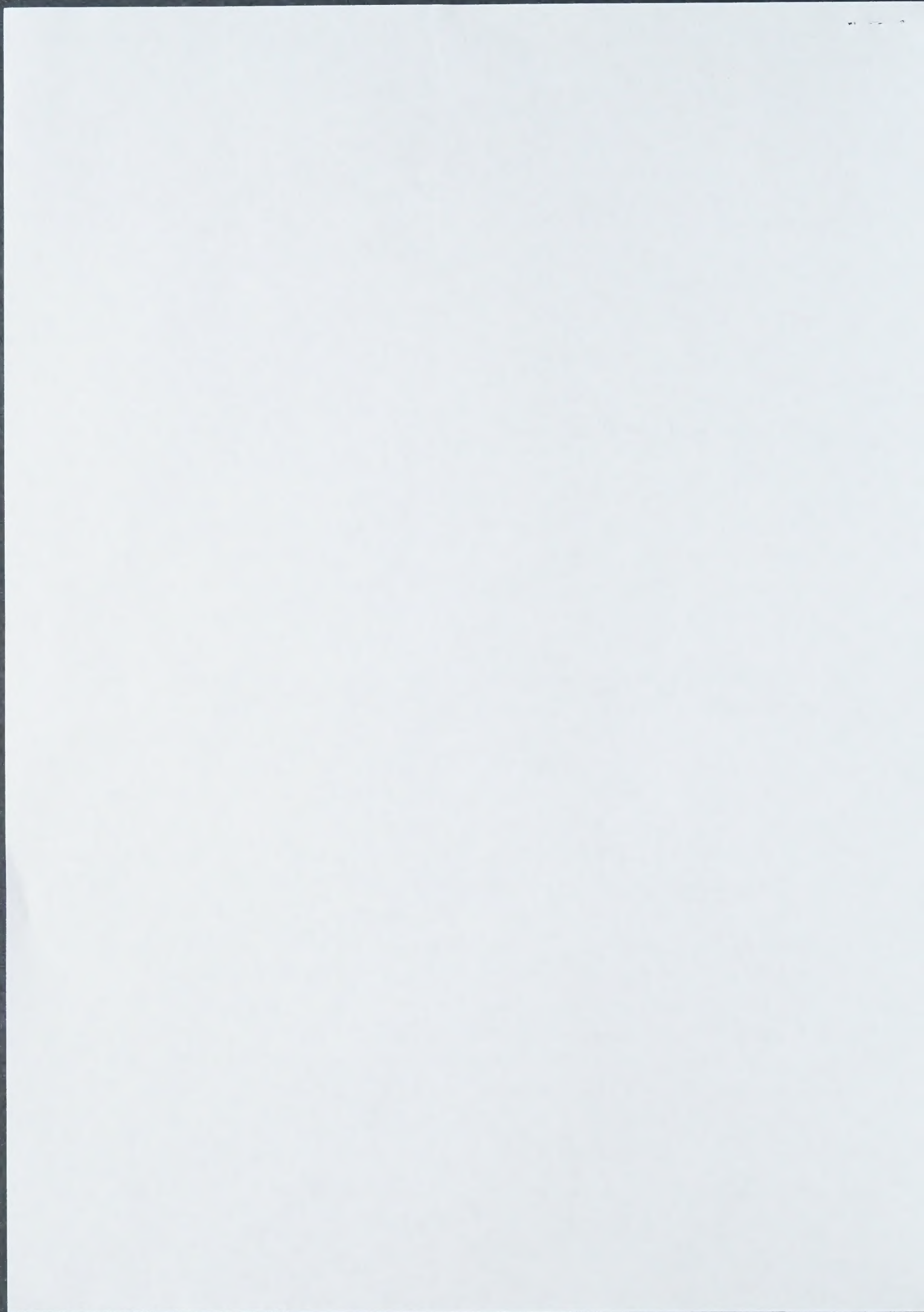

Dear Alfred and Isabel,

It was a pleasure to meet up with you yesterday and I'm so pleased that you were able to come and meet with the Bader awardees. I know that they enjoyed meeting you and, as with all of the recipients of the award, they greatly appreciate the help that it provides. The pressures on students are extraordinary and your generosity helps alleviate some of that burden in a profound manner and with a long lasting impact.

As we discussed I enclose two papers describing some aspects of the new reaction that we have been studying along with an unpublished manuscript in preparation for submission.

The initial discovery of the reaction (OBC) was made by a very talented postdoctoral fellow, Richard Fitzmaurice and was followed up by Ms Jenna Ahern, another very good student. The work has been taken to a new level because of the efforts of Vijay Chudasama (*Chem Comm* and unpublished). Vijay is an astonishingly talented individual, for example he was awarded the SET Chemistry Student of the Year in 2008 as the best Chemistry student in the UK. He is a UCL graduate and was our top student of the year and performing better than any student we had encountered in the last few decades. He was a recipient of a Bader award and was very appreciative of the award and the financial support. We were very fortunate that because of his truly exceptional ability he obtained a UCL scholarship to carry out graduate studies in my group to work on this fundamental and (in our opinion) potentially very important work. It was particularly important that he obtain this scholarship because I have had several unsuccessful grant applications on this area, and so without that support I would not have been able to support Vijay or any further work on this project.




This new reaction is truly fascinating and I think works because aldehydes react with oxygen to generate ultra-low concentrations of acyl radicals. The trick is to then ensure that the acyl radical reacts to make a carbon-carbon bond rather than to make the carboxylic acid. Thus the balance between ensuring sufficient oxygen is present to promote the formation of the acyl radical and yet not oxidise the radical is vital. We are beginning to gain a more sophisticated understanding of this process and I genuinely believe that with Vijay's insight and immense commitment to synthesis, he will turn this into a general and broad ranging transformation of significant use for many laboratories around the world. I hope this is the case because it would be appropriate reward for Vijay, who has not benefited from any sort of privileged background, and for someone who is totally committed to organic synthesis and plans to be an academic. I predict a great future for him and hope that the UK can provide an attractive environment for his long term career. I suspect that it will be tempting for him to remain in the US, when he experiences that environment as I expect he will as a postdoc in a couple of years time.

Working with Vijay has been a particular privilege for me, and an example of the wonderful benefits of the academic life. The experience of teaching, learning and discovering with our students is a real pleasure and at the heart of the University life. Your generous donation for Bader awards, plays a vital role in helping us support individuals and safeguard the environment for generations of UCL Chemistry students to come and for that we are immensely grateful.

