

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Isábel and Alfred Bader receive highest alumni award

Two of the university's most loyal alumni, Alfred (Sc'45, Arts'45, MSc'47, LLD'86) and Isabel Bader (LLD'07), plan to visit campus this weekend to accept the Alumni Achievement Award, the highest honour bestowed by the Queen's University Alumni Association.

"The scale of Alfred and Isabel Bader's generosity is unprecedented at Queen's," says Daniel Woolf, Principal and Vice-Chancellor. "Their dedication and loyalty to this institution has enriched the student learning experience in countless ways, and faculty and students will continue to benefit from their involvement for years to come."

Alfred and Isabel Bader are being given the award for their significant contributions in the arts, philanthropy and education at Queen's.

"The commitment of Alfred and Isabel to Queen's University and its students is absolutely amazing," says Jess Joss (Artsci'96), President of the QUAA. "Together, they have created so much opportunity for learning and growth at Queen's. They have helped so many students pursue their academic goals, in the arts and in science, both here on campus, and internationally."

Alfred Bader fled Vienna for Britain in 1938 following the Nazi attack on synagogues and Jewish homes and businesses. However, his stay was short-lived because British Prime Minister Winston Churchill sent German-speaking refugees to internment camps in Canada and Australia in 1940 under the pretense that they could be "enemy aliens." Dr. Bader, 16-years-old at the time, was sent to Fort Lennox in Quebec until autumn 1941 when Martin Wolff sponsored his release. Mr. Wolff took Dr. Bader into his home and treated him like his own son.

Dr. Bader arrived at Queen's on November 15, 1941 to study chemistry. He served as president of the Queen's Hillel Foundation, and he became a member of the Debating Society. He also joined the recently founded Science'44 student co-op in second year.

He excelled at Queen's, earning undergraduate degrees in engineering chemistry and history as well as his master's degree in chemistry. He completed his PhD in organic chemistry at Harvard in 1950 and went on to start his own company after working for the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company in Milwaukee. An astute businessman, Dr. Bader helped build up Aldrich Chemical Company and he founded another company, Alfa Inorganics, in 1962.

Dr. Bader's philanthropic support for Queen's has its origins in 1943 when he received the Roberta McCulloch Scholarship. He vowed to establish a similar scholarship if given the opportunity. He followed through on that promise in 1948 when Martin Wolff died and left Dr. Bader \$1,000. Dr. Bader used those funds to establish the Martin Wolff Scholarships in Civil Engineering at Queen's. Since then, Alfred and Isabel Bader have established nearly 20 awards



and fellowships for students. Furthermore, they have endowed an unprecedented three chairs at Queen's – two in art history and one in chemistry —and a curatorship in European art at the Agnes Etherington Art Centre.

The couple's generosity has also expanded and shaped Queen's physical campus. They funded the purchase of Herstmonceux, a 15th-century castle located in East Sussex, England. The castle was renovated and now houses the Bader International Study Centre. Isabel Bader's love of the arts – she co-founded a drama school and costume museum in Sussex -- inspired the Isabel Bader Centre for the Performing Arts, which will officially open this September.

In addition to his work as a chemist and businessman, Dr. Bader has spent a considerable amount of time researching and collecting works by Dutch and Flemish artists of the Baroque era. His first gift of art to the Agnes Etherington Art Centre in 1967 has grown to 130 works including two Rembrandts. The Bader Collection has placed the Agnes Etherington Art Centre at the forefront of university art galleries in Canada, offering students across campus unique experiential learning opportunities.

The Baders intend to visit the Agnes Etherington Art Centre on Thursday and the Isabel Bader Centre for the Performing Arts on Friday. They will receive the Alumni Achievement Award at the QUAA Alumni Awards Gala on Saturday evening.

At this event, the QUAA will also honour other exceptional members of the Queen's community: alumni, students, and faculty. The mission of the QUAA is to reach out and foster a lifelong association with Queen's, to engage its members in the life and work of the university, and to serve the alumni community in all its diversity.

