
Thank you for sending the scholarship money to the AJDC, so that I can announce the next year of your scholarship.

Dear Dr. Bader,

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to meet with you to talk about my passion and avocation, Keshet of Wisconsin. I got angry four years ago when none of the Jewish Day Schools allowed admission to special needs children. Today, not only do all three Jewish day schools in Milwaukee participate and have Keshet children as part of their student population, but the children have surpassed all expectations and surprised both the educators and their families with new capabilities. I got angry four years ago when Jewish children with special needs were unable to be get suitable assistance to have a meaningful Bar or Bat Mitzvah. As of today there have been six B'nai Mitvot with three more students now in training.

I have often commented that the real heroes of Keshet are people in our community that supported this program without a family connection. That was the way your family started. Daniel and Linda, as well as the Helen Bader Foundation have supported this cause from inception, with no expectation that Keshet would someday be a resource that they might use. In David and Daniel's Chapter in your book, you helped me to understand that the root of my Keshet passion was I perceived an evil. As a Jew, what sets us apart is not that we are better or more clever, but many of us, sadly not all, are angry when we see evil. I saw evil when the Day Schools refused to accept these kids or when a Bar or Bat Mitzvah was not possible. Today, because of Keshet this has all changed. When I read the above passage in your book, I immediately understood what the root of my passion for the Keshet program was all about and more importantly that I must find the means of keeping Keshet alive for future generations. Many in the Jewish community, unless their own child, grandchild, niece, nephew or sibling affects them, chose to ignore Keshet as opposed to supporting it. Perhaps we could discuss changing the name of our program to The Alfred Bader Keshet Program for Jewish Children with Special Needs!

On a completely separate note, and at the risk of sounding patronizing, I just finished reading your biography. Thank you for giving it to me. I've always been fascinated by the insights I derive from reading the story of another person's life. It has taken me over fifty years of my own life to recognize that there is no substitute for experience. In your case, not only have I gained the knowledge of your experience, but also had the opportunity to meet you. Having built a business, sold that business and now being an

employee of the business, I think we've shared some of the same frustration. What I learned, as you learned, was patience, and to stand up when I know I'm right.

Dr. Bader, now that I've finished your book I certainly would enjoy meeting with you again,. If we do get together again I would like to make you two promises. The first promise is that I will never again solicit or try to sell you on supporting Keshet. Whatever you do will be helpful and appreciated. The second promise is that if we get the chance to meet again, it will be at your prerogative, not mine. I certainly would enjoy talking with you again, and if you feel the same way, please give me a call.

Cece Hinton told me by telephone a few days ago that you said I could not officially curate the Whalley exhibition because I am loaning a large number of Whalley works to the exhibition. I am surprised by this news. You previously had told me that my loans will not be identified by my name and will have to appear anonymously in the exhibition and in the catalogue as "from a private collection." I understand the reasons for the requirement for the anonymous entries, but such being the case, I think that I should not also be penalized by prohibiting me from curating the exhibition. I have spent over three years working on the catalogue materials and to be told now that I cannot curate the exhibition because I have loaned works to it seems to me very unfair.

Since my loans are anonymous, they have no public connection to me and therefore should have no bearing on whether I curate the exhibition or not. I feel strongly that my name should appear in the catalogue as curator of the exhibition.

It has been my and Alfred Bader's understanding all along that I would curate this exhibition. I am at a complete loss now to understand your decision. I will appreciate your reconsidering your position on this point.

Dear Alfred,

I hope both you and Isabel are feeling well. It is hard to believe that a whole year has almost passed since we have last met in Prague. I have had a busy year, having my "habilitation" in September and now preparing my rather extensive book on panel painting in Bohemia and Moravia between 1400 - 1460 for print. It should appear in early summer, unfortunately only in Czech, with a German summary.

I am now writing to inform you about the contest for the Bader Scholarship in 17<sup>th</sup> Century Painting for 2001-2002. After announcing it in personal letters to the professors at the universities in Prague, Brno and Olomouc and advertising as usual, only four applications have arrived – and none of them from either Brno nor Olomouc, which have, as you may remember, supplied most of the applicants in previous years. With the help of the two colleagues named by the Association of Art Historians, I have selected two winners for the 5,000 \$ scholarships. Both of them are graduate students with good references:

<u>Johana Kofroňová (Charles' University, Prague)</u> who will study the **Types of** rendering space in 17<sup>th</sup> century Roman painting and its influence in Bohemia.

<u>Markéta Gallová</u> (Charles' University, Prague and Albert-Ludwig University, Freiburg) – she plans to study **Early years of Karel Škréta in Italy.** 

The third applicant was restorer Pavla Vosátková. The main problem was not that she should not be art history student, but her project was extremely vague and it was unable to assure that she will be able to spend the scholarship effectively. I think that giving one scholarship less provides a useful proof that the money are given thoughtfully. The letter of recommendation sent by this -unsuccessful - lady was a personal one addressed to you by one of our senior art

historians (I know him personally and he is a very fine fellow) – I am sending it to you attached.

You surely recall that we have agreed at the possibility to offer one "bigger" scholarship of 15,000 \$, if a really outstanding graduate student might appear. We have now received one such application, regarding Martina Sošková. Her doctoral thesis is analogous to the one pursued by our last-year winner Zora Peloušková, whom you have met in Brno: the catalogue of 17<sup>th</sup> century German and Austrian paintings in the National Gallery in Prague. Miss Sošková is really the type of student who appears only once in a decade. She has already won the five-thousand-dollars scholarship three years ago and both she and her tutor claim, that her stay abroad has helped not only to widen her horizon both professionally and personally, but that it has also changed her attitudes by giving her a more international scope of experience. I can add my recommendation, too, since I know Miss Sošková as an extremely hard-working person, which is, unfortunately, a feature still too often missing among our youths. Besides, she is also highly rational and intelligent (which, again, is not a common feature in art-history students), having a keen sense of art at the same time. In fact, if I should name the best one of the winners of your scholarship in previous years, I would surely name her. Please, could you be so kind and decide, whether you will be giving her the "bigger", "doctoral" scholarship? Or perhaps we could discuss the theme in more detail when you come to Prague - I hope you will again, this year?

