Value \$110. Founded in memory of Major Kenneth B. Carruthers, B.Sc., who was killed at Passchendaele in October, 1917. Awarded to a third year student in Mining Engineering on all the work of the year.

Kenneth B. Carruthers Scholarship in Metallurgical Engineering

Value \$110. Founded in memory of Major Kenneth B. Carruthers, B.Sc., who was killed at Passchendale in October, 1917. Awarded to a third year student in Metallurgical Engineering on all the work of the year.

Chemical Institute of Canada Scholarships

Two scholarships of the value of \$25 each, given by the Chemical Institute of Canada. One scholarship is awarded to the student in third year Chemical Engineering who obtains the highest standing on the work of the year, and the other to the student either in third year Chemistry or in the penultimate year of the Honours Course in Chemistry in the Faculty of Arts who obtains the highest standing on the work of the year.

Isaac Cohen Scholarship in Electrical Engineering

Value \$100. Awarded to a third year student in Electrical Engineering on all the work of the year.

Reuben Wells Leonard Penultimate Year Scholarships

Two Scholarships of the value of \$300 and \$200 respectively. Awarded to the student in the third year obtaining highest and second highest standing on all work.

R.C.E. Memorial Scholarship

Value \$125. Established by the Royal Canadian Engineers in memory of all ranks of the corps of the Royal Canadian Engineers who gave their lives in the Second World War. Awarded annually to a member of the Queen's University Contingent of the Canadian Officers' Training Corps who has completed the third year of a course in the Faculty of Applied Science. In determining the award the Committee will take into consideration qualities of leadership as well as academic standing. The winner of the Scholarship must have successfully completed at least one summer season's training with the Canadian Officers' Training Corps.

Susan Near Scholarships

Scholarships of the total value of \$500. Established under provisions of the will of the late Susan Near of Toronto. Awarded to students in the third year on all the work of the year. Apportioned amongst all Departments in Scholarships of \$75, \$50 and \$25, each Department to have one or more Scholarships according to the number of students in each. The exact distribution is announced at the beginning of each session.

William Wallace Near Scholarships

Three Scholarships of the value of \$100 each. Established under the provisions of the will of the late William Wallace Near of Toronto. A Scholarship is awarded in each of Chemistry, Chemical Engineering, and Civil Engineering to a student in the third year on all the work of the year.

Scholarships of the Association of Professional Engineers

Three Scholarships of the value of \$100, \$75, and \$50 respectively. Founded by the Association of Professional Engineers of Ontario. Awarded to students in the third year on all the work of the year.

Fifth Field Company Scholarship

Value \$40. The Fifth Field Company Scholarship is provided by funds accumulated for this purpose by the officers, N.C.O.'s, and sappers of that unit since the First Great War. Awarded to a student in the third year course in Civil, Mechanical, or Electrical Engineering on the basis of Hydraulic Engineering I.

The Martin Wolff Memorial Scholarship

Value \$50. Established by Alfred R. Bader, Science '45, Arts '46, in memory of the late Mr. Martin Wolff, a distinguished civil engineer in the Province of Quebec. Awarded annually to the student in Civil Engineering who makes the highest standing on all the work of the year.

Engineering Institute of Canada Prize

Value \$25. Awarded by the Engineering Institute of Canada to the student in the third year who has proved himself most deserving, as disclosed by the examination results of the year in combination with his activities in the students' engineering organization, or with a local branch of a recognized engineering society.