Once again, many thanks for taking the time to come and visit us. It would be great to arrange to meet with you both in Bexhill and if so I would be happy to organise to visit on a date suitable for you both, and perhaps David and I could take you both for lunch somewhere close by.

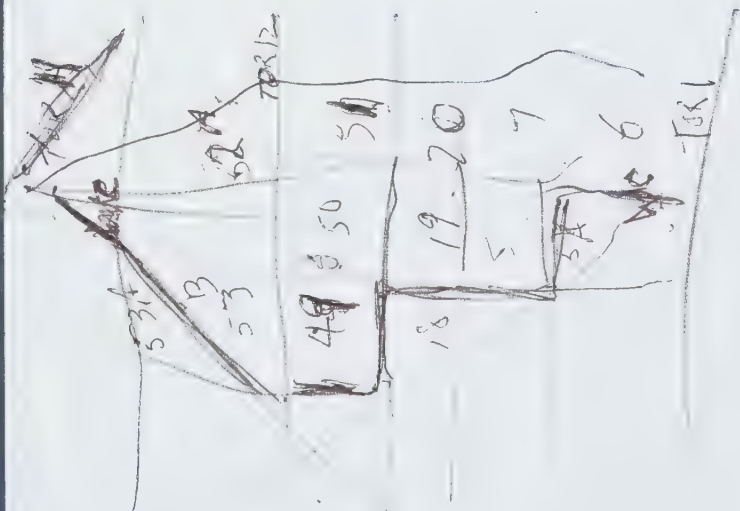

Dear Alfred and Isabel,

Thank you for calling yesterday. It is always a pleasure to hear from you. I am glad that Isabel returned home safely. It is good that Marion is feeling better. I know that Isabel's visit did her the world of good.

As promised, I am following up on the question you raised about the letters and then am following up on the question I raised about a project we might do together.

The first is the question of the letters.

I do not wish to do anything which would make either of you unhappy. I am here to serve you and assist. I do think that it would be better to have a friend doing the work than a press or a university department or graduate students. For this reason, I would help if that is what you decide. I would also promise complete confidentiality.

1. Typing the letters. Ann Lewis retired recently and would be delighted to work on the project with total confidentiality. She did not know what would be a good fee for typing but I did get the impression that her personal resources are a bit meager. I checked with the Department of Human Resources at Carleton and they thought that 800 hand-written pages would take about 65 hours and that the normal pay would be \$22 an hour or \$1430. Ann would be pleased with this, I am sure.

2. Presses. I had a staff member call a few presses. At UBC, the print and binding costs would be \$10 per hardcover and \$4.41 per paperback. Pre-press services of text design, cover design, and final proof production at \$6,500 plus overhead costs of \$22.00 per copy would make it \$53,000 for a print run of 2,500.

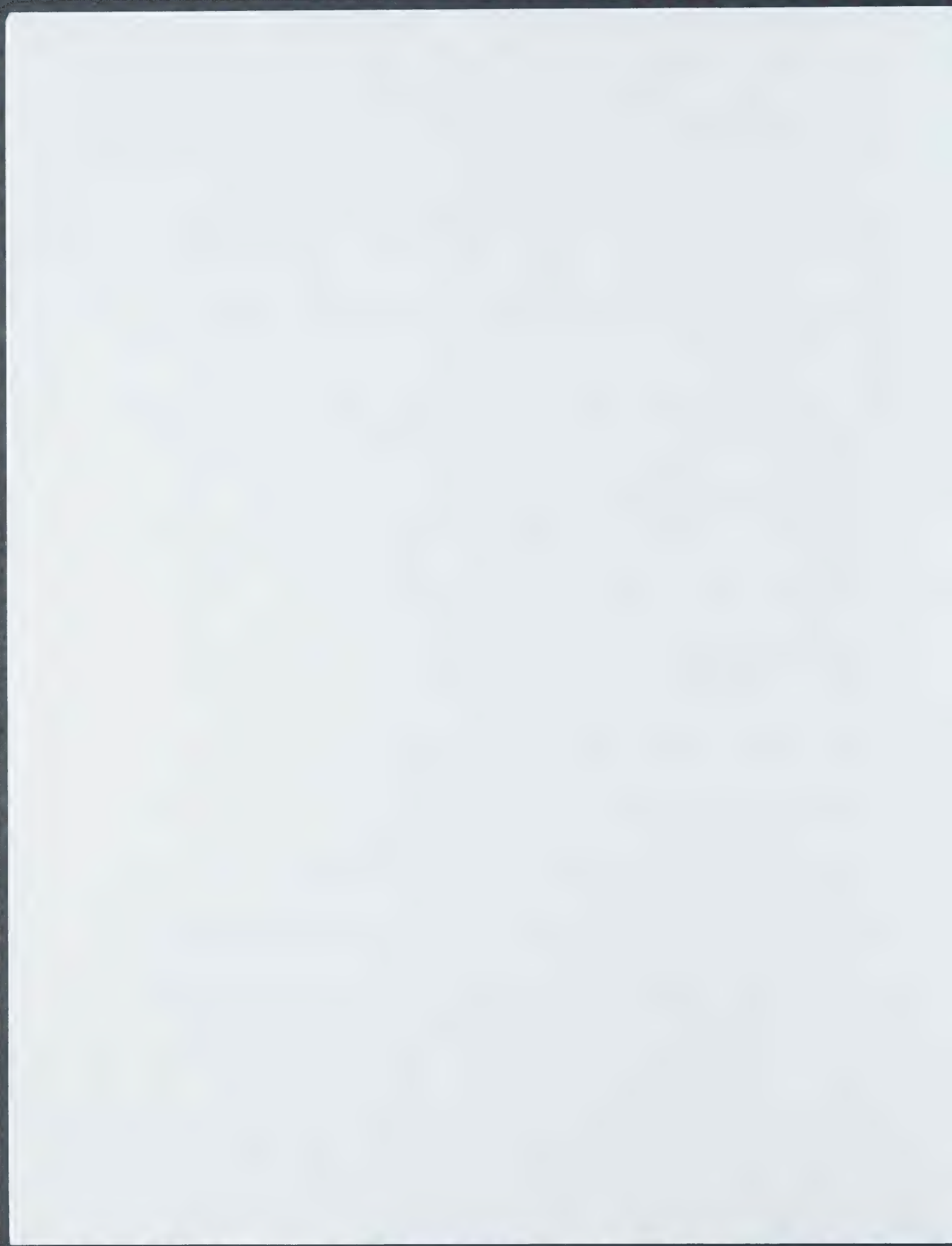
At the University of Iowa which has a very nice series of letters and diaries, they would estimate \$50,000 for 5,000 copies which would include high quality, non-gloss paper and some color printing.

