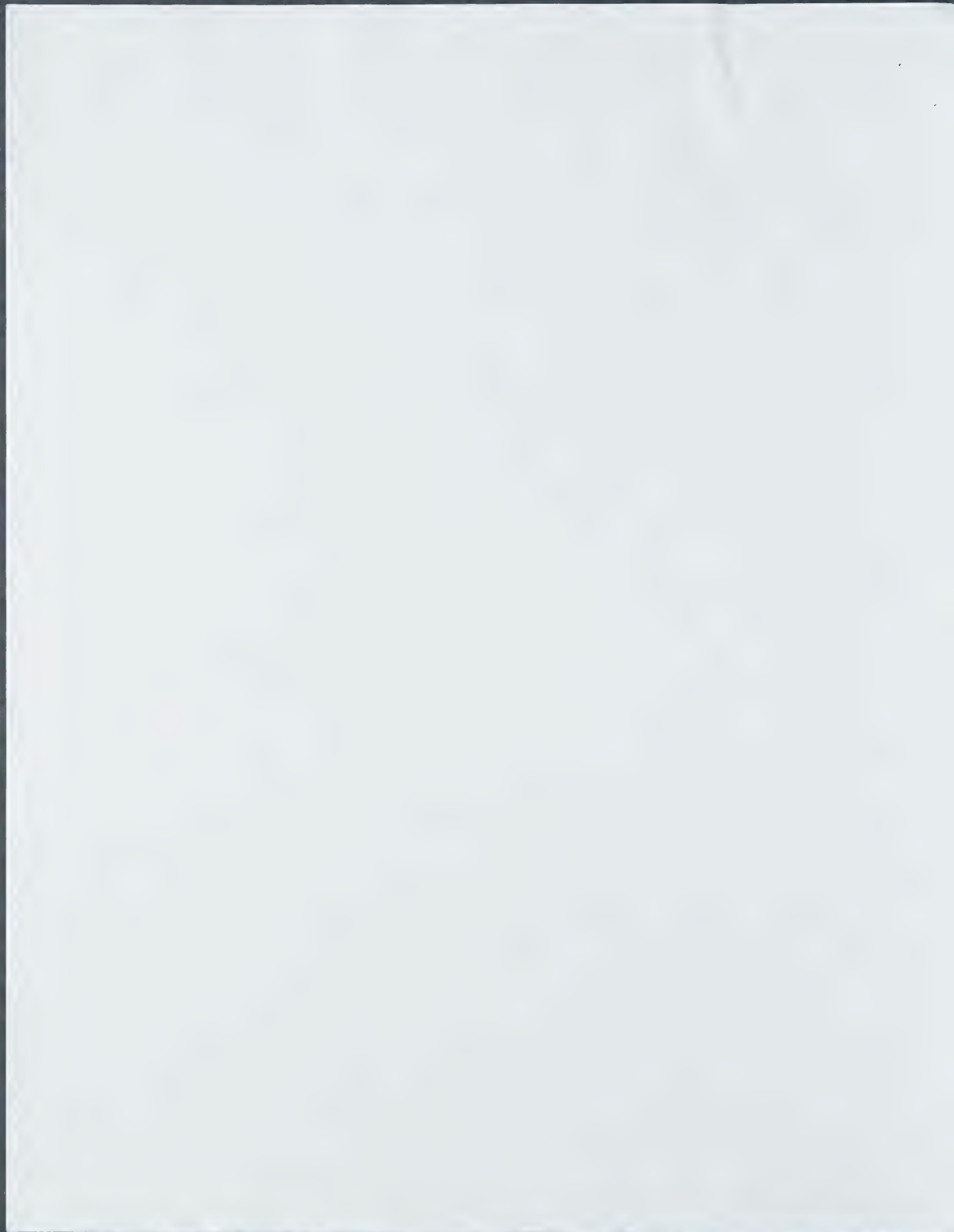
Dear Alfred,

Many thanks for your response. I can't thank you enough. Let me share with you the following.

Entrepreneurship Training:

The history of our involvement in Entrepreneurship Training Program is a checkered one. My original inspiration came from personal experience at Harvard, where I saw firsthand at the HSA (Harvard Student Agencies, Inc.) --- of which I became President in a previous incarnation --- just how exciting and liberating entrepreneurship can be.

What we did in Sarajevo led to some solid achievements, including training of refugees in preparation for their return. We were never able to overcome satisfactorily, however, a key local staffing problem, and in the absence of dynamic local leadership the market moved on. For the program to survive and become self-sufficient we needed to be able to find more dynamic local management and persuade the Soros organization to agree to a change. This we were unable to do.



Even though the initial center is closed, soon we do expect to launch the heretofore unrealized Mentoring aspect of the program --- training local experts as small business consultants and subsidizing their use by the recipients of small business loans from the La Benevolencija Loan Fund. Having learned our lesson, we have defined the tasks for this part of the program so that JDC experts can implement it according to their own best judgment and not be frustrated by the intricacies of co-management.

Even when we were experiencing these difficulties in Sarajevo, we tried again with Soros support to launch the program in Podgorica, Montenegro, but there my colleagues and I ran into even more serious problems in trying to make the local partnership work. So after two trial seminars, (that were very successful in themselves) we decided nonetheless not to continue.

Now we are indeed replicating the Entrepreneurship program in Belgrade, this time with the entire management and financial control essentially in JDC hands. We work with a local committee from the Belgrade Jewish Community that is much more open and accepting of our expertise than our previous partners. They have even formed a special business club --- something we could never get going in Sarajevo. In fact I should be sending you soon a new more detailed proposal concerning this effort.

In Macedonia we have interested other organizations in applying to Soros to do something similar (vocational orientation and job training) with Roma women. JDC experts from Israel would work for this project, but I am not planning for the JOINT to be the implementing organization.

#### Home Care in Sarajevo

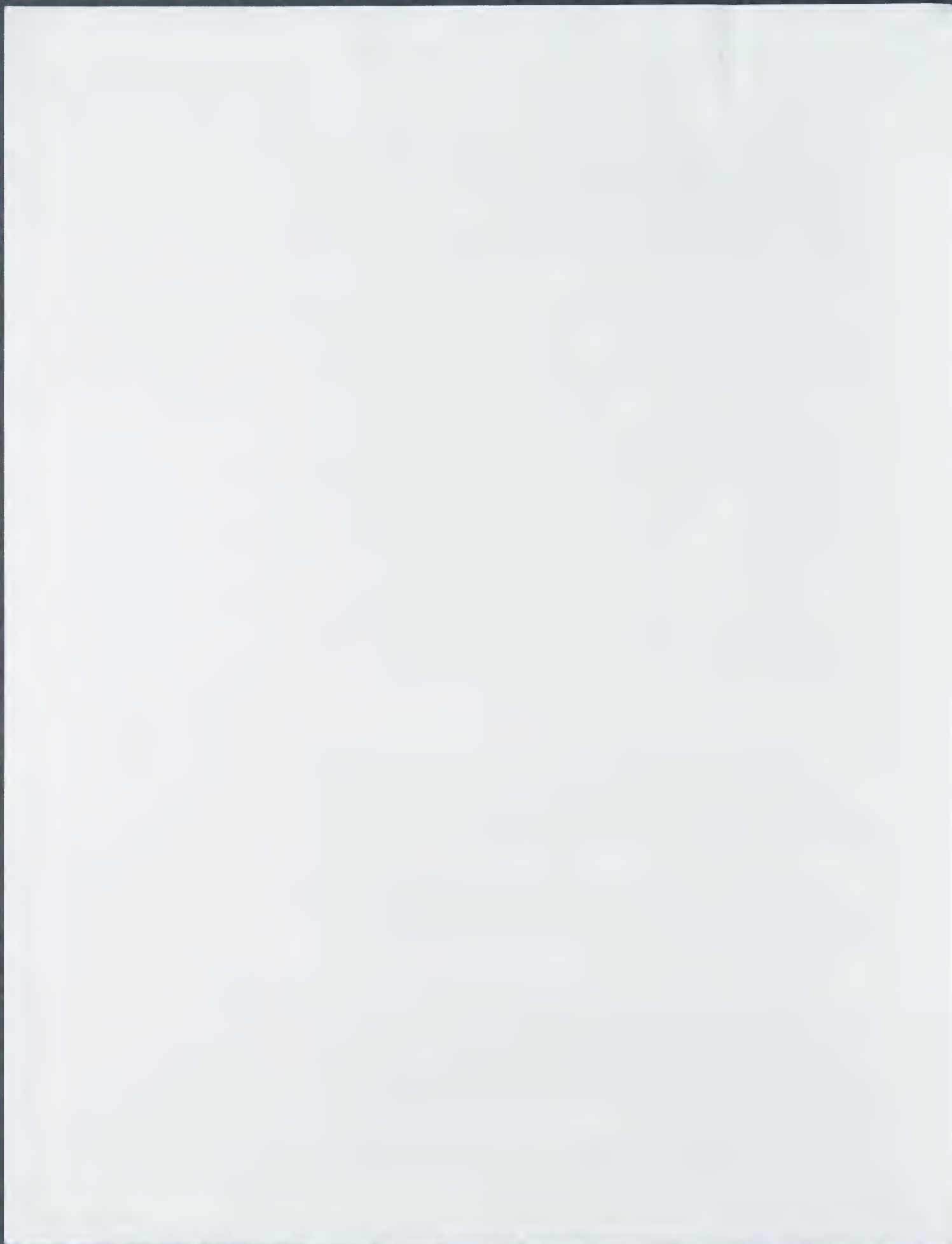
I immediately communicated your generous offer to the leadership of La Benevolencija in Sarajevo. They are of course delighted. To meet your request, I asked them to find a way to include immediately the 70 persons on the waiting list, trusting that we will come up with the rest of their ideal budget one way or the other. I await their response.

It came to me that this project in Sarajevo might be the best example of the kind of program that Sue Reed would like to film. So, after speaking to her by phone, I am sending her a copy of my original letter to you.

#### The Orphanage in Dnepetrovsk

As I said to Isabel when I called from Sarajevo, the JOINT and WJR are both taking very seriously the issues you raised concerning the budget of this orphanage. The persons directly in charge of our activities in that region have been instructed to verify the actual situation at the orphanage and produce information that can be counted on. I hope that JDC will have the results fairly soon.

I can only apologize to you that I served as an unwitting conduit for a





proposal that was badly flawed. I know that WJR is also red-faced over the matter and to the best of my knowledge they are also conducting their own inquiry.

An Endowment for a Chemistry Professorship in Brno (or for any other purpose)

The JDC person in charge of such matters has authorized me to say that JDC would be ready to manage an endowment that you would wish to set up and to guarantee that the endowment would yield annually an agreed-upon rate of interest. (More than the Harvard example you cite in your memoirs, I assure you).

If you are interested, please let me know the kind of arrangement you seek.

Joseph and His Brothers

I was just in Prague with a very distinguished Israeli rabbi, Rabbi Menachem HaCohen. He is a most unusual man, the scion of a most traditional Jerusalem rabbinical family, he became for 15 years a Knesset member for the Labor Party. The rabbi for the Kibbutzim and Moshavim, he has counted among his friends and mentors Hugo Bergman, Max Brod, David Ben-Gurion, and the Lubavitcher Rebbe. He has written commentaries on the Torah among other books.

When I tried to engage him on this question as to who sold Joseph into slavery in Egypt, he said it was the brothers of course, and despite his generally liberal and open approach didn't seem to think there was any question about it. So now, after reluctantly getting to the point of being ready to consider that the brothers were not quite so directly to blame, I don't know what to think.

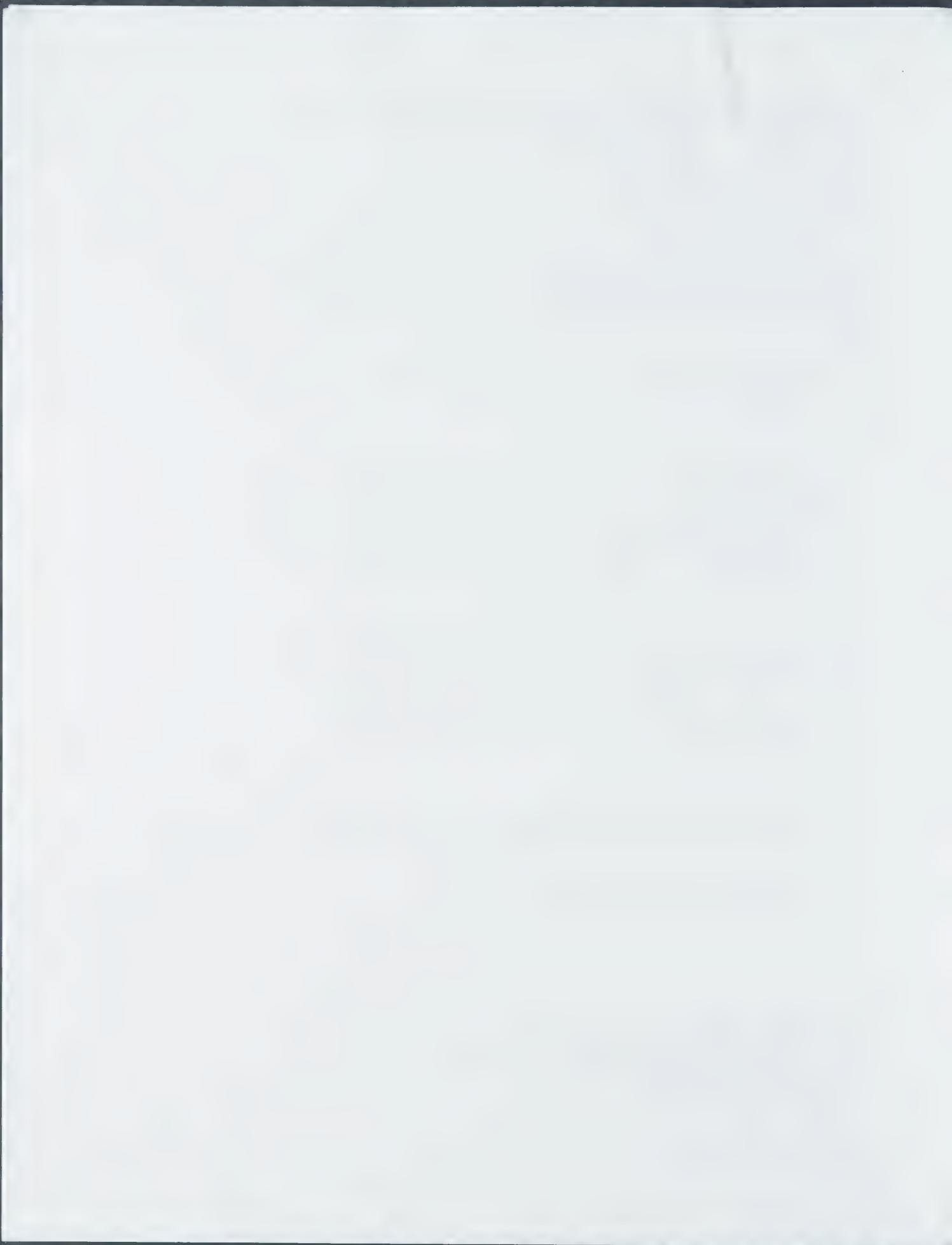

I am sorry that my reply to your long e-mail of January 3rd has been so delayed, but I have been trying very hard to catch up with all the work that accumulated while we were in England

Your e-mail is both disappointing and challenging.

It is disappointing because you wrote that the Entrepreneurship Training Center, which we helped finance, could not be sustained economically. I had understood earlier that it was a success and was actually being duplicated elsewhere.

I am very intrigued by the Home Care Program which helps so many people, 182 Jews among a total of 470. Even 3 Roma are included!

In the last paragraph of the budget it says that an additional 70 persons now on the waiting list could be included if only someone would donate DM 30,500 more and of that the Joint is willing to pay half.

Perhaps I am too demanding, but supposing that I sent you promptly \$50,000, could those 70 persons on the waiting list be included?

As soon as I have your and Michael Schneider's response, I will send you my check.

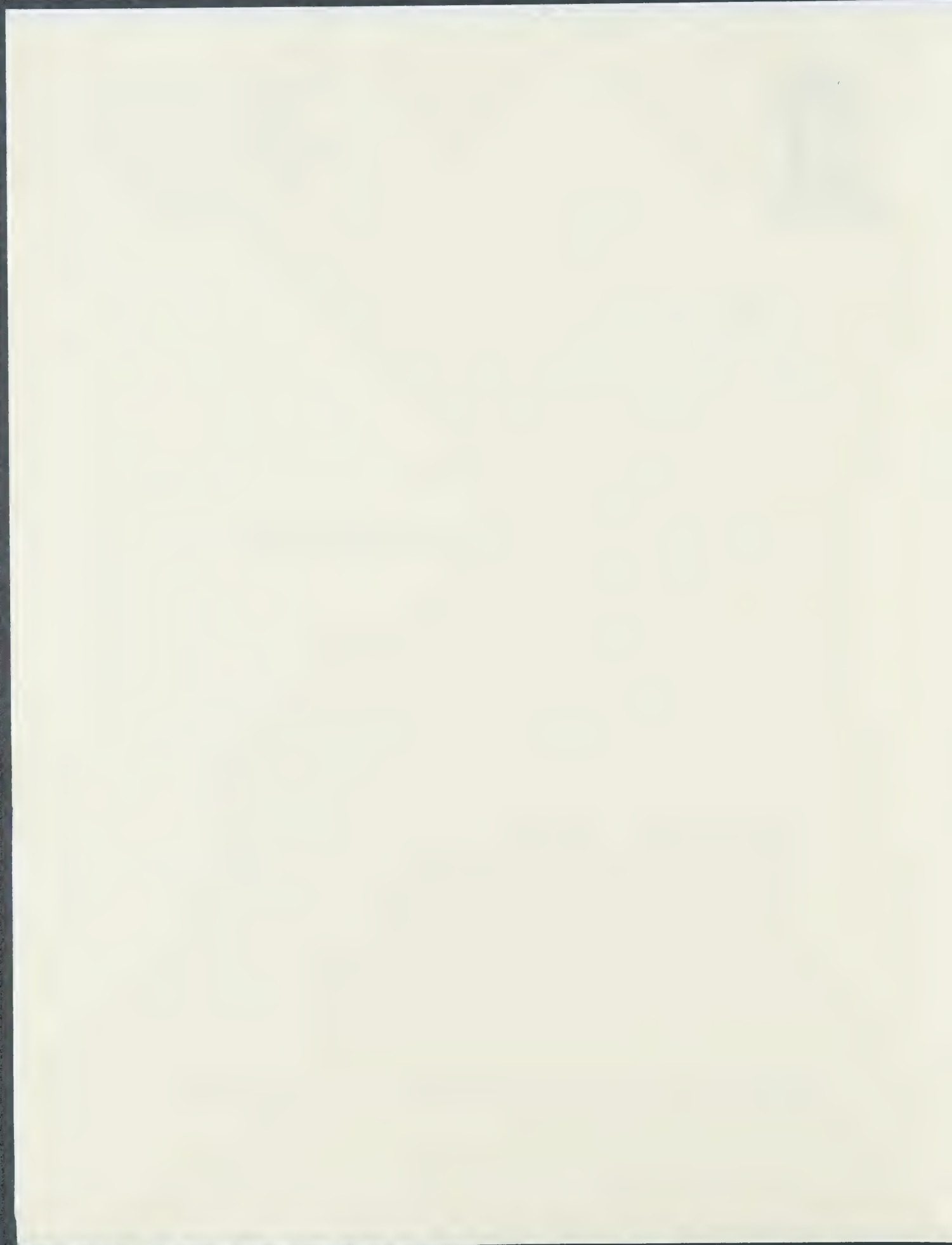
I hope that this correspondence finds you and your family in the best of health and making preparations for a joyous holiday season.

The last time we met you requested that I give some thought to what projects Family House, Inc. will undertake in the near future and what our needs relative to these are.

Subsequent to our meeting the administration of Family House, Inc. revisited the projects temporarily halted in order to, in one instance, eliminate and/or contain drug trafficking to stabilize the area and in the other impact the overall community (health) quality of life.

To assist us in the determination of our next priority project the Board and administration of Family House, Inc. looked into what the most pressing needs within the community are as voiced by its residents. The final selection criteria employed was based upon community need in combination with the agency's mission and service delivery experiences.

Family House, Inc. has determined that our next project priority will be the completion of

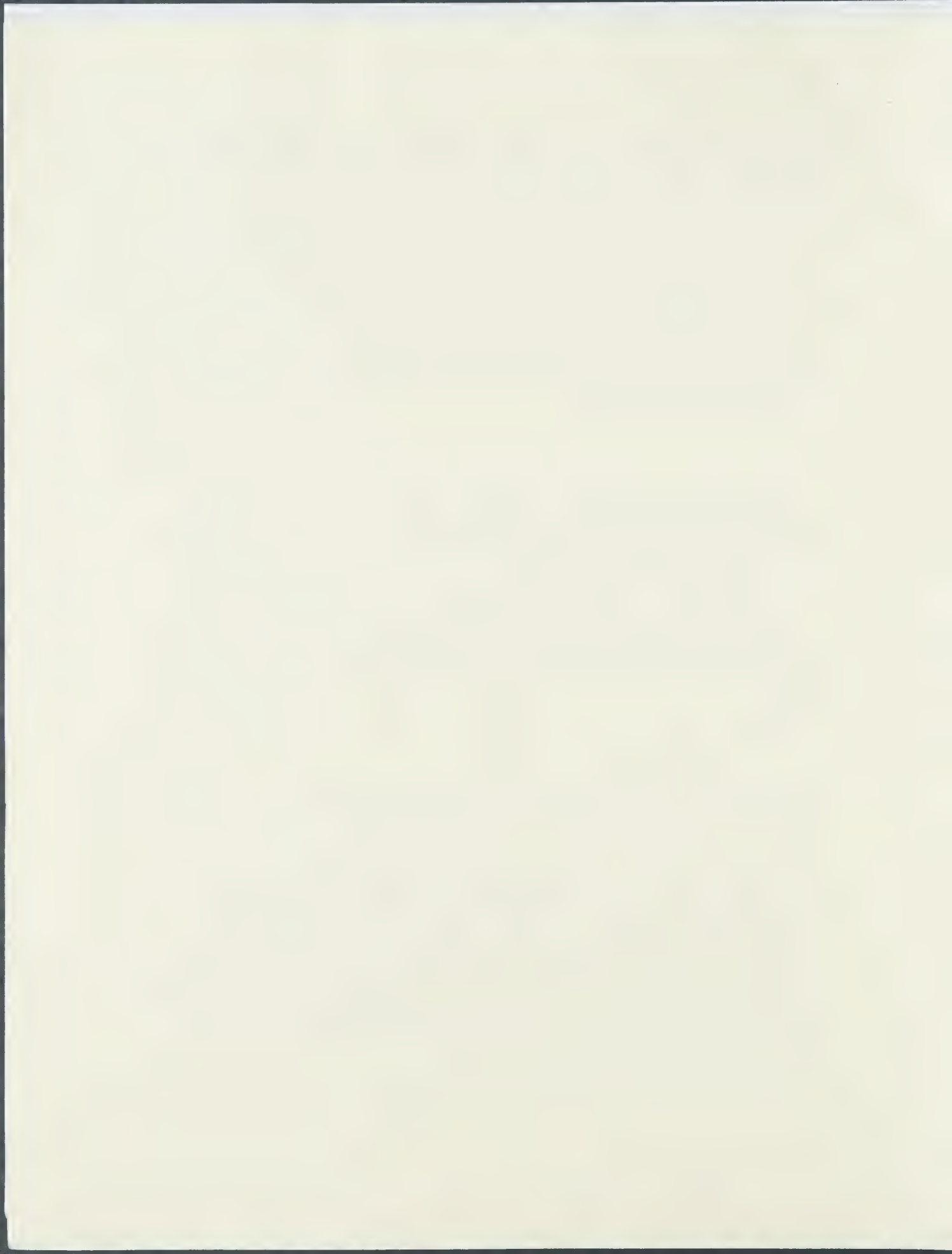




construction and operation of an eighteen (18) bed Class C. community based residential care facility (CBRF) on the properties located at 3291, 3293 and 3295 North Eleventh Street. The total cost of the project is estimated to be five hundred eight nine thousand seven hundred dollars (\$589,700.00). To date we have raised two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,00.00) for the project. Family House, Inc is currently seeking the balance of funds needed for the project in the amount of three hundred eighty nine thousand seven hundred dollars (\$389,700.00).

Various sources have been asked to contribute funds toward the construction of this facility and the overall increased resident bed capacity of Family House, Inc. The balance of funds needed for the completion of the project are currently being sought through a variety of avenues. To date foundations, loan entities, grantors, private citizens and the private sector are being asked to assist us in this endeavor through gifts of financial support.

The original cost projections for the building were done in late 1999. It was estimated then that the entire facility could be constructed for approximately three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000.00). At that time the building was designed to house a maximum capacity of only twelve (12) residents. Since that time a number of factors potentially impacting the costs of the facility have become financial realities. It is now estimated that the facility will cost approximately five hundred ninety thousand dollars (\$590,000.00). The primary factors affecting the increased cost are:



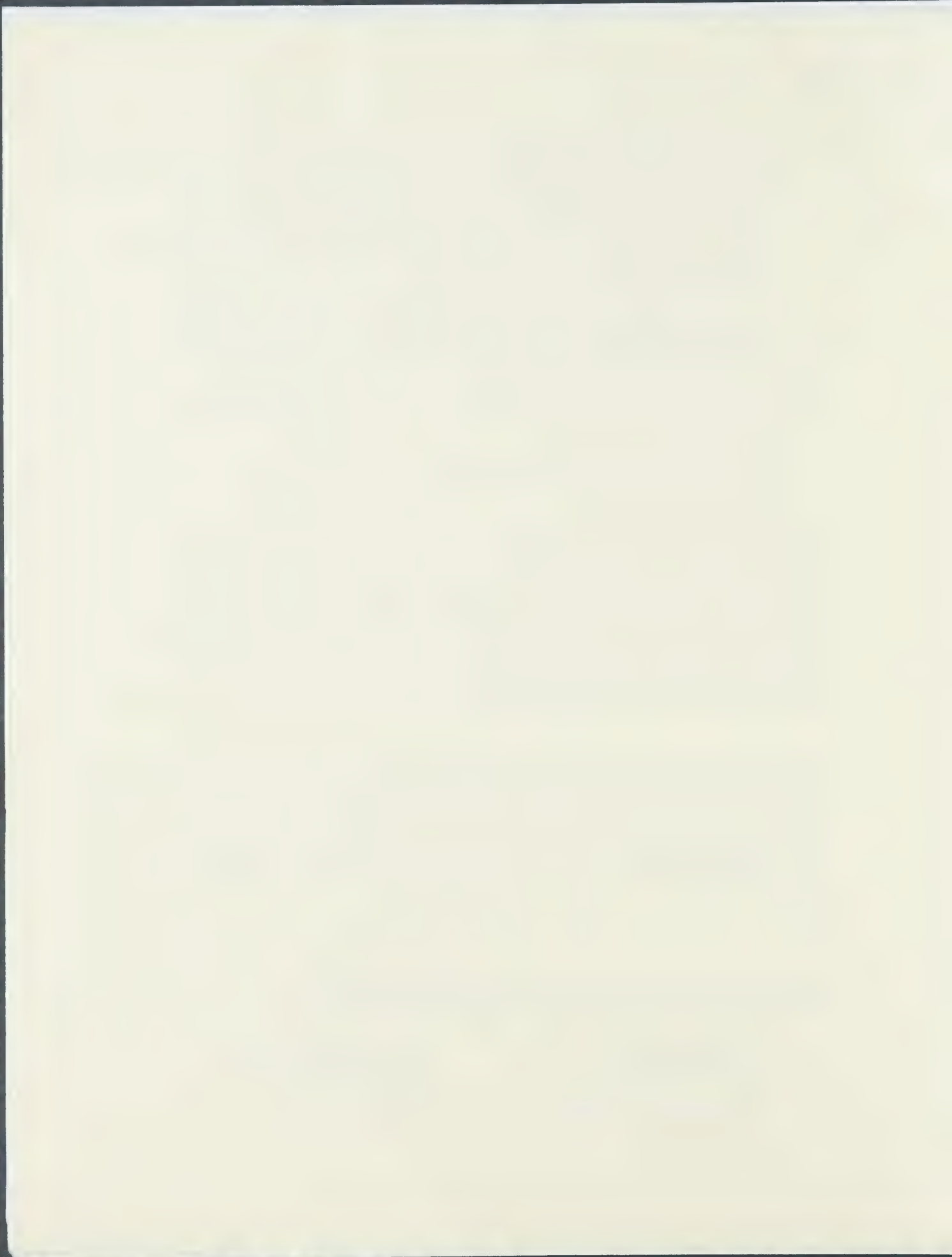
- increased maximum resident capacity from twelve (12) to eighteen (18)
- design changes that now incorporate attachment of the single story home located at 3291 North Eleventh Street on to the newly constructed building
- raising of the garage located at 3295 North Eleventh Street and incorporation of the land into the expanded construction design
- CBRF code changes and construction requirement revisions in the areas of fire protection, electrical, plumbing and water service(s) to the building due to the newly increased building capacity
- increased material costs due to changed code requirements and modification of resident capacity
- increased architectural costs due to modification of resident capacity

Updated architectural plans for the building to be constructed have already been drafted and approved by the City of Milwaukee. All needed variances have been granted. Our primary contractor is the same entity that has worked very successfully in the past with us in similar projects. The name of the contractor entity is Building Specialists.

The first phase of the project, clearing the land, was completed with the assistance of fifty-eight (58) UPS volunteers on November 10, 2001. Demolition of the brick and cinder block garage located at the rear of the 3295 lot took place on Thursday November 29, 2001.

The time frame for completion of the building is as indicated below:

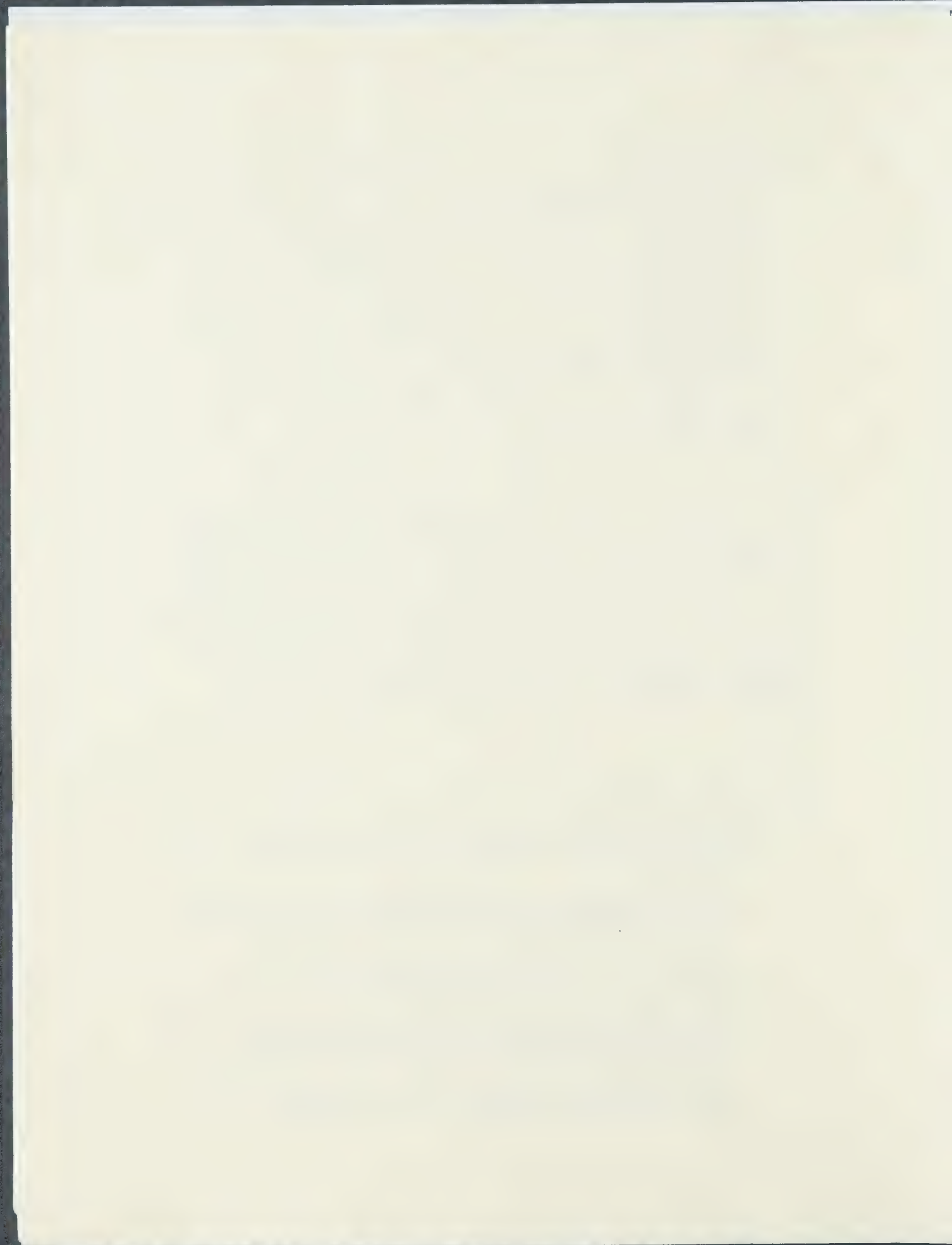

All monies received for the project will be applied exclusively to the construction of the new eighteen (18) bed facility. All direct administrative and some other costs associated will be provided by Family House, Inc. as an in-kind service to the project. Additionally Family House, Inc. has provided from its own resources the first fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) for the start up of project excavation and the laying of the building foundation.