I am looking forward to hearing from you soon.

Dear Doctor Bader,

Please do let me introduce myself. I am Dr. Jaromír Šíp born in Prague 18th Oct. 1918 still as an Austrian subject. My father got a job in Slovakia where the family lived till driven out by Slovak Fascists in 1939. During the war I was on the slave-labour in German Junkers factory till the end of the war. Then I studied history of art and joined the National Gallery in Prague where I stayed from 1951 till 1978 when I retired. My speciality was the constant comparing of Catholic and Protestant approach to art in the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries both in Central Europe and the divided Netherlands. Having retired I was invited to the U.S.A. where I acted in 1979 and 1980 as a visiting professor at Williams College at Williamstown (Mass.) We have never met but I think I know a good deal about you. After all we are of the same generation and our life experience is not all that different. I do know you through a book given to me by prof. Anne Dutlinger (Bethlehem Coll. PA); thus I was able to "compare notes" with your life experience.

There, in the book on you, I realized why you had been trying to rescue and save pictures of  $17^{\rm th}$  and  $18^{\rm th}$  centuries that had been badly neglected and fallen into oblivion.



And this is why, doctor Bader, I také the liberty to ask you to pay closer attention to the application of Miss Pavla Vosátková trying to get your grant.

I have known her for several years and I was able to discover in her the qualities which are heading my list of priorities.

- 1. She is willing to work hard and always trying to help the painting in the first place.
- 2. She is completely free of any kind of prima-donna attitude.
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According to my personal experience I often lacked - when researching paintings and making decisions on the way of their restauration - technological information which I could use as an analogy. Therefore I think the project of Pavla Vosátková would be also of much use for the work of historians of art.

Dear doctor Bader, being my age and addressing you I fully realize that I don't have much future left, and that's why I have to try to put the right people into the right places in order to undo at least a part of the Kafka-like absurdity that has been part and parcel of life experience of the generation.

Thank you very much for your letter of May 23 and for considering the case of Czech students intending to come to Glasgow. I also appreciate the detailed account by Prof. Carlos Seoane.

There will be *two* Czech students coming to Glasgow annually under the new *Socrates* scheme. They will not be required to pay any fees here but they will not get any additional support from the British sources. I appreciate that some universities may offer bursaries even to Czech students but, unfortunately, this is not the case of Glasgow. Furthermore, unlike the EU students, the Czechs will not be able to supplement their income by legal part-time jobs while in the UK.

Since these students cannot expect any additional support from the Czech Republic either, they will be expected to make do with 450 Euro (£ 280) per months for the academic year (from the *Socrates* scheme). As I explained to you in my previous letter, the basic metabolism (rent + food) currently presents a burden of £ 500. Therefore, I take the liberty of asking you whether you would be willing to help them cover the difference. This would represent a bursary of ca. £ 2000 per student per academic year.

You may be interested to know that I will be able to meet the first two students in June, i.e., prior to their arrival here, since I am coming to Prague to attend an international conference on stereochemistry. Both have excellent recommendations from my former colleagues and I am confident I will be able to confirm their high standing. I will also use this opportunity to further promote the Socrates scheme and Glasgow in the Czech academia and to scout for future candidates.

Thank you very much for kindly considering this case. I look forward to hearing from you soon.



Dear Alfred,

I now had the opportunity to carefully study your letter and the one by Prof. Kočovský, according to your kind phone call yesterday.

I will try to be precise:


- 1. The exchange of students under the EU umbrella was started by the ERASMUS Program (European Action Scheme for the Mobility of University Students) in 1988.
- 2. It was only for the EU member countries and, basically, involved the following aspects:
  - a) Student registration only in the home University and not in the host University.
  - b) Credit recognition by the home University of the credits obtained in the host University (normally one or two semesters).
  - c) Designed for undergraduate students although, exceptions with graduate and PhD were sometimes accepted.
  - d) Therefore, the student spends, say, one year in the host institution in the middle of his/her studies, come back to the home institution to finish his/her studies and get the Degree in the home institution only.

- e) The host institution is not allowed to charge its fees to the students (British universities tried at first very hard not to comply with this regulation!) and also the students received a small grant from the EU.
- t) This grant is fully compatible with any grant the student may have from his own country.
- g) As the ERASMUS grant was always very low (the Glasgow students would be very lucky in getting £450/month, the Universities very often give to the students an additional grant, either from its own funds, from the national or local governments or, occasionally, form donors, such as professional associations belonging to the same trade as the students.
- 3. I was very lucky to be involved in the ERASMUS Program from the very beginning and see it grow form a few dozen students. We exchange at Complutense some 3000 students a year with more than 400 Universities. Spain is now the second/third European country in the number of exchanges. The biggest actors are Germany, Spain, Britain, France and Italy.
- 4. A few years after the ERASMUS scheme was started, the European Union decided to create a parallel program to favour the Central and East European countries: TEMPUS (Transeuropean Mobility Program for University Students). It has two branches: TE' 'US-TACIS for the countries belonging to the former Soviet Unic. and . EMPUS-PHARE for the Central European countries (ie. Checoslovakia at the time).
- 5. As the EU was aware of the financial difficulties in those countries, they provided a much more generous grant for those non-EU students than they did for the EU ERASMUS students.
- 6. The scheme worked well for some years.
- 7. Then, ERASMUS was replaced by SOCRATES I (although the term SOCRATES/ERASMUS is still used) and, last year, SOCRATES II.
- 8. This fact, together with the fact that the Czech Republic and other central European countries became candidates for joining the EU, gave them the right to become SOCRATES countries. TEMPUS disappears


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and, with it, the extra benefit of the Czech and central European students.

