

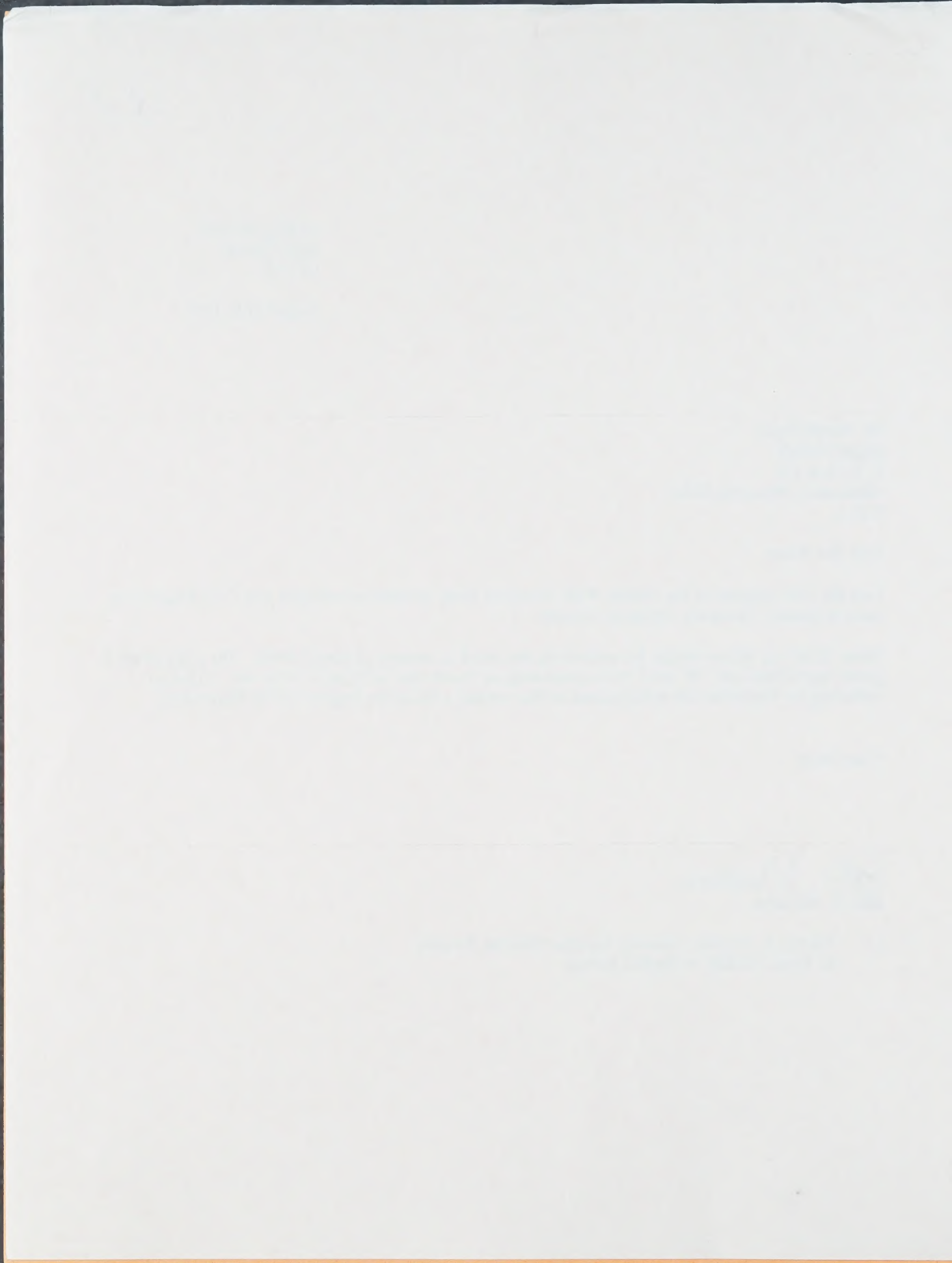

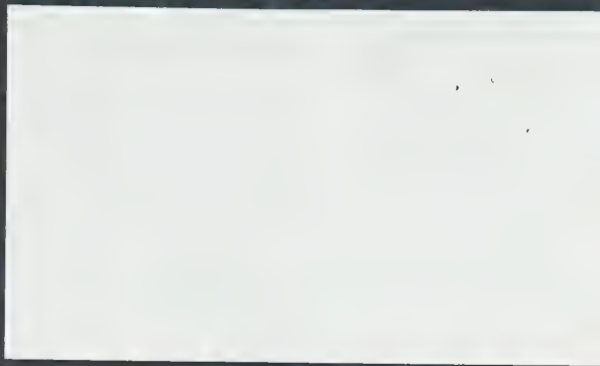

I was on a lecture tour to Colorado, hence the delay in responding to your fax of November 4th.

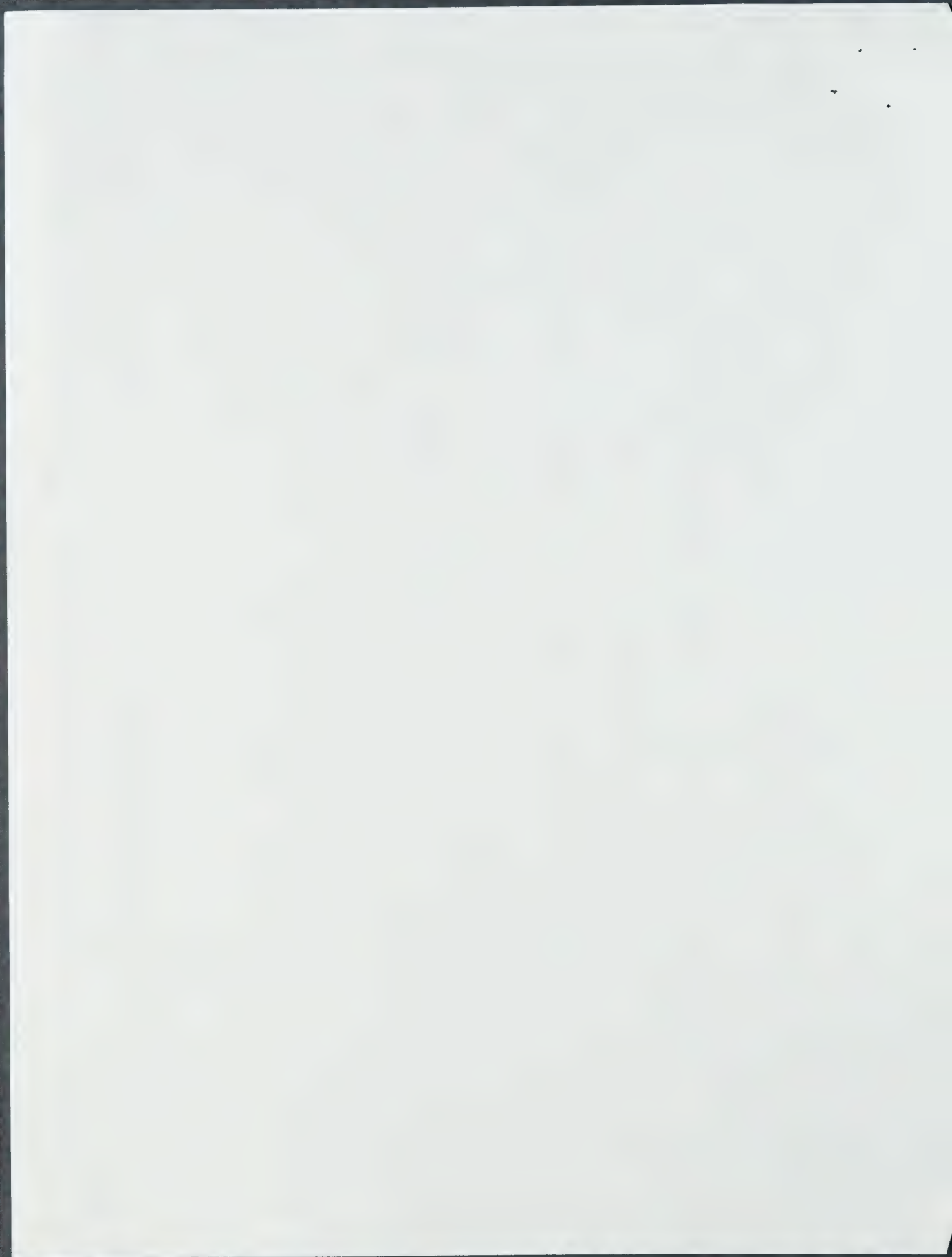

Dear Dr. Bader:

Last summer I had the pleasure of meeting you, after your fascinating after-dinner lecture on art restoration, at the International Isotope Meeting in Toronto. I was particularly interested in your restoration of a picture which, when you had removed a cross with a solvent, you were able to identify the original painting as one of King David.

I am now writing to you on behalf of Congregation Iyr-Hamelech, the reform Jewish Congregation of Kingston. Our congregation which has been in existence for approximately seventeen years, has now purchased its first building at 391 Barrie Street to serve as Hebrew School and Synagogue. Our congregation, which has grown rapidly in recent years, has fifty member units and forty children in Hebrew School. The driving force for purchase of our own building was the fact that the number of children had increased to the point where rented accommodation became inadequate.