Bannister Secretary of the University Queen's University Kingston, Ontario, Canada Dear Mr. Bannister: I am sorry that we could not meet personally during my recent visit to Queen's, but I believe that I will sometime this winter give a seminar to the Queen's Chemistry Department, and I hope then to have a chance to meet you personally. Thank you for sending me a copy of your letter of November 8 to Dr. John E. Hammett. With that copy the two certified checks to the Friends of Queen's University were returned to me, and I presumed that this was just an error, and I have forwarded the checks to Dr. Hammett. Undoubtedly, Dr. Hammett will be in touch with me if he has any problem understanding the receipts I require for tax purposes, and there is of course no great hurry about this, as I will not require documentation for tax purposes until April 15, 1967. Practically, of course, the matter is quite straightforward: I gave the stock to the Friends of Queen's University, but as there is a market for the stock only in Milwaukee and not in New York, it seemed the practical thing to do to arrange for the sale of the stock for the Friends of Queen's University here in Milwaukee. I will be in Europe from this coming Tuesday, November 22, until December 6, so that if Dr. Hammett should try to contact me during those two weeks, I will not be able to reply until after my return. Dear Dr. Hammett:

In your absence on November 3, I spoke to Mr. LaQue concerning a gift of \$10,000 to the Friends of Queen's Incorporated, and its ultimate transmission to Queen's University to cover the cost of a valuable painting which the University wishes to acquire.


My understanding was that if Dr. Bader wishes to give an unrestricted gift of money or securities to the Friends of Queen's, there would be no reason why he could not receive an income tax receipt which he could use in the United States. It was my intention to then write to the Friends of Queen's Incorporated asking for a grant to cover the acquisition of the painting.

Dr. Bader has indicated that he is prepared to make similar contributions to the Friends of Queen's in subsequent years providing that there are some means by which these funds can be eventually transferred to Queen's University for the purchase of art.

On November 3, Dr. Bader did give the University two cheques payable to the Friends of Queen's Incorporated, amounting to \$10,000 (U.S. funds), which are attached.

A problem has arisen, however, in that Dr. Bader has requested that instead of receiving a Friends of Queen's receipt for \$10,000, he receive a receipt for \$600 and another receipt for 800 shares of Aldrich Chemical Company stock valued at \$9400, the latter receipt to be dated prior to October 27, 1966. The reason he wants this receipt for stock rather than cash, is the substantial tax advantage to him.

The proper procedure, in my opinion, would have been for Dr. Bader to forward the stock directly to the Friends of Queen's, and the Friends of Queen's would then send him a receipt for the stock. Although it is now too late to follow this procedure concerning his 1966 gift, the question arises as to whether we can meet his wishes in any other way. We should not peopardize our good relationship with the U. S. Department of

Internal Revenue by attempting to circumvent the existing regulations. However, the problem has been created only by the advance sale of the stock. Possibly we can act retroactively to place the whole transaction in order. The following procedure has come to my mind as a means of meeting the problem.

1. Frederick & Co. Incorporated (Dr. Bader's Broker) to write to Friends of Queen's Incorporated; the letter to be dated the same date as the stock was received from Dr. Bader.

We have received for the account of the Friends of Queen's Incorporated from Alfred Bader, 800 shares of Aldrich Chemical Company common stock. An official receipt is enclosed.

Dr. Bader has advised me that it is your intention to sell the stock, but he would like to have a receipt for the stock for income tax purposes.

Will you please confirm that you wish your firm to sell the stock for the Friends of Queen's Incorporated. We will forward a covering contract and proceeds of sale to you. Upon receipt of your cheque, please send Dr. Bader a receipt dated October (?) for 800 shares of Aldrich Chemical Company stock, indicating its value in accordance with the actual proceeds of sale.

2. Friends of Queen's to reply to Frederick & Co. Incorporated as follows:

In reply to your letter of October (?) please sell the 800 shares of Aldrich Chemical Company common stock which you are holding for the Friends of Queen's Incorporated, and remit the proceeds, together with a copy of your contract covering the sale.

3. Letter from Broker to Friends of Queen's

As instructed in your letter of October (?), we have sold the 800 shares of Aldrich Chemical Company common stock received from Dr. Bader for your account. The net proceeds of the sale were \$9400. Our cheque for this amount, together with the covering contract, are enclosed.