- 9. This put the Czech universities in a more difficult situation, but they are working bravely and are exchanging significant number of students. Complutense, for instance, exchanges students with Charles University and Brno on a regular basis.
- 10. Of course, every Czech student going to any country in the EU would be extremely grateful for the extra grant suggested by Prof. Kočovský, in addition to the modest EU grant administered by the National Agency handling the funds for the Czech universities.
- 11. I hope that this information give you the necessary background to make your decision. The funds from the EU are not likely to increase in the coming years. On the contrary, the SOCRATES II budget is fixed for seven years and the number of SOCRATES exchange students is continuingly increasing, including the very significant number of the Czech students.



I very much appreciate your generosity toward our students here at Glasgow and also to my fellow-countrymen. The Czech chemists have benefited enormously from your studentships and awards. As I have informed you earlier, the first two Alfred Bader Awards went to my ex-students (Dr. I. Starý and M. Smrčina) and I believe there is now one more in the pipe-line. Last year, I also met some of the graduate students at Columbia, whose study has been made possible through your studentships.

You may be interested to know that we have now extended our existing Socrates exchange program to Prague. As a result of that, the first two Glasgow students will go to Prague in October to spend 9 months there, working on research projects of their choice at Charles University. Reciprocally, two students from Prague are expected to arrive here, also in October, to do research and to attend selected lectures.

The Socrates scheme is funded by the European Union and the students will obtain additional funding to help to cover the living expenses abroad. However, this will only work smoothly for the Glasgow students coming to Prague as they have their standard student grants. Unfortunately, the situation of the Czech students is rather bleak. Since they have practically no allowances for their study in the Czech Republic, they will almost solely depend on the Socrates fund, which is currently at the level of Euro 450 per month (roughly equivalent to £ 280). I cannot see how they would survive in Glasgow, where the "basic metabolism" (i.e., rent + food) requires £ 500 per month as an absolute minimum. Please note that the Czech Republic does not have a suitable scheme to offer additional support and that these students cannot supplement their income in Glasgow by part-time jobs as they are non-EU nationals.

In the past, when I had students from the Czech Republic, either here or in Leicester, my wife and I had always offered them to stay with us for a few months, and I could also contribute to their living expenses by selling chemical samples for testing and through various donations from pharmaceutical companies. However, these were ad hoc cases and I believe you will agree that with the regular exchange program we are now launching, this patch-working would not be viable.




In view of the insurmountable financial burden the Czech students would face here, I take the liberty of turning to you for help. I appreciate that they should contribute from their own pockets but with a view of an unfavorably low exchange rate of the Czech Crown to Sterling, this would represent just a small contribution. I believe that an additional £ 200 per month per person (i.e., a bursary of £ 1,800 for the whole 9-months stay) is what would make their stay in Glasgow possible in the current financial climate.

I would like to thank you very much, in advance, for kindly considering this case and I look forward to hearing from in due course.

Subject: Bar-b-q and employment contracts

I found an email I had sent to all trustees of INAT had not reached you, so I tried in my unskilled way to forward it to you using your office rather than home email address. The result was you must have had two emails with no message. The message was about the alumni bar-b-q on 30th June. I hope you and your family will be able to come and support the event, and perhaps you could let me know if this is possible.

I am also writing because I want you to know that I am not atall comfortable with the way the contracts were produced, nor with the content, about which I was not consulted. I am happy for you to share my comments with other trustees. As the Baders are providing the £50,000 I think they should approve the contracts. Their stated understanding to me was that Stephen and Simone were each working half time so the £35,000 provides one fulltime salary on a job share basis. So when I read that the contracts in both cases state that the "consultants" will spend "such" time as may be necessary I was surprised.

I realise that you are a friend of S&S and, as Lindsay said so are all the trustees with the exception of Charles Moore who came into the trust via me. I also consider myself a friend of S&S and want to discuss the matter with them and explain my reservations, but although I have sent several emails I have not yet heard from them since the trustees meeting except for the email about the lottery disappointment. I realise I was foisted on them by the Baders when I supose they thought they were totally responsible without interference for this section of the project. It was Alfred Bader who persuaded me to participate and I put a time and money limitation on my contribution. As a result £5,000 was loped off the £50,000 earmarked for this stage.

To look specifically at my contract, I actually started to put time in in September but felt committed to the equivalent of a half day or 4 hours a week. (not "such" time as may be necessary). Then looking at 3.2.1 I see fund raising is part of my responsibility as a consultant. From the start I said I had no expertise or experience of fund raising. I said I had expertise in planning, building, negotiating, co-ordinating and project management; and am happy to use these skills as part of a team approach to "develop the project known as the Observatory Arts Centre," (3.2.1 in S&S's contract), but I see no suggestion that we should work as a team in the contracts. To then look at the other contract for Stephen and Simone I find it impossible to see that one contract is suitable for two people as if they both had the same skills expertise and experience. In their contract 3.2.2 says "to lead INAT's search for public and private funds" I had always assumed that was their, or Stephen's primary responsibility (although the way the contracts read it seems to be more mine although from the start I had said I had no experience in this field). Also the job description does not include administration, availability, computer skills etc. Again a lack of specific time commitment does not take into account the large donation that has been made available for this years work. After 6 months I believe



we should already have a professional pack to give to prospective sponsors or donors so maybe we haven't used "such" time as is necessary to meet our responsibilities. I think the board should discuss these arrangements without employees, (or consultants) present. I also believe that there should be a discussion between Stephen, Simome and myself regarding our shared and seperate responsibilities. This should then be reflected in our contracts, (3 contracts for 3 people), so that there is greater clarity, and that we are then all working together with good communication. I am aware I will always be on the outside as they live together and made a much bigger time commitment to the project. I felt I must write so that my objections can be discussed before the contracts are taken further. I am surprised I have not heard from Stephen, quite aside from my emails, as it was obvious from the meeting that I was not happy with the way the contracts had been produced, and as you can see I am not happy with the contents either. I hope we can discuss this soon.. Kind regards Jane