Upon completion the facility will:

- increase the area capacity for housing of the elderly economically disadvantaged
- create new employment opportunities and positions in nursing, maintenance, nursing assistance, food service, house keeping and clerical assistance
- strengthen the area tax base through the generation of local revenue
- further stabilize the neighborhood through the replacement of abandoned and blighted properties with newly constructed attended housing units.
- provide adequate space for community center activities on the lower level until construction of the building across the street is completed



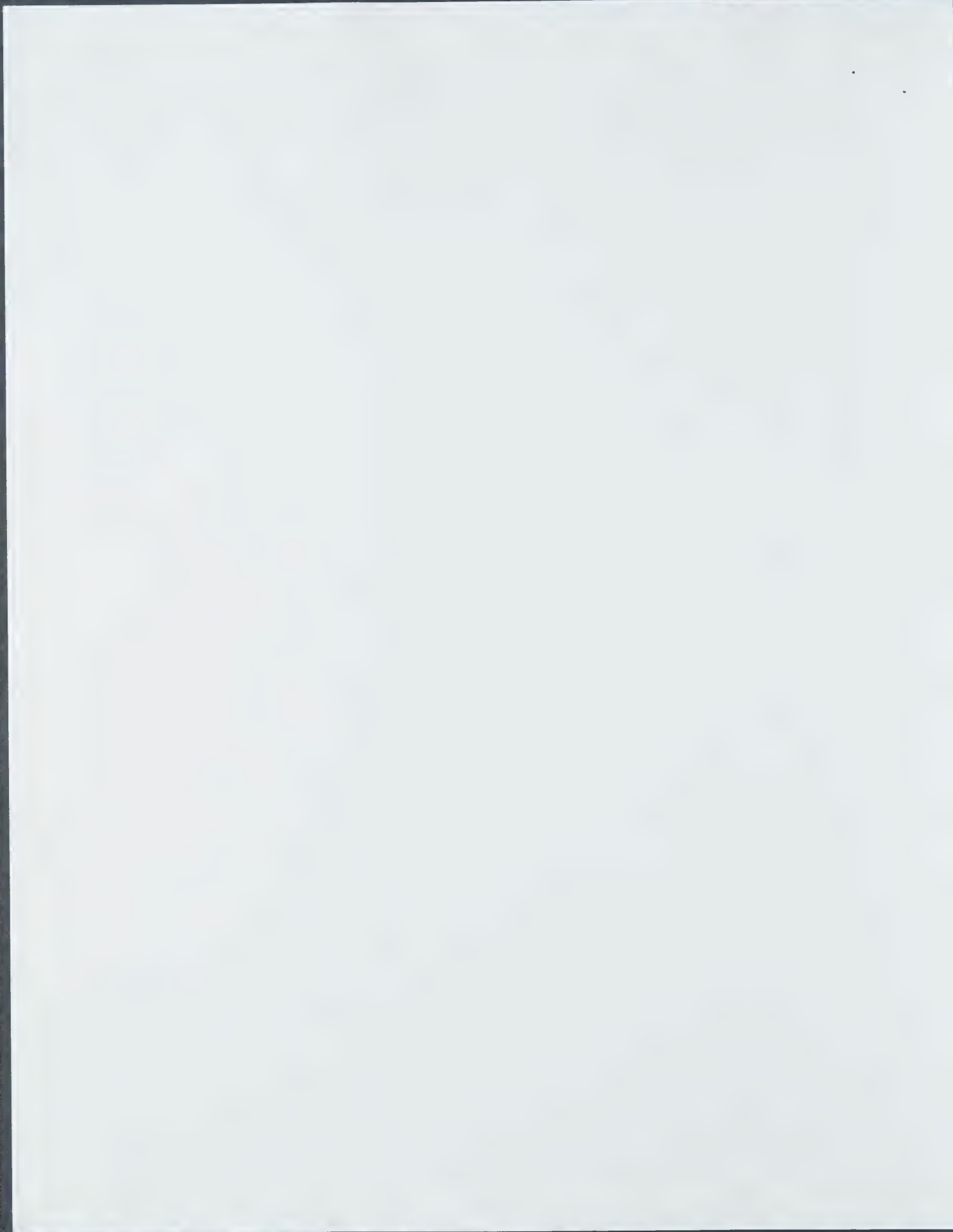
Just back from an incredibly crowded and exciting visit to the Czech Republic.

Among other matters I also spoke with a number of different people about inviting you to deliver a series of lectures. Several opportunities were broached. Please tell me which of them you prefer.

I met with Tana Hlavata and one of her colleagues. They are quite satisfied with the way the restructured Roma program is progressing. We brainstormed about asking you to deliver a lecture that would help sensitize Czechs to the importance of philanthropy. To further this aim they hold periodic awareness or rather training seminars for two different audiences: corporation executives and students of journalism. Might you agree to address one or the other on a new topic such as "Why I Am a Philanthropist"?

Milena Bartlova and I also met and discussed an idea we have been exploring for some time. She will be writing to you directly.

The very young and dynamic and seriously committed Progressive Jewish Congregation in Prague (Beit Simcha) keenly awaits an evening lecture from you on "A Jewish View of the Messiah." And I am weighing different options for asking you to speak on "Rembrandt and the Jews," including one in Brno.



All of us are once again overwhelmed by your generosity in setting up the Alfred and Isabel Bader Philanthropic Fund within the JOINT. I await your instructions.

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P.S. Re-reading your adventures as a Chemist Collector has inspired some further research. I thought the following information about the Austrian Wunderteam that I was able to obtain might be of interest to you.

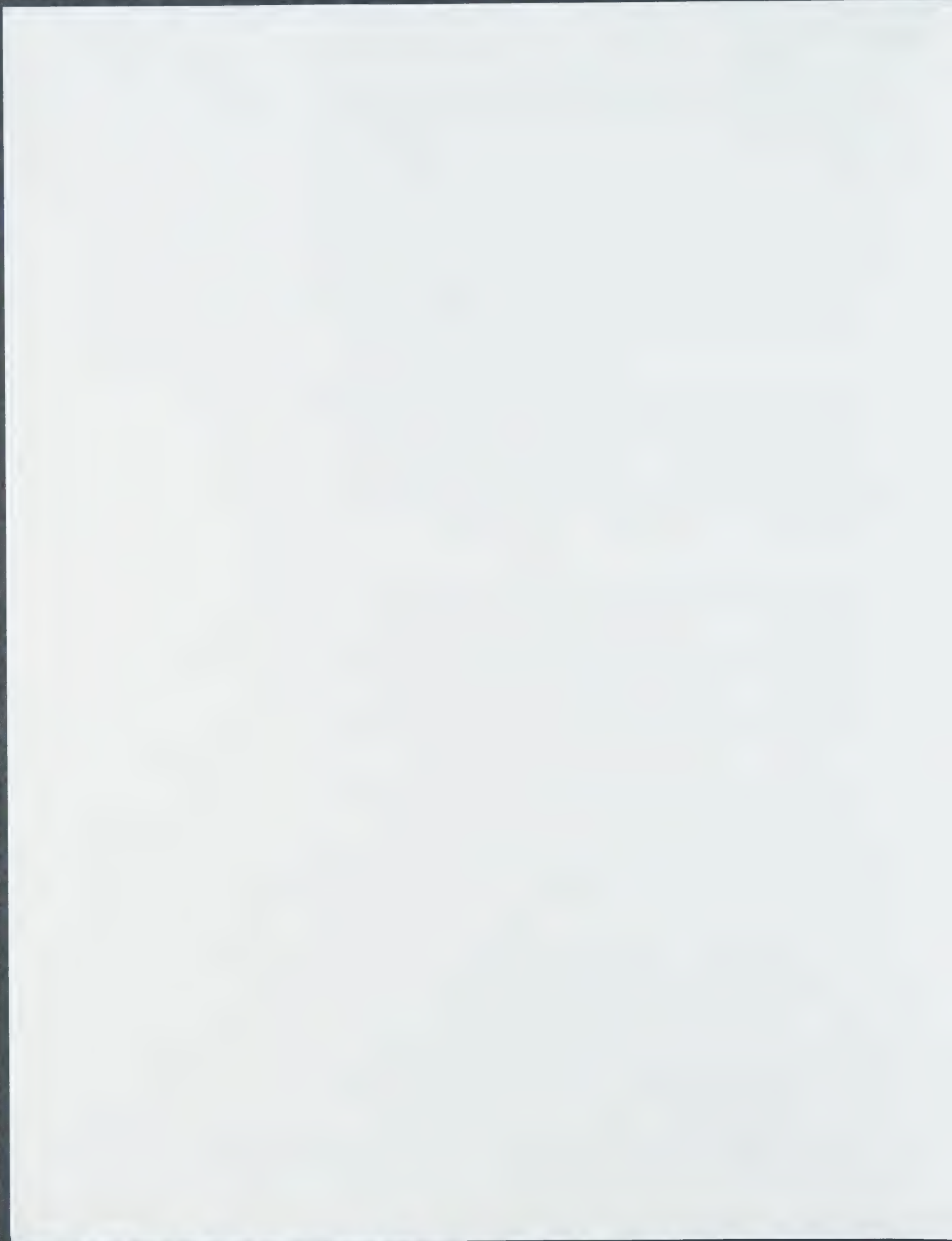
It turns out that the match you refer to was actually played on 7 December 1932 according to the information I have received. It was a friendly fixture i.e. not played in a competition and was held at Stamford Bridge, Chelsea, London. Stamford Bridge is the home ground of the Chelsea Football Club and is still in use, though the stadium has been somewhat altered since 1932. England led 2-0 at half time and the end result (as you know) was 4-3 for England.

The Austria side of the early 1930's were feted as the Wunderteam and regarded as Continental Europe's strongest team. They brought to football the intricate Danubian short-passing game known as the Vienna School, and they had gone 14 matches unbeaten when they met England near the end of 1932. While England managed to win, the match reports generally agreed Austria had played the better football, particularly in the second half, and the game was one of the first indications that England's football supremacy was doubtful.

The two opposing centre-forwards, both scorers that long ago day, suffered tragically early deaths.

Jimmy Hampson scored five goals in his three matches for England—one against Northern Ireland and two against Wales in 1930 as well as his two against Austria in 1932—and 289 goals in 423 Football League matches, nearly all as Blackpool's centre-forward. On 10 January 1938, in his 11th season with Blackpool, he joined a fishing party in Morecambe Bay. His boat collided with a trawler, and his body was never found. He was 31.

Matthias Sindelar, the brilliant centre-forward who also scored for Austria in their 2-1 win against England in Vienna in 1936, was known as Der Papierene (Man of Paper) because of his slender build and his ability to slip through defences. He scored 27 goals for Austria in 44 internationals. But 1938 brought the Anschluss, the end of the Austrian national side and the removal of all Jewish influence at his beloved club side, FK Austria Wien, including his teammates, club officials and fans. A staunch opponent of Nazism, Sindelar refused invitations to play for the German



national side and infuriated Nazi officials when he led "old Austria" to a 2-0 victory over the new Austro-German side in what was supposed to be a "reunification" match. On 29 January 1939, he and his new girlfriend were found dead in his apartment. He was 35. The official verdict was accidental death by carbon monoxide poisoning, but questions remain. More than 60 years after his death, all the Players of the Century lists featured his name, and he was honoured as Austria's Sportsman of the Century.

There is no question that Mr. Bader's first donation has been used in a manner that will improve the children's quality of life this winter and make their holiday season a little brighter.

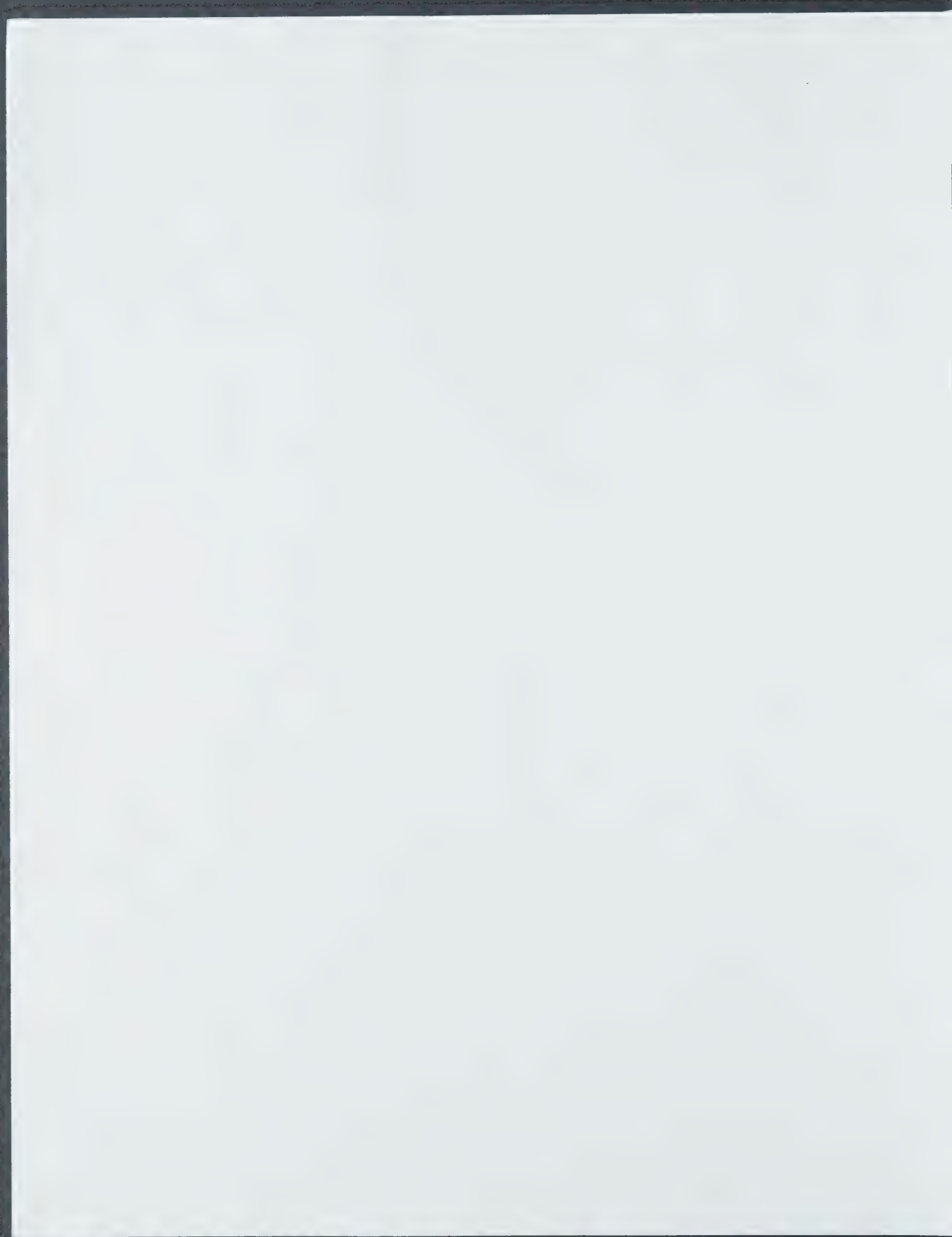

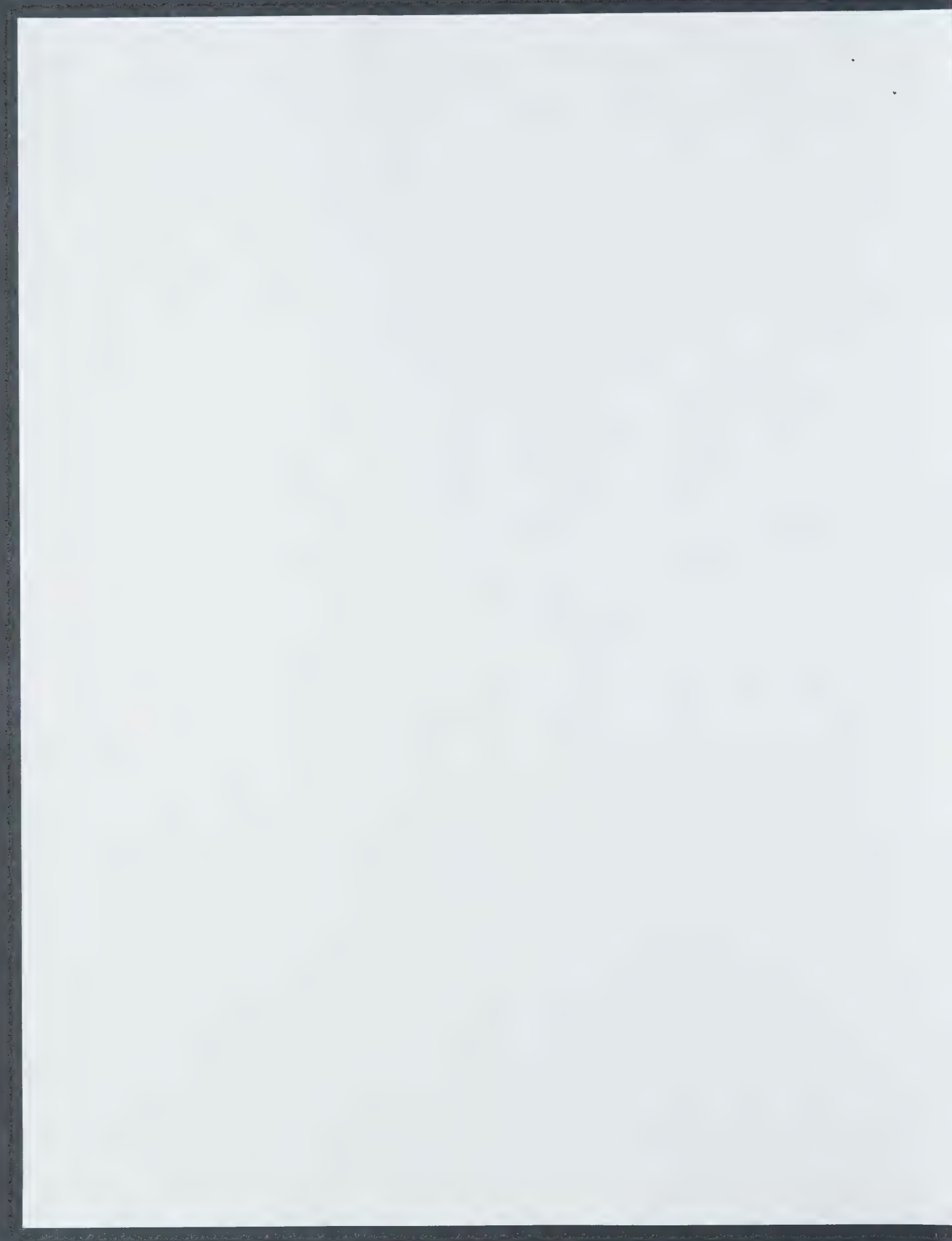
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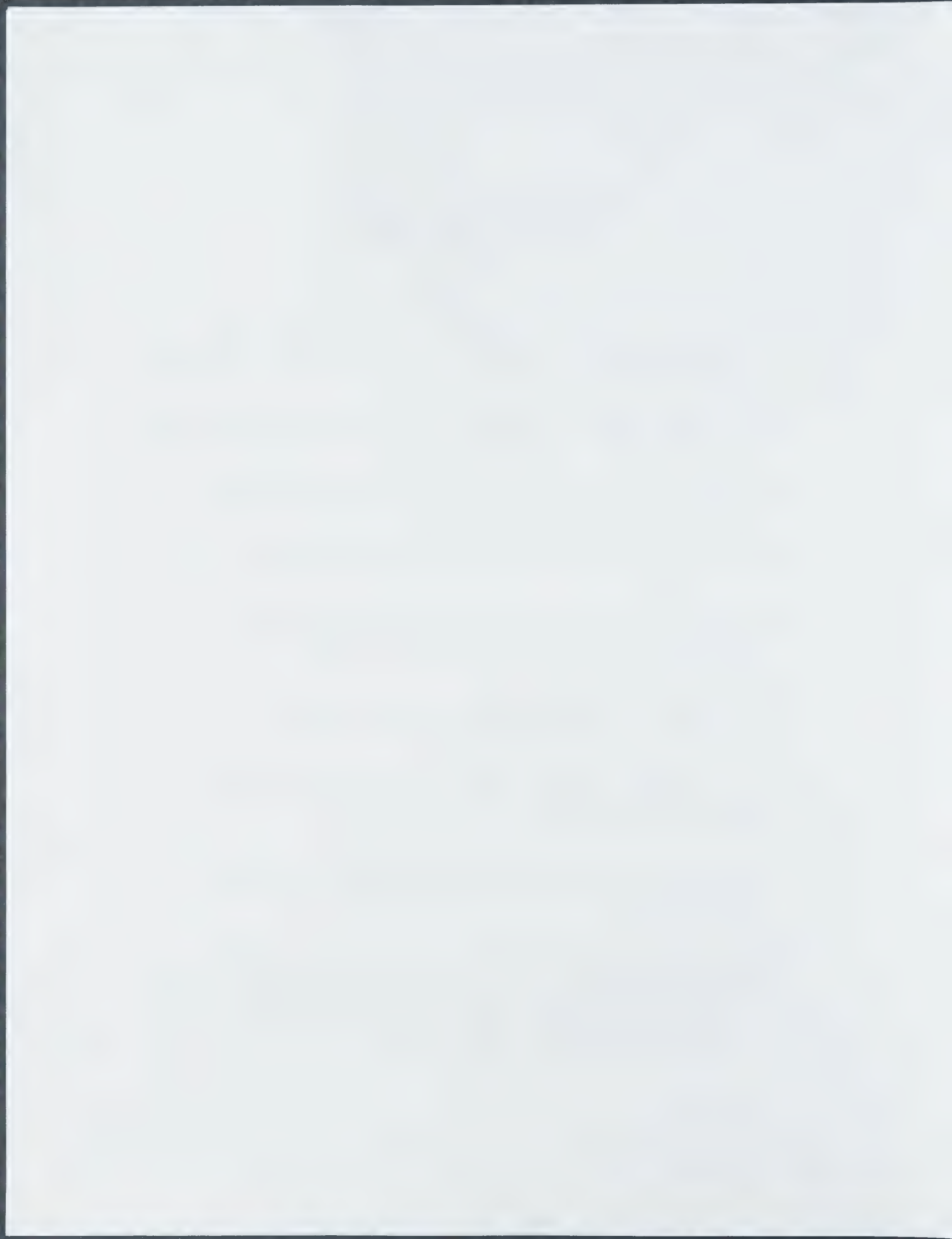
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## **The Alfred Bader Award (Established 1994)**

1. The Award shall be known as *the Alfred Bader Award*.
2. The Award will be presented as a mark of distinction and recognition to a scientist with the Czech citizenship for excellence in research in organic and bioorganic chemistry.
3. The scientist shall not have reached the age of 35 years by the application / nomination deadline of the year in which the nomination becomes effective.
4. The award shall be presented annually unless the Award Committee considers that no suitable candidate has been nominated or applied.
5. The Award Committee shall be nominated by the Czech Chemical Society.
6. The Award shall be presented at the suitable convention of the Czech Chemical Society. The recipient will be required to present an award address at the meeting.
7. A paper based on the award address should be submitted in Czech to a journal of the Czech Chemical Society.
8. The Award shall consist of a prize of CZK 100 000.- and a scroll. The recipient will also receive travel expenses to attend the convention (within the Czech Republic only).
9. The funds to endow this award have been provided by Alfred Bader. The administration of these funds shall be the responsibility of the Czech Chemical Society.
10. Applications for the Award shall be submitted in writing through the Secretariat of the Czech Chemical Society. Entries should be submitted by the published deadline and shall consist of description of the contributions of the nominee, biographical sketch and papers reprints. References, and supporting documents are welcomed.

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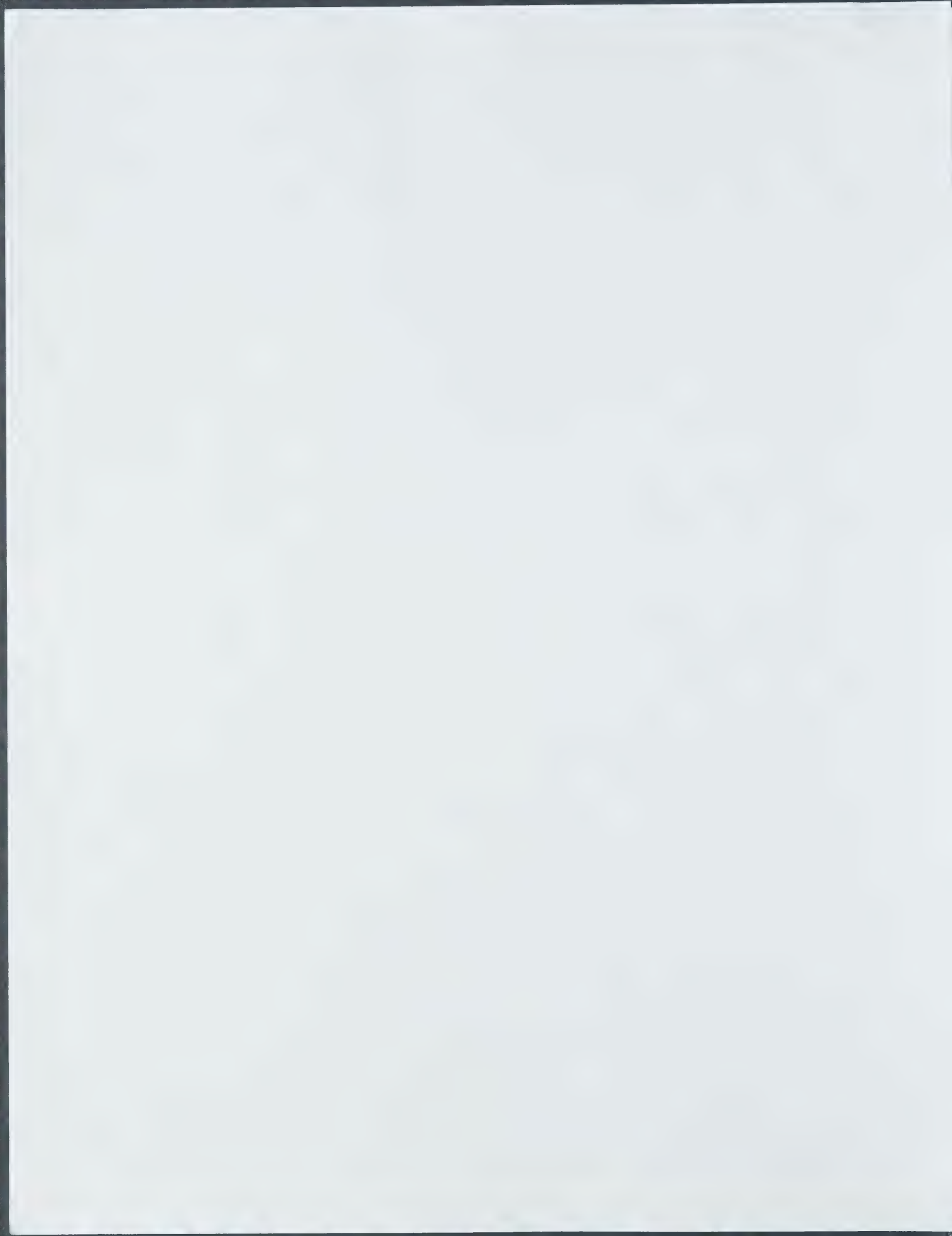
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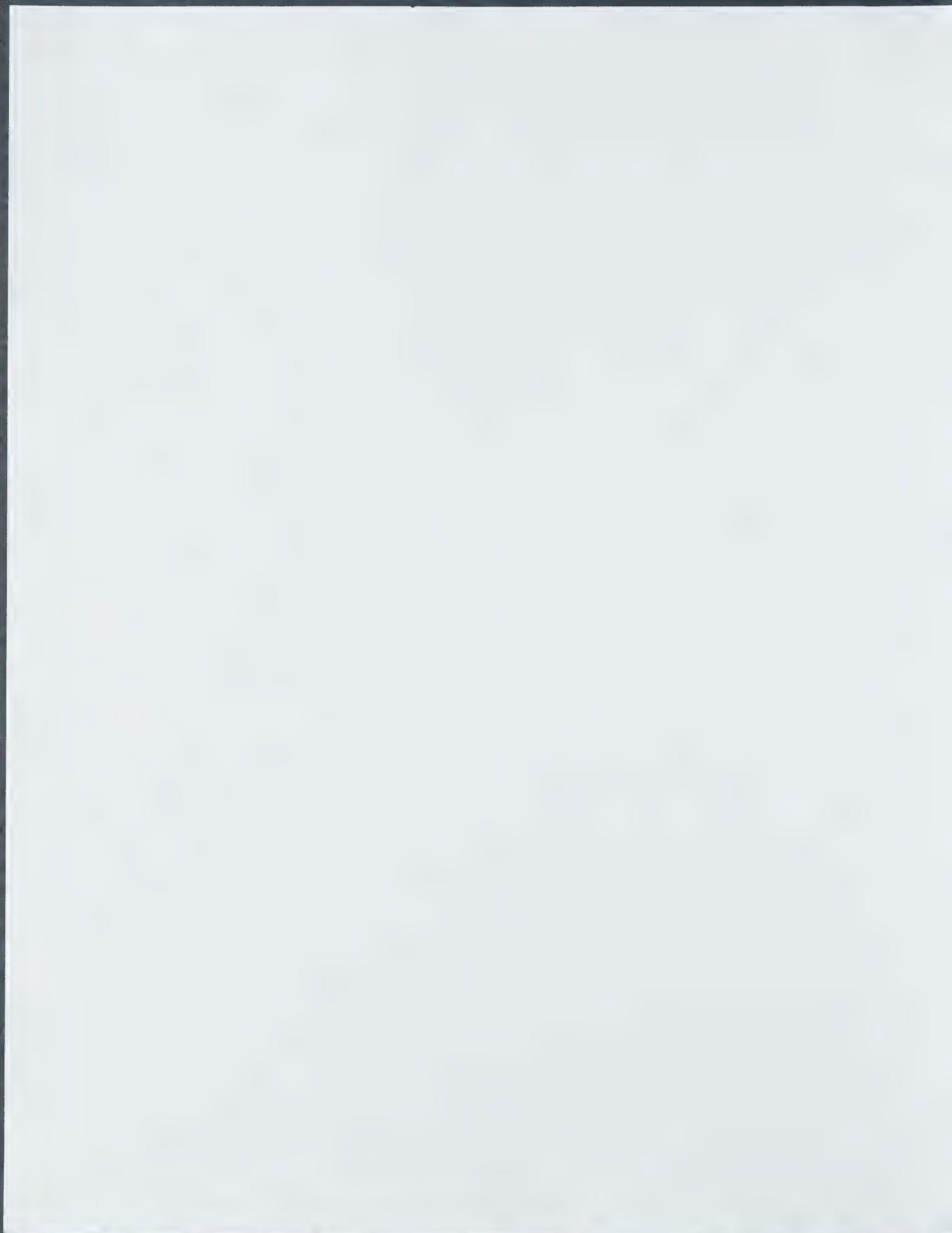
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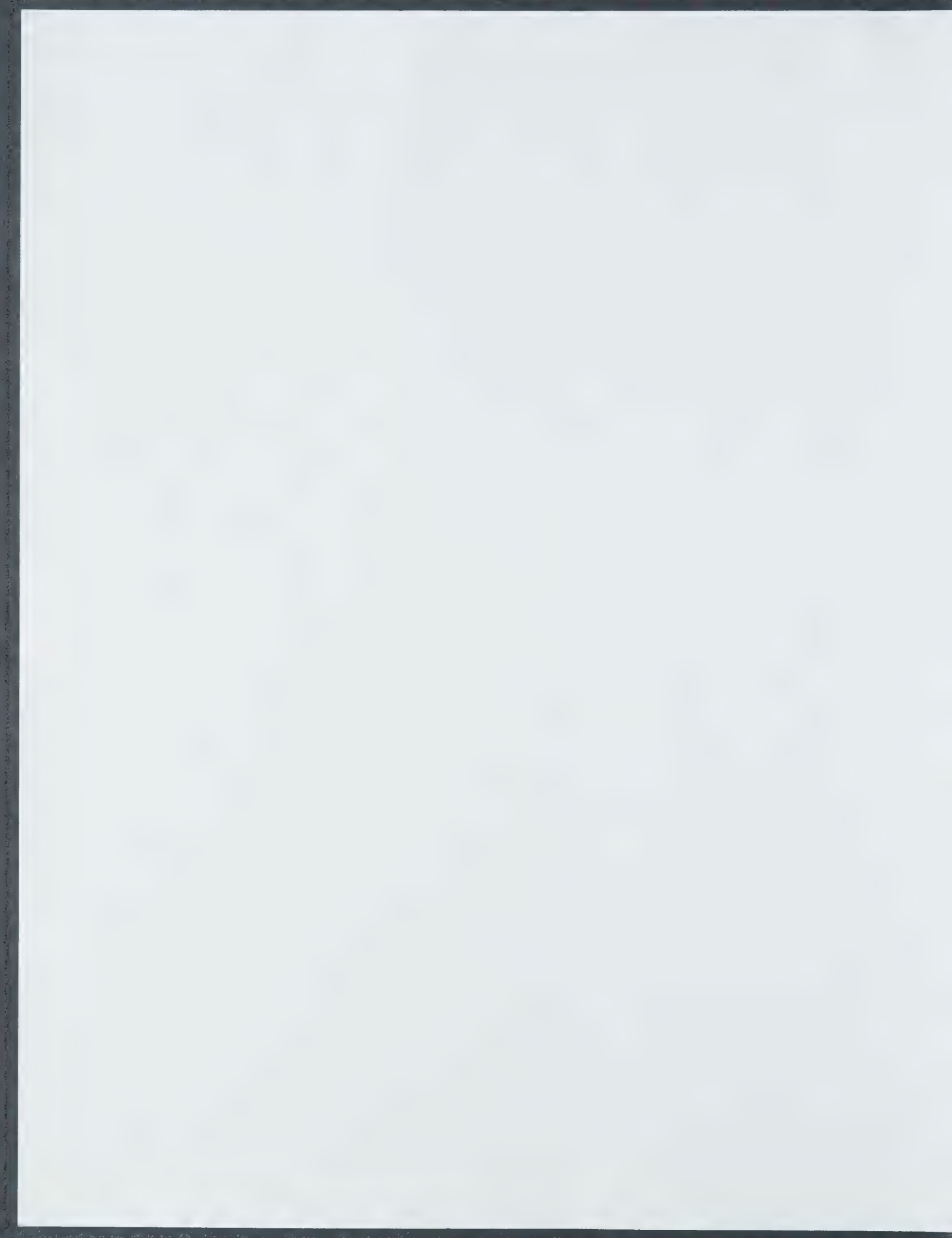
Dear Tzivia,

Dear Professor Danagulyan,

Thank you so much for your e-mail of today.

After my discussion with Prof. Katritzky about how best to help Armenian chemists, I carefully considered his suggestion that I should send chemical journals to your embassy in Washington and they would then send them to you.

Thinking about this, I realized the difficulties: the books are very heavy and your embassy might have great difficulties sending hundreds of pounds of books from Washington to Armenia.

Would it not be far better if I sent some money to help Armenian chemists at your University?

What will be important to me is that the money will really help the academics working at the University and will not be taken by administrators or politicians to cover overhead. Would it, for instance be possible, if I sent, to begin with, say \$10,000 to have \$1,000 be given to ten academics with instructions to use the money to help their students?