These are today's prices. What would happen in 20 years? Technology would be more sophisticated and efficient for sure but costs of labor and value of dollars is not sure.

3. Of course I would do the introduction, oversee the project and see that it gets done as a service to friends. Definitely no costs involved.

4. U of Iowa is the best option now, in my opinion. At the appropriate time, we could check on other possibilities.

5. Then the press would sell the book. What should be done with proceeds? I think they should go back to your estate or to scholarships or whatever you wish.... You should make that determination. You should also say what should happen if there are extra funds in the account once the work is complete.

I can well imagine the many difficulties you had to overcome in establishing the Aldrich company, with its chemical library. Then, the pain when amalgamation with Sigma went wrong. I was struck by the excellent busines principles your son David expressed on page 7. (no doubt developed out of your own experience.)

This reminded me of my parents friendship with Ernst and Dora Bader, Swiss Quakers. Did you ever know of this Bader, also as a paint manufacturer to begin with? They came to London in 1938, but after some bomb damage moved their Scott-Bader factory to Wellingborough, and have prospered in plastics and engineering. Since you share the name of Bader with ^{them} you. You may perhaps be interested in how they shared the company with some of their workers.

I was also amazed at how you progressed from stamp collecting, and developed a pleasure in recognising valuable paintings. Surely a fascinating skill in which you also consulted other experts who might have been competitors.

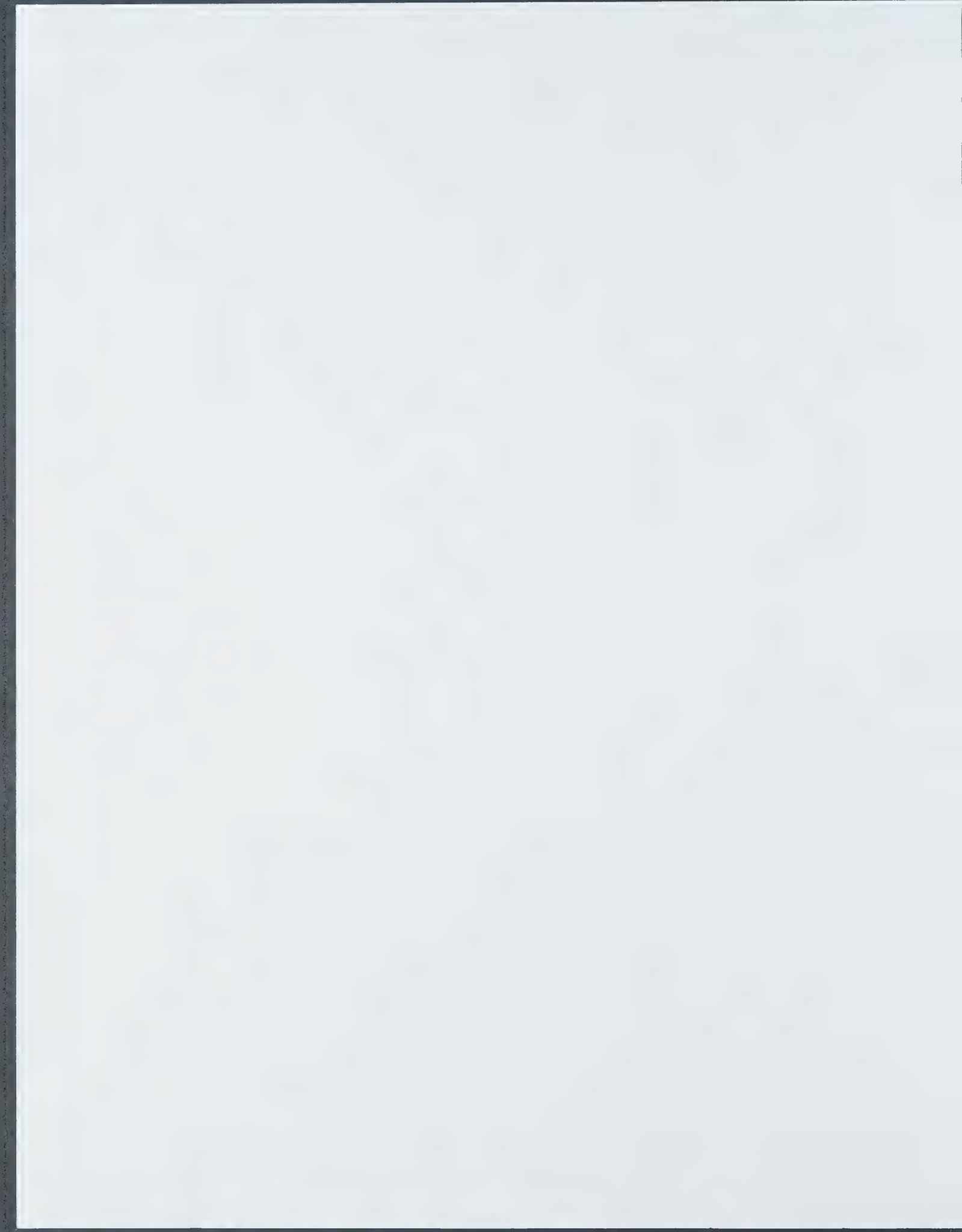

Isabel and I plan to be in London the week of July 4th but meeting you for lunch may not be very easy because I have some 2,000 paintings to look at which are located at several locations.

