

Dear Dr. Bader: Thank you for the information. Have a safe journey and give my sincere regards to Prof. Kocovsky. He will visit me in Brno on April and I am looking forward to meeting him personally very much.

I am currently hosting Prof.. K. Reardon from the Colorado State University. His group is using our enzymes to develop the biosensors for environmental applications. We are discussing future collaboration.

As far as the new academic for my "position" I have no good news. My former salary (before getting the Loschmidt Chair) was 100% paid from 2 research grants so this has never been a real position (paid from the Faculty budged). One of these grants will finish on December 2003, while the other on December 2004. I suggested that the money from the second grant should be used for a new person to come to our Institute but was told by the co-ordinator of that project that the money have already been used for another group participating on the project (located at the Institute of Biophysics, Brno). Unfortunately, I have no right to determine how the money should be spend since I am not a co-ordinator of the grant.

I am rather trying to change the overall system of the acceptance of the academics to the Faculty and create the evaluation system of current academics. As I informed you before, currently I am collecting the information for our Dean for this purpose. This will make more systematic change which could be more important that accepting a single person once. I hope with the new system it should not happen that the highly qualified person like Dr. Michal Storek is not successful with his/her application for the faculty position.

I am writing you after longer period but I feel it is necessary to let you know that we have at our Department very bright and talented student who when learnt that there is opportunity for him to go to study to Harvard University (we got the announcement of your Foundation for Graduate University in Chemistry at Harvard University) he immediately approached me and told me his problems.


The deadline for submission of the application to Harvard is December 13, 2003. He is capable to submit all the necessary materials there with exception of results of GRE (Graduate Record Examination) and TOEFL that are available in Czech Republic (at Prague) only after the deadline (TOEFL in January and GRE in March).

Because Jakub Svenda (the student I mentioned to you) is exceptionally good student with a really deep interest to organic chemistry and especially synthesis I would be very thankful if you could from your position influence the admission committee in this case to postpone their deadline for submission of these documents. Jakub Svenda during his study spent 3 months in England at Bristol University with Professor Gallagher. And although he had not sufficient grand for rather expensive England he readily earned money doing some work to survive and be able to work there. After he returned home I got very nice letter from Professor Gallagher saying that he is always welcome to return either for further study or for PhD study (Professor Gallagher says: "VERY bright and talented and he will be a big asset to whichever group he joins for a PhD. I have been thoroughly impressed by him and I am very sorry to see him leave. If he ever wants to come back for a visit again, he would be most welcome.")

In the future it would be much better if the announcement from the sponsored universities would come earlier, it means in April or May. There are not many good students and even those need some time to digest the idea to go to study abroad.

lorek. Although I offered him a teacher's job and all seemed to be agreed I have learnt at the beginning of October that he extended his stay in USA and he could start his job here not earlier than in September next year. In the meantime I got to problems with staff because one of my lady teacher's got pregnant and cannot stay any more in laboratory and one man just for some family reasons left our Department. Therefore there is at the moment shortage of teachers and I probably will need to start competition for the freed positions which makes me problems. It seems that Michael Storek probably will arrive to spend Christmas in Czech republic and probably during that time he visits me. But unfortunately in the time just before Christmas there is no proper time for any his presentation which I already suggested him and rose money for his travel expenses form USA to Brno. I thing that the faculty should have had at least opportunity to see him and listen to his latest results. It would of course help in his acceptance to society of chemists here. In last letter he mentioned some problems with housing and the reality that he is obliged to support three people (father, mother who are unemployed and his studying brother).

That is my information about the new position and its filling. But I would like to add that the money it was used for salary of Jiri Damborsky before he got Josef Loschmidt Chair is money belonging the holder of the grant (they are not University money) and can be used only for the research within the planned program (in the direction of former Damborsky work). Therefore any other person doing something else, as we expected for new coming person



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doing some organic synthesis, cannot be paid from that money. This is not easy problem.

Anyway that is all for today. I am looking forward for your news and help.

Dear Mr. Levine,

Thank you for your message. The incident you have written about is certainly a sad one for McGill and for Canada. The crux of the matter is not that McGill lost a painting but that people like Mr. Bader suffered discrimination, not only by McGill, but by many institutions up until 40 or 50 years ago. This is not solely a story about McGill but about how society historically discriminated against Jews and others not only in Europe but in North America – a sad chapter and one we hope will never be repeated in any form. Discrimination is morally wrong, against anyone or any group of people.

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

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

Sehr geehrter Herr Dr. Bader, sehr geehrte Frau Dr. Bader,

der Anlass dieses Schreibens ergab sich aus einer Unterhaltung mit meinem guten Freund Shelley Katz. Ich bin selbständige Filmproduzentin und erzählte ihm bei seinem letzten Berlin-Aufenthalt von einem mir sehr wichtigen internationalen Kinoprojekt. Shelley berichtete mir von Ihrem Engagement bei Filmprojekten wie "Kindertransport" und riet mir bezüglich eines Termins bei Ihnen anzufragen, was ich mir hiermit erlaube.

Das Kinoprojekt "Der Prophet von San Nicandro" wurde erst vor kurzer Zeit von einem amerikanischen Filmproduzenten an mich herangetragen. Es handelt sich um eine wahre Geschichte, die nur einmal, im Jahr 1955, als Buch von dem Autor Phinn E. Lapide veröffentlicht wurde und nun als Drehbuch verfasst wurde. Die Geschichte erzählt von Donato und den Einwohnern des kleinen italienischen Dorfs San Nicandro. Donato beschließt ausgerechnet kurz vor dem zweiten Weltkrieg, zum Judentum überzutreten. Seine Frau schließt sich ihm aus Liebe an und er gewinnt nach und nach eine kleine Dorfgemeinschaft dazu, sich trotz der Gefahren nicht davon abbringen zu lassen zu Juden zu werden. Natürlich bringt dieser Entschluß auch Probleme im Zusammenleben mit der überwiegend katholischen Dorfgemeinde mit sich, die sich jedoch letzten Endes hinter die iüdischen Mitbewohner stellen und sie vor den Nazis verstecken. Dies ist eine Geschichte über Toleranz, Gemeinschaft und Brüderlichkeit. Es gibt aber noch einen weiteren Aspekt, der mir sehr wichtig ist und der meiner Meinung nach im Drehbuch noch nicht stark genug herausgearbeitet wurde. Die Haupfigur Donato wurde sehr tief berührt vom jüdischen Glauben und hat deshalb diese mutige Entscheidung getroffen. Ich möchte dies in dem Film vor allem in den Szenen, in denen Donato der kleinen Gemeinde die Thora vorliest, mehr zum Ausdruck bringen und mir zu diesem Zweck fachkundigen Rat seitens jüdischer Gelehrter holen. Für mich war es immer ein Bedürfnis mehr über den jüdischen Glauben zu erfahren. Weltweit wird immer viel über die tragische jüdische Geschichte berichtet - mir fehlte jedoch immer der direkte Bezug dazu, was das Judentum im Innersten ausmacht. Diese Geschichte ermöglicht es, auf durchaus unterhaltsame, spannende und anrührende Weise dem Wesen des Judentums zumindest ein bißehen näher zu kommen, indem wir als Publikum mit Donato und seinen Mitstreitern ihren Weg nachvollziehen.