Letter to Dr. Bader We have received a letter from Frederick & Company Incorporated, dated October (?), 1966, in which they stated that they have received from you for the account of Friends of Queen's Incorporated, 800 shares of Aldrich Chemical Company common stock. We advised Fredericks & Company to sell the stock, and have now received their covering cheque for \$9400 payable to the Friends of Queen's Incorporated. I am pleased to enclose a receipt dated October (?), 1966, for 800 shares of Aldrich Chemical Company common stock indicating its value at \$9400, in accordance with the contract of sale in our possession. An additional receipt for \$600 is enclosed, making your total contribution to the Friends of Queen's, \$10,000. The above procedure appears to be somewhat cumbersome. Possibly you may have an easier way of handling the problem to everyone's satisfaction. Rather than get involved in a great deal of correspondence with Dr. Bader, you might consider calling him by telephone. Will you please discuss this problem with Mr. LaQue, and possibly with Dr. Bader, and see if you can work out some mutually satisfactory solution. Yours sincerely, John W. LETTER OF INTENT



Through my donations and in accord with my expressed wishes, Queen's University at Kingston in Ontario, Canada has established a fund which during my lifetime is to be used for the purchase of works of art for the collection of the Agnes Etherington Art Centre at Queen's University.

It is my wish that on or before December 31, 1997, whether I am alive or not, the unexpended and uncommitted funds in this account be employed as follows:

If, by December 31, 1997 or earlier, Queen's University establishes a Ph.D. program in art history, the money in the account at the time of the establishment of the Ph.D. program is to be used for the endowment of one-year travelling fellowships to Europe, to be awarded to graduate students in art history working for their Ph.D. degrees at Queen's.

If, at the discretion of the Department of Art History, there are no sufficiently qualified Ph.D. students for all the awards, the department may leave the unused portion with the capital, or may use it to improve the library of art history or other suitable services of the department. For example, if \$15,000 is the amount deemed reasonable for a travelling fellowship, and the income is \$100,000 that year, but there are only four qualified students, then the Department of Art History may at its discretion leave the balance of \$40,000 with the capital or use part or all to improve the library or other art historical services.

Failing the establishment of a Ph.D program in art history by December 31, 1997, the money in the account is to be distributed equally between the Department of Art History to establish undergraduate and graduate scholarships (the latter for M.A. students), and the Department of Chemistry to establish scholarships and fellowships in organic chemistry. The awards in chemistry are to be divided between undergraduate and Ph.D. students in the ratio of one to two in dollar amounts. The division between undergraduate and M.A. students in art history is to be left to the discretion of the Department of Art History.

Thus, for example, if by December 31, 1997 no Ph.D. program has been established, and the income available in 1998 is \$100,000, then \$50,000 shall be used for scholarships in art history, \$16,666 for undergraduate scholarships in organic chemistry and \$33,334 for fellowships for graduate students in organic chemistry working for their Ph.D. degrees at Queen's.

Among the highlights of our happy days at Queen's last month was our getting to know you as a person. When Sarah Dalton left we wondered who could take the place of such a caring person, and now we know: it is you.

First of all, please accept Isabel's and my thanks for all your help.

Now please let me summarize our discussions:

- 1. You will let us know the starting dates of each of the fourteen bursaries, scholarships and fellowships we have funded.
- 2. You will change the name of Capital Account to The Bader Chair in Northern Baroque Art. It may well be that the University will allow us to fund a Chair in Southern Baroque Art.

Also, you will let me know what the \$15,000 transferred to was used for, presumably by Professor Volker Manuth.

3. The Herbert and Stella Overton Award in Music, Account seems to be quite mixed up. Page 166 describing this award says there are two such at \$1200 each, yet the statement says that \$8800 was distributed.

The statement says that Kim Muir received \$12,000 for this academic year. Should she not receive considerably more? Perhaps the \$12,000 is just the first installment. Please advise.

5. The Herbert and Stella Overton Prize in Drama, Account seeds, is described as having a value of \$1,000, yet next year's projected income is only \$914.