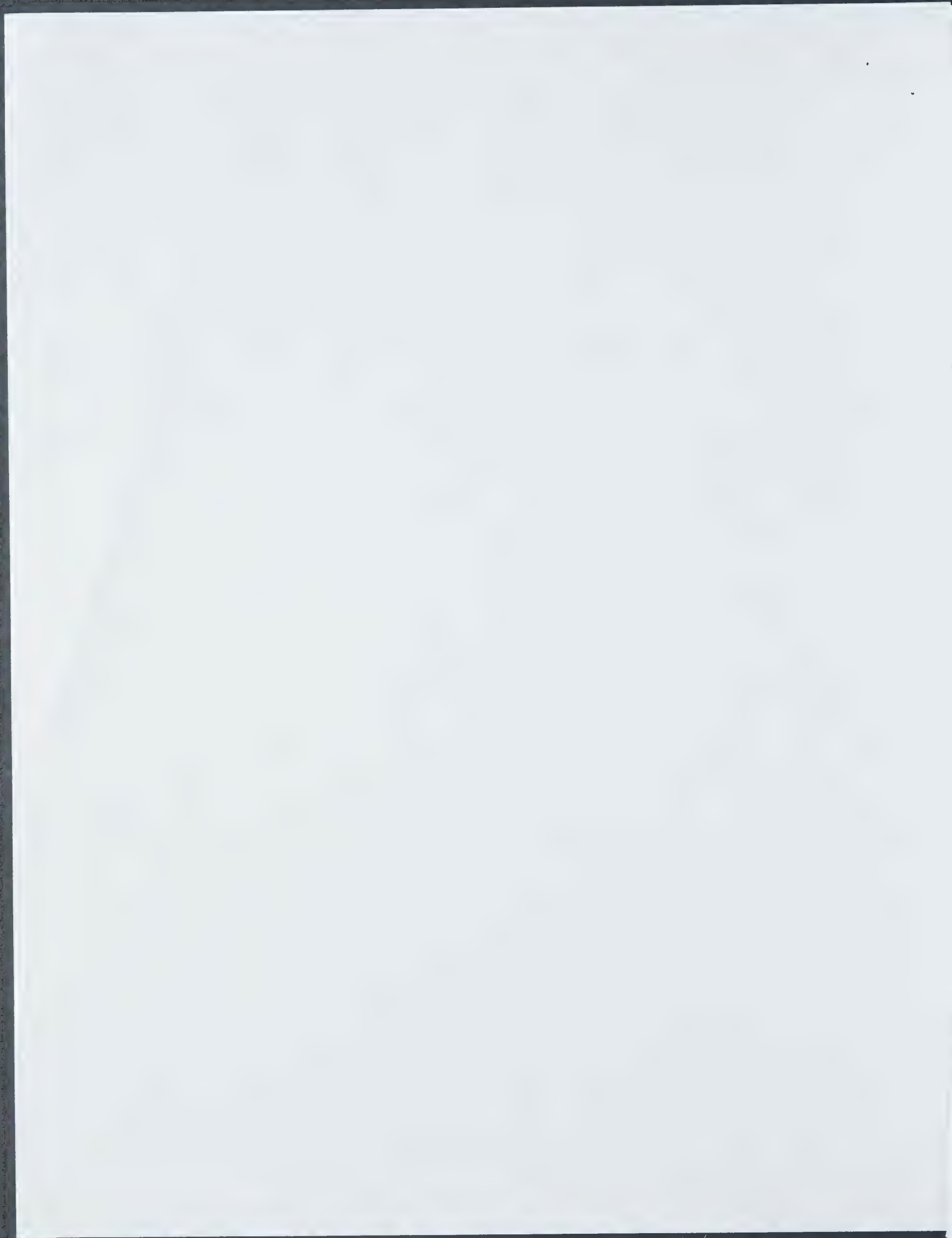
Lunch on the 5th is certainly impossible but Tuesday the 6th might be possible. Where will you be staying?