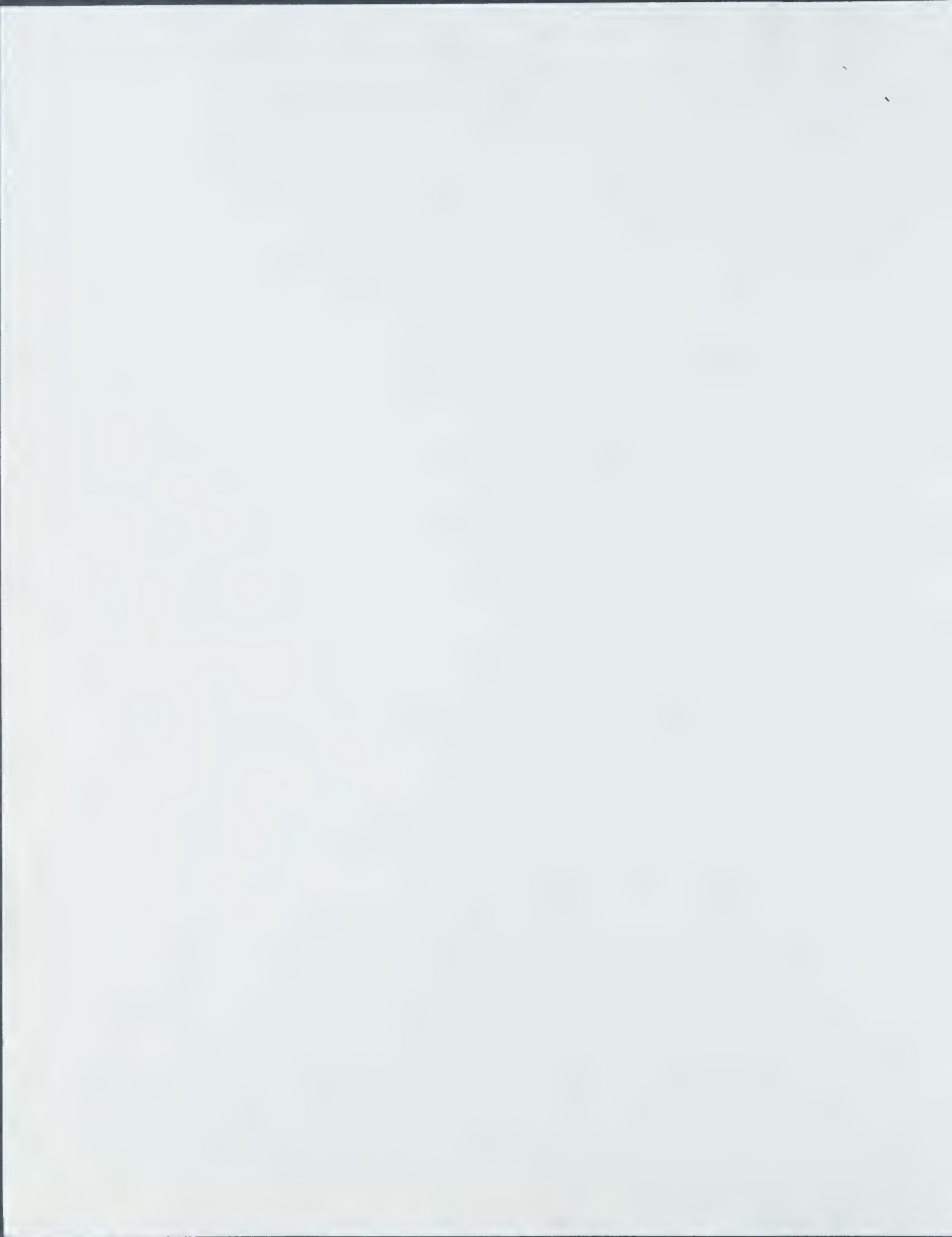
The next question is how best to send the money to you. I have worked for some time with the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee which helps a great many people around the world, and not just Jews, often on a non-sectarian basis. Just to give you some recent examples, within the last few months I sent \$25,000 to help Romas (gypsies) in the Czech Republic; some \$36,000 to help needy elderly Bulgarians on a completely non-sectarian basis; a bit earlier I sent a much larger sum to start an entrepreneurial school in Sarajevo.

I have asked the Joint whether they have any efforts in Armenia, and if the answer will be yes, that would be a good way. If the answer is no, then you might think of some Armenian-American Foundation which would receive the money from me and pass it on to your Chemistry Department without taking a percentage for the Foundation.

The reason that I would like to give it either to the Joint or to a charitable Foundation such as an Armenian-American Foundation is that any such gifts are tax-deductible to me, which means in effect that you get 2/3 from me and 1/3 from the US government!

There is absolutely no need for anyone to thank me in any form or way; all I want to do is to be certain that the money will ultimately help students in Chemistry.

Now you will of course ask yourself why would an American non-Armenian chemist want to help Armenians? There are two answers to that: one is that there is a Commandment in the Bible, in Leviticus 19 that you should not stand idly by the blood of your neighbor. But the entire world stood by idly during the first World War when a third of the Armenians were killed. Nobody helped. The second

- is that there appears to be pretty good genetic evidence that many Armenians are descended from the Lost Ten Tribes of Israel.

As soon as I have heard from the Joint I will let you know. In the meantime you might like to inquire whether there are any Armenian-American Foundations who could pass my gifts on to your Chemistry Department.

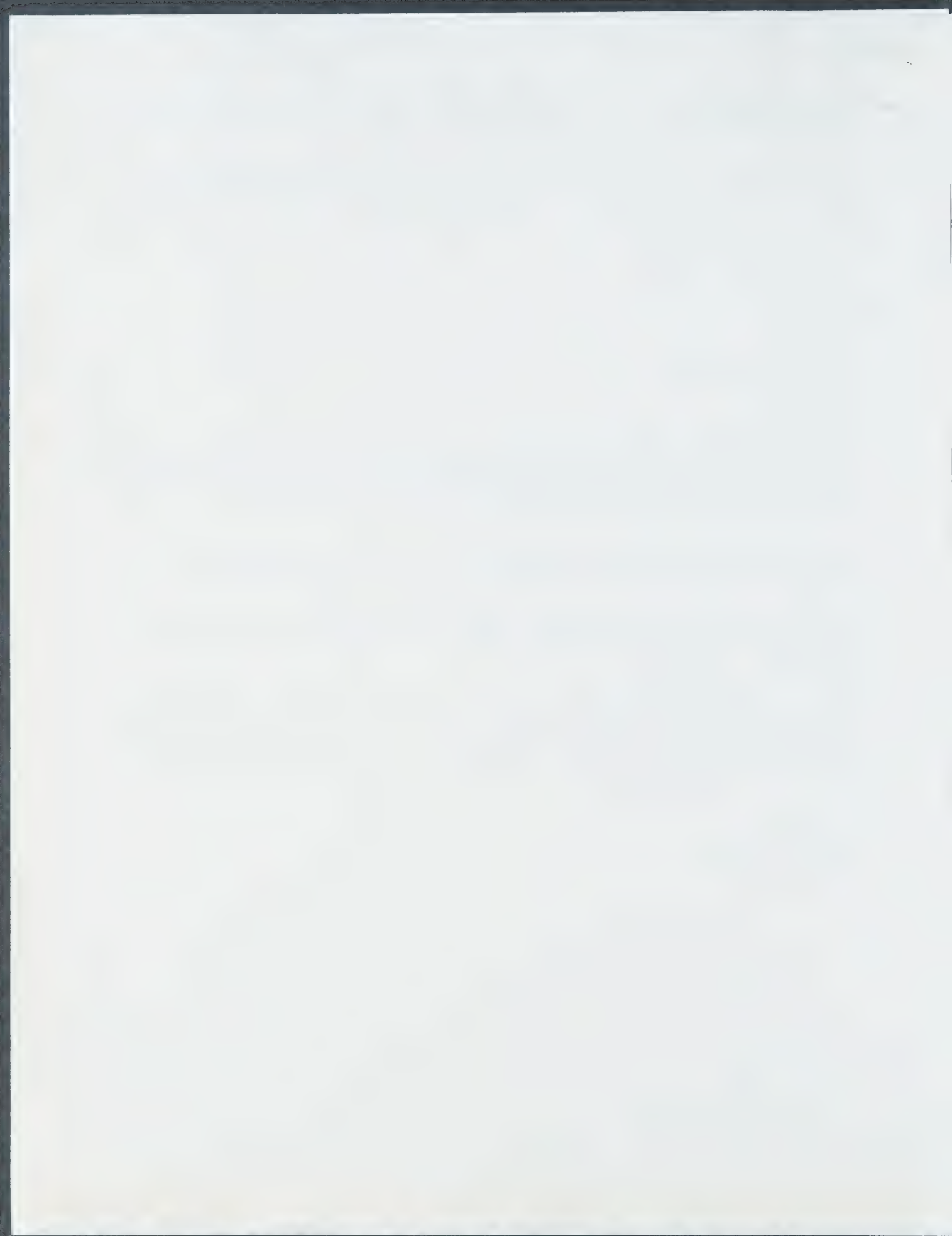
In a day or two I will find out the possibility of journals transportation via Consulate or any other way. In particular, I think that it will be easier to arrange this via a charitable organization.

I was moved by the description of the murder of Charles Jordan. It reminded me of the life and work of Wilfred Israel who was killed during the war, on the way from Portugal to London. There are some people like Jordan and Israel and Bar-Chaim, but not many.

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Dr. Schmidt in Graz is an excitable, well-meaning, unorganized woman. Her books were very good but there are probably much worthier recipients for help than Austrian children being sent to a lake in Hungary.

I can certainly understand Dr. Nic's decision to join the high tech company. Sadly, I know of no other Bader Fellows from any of the four Universities to which we have given quite large sums, who have returned to the Czech Republic. The fellowships were certainly not set up to provide a brain drain for the ablest Czech chemists to come to the West, and I feel rather helpless.

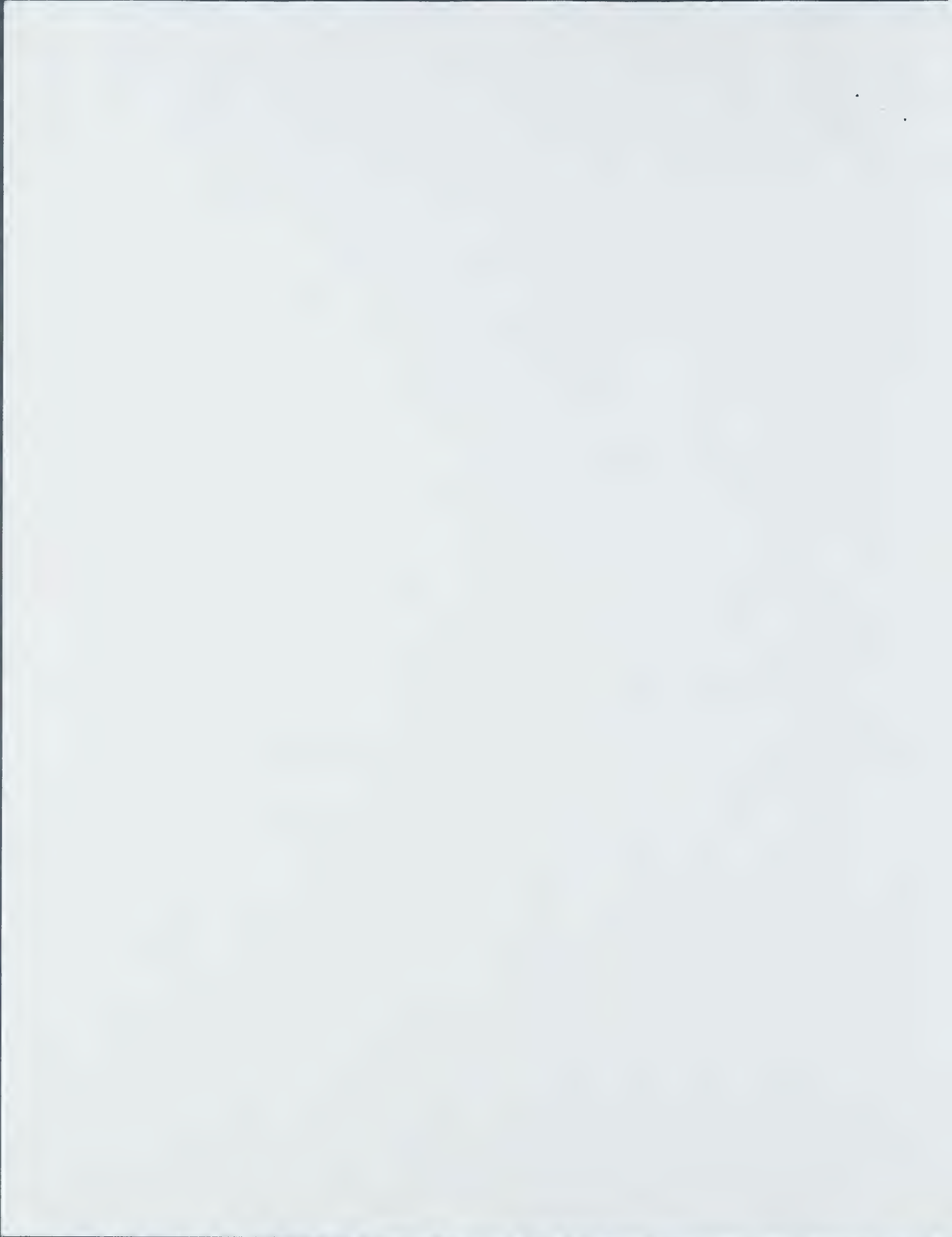

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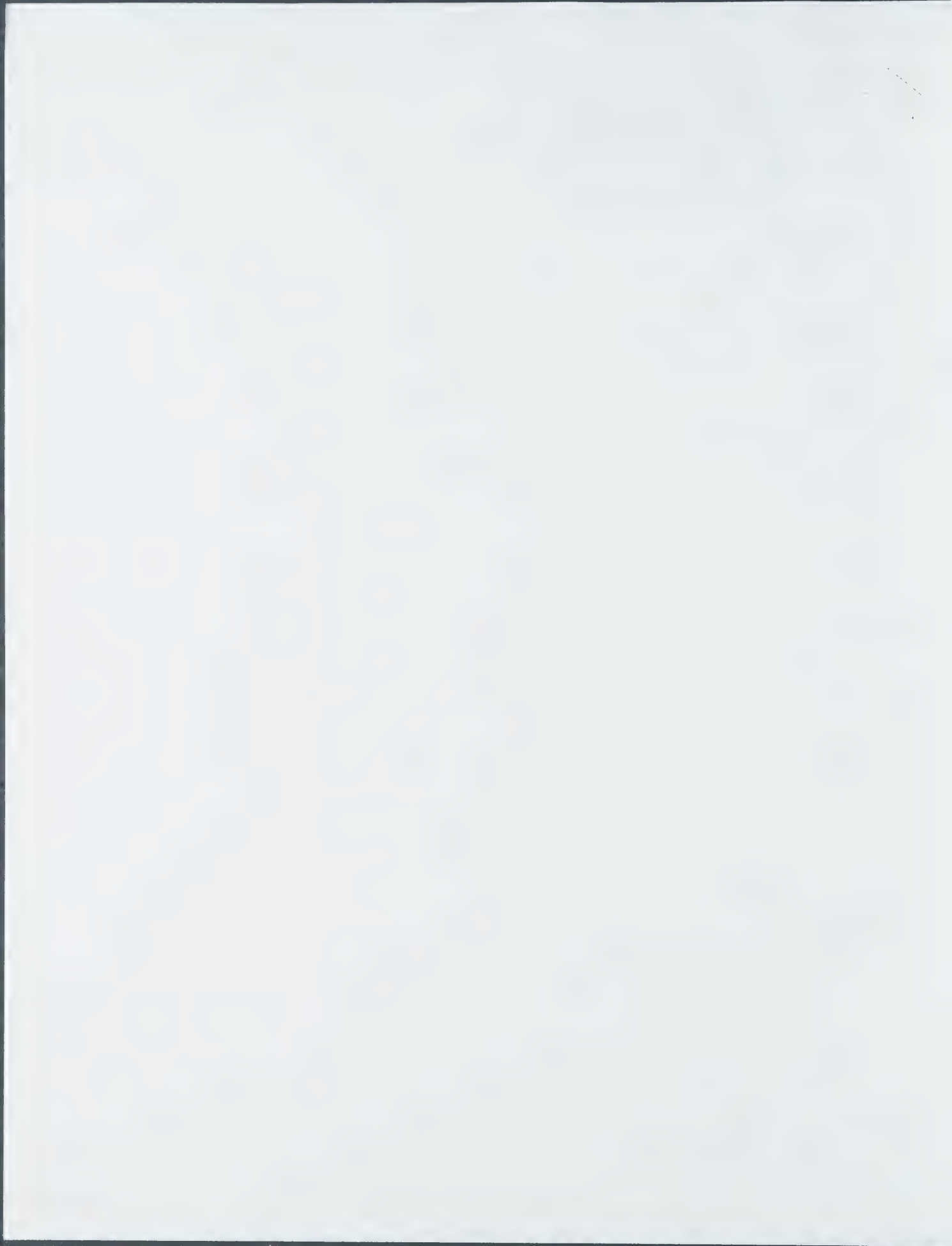

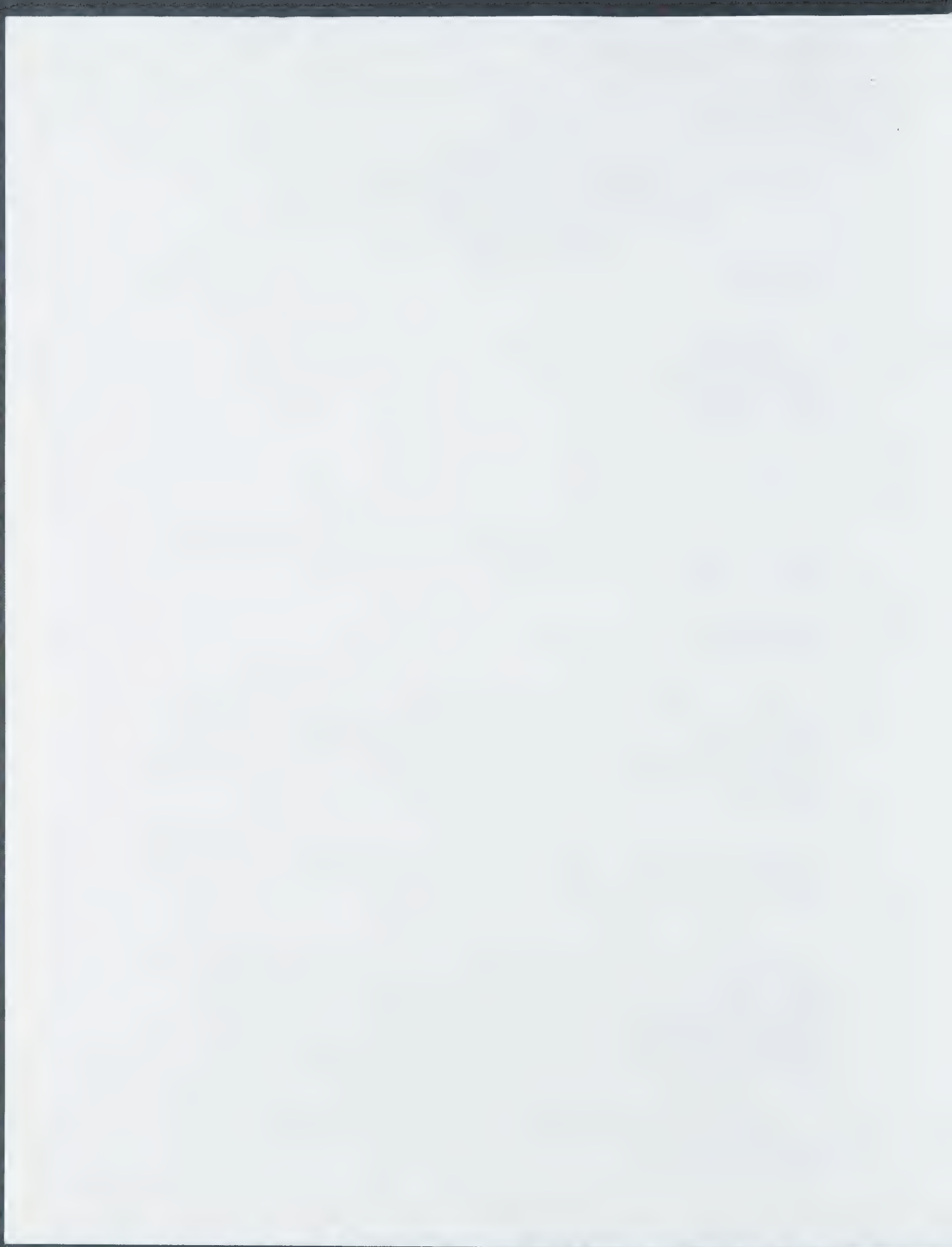
#### THE BADER CHEMISTRY PRIZE

Dr. Paleta seems to be more "with the program" (as we used to say in the American Army) than before. The Bader Prize Competition for the year 2000 has been announced in the Bulletin of the Czech Chemical Society, and a press release for the public media (as required by Czech law) is ready, he told me. Financial affairs, such as the bill for last year sent to the Foundation for a Civil Society, are being handled by the Secretary of the Czech Chemistry Society and not by Dr. Paleta.

The Bader Award Selection Committee has been reconstituted, he said, so that it now includes 10-11 synthetic chemists as opposed to persons from any and all areas of organic chemistry. Presumably this renders the Committee better qualified to chose a chemist who meets the eligibility criteria.

I tried to review with Dr. Paleta to what extent the actual administration of the Prize meets the conditions set down (attached), in particular the requirement for an English-language article to be published based on the Prize Winner's speech at the award ceremony. From what I could gather, an article by the winner is published in Czech in "Chemicke Listy" within the year following the award, perhaps with a summary in English. Unclear if the article is always based on the award speech. I asked Dr. Paleta to inform me specifically how this condition has been met until now.

Dr. Paleta will also send a list of the past Bader Prize winners and let us know what they are doing now.

This last point took on special importance when I met later with Dr. Nic. A Czech venture capitalist intrigued by Internet software developed (as an avocation until now) by Dr. Nic has set up a company to make the most of his IT talents. Dr. Nic told me he is now or soon will be directing a team of 50 computer specialists. Now it is chemistry that has become something of an avocation for him; he retains his chemistry research group as a sideline.

NADACE VIA - ROMANI AID

I was most pleased with my meeting with Tana Hlavata and her colleague Julia Szanton of Nadace Via. First, they have come to accept and endorse the very suggestions I had tried to get across earlier: to concentrate on fewer organizations and try to build them up for the long haul. Second, they responded well to the comments I received from a Jewish-Romani activist whom I have known for some years. They would welcome his suggestions as to who should be a member of the Peer Committee that recommends the grant recipients. They also invited me to meet with the Peer Committee the next time I come to Prague. Alfred, I would like to see you continue with this group in the future as I can see the potential of having a wider impact on the way they approach grant giving.

Nadace Via will be sending a letter setting out just how they plan to implement the grant this year, including how any changes have or have not been coordinated by them with Mr. Kaneb.

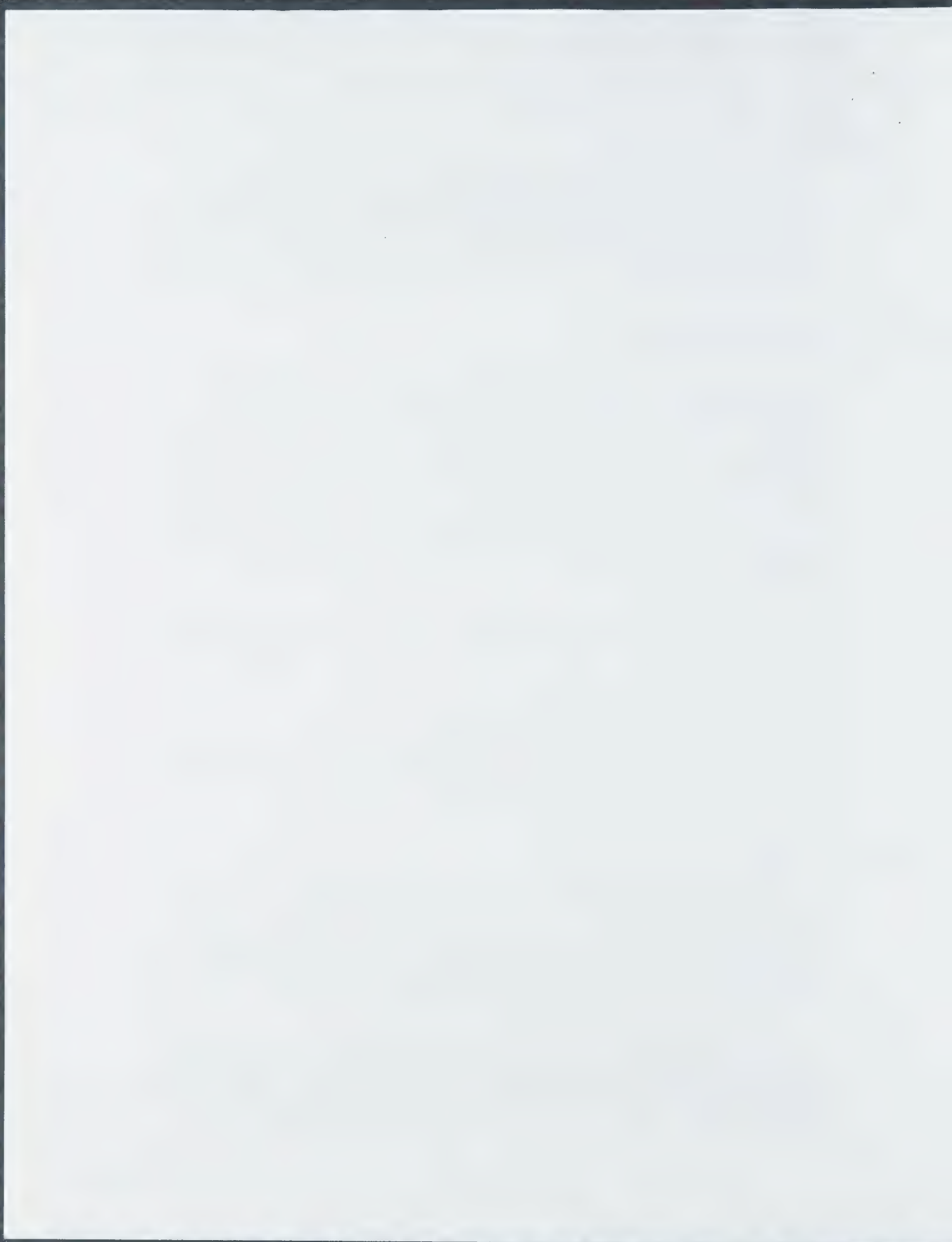
YOUR CORRESPONDENCE WITH Mr. KANEB

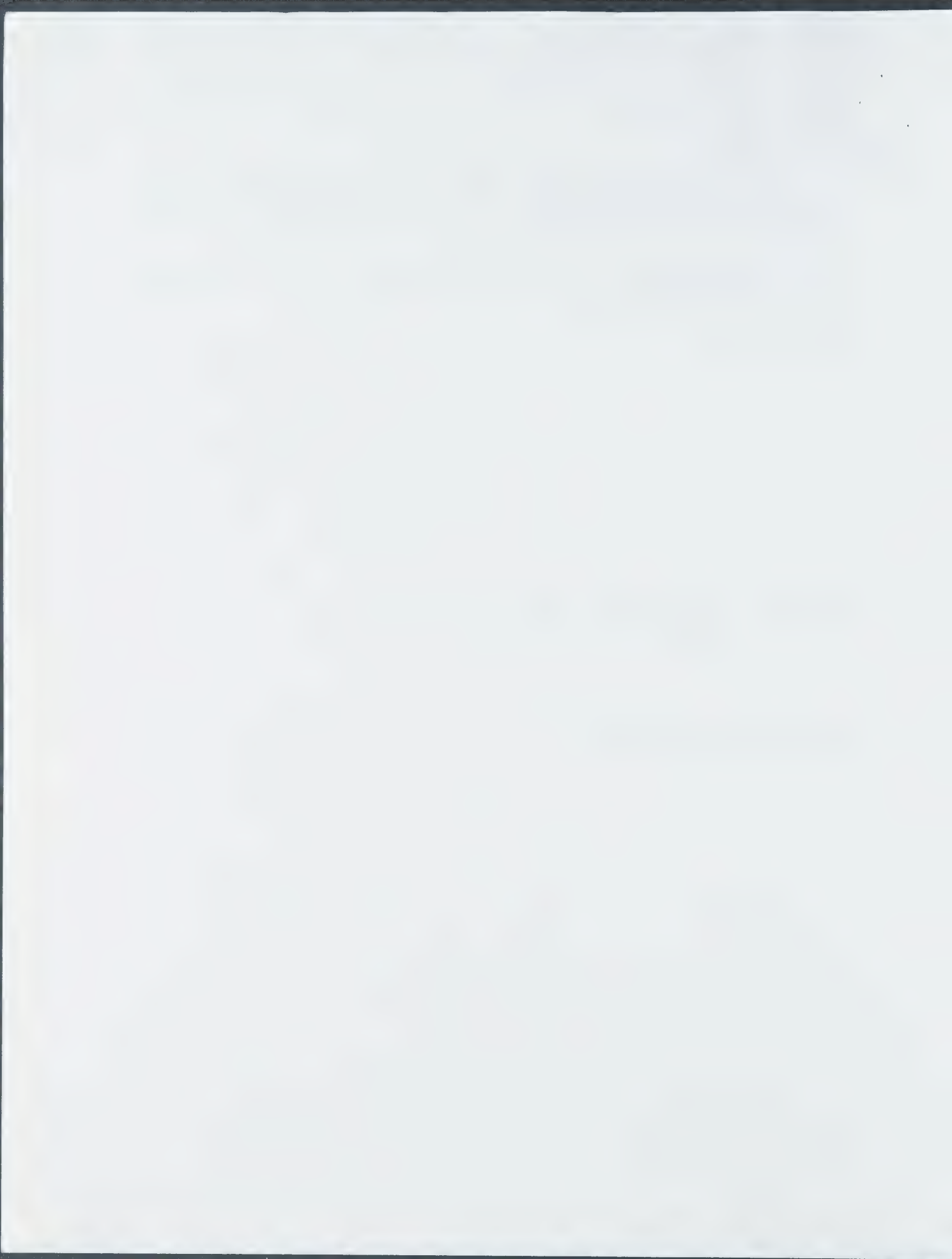

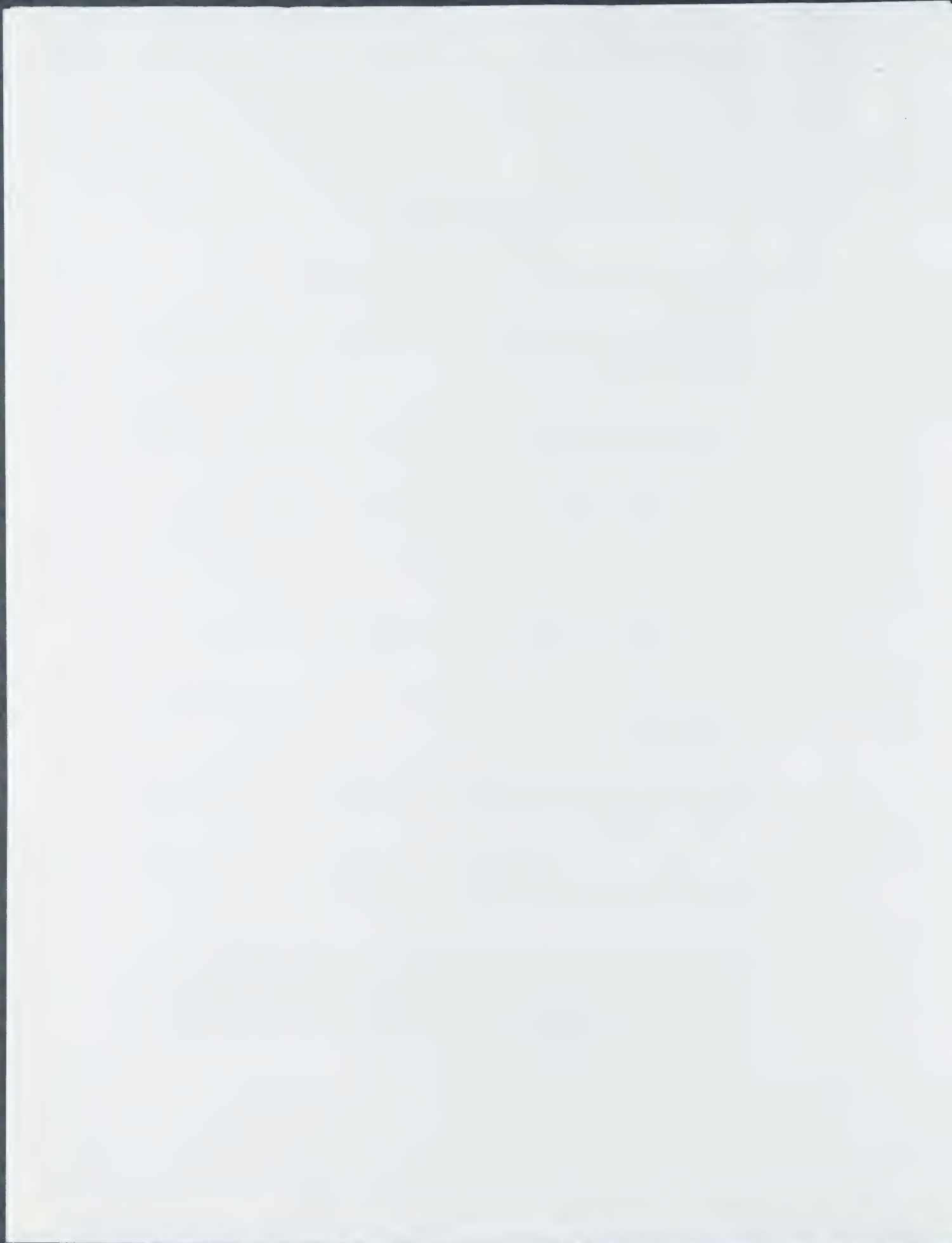

## The Alfred Bader Award (Established 1994)

1. The Award shall be known as *the Alfred Bader Award*.
2. The Award will be presented as a mark of distinction and recognition to a scientist with the Czech citizenship for excellence in research in organic and bioorganic chemistry.
3. The scientist shall not have reached the age of 35 years by the application / nomination deadline of the year in which the nomination becomes effective.
4. The award shall be presented annually unless the Award Committee considers that no suitable candidate has been nominated or applied.
5. The Award Committee shall be nominated by the Czech Chemical Society.
6. The Award shall be presented at the suitable convention of the Czech Chemical Society. The recipient will be required to present an award address at the meeting.
7. A paper based on the award address should be submitted in English to a journal of the Czech Chemical Society.
8. The Award shall consist of a prize of CZK 100 000.- and a scroll. The recipient will also receive travell expenses to attend the convention (within the Czech Republic only).
9. The funds to endow this award have been provided by Alfred Bader. The administration of these funds shall be the responsibility of the Czech Chemical Society.
10. Applications for the Award shall be submitted in writing through the Secretariat of the Czech Chemical Society. Entries should be submitted by the published deadline and shall consist of description of the contributions of the nominee, biographical sketch and papers reprints. References, and supporting documents are welcomed.

PRAGUE — A fisherman found Charles Jordan's slumped corpse bumping against a weir on Prague's Vltava River, four days after Mr. Jordan had slipped out of his hotel room on a hot August night to buy cigarettes.

Jordan had devoted his life to helping Jews, and later Asians, Vietnamese and other refugees, to flee the fascist, communist and the conflicts that convulsed the 20th century. As a senior official of the American Joint Distribution Committee, one of the world's humanitarian aid organizations, he cut a dashing and dapper figure, using his tough negotiating skills and a check-and-balance dagger to save scores of thousands and others.

Reports suggested that shadowy Middle Eastern groups had had a hand in his death, but three investigations after the collapse of the Communist ruled, or why his body ended up floating in the muddy waters.

Europe section, was an 18-year-old survivor of the Budapest ghetto and an active young Zionist when Mr. Jordan came to Budapest in 1940.

Mr. Rich's Budapest apartment was the final Hungarian station on an underground railroad, organized by Mr. Jordan to send young Zionists through safe houses in Communist Czechoslovakia and on to Allied-occupied Austria.

"I said, 'Thank you, Charles Jordan,'" on finally arriving in Vienna, Mr. Rich recalled last week.

When the Communists dismantled the escape route Mr. Jordan was expelled from Hungary and had earned the growing ire of the region's Communist regimes, who considered him little more than a spy.

The joint distribution committee, with its ties to the United States and Israel, "was quite logically considered to be one of the main tools of the Western imperialists and Zionist spies in their attempts to infiltrate the new Stalinist regimes," Mr. Rich said.