Should we improve the capital slightly to increase income above \$1,000?

You know how taken aback we were to learn that several of the Awards can be given only to students from the Province of Ontario. This was never said to us, nor is it spelled out to the students coming from other provinces or abroad. Only about 80% of the Queen's students come from Ontario, and the University has been trying to give special awards to the 20% from out of Ontario. In order to help with these efforts of the University to award scholarships and bursaries fairly to non-Ontario students, we left you a cheque for US \$100,000. Please do send me a receipt for that and also for the cheque for US \$100,000 which we left for the David C. Smith Fellowship in Economics.

Of course most of what I have detailed here parallels your September 22nd three page memo.

My wife and I still remember with great pleasure your and Dr. Keyszelitz's kind reception of Prof. Noe and us in June, and want to thank you most sincerely for the time you spent with us.

Please forgive my thanking you so very late, but I had very much wanted to take counsel with Prof. David McTavish, the Chairman of the Department of Art History and the Director of the Queen's University Art Centre in Kingston Ontario, before writing to you.

Originally, I had hoped that we could somehow work out an arrangement whereby I provided the funds for Queen's University to acquire some major Harrach paintings with the clear understanding that these would remain at Queen's University as part of the Harrach Collection. Following that, I had hoped that we could somehow work out a system whereby Queen's students working for their Ph.D. in art history—and particularly those students working in the field of the Italian Baroque—could spend some time in Rohrau to study your wonderful collection.

Both you and Dr. Keyszelitz kindly explained that selling paintings to Queen's University would be very difficult because the Austrian government would make export permits very difficult to obtain--even if the paintings became part of "Harrach Collection" in Canada.

I came to Queen's almost 50 years ago, from Vienna via England and a prisoner-of-war camp on Lake Champlain.

When I was accepted by Queen's in the middle of November 1941, having been turned down by McGill and Toronto, I was scared and shy and selfish. Scared, because I had been told on leaving the camp that I must not tell anyone where I had been and had to report weekly to the local RCMP. Shy, because what could I say to fellow students who told me they had come from Glebe or Lisgar or the KCVI--and then asked where had I come from, in the middle of November? And selfish, because I thought one had to be, to survive. Yet, my fellow students in class and in Collins House, the Science '44 co-op, put up with me. And many of the professors, Jean Royce the Registrar and Dr. McNeill who introduced me to debating, treated me wonderfully well, as an individual, not as prisoner-of-war No. 156.

This kindness brought me out of my shell, and over the years my contacts and interaction with Queen's staff, alumni and students have continued to give me great pleasure.

I have always been interested in art. In the forties, Queen's had neither an art centre nor a department of art history, and I am delighted to see the growth of the Agnes Etherington Art Centre and the Department of Art History, now among the best in Canada. That growth is just indicative of the growth and vigour of this great university.





Dear Sarah and Tom,

As you know, Isabel has funded a number of awards but the accounting looks so difficult to us that we would like to discuss these one by one.

Isabel believes that the first funding for the Award in Music was given in 1995, not in 1997, with a gift of US 10,000.

In 1996 a student, Blackman, won the Award.

Then in March of 1997, Isabel gave an additional US 10,000 and that should have been matched by Ontario.

A student, Melanie Thompson, won the award in 1997.

Then in March of 1998, Isabel gave an additional US \$20,000 and that also should have been matched by Ontario.

Thus, Isabel gave a total of US \$40,000. US \$30,000 should have come in as matching funds from Ontario for a total of US \$70,000. That, however, is not in accord with the sheet you sent, copy attached.

Where did we go wrong?

As you know, we have established Awards at many Universities and generally we receive an accounting showing the initial sum plus income minus Awards given, and then showing the balance at year end.



It would be so helpful if we could receive the same from Queen's.

Once we understand the Music Award, Isabel will sign the Terms of Reference. Incidentally, there we think that only the year of establishment needs changing, from 1997 to 1995.