Dear Alfred and Isabel,

We are presently involved in plans for events marking Holocaust Memorial Day in January of 2002. The events are planned for Friday, January 25th through Sunday, January 27th. It would mean a great deal to us and to many other people if you were able to join us and participate. Here is some background information and an outline of how plans are progressing at the moment:

Following the second performance of Shelley's <u>Kaddish</u> which took place as part of the Holocaust Memorial Day service at the Town Hall in Eastbourne, the organizer Geoffrey Smith approached Shelley about writing a new piece of music to be performed at the events marking Holocaust Memorial Day in 2002. In preparation, Geoffrey has already made tentative arrangements for three events. Each of these events would include a performance of Shelley's new work, a viewing of Attenborough's "Children who Cheated the Nazies" and, if you would be willing, Alfred, it would be very meaningful if you were prepared to speak.

Last year the Holocaust Memorial service was held at the Eastbourne Town Hall but its capacity of 400 was exceeded and many people stood and more were turned away. For this reason, Geoffrey Smith has booked the Congress Theatre in Eastbourne for the evening of Sunday, January 27th. A second event on the morning of the 27th is also being discussed. Because the government is not planning a London event this year, the mayor, Ken Livingston would like to have something arranged and has been in touch with Geoffrey about the possibility of doing the programme described above in London. Two possible venues, including the Chapel in Westminster are interested in hosting this event. Finally, because Shelley is planning to write part of his new piece drawn from texts which children at local schools in Eastbourne have written, a third event is planned to take place at Causeway School with students singing in the children's choir part. Peter Parfitt, who is the music director at Moira House Girls School has agreed to conduct the piece (as he did last year in Eastbourne) and his students will once again participate.

Geoffrey Smith arranged for last year's Eastbourne service to be recorded for a CD and it has been widely distributed. He will again produce a CD and feels confident about securing a radio broadcast. The full programme would include Shelley's new piece, another performance of the <u>Kaddish</u>, a viewing of "Children who Cheated the Nazis" and the talk which we would be very grateful if you would consider giving, Alfred.

Last year Shelley received a grant from South East Arts to write and arrange three performances of the Kaddish. This year Geoffrey, who works for the Christian Friends of Israel (that's not an easy job these days!) had hoped that his organization could apply for a similar grant to support both the writing and the performances of this new work. Although South East Arts was very pleased with Shelley's piece and would view another commission favourably, the CFI has been advised that grant applications from religious organizations which represent a small and narrow segment of the population and which are viewed as exclusive rather than inclusive are not likely to be successful. Stephen Phillips, who sits on the South East Arts board, has also advised us off the record that works with Jewish content aren't likely to be as successful as those with no obvious religious content. At the moment, a combination of participants in the project are considering making a grant application which would need to be sponsored by an acceptable institution. It may be that we can make an application from the ISC and to that end we're in discussions with Patrick who will also need permision from Queens. We will make the grant application as soon as possible because Shelley will need at least two months to write the piece. He has already started working on it but will not be able to afford the further two months if an application for funds isn't successful. If you think that you would be prepared to join us on this project we would like your permission to include your participation in the grant application which will be made as soon as possible.

It would be a real privilege for all of us if you were willing and able to participate in this important and meaningful occasion. We look forward very much to hearing from you.



It seems a long time since we have been intouch and I am just writing to ask how you both are, as so much has happened since we last spoke. I was so sorry to hear from Diana that Adina's Father, your very close friend had died and want to send my deepest sympathyto you in your loss. You have been in my thoughts and prayers since I heard. What a catastrophe in NY and Washington too, I do hope you and your family were not personally affected, but of course we are all affected even if we don't happen to know one of the victims. I find the words war or peace unhelpful, but am glad there has been a bit of time for reflection and hope action will lead to greater social justice as well as protection of innocent victims. Words like terrorism always lead to wondering, what terrorism, whose terrorism, what is terrorism, and then also the place of power and powerlessness. I must stop now as I could go on for too long and it is so hard to be sure I am being respectful to others oppinions in a one way conversation. One thing I have been reflecting on is attonement, a concept so important to Christians as well as Jews. Although I think it should have been produced months ago, we have finally almost produced a professional folder for money raising purposes. We now have a mock up to show the Trustees on the meeting on Thursday. I expect you have seen the accounts, somehow so much time being devoted to the Madrigals which lost quite a bit when you include the "season Programme" printed too late for the castle concerts so only applied to the two concerts put on by Stephen should be included in the Madrigal loss bringing it to over 1,000. One good thing is that accounts are now going to be eficiently kept which makes me very happy. I think that Stephen and Simone are doing a bit more work on grant applications and European money. They often see people and take them around the site, or meet with people and increase interest in the project and I am not aware of most of that. 



Dear Dr Bader,

I have heard of your interest in traumatised children through Sue Reid of Golden Reid Productions. I was one of the people she interviewed for the film 'The children who cheated Hitler'. My contribution was largely about Quaker work in support of the Jews in Germany in the years 1933-1948. Sue wondered if you would like to see it with us, while you are here in November. She recently sent me the unedited video of the interview, which was not included in the final version of the film. My parents, as Quakers and German citizens were deeply involved in this work, about which I have written a book.