During the 1960s, Mr. Jordan negotiated the secret emigration to Israel of Jews from North Africa and the Middle East, closing obscure deals with governments of neutral countries to cover the Jews' real destination.

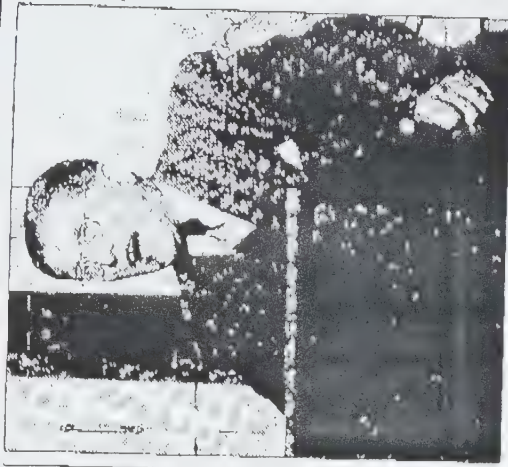
In 1965, he negotiated the emigration of 40,000 Hungarian Jews to Israel, and in 1966, he won the release of Romania's Jewish population from the Communist dictator Nicolae Ceausescu.

By the time he began what would be his last tour of Eastern Europe, Mr. Jordan was no friend of the local Communist regimes. Israel had beaten its Arab neighbors in the Six-Day War of 1967, Czechoslovakia had shut Israel's embassy and local Arabs were demonstrating against Israel in the streets of Prague.

Mr. Jordan's nephew, Paul Kaplan, was a 20-year-old student traveling with his uncle that summer. Searching for clues to his uncle's death, he recalled last week how nervous Mr. Jordan appeared on a drive in Romania.

"He became agitated and looked through the back window of the car," Mr. Kaplan said. "Do you realize what's going on," he asked me. For the life of me, I never caught on. To this day it remains a mystery what he was talking about."

Mr. Kaplan also recalls that his uncle, a passionate stamp collector, left their Bucharest hotel one night to meet a fellow collector. Some observers suggested that he could have used valuable stamps as a way to clandestinely transfer money for Jews caught behind the Iron Curtain.

the Arabs as a "present" to avenge their defeat in the Six-Day War, but no hard evidence has emerged to support this account.

His colleagues have been unable to weave together a chronology of Mr. Jordan's last days, and the police spokesman, Mr. Srb, says too many files have disappeared to make it probable that an answer will ever be found.

But the joint distribution committee has remained active in the former Communist bloc, helping the vestigial Jewish communities rebuild after four decades and more of communism, and during the wars to the former Yugoslavia, helping refugees of all creeds to escape the fighting and rebuild their lives.

"If you can help your own, then you can help others," said Yechiel Bar Chaim, Mr. Jordan's successor as the joint distribution committee's director for the Czech Republic and much of the Balkans. "We couldn't be giving our meals right now to Gypsies in Serbia without having first built up an organization to give meals to Jews in Yugoslavia."

What Mr. Jordan did, and what the joint distribution committee still does, Mr. Bar Chaim said, reflects the saying of Rabbi Hillel, an ancient Jewish sage. "If I am not for myself, who will be? If I am only for myself, what am I?"

Charles Jordan 'sometimes skated close to the edge' in his efforts to help Jews and other refugees.

The Czech police ruled the death a suicide. They agreed to an independent autopsy, but when a Swiss pathologist arrived, he found that the body had already been examined and was unable to determine how or where Mr. Jordan died.

The Swiss pathologist died mysteriously a few months later. He was found frozen a few meters from his car in the Alps.

IN THE POST-COMMUNIST ERA, investigators reopened the case three times, but many files have disappeared since 1967 and they still have no answers.

"The case is closed, unresolved," said Jan Srb, a police spokesman.

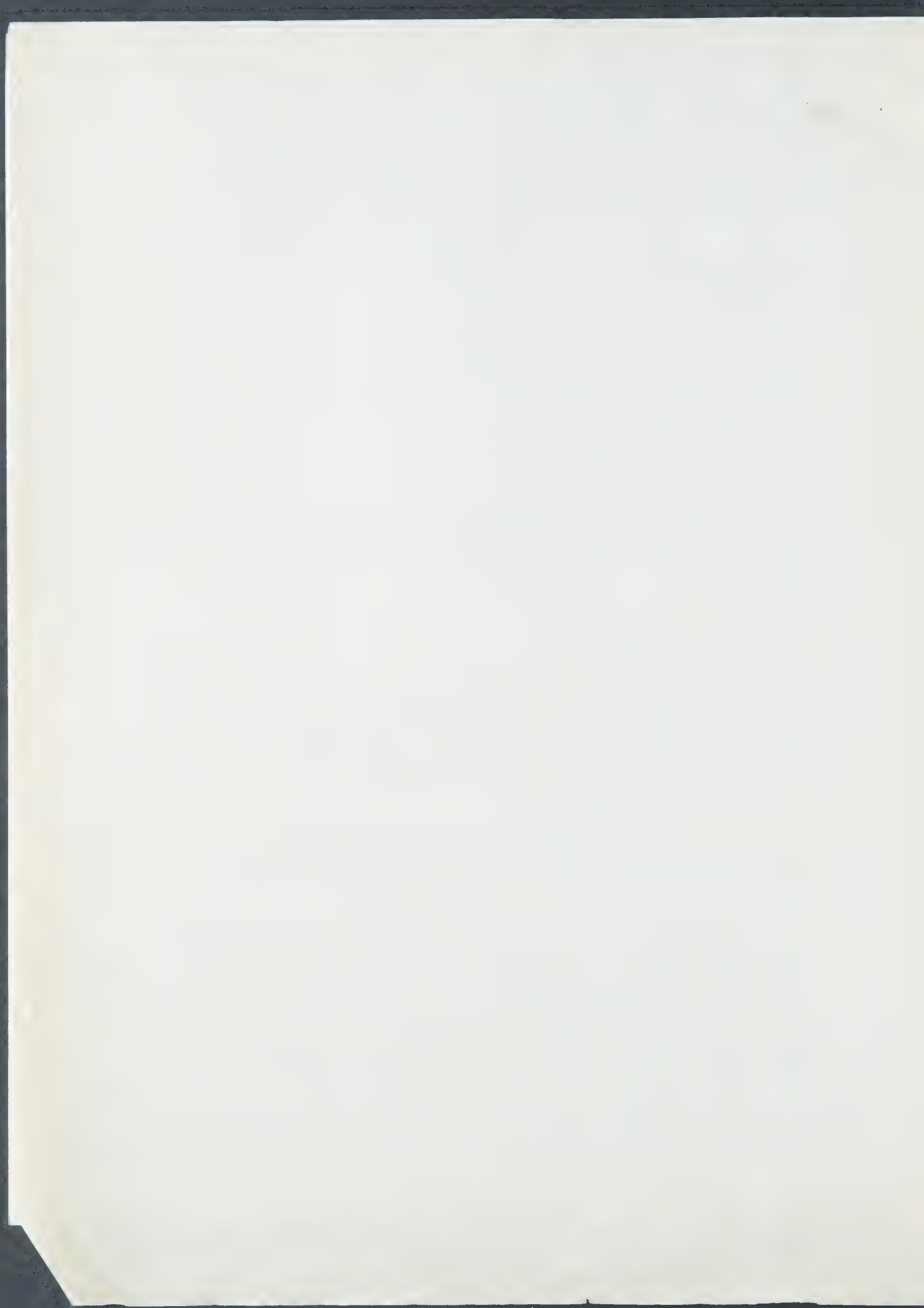
Just what Mr. Jordan was doing in Prague in 1967 is still not known. He said he was on a private trip with his wife. Some reports suggested that Mr. Jordan died in a stamp smuggling deal gone awry. Others, that he was mistaken for a police officer.

The most convincing account came from Josef Frolik, a Czechoslovak spy who defected to the United States.

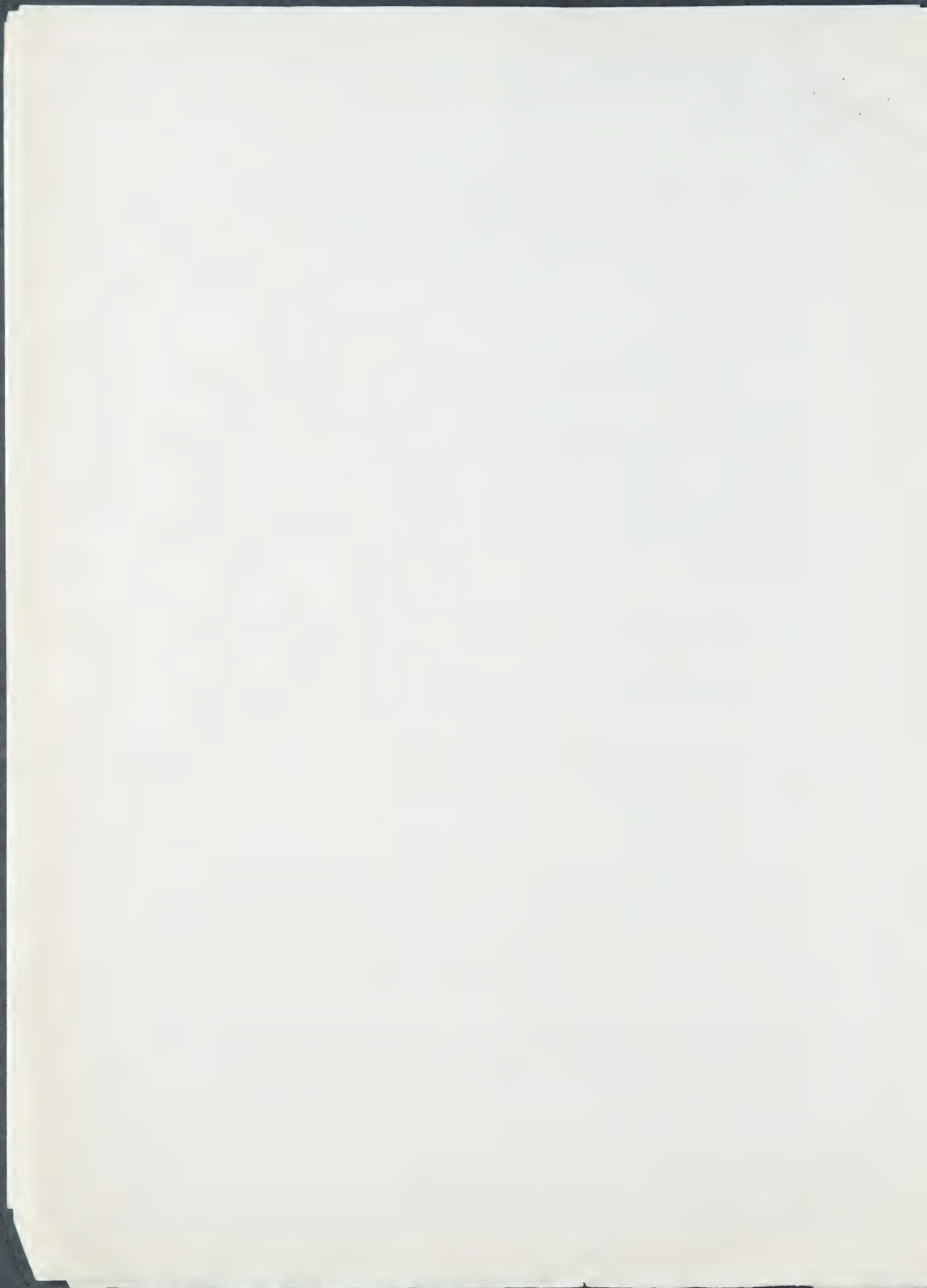

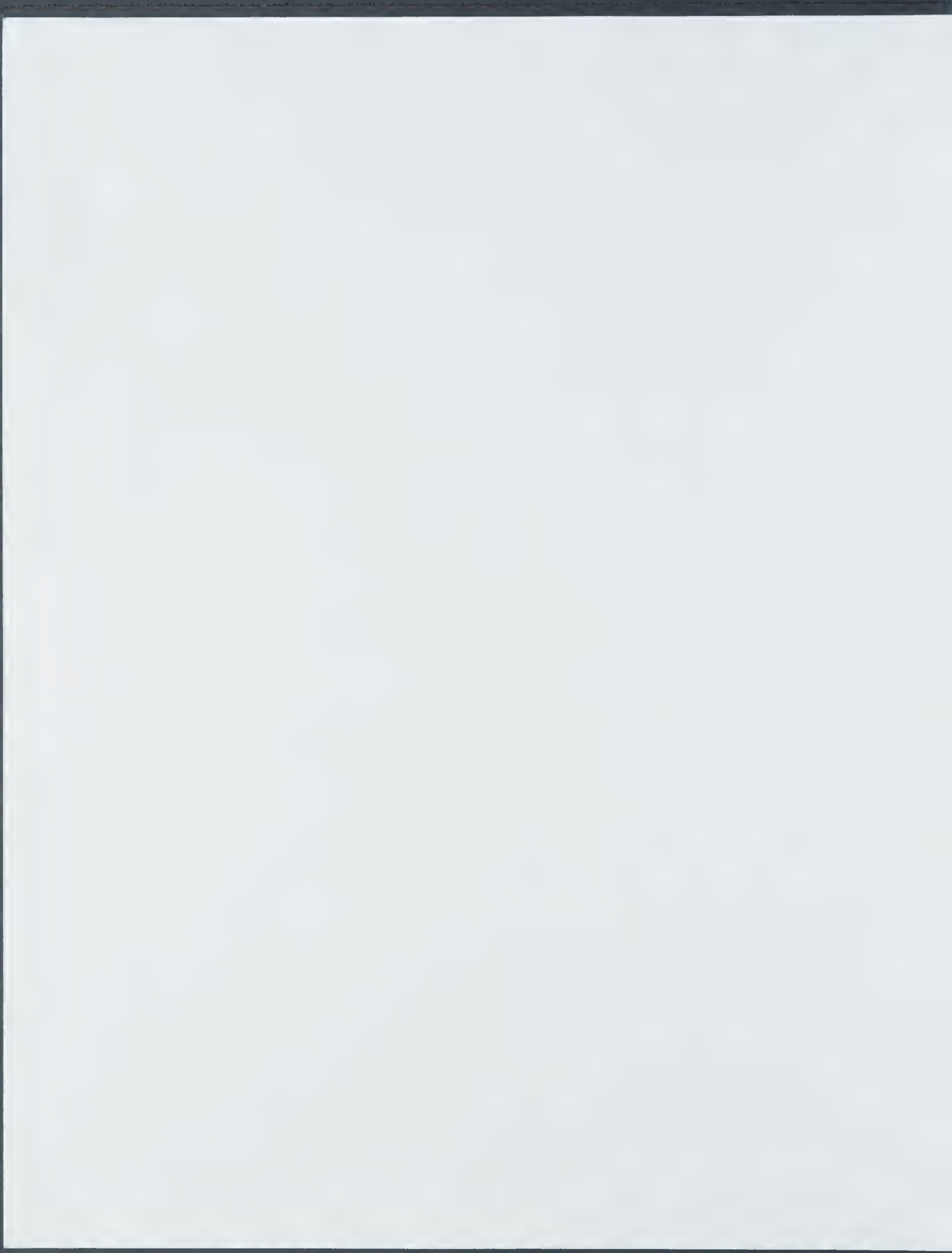

Therefore my recommendation would be to search for a different charity, more capable of meeting professional ethical standards.

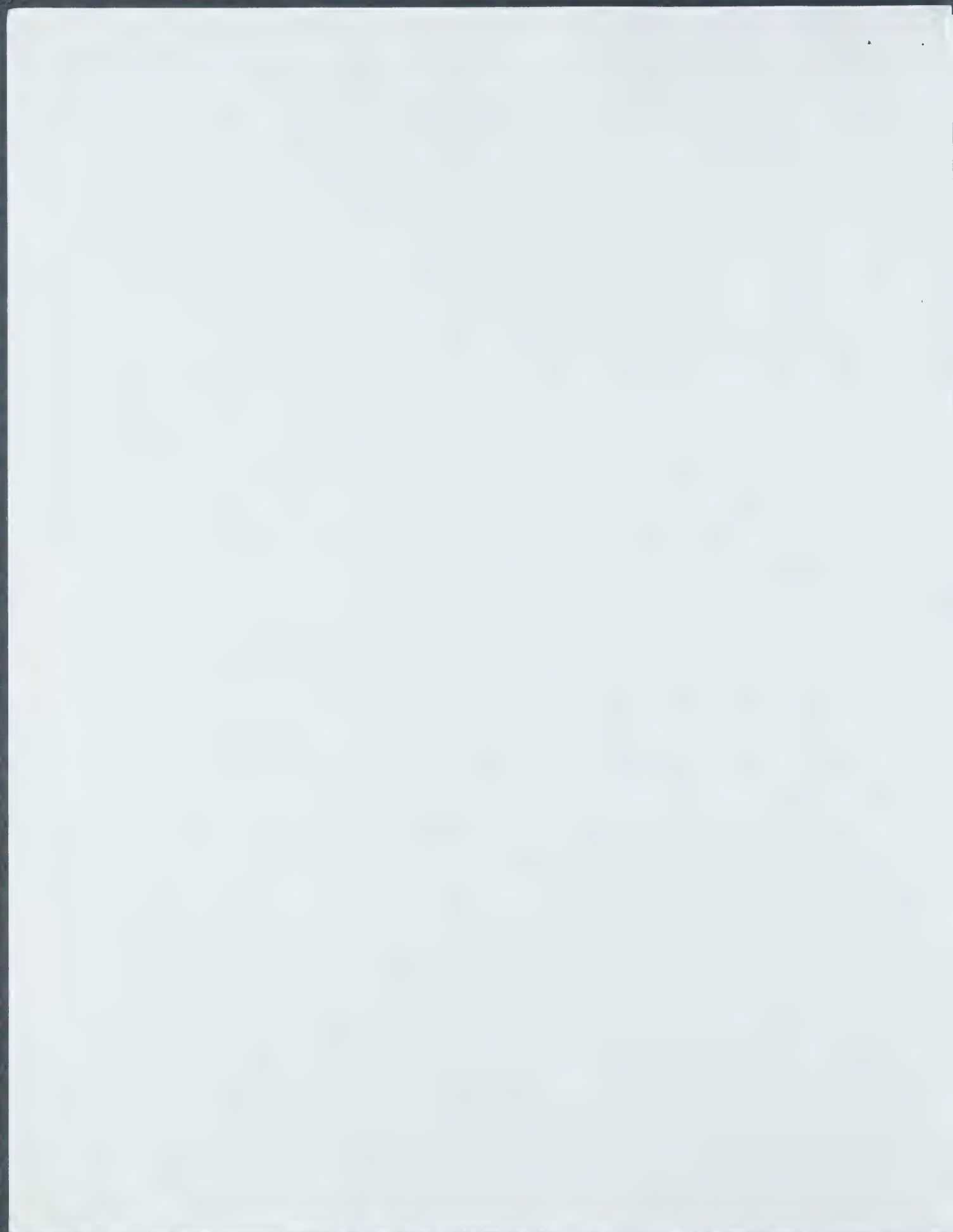

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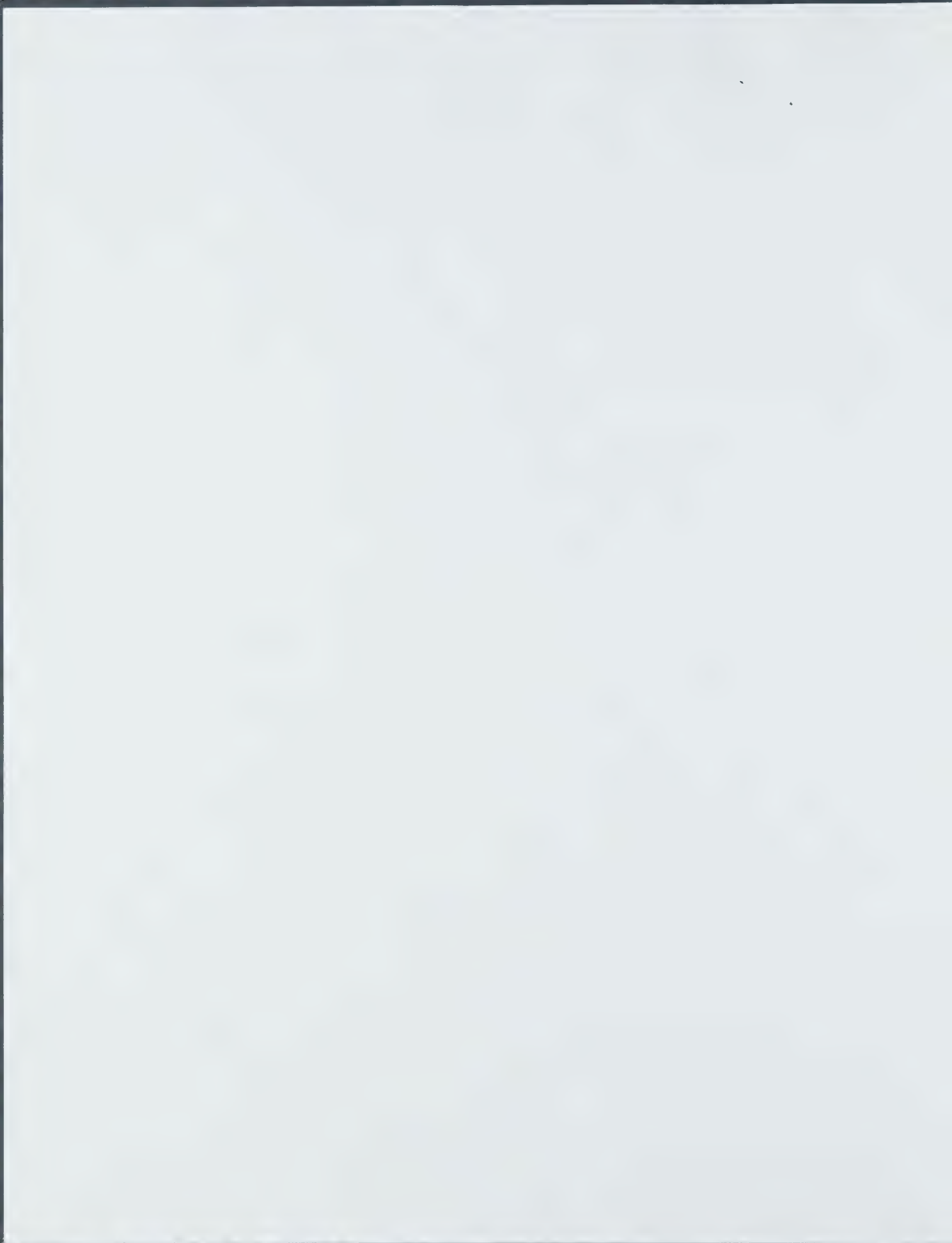
I am happy to know from your fax of today that your assistant, Mrs. Keil, speaks German.

- FCS forwarded 110,000 Kč (c. \$3,212) to the Czech Chemical Society who will present Dr. Vladimír Havlíček with the third annual 1997 Alfred Bader Award for Young Czech Chemists. The award ceremony will be held at the Liblice Chateau in October. Zdenka Krejčová or another FCS representative will present the award at the ceremony.
- Applicants are currently being considered for the 1998 Chemistry Award.

### II. Bader Chemistry Fellowship Program

- An advertising campaign is underway for next year's fellowships.
- Milan Chytil, a current Bader Fellow at Harvard, will be traveling to the Czech Republic October 7-28 to speak at various universities and institutes around the country to promote the Bader Fellowship Program.
- On 9/18/97, the Foundation's Executive Committee approved Dr. Bader's proposal to provide additional grants to Bader Fellows. These grants would be intended for Bader Fellows who are returning to the Czech Republic to accept positions at academic or research institutions. The Prague office is currently researching the logistics and legalities of extending the Bader grants in this way. Should this be possible, the first of these grants will be awarded to Milošlav Nič at the Institute of Chemical Technology (VSCHT) in Prague.

Funding: Grants to Bader Fellows are not currently provided through FCS; the extension grants would most likely be facilitated by FCS although the details must still be worked out.

A \$10,000 gift to Chemistry in Brno was a one time gift which I made to help a young professor there.

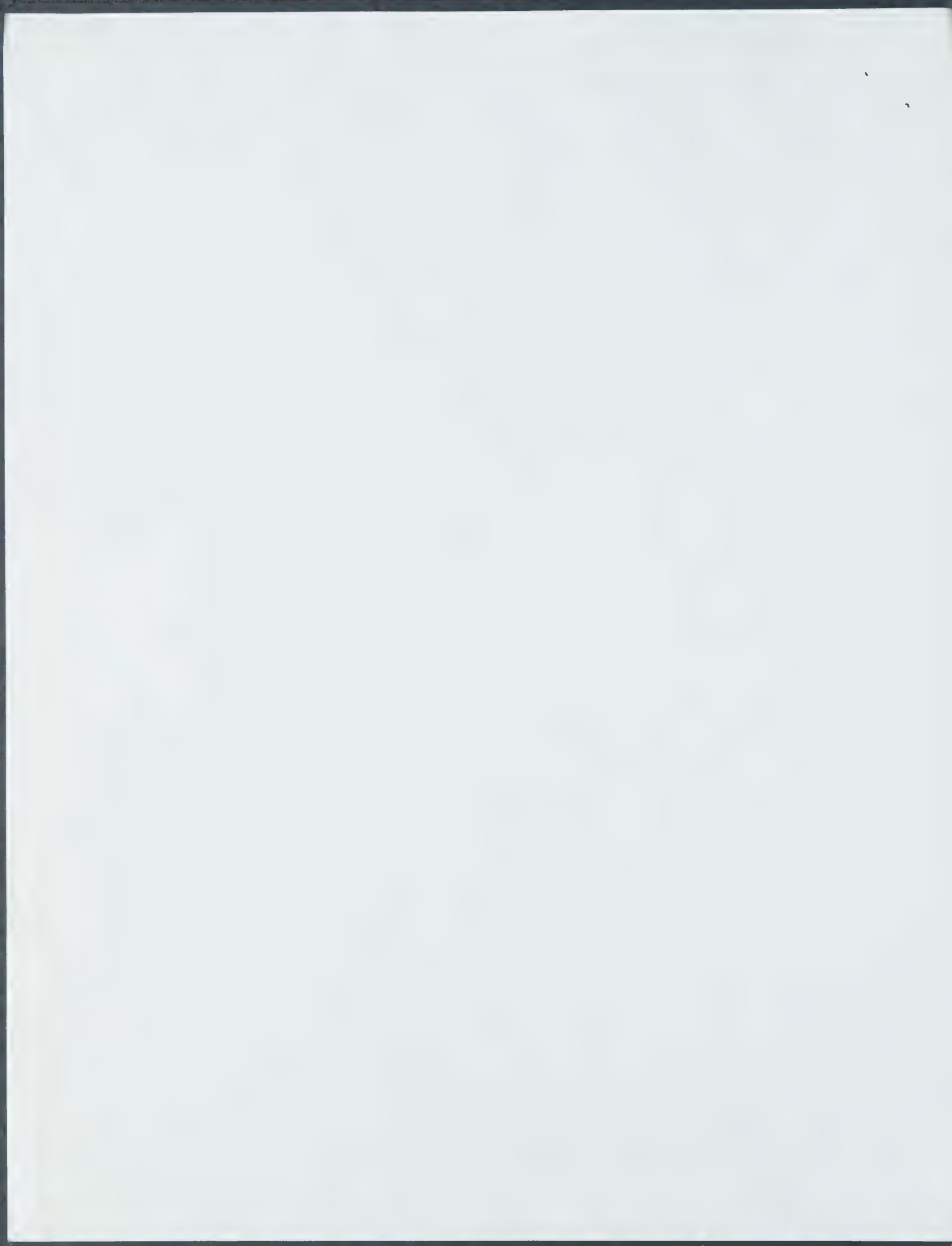

Please excuse the delay in responding to your letter of December 31, 1998 which arrived on January 4th, no doubt because of the "Season's Greetings" rush.

I would be very happy to spend some time with you in the last week of January. The best days for me are either Tuesday, January 26th, or Thursday, January 28th. I suggest that you and your wife could come to our offices for a briefing by staff, and perhaps we could have dinner together the same evening. Please have your office call my assistant, Tzivia Bieler, who will be happy to make whatever arrangements are necessary. Her direct telephone number is 212-885-0812.

I have, in fact, been in touch with the World Jewish Relief (WJR) leadership, particularly Ashley Mitchell, and I am trying to give him some advice. I think Warren feels he is ready for another challenge and Eli feels he will not be considered for the top job. World Jewish Relief is currently searching for a new Director. We are trying to be helpful in their search.

At present, WJR is focusing a large part of its budget on hunger relief in the Former Soviet Union, channeled via JDC. It also sponsors economic development and community organization in Bulgaria. Designated gifts are channeled separately by WJR to whichever agency is most suited to execute the project.

Thank you so much for the two checks. As you requested, \$36,000 will be designated towards non-sectarian work in Bulgaria and \$30,000 towards the orphanage in Odessa. As always, I am grateful to you for your gifts and for your interest in our work. Incidentally, you are correct about Bulgaria during the war. It was the Bulgarians in Macedonia who were compliant with the Nazis.

The Joint Distribution Committee receives its funds chiefly from American Jewry through the United Jewish Appeal/Federation Campaigns. The JDC also receives smaller amounts from the World Jewish Relief and communities in Europe.

Meanwhile, we carry on here with whatever life and history bring us. We are now providing relief for 175,000 elderly Jews in the Former Soviet Union. We are watching the political situation as well and are preparing contingencies in case things worsen and we are expelled. This is a plan, not a prediction.

We are providing relief in Ethiopia for several thousand so-called Felas Mora -- Jews who converted to Christianity several generations ago. They now want to go to Israel, have sold their meager land and possessions and have transformed themselves from a relatively self-sufficient agrarian community to a population of urban slum-dwellers. Eventually, if Israel rejects them, a way will have to be found to get them back on the land again.

We are also in the process of negotiating how much should be used from Swiss Banks on services to the aged poor survivors around the world. This sum could be substantial and will provide us with much needed financial relief. But there is a long way to the end of this affair -- lawyers getting into the act, etc.

We can, of course, discuss more when we meet; I look forward to seeing you at the end of the month.

It was a pleasure to meet you last Thursday, if only for a short time. I hope your trip back home was comfortable.

As promised I am sending you the book you were interested in on the Kindertransport. I am in the process of reading your autobiography, which is proving quite fascinating, and I thank you for suggesting we trade books.

It was interesting hearing your views on the causes that we support. I am pleased to be able to learn which projects attract you. In this way, I can keep you informed should something of particular relevance come up.

The cause I believe appealed to you most during our discussion, was the Children's Homes in Dnepropetrovsk. Please find attached further details on these Homes. As you will see from their expenditure budget, they run a tight ship, which is accountable to their donors for every last penny. Dear Mr. Bar-Chaim,

I promised to tell you a little bit more about our efforts in the Czech Republic.

As I understand it, the Art History scholarships are now in place and we can depend on Dr. Bartlova to do a very good job. She is an able art historian, I have given her personally a number of travel grants and she is the daughter of that very great first Czech Ambassador to Washington, the late Rita Klimova.

Every three years I would like to give the Czech Chemical Society the funds needed for three successive 100,000 Crown awards. Professor Paleta is very much of a politician and I do not think that he is very reliable.

When next you are in Prague you might like to chat with the first Bader Fellow to return to the Czech Republic to an academic position at the Technical University, the same institute where Professor Paleta teaches. Do chat with this first Bader Fellow, Ph.D. from Imperial College in London, Dr. Nic.

In order to help Bader Fellows find positions in the Czech Republic we have pledged \$30,000 per Fellow returning to a Czech academic position. Dr. Nic was the first Fellow to receive this, and the \$30,000 is in place. The understanding is that the Universities take 10%, that is, \$1,000 per year, and the returning Fellows get \$9,000 a year, to be used to help their students.

You will enjoy talking to Dr. Nic, whom I trust completely.

I am an organic chemist and hence want the Bader Award, 100,000 Czech Crowns per year, to go to an organic chemist. I do not buy the argument that the Czech Republic is a small country and so finds it difficult to give this award annually. To me this is nonsense and it is completely politically inspired. An even worse case of such politics is the story about Sheffield University on p.260 of my autobiography.

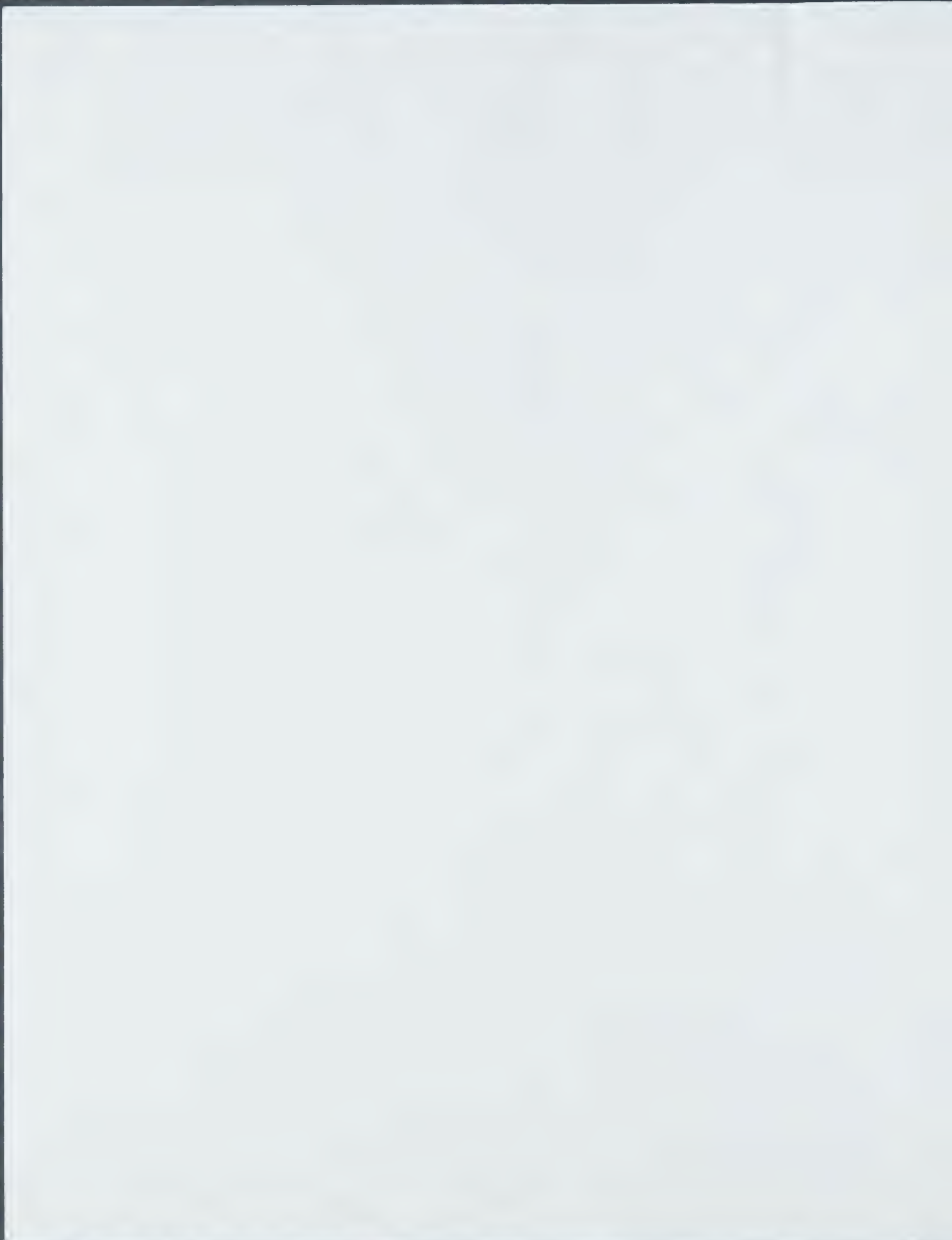
Regarding the help to the Czech Romas, I do want to continue my help through the Nadace Via for one more year simply because I promised it.