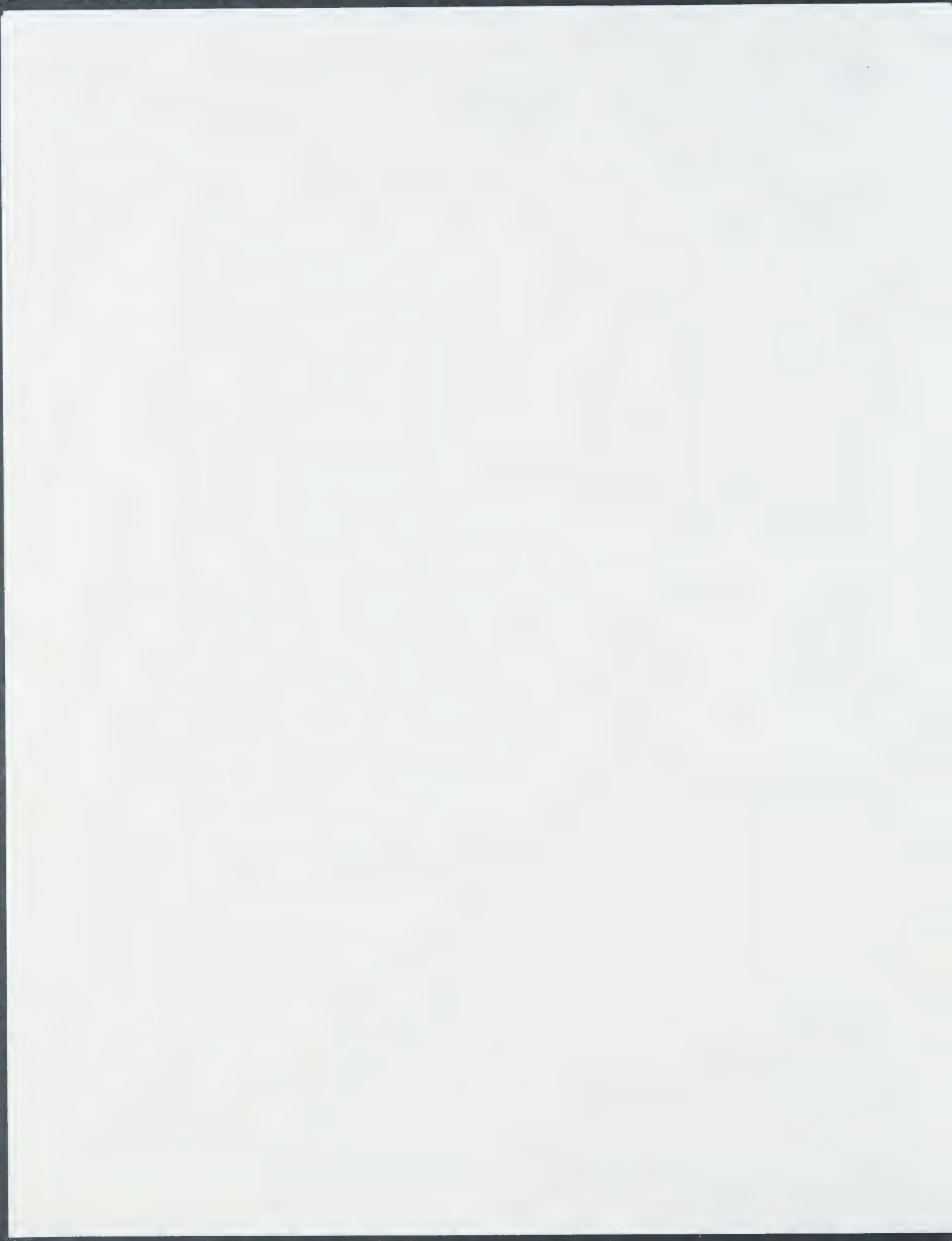

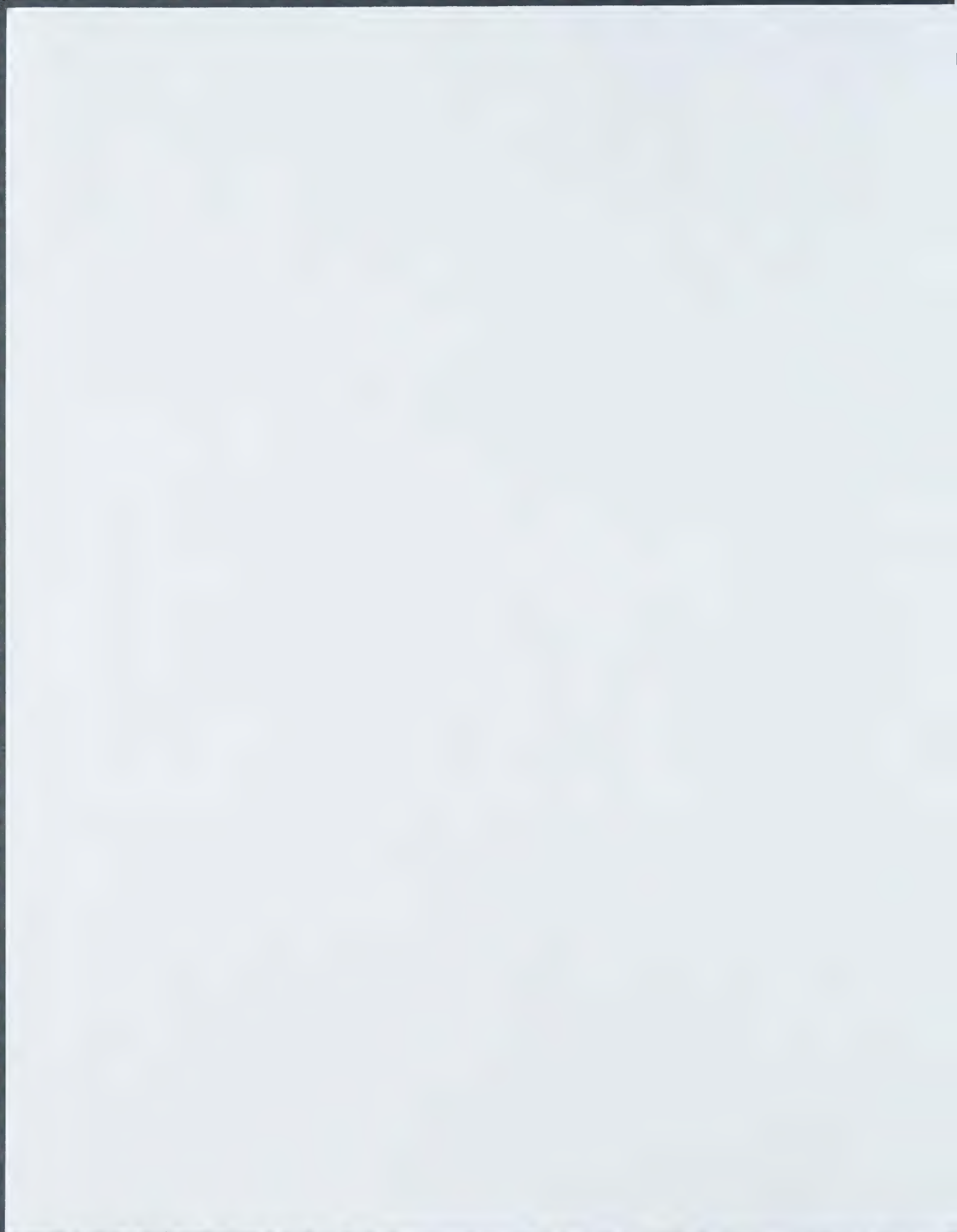

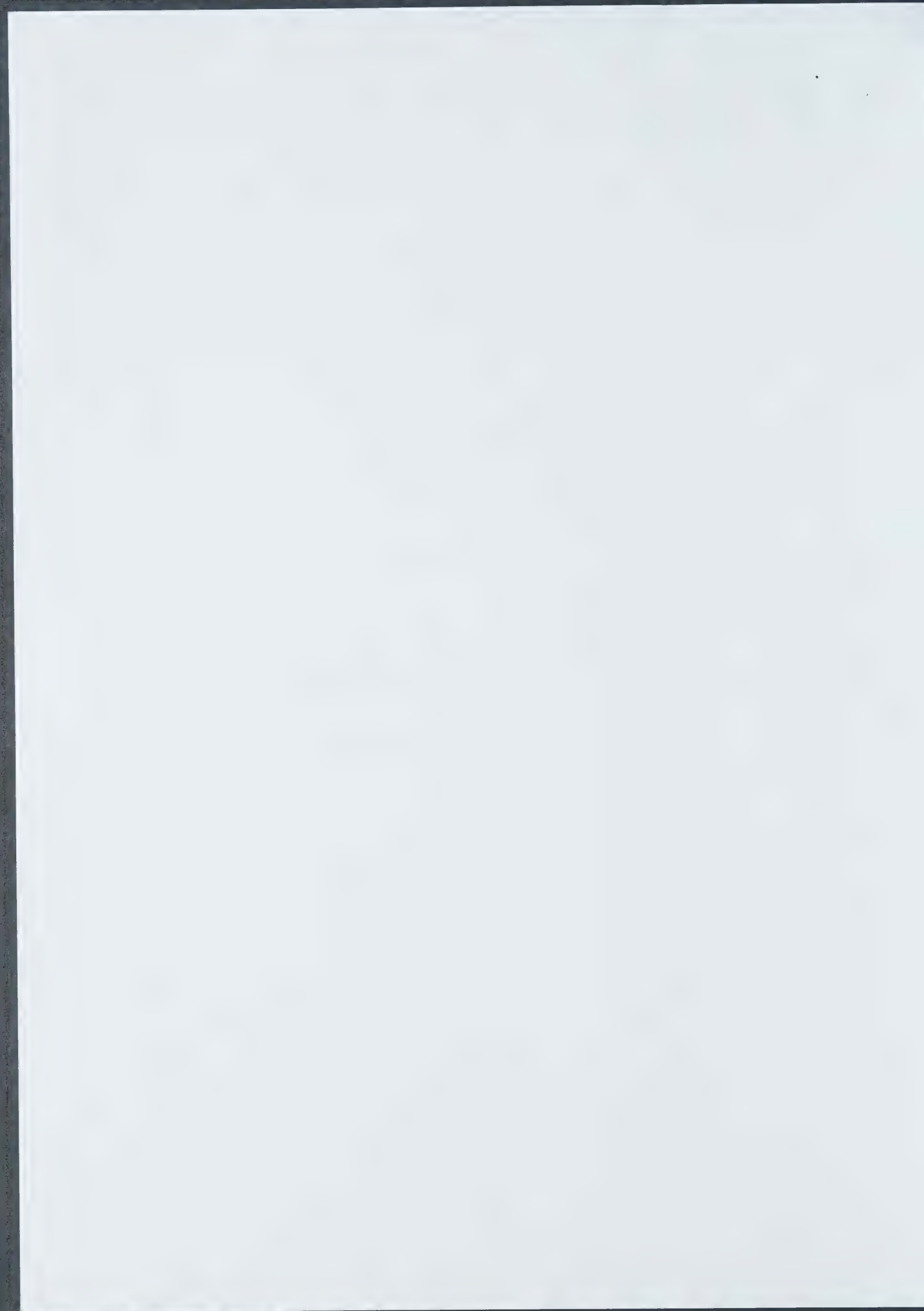
Thank you for your letter dated 19 May 2010.