The founding ten families of our congregation strongly believed in an inclusive congregation, and we have always, therefore, welcomed everyone irrespective of their ability to pay. Approximately one third of our membership consists of single parent families with limited financial resources, and many of the other family units are young families of moderate means. As a former Jewish student in Kingston you might be interested to know that we welcome students from Queen's and other institutions at no charge to all our religious services and social functions.

I am writing to enquire whether you might have an interest in making a financial contribution to our building fund, thus allowing us to continue being an inclusive and welcoming congregation to all who wish to remain within the Jewish fold.



All donations are tax deductible in Canada. We would be happy to acknowledge your gift by placing a plaque in the main room of our building.

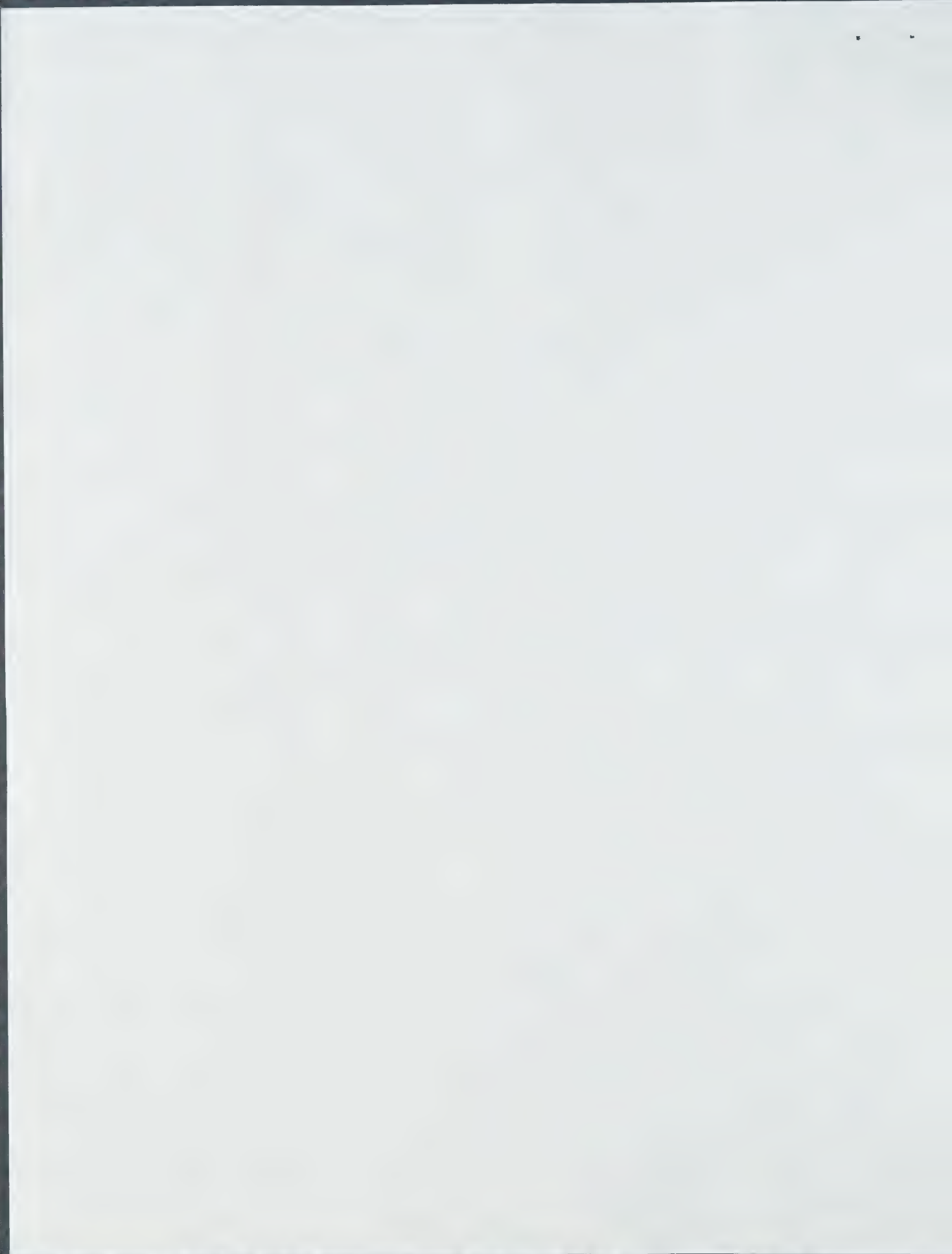

Why not give the color transparency to David McTavish who plans to come to Milwaukee later this month.


I am glad that you like the Backer which Queen's purchased from an old lady in Chicago at probably less than one tenth the price which Hoogsteder is asking for his work.

Thank you so much for your letter of March 11th, which reached me only yesterday as it was addressed to Sigma-Aldrich.

Allow me, first of all, to tell you an interesting story. One of the students at Queen's University in the early 1940's was an orthodox Jew, Willy Low, who was in the prisoner of war camp with me and who later became an eminent physicist and founder of the Jerusalem Institute of Technology. At that time, some examinations had to be written on Saturdays, which Willy of course refused, thus failing those examinations. Some time, I believe in 1944, Willy went to Jean Royce, the Registrar, a wonderful woman who helped us entering Queen's, and said to her: Look at my record; I have nothing but A's and each year one F. I will be able to explain why I have the F, but will Queen's be able to explain? Miss Royce listened carefully and then asked Willy one question: If we allow you to write the examination papers on Sundays, will we have your assurance that you will not have discussed the papers before, with others? Of course Willy replied yes and from then on orthodox Jews could write Saturday papers on Sunday.

I do not believe for a moment that anyone at Queen's wants to harm Jewish students, but considering the Jewish calendar requires some effort and clearly that was not done.

I am sharing your letter with Principal David Smith who will undoubtedly pass on the correspondence to the persons in charge of setting examinations.