I did not realize that the Nadace Via takes 12% on top of the 20% demanded by the Foundation for a Civil Society.

Probably during our visit in London you will be able to suggest alternate and probably better ways of helping Romas in the Czech Republic. Please keep in mind that I would like to help Romas in the Czech Republic and, at this point, not in other countries. Of course you will ask why, and the answer is that I feel a special kinship with the Czech people and am embarrassed that many of them have treated the Romas so badly.

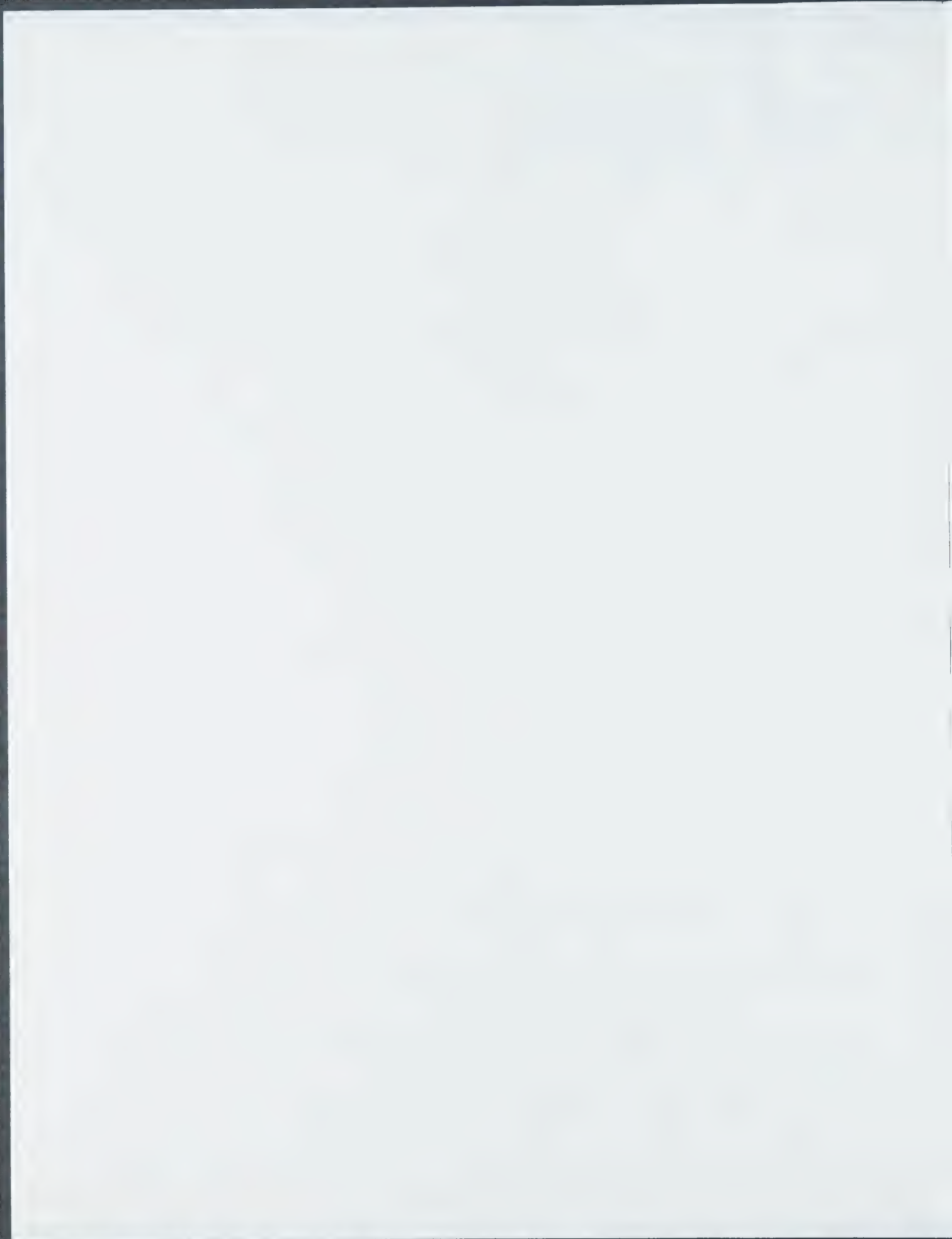
I am sorry that a lecture tour to the South has delayed my responding to your e-mail of October 8.

I have just had a long telephone conversation with Dr. Milena Bartlova in Prague to resolve our misunderstanding about art historical scholarships.

My understanding during our meeting with Dr. Bartlova in Prague last June was that we would fund three undergraduate scholarships of \$5,000 each.

Then, if sometime in the future there was a really able Czech student in Art History who could benefit from a \$15,000 one year fellowship, we would give that \$15,000 in addition to the 3 x \$5,000 for undergraduates.

However, it appears now that there is no such student for the graduate fellowship, but Dr. Bartlova believes that there will be three

undergraduates who could benefit greatly from the \$5,000 scholarships.

We agreed that Dr. Bartlova would work with the Czech Association of Art Historians which is quite a small group, to advertise the availability of the \$5,000 scholarships. Dr. Bartlova told me that an additional \$1,000 would cover the cost of advertisements for these scholarships and other out of pocket expenses.

Thus, we would like to ask the Joint to accept from me \$16,000 for the three undergraduate scholarships and expenses.

Then, Dr. Bartlova will share with the Czech Association of Art Historians the fact that if in the future there will be graduate students who could really benefit from the annual \$15,000 fellowship, we will be informed and will consider giving the funds for that.

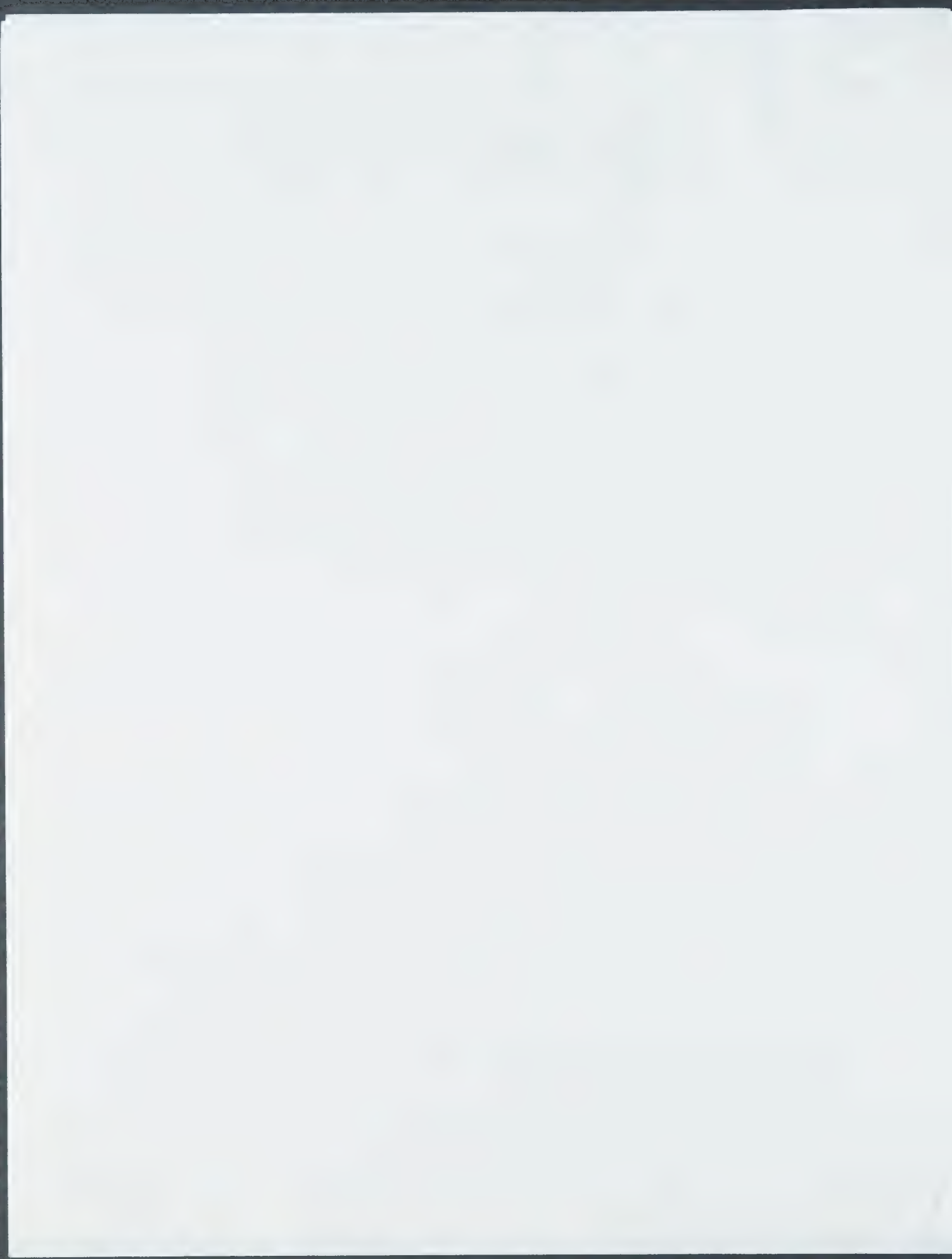
We must remember that there are not very many art historians in the Czech Republic and quite a few of those are not really interested in Baroque, that is 17th century, art.

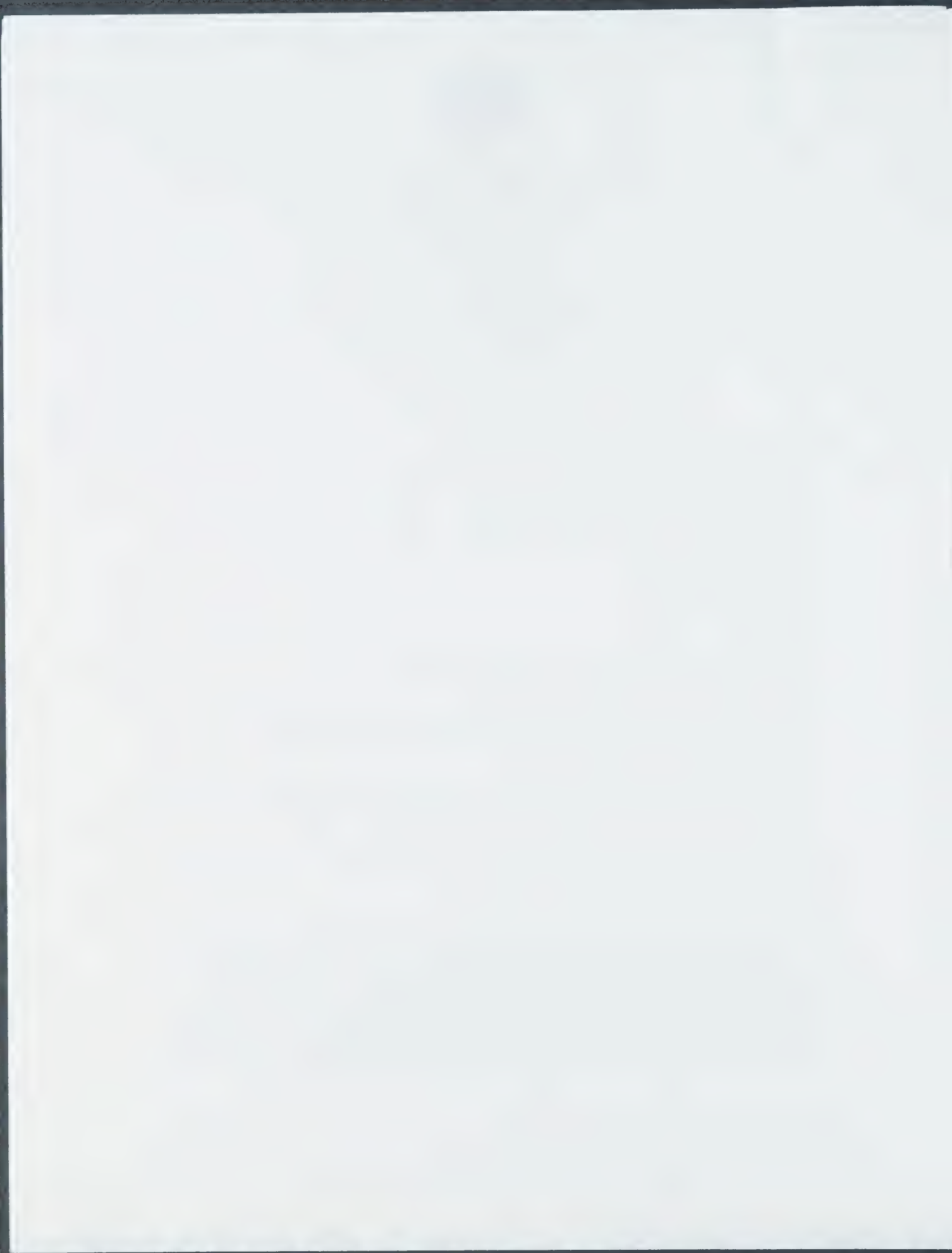
Thank you so much for your letter of October 18<sup>th</sup>.

I was of course very saddened by the death notice of Professor Herout, who helped Aldrich with interesting compounds over very many years.

I am happy to note that Dr. Hocek has won this year's Bader Award. There is certainly no question that he is an able organic chemist and the one paper of his which I have read on the synthesis of purines shows his ability.

I do not think there is any great harm in the fact that at the moment only two chemists applied for this year's award.

Please remember that I am an organic chemist and I very much want to help organic chemists. I understand of course that the Czech Republic is a small country, but I do believe that the number of really able organic chemists will increase gradually. As you know, we have established fellowships at four Universities, specifically for Czech chemists to get their Ph.D.'s at Columbia, the University of Pennsylvania, Harvard and Imperial College. You know that the first Bader Fellow, Dr. Nic, has returned to Prague to teach at your

University. You also know that we are encouraging Czech Universities to support Bader Fellows by giving them three annual grants of \$10,000 per Fellow. Surely that will increase the number of organic chemists, as will many other factors. Naturally, we will be really happy when the first Bader Fellows win the Bader Awards.

If, at the end of the day, however, the Czech Chemical Society should decide that it cannot give the Award to organic chemists, then we should just stop it. In the future you could ask either Isabel or me (if we are still alive) to reinstate the Award when the time is right.

As you know, the Foundation for a Civil Society is essentially ceasing its efforts. But we have found that the American Joint Distribution Committee is willing to help us and would pass on the 300,000 Czech Crowns required every three years. Of course it is the Czech Chemical Society and not the Joint that must make the selection.

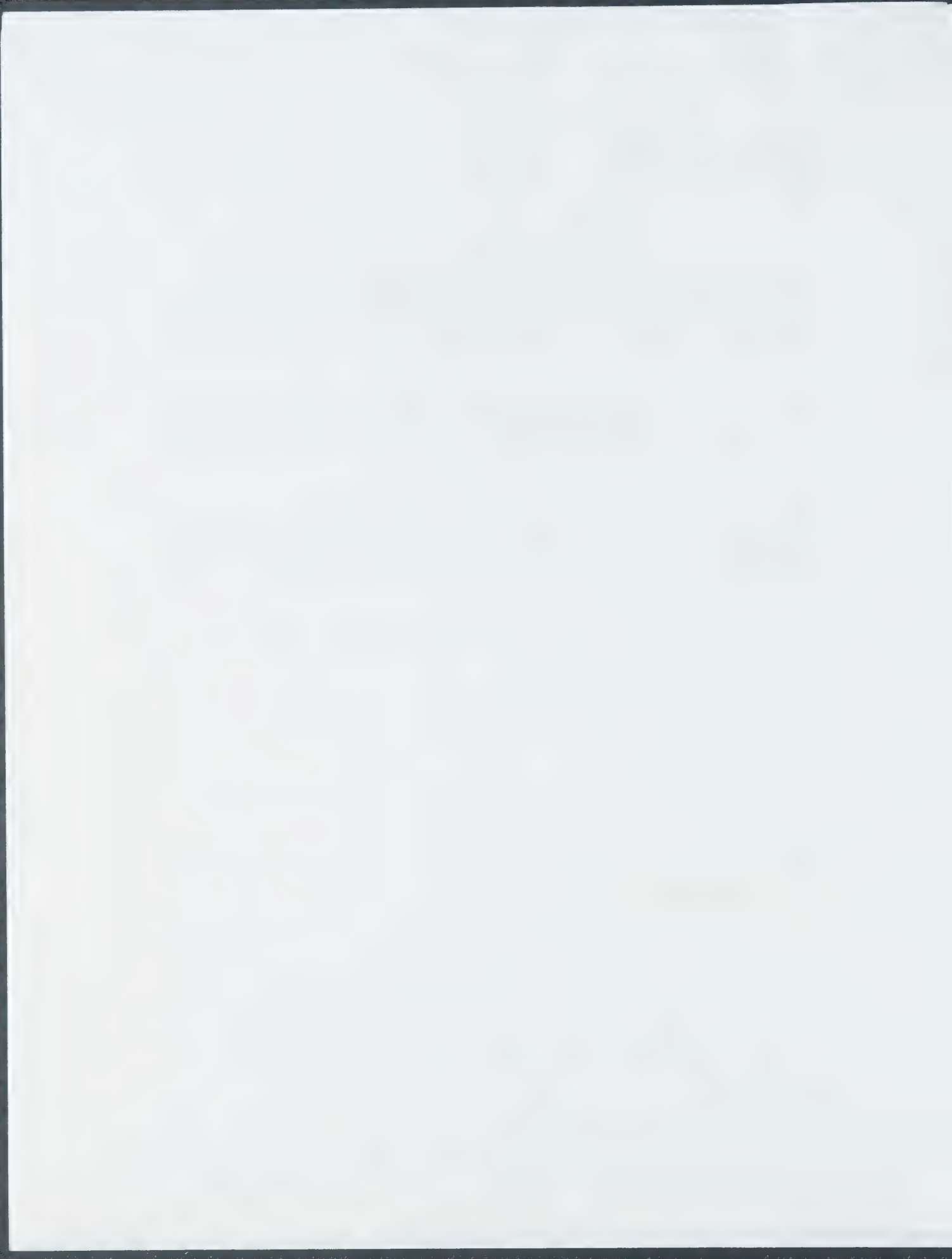

Dear Dr. Bader:

I have the pleasure to inform you that the „Alfred Bader Award“ for year 1999 received Dipl. Ing. Michal Hocek CSc. (age 30) from the Institute of Organic Chemistry and Biochemistry, Czech Academy of Sciences, Prague 6, present editor-in-chief of The Collection of the Czechosl. Chem. Commun. I enclose a list of his original papers. He was selected as the better among two applicants by majority (5:3) of the members of the „Bader Commission“. This is in fact the same situation as in the last year: optically they were three applicants, but one was a PhD student not able to compete really with the other two applicants.

The Award will be given to Dr. Hocek at the conference „Advances in Organic, Bioorganic and Pharmaceutical Chemistry“ which is held on Nov. 15-17, 1999, Chateau Liblice. The winner will give a lecture at the Conference about the work that was awarded.

It seems to me that the potential candidates select themselves and apply only in situation when the receiving of the Award is most probable. We are a small country and the potential candidates know one another and also know the results of the rivals as they meet at national conferences. In addition, the potential competition is decreased, as great parts of research topics at organic chemistry departments in Pardubice and Masaryk University in Brno cannot compete: in Pardubice, a great part of the Department is involved in a modern study of substitution effects and in Brno, a great group is studying NMR effects on synthesized model compounds.

The commission for the Award would like to suggest you to include these topics into ones that are allowed to compete for the Prize.

I was contacted by Mr. Yechiel Bar-Chaim (The American Joint Distribution Committee, Paris) who visited Prague in early September.

I enclose a copy of the death notice of Prof. Herout and a copy of article on CChS Alfred Bader Award 1998 (I am not sure whether I already had sent it to you).

Michalu Hoskovcovi, CSc.** (35 let) z Ústavu organické chemie a biochemie AV ČR v Praze. Předložený soubor prací se týkal chemie feromonů. Slavnostní předání Ceny,

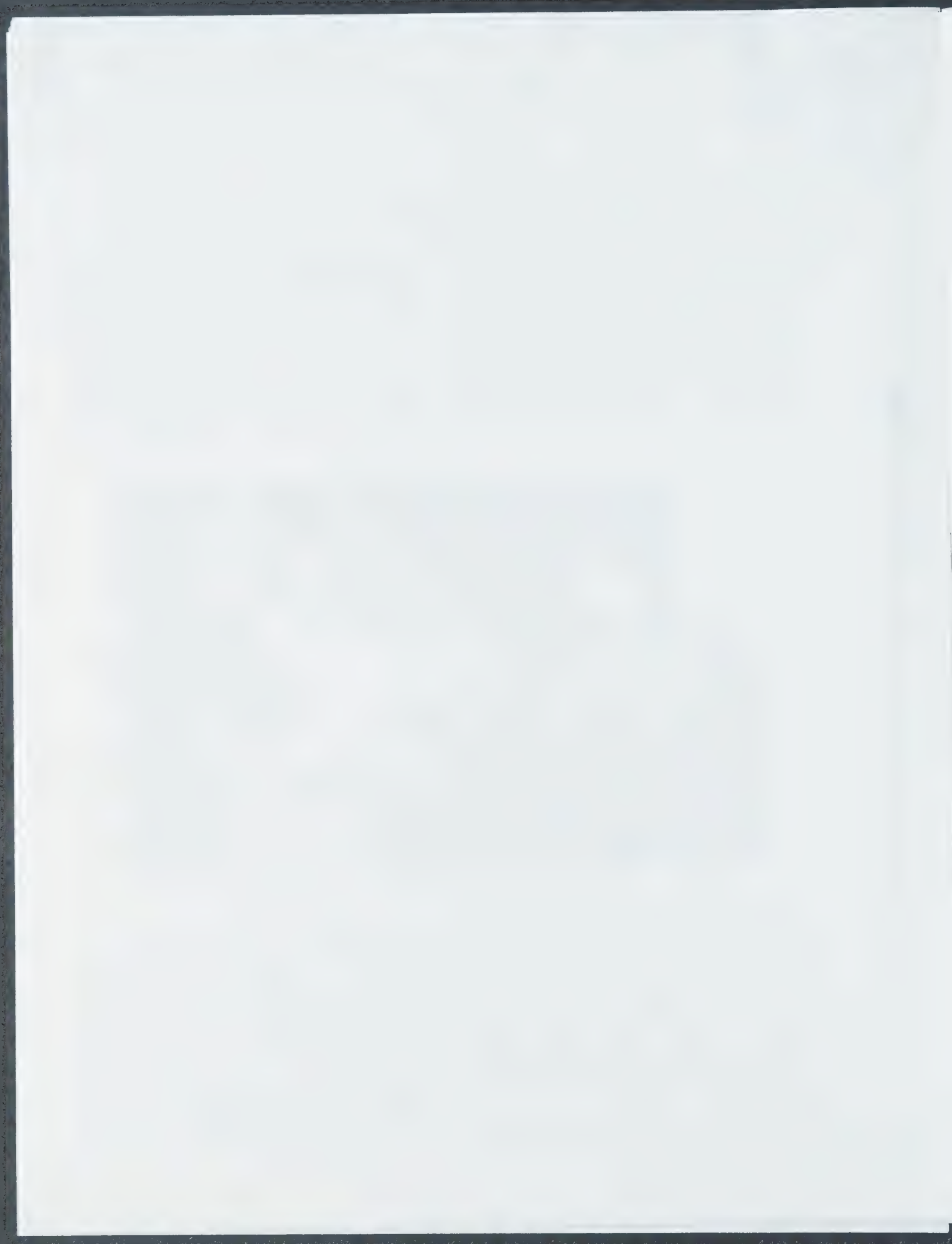

Zde se nový laureát představil odborné veřejnosti přednáškou s názvem „Chemická komunikace hmyzu pohledem organického chemika“.

Nový nositel Ceny získal diplom inženýra chemie na Ústavu organické chemie VŠCHT v Praze (1987). Dokto-

Jaromíra Strejčka, CSc., později jako člen České entomologické společnosti AV ČR. Spojení jeho profesionálního zájmu o chemii s entomologií jako „hobby“-disciplínou mělo mimořádně pozitivní vliv na kvalitu a efektivitu jeho práce v interdisciplinárním výzkumu cíleném na studium možností ovlivňování vývoje a chování hmyzu. Od obhájení disertační práce se na Oddělení přírodních látek ÚOCHB intenzivně věnoval syntéze semiochemikálií, látek používaných hmyzem k intra- a interdruhové chemické komunikaci, a studiu molekulárních mechanismů přenosu chemického signálu. Zapořil se do řady výzkumných projektů oddělení, směřujících



k integrované ochraně rostlin před hmyzími škůdci. Zde je třeba vyzdvihnout jeho podíl na řešení grantu „Biorational pesticides based on pheromone analogues“, který Oddělení přírodních látek získalo na léta 1991–1995 od U.S. Agency for International Development. Pro jeho další vědecký růst měla velký význam i několikaměsíční stáž v USA (US Department of Agriculture, Gainesville, Florida), kterou v rámci tohoto grantu absolvoval. Celkový souhrn odborných výsledků Ing. Michala Hoskovce, CSc. představuje osmnáct původních sdělení v mezinárodních časopisech. Nositel Ceny je ženatý, má dvě dcery (1993, 1998) a rád (a výborně) vaří.

Dr. Alfred Bader, světově známý chemik, milionář, self-made man, zakladatel firmy Aldrich, filantrop, sběratel vlámských mistrů, podporoval již od šedesátých let české chemiky ekonomicky, jak bylo možno. Důvodem může být mj. i to, že se považuje dílem za Čecha. Jeho filantropická aktivita přerostla po roce 1989 v několik významných forem. Dr. Bader ustanovil finanční jistiny (vždy ve výši cca milion dolarů), z jejichž úroků jsou hrazena „navždy“ stipendia českým studentům chemie na významných světových univerzitách, jako je Harvardova univerzita, Imperial College of London, University of Pennsylvania, Columbia University. Podrobnosti o stipendiích je možno vyžádat v sekretariátu České společnosti chemické. Dr. Bader poskytuje stipendia i studentům vlámského malířství a judaistiky. Vrcholem angažovanosti pro českou chemii bylo zřízení Ceny Alfreda Badera v roce 1994, která je spojena s udělením finanční prémie ve výši 100 tisíc korun mladému českému organickému chemikovi (do 35 let). Finanční prostředky pro cenu poskytuje Dr. Bader prostřednictvím zmíněné Nadace pro občanskou společnost a uděluje jí Česká společnost chemická na základě rozhodnutí dvanačtičlenné komise pod předsednictvím prof. Oldřicha Palety z VŠCHT Praha. Přihlásit do konkursu se může každoročně kterýkoliv český chemik splňující požadavky statutu ceny. Informace podá také sekretariát ČSCH.

Zájemce, kteří zvažují svou přihlášku do soutěže o Cenu, bude zajímat, že s výjimkou prvního, se ostatní laureáti zúčastnili soutěže vícekrát. Vlastně se stalo pravidlem, že nositel se již o Cenu ucházel v některém z předchozích ročníků, protože Cena se může udělit jen jedna. Autoři nejlepších kolekcí původních sdělení, kteří Cenu neobdrželi, získávají *privilegium permanentní přihlášky* (do věku 35 let); pak postačuje, aby v roce, kdy se hodlají opět soutěže zúčastnit, poslali pouze doplněk předchozího souboru, případně jej aktualizovali.

**Uzávěrka přihlášek do konkursu o Cenu v roce 1999 byla stanovena na 15. červen 1999 (datum poštovního razítka).** Hlavní částí přihlášky jsou separáty publikovaných prací a k nim zpracovaný autorův komentář k dosaženým výsledkům v rozsahu 4–6 stran; příložený životopis by měl zachytit odborný vývoj, mj. téma diplomové a doktorské (kandidátské) disertace, získaná ocenění, stáže a jejich tematické zaměření, získané granty apod. Řada publikací vzniká týmovou činností a v takových případech je potřebné vyjádřit podíl uchazeče na publikovaných výsledcích (návod na stručné vyjádření autorského podílu zašle přihlášeným sekretariát Společnosti). Uchazeči o Cenu se přihlašují na sekretariát Společnosti zpravidla sami, zároveň však statut Ceny dovoluje, aby návrh podali kolegové, instituce a rovněž vědecké rady a senáty.

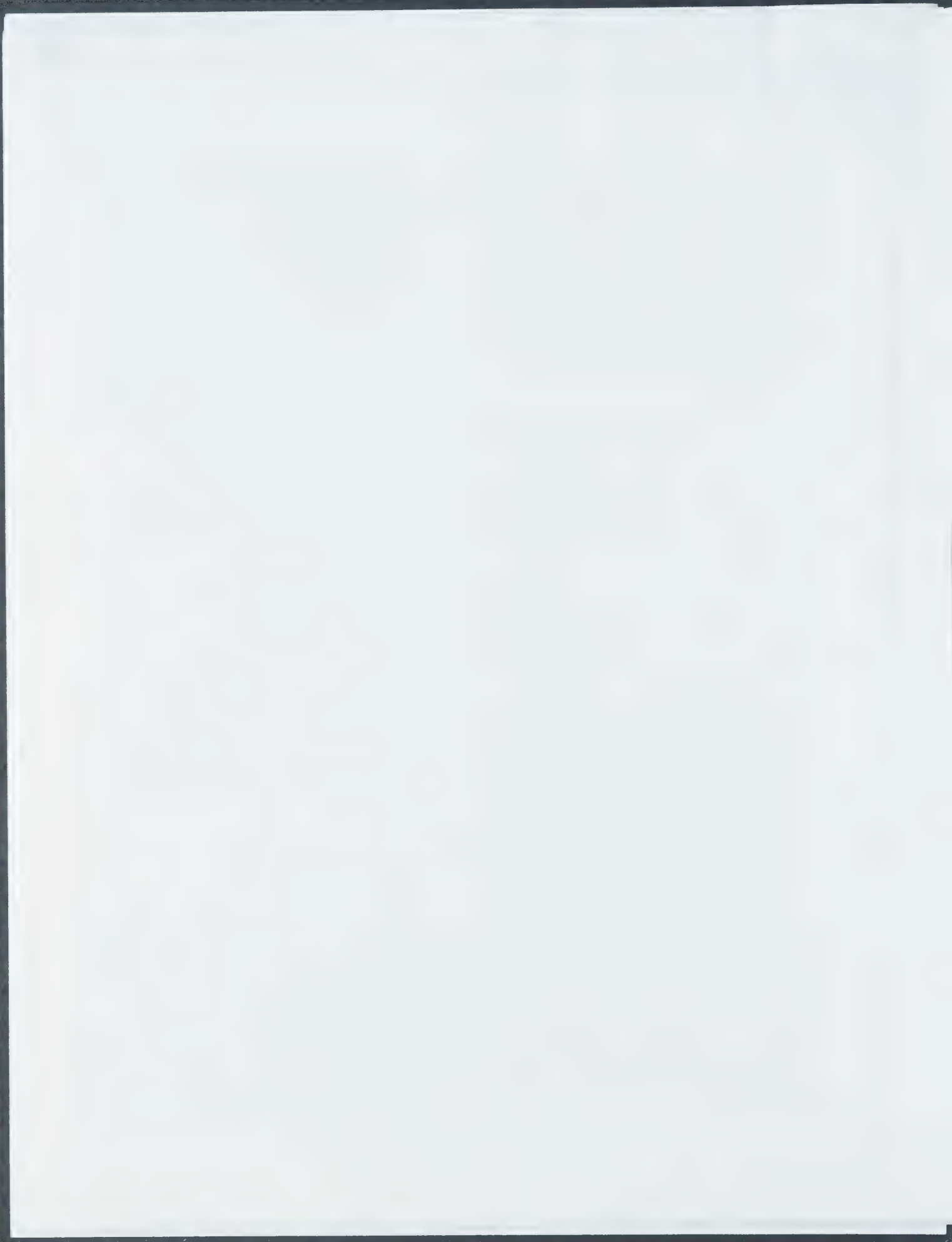

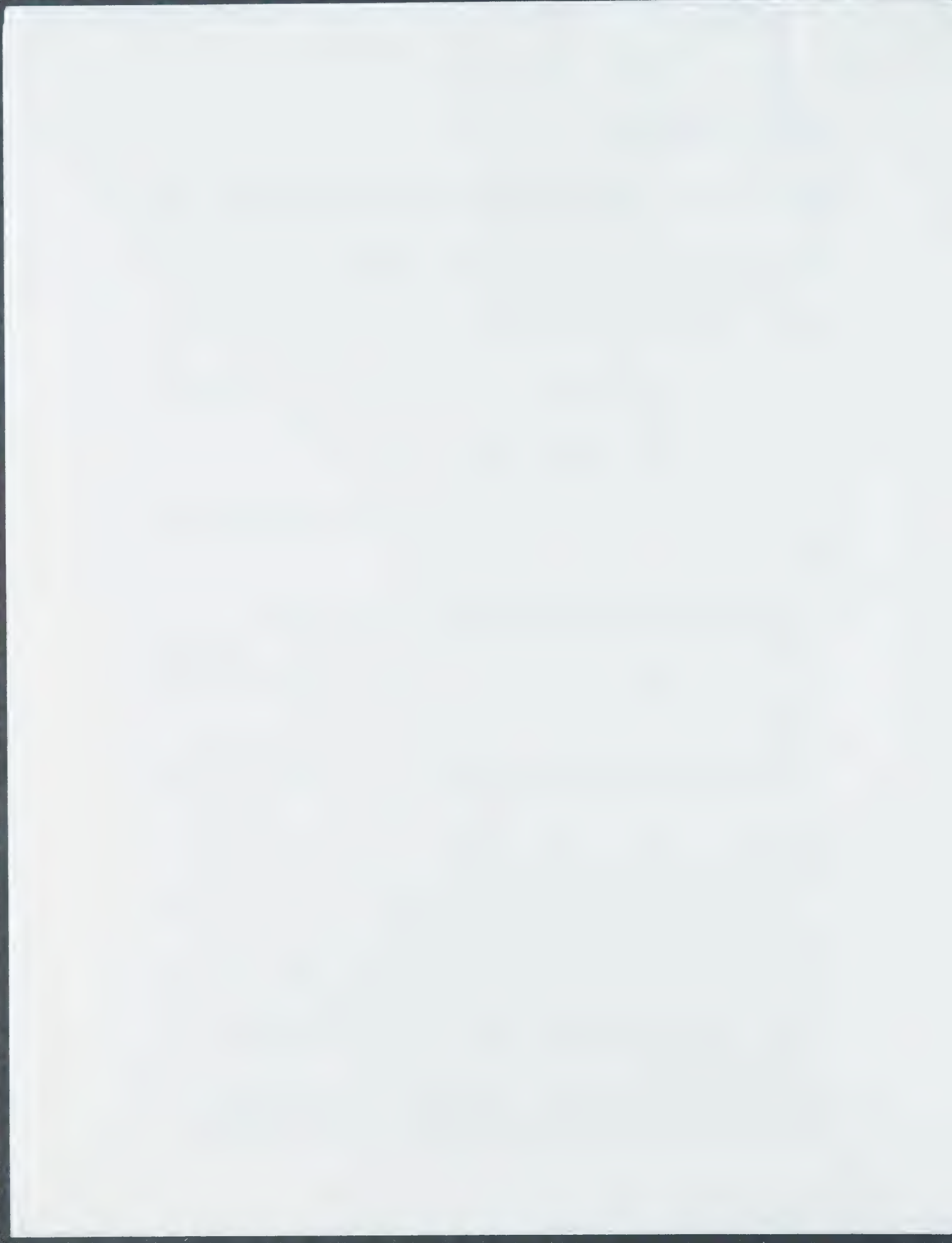

Naturally the first thing I did when I arrived in Prague in June is to inquire at the Jewish Community Center whether Yechiel Bar-Chaim was in Prague. Unfortunately, he was not there but in Paris. But then when I visited Vivienne Lewis in London she gave me a photograph of herself with Mr. Bar-Chaim, copy enclosed. I very much look forward to meeting him.