After the last jews left Bad Pyrmont where the Quakers had helped them up to the time they were exiled to Poland. My father was then also arrested and sent to Buchenwald, but he survived there for three years until rescued by the Americans in 1945.

Since those awful times Quakers main concerns have been to prevent war. To this end I enclose a few papers from Quaker Peace and Social Witness which may give an overview of some of our work.

But now our leaders feel driven to start another war. This time it may involve the three religions, believing in one God, which all originated in Jerusalem. There seems little that peace workers can do now, though we work at the UN in New York and Geneva, Uganda and Kosova. But peace is a process, not an achievable goal, there will always be something, somewhere, we can do together to make the world we live in a better place.

I wonder if you are in any way related to Alfred and Dora Bader of Wellingborough who were friends of my parents.

I hope you will not postpone your visit to Europe in view of the crisis the world is in.

Following our phone chat re Mr Bader, I enclose some information on our work which has a bearing on traumatised children in conflict situations.

We ourselves do not work directly with traumatised children, though the building of playgrounds in Lebanon is an exception to this. The main thrust of the work in Lebanon, former Yugoslavia and Uganda, however, is to help to build peace in these situations by strengthening and supporting local organisations. These local organisations work in a wide variety of fields - some with refugees, some on human rights, some on conflict resolution training. We have representatives in situ who get to know the people in these organisations and offer them consultancy and training so as to build the capability of the organisations. Some of these organisations deal directly with traumatised children eq helping children in Uganda who have been abducted into armed forces to re-integrate in their society and get into education. I can get more details on our involvement with these particular groups, if need be. But it is important for Mr Bader to realise that such organisations in conflict zones - whether or not they work directly with traumatised children - ultimately assist the development of their societies and therefore make life better for children as well as adults.

Our work at the UN on child soldiers is another important example of where we have made a difference to thousands of children and young people living in conflict situations through international pressure and agreement - often by preventing the trauma that comes with armed action at an early age. I'm sure that Mr Bader is interested in prevention as well as cure.




Dear Professor Chapman,

We now have ample time to plan for our visit in November, to which Isabel and I look forward very much.





Dear Alfred, Glad to read that Pavel is now working on your schedule. I did not go into college to-day. Yesterday afternoon the University suffered a major blow: the Botany building ,close to Chemistry, as gutted by fire. So to-day everybody probably had their hands full making emergency arrangements.

All the best seats for La Traviata have gone to subscribers to which we no longer belong. But I managed to get seats in the back stalls at £23.50 apiece. I may be able to improve on these later, if there are some returns. But the Theatre Royal is quite small for an Opera House, so it should be an enjoyable evening anyhow. Were Memphistoteles to offer us our youth back, we would gladly join the one shilling que for the Gallery!

In November Glasgow hotels are scarcely over-crowded. So that is not a pressing matter. As I mentioned earlier, we ourselves will not be able to avoid using a car. When I go to shul by myself, I park a decent five minutes away. But there is no way Yvonne can come without my dropping her practically at the door. Apart from our notable and energetic lay-minister, who regularily walks the eight miles from his home, and one or two people who still live downtown, all our learned congregation in fact drive to Garnethill from the more Jewish south of Glasgow or from the more outlying western suburbs; and that will apply equally to the Kinder attending the Shabbaton.

If you really did want to stay within walking distance of Garnethill, I can recommend The Greek Thomson Hotel where some of our visitors have stayed before. # SOME THOUGHTS ON THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE ISAAC NEWTON TELESCOPE

Stephen Phillips 20.10.01.

The aim of the development of a redundant telescope housing into an arts/creation centre is to benefit the arts, the Wealden community and the wider region, other local institutions, particularly the Science Centre and, most of all, the ISC and castle. Its failure would be a blow and lost opportunity to all these beneficiaries and a gap in the vision for the site of the Doctors Bader.

The Observatory Arts Centre can also become a beacon for creative activity across the region and a focus for partnerships with numerous organisations and individuals in the arts as well as academic institutions, notably Brighton and Sussex Universities. The performance and exhibition spaces will also be available to schools.


By being fully wired it will be a centre for new technology, both for rurally based professionals and as an education centre for the community. It will thus stimulate business. Its other training activities will be across the range of cultural activities and will be aimed at young graduates and professional development.

We would expect to provide work spaces for a number of artists and people working in creative industries and at the sharp end of new technology. Likewise there would be rehearsal areas, sprung dance floor, exhibition spaces and facilities for larger groups to use the Observatory as a "creation centre" on the French pattern.

In essence we would be generating activity and enabling collaborations as well as providing some local employment and, hopefully, much pleasure.

If a scheme like ours, which has support from numerous institutions in the region, including both tiers of local government, is not implemented for the site a great opportunity will be lost.

It seems unlikely that Queens will wish to invest on this site in the foreseeable future, or would wish to invest in the staff and expertise to plan such an enterprise. No viable alternative use has been seriously explored.




If INAT does not proceed successfully, the ISC will lose a vibrant potential partner who would help to animate and strengthen the whole estate, along with access to a set of excellent arts and communications facilities, which would be complimentary to those at the castle, (to mutual benefit).

Queens would have missed out on a chance to realise Dr Bader's wider vision for the estate, which could otherwise have added a cultural dimension to the academic, heritage and science enterprises already on stream.

Not only have the Doctors Bader pledged a third of the cost of the project, a generous promise of what is new money to the UK, but a distinguished board of charitable trustees, including the former Lord Lieutenant of East Sussex, the head of Brighton University's Eastbourne based School of Service Management and the editor of the Daily Telegraph, will have wasted its time and efforts.

As I see it Queens has nothing to fear or to lose from the arts project.