BADER DONATES \$150,000 TO FUND CZECH STUDENTS

In a surprise gesture of goodwill towards IC's Chemistry Department Dr Alfred Bader announced that he would provide \$150,000 to fund an annual studentship to enable a Czech student to come to IC to do PhD research. The money will be invested to ensure a regular income to pay for travel, fees and maintenance. The Rector, Sir Eric Ash, personally drew up a letter of agreement and presented it to Dr Bader when they met to discuss the award. Dr Bader then took out his cheque book and wrote a cheque for the full amount.

Dr. Bader is Chairman Emeritus of the world's largest laboratory suppliers of chemicals, Sigma-Aldrich. He is also well known as a leading art collector specialising in Dutch masters of the 17th century. Regular readers of his magazine *Aldrichimica Acta* recognize it by its trademark of always reproducing an old master from Dr Bader's collection on its front cover. Many labs up and down the world are decorated with copies of his collection.

Wonderful surprise

When interviewed by our reporter Dr Bader said: "Czechs have always had an active chemicals industry and need well-trained chemists. Over the years many advances in the subject have been made by Czechs such as Heyrovsky who developed polarography. Now that the Czechs are looking once again to the West I felt that I could help by making it possible for there always to be Czech PhD student studying at IC."

Asked by our reporter about the gift, Head of Department, Professor Steve Ley said: "Dr Bader's generosity was a wonderful surprise. The gift comes on top of £10,000 which Alfred and his wife Isabel gave last year to establish the Bader prize for a third year student who stays on to do a PhD in organic chemistry." The current holder of the prize is Steve Marsden.

The new research award will be called the Alfred Bader Research Fellowship. Dr Bader has recently been elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Chemistry in recognition of his efforts in promoting our subject. He told our reporter: "I saw my fellowship as a way to pay tribute to Professor Ley for the magnificent job he is doing for chemistry and for IC. If I can help young Czech chemists to share in the excitement of Imperial then I will be very happy."



ICI SURPRISES FOR DON AND SUE!

Britain's biggest chemical company, ICI, has allocated surprise funds to two of ICI's top young talents, Drs Don Craig and Sue Thomas. They were delighted to find in their mail the other day, letters telling them that they were each to receive £9000 spread over the next three years and that the money could be spent in anyway they wished. Don and Sue are two of only a handful of young chemists who have been singled out by ICI for this special funding bonus.

Dear Dr. Bader:

Thank you for your recent letter in response to my report to you on the Bader Fellowship and the most recent recipient, Petr Valenta. Before responding, I wanted to talk with my colleagues in the chemistry department so that I might give you a full and accurate response to your question.

As you suspected, the department has not received any applications from Czech students in quite some time, despite the fact that our faculty members travel to Eastern and Western Europe throughout the year to recruit students and give talks. On a happier note, I learned that all Czech students who have applied over the last decade have been admitted.

Since we cannot guarantee that we will always have students from the Czech Republic interested in studying organic chemistry, I wonder whether you would be willing to consider broadening the restrictions on your fellowship to include any student pursuing a Ph.D. in organic chemistry? We would, of course, maintain your preference for a student from the Czech Republic, but this would enable us to award your fellowship in years when no such student is admitted.

If you do not wish to broaden the preferences for your fellowship to include all students, we certainly understand and want to respect your wishes. In this case, we will only award your fellowship in those years when we have an appropriate candidate. In years when your fellowship is not awarded, we will reinvest any spendable income into your fellowship fund enabling the principle to grow.

I have asked Carol Pooser, executive director of external affairs for the School, to contact you to discuss this further. If neither of these options appeals to you, Carol would be happy to explore with you other ways to designate your fund in order to assure that we are able to use your gift in a way that is meaningful to you.

Thank you once again for bringing your concerns to my attention, and I hope that we can continue to work together to address them in the best possible way.