Sie werden nun vielleicht denken, warum ich das Projekt nicht mit dem amerikanischen Produzenten und einem amerikanischen Filmstudio produziere. Ich möchte das Projekt jedoch aus Europa heraus stemmen, ohne amerikanische Finanzierung, um die Kontrolle über den Inhalt behalten zu können. Die Geschichte sollte meiner

In Hollywood steht jedoch sehr der Erfolg am Boxoffice im Vordergrund. Dies ist nicht per se schlecht und ich möchte natürlich auch, dass der Film möglichst viele Menschen anspricht, jedoch befürchte ich dann eine Verflachung des Themas und die Vermarktung der Geschichte als Sensation, womit die Essenz verlorenginge.

Ich hoffe, ich habe Ihr Interesse an einem Gespräch wecken können und danke Ihnen sehr dafür, dass Sie diesen Brief zu Kenntnis genommen haben.


# Funding of the Bader Bursaries





# AN OVERVIEW OF CURRENT PROJECTS IN BOSNIA-HERCEGOVINA

# 1. Music Therapy

The Music Therapy Department of the Pavarotti Music Centre is the only clinical music therapy unit in Bosnia-Hercegovina. It serves the most traumatised population of children and young people in the Balkans. Although hostilities ended some years ago, the aftereffects of the war continue to be felt in society and in the lives of individuals. The University supports the MT Department's work in the Centre for Children with Special Needs, Mostar, by regular placement visits by Edinburgh students, and by organising an annual summer camp for the children. It is presently working to try to secure funding for the future of the Department. The current funding ends in July 2004.

# 2. The Schools Outreach Project.

The Schools Outreach Team, founded by the University, is now localised and constituted as an independent NGO, *Educon*.. The project reaches 3000 children per week throughout the Neretva Canton. The University continues to support *Educon* by bringing students on placement, preparing working materials and training.

# 3. The Sarajevo Experimental Schools

The University works closely with three experimental schools in the Sarajevo region, each in a separate post-Dayton entity: "Vrh Bosna", a Federation Bosniak school, "Jovan Ducic", a Republika Srpska school, and "6 Osnovna", Stup, a Federation Croat school. Here we have two objectives: a) to help to develop materials for the new Bosnian curriculum where the therapeutic experiences of the last years may be integrated into the school programme across the entities, b) to pursue reconciliation across the divided entities of Bosnia-Hercegovina, through shared creative activity.

# 4. The Mostar Sinfonietta

The University has played an important role in the founding of the Mostar Sinfonietta, an orchestra which brings together musicians from all parts and all faiths of the divided city of Mostar. The orchestra has a programme of outreach work to schools and communities supported by students from Edinburgh on placement.

# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

The following is a Memorandum of Understanding between the International Study Centre (ISC) at Herstmonceux Castle on the one part and Dr. Shelley Katz and Ms Diana Gilchrist Katz on the other.

It is agreed that Dr. Shelley Katz and Ms Diana Gilchrist Katz will continue to act as Musicians in Residence at the ISC for the period January 1, 2003 to December 31, 2004, under the following terms:

- 1. The Musicians in Residence will attend the Orientation session for students at the beginning of each term to introduce themselves and their particular role at the ISC.
- 2. During the time-period each term when classes are being held, the Musician(s) in Residence will normally be present at the ISC for at least one consecutive 24 hour period every two weeks. During this time the Musician(s) in Residence will be available for consultation and will organise student musical activities. The latter will include scheduled on-site occasions such as end-of-term gatherings, Burns Night etc., and may also include student preparation for coffee-houses or other ad hoc occasions.
- The Musicians in Residence will normally present a concert early in the Fall Term of each year and again in the Spring Term. These will be open to all students and to the general public. There will be no charge to the students and no charge for the use of the facilities. Any expenditures must be agreed in advance with the Executive Director, and any profits will accrue to the ISC.
- 4. In the Winter Term, the Musicians in Residence will organise another special event, normally a visit to an opera, in collaboration as necessary with Student Services, and after consultation with the Executive Director.

In return for these services, the Musicians in Residence will receive an annual honorarium of \$40,000 US, paid in two instalments: \$20,000 at the beginning of each calendar year and \$20,000 on July 1 of each calendar year. (The first instalment for 2003 will be adjusted retroactively to recognise the new arrangement). The Musicians in Residence will be provided with appropriate space and facilities to enable them to perform their duties in a professional manner, and meals and accommodation will be provided as appropriate to the performance of those duties, at a rate consistent with that from which UK faculty benefit.

This agreement does not preclude private arrangements with students for lessons; it does not include any activities to promote music and the arts at Herstmonceux Castle other than those described above.

It is understood that the present Memorandum of Understanding may be renegotiated

Thank you so much for visiting us last week. It was a real pleasure to see you and Isabel again. I enjoyed all your lectures immensely and was pleased that the Principal, Sir Muir, came to your lecture on Thursday. I hope the rest of your stay in Glasgow was pleasant.

Regarding the students, who receive your bursaries and prizes, I have instructed my colleague, Dr. Bob Hill, who is in charge of all these, to prepare a detailed information in the same way you receive from Edinburgh. He should contact you shortly. Below I summarize the information on the Czech students who come to Glasgow as part of the Socrates exchange program and whom you also support. Please note that the undergraduate study in the Czech Republic takes five years so that the students graduate with MSc.

**Petr Sehnal**, MSc, *graduate student*, Charles University, Prague, PhD student with Dr. Ivo Starý. Due to arrive in October 2004 (will be in his 3<sup>rd</sup> year).

Two more students (both probably *undergraduates*) are supposed to arrive in October; their names will be communicated to me in the early 2004.

Enclosed please find reprints of the papers published to date, where the Czech students participated, to illustrate the chemistry they had been involved with. Needless to say that I was very pleased with all of them and that my colleagues were very much impressed by their working ethics, which we do not see very often among the British students.

Since the Socrates scheme should work on a reciprocal basis, we are trying to encourage our students to go to Prague. Two undergraduate students went to Charles University, Prague, in 2001/2002 (one of them is now doing a PhD at Glasgow), one is there right now (2003/2004) and I have just identified another one, who would like to go next year (2004/2005). I hope this will partly alleviate any grievance the Czech professors might have because of losing cheap labor. Anyway, I am trying to assign the Czech students to projects that are or may evolve in collaboration with the Prague professors.

I hope you will approve my approach and will find the outcome of your support to the Czech students acceptable. Of the five students I had here to date, all three undergraduates embarked on a graduate program in organic chemistry, one in the USA and two in Prague, while the two graduate students are clearly flourishing



### **PROPOSAL**

## A base for the World Peace Orchestra at Herstmonceux Castle?

The World Peace Orchestra wishes to approach the Directors of the ISS, through the good offices of Dr Alfred Bader, to explore in principle the possibility of establishing a base for the Orchestra at Herstmonceux. Such an initiative would ideally be predicated upon the following conditions:

- The availability of Herstmonceux as a location for a two-to-three week annual residency at some mutually acceptable time in the summer months. This would involve accommodation and full-board catering for 60-70 people maximum, plus workshop and rehearsal space.
- 2. Successful fundraising by Directors of the WPO to meet the necessary costs.
- 3. A co-ordinator from the ISS side able to liaise with WPO organisers.
- 4. An agreement between Queens and the University of Edinburgh, at some appropriate level, to share a measure of ownership of, or association with the project.
- 5. A modest programme of WPO-related activities to be implemented between annual residencies.