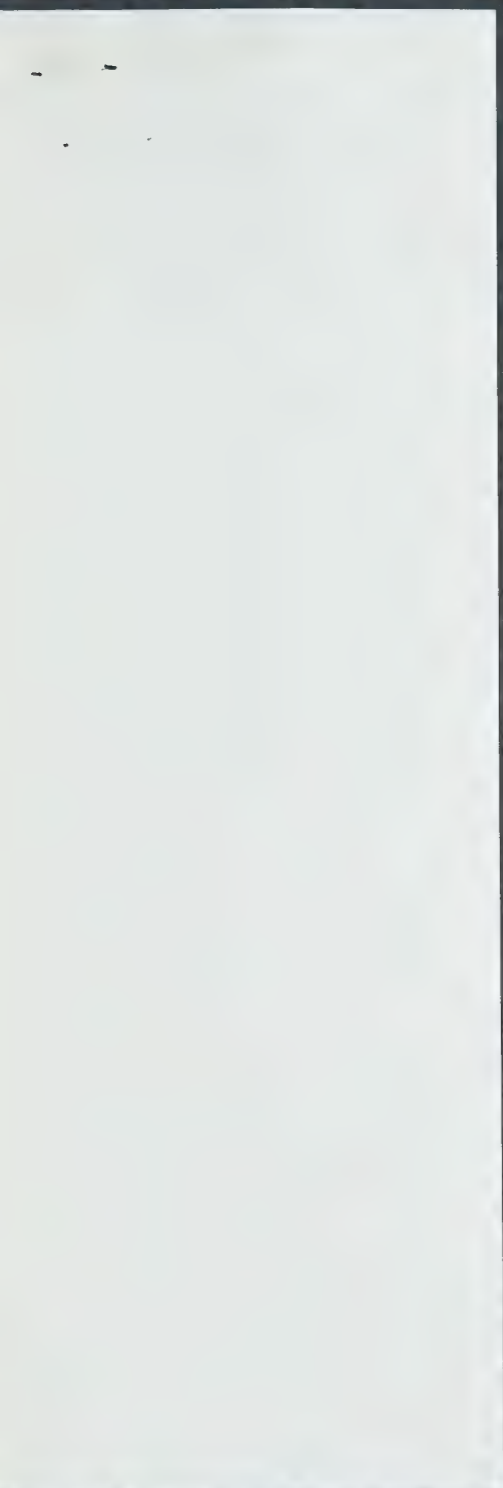

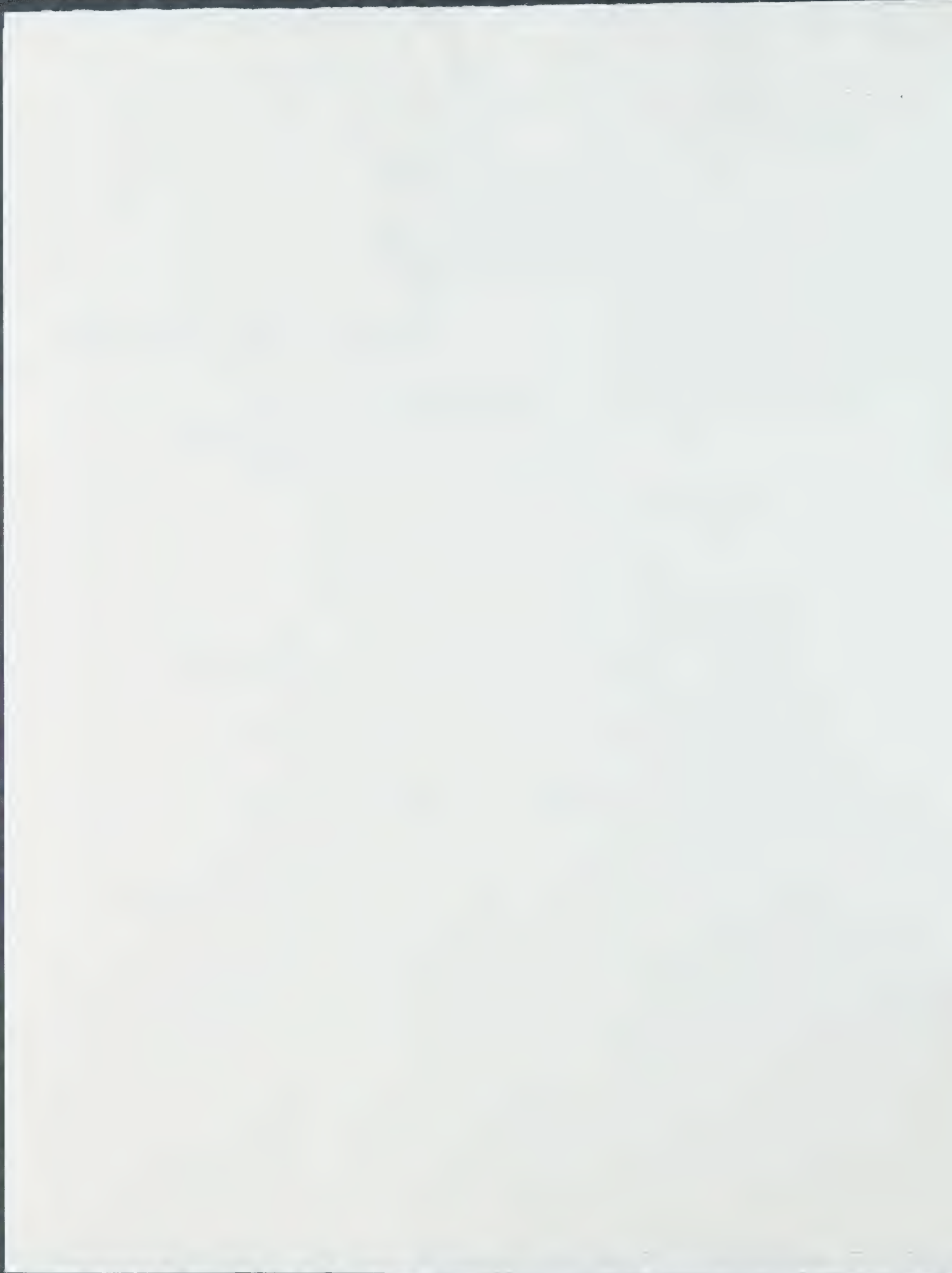

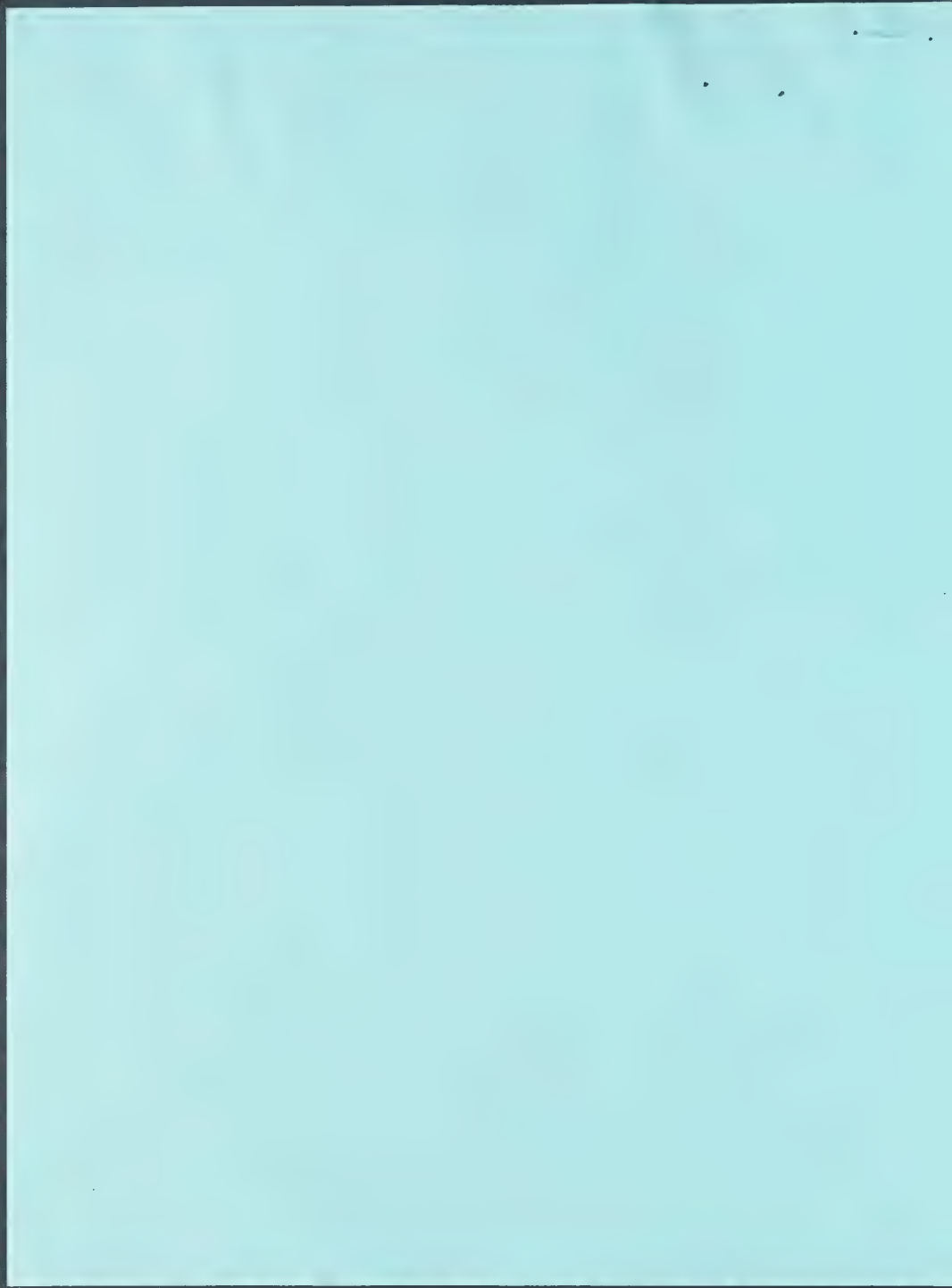

It was in 1986 when he received his first Master's, that you spoke. I have heard many speakers at various graduations, but you were the only one that touched my heart.





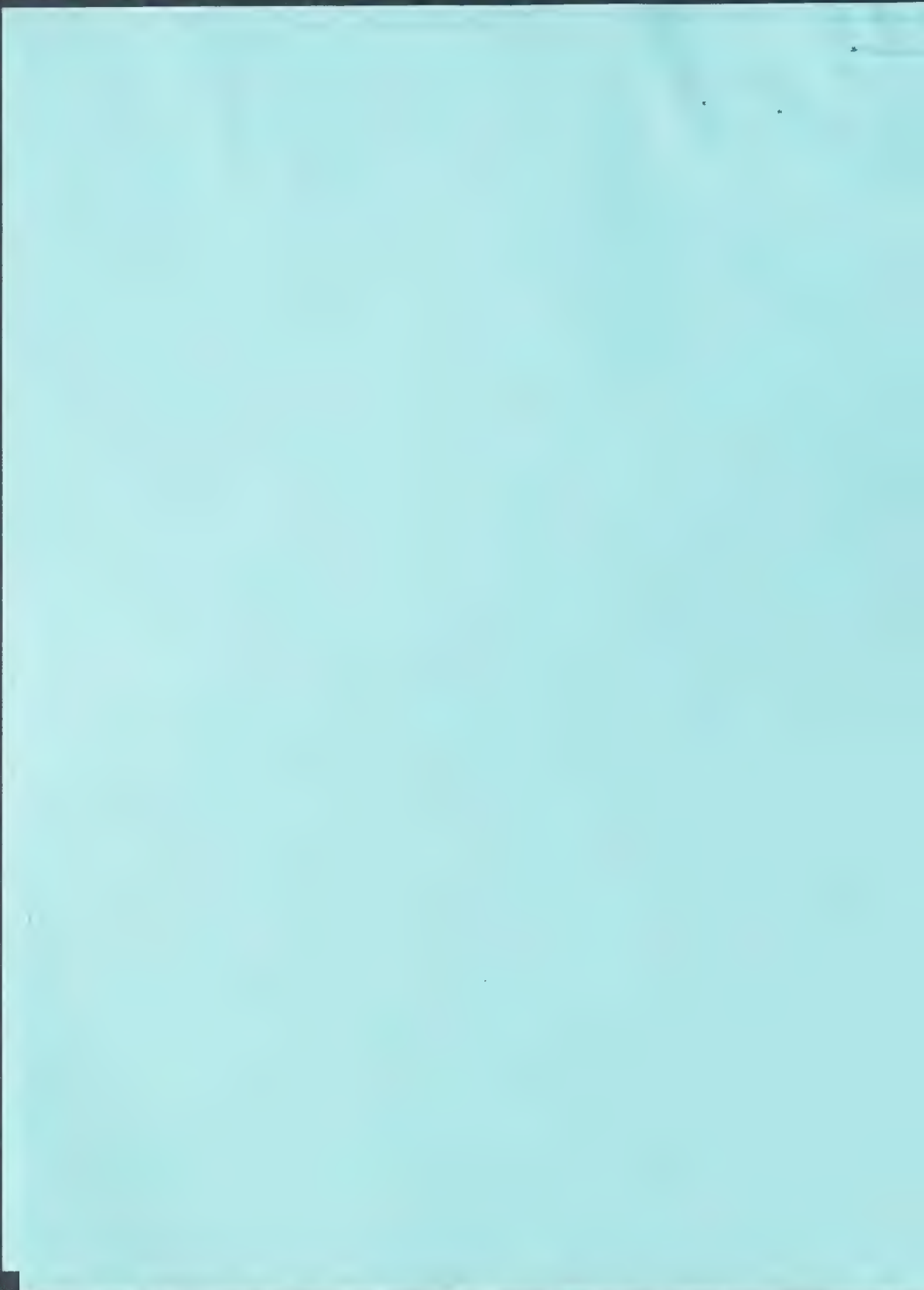
Our other daughter, Helene, also received

