



Margaret told me about your kind phone call and related to me that you did have a good trip to your English home! Thinking back I am amazed and full of admiration that you were so relaxed and well organized in the prospect of such a long stay away from your Milwaukee home. The secret must be that you moved from one home to another, a just as well organized home that awaited your coming.

My trip was restless (Detroit, Toledo, back to Detroit, Toronto, New York, one museum after the other). But I had, like during my visit to you, most rewarding encounters with surprising paintings. It was good for our research as well as for the exhibitions we are organizing.

My stay with you was one rich of emotions – you witnessed them all – and as far as these emotions were a disturbance to you I apologize. Bob's death kept absorbing me deeply. I wanted to speak on his funeral. His family also hoped that that would happen. I had to decide to write a farewell word with a personal portrait of Bob and to ask that to be read during the ceremony. Bob and I spent so many happy hours on our research trips. Moreover, my whole family became befriended with Bob's lovely family.

The most, however, I was impressed by the two of you and by the history you went through and the calm happiness you found in the autumn of your life (did you ever read *Nachsommer* by the Austrian author Adalbert Stifter?). Professor Sumowski further notes the painting's illustrious provenance as coming from the famous art researcher and collector Dr. Abraham Bredius who always considered it an original by Lievens and from whom it was inherited by his friend Dr. J. O. Kronig and thence by descent in his family. Recently discovered, the painting is part of a study of the same model used in another work formerly at the Caretto Gallery, Turin and recorded by Sumowski Vol VI, number 2358. The present painting was exhibited at the Tel Aviv Museum exhibition entitled "The Sacrifice of Isaac", 1997, number 8 illustrated page 35 of the catalogue. This is an early work dating circa 1625 while Lievens was still working with Rembrandt in Leiden. In an case, this is a masterly painting from the circle and almost certainly directly attributable with further research.

Domenico Zampieri, oailed Domenichino (1561-1641); "Classical Landscape with Elijah and the Angel"; Oli on canvas 100cm % '36cm (29.3.8" X 53.1/8"); From the collection of John Elijot, 1757-1823 thence by descent to Myer Richard of Rawnslay, Wellvale in Lincoinshire and thence by descent to Mary Fry (nee Fane) of Fulback Hall, Lincoinshire. This is a large and magnificent work in the full tradition of Domenichino's landscapes with Biblical figures. Recently re-discovered, it relates clearly to numerous other autograph work in many ways. Compare examples at Allen Memorial Art Museum at Oberlin College, Ohio, Galleria Doria Pamphili, Rome and several large carryases in the Louvre, Paris.

This aspect of Demenichino's work is directly related to the earlier influences of his studies with the Carracci family, especially in the Arcadian landscapes of Annibale. It's quality and execution speak for it as an autograph work of great beauty and this appraiser's opinion is shared by Dr. Christopher Wright who has also personally examined the painting in detail and who is further confirming its authorship in a written communication.

I hope that you and Mrs. Bader are well.

I am getting ready to teach my course on the Holocaust, as a seminar for senior students, next fall at the University of Western Ontario where I've been awarded the Smallman Visiting Professorship in the Department of History.

The library at Western is sadly inadequate in books and journals covering the Holocaust and I write to ask if you can help. I know how wonderfully generous you've been to the University of Toronto and to Queen's and that asking you to support another university is probably the height of chutzpah on my part. But there are some 4,000 Jewish students at Western, not all of them about to take my course, but many of them potentially interested in this and other aspects of Jewish Studies now and in the future.

So I write, in some desperation, to ask if you would help buy some of the books I badly need for the course, including a complete run of three key journals: *Yad Vashen Studies*, *Holocaust and Genocide Studies*, and the *Leo Baeck Institute Year Book*, as well as some seventy-five to eighty-five basic books. The journals might cost about \$2,000 and the books perhaps another \$5,000.

I am a teacher, not a fundraiser, and I just don't know where else to turn. Will you help? I ask on behalf of the students.

Course Description:

This course surveys the destruction of the European Jews during the Second World War. Beginning with a survey lecture on European Jewish history since the French Revolution, we will examine modern antisemitism and the rise of Nazism in Germany. We will then explore the evolution of policies, structures, and practices for the murder of the Jews in some of the countries that were occupied by German armed forces. As well, we will examine the reactions of the Jews, governments, and populations of several European countries, and the policies of Allied governments and the Christian churches. We will conclude with assessments of the survivors and post-war Jewish responses to the Holocaust.

Required Course Materials

The most comprehensive work on the Holocaust is Raul Hilberg's <u>The Destruction of the European Jews</u> (1961). We will regularly use the three volume (1985) edition, referred to here as Destruction, which is on Reserve in the Weldon Library.

The basic texts for this course are Y. Arad, Y. Gutman, and A. Margalit, <u>Documents on the Holocaust</u>, (1981); Robert S. Wistrich, <u>Hitler and the Holocaust</u> (2001); Rita S. Botwinick, ed., <u>A Holocaust Reader</u>. From Ideology to <u>Annihilation</u> (1997); and Donald L. Niewyk, ed., <u>The Holocaust</u>. <u>Problems and Perspectives of Interpretation</u> (2003). All are have been ordered



for the Campus Bookstore. All are on Reserve in Weldon Library. You are expected to read appropriate sections of Wistrich (use table of contents and index carefully) before each class.. As well, you are encouraged to consult other surveys of the Holocaust, notably M. Gilbert's The Holocaust. A History of the Jews of Europe During the Second World War (1985); W. Benz, The Holocaust. A German Historian Examines the Genocide (1999); D. Engel, The Holocaust. The Third Reich and the Jews (2000); R.S. Botwinick, A History of the Holocaust From Ideology to Annihilation (2004); D. Dwork and J. van Pelt, The Holocaust. A History (2002); and D. Bergen, War and Genocide. A Concise History of the Holocaust (2003).

For your historiographical paper and for future reference, you are advised also to consult Y. Gutman and G. 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


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


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

Dear Dr. and Mrs. Bader,

I trust this letter finds you both well. I hope the Wisconsin winter will not be too harsh this year. We have had a week of hard frosts already and snow is expected later this week. I have not lived in London long enough to know whether threats of snow are like those we used to get in Tennessee—nothing ever happens and then a few weeks later you wake up to an unpredicted foot of the white stuff!

You will be pleased to know that the \$36,000 gift you gave through the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee came to precisely £19,900.50 (£12.50 more than the estimate I sent you in August).

As requested, we have also reallocated the funds to our Uganda Programme, instead of the Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel (EAPPI). We appreciate your support and would like you to know that whether your money goes towards Uganda or EAPPI, you are helping the Quakers to make a difference in the lives of individuals and continue the challenging work for peace.

Enclosed is a map of Uganda along with the most recent journal letters from our field representatives, Stefanie Pollender and David Newton. I have also included letters from the latest group of Ecumenical Accompaniers as I thought you might like to keep tabs on that work. Please let me know if you no longer wish to receive them.

As always, please let Brenda or myself know if you have any questions. (I will be out of the office from 12 December until 12 January visiting my family in Tennessee.)