The WPO is in the process of expanding its membership to include, for example, Israeli and Palestinian musicians, and hopefully an association with the pioneering work of Daniel Barenboim and the late Edward Said. It is a visionary, socially and culturally transforming project worthy of the patronage of two great universities: all the Academies of the Balkan region, and the Royal Academy of Music, Stockholm are already associated with the Orchestra.

# Securing the Future 2004 - 200->>>

### Introduction

The Young Musicians' World Peace Orchestra was launched in Salzburg on the 16<sup>th</sup> September 2002 at the European summit of the World Economic Forum. For the first two items – Bach's Brandenburg Concerto Number 3 and Nigel Osborne's 'Spirits of the Black Sea', composed especially for this occasion – the orchestra was led by the Medici Quartet, who had spent the previous week at Jeunesses Musicales in Bulle, Switzerland, preparing the young musicians for this and subsequent performances.

As the final sustained notes of the Osborne hung in the air, the Medicis rose without a word, left the stage and joined the audience. The auditorium was breathless. Twenty-five young musicians, without a conductor, were exposed on the stage in all their vulnerability. The atmosphere was electric, the audience on edge. And then the orchestra moved into a stunning performance of Sibelius' 'Valse Triste' – vigorous, controlled, and intensely moving.

The impact of the performance was immense. There was, of course, the pleasure of listening to music beautifully performed. But there was more. These players from the diverse nations and regions of the Balkans had come together through music to bridge their differences and work together, demonstrating as they did the power and necessity of reconciliation and cooperation.

The performance in Salzburg, and subsequent concerts in Stockholm and Helsinki, were the public manifestation of a process in which music-making provided both the framework and catalyst for change and development.

The orchestra will continue to grow. Following the concert in Salzburg, Klaus Schwab, founder and Director of the World Economic Forum, with support from Jean Lemierre, Director of the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, issued an invitation for the orchestra to perform at the Forum's world summit in Davos at the beginning of 2004. They have also been invited to perform at other events over the next three years. War and conflict continue to hover at the edges of all our lives, and there can be no greater need than for an orchestra such as this one, performing its heart out in the interests not of a single country or economic interest, but in the interests of harmony, understanding and peace.

The plan which follows sets out the mission and objectives of the Young Musicians' World Peace Orchestra, and includes an outline of how, organisationally and financially, we propose to achieve these objectives.

## Mission and Objectives

The overall mission of the orchestra is to bring together young musicians primarily from conflict zones around the world to develop personally, professionally and socially, to engage in a process of conciliation and cooperation, and to perform at events and in venues where their work will have an impact on decision makers and leaders in government, business, media and culture.

To achieve this mission we have the following core objectives:

- (a) to create an educational, artistic and social environment in which young musicians from conflict zones and (as a minority of the orchestra) from other countries, can come together to enrich their personal and professional lives by learning from each other and from teachers of international stature;
- (b) to create opportunities for the orchestra to perform at significant political, economic, educational and cultural events throughout the world, including in countries from which the players are drawn;
- (c) to develop a network of partners in government, education, the business and financial sector, the media and the cultural sector who will contribute in a range of ways including knowledge, contacts, services, facilities and finance, in return for a range of benefits and levels of involvement; and
- (d) to disseminate the orchestra's messages of peace, cooperation and reconciliation by developing and sustaining its profile through word of mouth, presentations, a dynamic website, publications and recordings.

## Organisation and Structure

The Young Musicians' World Peace Orchestra is an international initiative with an organisational base and bank account in the UK. The address for our registered office is given at the foot of the first page of this document. We are currently in the process of registering as a UK educational charity, and are approaching a range of people to act as Trustees. A majority of these are required to be UK residents. We anticipate that charitable status will be achieved by March 2003.

Financial and organisational management of the orchestra has so far been undertaken by its three UK Directors (below. We hope to extend:

Paul Robertson, Leader of the Medici Quartet Indra Adnan, Director of Poiesis and Power of the Arts Peter Bradbury, Principal of Peter Bradbury Associates: Consultants for the arts and creative industries.

In addition to the core team in the UK, the orchestra's directorate and administrative infrastructure includes representatives of key partners in the development of the orchestra. At the time of writing these include:

Gunilla von Bahr, Rektor of the Royal College of Music, Sweden



Faruk Sijaric, Dean of the Sarajevo Academy of Music Anders Öman, Coordinator for International Development, Royal College of Music, Sweden

As the orchestra develops over the next few years we envisage that additional partners will contribute to aspects of the orchestra's work.

Funding for the organisational and administrative infrastructure of the orchestra has so far been drawn from money raised to support the orchestra's autumn tour, up to a total of about 7%. However, a key part of our business plan will be to seek funding specifically for this purpose.

## **Key Features of Our Approach**


The Young Musicians' World peace Orchestra is a unique initiative with a range of objectives in addition to performing music. This uniqueness resides in the following key features:

- (a) Members of the orchestra are drawn primarily from conflict zones. The core of the orchestra is currently based in the Balkans, but as we develop we will include a much wider range of countries and regions.
- (b) Understanding and cooperation not only between young people from countries in conflict, but between people from conflict zones and those who live and work in relative peace, can only increase the possibilities of cooperation between all nations. For this reason, players from other countries such as Sweden and the UK¹ have been included in the programme so far, and we envisage widening the involvement with each new country in which the orchestra performs. Our intention here is to enrich further the experience of all participants. Everyone has a great deal to learn from each other, and we do not envisage the cultural and social exchange as a one way process.
- (c) For each tour or training/educational programme, we build in a period of personal, social and professional development for all the players and ensembles who make up the orchestra. For the autumn tour 2002 they spent three days in Sarajevo followed by ten days at Jeunesses Musicales in Bulle, Switzerland, where they divided their time between rehearsals and workshops on the one hand, and social interaction on the other. Of course it is important that the players, whose professional development has been hampered so far by poor conditions for musical education in their home countries, come into contact with the highest quality of teaching. Equally important, however, is the social and pastoral dimension of the experience. This is especially true given that many of the players have struggled to maintain their musical education and careers through often traumatic encounters with conflict. Our approach is to work closely with the young people to enable and facilitate their interaction and to build understanding and confidence.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> The YMWPO initiative has its origins in a collaboration between the Royal College of Music, Sweden, music academies in the Balkans, and the Medici Quartet. This, and parts of the autumn tour, were funded by the Swedish International Cooperation and Development Agency. The involvement of Swedish players emerged organically from that project.