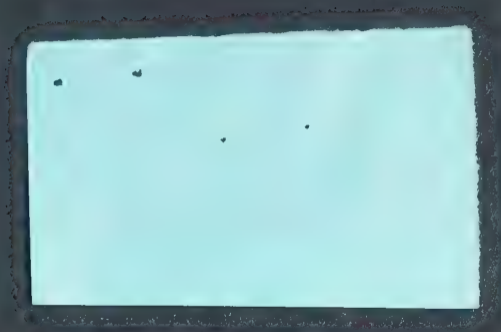

Thank you so much for your letter of March 11th, which reached me only yesterday as it was addressed to Sigma-Aldrich.

Allow me, first of all, to tell you an interesting story. One of the students at Queen's University in the early 1940's was an orthodox Jew, Willy Low, who was in the prisoner of war camp with me and who later became an eminent physicist and founder of the Jerusalem Institute of Technology. At that time, some examinations had to be written on Saturdays, which Willy of course refused, thus failing those examinations. Some time, I believe in 1944, Willy went to Jean Royce, the Registrar, a wonderful woman who helped us entering Queen's, and said to her: Look at my record; I have nothing but A's and each year one F. I will be able to explain why I have the F, but will Queen's be able to explain? Miss Royce listened carefully and then asked Willy one question: If we allow you to write the examination papers on Sundays, will we have your assurance that you will not have discussed the papers before, with others? Of course Willy replied yes and from then on orthodox Jews could write Saturday papers on Sunday.

I do not believe for a moment that anyone at Queen's wants to harm Jewish students, but considering the Jewish calendar requires some effort and clearly that was not done.

I am sharing your letter with Principal David Smith who will undoubtedly pass on the correspondence to the persons in charge of setting examinations.