- It will be developed at the expense of the Trust
- The Estate will be made more attractive to general visitors and prospective students.
- There will be a range of additional facilities to strengthen the ISC's
- There would be take up of spare capacity accommodation at the ISC, particularly in down periods.
- A substantial chunk of unmanaged woodland would be improved and landscaped, along with a new road access to the Wartling Road and extended car parking.
- A historic building would be saved from gradual decline, which might otherwise become a costly white elephant.
- If the Trust fails and has to cease trading, the site will revert to the castle/ISC complete with whatever improvements and added value have occurred up to that point.
- There will be no sublets which carry any long term rights, so the worst case scenario would see the Trust having to cease trading and the whole site returning to Queens, refurbished and unencumbered.



• In the more likely event that the Trust is successful, the ISC will benefit from greatly increased activity, new and strengthened partnerships with a number of sympathetic organisations, the chance to expand student opportunities (various arts and cultural programmes) and generally to plug into the local community in a really positive sense.

There are, however, hurdles which it is very hard for the Trust to clear in the short term, several of them to do with chickens and eggs.

A lease hold of some 50 years, not vulnerable to the ISC's remaining in business, is essential to raise public moneys. In the sad event of the ISC having to sell up, two thriving activities on the main road (arts and science centres), maintaining visitor levels etc would not be a hindrance to selling on. Having led the campaign to prevent purely commercial development on site, and sitting as I do, on the Regional Assembly and the Cultural Consortium, I find it hard to imagine that any future use would be allowed to deny public access at anything less than the present levels.


There are a number of details about the present heads of agreement which can easily be sorted, but Queens' interpretation of Dr Bader's "no costs to Queens" pledge as including all legal and professional fees, (as opposed to just the actual cost of renovation and conversion), is very problematic.

By suggesting, not unreasonably, that we agree a detailed lease before signing the heads of agreement, the Trust would have to incur considerable legal and professional fees of its own, not to mention of Queens, which it would be hard pressed to afford. Most of our funds will only come on stream at the point we commit to carrying out the project – but we need the agreement to raise those same funds.

The question of Queens wishing to have a claw back clause is also difficult in that as a charity there will be no actual profits — all surpluses will be ploughed back into the charitable aims — but we can examine that.


Any short term profit made by visiting companies, performers or users of the creation facilities and work spaces would be part of a rental/hire agreement with the Trust. INAT would obviously seek to prevent a situation in which any partner made excessive profits without some mutual benefit.

Is it worth considering whether selling the freehold would be a simpler process?



My chief concern is that we should avoid any substantial up-front costs and that we should seek to open up the site as soon as we can cover the first stage of development (making safe, improving access, landscaping, reconnecting essential services etc).

Given the very welcome goodwill on all sides I hope that we can clear the various hurdles and get another stage of the Herstmonceux project up and running as soon as possible.

Dear Dr Bader,

I have heard of your interest in traumatised children through Sue Reid of Golden Reid Productions. I was one of the people she interviewed for the film 'The children who cheated Hitler'. My contribution was largely about Quaker work in support of the Jews in Germany in the years 1933-1948. Sue wondered if you would like to see it with us, while you are here in November. She recently sent me the unedited video of the interview, which was not included in the final version of the film. My parents, as Quakers and German citizens were deeply involved in this work, about which I have written a book.

After the last jews left Bad Pyrmont where the Quakers had helped them up to the time they were exiled to Poland. My father was then also arrested and sent to Buchenwald, but he survived there for three years until rescued by the Americans in 1945.

Since those awful times Quakers main concerns have been to prevent war. To this end I enclose a few papers from Quaker Peace and Social Witness which may give an overview of some of our work.

But now our leaders feel driven to start another war. This time it may involve the three religions, believing in one God, which all originated in Jerusalem. There seems little that peace workers can do now, though we work at the UN in New York and Geneva, Uganda and Kosova. But peace is a process, not an achievable goal, there will always be something, somewhere, we can do together to make the world we live in a better place.

I wonder if you are in any way related to Alfred and Dora Bader of Wellingborough who were friends of my parents.


I hope you will not postpone your visit to Europe in view of the crisis the world is in.

Following our phone chat re Mr Bader, I enclose some information on our work which has a bearing on traumatised children in conflict situations.

We ourselves do not work *directly* with traumatised children, though the building of playgrounds in Lebanon is an exception to this. The main thrust of the work in Lebanon, former Yugoslavia and Uganda, however, is to help to build peace in these situations by strengthening and supporting local organisations. These local organisations work in a wide variety of fields – some with refugees, some on human rights, some on conflict resolution training. We have representatives in situ who get to know the people in these organisations and offer them consultancy and training so as to build the capability of the organisations. Some of these organisations deal directly with traumatised children eg helping children in Uganda who have been abducted into armed forces to re-integrate in their society and get into education. I can get more details on our involvement with these particular groups, if need be. But it is important for Mr Bader to realise that such organisations in conflict zones – whether or not they work directly with traumatised children – ultimately assist the development of their societies and therefore make life better for children as well as adults.

Our work at the UN on child soldiers is another important example of where we have made a difference to thousands of children and young people living in conflict situations through international pressure and agreement – often by *preventing* the trauma that comes with armed action at an early age. I'm sure that Mr Bader is interested in prevention as well as cure.

Dear Alfred,

On January 16, my first semester at Pardes will be over and after 2 days break (man darf nicht lange faulenzen), the second half will start. I learned immensely and I hope to intensify my exposure to the Hebrew text as much as possible and to reduce my contact with English as little as possible since I want to progress more in the second half of my Jerusalem's stay.

I am also writing to ask you very much for a support I am missing. I knew from the beginning that I would not be able to live all the year with just my money. Please allow me to present my budget deficit.

My last paycheck from Pardes, which comes from your check and covers my monthly rent and bills, is coming in May. Since my contract is running till the end of July, I am missing money for two rents, i.e.  $2 \times \$275 = \$550$ .