- (d) An important aspect of this combination of pastoral and musical development will be the involvement of leading musicians such as the Medici Quartet on an ongoing basis. As part of the overall process they will visit and work with the players from the relevant countries in a series of encounters designed to build trust and confidence, both of which are necessary to their successful participation in the initiative.
- (e) The role of the cultural sphere in the social and economic regeneration of regions devastated by war and conflict is increasingly recognized at all levels, from government to business and finance. We believe therefore that in providing unique and unsurpassed opportunities to combine personal and social with musical professional development, we are training some of the cultural leaders of the future. We fully anticipate that young musicians who have participated in the YMWPO will return to their countries or regions better equipped to make a powerful contribution to regeneration. In order to help sustain the impact, the orchestra, its directors and its teachers will maintain and develop their involvement with the musical life of the countries from which the players are drawn beyond the life of each tour.
- (f) The composition and scale of the orchestra will evolve over time, and there will be a regular turnover of individual members. With each new tour or programme we will take on new players representing different conflict zones. Having played their part in the initiative, players will return to their careers having benefited from their participation and be replaced by new people. An outline of our short-medium term tour plan is given below, but we can say here that in the next twelve months we intend to include players from Greece and Turkey, Israel and Palestine, Pakistan and India, and both sides of the sectarian divide in Northern Ireland. We have also had a direct invitation to involve players from Singapore, which we envisage will extend and enrich the cultural and social dimensions we are trying to provide. Since the Bali bombings, Singapore's vulnerability as a multicultural society in a complex political region has been highlighted very sharply.
- (g) It is not unique that the musical and professional development for our young musicians is based on ensemble playing, but it is an important feature of our approach. Ensemble playing requires the greatest level of musical intelligence and coördination, cooperation and listening, and leadership. Training and coaching the young musicians at this level will equip them to work as part of a team and to engage at a fundamental level with a wide range of people. It will also help to build trust between members of each ensemble, and between the ensembles and their teachers.
- (h) The tours and performances given by the orchestra will not follow the usual pattern of orchestral itineraries. Our commitment is to arrange performances where the unique political and socio-cultural circumstances of an event or festival will highlight the orchestra's messages of peace reconciliation and cooperation. Even where a performance occurs as part of a traditional arts based festival for example Belfast we will work with partners to ensure the highest level of attendance and involvement on the part of the political and economic sectors.



## Outline Programme 2004-5

Our programme for the coming years is based partly on invitations we have already received and partly on extended conversations with potential partners likely to result in invitations. We are fundamentally dependant on the ability and willingness of the partnership organisation to cover a substantial proportion of the costs of accommodation and catering involved in each tour. For each tour we are looking for 7-10 days of development work followed by performances in at least three or four cities. Additionally, leading musicians will visit the countries from which the young musicians are drawn to work with them in preparation. This aspect of each tour is irreducible given our objectives. The itinerary must also mesh with the educational schedules of the institutions from which the players are drawn.

We envisage two or three major tours for the orchestra per year. These may be supplemented by one-off performances (for example at festivals or occasions with a theme of peace such as the Nobel prize ceremony) where these are appropriate and meet our objectives.

## Financing the Initiative

To support the performance of the YMWPO at Salzburg, including its ten days in Bulle.

we spent something in the region of €200,000. This was funded from a range of sources, including the Swedish International Development and Cooperation Agency (via the Royal College of Music, Stockholm), individual donations, and trusts such as the Solti Foundation which sponsored three individual members of the orchestra from Bosnia and Macedonia. While we approached a number of corporations in the business and finance sector, prevailing economic conditions and responses to financial trauma in the corporate sector meant that we were unsuccessful.

We envisage the following budget for the period 2004 – 2005. In many cases we anticipate that accommodation costs will be covered by partner institutions in countries in which we tour, particularly during the period of rehearsal workshop and social/educational development:

Our strategy for raising funds to support the ongoing costs of development includes the following:

Approaches to government and charitable bodies in the UK, Europe and the US
Support from organisations such as the World Economic Forum
Approaches to the corporate sector
Appeals for individual sponsorship

Ideally, we are seeking the support of a major sponsor or group of sponsors for development of the orchestra and for each tour. We will continue to offer the opportunity for individual or corporate sponsors to support one or members of the orchestra, and to develop this as a relationship over time. We are also seeking packages of sponsorship of particular kinds: for example, airlines or airline consortia (eg Virgin, Opodo) and hotel chains (eg Hilton, Jurys, Macdonalds) providing free or subsidised air fares or hotel rooms.

Fundraising will be conducted from our UK base but will also enlist the support of partners.

Because the orchestra will usually perform at events rather than following a standard concert itinerary, we cannot anticipate earned income from box-office receipts. However, we do anticipate a small income stream from sale of recordings once these are in the market.

Five years ago World Jewish Relief commissioned Für Das Kind, the sculpture to commemorate the Kindertransport. Sir Nicholas Winton together with Erich Reich and Harry Heber, both Kinder themselves, unveiled Für Das Kind at Liverpool Street Station on Tuesday 16th September 2003. Significantly the piazza has now been renamed 'Children's Square'. The ceremony took place in the presence of the Home Secretary, the Chief Rabbi, the Ambassadors of Austria, Czech Republic, Germany, Poland and Israel, and 200 Kinder and was a truly memorable and dignified occasion.

As you were unable to be present we have pleasure in enclosing the commemorative programme which was produced for this unique occasion, together with a photograph of the sculpture. Für Das Kind now stands as a national landmark to serve both as a permanent reminder of the events that took place sixty-five years ago and as a message of tolerance, compassion and humanity for future generations. We urge you to visit it with your friends and family.

Indeed as you will see from the date of this letter, today marks the 65th anniversary of the arrival of the first Kindertransport, Friday 2nd December 1938. We each have a responsibility to ensure the message from this period in history reaches as wide an audience as possible. For its part World Jewish Relief, in conjunction with the Museum of London and the Imperial War Museum, is planning an Annual Kinder Day, details of which will be announced in due course.

Any contribution made to World Jewish Relief in response to this letter will help it continue its work in rescuing and providing relief to children whose lives are threatened by war, hardship and misery, offering them a chance for a brighter future, just as it did 65 years ago.

#### Dear Alfred and Isabel

As the Fall Term at the ISC comes to a close, I thought it appropriate to give you a report on my progress so far.

First, I must say that everyone has been wonderfully accepting, friendly and supportive of me at the ISC. Aside from a few small administrative oversights, I have experienced none of the difficulties that plagued Shelley and Diana when they first arrived at the ISC. The members of the English Department have been very welcoming and are happy for me to be working with students, and David Bevan has been magnificent. I am impressed with the manner in which David is able to tactfully set parameters and state expectations, while allowing me the freedom to develop my role and projects at the ISC as I see fit. To use a management buzzword, he has been very 'empowering'.

I've divided this report into a few sections. First: my work at the ISC.

#### Writer's Circle

I am very pleased with the progress the writer's circle has been making. I have a group of about eight students who attend the sessions regularly with a few who drop in from time to time. I'm delighted with the camaraderie that has developed within the group; students have progressed to the point of feeling comfortable presenting all sorts of work, and the group is now adept at providing constructive comments, support, and suggestions. It has been wonderful to see them develop in confidence, as well as in writing and critiquing skills.

The main project for the writing group this term has been a series of programmes for the Queen's radio station, CFRC. The objectives of this project were: to give students a project to work toward; to provide a sound learning opportunity for them; to raise the profile of the ISC on Queen's campus in Kingston; and to create a permanent record of 'the ISC experience' from the perspective of students. I invited all students at the ISC to write 2500 word essays about their experiences here. A group of students developed the pieces over the term, working with me to shape and refine them, revising them according to group feedback, and finally, practising their performances for the recording. Shelley Katz has become very much involved with the project,



devoting a considerable amount of time to recording the students and providing music for the pieces.