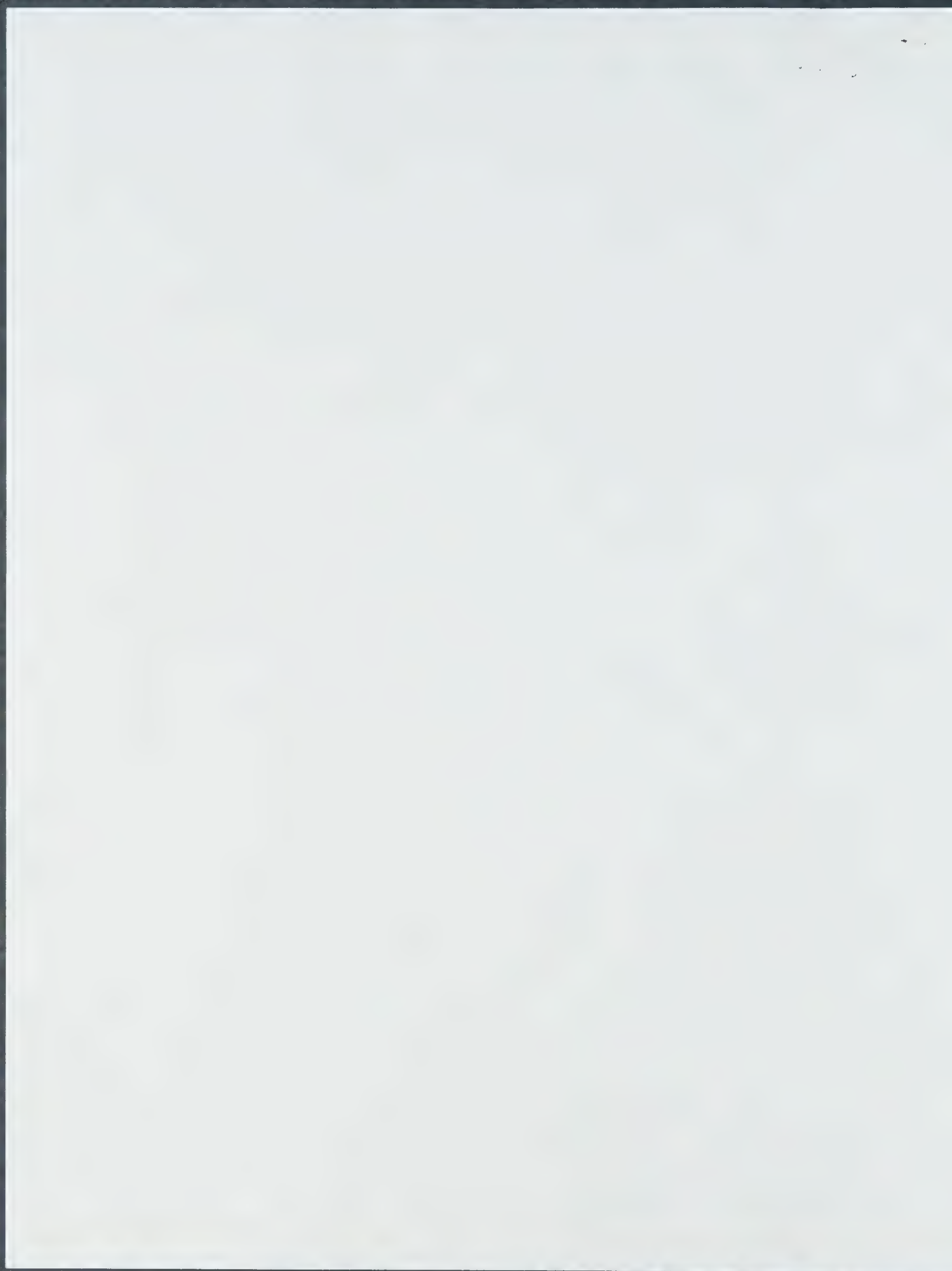

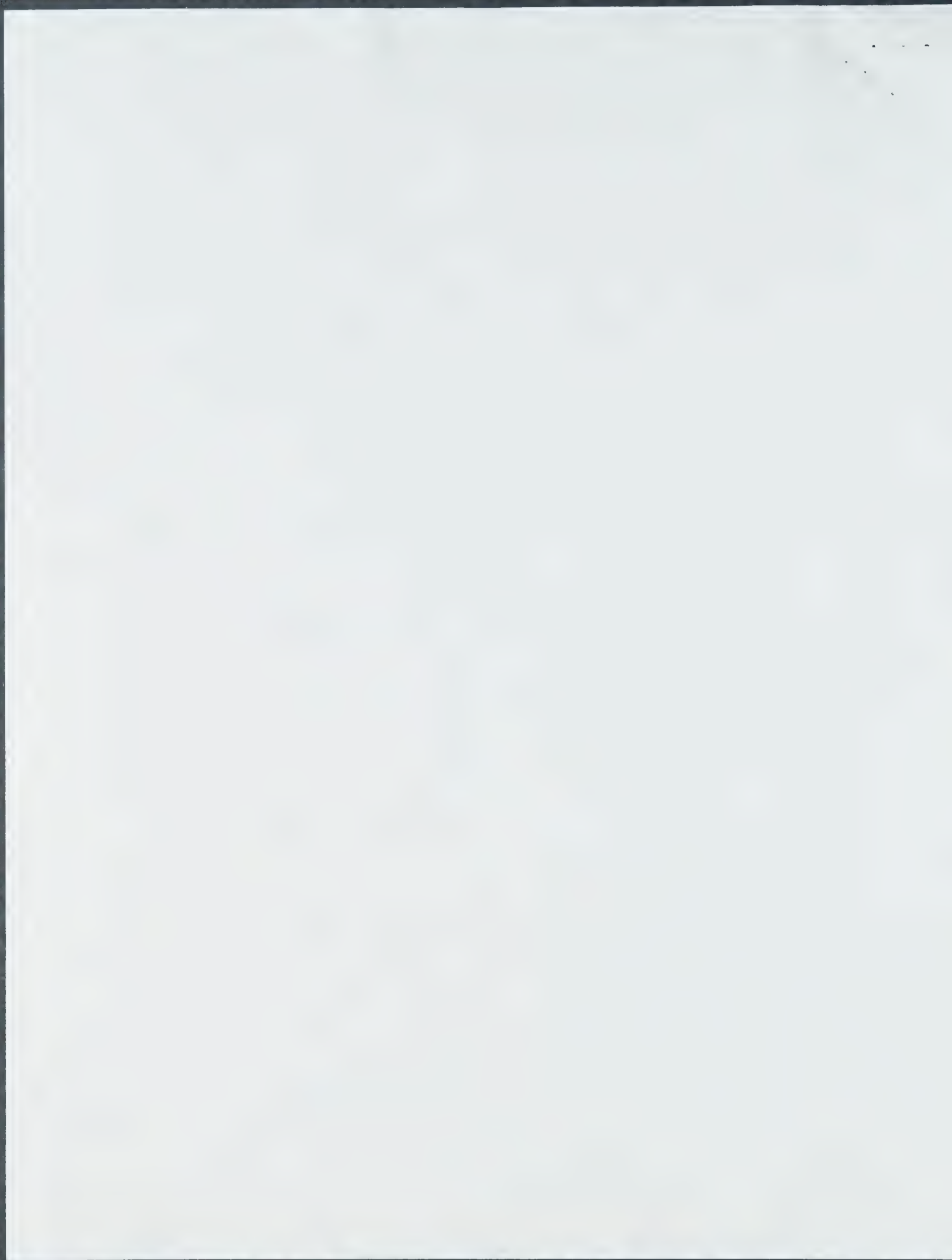

All final examination schedules carry this notice of policy and in more recent years a list of "Important Faith Dates", compiled by the University's Interfaith Council, is widely distributed and publicized within the University (A copy of the 1993 notice is enclosed for your information) In addition, the Senate Committee responsible for establishing academic sessional dates reviews this matter regularly with a view to further improvements in our policies and procedures.

I regret that your daughter encountered difficulty when making arrangements to reschedule her exams, but I hope you are assured that Queen's is very sensitive to this matter and to the students who represent many faiths on this campus.

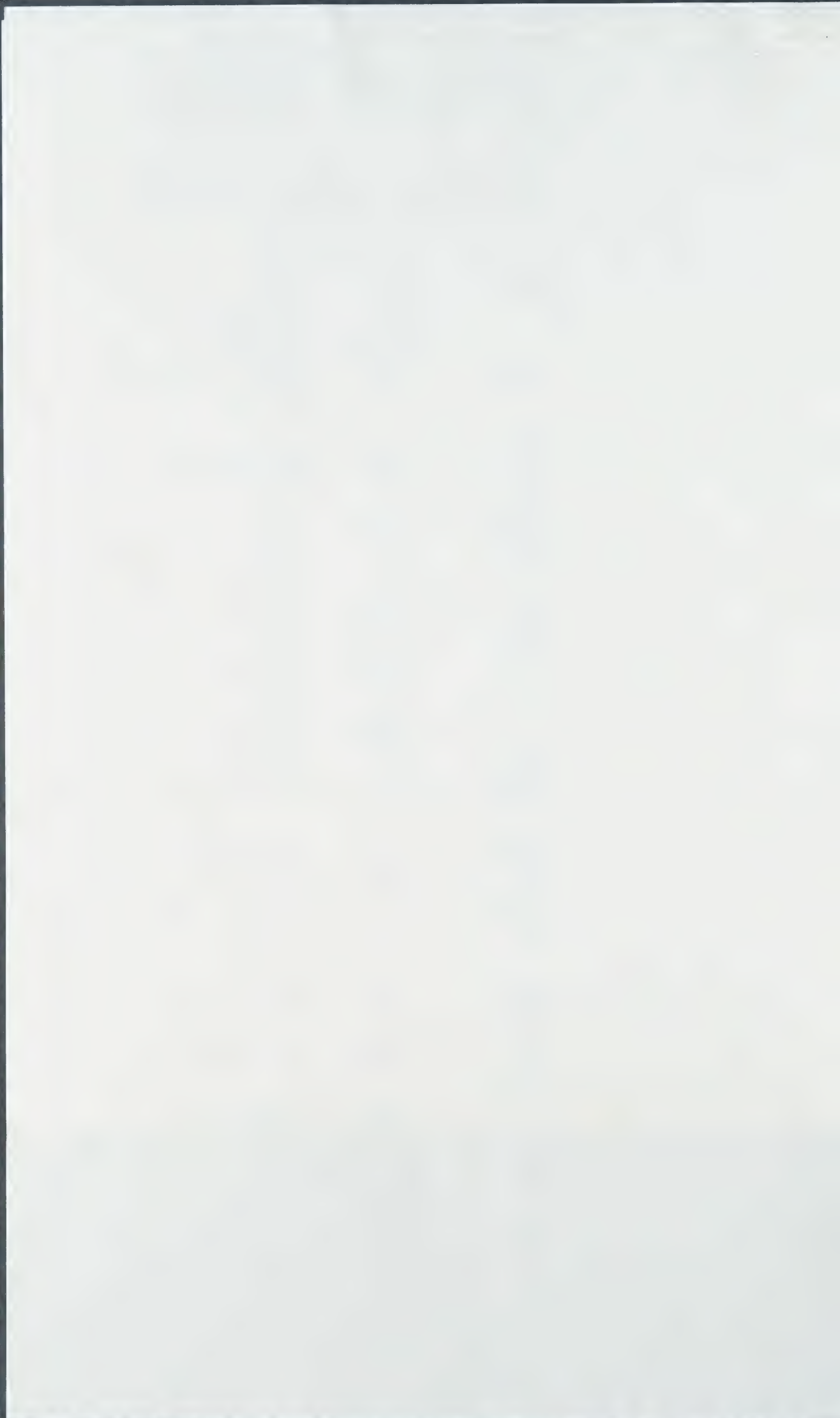

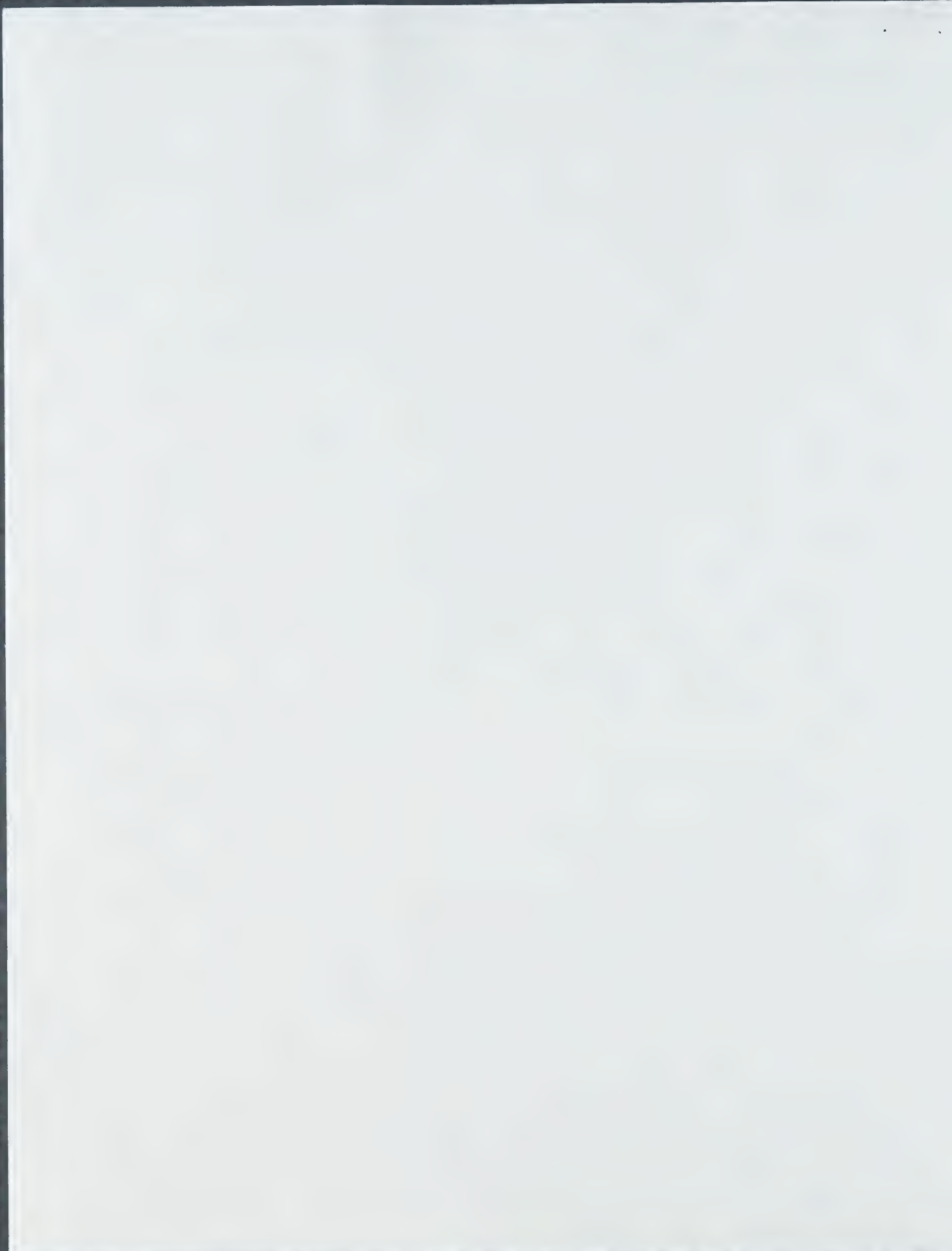

Since we are personally concerned about equality, we were touched by the story of your personal life and how Queen's had accepted you when other universities turned you down.