While in Prague I did meet the head of the Jewish community, Mr. Tomas Kraus. He is a pleasant man but he refused to give us an accounting on the funds coming into the Jewish community in Prague. Of course, realistically, I had no business to ask for it, but it would have been interesting to see how the millions of dollars coming in from tourists are spent. Certainly little is given to smaller communities outside Prague. Incidentally, Mr. Kraus told Isabel and me that he had some disagreements with the Joint, for the very same reason!

Isabel and I will be in England the last week of this month and then again in November and December. I much hope to have an opportunity to talk to Mr. Bar-Chaim about the Joint helping with the distribution of our gifts, which up until now were given through the Foundation for a Civil Society.

Vivienne Lewis and Jonathan Joseph in London urged us to contribute to helping in the Ukraine, but I don't think this is really for us. I would much rather give to help very focused efforts, like the orphanage in Odessa.

Of course I have also carefully considered helping your efforts in Kosovo; thank you for the video.

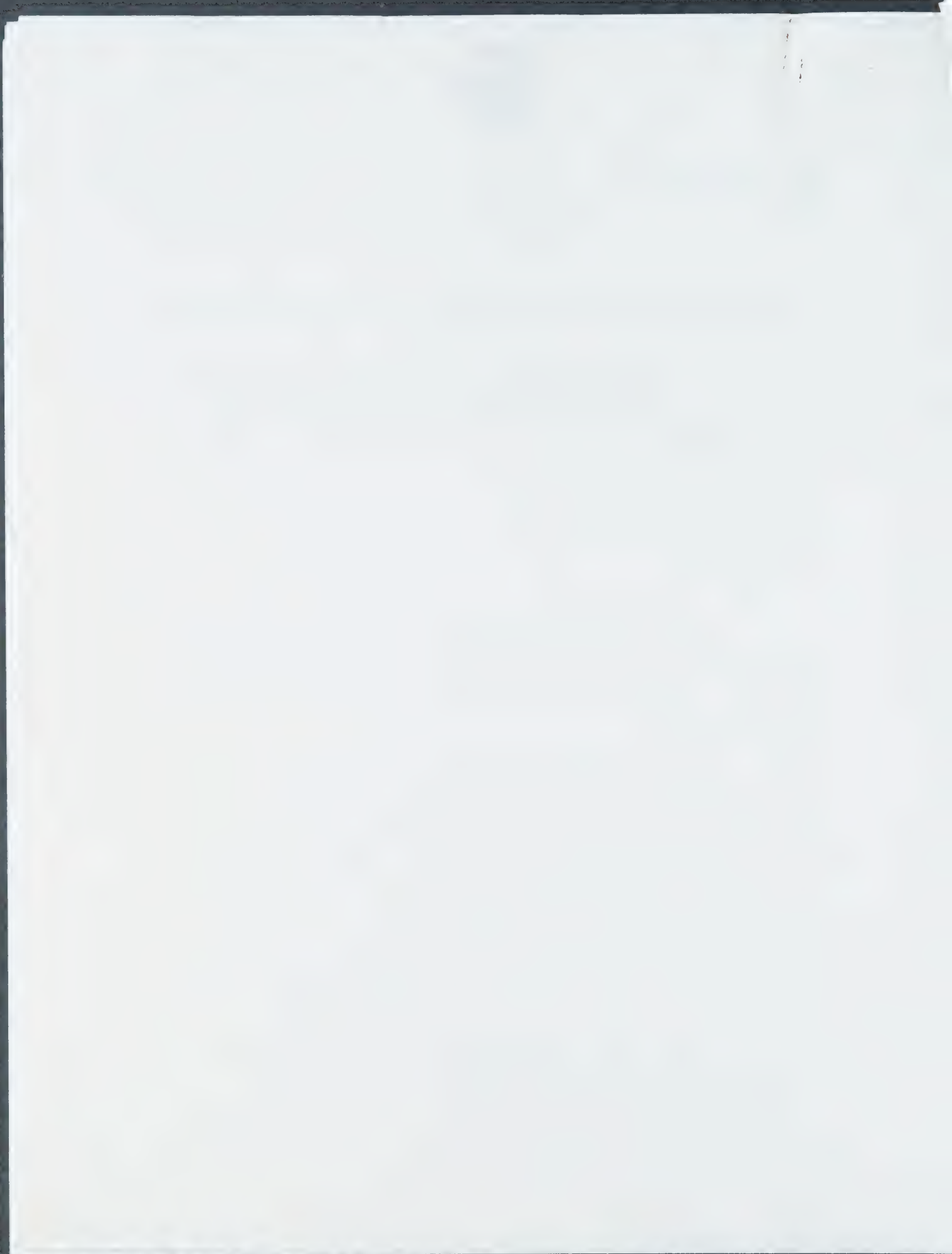

Last week, I visited, as promised, the Zvi Perez Chajes Schule in Vienna. Magister Jutta Bauer presented the School to me and showed what had been done with your donation.

The school has 320 pupils aged 3-18. About 95% of them receive some kind of scholarship from the Kultusgemeinde. All Jewish children are admitted. Those in need automatically receive a full or partial scholarship.

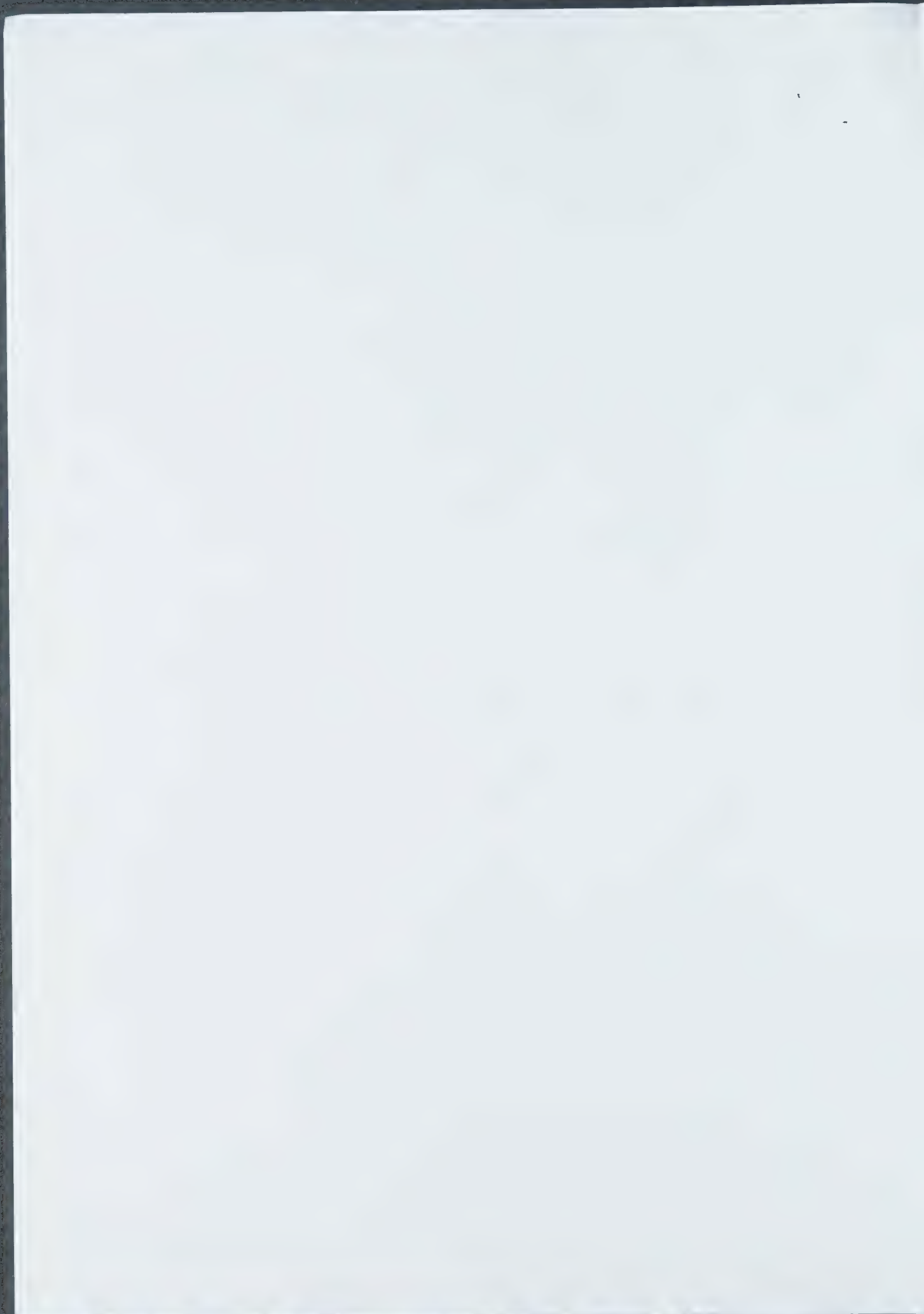
In general support for the School is provided as follows:

* Austrian Government	10%
* Kultusgemeinde	50%
* Pupil tuition fees	40%

Your donation was apparently the first ever received from abroad.

Ninety students stay after school for extra-curriculum activities. Your donation was used to prepare and equip a special room for this program.

Next year, 30 new pupils are expected to enroll in this school which is already filled to the brim, so a new classroom will have to be prepared.



Please, find attached a letter from Magister Bauer setting out how the Chajes School would use any new donation. Since the Kultusgemeinde regularly picks up the bill for scholarships, it is indeed for the new investments that the School has to scramble for funds.

Meanwhile, I am about to leave for Macedonia for the national ceremonies there to commemorate the March 1943 round up and deportation to Treblinka of nearly the entire Jewish population at the hands of the Bulgarian Fascist occupiers. Will also be looking into health and education programs for the Romas while I am there.

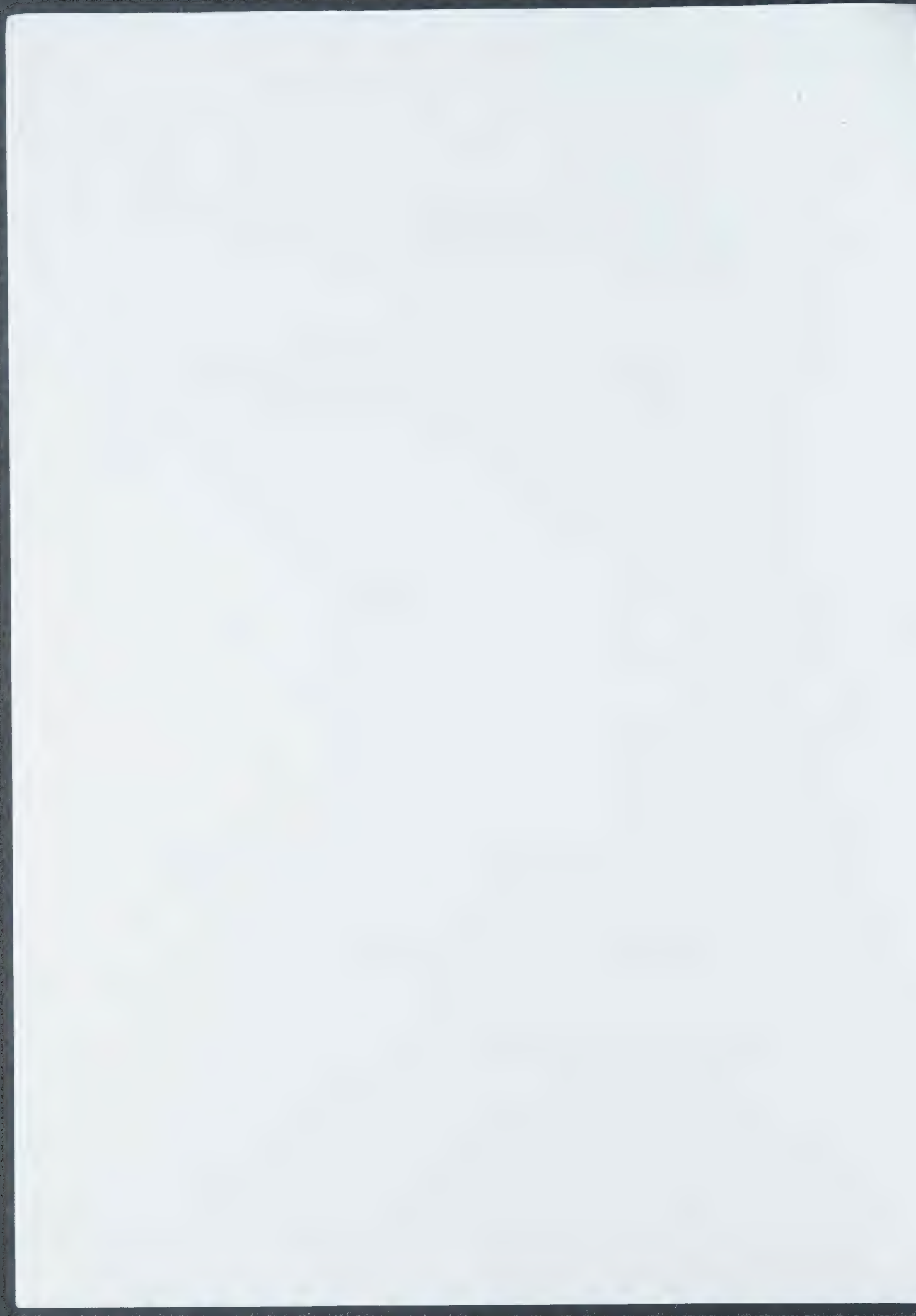



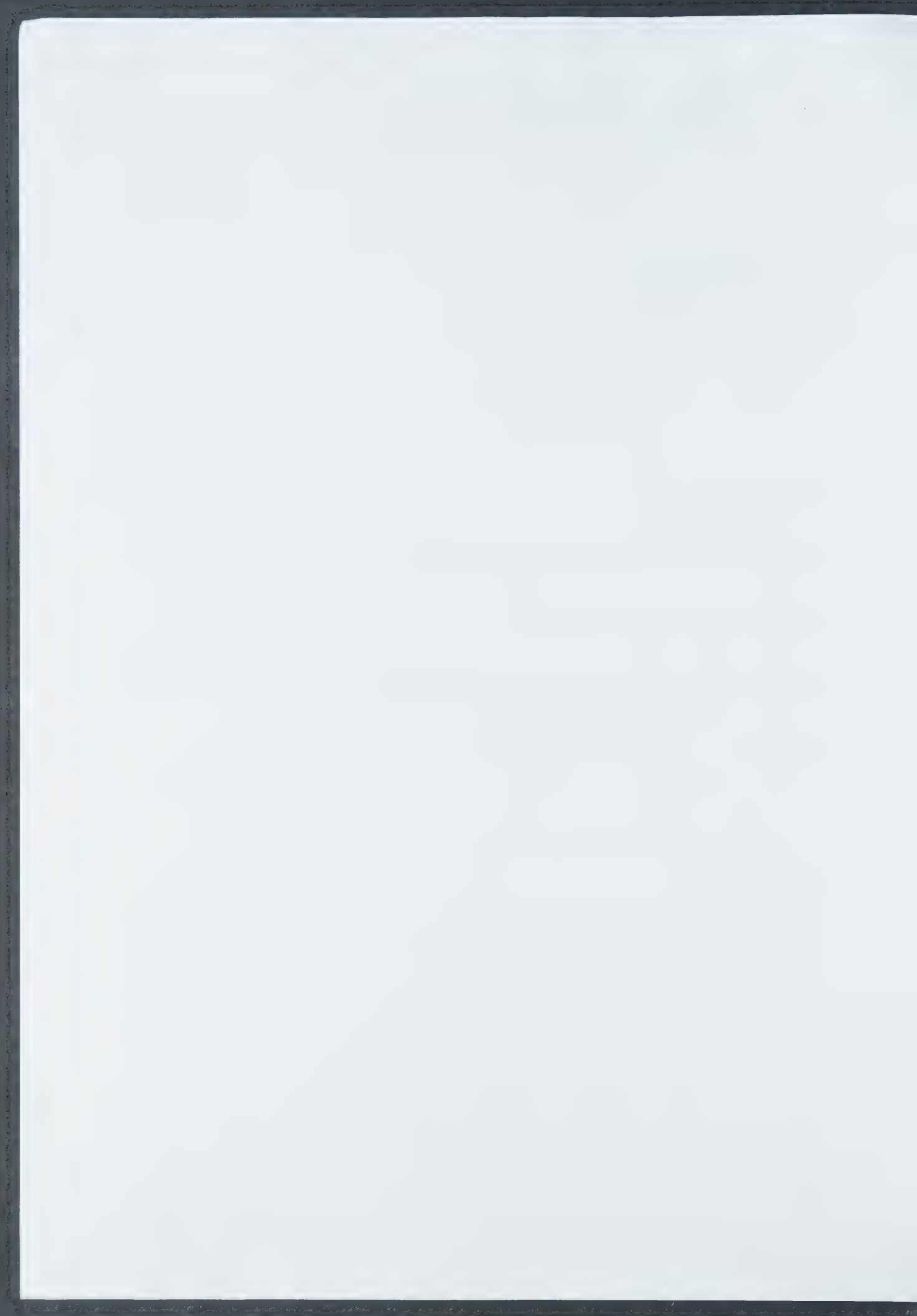

Tomorrow I'm due to take the train to Vienna to study the situation of Austrian Roma and also examine how unaccompanied children and youth who have reached Austria as refugees are treated. 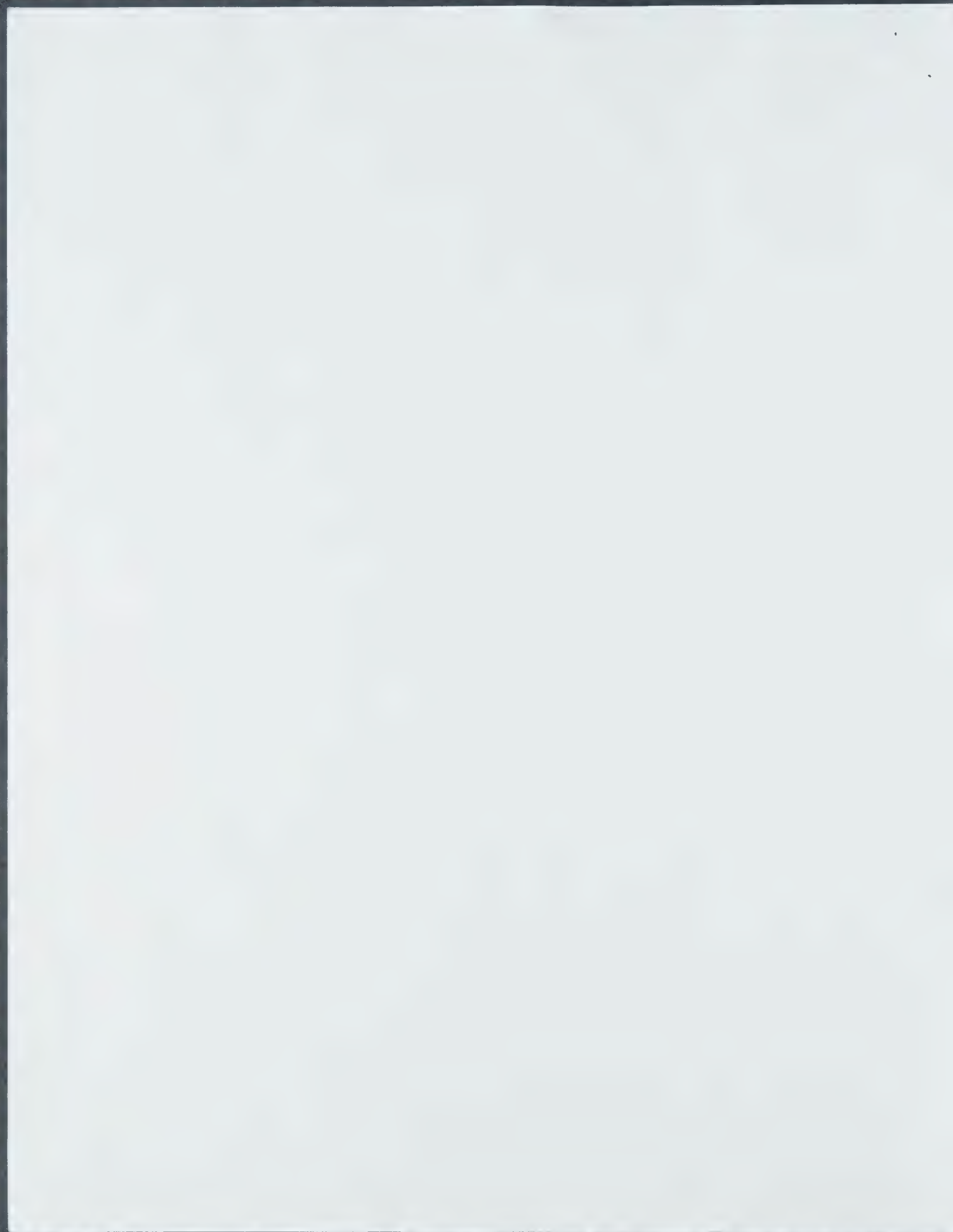

Here is a country-by-country round robin concerning your donations:

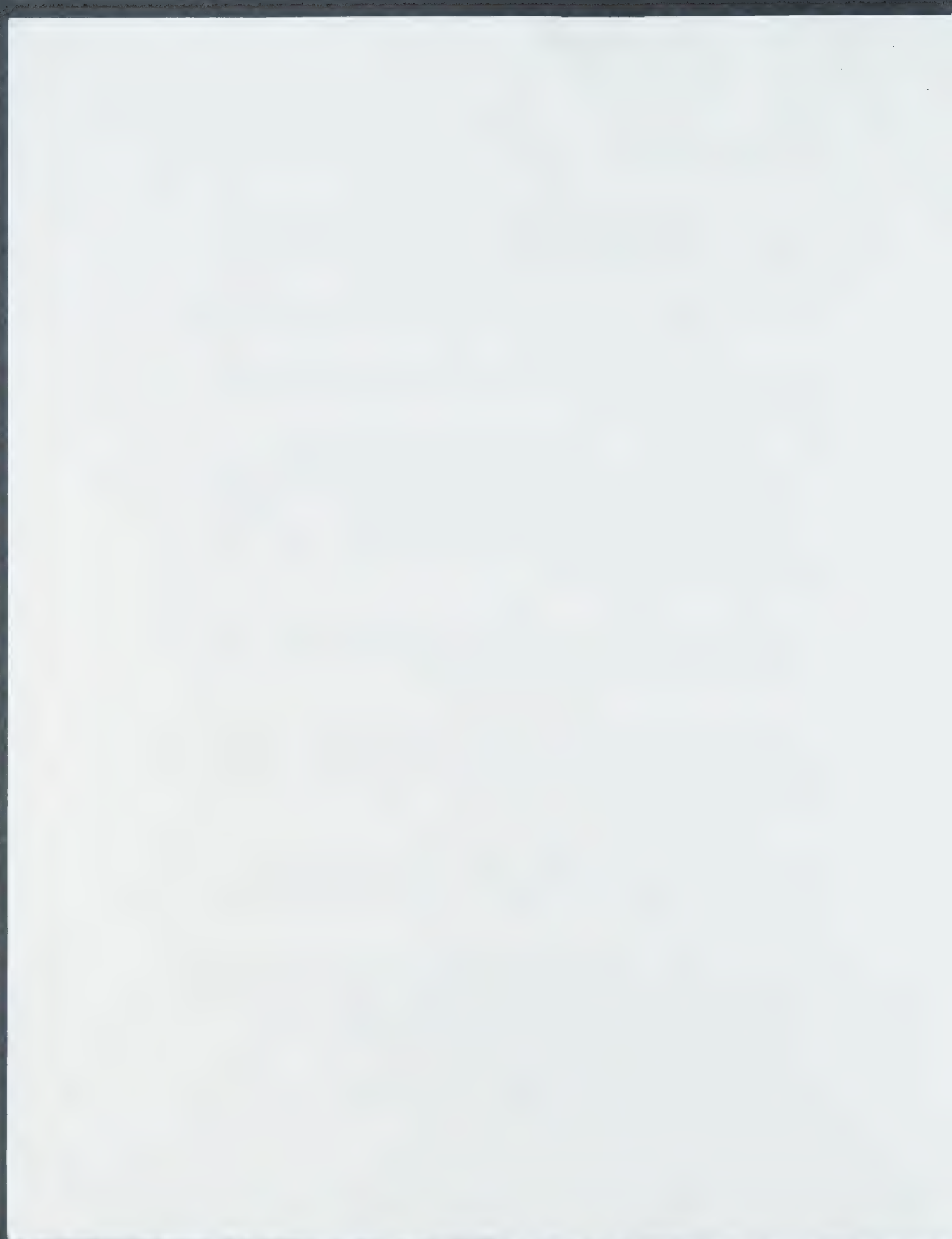
1. YUGOSLAVIA: Delighted to have a green light from you on all the proposed projects for Yugoslavia. Will proceed accordingly.
2. MACEDONIA: My colleagues and I are making an all-out effort to begin and complete the school renovation by 10 September when the pupils return to school. One new twist: we will buy the paint and the teachers, parents and community supporters will paint the school. In another change in plans I should be in Skopje at the end of the month to see the progress.
3. CZECH REPUBLIC: Not to worry but for now the Czech Chemists can't get to the money for the Olympiad, since their headquarters (together with their records) as you know are next to the Charles Bridge.

In fact I may have to put off my visit to Belgrade to rush to Prague instead. Am trying to convince my JDC colleagues to join a fundraising coalition for Czech Relief that is now being organized by our friends at Nadace Via and People in Need.

There would be several lines for donors to choose between: relief for people; repair and restoration of historic monuments; and even a sub-line for synagogues and Jewish cemeteries.

(Although the river flooding did spare the Old Town, the water backed up and did fill to the depth of two meters the Alteneuschul, the Pinkas Synagogue (where the names of the Czech Jewish Nazi victims are engraved) and the underground kitchen of the Jewish Town Hall).

Would you be interested in hearing more about one or more aspects of this campaign?

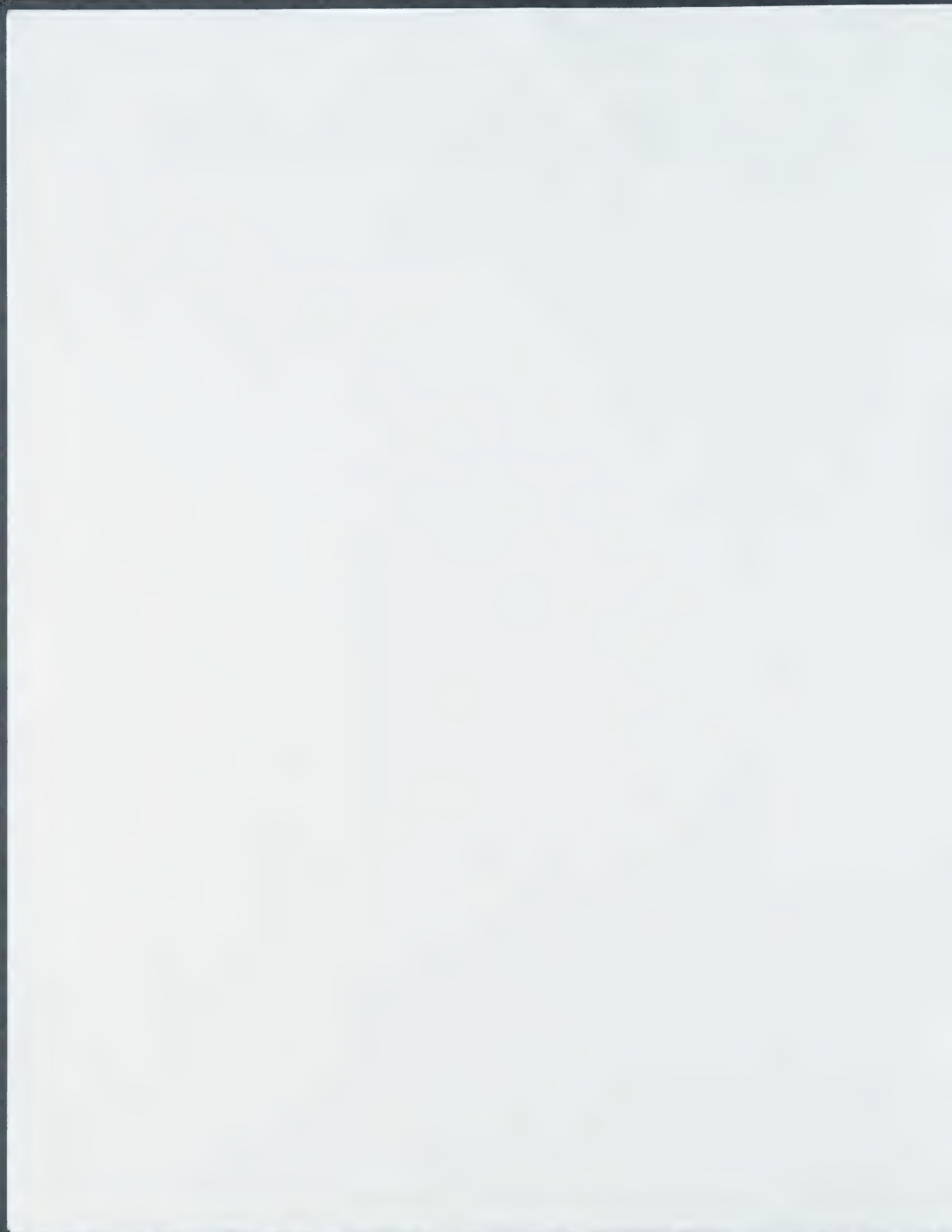

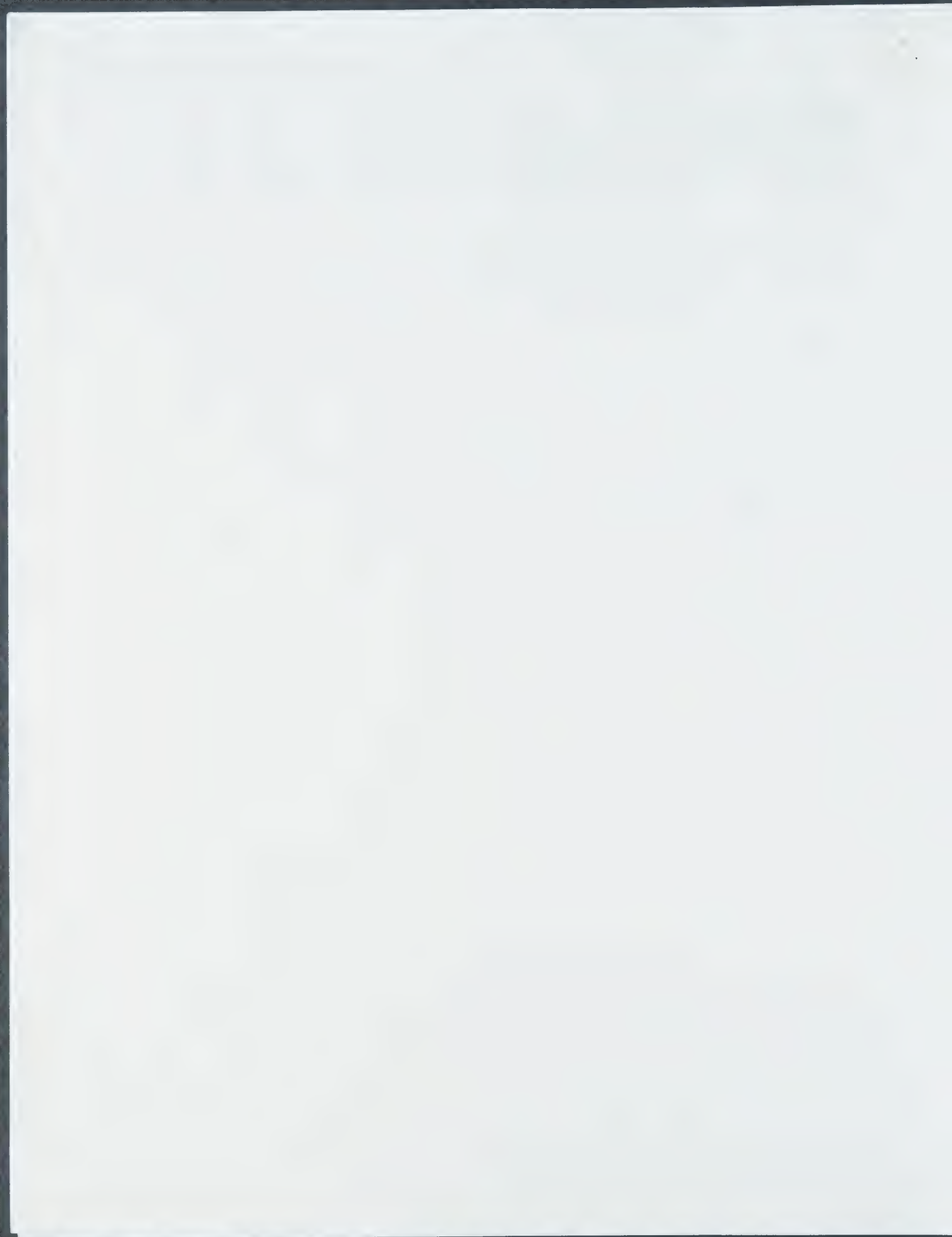

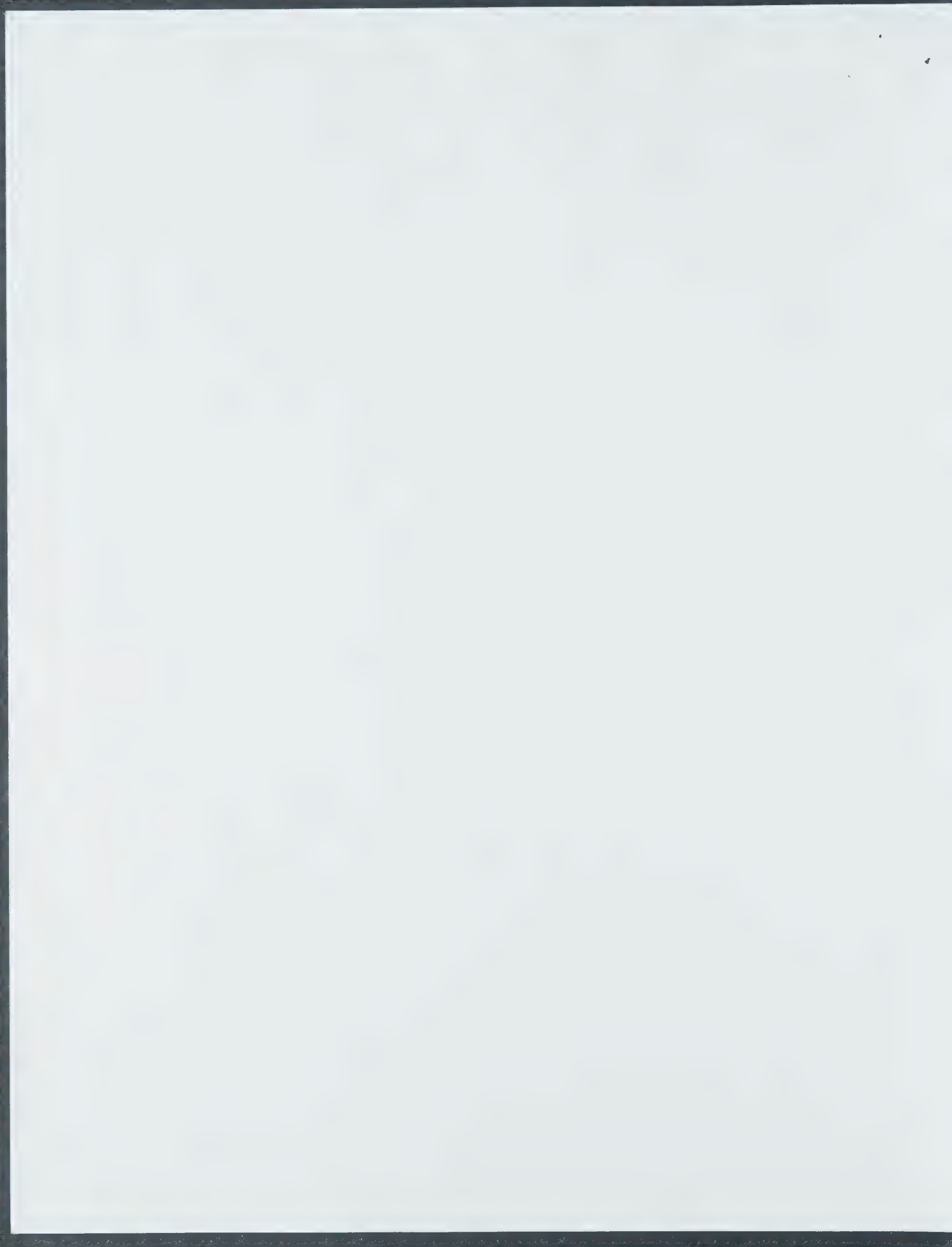

Let me share with you the latest update before I run off for JDC budget discussions.