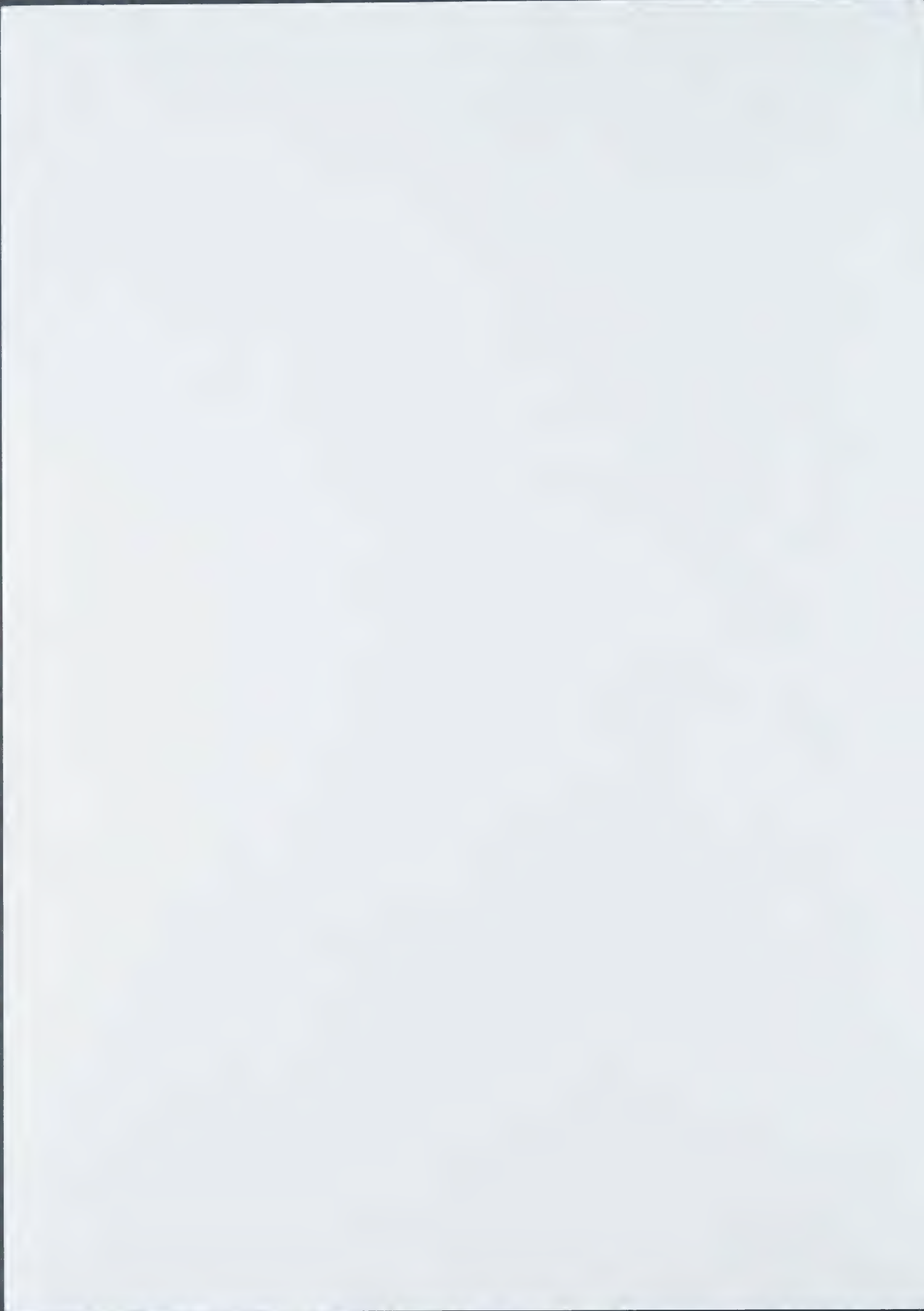

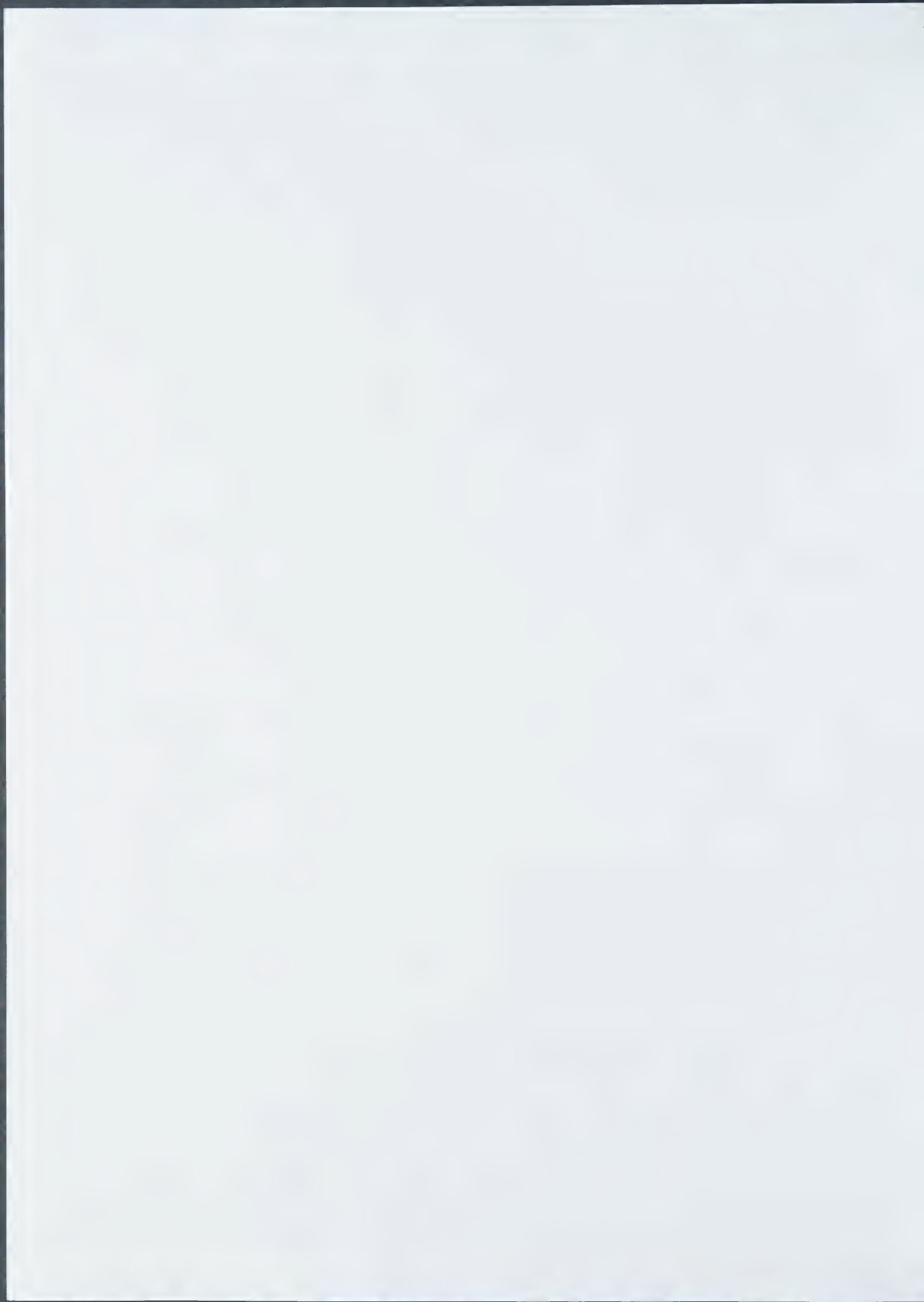
I hope that this time-frame and procedure seem reasonable to you as well.