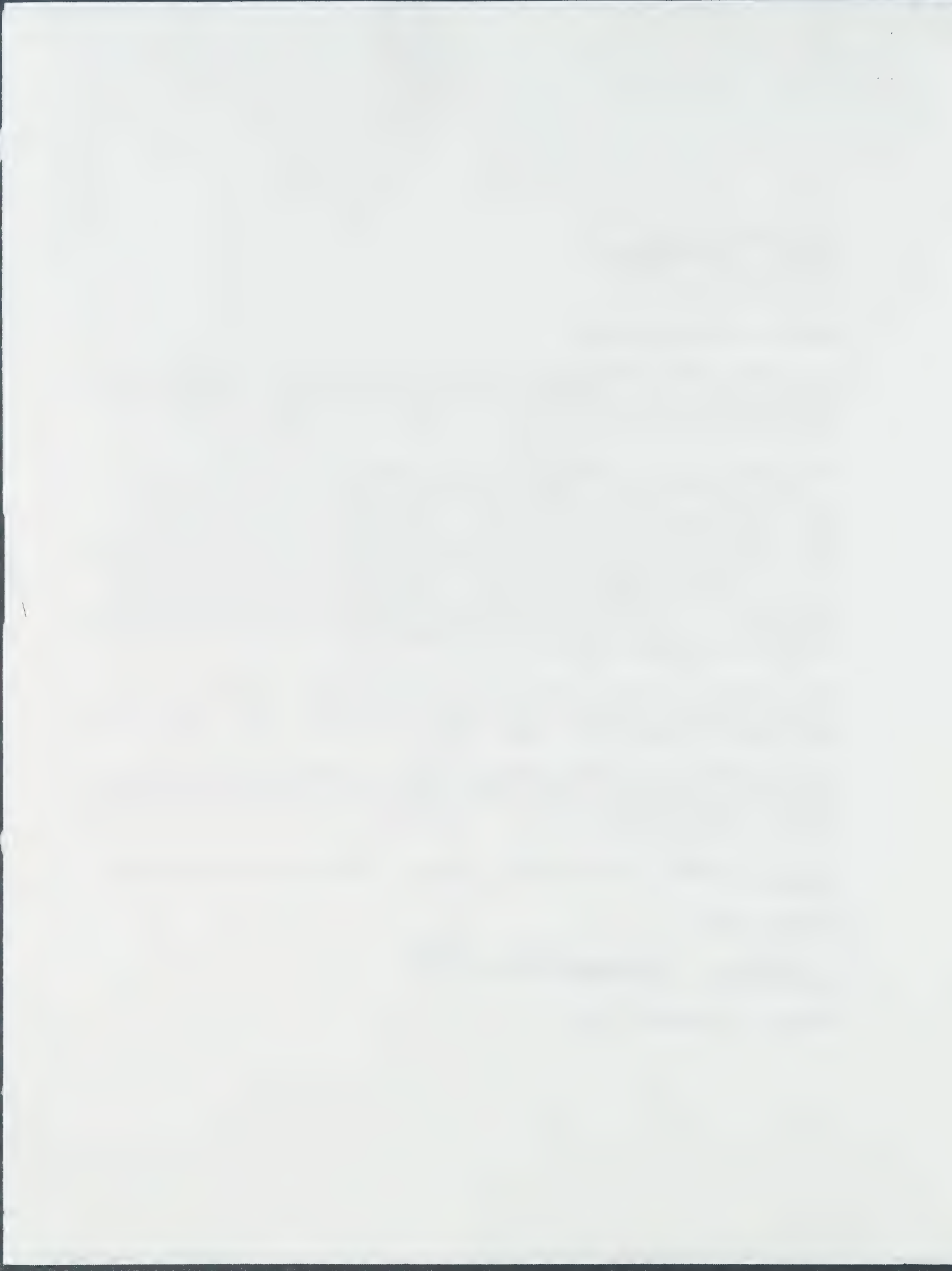

Dear Alfred,

In your last fax of March 12 you mentioned a planned visit to Dr. Sumowski in June. I realize that this fax might find you away. Something related to your art collection just came up here. One of the photographs to arrive recently brought with it a request for a photograph of one of your paintings, in exchange. Hopefully this can be arranged. The museum in Budapest sent me a photo of their *The Labourer offering shelter to the Levite and his Concubine*, and asked for one of *Jacob wrestling with the Angel* of 1623 by Moyses van Uyttenbroek. Their idea must have been that because it was shown at the Agnes Etherington Art Centre in Kingston, that this was where a photograph also would be available. This is not the case. The letter cited the "Age of Rembrandt" exhibition catalogue, where it clearly states that the works were in the private collection of Isabel and yourself. Would you be willing to supply me with this photograph they ask for? If not, I will simply ask the Budapest museum for an invoice. It would be nice to send them the photo. Please let me know as well about the costs involved.

A recent trip to New York included visits to the dealerships of Otto Naumann and Jack Kilgore. Otto was not in, but his secretary showed me the portrait of a boy by Jan van Moordt, signed and dated 1675. It struck me as a very lively painting, and reminded me of the *Joseph selling corn to the Egyptians* at your house. The date for that picture must be close this. Kilgore's picture was also a treat to look at. It almost seems that the Levite's concubine is doing the talking in this picture. Last summer I was at Duke Street in London, looking for Allan Jacobs and this painting; he had been gone for years, apparently. It was good to be able to see it and to talk with Jack Kilgore about it.

The thesis is on course for a late summer completion. The research has wound

up, except for a few straggling photographs, and some unanswered inquiries. The writing itself has brought up many problems, as it should. One of them concerns a portrait of a woman in the Chicago Art Institute, given to van Moordt by Sumowski, and to van den Eeckhout by Saskia Nystad. Perhaps you know this painting as well. I favor van den Eeckhout, and have written of this to Manuth, in order to provoke a response. He will have written on it in his monograph, no doubt.

In this fax I also spoke of my plans beyond the M.A. thesis, to apply to the Ph.D. program at Queen's. I encouraged him to accept the chair here, in the hope that he could supervise my dissertation. I will apply to Queen's either way.

The plans for the coming year remain tentative. The Canadian Government pulled out of the scholarship program by which I was to study in Leiden, and do some work on van Moordt under the supervision of Sluijter there. It was a reciprocal arrangement, by which each country sponsors the foreign students; the Dutch have not yet decided, but they are likely to pull out as well, leaving me here in Canada next year. The news will come in the next few weeks.

I hope that this June trip will have been a success for you. The reason you mentioned it to me was because I had asked about a photograph of that painting that had appeared at the Dorotheum. I hope that Sumowski proved willing to pass his photograph of that painting on. A copy of his book, with the reproduction of this painting, will not be available until next year, so the publisher has said. I look forward to hearing from you.

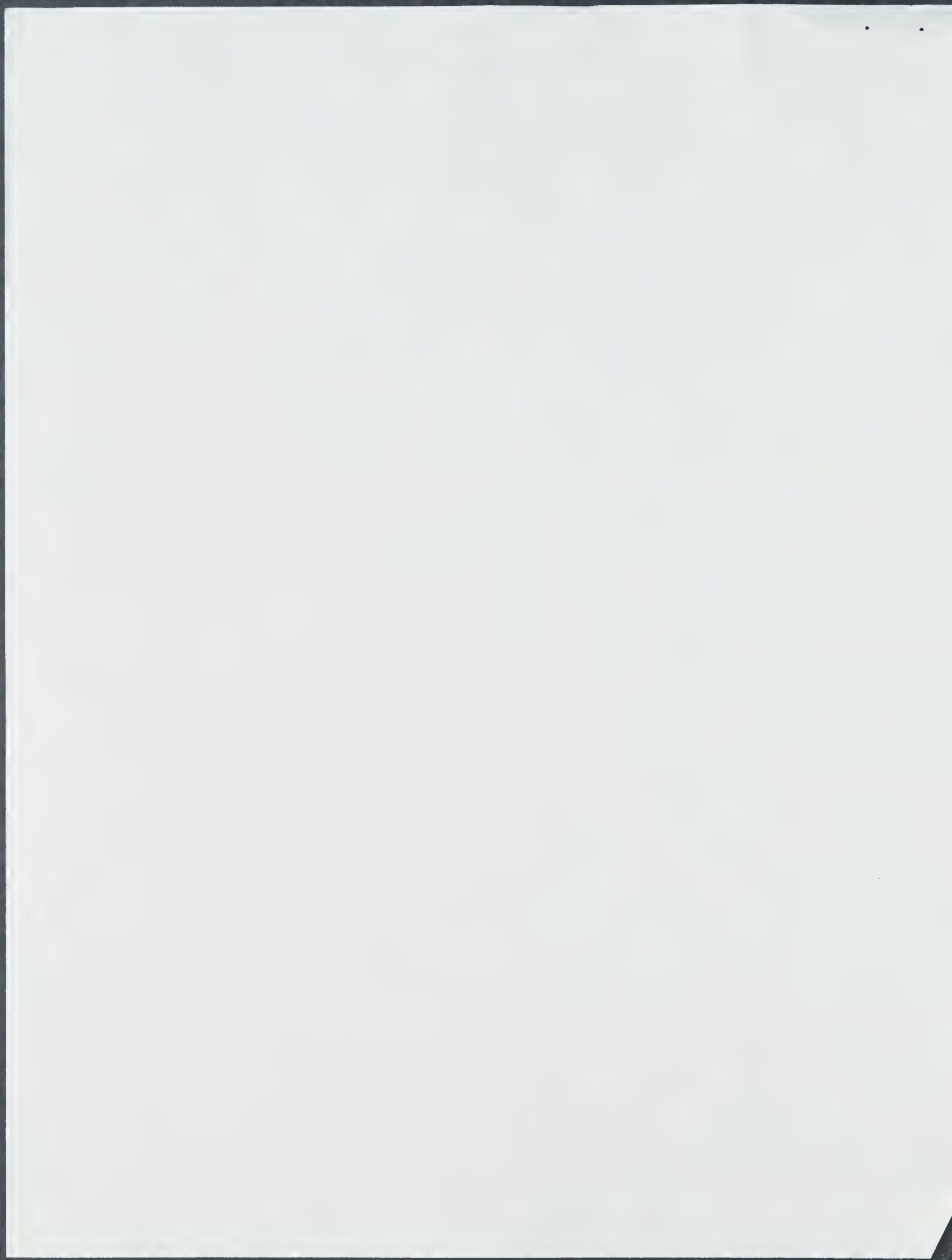
I am sorry that a 3-month trip to Europe has delayed my responding to your letter of May 10th.