(In prospect: a further 5% budget cut coming on top of successive 5% reductions annually over the past 5-7 years). Principal victim of the cuts: precisely the kind of educational and cultural initiatives which are so close to my heart and, which I see are so vital to sustaining/developing vibrant Jewish communities in the places I work).

#### Czech Republic

Miloslav Nic learned that any student prizewinners at the Chemistry Olympiad can apply for a tax-exemption if they have no other substantial sources of income. No matter how poorly paid, the chemistry teachers would still cross the tax-exemption threshold and cannot so apply. Miloslav sent the information to Prof. Sejbal.

#### Yugoslavia

I am due to go to Yugoslavia just before Rosh Hashanah and am now busy asking local partners to make certain preparations for possible humanitarian aid that would be financed from the discretionary funds.

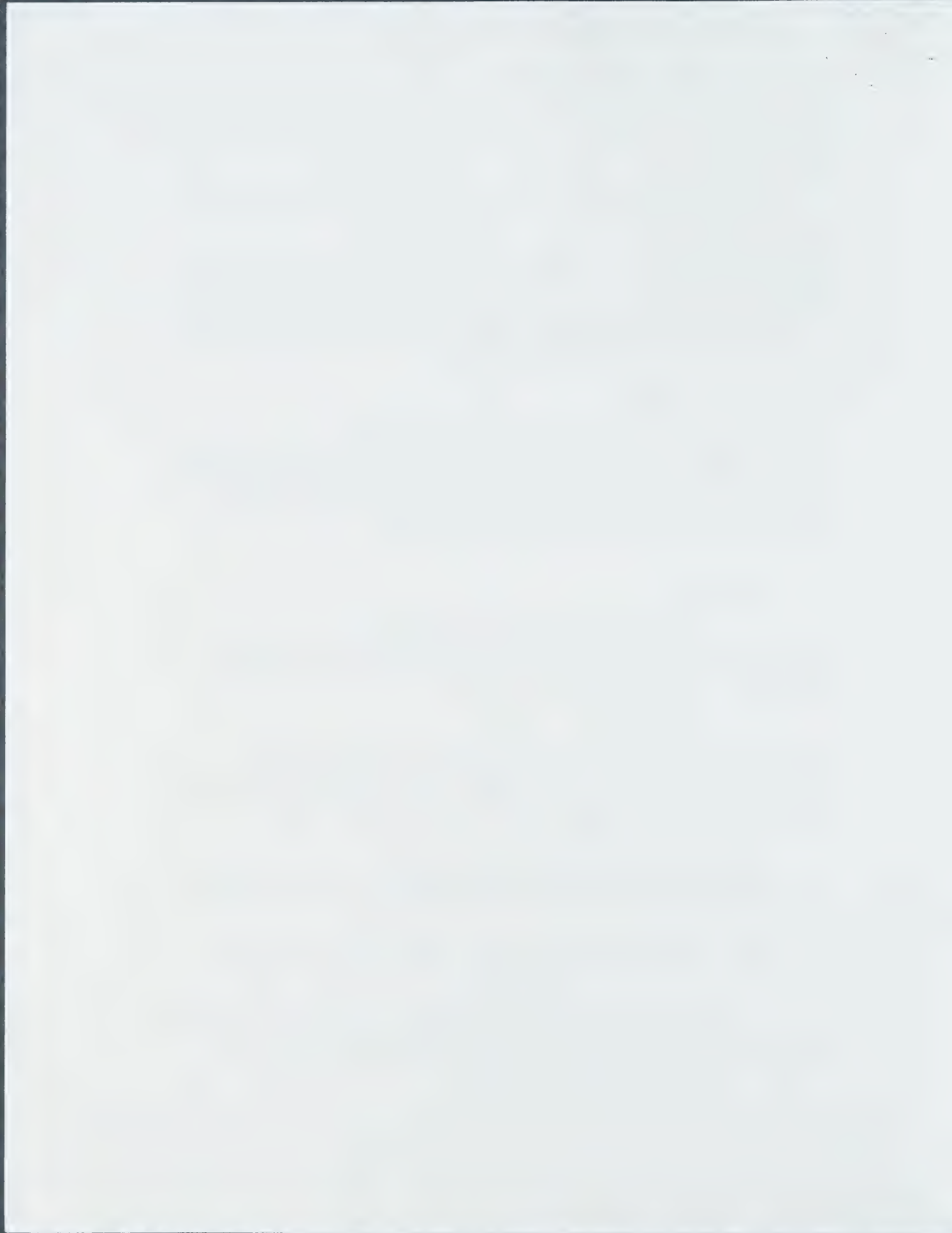

The center is to be established by an extraordinarily dedicated former ballet dancer (non-Jewish), who now devotes her talents to these children. This effort is supported by the American wife of the rabbi and by the former President of the Belgrade Jewish Community who themselves do non-sectarian volunteer work with troubled children and orphans.

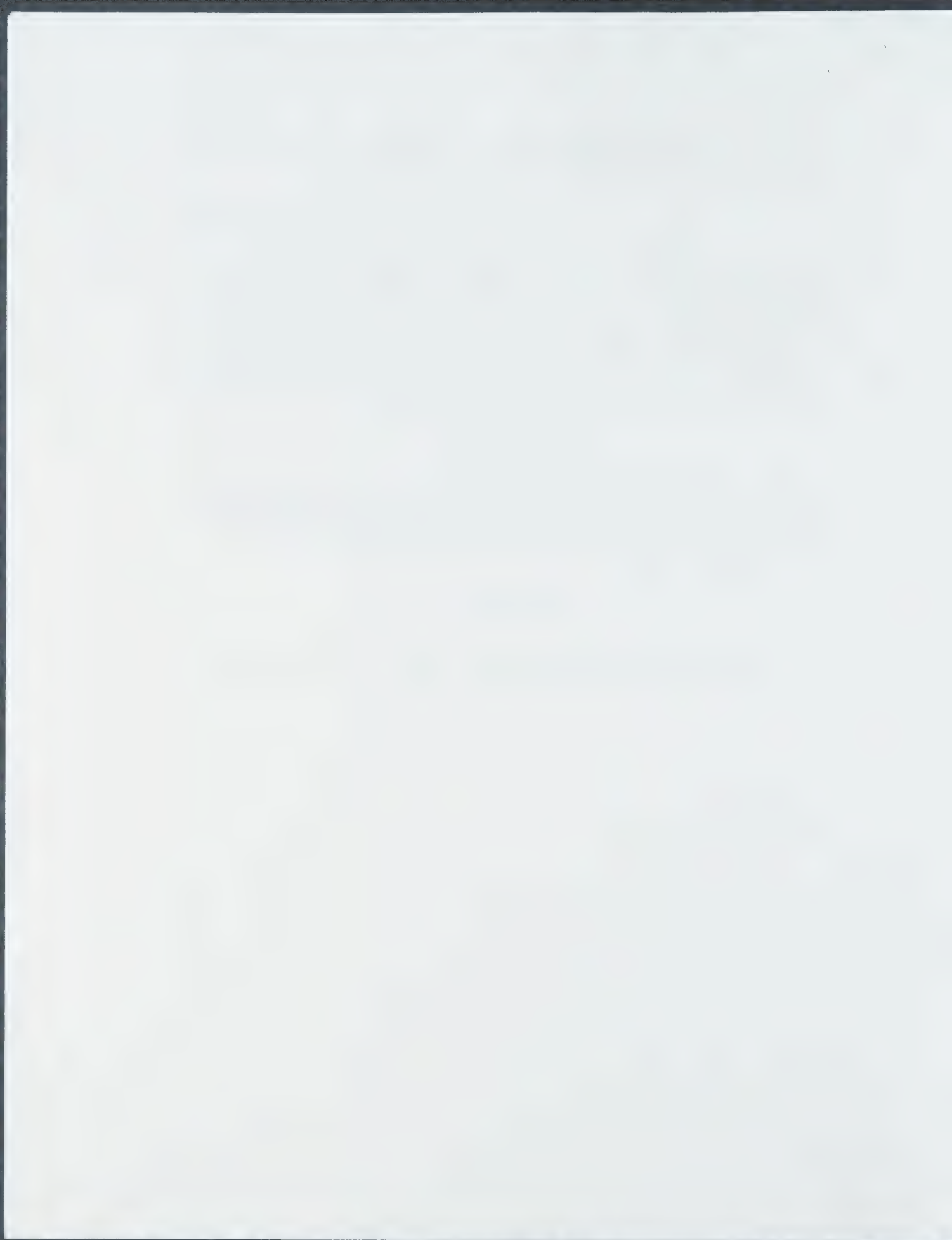

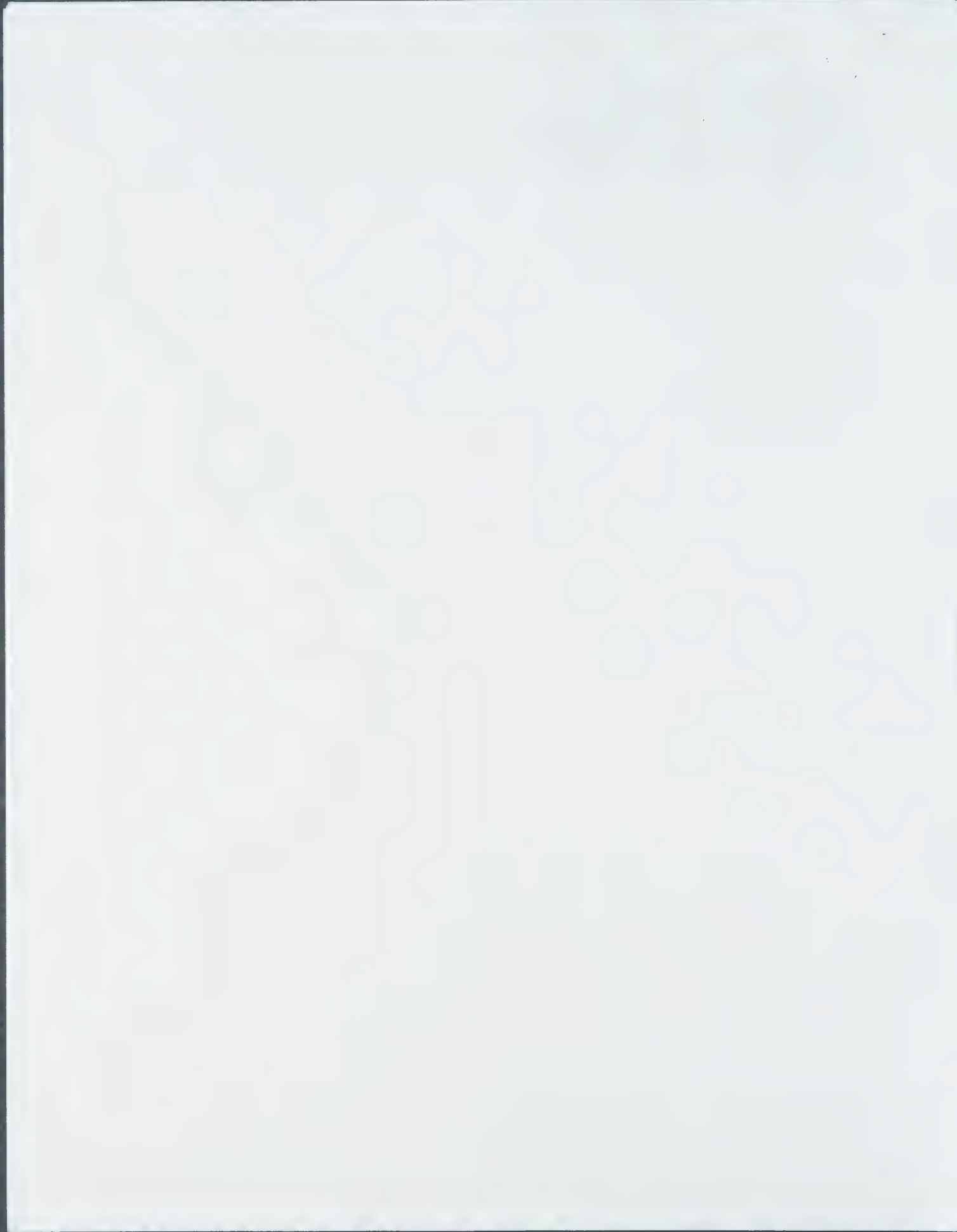

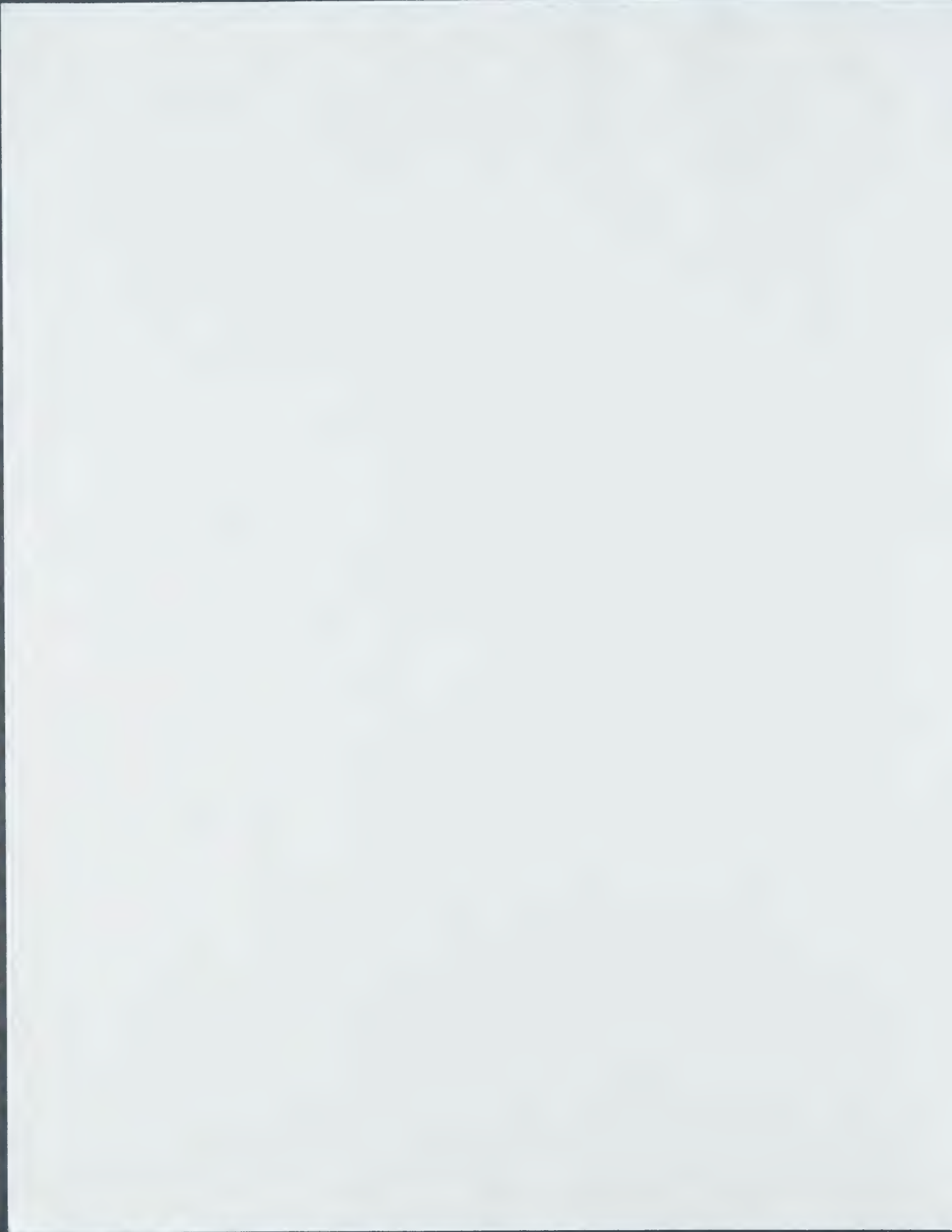

Czech Republic

I have sent the agreement back to the Czech Chemists along with your comments.

In addition I can confirm that your donations to the Czech Chemistry Olympiad and Masaryk University for the Loschmidt Professorship have been sent and the recipients notified that the grants are on their way..

Dr. Nic is still checking if there is a way for the Olympiad prizes to be given tax-free. He writes that he depends on his mother-in-law for information and has no response as yet. I wonder what that means.

Bosnia-Herzegovina

Multiple sclerosis treatment has begun for Gordana Abinun in Sarajevo thanks to your help.

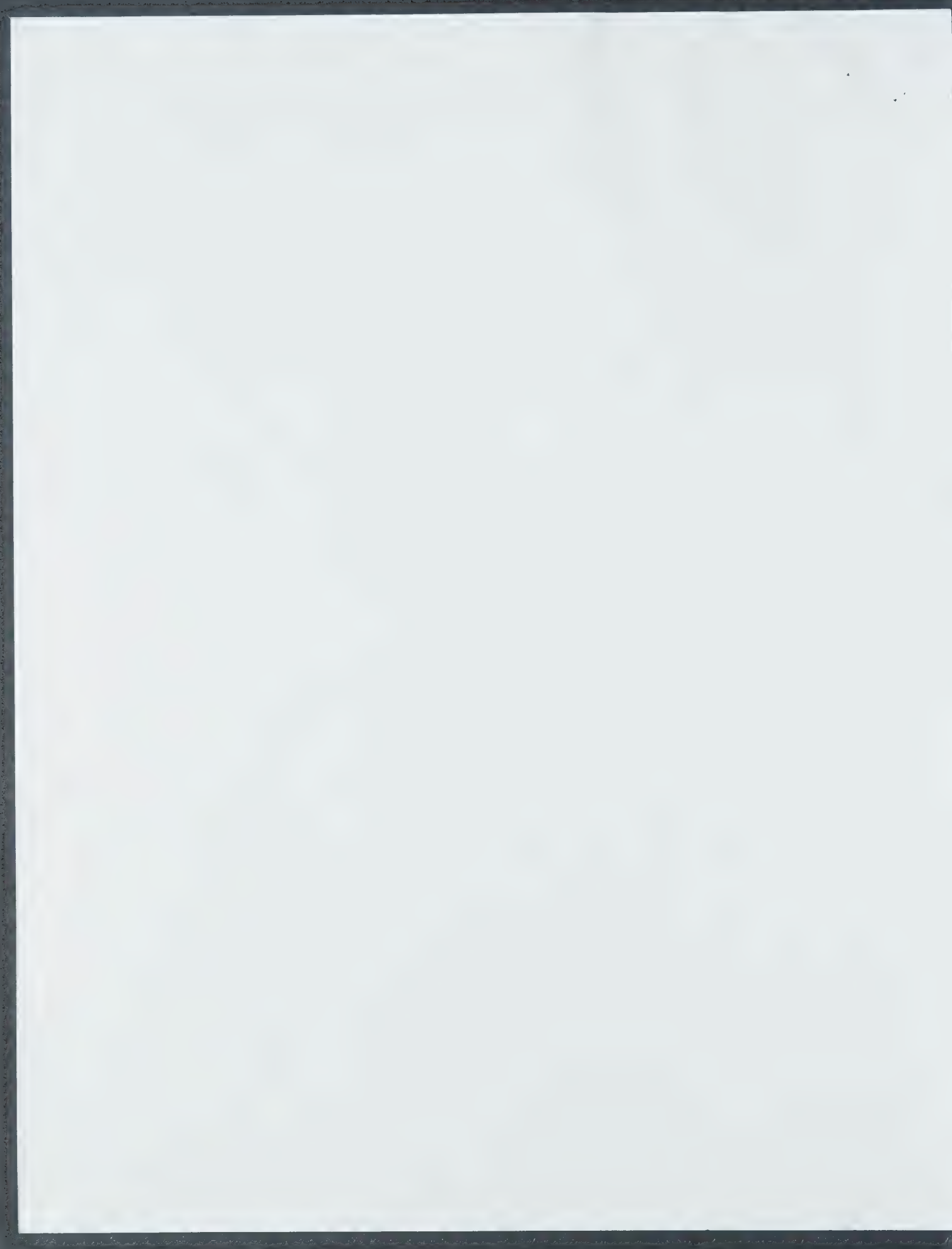
Macedonia

Following my trip a fortnight ago to Skopje (together with a volunteer educational consultant I recruited who travelled at his own expense --- he's my son's former principal), I am trying to get everyone engaged around what needs to be done to help the Kosovar Roma refugee children study.

Of the 420 children at the "Resettlement Camp" who could be studying in grades 1 to 8, fully one-third are not in school at all. My primary focus is on these children, and I am trying one more time to negotiate with IRC, UNHCR, and Unicef to see what can be done.

Moreover I can attest firsthand that the 26th of July School which these children are supposed to attend (it is walking distance from the camp) is in frightful physical state --- badly leaking roof; expanses of windows broken; pitted and ruined floors in classroom after classroom; toilet facilities that no longer function; electricity in disarray....

The schoolchildren also suffer from the absence of basic educational materials and labs. The school itself has more than 2,000 pupils ---poor Albanians and Roma for the most part --- "studying" in 28 classrooms in three shifts. 90% of the children live on welfare.





At the same time that the focus of our attention has to be the children themselves, some physical investment in the school is a necessity in my opinion if the children are to be encouraged to enroll and persevere in their studies.

Therefore a very experienced colleague of mine (Who has been restoring to proper use dozens of schools in Kosovo) and I have been devoting our time and energy to investigating what kind of money it would take to create conditions of minimal decency for the children to study. The barebones cost for everything we would like to do is \$125,000 (Original architect's estimate \$431,000). But I do not have that kind of money.

We approached the Macedonian Education Ministry to see if they would join us. But elections are in another month and under such unstable conditions the Ministry is just not capable of responding even if they had the means (which is doubtful).

My take on the work that would constitute a minimum-minimum costs \$60,000. No frills; not even re-painting the outside walls to give the repairs some sense of a public presence.

Alfred, my question to you is the following:

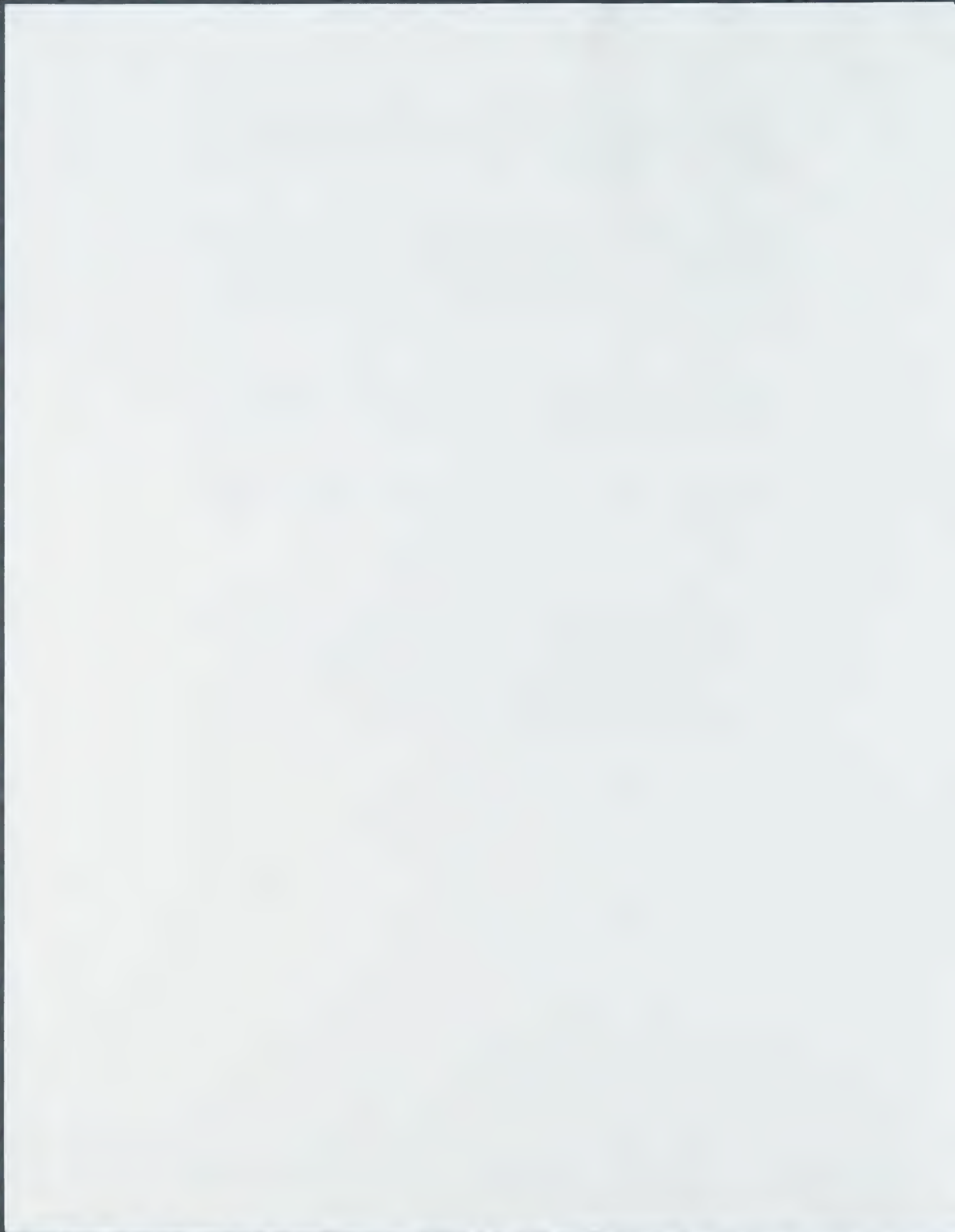
*I have reached the conclusion that this investment is essential. Would you agree to the following proposition? Out of the \$70,000 you originally allotted for Roma Women and Children in Macedonia (or alternatively out of the discretionary funds you have put at my disposal) I would like to invest \$20,000 in this project? The remaining \$40,000 I would take from what is left of some special funds put at my disposition following the war in Kosovo for use outside of Kosovo.*

My friend and colleague Shauli Dritter risked his life (at my request it would seem) to visit the vocational training program for Roma adults that you are supporting in East Jerusalem. He came back highly satisfied with the courses and I was equally delighted he returned safely.

I just came back from a trip to Macedonia, accompanied by a volunteer educational consultant who is prepared to help me. We obtained some reliable data: one-third of the young Roma refugee children in the "resettlement camp" in Sutu Orizeri do not attend school. The biggest problem is at the transition point between 4th and 5th grade. I am trying now to refine the program with input from the International Rescue Committee, UNHCR, UNICEF, and Dobra Volja, the local Jewish non-sectarian humanitarian aid organization we established in Skopje.

Paris is extremely hot. Spent the weekend with my wife and son in Normandy (Bayeux and Omaha Beach) where every reference to the sacrifice of young soldiers years ago so that others might be free stirs me tremendously. Sign in a local restaurant, "Welcome to our Liberators" draws in crowds of college students from Iowa and Arizona and day-trippers from England as well. What to do with the juxtaposition of wartime loss and victory with peacetime larks?

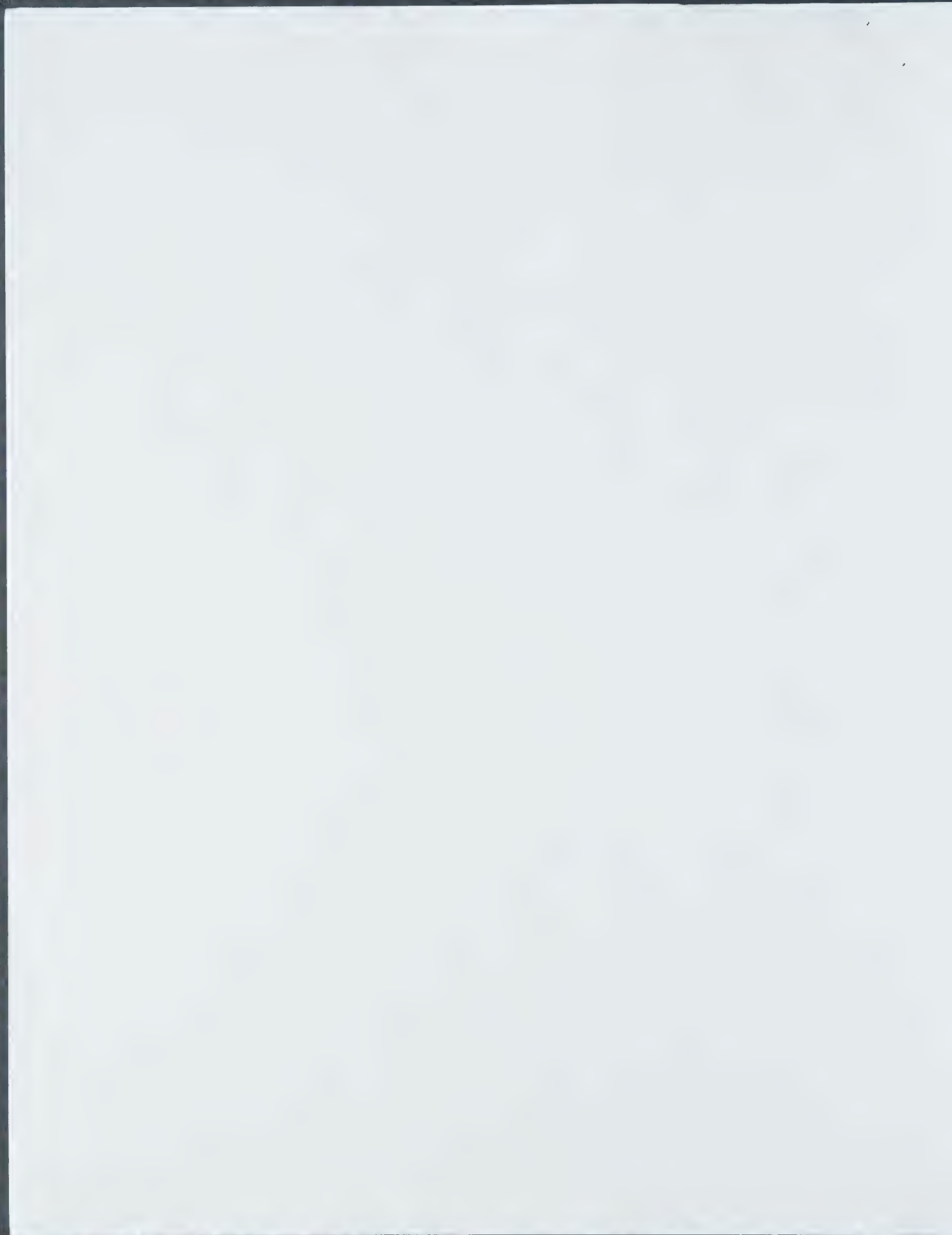
Perhaps I am too demanding, but supposing that I sent you promptly \$50,000, could those 70 persons on the waiting list be included?

Dear Alfred,

I have recently returned from a trip to Mostar and Sarajevo where unfortunately relations between the different ethnic and religious groups are nearly as complicated and as conflicted as they have ever been.