Moreover, from the money I still have on my account I am able to cover my monthly expenditures for max. 2 month more. I would like to emphasize that I live very, very modestly and strictly observe my monthly expenditures. Despite that, they are on average \$350. I am missing any financial support for 5 month of living here, i.e.  $5 \times 350 = \$1750$ .

Briefly, in order to be able to finish my studies in Jerusalem, I need 1750 + 550 = \$2300. It is a huge amount of money for me and I am sorry that contrary to my American schoolmates I cannot turn to my parents or family to ask them for help. Therefore, I am daring to turn to you and I am asking you very much if you can help me in order to complete my studies at Pardes.

Dear Alfred,

I would like to inform you how is everything going.

My mornings classes are 3 days Talmud and two days Chumash. In Gemara we study the tractate Sanhedrin. So far we were translating just Mishnah but starting this week we will be exposed to the Gemara as well. I hope it will not be too frustrating.

In Chumash we study Shemot with mediavel commentaries, mostly Rashi, Ramban and Ibn Ezra. For about 3 weeks we did just the first chapter - it is amazing what everything can be studied about the Torah words.

>From 12 p.m to 1 p.m. we have just short classes - twice Parashat Hashavua and twice Rambam . These two classes are in Herbew so that it is challenging but very good. In Rambam we study Sefer Mada, unfortunately a chapter that is not so much interesting, but I was thinking of studying privately with another group Moreh Nevuchim. I remember that you told me how much do you like Mamonides - what do you like mostly about him?

At the afternoon we have twice a week Halachah with Zvi Wolf and twice a week Bekiut Nach.
Zvi is an extraordinary teacher - as my schoolmate Rachel said:
"I could never imagine that Halachah can be so funny!"

In Bekiut Nach we finished reading Samuel's books and strated with Kingsour goal is to finish all the prophets this semester. The reading is in English but once in a while we checked also some Hebrew words.

On Sunday night we have an interesting lecture Women and mitzvot and afterwards Torah Trope - so that Sundays are always pretty busy. On Modays and Thurdsdays evenings I have Ulpan where I learn modern Hebrew.

In some free time I always translate all the Parashat Hashavua



since I would like to learn all the vocabulary of Chumash during this year.

The days are prety full and I am tired every day but I like the learning a lot. Last week we got cheap tickets to Jerusalem symphony - they gave Dvorak's Sixth symphony so that I could listen to beautiful Czech melodies.

Every Thursday afternoon we have instead of learning in Beit MIdrash a communal project somewhere in the city - I started it last week in an absorption center for Russian Jews. I will be visiting some older or sick people. Last week I got to know Dina from Petersburg. She is 80, loosing her eye-sight, but she writes poetry. She does not speak Hebrew well - just Russian and Yiddish. I will be walking with her every week and listening to her poetry. So I will refresh my Russian from high school.

Two weeks ago Pardes went for a Shabbat trip to Gilboa. We hiked for a couple of hours in the area where king Saul made a suicide (if it was like that at all since Samuel 1 and Samuel 2 are contradictory) and we spend Shabbat on a kibbutz - they cooked well for us.

There will be every month a trip - in 2 weeks to Eilat -for 3 days - everyday a 8 hour-hike. So I hope I will survive.

I hope both of you are doing well. Temperature goes down even in Jerusalem.



Re: Potential Collaboration with Mentoring Institute

Based upon our meeting on last Thursday and subsequent discussion I believe it is possible for us to work with the Mentoring Institute in the below outlined manner.

Based the student profile shared with us at the meeting last week it would seem to me that a significant number of the youth enrolled in the Mentoring Institute would be in need of some sort of employment experience and the attendant income it would generate for them. We, on the other hand, have a need to further staff and support our youth programs especially in the area of tutorial services offered to the younger children who are in need of assistance with their reading and writing. It would seem that both programs would benefit by the placement of a predetermined number of youth at Family house, Inc. for the purpose of tutoring and other educational assistance in the basics of the 3R's to the youngest of the group of children in our after school program.

The current school year is nine (9) months in length. This necessitates the program being divided into two (2) parts. The major portion of the program would last for the duration of the school year and consist of the student tutors work experience begin scheduled for approximately three (3) and one half hours per day for four (4) days per week and eight (8) hours once a month on a Saturday. During the summer months work experience the maximum number of hours scheduled for Mentorship program students would equal four (4) hours a day five (5) days per week.




In the very near future if this initial component of the project is successfully implemented I suggest that we acquire the services of an additional two (2) students to assist with the Family House, Inc. young women's mentorship program. There also exist placement possibilities in the administration and operation areas of Family House, Inc.

Below is a projected budget for the yearlong collaborative mentorship program between our respective agencies described above.

However, be advised that should it not be possible for a collaborative effort to take place at this time between the agencies Family House, Inc. and the Mentoring Institute, this project could be implemented solely through and by Family House, Inc.

## KLAL YISRAEL by Otto Hutter

My trip to Israel had been carefully planned. So, when the telephone rang soon after I had reached my Jerusalem hotel room, it came as no surprise. It was Asher, a colleague from the Hebrew University. I had enjoyed his and Esther's hospitality before; and was invited to spend *Erev Shabbat* once more at their home in the German Colony. Soon the phone rang again. I recognized the soft voice of Moshe. In the last year, the phone had bridged the two thousand miles between us. Now he was only two blocks away. We had last been together sixty-three years ago as classmates at the Chajes-gymnasium in Vienna, the first Zionist Jewish day-school . We arranged to meet in the Jeshurun during *Schacharit* next day. Moshe told me whereabouts he normally sits.