Text of a tribute to Walter MacFarlane Smith delivered by Prof.K.Russell at the Memorial Service on Friday, September 3, 1993 in Kingston, Ontario.

Walter Smith was brought up in Fredericton; he was proud of his maritime background. He graduated from the University of New Brunswick in 1935 and published his first paper with E.W.R.Steacie at McGill when he was 21. He obtained his Ph.D at McGill in 1938 and went on to do research with Nobel prize winner R.G.W. Norrish at Cambridge. His work was interrupted by the war and in 1940 he began armament research first at Woolwich and then at Bournemouth - and he married Frances. He completed his Cambridge Ph.D. in 1943 and then in 1944 he and Frances returned to Canada on the Aquitania. For the last year of the war, Walter was associated with the Canadian Armament Research and Development Establishment near Quebec City.

Walter came to Kingston and Queen's in 1945. The Department of Chemistry was small, teaching loads were horrific and for a time the staff had to cope with additional students as ex-servicemen returned to Canada - Wally Breck and Bob Wheeler among them. Walter supervised some work in resonance radiation but it was not until 1955 that he developed his main research interest on the rates of association of ions in solution. His research in this field is still referenced in major reviews. I'd like to quote some referees' comments on one of his papers. One said "This is indeed an elegant and carefully thought out paper with a place of significance in the literature." The other independent referee said it was a carefully executed and significant study. Further on he wrote "indeed the authors may err (if at all) on the side of caution." Walter submitted papers only after most thorough and penetrating analysis. He was a first class Kineticist and he left his mark on the scientific literature.

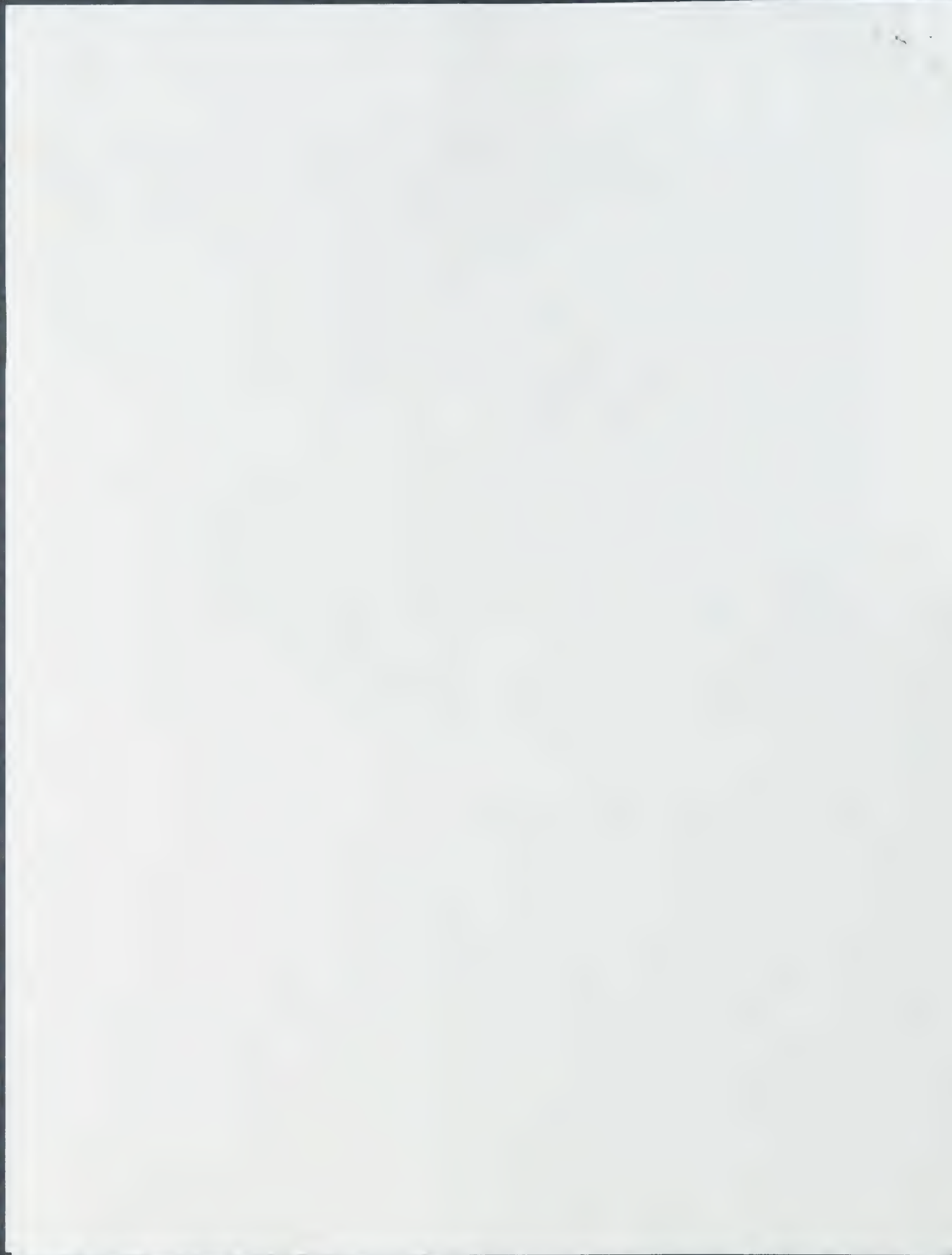
Walter was appointed by J.A.McRae and served the Department well both under Dr. McRae and G.B.Frost whose office was just across the hall. Then in 1962 Bob McIntosh installed him as Departmental Chairman of Undergraduate Studies for students in Arts and Science. This strengthened his contacts with Departments all over the University and he got a great deal of satisfaction out of his wide responsibilities. I know Bob McIntosh and Don Heyding were pleased to give him almost free rein in this work and they seldom interfered. I don't think it would have done them much good if indeed they had tried! He rewarded them with a job extremely well done. Students readily went to him for advice and he could give them answers based on a wealth of knowledge of Science Departments and of the Mathematics Department. For a couple of years around 1970 Walter was Acting Head of the Chemistry Department. He was the obvious man for the interim but I think he was much relieved when Don Heyding was appointed Head in 1971.



Walter lectured to thousands of first year Arts and Science students over the years. His lectures were extremely well prepared and well organized and his students had great respect for him. Admittedly a remark attributed to one student was "Machine-gun Smith. Drop your pencil and you are two weeks behind." And his handwriting sometimes caused problems. I am told that he was once given, as a Christmas present by his students, a Grade 2 book on 'How to Write". He was however one of our most effective lecturers. He lectured to the whole Arts class of about 80 students in the 1950's and twenty years later to the more specialized Chem.116 in Arts and Science. He never missed a lecture in his 35 years at Queen's. He taught electrochemistry for many years but his particular joy was his 4th year Kinetics course. Walter was a scholar who could transmit his scholarship to students at all levels.