Dear Alfred and Isabel

As promised I write with summary details of the finances for the Bader bursary scheme here in UCL Chemistry Department. There is always great interest from our undergraduates in the bursary scheme, and it makes an immense difference to the finances, and the progress, of the chemistry students that you so generously support.

In summary, the total funds available in the Alfred Bader Bursary account, at the start of August 2008 were **£ 54702**. Last academic session we supported 13 students in total, with a bursary of £2000 each. This is paid as £1000 in term 1, and the second £1000 in term 2, subject to satisfactory progress, and all of the students received the full bursary. Thus the current balance of the fund, at the start of this academic year (09-10), stands at **£ 28702**. We have a commitment to award the bursary to 9 students currently in years 2, 3 and 4 this year, and to continue awarding the bursary to these students up to the end of their degree would cost exactly **£ 40000**.

As I mentioned, we would very much like to continue awarding Bader bursaries in future academic years. To extend the Bader Bursary scheme to four new students each year for the next 3 years, would cost £ 8000 per student, so for 12 students would amount to £96000. Thus the total amount required would be:

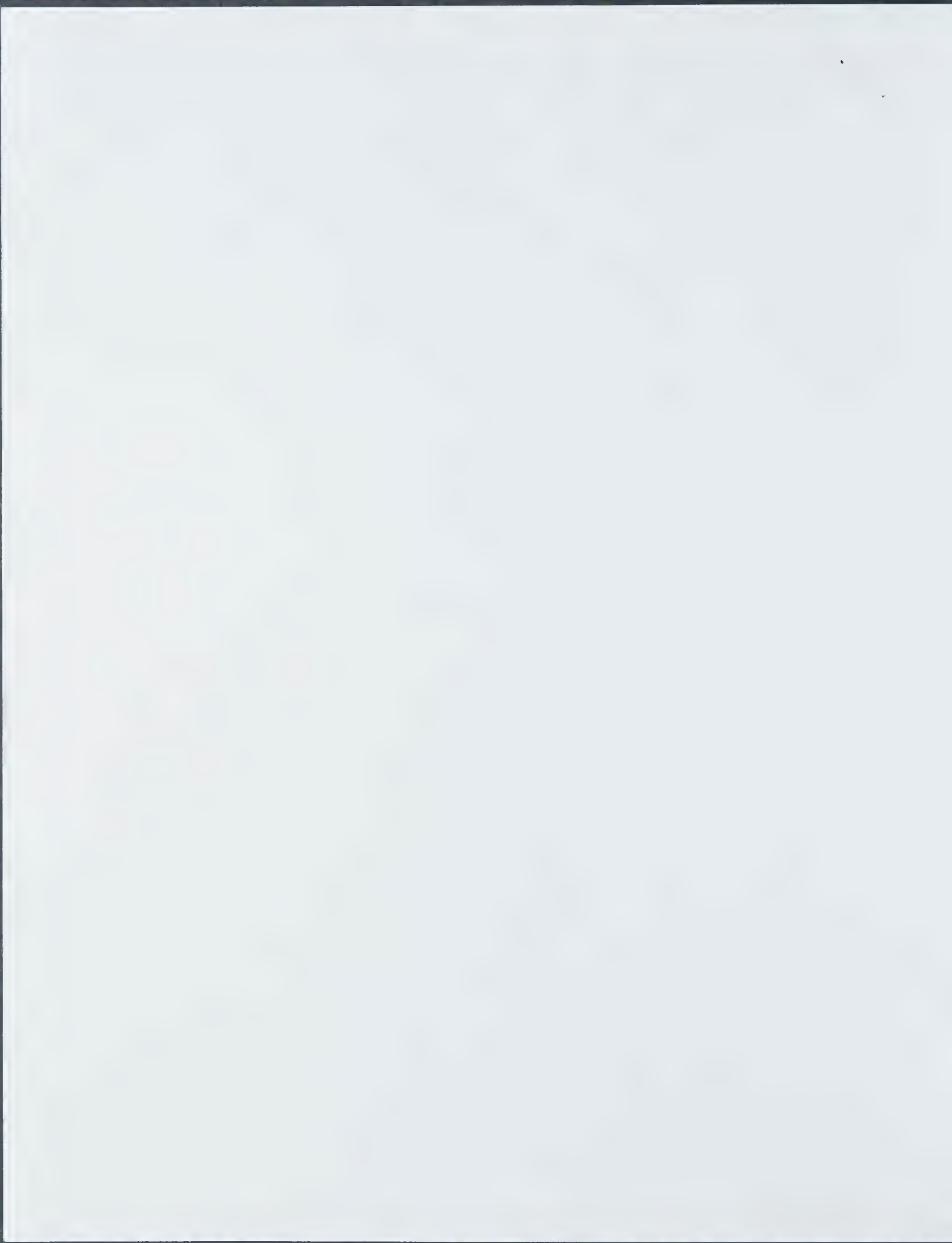
$$(\text{£ } 96000 + \text{£ } 40000) - (\text{£ } 28702) = \text{£ } 107298 \text{ in total}$$

Alternatively, to run the scheme for four more years would require:

$$(\text{£ } 128000 + \text{£ } 40000) - (\text{£ } 28702) = \text{£ } 139298 \text{ in total}$$

Of course these figures disregard investment income earned by the bursary fund and the fact that some students graduate (with a BSc) after 3 years rather than four, saving us one year of bursary. Equally they are based upon keeping the level of the bursary constant.

I do hope these figures are clear. I have asked for a more detailed breakdown of the investment income raised from the bursary fund, and will forward this to you when it arrives.



On the following page, I give a list of the students in years 2-4 whom we will be supporting this year and throughout the rest of their studies. If, as I hope, you and Isabel are planning to attend the Chemistry Laboratory Dinner this year, I would be more than happy to arrange for you to meet informally with some of them.

On a final note, we continue to award the Bader Prize of £1000 each year, from a separate investment fund, to the most able new PhD student starting research into organic chemistry. Last years' recipient was Mr Vijay Chudasama, an extremely talented student who graduated from UCL chemistry with an very high first class mark. I mention this because, for all four years of his undergraduate study, Vijay was himself a Bader bursar and enjoyed your support in his development as a chemist.

On behalf of UCL chemistry, I would like to reiterate my profound thanks to you and Isabel for your continued support of our undergraduates with Bader bursaries. 'A Chemist helping Chemists' indeed!