#### Other work with students

- From time to time, I send out notices to all students informing them of small publishing and broadcasting opportunities. For next term, I have arranged with the Hailsham Gazette/Eastbourne Gazette to offer the students a tour of the newspaper offices.
- One student, Anne Keery, is working with me to fulfil part of the requirements for her Duke of Edinburgh Award. She produces a written record of her experiences each week, which I read and comment upon for her.
- From time to time, students approach me to review and comment upon various pieces of writing they have produced, including, occasionally, academic writing.

## My own Writing

Obviously, the main intent for this year has been for me to work on my own writing. There are two things I want to achieve this year: one is to capture, finally, my stories from South Africa; the other is to gain experience within the media in the hopes that I will have greater access to writing and publishing opportunities in the future.

I have found the process of writing full-time to be an absolute roller coaster. At times, I write non-stop for days. At other times, I seem to struggle to put two sentences together. It is both far harder and far more rewarding that I could have ever imagined.

#### South Africa Stories

I have written more than 20 new essays since August – a little over half the stories I intend to write. At the moment, they are all very rough and no-where near ready for publication. I intend to spend the next four months completing the first drafts of the stories; then, once they are written, I will work on polishing them and possibly fitting them into a continuous narrative. I began work on this narrative structure in September, and completed about 30 000 words before deciding to return to the main task of producing the individual stories. I still have many more stories to write, and am far from running out of ideas.

As always, however, I struggle with my confidence. I worry that I am doing neither the stories nor the people behind them justice. I felt quite depressed about this for a time, but I decided I must get on with it and do the best that I can. My confidence is something against which I have always struggled, but then, we all have our demons. Fortunately, I find the best means I have for fighting off my particular demon is to spend time working with the students at the ISC. Far from taking time away from my project, I find that working with the students pushes me on to more and better work.

While the writing is, at times, difficult, it is enormously rewarding – in fact almost a relief – to see the stories I have held in my head for the past several



years finally, if haltingly, coming to light. I can't wait to be finished, yet I don't want the process to end.

#### Other writing

As well as my South Africa Stories, I have been working on the following projects:

- A monthly by-line with the Hailsham Gazette. Each month I will produce an article about the ISC to raise its profile within the local community.
- Several pieces for the Queen's Alumni Review, including a column that should begin in the next issue. It was organizing this and the radio programme that caused me to delay my return to Herstmonceux in August, which unfortunately meant that I missed the MECA group. I do hope to be able to spend time with this group in August, if they return.
- Two articles for the Bexhill Observer. I hope to find more publishing opportunities with the Observer group of newspapers next term.
- Finally, there is, of course the article comparing our experiences, Isabel. The next draft has begun. I'll keep you posted.

I'm sure you would like to see some of the products of my work over the past few months, so I have included a few pieces. First, I thought you would like to see the rest of the radio pieces the students have produced. (And yes, they do all know about this and they are happy for you to read them.) The introduction to the first piece was written by me, relying heavily on your autobiography, Alfred. If there are any factual errors or if there is anything you would like to see changed, please let me know. I will be doing the final recording with Shelley on Thursday. Finally, I have included one of my new South Africa stories. This is the piece that I mentioned to you when you came to lunch. I would be interested in hearing your comments on all the pieces.

Once again, I must thank you for the opportunity you have provided to me.

I was so pleased to read in a recent issue of the Queen's *Alumni Review* that you are publishing a second volume of your memoirs. The implication of the article is that both you and Isabel are well – which is wonderful news. I don't know whether there is much in the second volume on Herstmonceux Castle, but, as the International Study Centre is now in its tenth year of operation, some commentary on the success of the enterprise is surely warranted. There is no doubt in my mind that if you and Isabel, along with David Smith (and Jane), had not had such determination and vision, the property would now be in a sad state of decay always been grateful that David asked me to play a small part in the planning and managing of the renovation, and establishment of the first academic program at the Centre. You must feel great satisfaction when you make your occasional visits and stroll through the peaceful gardens.

Yesterday I re-read the section in your memoir relating the purchase saga. What a strange time in the property market in SE England that was? Some friends, who lived close to the Castle, who were caught in the Lloyds (insurance) débacle at that time, went through a painful 'filtering down' (as the housing economists write) through a succession of properties during those few years at the beginning of the 1990s. But, now values are restored. You mentioned to me once that in the long run land and property are invariably sound investments. The Herstmonceux property must have gained considerable asset value – what a great and timely gift to Queen's! I do know that if there had not been a period of high unemployment in the construction industry we would not have opened the ISC on schedule in September 1994, or completed on budget. Construction workers began to drift away to other jobs at an alarming pace as the economic recovery began in the summer of '94. So, timing is everything!

I have not been back to the Castle since 1995, but intend to do so in 2004 -- just a personal interest in seeing how the renovations and redevelopments have worked out. Thanks, as the old radio show used to conclude, for the memories.







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Contact Staff Subscriptions York galleries and artists. Lord handled the commission of the bronze baseball players' sculptures at Miller Park.

But Lord's connections and artistic achievement have not translated into financial success.

The Lehmann Maupin Gallery in New York filed a \$144,120 judgment against Lord in Milwaukee County Circuit Court last month, and Marlborough Gallery Inc., another New York gallery, filed a judgment with an unspecified amount on Nov. 7.

In addition, the Wisconsin Department of Revenue has filed delinquent tax liens totaling more than \$14,000 against Lord over the past two months.

Such legal actions, all culled from the state's online circuit court records, are not unfamiliar to Lord.

In March 2002, a group of anonymous backers saved Lord's business after he defaulted on a \$292,982 debt to a longtime business associate, Charles Peckarsky.

The state filed 14 tax warrants against Lord from 1996 to 1999. He paid more than \$181,000 to cover all of the back taxes and penalties.

The criminal charge, however, puts Lord into a different legal predicament. He could face 10 years in prison if convicted on the felony count.

"This guy is just numb right now," said public relations consultant Todd Robert Murphy, acting as Lord's spokesman.

"We are completely perplexed and confused by this matter," he said.
"We were blindsided and at this juncture still don't have all of the details as to why this action was taken."

Murphy said Lord would cooperate with authorities, and was likely to cancel a business trip that was to take him to New York through Tuesday.

The criminal complaint, filed in Milwaukee County, alleges that Lord transferred \$394,500 from Geske's estate into his own accounts from February 1997 to December 1998, when he was replaced as representative of the estate.

Subtracting the \$16,666 Lord rightfully inherited, and \$203,000 he paid into the trust account, leaves roughly \$175,000 he has failed to repay.

Martin said he and other beneficiaries of his aunt's estate waited a



number of years for Lord to fulfill his promises to repay the money. With their patience and the statute of limitations running out, they went to Milwaukee police earlier this year.

Martin runs a probation program for the state of New Jersey, setting up payment plans for criminals ordered to make restitution. He noted the irony.

"I don't want to see Michael go to jail," Martin said. "That's a very last resort.

