





What is Oral History?





the Opportunity; the Challenge; the Plan



THE PRESENT OPPORTUNITY

Science and technology become ever more pervasive in modern life, yet many from the literary intellectuals to ordinary citizens are ignorant of the culture of science—of science and technology as a body of human achievements, aspirations, and intellectual and entrepreneurial ideas. The obverse of ignorance is fear—as expressed in anxieties over pollution, pesticides, genetic manipulation, etc.

Today, American chemistry and chemical industry are too often the victims of ignorance and fear. This is the more regrettable because American chemistry and chemical industry represent one of the great success stories of the past century. When the American Chemical Society was founded in 1876 America depended on Britain and Germany for dyestuffs, drugs, and chemical products; the few American chemists and chemical engineers were no match for their European colleagues. A century later American pharmaceutical, agricultural, chemical product, and petroleum firms were the envy of the world, while American universities held a near-monopoly of Nobel prizes in chemistry. Yet the history of these developments remains unwritten, while documents are destroyed and dispersed and a public grown weary too easily associates the field with materialism and despoiliation. THE CHALLENGE IS TO BEGIN THAT WORK WHICH WILL GIVE TO CHEMISTRY ITS RIGHTFUL PLACE IN HISTORY, AND IN PUBLIC ESTEEM. IT IS TO THIS CHALLENGE THAT THE WORK OF THE CENTER FOR HISTORY OF CHEMISTRY IS ADDRESSED.

THE MISSION OF CHOC

The Center for History of Chemistry is a joint endeavor of the American Chemical Society, the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, and the University of Pennsylvania, established in January 1982 to discover and disseminate information about historical resources and to encourage research, scholarship, and popular writing in the history of chemistry, chemical engineering, and the chemical process industries.

The aims of the Center are to develop a program of interviews and undertake oral histories of major developments in modern chemistry; to locate historical manuscripts and archival records in the hands of individuals, societies, trade associations, and companies important in the history of chemistry, chemical engineering, and the chemical process industries; to encourage the preservation of these records in appropriate repositories; to offer aid in the appraisal, arrangement, and description of such records; to develop a comprehensive data base describing such collections, with finding aids and other reference tools; and to make known the achievements of chemists, chemical engineers, and the chemical industry.

CHOC is independently incorporated under the Laws of the District of Columbia.

CHOC has applied to the Internal Revenue Service for 501(C)(3) status.

CHOC is governed by a national <u>Policy Council</u>, composed of representatives of its three sponsors. CHOC also draws on the services of a distinguished <u>Advisory Board</u>.

CHOC: THE FIRST FIVE YEARS

Since its founding in January 1982 CHOC has:

- --inaugurated an active program of <u>oral history</u>. Interviews have been completed with over fifty leading chemists and engineers including Arnold Beckman, Carl Djerassi, Hoyt Hottel, Herman Mark, "Speed" Marvel, Max Tishler, and Ernst Volwiler
- --developed a series of <u>travelling exhibits</u>. "Joseph Priestley," "Scaling Up," and "Polymers and People" have been seen by hundreds of thousands of people at science museums, schools, and shopping malls
- --produced a range of publications, from the widely-distributed $\underline{\text{CHOC}}$ $\underline{\text{News}}$, through information pamphlets, to guides to $\underline{\text{Corporate}}$ $\underline{\text{History}}$ and to chemical archives
- --extended its library, photographic, and documentation resources, and answered a steadily growing barrage of questions from students, teachers, and the media
- --sponsored conferences and meetings through which the chemical community can learn of, and can make known, the story of chemical achievement



CHOC: SUPPORT AND NEEDS

The main support of CHOC in its first five years has come from its three sponsoring organizations, from corporate and individual friends, and from federal and private foundations. Between them these sources have underwritten an annual budget which has grown to over \$400,000 a year. In 1986 a new group of individual 'Friends of CHOC' from 32 States contributed some \$9,000 toward this total.

With the need for and utility of CHOC well-established, the CHOC Policy Council inaugurated a planning exercise to establish a long-range plan. With the aid of Fund-raising Counsel (Barnes and Roche, Inc., a major national organization) a long-range plan was established. That plan has been endorsed by the Board of Directors of ACS, the Council of AIChE, and by the University of Pennsylvania.

The plan calls for the raising by CHOC of

--\$2 million to provide a home for CHOC

--\$2 million to provide a capital reserve, to stabilize the operations of the Center.

In addition, the University of Pennsylvania has committed itself to raise \$1.25 million for an endowed chair in the history of chemistry, to be associated with CHOC.



THE BECKMAN CHALLENGE

CHOC is delighted that Dr. Arnold Beckman has signed a letter of intent to <u>donate \$2 million</u> to what will become "the Beckman Center for History of Chemistry" provided that CHOC raises a matching \$2 million (in firm pledges) by 31 December 1987.

This exciting challenge offers the prospect of establishing CHOC on a proper basis, in adequate space, for the first time since the Center was launched. In response to this challenge, the CHOC Development Committee has identified the need for funds to be devoted to:

An endowed chair/directorship	\$1.25 million
Library and information center	\$1.00 million
Oral history of industry project	\$0.50 million
Exhibit design center	\$0.50 million
Graduate Fellowships	\$0.25 million each

The opportunity is for the friends of CHOC to meet these and other Center needs (publications support; a media fund; conference support; school science teacher fellows; scholarly travel) with <u>capital funds</u> that will stabilize the Center's operations and meet the Beckman challenge.