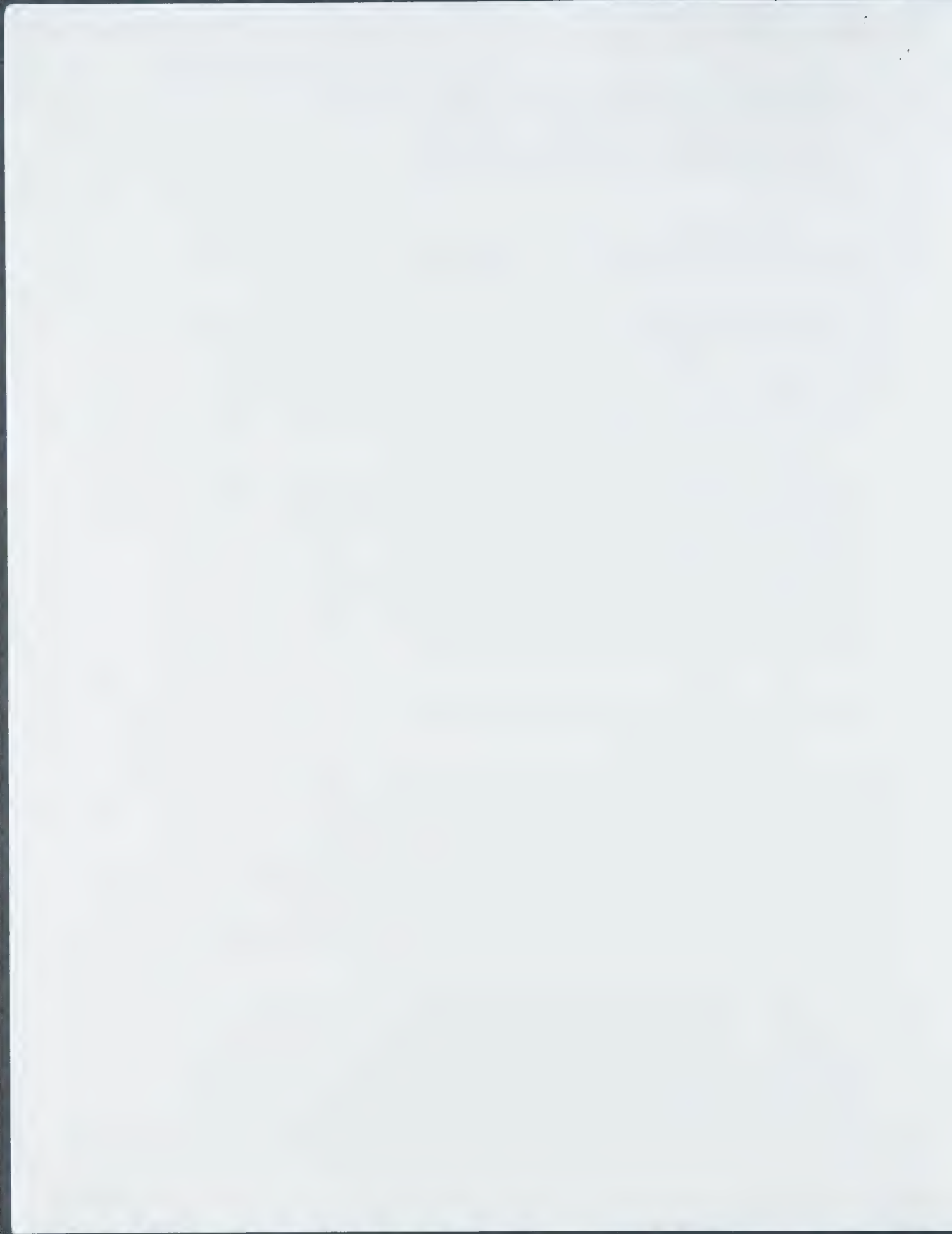
For a long time the Jews of Bosnia were the exception. They seemed to provide the glue between the mutually hostile Bosnian Serbs, Croats, and Muslims. When JDC underwrote the activities of La Benevolencija, the Jewish Cultural and Humanitarian Aid Society of Sarajevo, during the Bosnian War, sending in food and clothing to be distributed to civilians of all backgrounds, each and every one of the warring forces allowed our trucks to pass through to besieged Sarajevo. Help from the Jews to non-combatants on all sides was allowed even when the war became a three-sided one (i.e. the Bosnian Muslims and the Bosnian Croats were also at war with each other).

Today as well in bitterly divided Mostar --- the Moslems live in East Mostar while the Bosnian Croats inhabit the West of the city--- we Jews have become the symbol (catalyst?) of the possibility however slight of their coming together. A year ago we dedicated in the Jewish Cemetery of Mostar a special memorial --- initiated by Zorin Mandlbaum, the President of the 40 strong Mostar Jewish Community, --- listing the names of those Jews from the region who had died during the Holocaust. To that ceremony came both the mayors of East and West Mostar. It was the first time both had come to the same public occasion voluntarily. Now that the Municipality has been united, the main picture on display in the Mayor's Conference room shows the four clerics who attended the ceremony--- the rabbi JDC brought from Israel, the local imam, the leading Catholic priest, and the Serbian Orthodox pope (priest) as well.

Since the Dayton Accords ended the Bosnian War almost exactly five years ago, La Benevolencija has continued its program of Non-Sectarian Aid. There have been two major elements.

The one you know about was our Entrepreneurship Development Program that began when you gave your donation and JDC matched it. Then the Soros Open Society Fund also came on board. The Entrepreneurship Training Center, after instructing hundreds of potential and actual entrepreneurs, proved not to be sustainable economically. It was obliged to close after four years of operations. But the La Benevolencija Loan Fund, established as a program complement to the Training Center using the same rationale and instructed by the same Israeli experts sent by JDC, has survived and is flourishing. It now has nearly DM 1,000,000 in capital and outstanding loans. 640 loans have been granted, of which 220 are active. Only 4-5% of the loans have gone bad and even these were insured. The Fund has three employees and is now able to support itself. There is a four month waiting list of potential borrowers.

The second program of Non-Sectarian Aid carried out by La Benevolencija has been its Home Care Program providing medical care and essential home services to 470 sick, frail, and lonely elderly persons of all nationalities. (Please see the proposal attached below), For the past eight years this program has been able to attract financial support from a wide variety of sources. Last year, I was gratified to learn, the La Benevolencija Loan Fund, was even able to donate DM 30,000 from its proceeds to help support the program. (Now the new laws for non-profit micro-credit organizations that have just gone into effect will not allow that in the future). Mostly JDC held itself in reserve for the day that we knew would



come when the other funders could or would no longer underwrite this vital program

What I learned last week, however, is that that day has come. The entire La Benevolencija Home Care Program is now threatened for lack of funding. In response to my immediate appeal, JDC has agreed to finance half of what is missing out of our Bosnian Mailbox Fund, if I can find a donor for the second half. So I am turning to you, as my first --- and certainly best --- partner for non-sectarian aid in post-war Sarajevo, to ask if you will donate the missing DM 100,000.

I should perhaps point out that the violence in the Middle East and the recent election results in Bosnia (in which the ethnically based nationalist parties gained strength) are putting new strains on the possibility for inter-ethnic harmony in Bosnia and elsewhere. For La Benevolencija to be obliged to fold its non-sectarian aid program for the elderly of most distress would be a black omen for what lies ahead.


Not only JDC looks on La Benevolencija as a shining example of what Jews, --- because we can care for our own, --- can also do for others. Their office walls in Sarajevo are adorned with certificates of recognition from around the world, including the Pope John XXIII Peace Prize given by the current Pope during his visit a few years ago. This community of survivors from World War II has shown itself to be a saving remnant indeed.

Our friends at La Benevolencija are modern-day Jews who still know how to fulfill Hillel's well-known and well-balanced injunctions: "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? and If I am only for myself, what am I? and If not now when?"

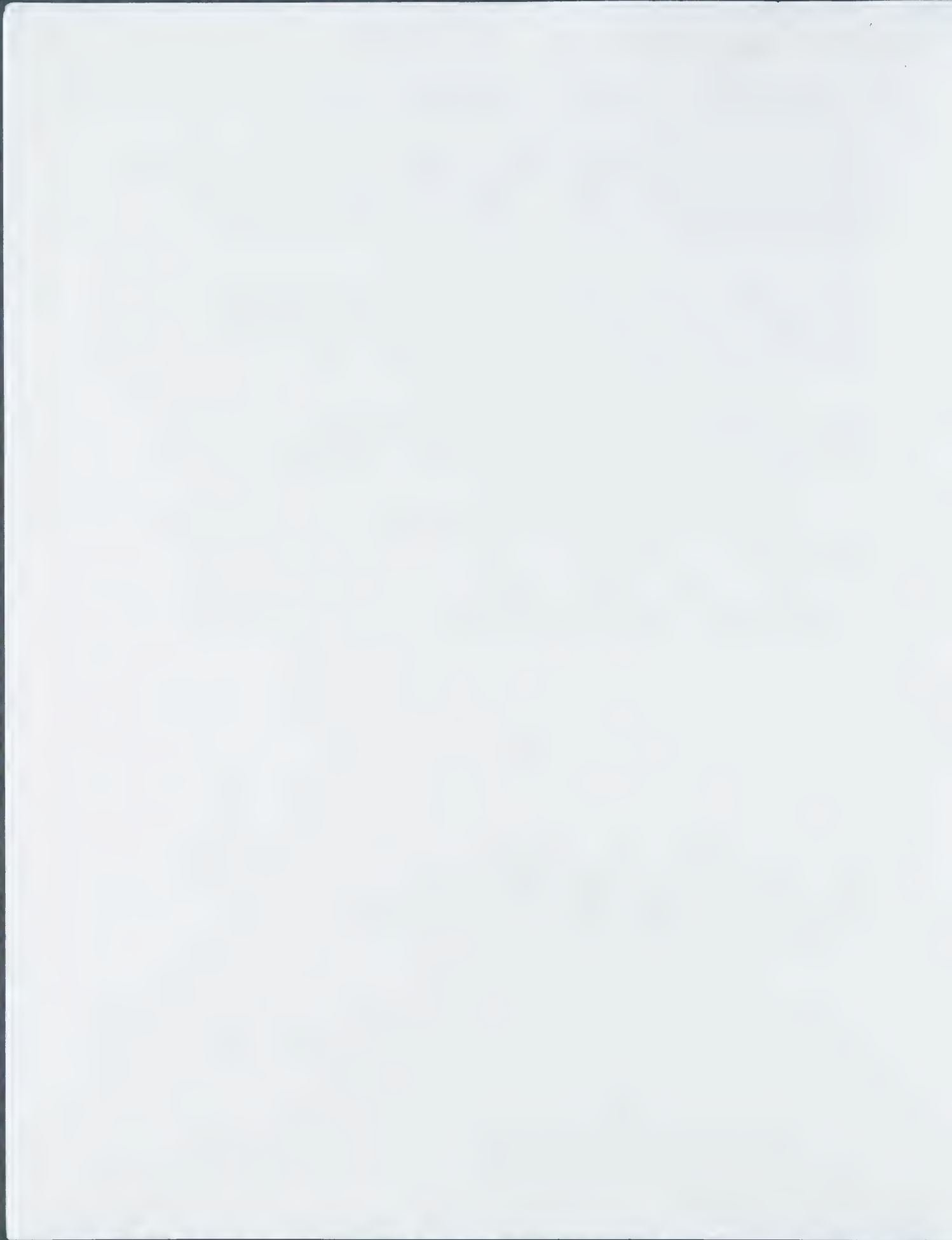
I am troubled to find this estimable program of proven value up against the wall financially. I hope that together we can assure its continuation in the coming year.

#### **PROGRAM REPORT**

La Benevolencija is cultural and humanitarian organisation within Jewish Community in Sarajevo. It has a respectable tradition in taking care of old, sick and lone people in Sarajevo.

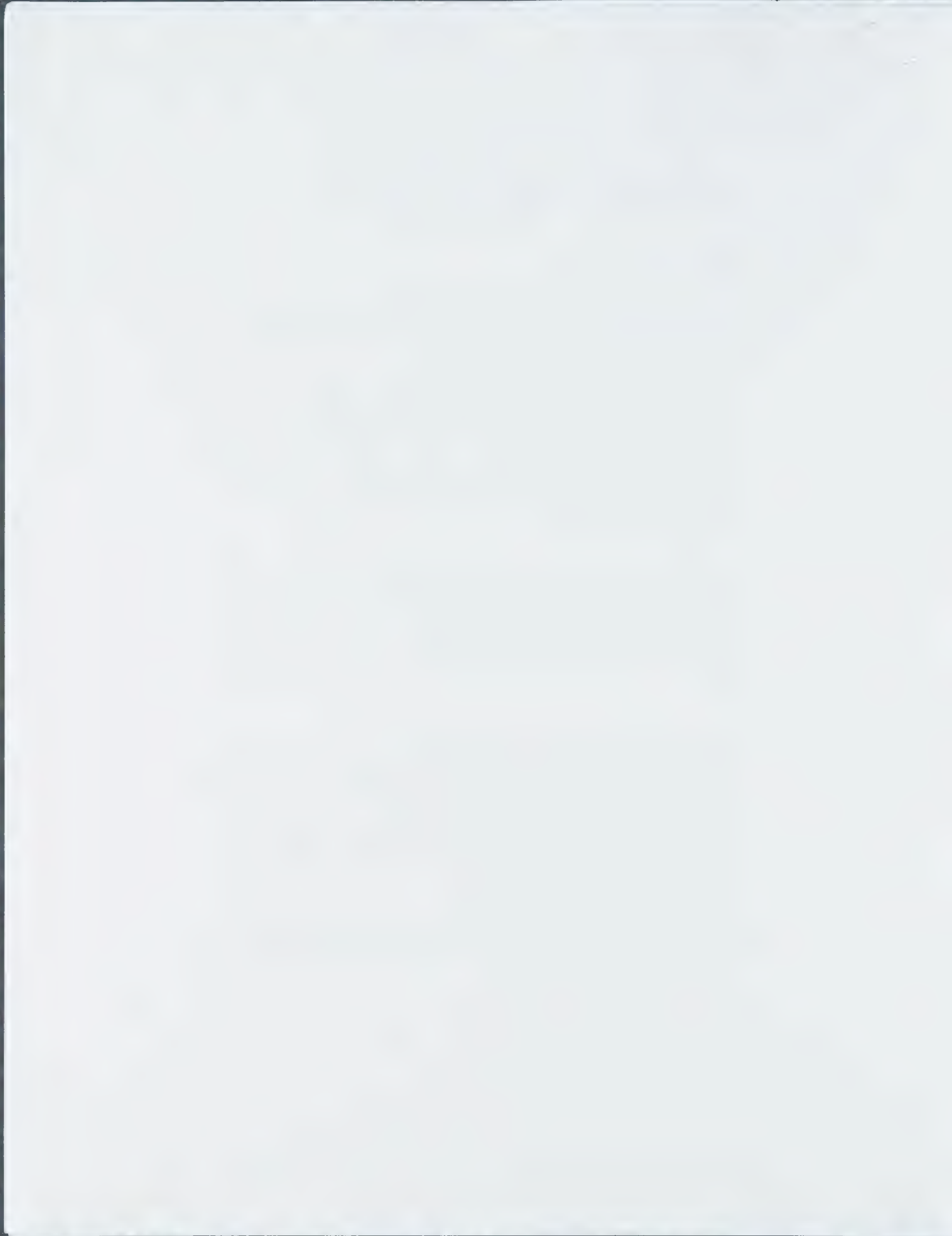
Since the war in Bosnia and Herzegovina ended, the interest of international organizations to help us is decreasing more and more.

With sympathy I have to say that at the end of 2000 (1999 was the Year of Old People in the World), on the intersection of new Millennium, we are left without any financial aid, which was taking care of 470 old people in Home Care project.

From 1992, to the present financial and material support to Home Care project was given by: JOINT; UKJAID; Friends of La Benevolencija Germany, Switzerland and Holland; Open Society Fund - SOROS Foundations; Mission Locale de Strasbourg, ICVA, Germany HELP; The Government of the Netherlands and the Micro-credit loan fund of La Benevolencija as well by different individual donors from all over the world.

All users of Home Care project are older than 65 years, chronically ill patients, hardly movable or bedridden or suffered greatly from the World War Second. Deeply hidden frustrations have found a way out from their souls and in very intensive form are being reactivated. The consequences of that are dominating post - war traumatic syndrome, intensive and continuous worries of unpredictable future. Life on the border of minimum existence is one more proof of horror that they have already experienced.

Many of them live totally alone, without children who are all around the world now, and it is one more proof of terrible situation they live in.



The users of Home Care project have constant need for someone who will knock on their door and with whom they will talk about their problems. All of them feel sadness, uselessness, weakness and heaviness of the life.

Also, the financial moment is very negative. All the users of Home Care project are pensioners with pensions that they receive only from time to time and they are not more than 200 German Marks. Of course, it is not even enough for existential needs.

Structure of Home Care beneficiaries is the following:

There are three persons younger than 65. They are psychological patients. Their mothers have been the users of this project since 1992. Unfortunately, they passed away during 1999, and this project takes care of their sons now. We have to control their therapy, prepare the food, hygiene etc. We need additional financial support for above mentioned issues.



## **PROJECT INTENT**

The main purpose of this project is to help old and exhausted people in all segments of their lives, who are older than 65, without children in Sarajevo. However, they are all chronically ill patients, not very movable or bedridden, who need to get at least one hot meal a day as well as keeping them in good psycho-physical condition.

All this is given to the users of Home Care project by:

## **WORKING TEAM**

31 able working women. They help older people in all segments of their lives:

- they visit them four times per week for up to two hours each time
- organize specialist doctor treatments,
- put in the hospital if needed and visit them regularly
- buy and bring medicines
- they take care of their personal hygiene and hygiene in the house
- buy supplies
- take for a walk (if the person is able to do that)
- with authorization, they are also getting done all administrative work

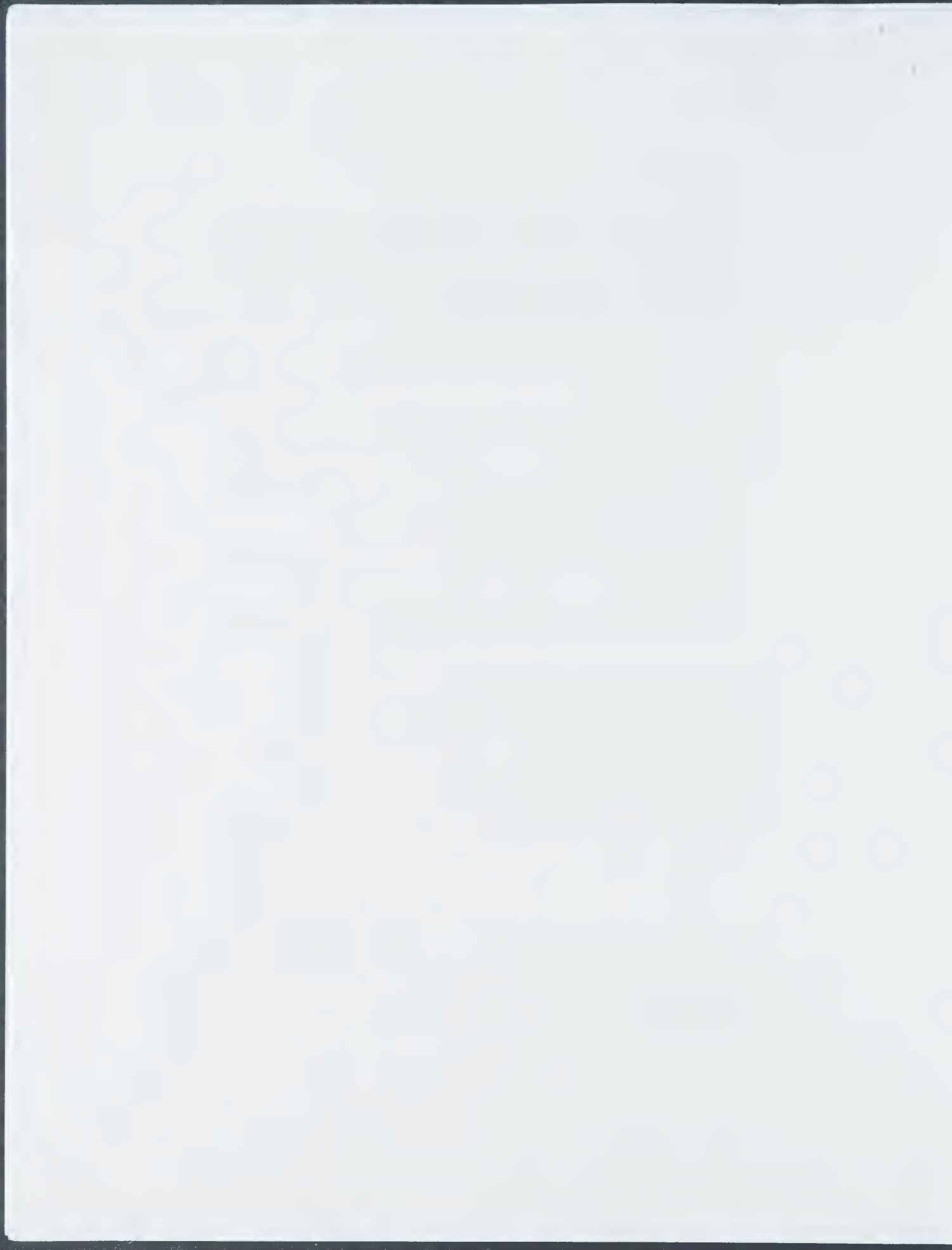
Working team is, through theoretical and practical seminars, most definitely able and qualified for work that they do.

Medical team, pharmacist and driver take care of very bad health conditioned members of Home Care project.

To leave those people would be like to condemn them to sooner death.

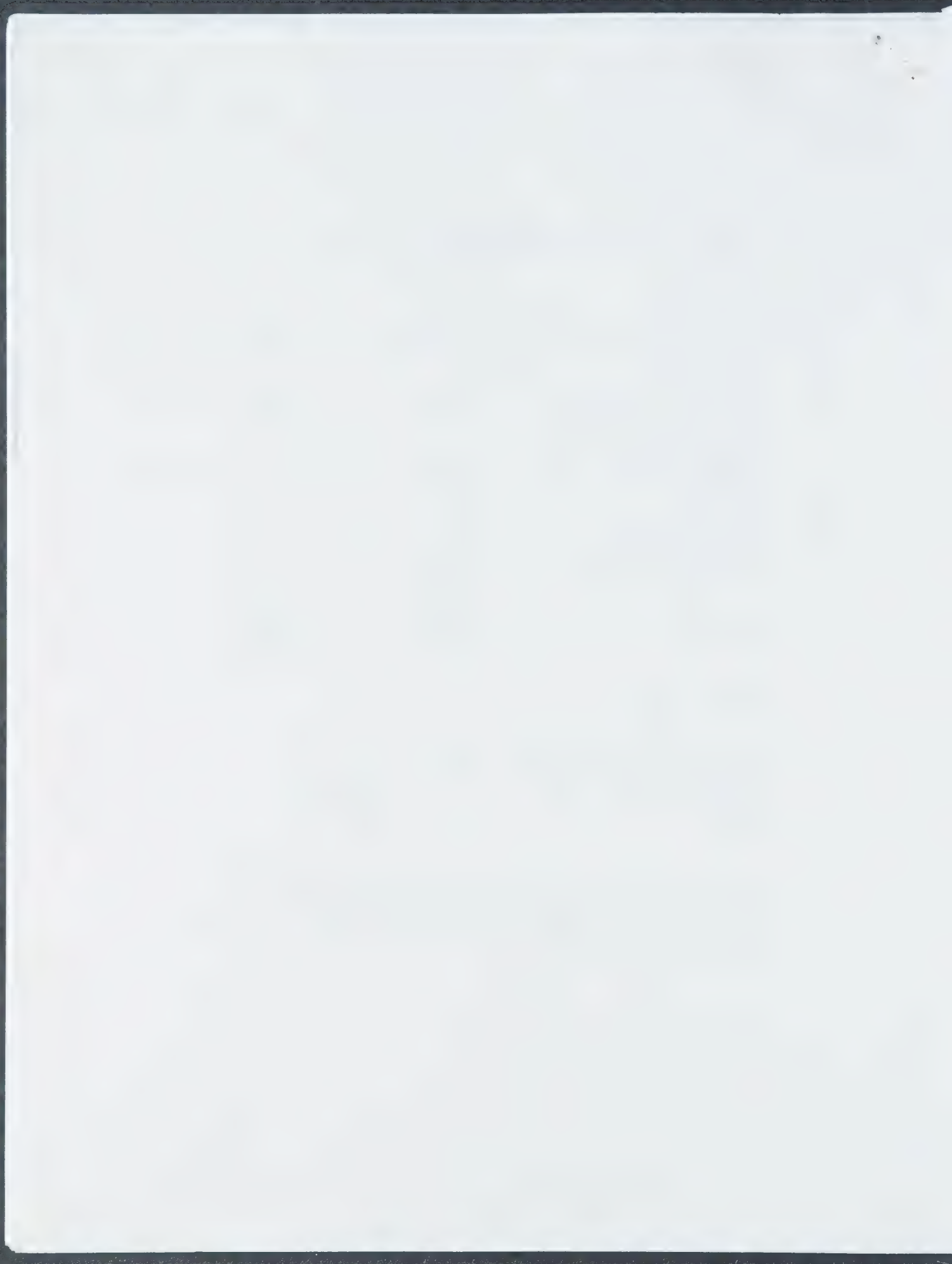

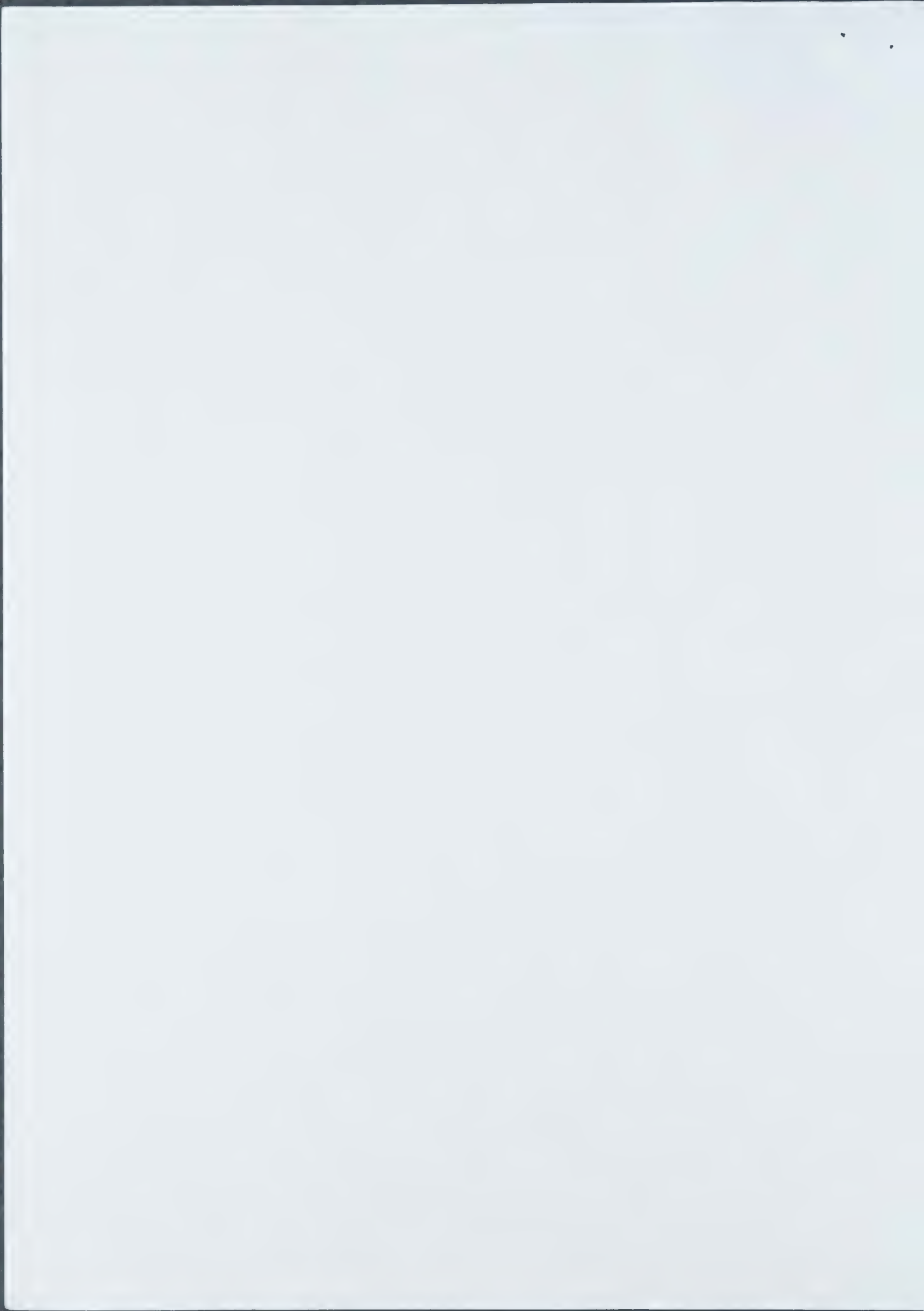

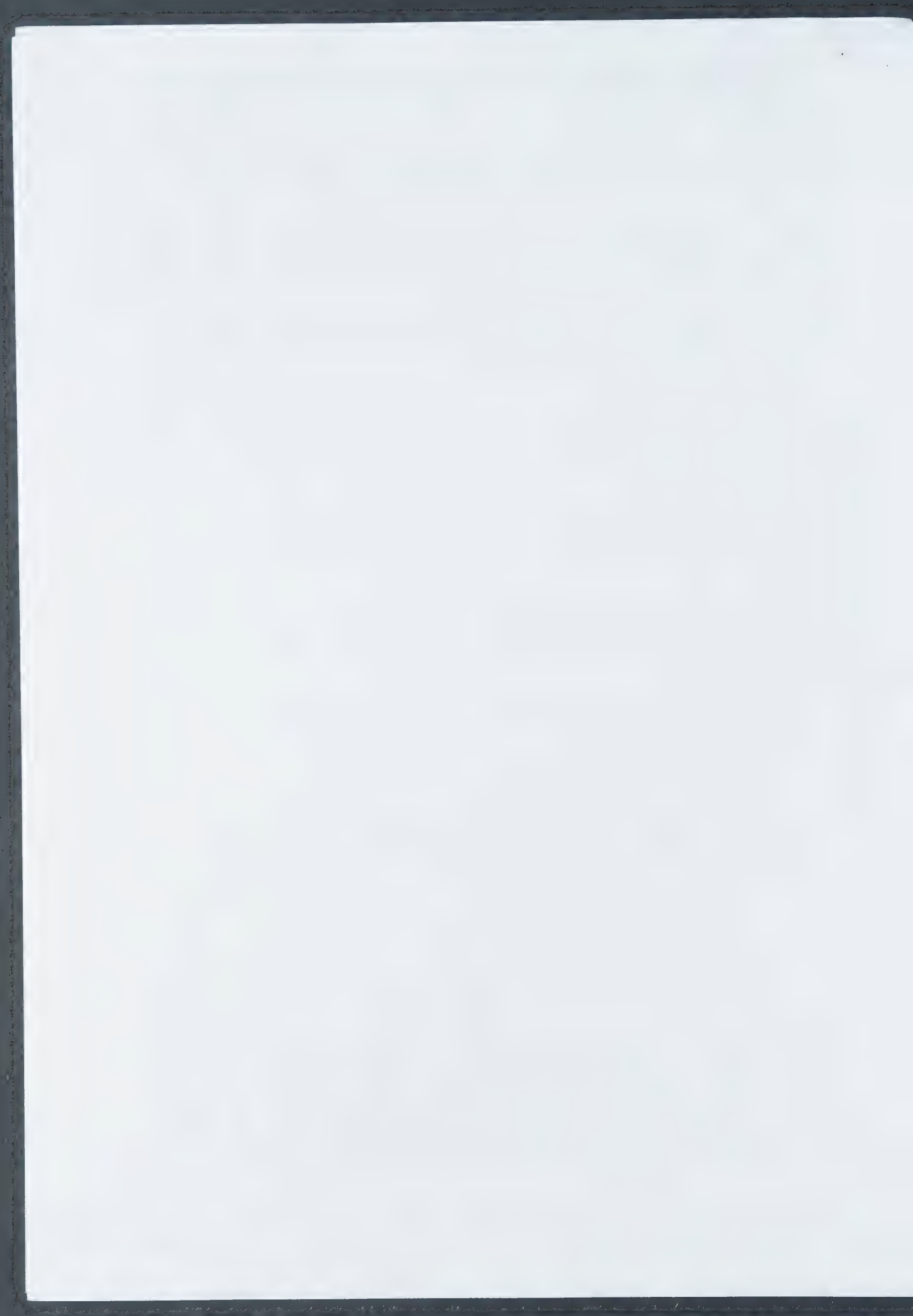
(A) In 1998, a loan was made from Wolfson to Odessa (thru Ohr Sameach) for a reported \$252,000 (see audited financials prepared by the Ohr Sameach accountant for December, 2000). In April 2001 a wire was received in Odessa from the Israeli Education Ministry for \$175,100 that was sent back to Ohr Sameach that was supposed to be a full repayment of the \$252,000 loan.

In a June 2002 meeting with Rabbi Baksht, Refael and Wolfson, Wolfson proved that he was never paid back and that outstanding debt was \$300,000. He also stated that, in his opinion, this is an Odessa and not an Ohr Sameach issue. Although he probably has a weak legal argument, future donations from Wolfson and the impact on other donors needs to be taken into account in a final resolution.

At your request, I traveled to Odessa, Ukraine from the period of October 30, 2002 through November 4, 2002 for the purpose of examining the books and records ("records") maintained by The Ohr Dessa Project ("Tikva"). The examination included (i) reviewing the actual results of operation for the first nine months of 2002 with a comparison to the budget; (ii) reviewing the anticipated spending and revenue levels for the fourth quarter of 2002; (iii) assisting local personnel in the preparation of a preliminary spending budget for 2003 for general operating expenses, special project costs and capital expenditures; (iv) updating the previous study splitting general operating costs between spending for the children's home, the school, the synagogue and humanitarian aid; (v) confirming 2002 revenue received to-date and expected full year revenue by source and responsibility; (vi) assisting in the preparation of a preliminary revenue budget for 2003 by source and responsibility; and (vii) determining local debt levels outstanding in comparison to historical amounts.

### Summary of Findings

The records of Tikva, principally maintained on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements, are well documented and detailed and fairly reflect the operating revenues and costs for the periods reviewed. The Tikva staff continues to be very knowledgeable in the detailed financial activities and has taken steps to improve controls over spending. These steps include a process of competitive bidding for programs that has resulted in more effective utilization of funds for heating fuel, guard services, capital expenditure spending and bus transportation. The original 2002 budget was prepared on the basis of 107 children in the orphanage. The projection for the end of 2002 is 130 children and the 2003 budget assumes a growth to 150 by December, 2003. This growth, both to-date and projected, is being handled with only very minor increase in total staffing levels.

Attached, for your review, are the schedules and narratives prepared.

### Specific Comments, Questions and Open Items

- I discussed with the staff the accounting treatment of cash vs. accrual basis. The financials continue to reflect a hybrid system that I think is the only way to make sense of the numbers considering the organization's fluctuating revenue receipts.

- In a true receipts and disbursements system, only actual cash payments would show as an expense. But if the organization had insufficient cash to spend in a particular month, it would be meaningless to show lower expenses for that month. Therefore, expenses, incurred but not paid, are shown in the monthly P&L with an offset to local payables on the balance sheet.
- Through an application from Ohr Sameach to the UJA, a request for a new baby home was submitted for funding totaling \$66,000. Tikva USA has submitted the second funding request with those funds to come directly to Tikva-USA.
- The 2000 audited financials prepared by Ohr Sameach reflected a debt to Wolfson of \$252,000. During 2001, the Israeli Education Ministry sent \$175,100 to Odessa that was immediately sent from Odessa to Ohr Sameach for repayment against the loan. In a June, 2002 meeting between Wolfson, Rabbi Baksht and Refael Kruskal, Wolfson asserted that the amount outstanding is \$300,000 and he considers this a Tikva, and not an Ohr Sameach debt. Although Wolfson probably has a weak legal argument, this issue needs to be further reviewed.
- During the course of the year, certain donors contribute with the understanding that their contribution will be spent on specific items (i.e. gifts for the children). Often, these items were not budgeted. Since the spending only occurs after a donation has been received, in reporting 2003 actual expenditures, these types of expenditures will be reported below the operating expense line in a new section called "Special Costs".
- During 2002, based on a specific donation, an office was set up in Israel to assist children in obtaining basic essentials when they left Odessa and resettled in Israel. During the early years of Tikva's operation, the number of children being sent was small. Now, as the original children grow older, it is anticipated that the number will increase to 30 per year. This concept, and its related cost, needs to be analyzed as the need for helping these children will continue to grow in future years. The Israeli based staff is preparing a budget for 2003 and it will be forwarded when received.
- The attached narrative for the 2003 budget includes a capital expenditure "wish list". Further discussion concerning the nature of the spending and the funding sources has to occur before they can be incorporated into the final 2003 budget.
