As I mentioned over the phone, the lecture by Eric Jan Sluijter in honor of the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of The Bader Collection was a tremendous success! We had almost 100 people in attendance, including such distinguished figures as the provost, Stephanie Dickey, Judith Brown, much of the curatorial staff at the Agnes, and lots of students. In addition, we had two notable faculty members from Boston University—art historian and Rembrandt specialist Michael Zell and musicologist/Rembrandt print specialist Joshua Rifkin—who made the journey for the event, as did the senior curator of prints and drawings from the National Gallery of Canada. We were incredibly pleased with the response from the attendees, who described Eric Jan's lecture as "fantastic", "a great overview", and "appropriately intellectual and very engaging for someone who knows little about Dutch art".

In addition to his lecture, Eric Jan met with students the following day. He shared with me that he was very impressed by their questions and that he found it to be a very rewarding back-and-forth. I think it was a very valuable experience for the students to meet informally with him.



Hello from Kingston! I hope this finds you well and happy. I have just returned from Amsterdam, where I attended the opening of the exhibition *Ferdinand Bol and Govert Flinck: Rembrandt's Master Pupils*, jointly organized by the Rembrandthuis and the Amsterdam Museum. As I'm sure you know, it includes three paintings from The Bader Collection. They are all on display in the Rembrandthuis, where they make a splendid contribution to this ground-breaking show (the first on these two artists).

As you may recall, this exhibition was one of the inspirations for our 2015 conference at Herstmonceux, which focused on Flinck and Bol. Over the past year I have been busy editing a volume of fifteen essays, most of which are based on papers presented at the Castle. I am delighted to report that this book, *Ferdinand Bol and Govert Flinck: New Research*, was published this week together with the catalogue for the exhibition.

I have asked the publisher to send you copies of both the research volume and the exhibition catalogue. They should arrive in Milwaukee some time next week. I do hope you will enjoy looking through them!

Other projects are in the works, including the book *Rembrandt and his Circle*, now in press, and another conference at Herstmonceux planned for July 2018. I will write about that when I have more details to share.

In mid-February, I wrote with news that Queen's was actively recruiting for the next Executive Director of the Bader International Study Centre (BISC). I indicated that, to mark the importance of the position to Queen's and to me personally, the incumbent would bear the title of Vice-Provost.

I am delighted to advise that our search was successful. Dr. J. Hugh Horton has accepted our offer to become the next leader of the BISC and Herstmonceux Castle Enterprises for a five-year term effective July 1 2017.

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
# Record number of first year students to study at the castle




For hundreds of Canadian students this upcoming academic year, this will be home - historic Herstmonceux Castle in East Sussex, England.



Imagine this as your classroom as you study history, arts, or science. The Bader International Study Centre is 'a unique and special place to study and work'.





Why learn about historic art through a screen when you can see it in person? Students on a field trip visit the Musée Guimet in Paris.

With a new school year soon to begin, there is a renewed sense of enthusiasm and pride for staff and faculty at the Bader International Study Centre (BISC). The incoming class for the 2017-18 academic year is 139 first-year Queen's students – the largest yet – and, with new Vice Provost and Executive Director Hugh Horton having just started his term, the next year looks to be a significant one in the campus' history.

"This is a unique and special place to study, and to work, and I am excited to be joining the team at the BISC," says Dr. Horton. "My first priorities include building on our recent strong enrolment performance, expanding our partnerships locally and with the Kingston campus, and continuing to refine and enhance the unique and personal student experience we have established at this campus. I look forward to building on the progress which has been made in recent years."

Next year will mark 25 years since Queen's University alumni Alfred Bader (Sc'45, Arts'46, MSc'47, LLD'86) and Isabel Bader (LLD'07) donated Herstmonceux Castle to Queen's – now known as the Bader International Study Centre. Since then, the castle has undergone renovations, generated many new partnerships, and established itself as a significant and distinct member of the Canadian higher education landscape.

In recent years, programming at the BISC has expanded to include a first-year science program in 2015, and a concurrent education (arts) program in 2016.

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These two programs join the existing first-year arts program, and an international law program. All programs offer a unique educational experience: small class sizes and close contact with professors, an interdisciplinary and community-oriented environment, and the opportunity for experiential learning activities in an international setting, whether at the castle or in sites across Europe.

"The field studies offered while I was studying art history at the castle were truly once-in-a-lifetime opportunities, and being lectured in front of the historic paintings I was studying were some of the most amazing academic experiences I have ever had," Maddi Andrews (Artsci'19) said in a recent news article, reflecting on her experience learning about Claude Monet's "Water Lillies" series.

In addition to providing a home and educational campus to about 250 Canadian university students each year, the BISC is involved in a number of other business ventures year-round and additional revenue-generating plans are in the works to help offset the cost of operating the castle. For example, when not in use by students, the site serves as a centre for academic and business conferences, a venue for festivals, weddings, concerts, plays, workshops, and exhibitions, and as a bed-and-breakfast facility and a tourist attraction for visitors. It was recently named one of the top 10 castles in the UK for a family day out by The Guardian. "The BISC is a key part of Queen's internationalization strategy, supporting the aims of our strategic framework," says Teri Shearer, Deputy Provost (Academic Operations and Inclusion). "Our new programs have been very successful, both in terms of attracting excellent students, and in student outcomes."

Dear Drs. Bader:

As the fellowships you have generously funded for early career humanities scholars come to a close, I want to thank you for the renewed energy the Bader postdoctoral fellows have brought to the Department of English. In 2015 we selected Dr. Emma Peacocke, a young Romanticist who had already published a book monograph *Romanticism and the Museum* and who was researching the representation of the University in the period. You can judge the caliber of the scholar your gift enabled us to bring to the department when I tell you that Emma was subsequently awarded a prestigious Banting Postdoctoral Fellowship with us for 2016-18.

In 2016 the Faculty of Arts and Science granted permission to appoint another scholar for the final year of the Bader Postdoctoral Fellowship vacated by Dr. Peacocke, and the department next selected Dr. Cathleen McKague, a graduate of the Shakespeare Institute of the University of Birmingham. She was an excellent match for Queen's because her current research explores the history of Shakespeare production in Canada using the Robertson Davies Collection in the W.D. Jordan Library and Special Collections. Her work with these materials has enabled our librarians to develop a better understanding of the collection.

Both scholars have been an amazing gift to the department—they have shared their grantwriting expertise with our current graduate students, helped organize speaker series and special screenings, and become outstanding instructors. Above all, their energy and promise have made the department a better scholarly environment for us all.

I wanted you to know that we are grateful for this gift.