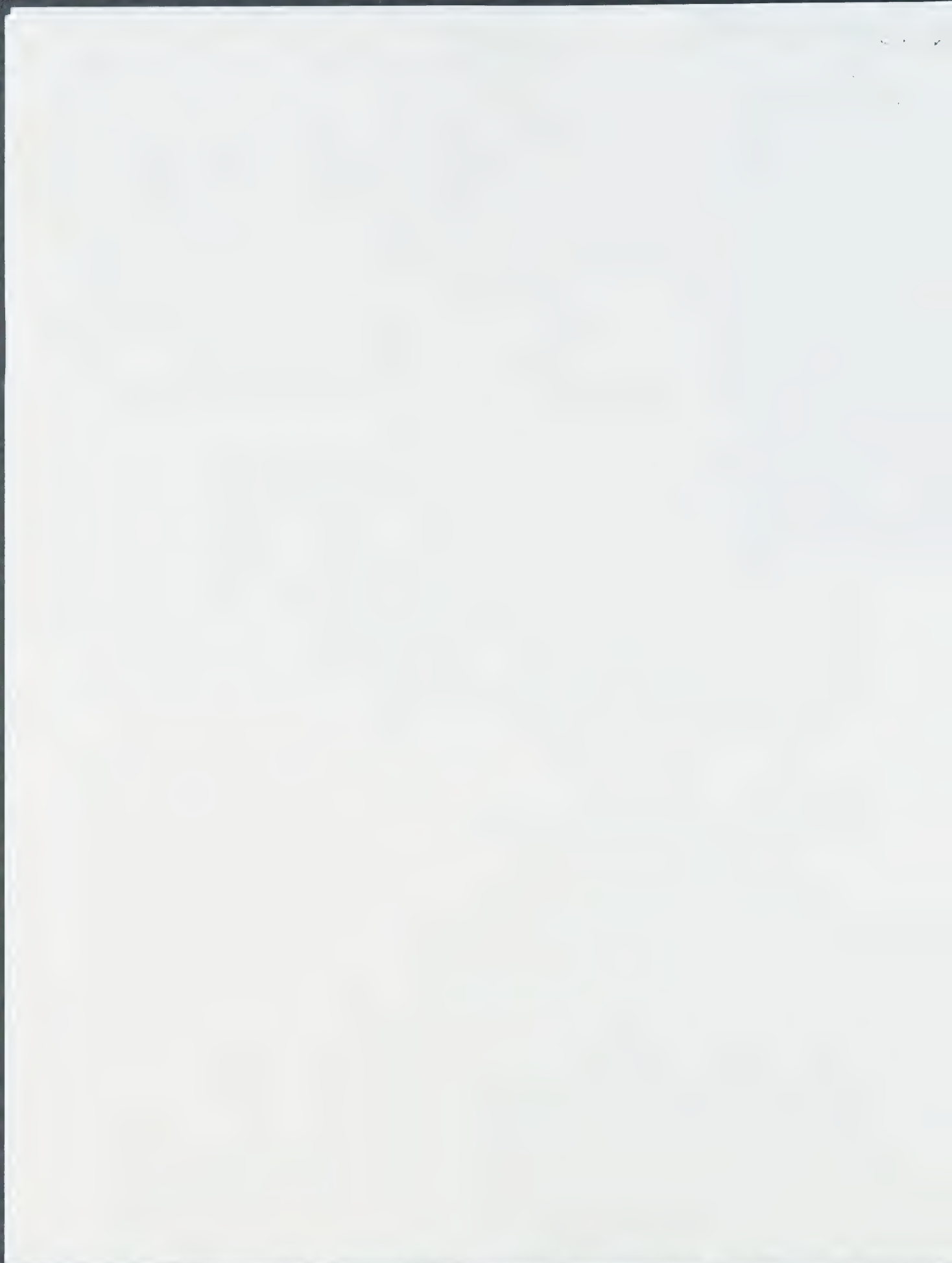
Walter had many friends throughout the University and scattered around the world. Most of these friendships were of his own making, many through Frances. In spite of his demanding duties he read widely and had a real interest in the theatre and music; he grew to share some of Frances's passion for art. When he retired he kept up his knowledge of scientific matters through reading and found time to become very informed on matters of political concern. His main interest was centred on his garden. He also became very knowledgeable on wines. His was a very happy retirement with Frances both at home and on their travels together. He was quietly delighted with his children's achievements. Walter had a life's work to look back on that was full of challenges that he met so well. We are proud to have known him.

I am a Registered Nurse with an arts degree but I am intensely interested in pursuing an education in chemistry. Is it possible for a mature student (40 yrs. +) to accomplish this feat?

I have low-profile work for Greece, and would like international efforts to provide assistance to educate the next generation in science and technology.

Until twelve years ago I was married to a minister in the United Church of Canada (a graduate from Greece in Theological School). My ex-husband had a Master's Degree in Near Eastern Studies. He traveled to Israel & studied at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem in 1964, 1966.



My ex-husband's interest was in the Holocaust and he was obsessed with trying to prevent such an outrage of history repeating itself. I understand you were separated from your family in Nazi-held Germany.

My son-in-law was a vocal Catholic and threw himself wholeheartedly into projects, the last was a major demolition project for the church & rebuilding of the church. He burned himself out and our marriage suffered, severe consequences. With the demise of that marriage came many crises. For many years now, I have been lobbying for some sense of justice for clergymen and their families. Because there has been no justice, they continue to suffer.

1) - We live in a church manse, we lost our home. The national office had no policy in place to assist us.

2) Because of modest clergy salaries, my husband was required to pay very little support to his family. This has resulted in ongoing financial hardship. Their father does not contribute to his children's education.

I had given up a nursing career to serve in the church and hence lost many financial benefits and had to begin at midlife to update my credentials & tried my best to sacrifice my children but I too was in a crisis and my parenting skills were substantially diminished.

My children thought God had deserted them as well.

You see we need some sort of financial recompense.

I wish to pursue an education in science.

My daughter wishes to pursue an education in accounting and teaching.

My second daughter graduates in Environmental Studies at Trent University in Peterborough in May.

My son wishes to pursue an education in music and electronics.

We all need a home.

We all could benefit from skilled counselling.

It would be a true miracle if this serious, urgent dilemma for ex-clergy families could be addressed and that the church hierarchy would provide positive concern and assistance.

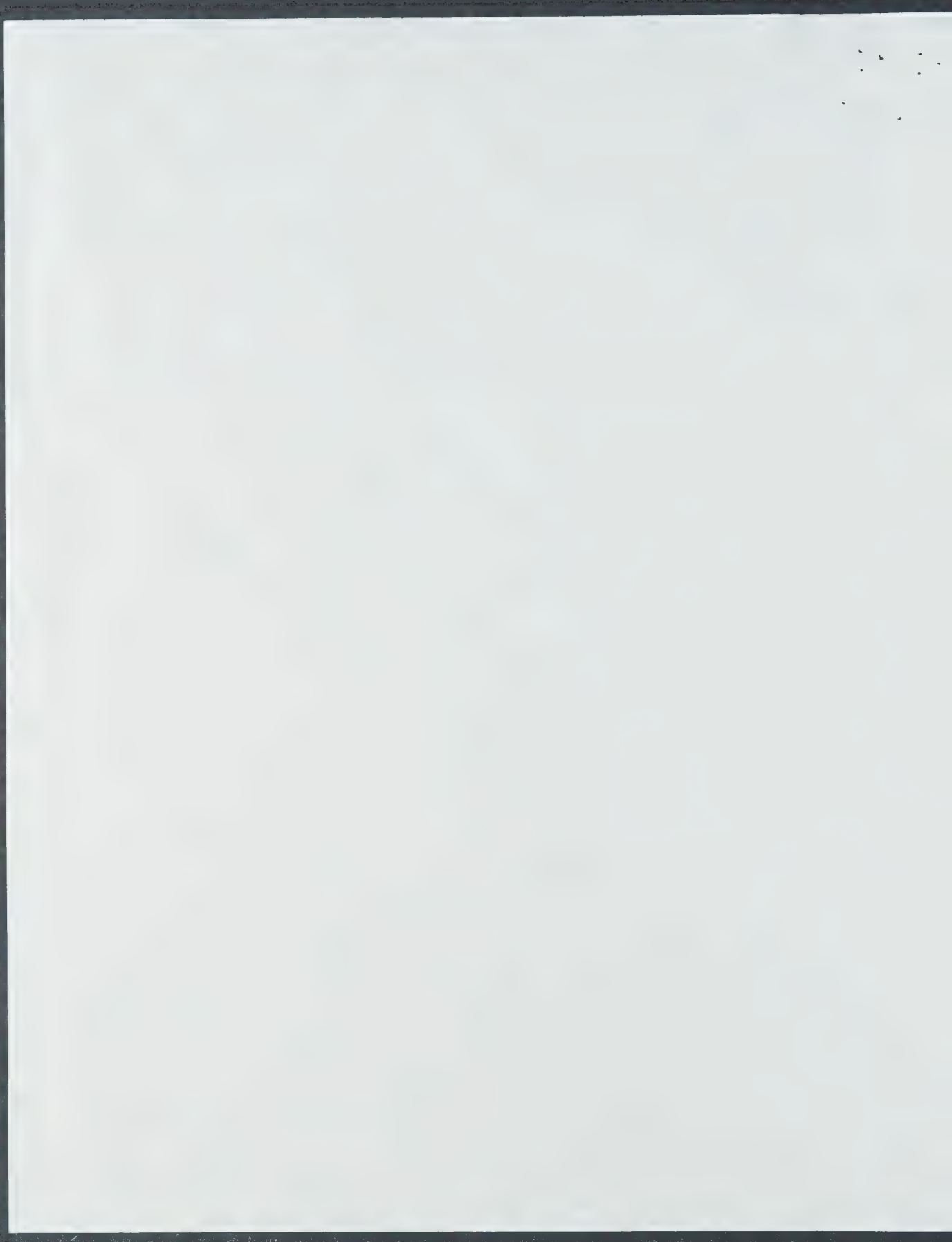