"I don't want to hurt Michael's business because if it hurts his business, it hurts his ability to make a living. But there comes a point where you have to do the right thing."

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# Moving pieces: Some art goodies get away, others stay

On Art

Win a few, lose a few.

That might well be the modern art-museum director's credo.

For every valuable collect ion that a director manages to lure, others escape - some diverted to rival institutions, some simply dispersed by owners at auction.

It's a game

that's watched carefully by boards of directors and often becomes a pawn in the ceaseless prestige competition that is today's art-museum world.

Consider some examples on the local scene.

Alfred Bader, the Milwaukee philanthropist, collector and art dealer, is in the process of

giving his collection of Old Masters - all except the two that are earmarked for his sons - to his alma mater, Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario.

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Recently, he gave the university's art gallery a Rembrandt portrait of an old man, valued by the Art Dealers Association at \$10 million. Logically, that small but fine picture should have gone to a museum in Bader's hometown.

But Bader decided differently. Years ago - several management regimes ago, in fact - he fell afoul of a Milwaukee museum director who preferred modern art to Old Masters.

The die was cast, forever.

### Similar incidents

The case of the Bader Rembrandt isn't unique. Almost every big institution has in its past similar episodes.

Half a century ago, the Milwaukee Art Center, as the museum was then known, lost another interesting body of work because it had irritated the prospective donor: a strong-willed world traveler named LaVera Pohl, who herself was a visual-arts administrator.

As the story goes, Pohl was anxious to remain at the helm of the old Milwaukee Art Institute until the completion of its merger with the Layton Art Gallery into the Milwaukee Art Center. She lost out in the power struggle, and, forced to leave before she wished, she vowed that her personal collection of "degenerate" European art - which included superb small works by everybody from Oskar Kokoschka to Wassily Kandinsky - would not go to the Milwaukee Art Center as she had planned.

Instead, she bequeathed it to Milwaukee Downer College for Women - without suspecting that, a few decades later, Downer's trustees would vote to merge with Lawrence College, forming Lawrence University.

As a result, the valuable trove of modernist images that Pohl had willed to Downer ended up being shipped 110 miles north to Appleton, becoming the crown jewel of Lawrence's brand-new Wriston Art



Center.

Those Kokoschkas and Kandinskys would have looked awfully good in the Milwaukee Art Museum's revamped European galleries.

#### Other losses

The Milwaukee Art Museum isn't the only major player that's lost a few battles over the years.

Even Marquette University's Haggerty Museum of Art, which is shrewdly supervised by longtime director Curtis L. Carter, is not immune to an occasional painful loss.

The campus art museum thought it had a deal wrapped up with Milwaukee-born sculptor Richard Lippold for his papers, models and works of art.

But the sculptor and his advisers, who had argued that an addition should be built onto the existing museum to house the Lippold archive, ultimately decided they could do better elsewhere.

So Lippold, whose work is shown from Lincoln Center and the Four Seasons restaurant in Manhattan to a Shinto shrine in Kyoto, Japan, went shopping for a deal at Columbia University in New York.

Now that, too, seems to have fallen through.

Lippold has since died, and his namesake foundation is talking about setting up and running its own museum - a possibility, but lots of hard work.

Another potentially important asset that left Milwaukee years ago is the Ethel and Arthur Liebman Collection of Chinese export porcelain, which wound up being owned, cataloged and shown by the Elvehjem Museum of Art in Madison.

It's a glorious array of treasures, and the Elvehjem has provided a properly elegant setting for it, but Milwaukeeans must travel 80 miles to see and savor a body of ceramic objects that was assembled in their midst.



## Some great catches stay

To be fair, both the Milwaukee Art Museum and the Haggerty have had good luck over the years in wooing specifically targeted collections.

The Milwaukee Art Museum has landed the Michael and Julie Hall Collection of American Folk Art, the Specks Collection of German Expressionist Prints and the Bradley Collection of postwar American art, to name just a few.

It also remains the repository of the Flagg Collection of medieval and renaissance art objects, from mechanical clocks to religious carvings and game boards, and a remarkable survey of the work of "The Eight," American illustrators turned fine artists, donated by the late Donald B. Abert, onetime chairman of The Journal Co., and his family.

Both the Milwaukee Art Museum and the Haggerty have benefited from the generosity of Marvin and Janet Fishman, who also have given important works of 20th-century Germanic art to galleries operated by the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and Cardinal Stritch University.

Still, the Fishmans have not hesitated to place cherished pictures of rarefied quality on the international auction market in London.

And so it goes.

Milwaukee's not the only place this occurs, of course. The Philadelphia Museum of Art ardently wooed billionaire publisher (and former Milwaukeean) Walter Annenberg for decades, only to lose his irreplaceable French Impressionist collection to the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City.

It's never a done deal, as they say in the trade, until the crates have arrived.

And, one is tempted to add, have been fully unpacked.

Dear friends,

What is it about the years these days? They fly by with amazing speed and seem, fortunately, well filled. So here I am with greetings of the season and to wish you well for yet another year. May 2004 bring more peace to the world.

Not that all is joy. Like most of you, I imagine, I am appalled that we are at war again, though not many people talk about it. But it is there and one knows that there must be better ways of coping with grizzly situations than fighting and bombing. Are we condemned not to learn? I am sad to think that both my countries (and I feel odd laying claim to either still), saw fit to invade and to make war. I sometimes wonder how normal life can continue while struggles for survival are going on in Iraq and elsewhere. Have we all become so anaesthetized by the images, which roll across the television screen? How can the young learn that this is not the right way?

And of course some friends have left us, here too in the community we have now joined. I know that some of you have met and liked Elroy Peterson, and you already know of his recent death. A brave, good man, a well loved local doctor, whose cancer finally beat him after a long and successful struggle on his part and the devoted care of his wife Jean. It was always good to visit him, he was ever ready to talk and discuss the world situation with more cheerfulness than it merited.

But here I am, getting back to our own news and life of this last year. A longish winter, though not as cold as Iowa can be and then a move in March before the winter was fully over. I am not good at moving and those of you, who have seen me move or who have lived through it with me, know this well. There comes a deracination that grips me and no doubt this goes back to my leaving home originally when I was too young. We had of course to dispose of "stuff" and that was not too difficult. We also packed dozens of boxes, having learnt that a box (especially of books) should not be too large. Ames has so many good people and typically, a tennis playing friend who owns a popular restaurant with her husband, offered to let me have as many boxes (and more) as I wanted, as they have goods and provisions sent and delivered in excellent handy sized cartons. Some of these boxes still sit on shelves in the basement, waiting to be unpacked

Our new home at Green Hills (a very civilised facility for the elderly) is not too far from our former home and we moved as much as we could by ourselves in car loads. The movers eventually took only the larger pieces of furniture and it was quite easy to settle in more or less at once, as soon as these were installed. Again, I had wonderful help from friends who cheered me through the whole sometimes wretched business. Herbert's son Alex visited and helped us with various pieces of apparatus, making it possible for us to listen to both CD's and our record collection

Green Hills has many good and interesting retirees. Herbert is barely a retiree, as he still goes to his office daily, morning and afternoon though he does make a concession to



retirement, by not going back on a Friday afternoon! People here are helpful and friendly without being in any way obtrusive. We knew a number already and gradually know more. The first few months were rather dreadful for me as I was immured, not able to walk much and quite unable to pursue the rather relentless tennis and exercise that normally keeps me alive and functioning. I had a painful heel that completely stopped my normal life. I saw few people and felt low. Yes, I was quite sorry for myself as I pictured this as my relentless future. Medical help was in abeyance, though I was eventually, after over half a year, sent to a specialist in Des Moines, who without more ado gave me a cortisone injection into the heel, most painful. But the effect was miraculous. 24 hours later the pain had disappeared. I could barely believe this, nor trust my good fortune. Gradually life returned to normal. In the event this meant travel, which I think would not have been possible had I still had the disability. I am grateful for the cure, even when friends mutter darkly about curing the symptoms and not the cause. I am too old to worry about that.