"These awards allow us to celebrate the achievements of members of the Queen's family," says Ms. Joss. "The QUAA believes it is important for these individuals with initiative to get the recognition they deserve and to share their inspiring stories."

Dear Dr. Bader.

Thank you very much for your prompt reply. I will make sure to continue in the path of kindness and generosity to those people in need, as I once was 24 years ago. I'll never forget what you and Paul Low-Beer did for my family. No money or words can ever repay you and Paul for your actions. The kind and bountiful views that you have abided to in your lives are a great example for not only me but my son about how important it is to help others.

Twenty four years have gone by very quickly. It was like yesterday that I remember taking a plane from Moscow, Russia to Vienna, Austria with my young wife and four year old son. At that time I was full of fear as I had never left the borders of the Soviet Union. We simply did not know what to expect. We



arrived late at night at around 11 PM and were placed by HIAS(Jewish organization) in hotel name Neuwaldegg house, which was located 30 minutes from the center of Vienna by trolley. The only thing I had with me except my suitcases were Paul's address written in Austrian on a piece of paper.

I woke up really early in the morning and as I walked outside I could not believe how different the world was after only two hours of flying.

I was a bit naive as I thought I could find Paul's home by walking from our hotel. My wife asked me where I was going and when I replied to her she told me I was crazy and that Vienna is an enormous city that is greater than just two city streets. I walked two blocks and found Paul's house. It was only two minutes from our hotel. It was a big surprise for my wife. I rung the doorbell and a lady answered who worked for Paul.

She informed me that he and Ala were away in Tuscany and would arrive in a week. When Paul was informed, probably by my dad that I had arrived, he immediately contacted Ala's sister who came with her husband the next day and took us into their home for dinner. We had never seen these people before and they treated us like family.

When Paul came back he invited us to his house. We ate dinner and Paul would laugh as my son, Alex, was singing Toto Cutugno's songs in Italian, that he knew by heart, through the records we played for him back in Russia. We spoke about life and he asked many questions regarding my fathers work with the development and research of Picamilon and Pantogam. These were the first class of drugs known as nootropics that my father developed in the Soviet Union between 1969-1972. They are still on the market in Europe today. I still to this day do not understand why pharmaceutical companies in America are not producing or studying nootropic compounds. I actually wanted to speak to you about this in person because I feel that Picamilon would potentially have a huge benefit in improving your quality of life. As we age the concentration of GABA in the brain drops and mental focus and clarity begin to slowly diminish. This is normal for all people after 60.

Before we were suppose to be moved to Italy we had a second dinner with Ala and Paul. Paul offered me pocket money after our dinner for our upcoming trip. At that time the organization called JOINT, completely financed the immigration of Russian Jews to Israel, United States, or Australia. He gave me money and I reluctantly refused. Paul insisted with his persistence and gave me Austrian Shillings was around 200 US dollars saying I'll never know if they will come in handy. Indeed they did come in handy when we arrived in Italy. In order to rent a room in an apartment, where usually a few families were split up I had to pay a real estate fee. It came out to be around the same amount as Paul gave me. From this point I believe you know more than me regarding my story and how everything was organized for me to arrive to the United States from Italy.

I communicated with Paul on occasion, not as much as I would have liked as it was difficult with our language barrier. When we speak you will realize I am a really slow learner. I would frequently ask my son to speak to him because his English developed much quicker than mine. When my son was 13 he had his Bar Mitzvah. I was surprised that Paul remembered his age and sent him 200 German marks with a card wishing him well. We never cashed this money as we decided it was best to keep it as a



memory of this great man.

My son plays tennis professionally. He picked up the racket late at 15 years old. He began progressing so quickly that we decided to put him on home school when he was 16.

During a few trips to Europe for Alex's tournaments, I contacted Paul prior so we could visit him. At that time Ala had already passed away.