The next morning, before setting out on the short walk to the Jeshurun, I studied an old photograph of Class IVB,1938. Moshe was the tall, brighteyed boy in the back row. Should be easy to recognise, I thought. But that Shabbat morning the Jeshurun was well attended, and from the back one man in a *tallith* looks much like another. Sitting where Moshe had indicated, was someone not tall enough to be him, I thought. So I sat my self in the row behind. Then I caught sight of his face. Yes, it was Moshe! The same large lively eyes, now behind thick glasses! I moved up and sat down beside him. We shook hands, carried on *davening* with the odd word between. Thus the ice was broken.

Moshe's parents had been Hebrew teachers, and Moshe's *Ivrit* was perfect by age 14. It served him well as scholar and teacher. Before retiring to Jerusalem, he had been a Professor at Baltimore Hebrew University. After the service, we walked slowly the short distance to his home. Moshe had only recently recovered from surgery and his wife's legs no longer served her as well as legs should. Nevertheless, Moshe and Shoshanah had contrived to lay on a fine midday spread replete with every kind of herring and the most beautiful and delicious *challot* I had ever tasted. And we talked until we needed a *shluf*.

The next morning Moshe and I met in the hotel lobby to work through the 1938 class list I had brought along. Combining our recollections, we concluded that at least twenty-seven pupils out of the thirty-nine in our class had managed to flee Vienna. Their trials and triumphs could form a sizeable appendix to Walter Laquer's recently published chronicle ('Generation Exodus', Brandeis University Press, 2001).



Egged Bus 963 from Jerusalem runs through the Judean desert towards Jericho, then up the Jordan valley to *Yam Kineret* and finally to Kiryat Shemonah in the extreme north . Altogether a spectacular four hour run. Ben-Zion, another classmate from the Chajes-gymnasium, had promised to meet me at the terminus. Fortunately, the terminus was uncrowded; and the pleasant open features of the boy I knew were still recognisable, though gnarled with age

The kibbutz which Ben–Zion and his then newly- wed wife Hannah had helped to found in 1945, was situated in the Hulla valley 10 km to the south. As he drove down the now well kept approach roads, Ben-Zion recalled the days when it took a three hour walk over rough ground. Now the kibbutz nestles under trees fifty years old. They overshadow the original watchtower still standing as a museum. A spring feeds a burn that meanders through the kibbutz to feed the large fishponds. 'Mekor majim chajim indeed! The carp growing in the ponds are destined to grace Shabbat tables in Tel-Aviv. Beef cattle graze on the Golan. A factory produces essential equipment. All property is still shared, but the chaverim now have a small private budget, for use in the dining hall and for other personal requirements, to save waste..

Over the next days Ben-Zion and Hannah drove me over the *Harei Naftali* to the west and the *Golan* to the east. Before 1967, the Syrian guns looked down on the kibbutz barely a mile below. They often opened up just as the children left school. Now the slit trenches have been filled in, but the underground shelters are well maintained. Townpeople from Kiryat Shemona who can afford it now send their children to the kibbutz schools as fee-paying pupils!

The kibbutz has three qualified nurses and the now ageing early members are cared for in their homes as long as is possible. Where appropriate they are provided with electric scooters and other mobility aids. A 14-bed nursing-home, fronted by a lawn caters for those who need it. Thus old age has been freed of financial anxiety and loneliness.

When Ben-Zion and Hannah lift up their eyes unto the hills they can see Mt. Hermon, where their eldest son fell during the Yom Kippur war. Their other two sons and grandchildren continue to live on the kibbutz. When I left on a Friday morning, I was told that on *Erev Shabbat* families always sit together. That evening they would need three tables pushed together, because a married granddaughter and their first greatgrandson were visiting. Not that this was a religious Kibbutz. But the



factory had shut down for the week-end, for widows and orphans they cared, the poor they did not oppress.

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The run from Kiryat Shemona to Tel-Aviv, through the Emek Yisreel and the coastal plain passed quickly with window gazing and with reflecting on the lives of my two schoolmates. Each a steadfast Zionist, though of different hues. The one, a Talmudist who had dwelt in the tents of the Lord all his life. The other, a defender and builder of The Land. I admired them both. Long may they live in peace and contentment!

I had settled in my hotel on Ben Yehudah Street by early that Friday afternoon and watched the pace of life gradually slow down as the shadows lengthened. I planned to eat in the hotel and have an early night. The previous Shabbat in Jerusalem, Asher had taken me to his community *shul* in the German Colony. It was well attended. As on the continent of old, *Kabballath Shabbat* was the main family occasion, and the many women behind the *mechitza* made for a tunefull service.

How then does central Tel-Aviv bring in the Shabbat ,I wondered. So, I sauntered the couple of blocks down to *Ichud Shivat Zion*, a major *shul*. As I lingered to decipher the notices, a man about my own age asked whether he could help. There ensued a conversation conducted in a mixture of Hebrew, English and German; for Yossi - as my interlocutor introduced himself- had come to Israel from Germany as a boy. Before long, I found myself invited to his home for *Erev Shabbat*. At first, I demurred not wishing to spring a surprise on his good wife. But he assured me that she was already expecting one guest and that, if I could come, it would allow us to make *mesuman benshen*. So how could I deny Yossi a *mitzwah* as beautiful as *hachnassat orchim?* 

Yossi's home was simple and his wife was attired in the modest fashion of orthodox women. But my, could she cook! Not since my childhood in Vienna have I eaten jellied carp as delicious as she served. Yossi had a melodious voice and the meal was punctuated by *zemiroth*. Afterwards, he delivered an erudite *Dvar Torah*. One premise impressed me especially: no one can fulfil all the mitzvoth by himself, because some relate only to *Cohanim*, while others to circumstances that may never apply. Only *Klal Yisrael*, that is all of Israel together in unity, can ever fulfil all the mitzvoth.

The miraculous carp we had eaten had surely come from Ben-Zion's pond, and verily it had worked wonders!