So in August we had our first time away from the new home. Herbert had a conference in San Francisco and we went not only there, but visited Portland, Oregon, a beautiful state with snow covered mountains visible in the distance, particularly Mount Hood, only a name from long forgotten geography lessons. Most exciting after the hot Iowa summer. In Portland we visited an old school friend of Herbert's, Lore Labby, whom he had not seen for over 60 years since his school days in Düsseldorf, yet recognised! She and her husband showed us the surrounding area and the magnificent Columbia River. We viewed a point where the river runs through a gorge of high mountains on each side. It looks much like the Rhine at its best, but bigger and even more majestic. San Francisco too was good, I enjoyed walking in the city while Herbert was at work and we met his old friends, the Ticks. Stan is an English professor, who had links with Philip Collins (Leicester), in the past. Our small world again.

Not long after, we were off to Berlin, another conference. We stayed in a flat organised for us by our friends the Wagenknechts whom I have known since Gwen Rutherford first sent me to visit them before the Wall had come down. They came to stay with me in Leicester as soon as they were allowed to travel from the wrong side of the said wall. Berlin looks ever more splendid but building continues unabated with a host of cranes still reaching into the sky.

From Berlin we went west by train across the whole of Germany and into France where my brother Michael and his daughter Natacha, met us in Strasbourg. A place I knew well as a student, as I spent the whole summer of 1949 at the university there. I was supposed to study French and German in the countries where these languages were spoken. I could not yet face time in Germany, and at Strasbourg one could do both. (The alternative was of course Switzerland, which was as ever, unaffordable.)

Michael took us to a splendid villa, part of which he had rented in the Vosges hills, to give his children and grandchildren a good holiday. I think we were at least 13 people there. We stayed for 2 days, and enjoyed a delightful outing to the old town of Colmar, which I had also visited as a student. Then on to Paris again by train to stay with my sister Feo, or rather in a small hotel near by, spending our time (and certainly meals!) with Feo and Jacob. The bare 48 hours were spoiled by the fact that Herbert was pickpocketed by a group of youngsters who were trying to distract and annoy him. I should have known what was going on. It is not as if I had not been informed about just



such happenings on the metro. The police do not seem very interested, there is much shrugging of shoulders but nevertheless endless filling in of data. I would really like to know what happens to such forms. No doubt in another 500 years they will provide material for research, but no one seems interested in the actual here and now of the event. Then on to England, with a visit to London to see Simon, Liza and Eleanor. The latter is a delight as I suppose all grandchildren are. She is talking well, interested in all that goes on. She is soon to have a sibling, later in December. I wonder what she will make of him/her? We saw Margaret and Rob in Birmingham, both busy and leading full lives. Rob was about to walk across Scotland again and they have both been walking/climbing in the Spanish Picos Mountains. Margaret works hard, now with her own firm, specialising of course in the fate of the asylum seekers.

My book, CHILD OF OUR TIME came out this summer, published by I.B.Tauris (London). There have been many changes, but people seem to find it acceptable in spite of my regrets over some of the missing bits. Rabbi John Rayner, whom I had got to know through my friends the Forrests, (Alan Forrest was at school with John), introduced me at the Wiener Library and spoke very movingly. His history is much the same as mine and that of other Kindertransportees. Friends came, some from as far as Cambridge and Northamptonshire, just for the evening. Among them some of my former students from Eltham Hill School (London), as well as other old and dear friends. It was heart-warming to see them, some after many years. Browsers Books in Leicester also offered a presentation of the book and invited many friends. For me a moving occasion to witness old loyalties and friends who had been good and close. Herbert was in England for some of my stay.

In Ames as always, people are good and kind in most unexpected ways. Our friends, Leroy and Carol Johnson, who had originally invited us to my first Thanksgiving celebration in the US - I had met Carol through my good tennis group - gave a garden party for what seemed like half of Ames, to celebrate my book. It was so kind and so beautifully done. They had taken the trouble to find the names and addresses of my British Women's Club (there are quite a lot of us about who enjoy a monthly meeting), my French speaking women's group and many others connected with me, however slightly, in the community. It was a delightful party enjoyed by so many of us.

Our local bookstore, Big Table Books too did me proud and they tell me quite frankly and generously, that they have never sold as many copies of any single book before. But as you know, Ames is good place to be, in spite of the 8" of snow at present! I now realise that my book will be known and presumably also read in both Leicester and Ames. I have no idea whether it is selling anywhere else! I would like to think so.

At the beginning of October I was back in Germany, as always, or at least for the 8<sup>th</sup> year in succession, invited by the Landeszentrale für Politische Bildung of the state of Hessen, my former home state. There again, Renate Knigge-Tesche, by now a good friend, gave me hospitality in her home in Mainz and took me to the different schools that had asked for me. A number of them already known to me, as were the teachers involved. The readings are never effortless, there is always some strain, but on the whole the students are interested and aware and put good questions. I enjoy doing this work and still think it is one of the most useful I could do. I spent the weekend in Fränkisch-Crumbach with Hilde Katzenmeier, whom some of you have met when she visited me with her sister Otti. (Otilie.) It is still a strange feeling to go there where I lived as a child.



Not the most exciting part of the USA but from a human point of view one of the best. 



Happy Chanukah. I hope you have recovered from your trip. I am so pleased that in your busy schedule we able to meet and thank you for a delicious dinner.

I have spoken to Ralph and I know that he is talking to you on Sunday. I just wanted to pass on some thoughts about the film, 'Hiding From Hitler'. When you saw this documentary film you and others thought it was very powerful but that it left untold the full story about what happened to the rescued and the rescuers. As we discussed in order to achieve telling the untold part of this story we would need additional funding. Remembering our aim is to pass the story on to a world wide audience via broadcast television, to be an educational source in schools and colleges and to be a timeless historical archive.

I have always attempted to achieve what I promised and to complete the story of what happened to these hidden people I think we have 3 choices, which are funding dependant

- 1). We can add additional stills, archive film, music and commentary to the film you saw, saying what happened to these people. Not exceeding our one hour length which we know is acceptable to British broadcasters. This version would cost £35,000
- 2). We can do a version that is one and a half hours long which would add additional archive film, music, stills, new interview material and extra dramatisation about what happened to these people. This one hour and a half hour length would be acceptable to British broadcast television and to foreign broadcasters. It would have more of an educational appeal and historic archive because of the additional content. This would cost £60,000



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3) The third option would be 2 hours long and would include dramatisation about what happened after liberation to the rescued coming out of hiding, new interviews filmed in Poland and the US with rescuers, new stills, new archive film and additional music. This version would be too long for British broadcast television, but would be acceptable to foreign broadcasters and as an historical resource because of the more detailed content. This would cost £100,000.