He always insisted that it was not necessary as it would cost me extra money. A very similar answer to yours in your email to me. I never pushed or insisted on coming because of how reacted to my offers. If you ask me today, it is one of the biggest regrets of my life that constantly eats at me. I know I should have not listened to him and went to see him with my son.

I remember when I was a little kid my father would always have your catalog laying on his desk. At that time in the Soviet Union you could not acquire your catalog officially so he would get it from foreign chemists during international trade shows in Moscow, Russia. I remember questioning my father, " Why is there a painting on the front page of each new chemical catalog that was published?" At the time he did not know anything about you or your interest in Dutch paintings of the 17th century, he replied, " To show people that to create this catalog is just like creating a brilliant piece of art."

I have decided to write this letter before calling you. It took me several days to formulate my thoughts. The reason being is that I do not know how long our conversation will be when we speak. I am most certain I will be a bit nervous and during this time it is rather easy to forget what you would like to say. After writing this letter to you I know that I have not omitted any important information I wanted to share with you.

P.S.

I am forwarding you some of my family pictures. The bald gentleman is me. The young beautiful lady is my wife, Anna. The tall young man is my son, Alex. The oldest and smartest person in our family, my father Lev and my mother Raisa of course.

Anna loves Italy. The first two pictures were made in Rome two years ago. The third picture was taken in Sorento Italy same time.

Anna said all of the oranges are for you Dr. Bader!!! The next three photos are from the New Jersey shore. My father apartment in Brooklyn New-York. Alex on US Open.






London Slant: Rush to Amsterdam's Rijksmuseum by londonslant

While Britain dithers over whether to build Boris Island or expand Heathrow I hear that Holland's Schipol is positioning itself as London's major airport. If so, maybe the reopening of the <u>Rijksmuseum</u> can be considered London's hottest new cultural event.

So hop on a plane and head to Amsterdam fast. Because the museum has reopened after a 12-year closure with a stunning temporary Henry Moore show. It's the icing on the rich and delicious cake that's the makeover of the museum itself.

I arrived at the Rijksmuseum entrance as a rush hour stream of cyclists pedalled past. Their campaign to stop the proposed blocking of this route through the heart of the building was partly why the museum remained closed so long. I'd been warned there were huge queues to enter, but when I arrived at 9.05 I walked straight in.

I hot-footed it to the Gallery of Honour where Dutch old masters are arrayed. It's a magnificent sight, with alcoves of Golden Age works leading up to Rembrandt's Night Watch, dramatically displayed at the far end.

When the museum was built in 1885 the names of featured artists were inscribed high on this gallery's walls. The rehang of this revered space reveals a fascinating change of tastes. Frans Hals and Jan Steen are still here, Hobbema has gone and Vermeer (who, unbelievably, was unrated) has now been brought in. It's wonderful to see his <u>milkmaid</u> calmly pouring from her jug centre stage—especially since I'd pipped the heaving scrum and had her all to myself.

The entire museum gets my resounding thumbs up for its brilliant integration of fine and decorative arts. The story of the Netherlands, against the backdrop of the sea, is vividly conveyed through skilful juxtapositions of paintings and objets d'art. Showcases of vases, clocks and pieces of furniture are set among pictures of similar age and style. I thrilled to items that would never normally grip me, such as silverware and porcelain.

The building itself is a treat. I followed an architecture trail that led from the decorative neo-Gothic Great Hall, with its stained glass windows, to the new Asian Pavilion, where works are displayed in zen-like calm.

When the Rijksmuseum closed for the evening I headed into its gardens, where the Moores were bathed in sun. I peeped into the greenhouse where vegetables for the lunches served in the museum cafe are grown. Then it was on to <u>Sama Sebo</u>, the Indonesian restaurant next door, for a first rate rijstafel. Fortunately I'd booked a table: it was shoulder-to-shoulder—just as the space in front of Night Watch had become.