I think the one and a half hour version ( number 2) would be the most acceptable because it fulfils nearly all our criteria. As I told you before I cannot guarantee that I will be able to raise the full amount, I have already spent a year fund raising which is why the film took 3 years. If we don't complete it quickly we are in danger of other film makers superseding us which would be awful considering the strength of the material we have filmed. I would attempt to complete version two in 4 to 5 months

I hope this is helpful and that you will be able to support this important project as you have so generously done. You have seen the film, you know the effect it had on you and on others at the showing, it stands as a story of the evils of racism. I value very much the friendship of you and Isabel and hope I have repaid that with my work and skills. With fondest best wishes.

Indeed I had hoped that Alastair Laing could have come to Milwaukee well before now, but he has indeed been very busy with his lectures and the Boucher drawing exhibition at the Frick here as well as with the excellent catalogue he wrote. As far as I now know he will appear late January and I am sure he will inform you about his travel plans. Nothing goes easy or quick as you must well know in the art world, but I am convinced that he will do as promised. Hopefully his judgment on your beautiful Venus will be as favorable as we are hoping for. Your premise on further doing business was dependent on my marketing your French drawing of a young girl and the 'Pierre'. I have so far not been successful but it is as difficult to sell a \$ 1,000 object as it is to sell a \$ 100,000 one, unfortunately. On Alastair Laing's advise, since I did not hear from Mr. Aaron on the Pierre attribution, I wrote to Madame Nicole Willk-Brocard in Paris about the small copper as Laing thought it could be by Noel Halle, a painter she wrote about in a very large catalogue raisonne. I had to have another color transparency made (at my cost) to send to her. I have not heard from Madame Willk-Brocard, so maybe Laing's suggestion that it might be by Halle was wrong. I will follow up with her by email directly after this email to you. I know her because she is also the chief editor of Arthena art publications in Paris, but French scholars and experts are not easy to approach. In fact I mentioned your charming copper to the Paris Old Master dealer Eric Coatalem (he is on the Faubourg St. Honore opposite Sotheby's) and he is coming to take a look at it in January when he is here for the big sales. The head of a Moor at Sotheby's so absurdly once given to a follower of Aert de Gelder did well at auction and I have the feeling that someone did accept an attribution to Joseph Vien, the late 18th century French artist I thought of. It may pop up in some gallery with a correct attribution. I had not intended to recommend it to you to buy, but rather as an interesting and entirely misattributed portrait.

From the illustration I thought it rather fine and quite interesting for what it was. In fact the Belgian dealer Axel Vervoordt had a similar head in a Fine Art Fair at the Armory in New York a few years back, but his was indeed Dutch and 17th century (but much less fine). Unfortunately I cannot tell you who the author might be of your cuirassier on horseback, but I would date it from the uniform from the 1914-1918 war. I had a interesting week in Paris, found a good small 17th century gilt bronze at the fleamarket which now is at Sotheby's to be included in their major Old Master and Works of Art sale in January.



I visited friends in Normandy, saw dealers such as Didier-Aaron who had an enormous French 17th century portrait hanging in their galleries which I once brokered some 18 years ago to Sotheby's (then sold for \$ 60K, price at Didier-Aaron \$ 1.5 million...). And I saw at another very fine and important Boucher drawing exhibition in the Louvre the two Boucher drawings I sold to the Musee Fesch in Ajaccio (they are extensively featured and illustrated in the Louvre catalogue of the exhibition which is nice for my self regard as I re-discovered them in California ...). I have sent many paintings away for auction here and in Europe as I want to reduce my art business to only a very few (good) things. And to buy some good works of art also. I would love to recommend in the future some paintings to you, but I like the more scholarly unusual kind, which are not in great supply and often not recognized. But I am stopping my impulsive speculative buying which has slowed down any sales because of extremely long research periods. I do hope that I may meet you in New York if you are planning to come for the big auctions and please forgive me this very long email.

Subject: Spare us the dreary science... G&M sat dec 13, 2003

Hello, Ms Taylor,

I was hoping that the headline was written by someone else but, on reading your article further (e.g. para "Well, I'm glad we've got that ...), I found confirmation of the point of view that scientific aspects of a piece of art are of no significance (e.g. "So what?").

The problem of the two disciplines, art and science, not being able to communicate has a long history but was well defined by C.P. Snow in the 1960s by his book "The two cultures." Matters have progressed somewhat in that exhibits of modern art may now overlap with those which portray the intricate aspects of Nature, e.g. the filament of a hair or a cell at high magnification, which not only have scientific value in how we progress to develop new materials and understand principles of life but also give us the perception that there is great beauty in what Nature has created. I am interested in both although I lack in artistic appreciation because of the need to commit myself very decisively to attempt to make progress in my field of research, organic chemistry, which may benefit the provision of new medicinal agents for human health improvement and conquering of disease.

I am very happy to learn about the origin of the unusual sunsets which inspired Edvard Munch's The Scream which I have admired as a masterpiece for many years. Why? Because it gives me an appreciation that an event in Indonesian Islands had an impact in Norway. This gives me support for the continuation to be humble in face of Nature and to attempt to understand it. Without detracting from the high artistic value, and without true appreciation because I am not a geologist, this fact may be important in our further understanding how volcanoes may be predicted on the basis of certain elements of formation in the sky and how this may help to save lives by evacuating individuals in time.

Similarly, regarding the comment on Turner, "an old man going blind" is a throw away phrase for what may be important: the possibility of early diagnosis of cataracts by considerations of color blindness. Again, simply as a hypothesis because it is not my field but perhaps verified by further research, some credence should be given to such potential.

I hope that you are right that "somebody will... identify that ..mountainous landscape behind the Mona Lisa" because that may lead to identification of where this amazing man (see some of his sketches which show amazing concepts, e.g. helicopters) painted this important piece of art and may thereby lead to uncovering of other paintings.

Hence, a point of view which I try to relate to students who are studying chemistry is that there should be an appreciation of both artistic and scientific aspects of what "we see." We see either by our artistic eye or by discovery through scientific principles; both are acquired as we go through life. To achieve what Munch, Turner and da Vinci borders on genius; to understand by



scientific investigations the timing of the piece of art, the origin of the (plant extract) colors that were used, what lies under the visible and "alleged" Rembrandt (a mystery solved by application of practical chemistry), the nature of the artist's physical state, whether unstable or deteriorating, allow further appreciation of their achievements. The beauty of art can be transcribed into learning of science as the Degas painting of the ballerina can demonstrate to a student grappling with fundamental "seeing" of three dimensions of molecular structure.

We must work together to encourage the public, especially the impressionable youth, to "see" both aspects in the levels to the best of their abilities so that we can say, in spite of today's doubt, that our world is making progress.

For your potential interest, the beauty of Nature and our understanding of it and our attempts to learn from, see the pictorial book by George Whitesides "On the Surface of Things: Images of the Extraordinary in Science."
